Careful, Mister!

YARBOROUGH-PHILLIPS ARE TO DRILL IN W-C HOCKLEY
L. G. Yarborough and Son, of Midland, and W. A. Phillips, of Jacksonville, have filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas, requesting a permit to start drilling by September 1, on a 5,100-foot wildcat in West-Central Hockley County.

The project will be their No. 1 W. T. Coble, and it is 440 feet from north and east lines of tract 41, league 68, Hardeeman County School Land survey. That puts it eight miles southwest of Levelland, and in an undeveloped area west of the Levelland field, and north of the slaughter producing area.

GULF TO DIG FLANKER TO GOLDSMITH DISCOVERY
Gulf Oil Corporation is to drill a 9,700-foot flanker to its recent discovery for flowing oil from the Ellenburger in the shallow Goldsmith field of Northwest Ector County.

It will be Gulf No. 439-E Goldsmith, and is 664 feet from north and 867 feet from west lines of section 15, block 44, TP survey, T-1-S.

It is one location diagonally removed from the same company's No. 430-E Goldsmith, now in process of completion, after showing for good flowing oil production from the deep pay.

Drilling on No. 439-E Goldsmith will be started by August 13, using rotary equipment.

SMC STAKES WILDCAT IN S-C RUNNELS REGION
Southern Minerals Corporation No. 1 K. V. Northington, is to be a 5,000-foot wildcat, in South-Central Runnels county, about one and one half miles west of the town of Ballinger. It is to start making hole immediately.

The project will be 1,400 feet from the northeast and the southeast lines of the Northington 550-acre tract in T. Pratt survey No. 365 1/2.

It is also 1,400 feet northwest of the northwest corner of the N. Taylor survey No. 363.

Miller Brothers of Alice has the contract to drill the exploration with rotary and are now moving in equipment. It is calculated that the projected destination of 5,000 feet should take the project through the Ellenburger and into the Hickory sand of the Cambrian.

Southern Minerals recently acquired a block of about 6,500 acres surrounding the drillsite. The spread was worked up by John Gator and Ernest Cezeaux of Ballinger, and Marvin Miller of Dallas. Robert E. Morrison of Abilene did the geological work on the block.

NO OIL SHOWS FOUND IN DST AT MABEE I HEYDRICK
Guy Mabee Drilling Company No. 1 Heydrick, wildcat to 8,500 feet in Central-Southwest Andrews County, between Martin field and the Block 12 field, and 980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 6, block A-41, psi survey, was drilled ahead beyond 7,525 feet in lower Clear Fork-Permian line.

A drillstem test was taken for one hour at 7,388-7,525 feet. Recovery was 2 1/4 feet of drilling fluid, with a slight odor of gas. No signs of oil were developed during the test.

The zone covered by the investigation had drilled soft—but apparently it had no petroleum and no water.

WILDCAT TO START SOON IN NW DAWSON COUNTY AREA

Joe Josephson, and associates, are reported preparing to start drilling within 20 days, on their No. 1 Oiler, as a 5,000-foot wildcat in Northwest Dawson County, about 12 miles northwest of Lamesa.

It will be in southwest quarter of southeast quarter of section 27, block M E L survey. That puts it about four miles east of the town of Welch, and a short distance east of nearest completed oil producers on the east side of the Welch field.

It is understood that Cities Service Oil Company and Magnolia Petroleum Company are contributing to the drilling of the exploration.

DEEP CROCKETT DISCOVERY TO COMPLETE NATURAL
Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Mitchum, Northeast Crockett County discovery for flowing oil from the Ellenburger, 14 miles northeast of Ozona, and 12 miles east and two miles south of the recently completed discovery for production from the same horizon, in the Midway Lane field, at Sinclair Prairie Oil Company and The Atlantic Refining Company No. 1-68 University, is preparing to complete.

