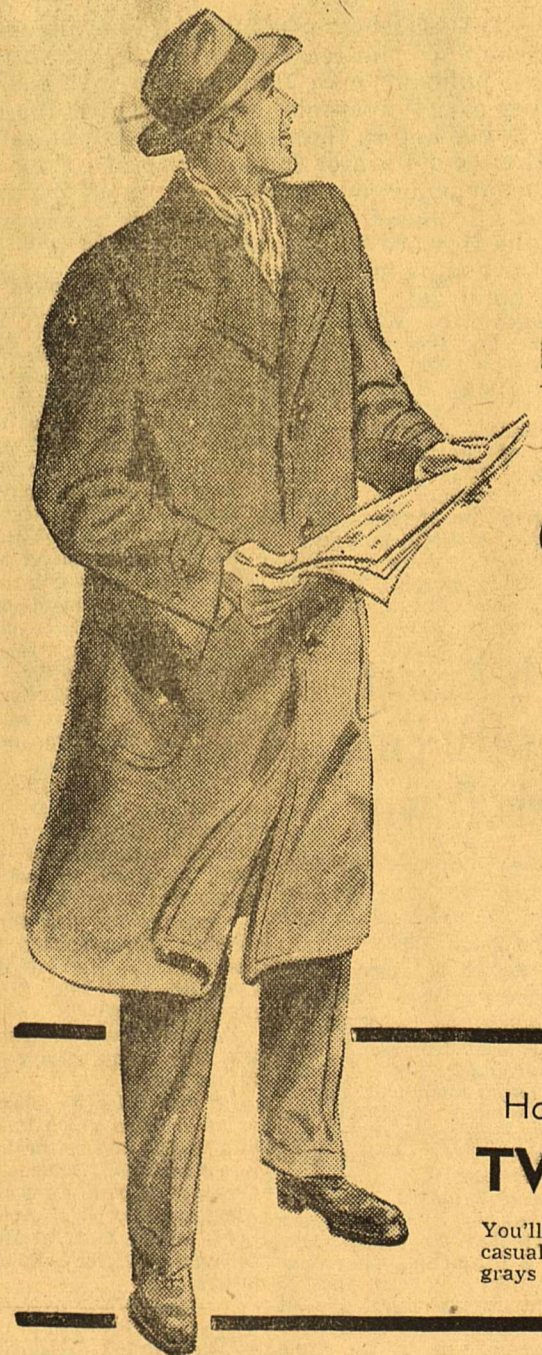

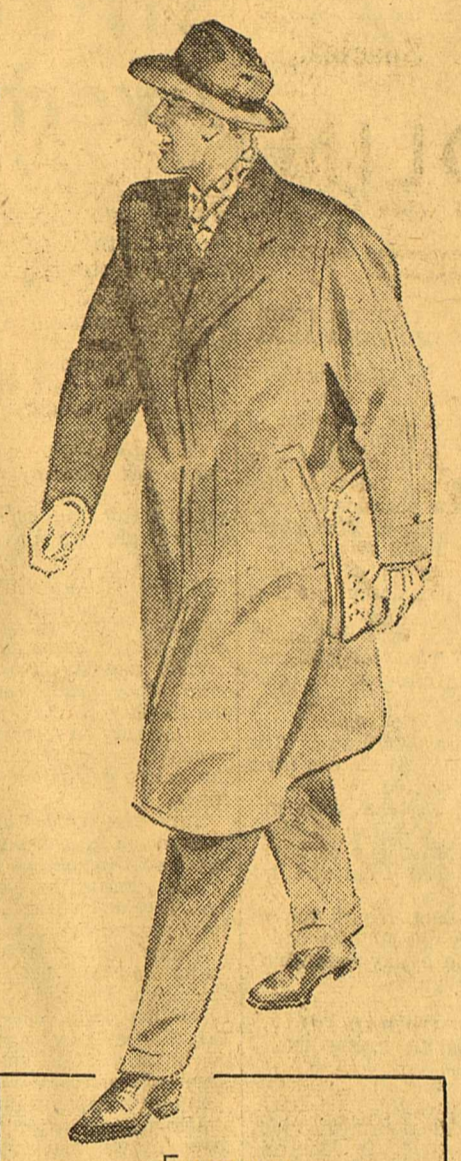

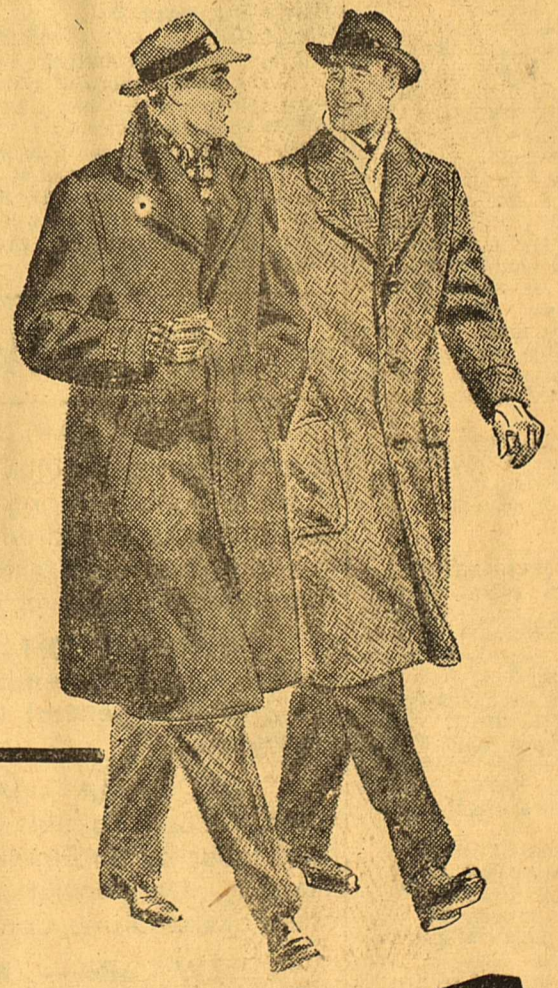

Midland Man's Mother Dies In Abilene Home

ABILENE—Mrs. W. J. Cunningham, pioneer Abilene resident, died Monday afternoon in the residence in which she lived about 40 years. Death came as a result of a cerebral hemorrhage. She would have been 73-years of age August 25.

She was the mother of W. J. Cunningham, Jr., of Midland. He is the manager of the VFW swimming pool at Midland Air Terminal.

Mrs. Cunningham was born August 25, 1874, on her parents' tobacco plantation at Brownsville, Tenn. She was married to W. J. Cunningham at Montague, Texas, June 12, 1894, and they made their home in Waco until 1899, during which time Cunningham practiced law.

They moved to Abilene in 1899, and had been here since except for a few years spent in Austin while Cunningham was a member of the Texas Senate. He was for many years district attorney and district judge at Abilene, and now is justice of the peace here.

Funeral services were scheduled at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include the husband; a son, W. J. Cunningham, Jr., of Midland; two daughters, Mrs. J. M. Chandler of Austin and Mrs. Florence Morel of Dallas; and four grandchildren.

Texas Oil Drilling Applications Increase

AUSTIN—(AP)—Oil well drilling applications thus far this year have totaled 5,382 compared with 4,303 during the same period last year, the Railroad Commission announced Tuesday.

Oil well completions so far this year totaled 3,264 compared with 2,722 last year. Wildcats brought in to date in 1947 were 141 compared with last year's 83.

The commission also reported an increase of 8,480 barrels in the average daily calendar day allowable on Aug. 2 as compared with July 26. The Aug. 2 figure was 2,477,993 barrels daily.

Airline Men Confer With City Manager

Operational requirements and terminal building lease arrangements at the Midland Air Terminal were discussed at a conference between representatives of Continental, Pioneer and American airlines and City Manager Bob Hoppe here Monday afternoon.

Hoppe said results of the conference were satisfactory and that agreeable lease arrangements will be worked out. He will offer recommendations concerning airline operations to the City Council at its next regular meeting.

M. H. Huffman of Fort Worth represented American Air Lines; R. F. McKee of Denver was the Continental representative, and George W. Harris of Houston represented Pioneer.