Street Paving Job Underway In Andrews

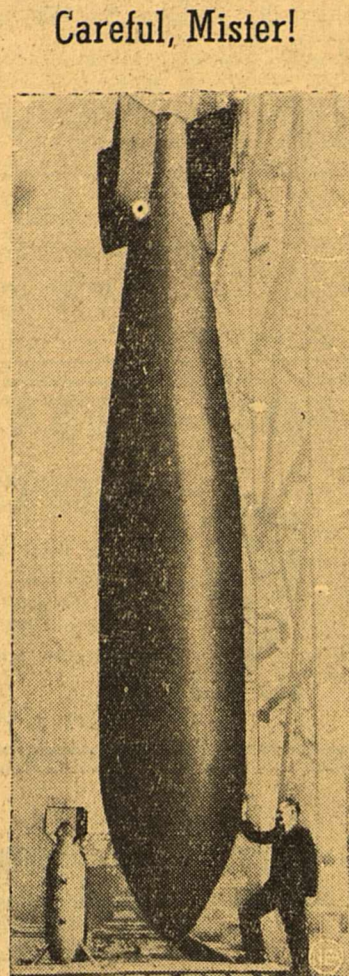

Bill Odom Will Seek New Record

CHICAGO — (AP) — Pilot Bill Odom said Monday that he would try it again after setting a new record for the fastest trip around the world.

The 27-year-old veteran flier broke all previous globe circling records as he buzzed the Douglas Airport control tower Sunday just 73 hours, five minutes and 11 seconds after leaving Chicago Thursday on his 19,645-mile solo trip.

"The good Lord was taking care of me for a while last night," Odom said, explaining that he had dozed off from fatigue over the mountains of Western Canada and awoke to find himself flashing toward a 19,000-foot mountain peak.

Broke All Records
Despite failure of an automatic pilot, lack of gas near the end of the trip, and extreme weariness, Odom, with his converted Army A-26 bomber, the Reynolds Bombshell, broke all existing records. These included the former solo record set in 1933 by the late Wiley Post, of 186 hours and 49 minutes, and the previous flight of the Bombshell with Odom, Milton Reynolds, Chicago pen manufacturer, and Flight Engineer T. Carroll Sallee, which made the trip in 78 hours 55 minutes last April.

Odom's average speed for the flight, including nine hours and 50 minutes on the ground, was approximately 269 miles an hour; but during the 63 hours and 15 minutes of flying time he averaged 310.59 miles per hour.

To Enter Air Races
Franklin Lamb, Odom's flight manager, said the airman would enter the Bendix Air Races at Cleveland August 30 and is planning another global flight in late October with scientists and newsmen aboard.

For the races he will fly a plane that Lamb says still is a secret, but added, "It will do considerably better than 500 miles an hour."

The new round the world trip will be the hard way—via the poles—Lamb said.

The architecture will be similar to that of the Episcopal church. The new building will be located on the church property east of the church on Illinois Avenue.

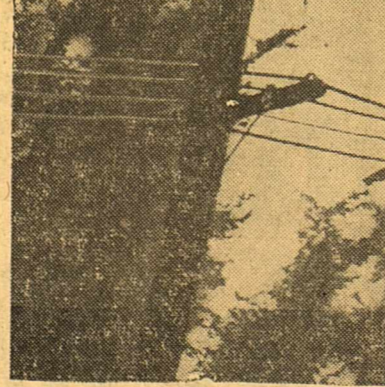
The building will be of brick construction.

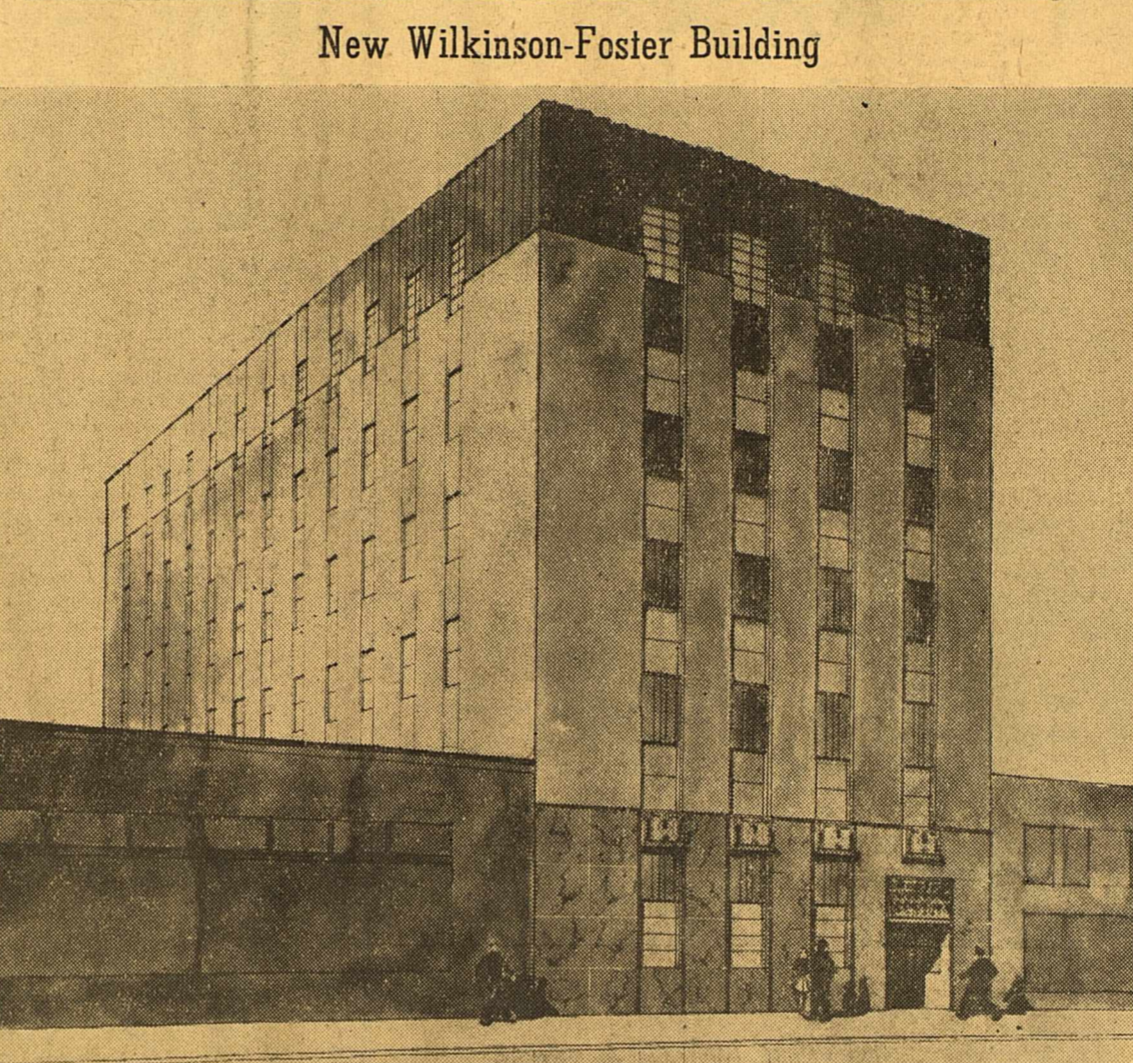

Howard Hughes Says Brewster Is 'Coward'



The new Wilkinson-Foster Building is under construction at 117 North Colorado Street, next to Barrow Furniture Store, in downtown Midland. A construction permit recently was let to Jack Wilkinson of Midland, I. N. Wilkinson of Abilene, and Mrs. R. T. Foster of Sterling City. The six-story building, which will house oil company offices, will be of brick, tile and steel construction. It will be 50 by 130 feet, and completely modern. Plastered walls, tile floors, fluorescent lighting and a refrigerated air cooling system of the latest type are features of the new office building. The exterior will be of marble and granite. Plans are to complete two floors for occupancy within six months, with the additional floors to be added as leases are obtained. Negotiations for leases on the upper floors now are underway. The Union Oil Company of California will occupy the second floor. Excavation has been completed and foundation forms will be installed this week. David L. Harmon is the contractor and J. J. Black of Midland is the architect.

Senate Inquiry Into Contracts Is Adjourned

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate inquiry into Howard Hughes' plane contracts was adjourned Monday until Fall, and Hughes declared it was called off because Senator Brewster (R-Me) was "too cowardly" to continue their fight.

Hughes made this charge in a statement read to news-reel cameramen after the Senate War Investigating Committee abruptly adjourned its inquiry into his \$40,000,000 wartime plane contracts until November 17.

Brewster Says Howard Hughes Threw In Sponge

AUGUSTA ME. — (AP) — Senator Brewster (R-Me) charged Monday Howard Hughes had "thrown in the sponge" under oath which I would answer.

"He was on two or three hours at a time for several days. Six times he urged the committee, and I quote 'I earnestly urge the committee to drop this matter right here.'

"It seemed to me he was crying 'enough' and throwing in the sponge. That concluded it so far as I am concerned."

Brewster and Hughes, millionaire Hollywood plane builder, exchanged charges before the committee in testimony last week.

Both under oath, Hughes charged and Brewster denied that the senator offered last winter to call off the inquiry if Hughes would agree to a merger of Trans World Airlines with Pan American Airways.

Hughes, Hollywood film producer and plane designer, holds a controlling interest in TWA.

Brewster left Washington Friday after the subcommittee had closed hearings on that particular aspect of the case and turned to circumstances of how Hughes got his plane contracts.

"When Senator Brewster saw he was fighting a losing battle against public opinion," Hughes declared, "he folded up and took a run-out powder."

Nationalization Of Steel Is Deferred By British Cabinet

LONDON — (AP) — Labor Party members of Parliament voted approval Monday to a decision by Prime Minister Attlee and his cabinet to defer nationalization of the steel industry, perhaps for the duration of Britain's economic crisis.

A Socialist informant said more than 100 Laborites abstained from voting at the party caucus. Attlee's margin of victory was only four votes—81 to 77. Labor Party left-wingers have been attacking Attlee on the ground the crisis program was "too little and too late" and his leadership was uninspiring.

One faction at the party caucus called for immediate resumption of trade negotiations with Russia. Sir Stafford Cripps, president of the Board of Trade, replied that the next move was up to the Russians. Socialist sources reported after the secret meeting. The trade talks broke down recently when Britain refused to ease the repayment of a wartime credit to Moscow.

Other Laborites called for cuts in the armed forces more drastic than Attlee has projected.

Members of the government said everything possible was being done to reduce the Army, Navy and Air Force.

On the steel issue, government spokesmen told the caucus there was no intention to abandon an election promise to nationalize the mills.

Americans Seek Explanation On British Spending

WASHINGTON — (AP) — An American demand for a full explanation of how Britain is spending her \$3,750,000,000 loan will confront British delegates coming here to discuss their country's critical financial plight.

Officials said Monday they need this sort of comprehensive statement before they can agree to relax any of the loan agreement provisions in a manner to help Britain save her disappearing dollar resources.

Britain has spent all except \$1,000,000,000 of the credit in 15 months—about twice as fast as anticipated. At the present rate all the money will be gone some time in October.

American government officials, preparing for the expected visit of British financiers next week, generally indicate that they are sympathetic toward Britain.

The State Executive Committee, in deciding this at a meeting here, also voted to support Roy Baker, national Young Democratic committee man from Sherman, as a candidate for president of the national group.

High Living Standard, Strong Buyers Market Prevails In Midland

NEW YORK — A higher standard of living and a stronger consumers market prevail in Midland, Texas, than in most communities in the United States, according to Sales Management's 1947 survey of buying power, covering all cities of 10,000 population and over.

With retail sales of \$14,284,000 in 1946, a large increase from the \$10,485,000 of the previous year, the city did 91.5 per cent of the nation's business with but 0.12 per cent of the population of the nation. It also was ahead on a statewide basis, accounting for 32 per cent of Texas' retail business with only 23 per cent of the population.

How well the average Midland family fared is shown by its effective buying power, which amounted, after tax deductions, to \$2,243 in spendable money.

Generally speaking, 1946 income in the United States remained about the 1945 level. Sales rose considerably but much of the money came from previously accumulated savings. Last year's savings, \$15.3 billion, were the lowest since 1941.

Birdwell, who said he had been called to testify before the Senate War Investigating Subcommittee Monday morning, denied at a news conference that he falsified an expense account, as Dietrich testified last week.

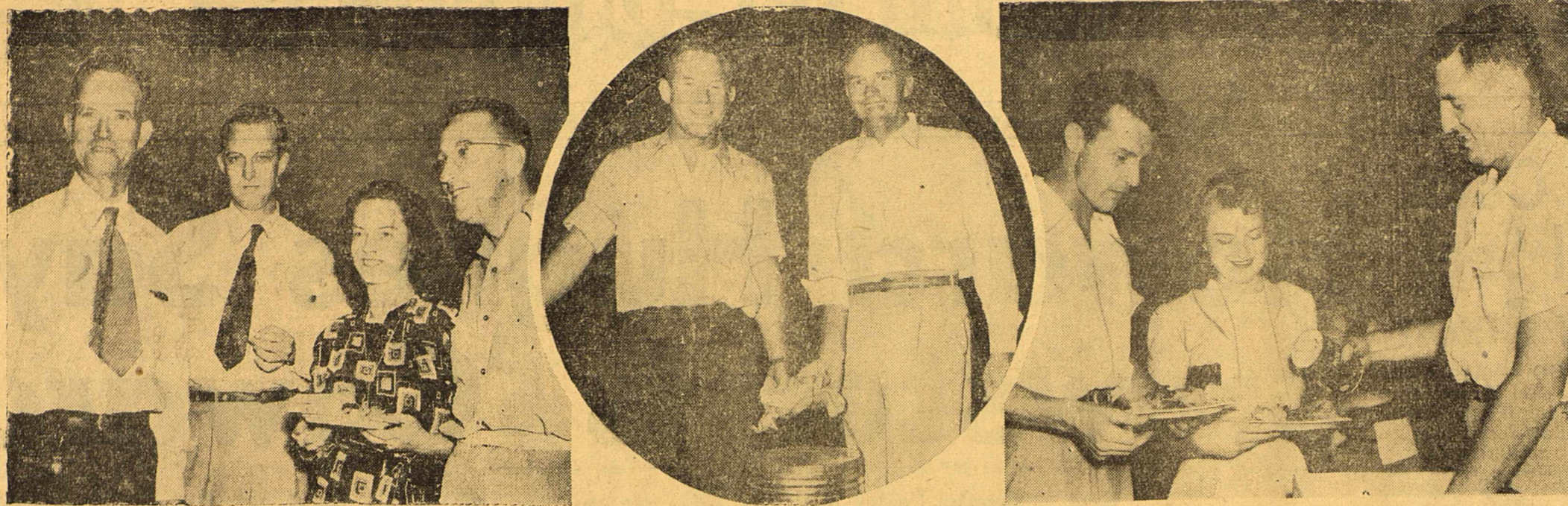

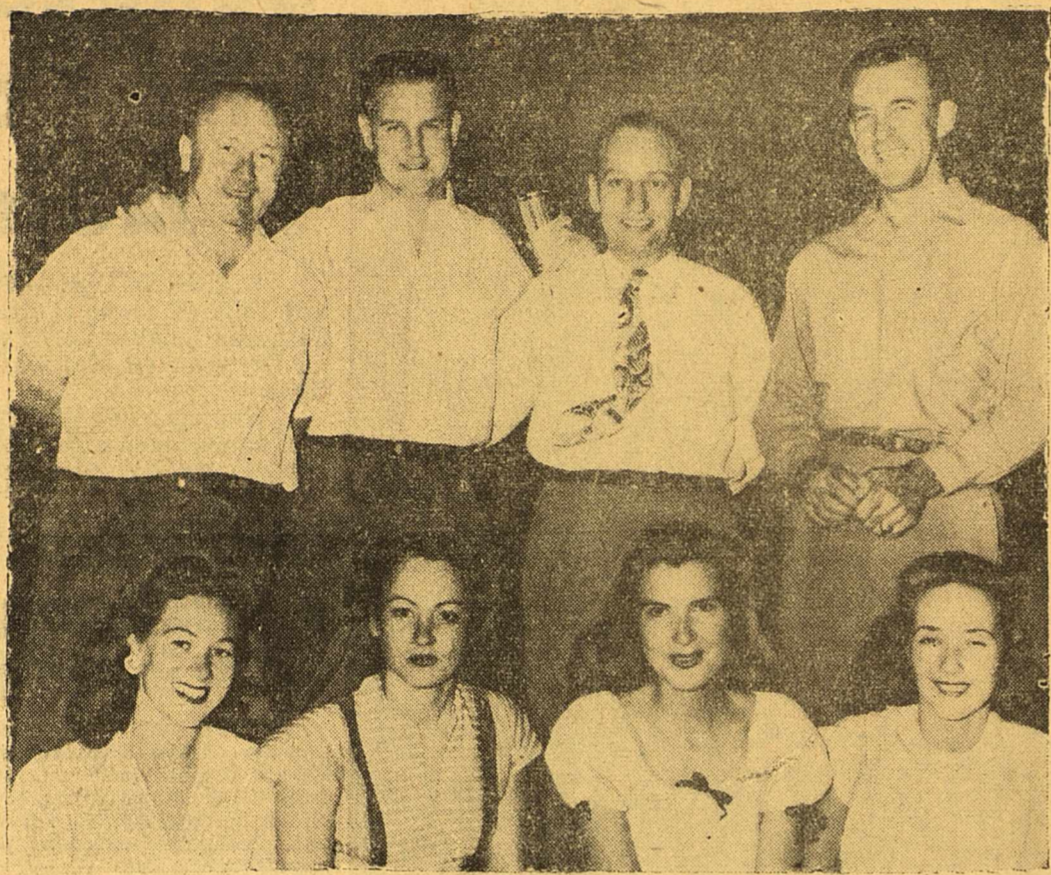

Navy Now Has Only 285 Combat Ships

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two years after the end of the war, the Navy reported its fleet of combat ships has shrunk from nearly 1300 to 285 in full operation and 21 in reduced status.

When the war against Japan ceased, the Navy said in a statement, the fleet included not only the 1300 combat ships but enough auxiliaries, not counting small landing craft, to total 11,000 vessels. Now, it said, it has besides the 306 combat ships in full and reduced status, 293 auxiliaries, 55 mine vessels, 74 patrol vessels and 152 landing craft.

From 41,272 planes on V-J Day, the Navy's air arm is down to 15,999 of all types, with 2,500 of them fleet combat aircraft.

In manpower, the Navy has gone from 3,996,758 men and 325,074 officers to 425,000 men and 46,000 officers and will shrink a bit more during the current fiscal year.

FIVE FAMILIES HOMELESS

DALLAS (AP)—Five families were left homeless early Monday when fire roared through a house here and damaged houses on either side of it. The cause of the fire was not determined. Fire Marshal W. G. Burns estimated total damages as \$13,000.

Victor Gilbert Meets With Valley Farmers

EL PASO—Victor B. Gilbert, El Paso County judge, and candidate for congressman, Sunday discussed with a group of Lower Valley farmers measures he anticipates taking to help solve their problems if he is elected.

He stressed the need for water conservation and prevention of soil erosion, which he described as the most serious problem facing the people of the 16th District. He pledged himself to work for a long range, scientific water conservation program.

The El Paso County official particularly condemned the action of the last Congress in cutting \$1,000,000,000 in appropriations from the soil conservation and reclamation programs.

He said he intended to push a program for insect eradication and spraying by airplane.

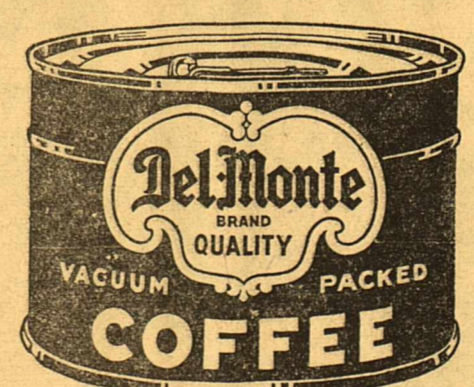

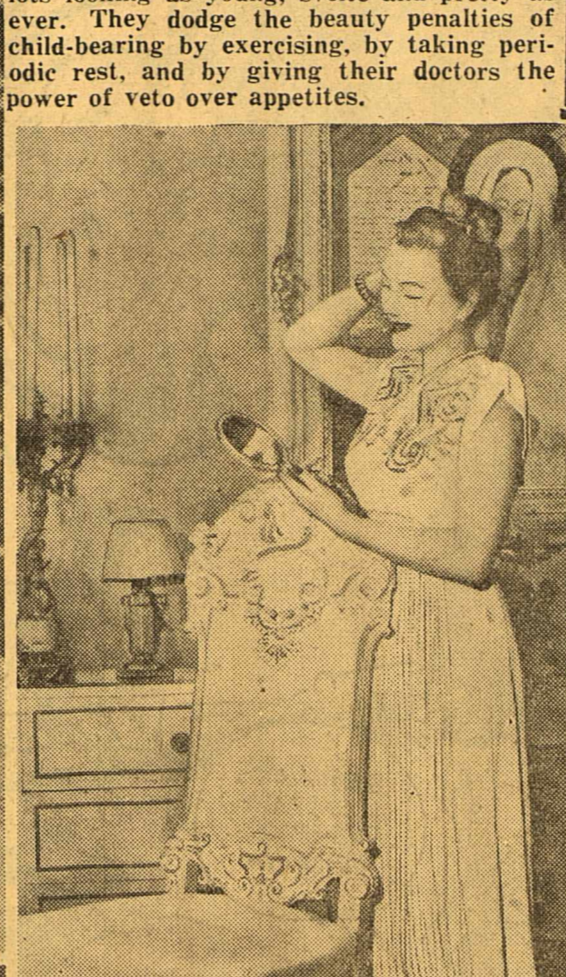

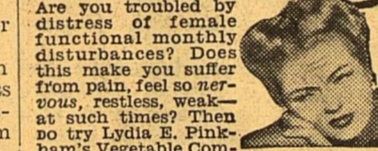

Physical Check-Ups Advised For Children About To Enter School

As opening of the new school term approaches, children preparing to enter school should be examined for any physical defects which might hamper progress in their studies, Dr. F. E. Sadler, director of the Midland-Ector-Howard County Health Unit, said Monday.

Family doctors and dentists during August can make sure children will be prepared to take up their books without hindering ailments which, in many cases, could easily be corrected, Dr. Sadler said. Eyes, ears, nose, throat and teeth should be carefully checked, not only because defects will cause immediate inefficiency in school, but will promote harmful effects that, if permitted to continue, may become serious threats to growth and development.

Children should be protected against communicable diseases by safe and dependable immunization, the doctor observed.

Warm Words At Lake Success

It might have been the heat or it might have been the humidity. Perhaps it was the result of a concerted decision. Or maybe they just got fed up. Anyway, some representatives of the United States, Great Britain and Australia really got together and teed off on the spokesmen of Russia and her satellites at Lake Success the other day.

There is nothing elevating in the spectacle of government representatives getting angry and calling names. Against the background of recent events at Lake Success, the spectacle might even be a little frightening. But we can't say we blame the gentlemen from the English-speaking nations.

At a meeting on Albania's UN membership, Chief Deputy Alexei Krasilnikov made a typical Russian-type speech. Then Britain's Valentine Lawford blew off steam. "It is deplorable," he said, "that we should be subjected day after day, week after week, month after month, to all this junk about provocations, lies, noises and repetitions."

That's not diplomatic language. But it probably better expressed some feelings that before have been expressed more elegantly, or else suppressed.

In the Security Council meeting the Communist bloc had complained that "monarcho-fascism" is rampant in Greece. Then America's Herschel Johnson had his say—and it seems to us that what he said has needed saying in the Russian and Balkan representatives' presence for a long time.

"Dictatorship is dictatorship," he told them, "no matter what name you call it." He explained that his government held no brief for the Greek government, but that Greece was no menace to international peace "and we think her three northern neighbors are." He added that there was not "the slightest evidence" of civil liberties to be found inside those neighbors' borders.

Testy Colonel Hodgson of Australia had something to say after the Krasilnikov speech on Albania, too. "I am glad these meetings are now open to the press," he said. "In the past the delegations here . . . have had to put up with calculated abuse and distortions" from this Soviet representative.

But perhaps the best thrust was by Lawford, who said, "We are presumed to be a gathering of intelligent officials, not a gathering of illiterates. We draw our conclusions from facts, not from catchwords."

Any non-Communist who has ever engaged in argument with one of the well-schooled comrades will know what Lawford meant. The comrades enter the list armed with a vocabulary of mumbo-jumbo and catchwords. They turn aside an opponent's argument by ignoring it and hurling a new accusation couched in the Marxist-Leninist-Stalinist double-talk of the moment.

It's most irritating. And it must be particularly irritating to the UN members, for the Communist delegates are post-graduate masters of their trade. One has only to read the speeches of Gromyko and his staff to catch the sneering decondensation, the cool insult, and the smug sense of rightness that will admit of no question.

We don't wonder that their intelligent colleagues finally blew up and talked straight talk. It may not improve international relations, but it might clear the air. It might also give the Russians and their followers an idea that there is a limit to which taunts and goadings will be endured.

Russia's tactics are those of the street-corner bully. And the bully usually discovers one day that he has gone too far, and pulls in his horns.

It takes 150 years for a slow growing cedar to reach a size suitable for use as a wire service pole. Southern pine will reach the same size in 50 years.

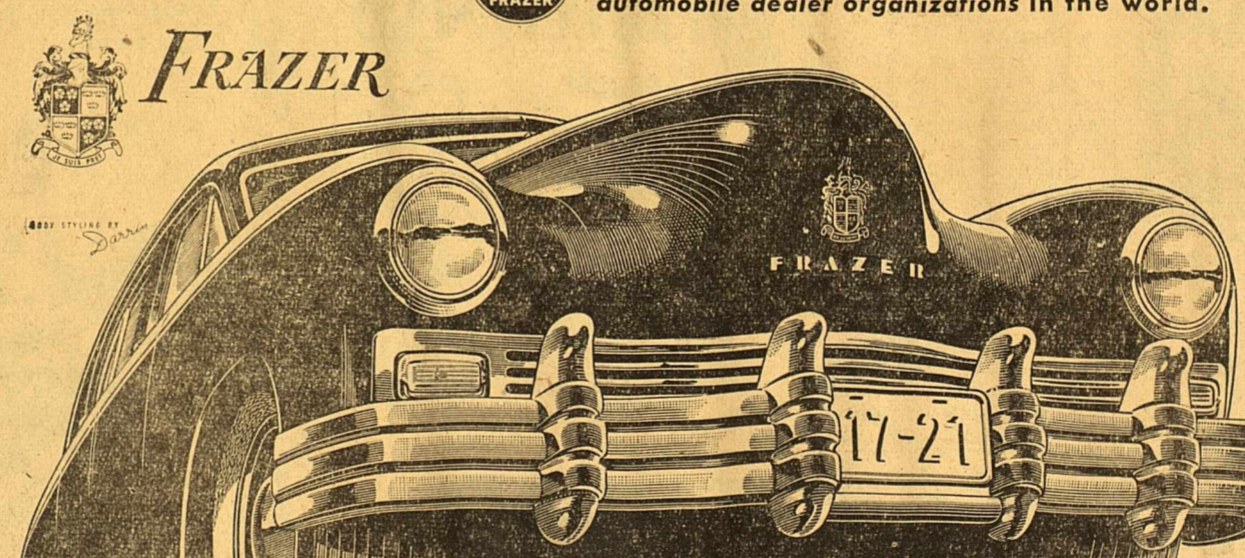
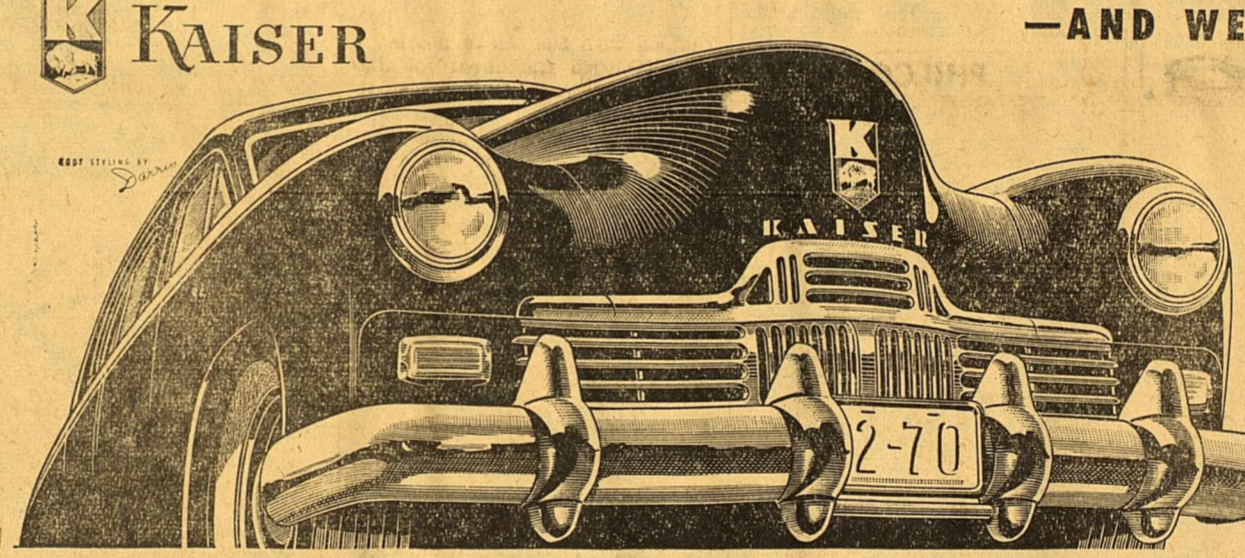

Holding East to two heart tricks on today's hand gave me the greatest thrill of the tournament. I won the opening lead with the king of spades and led a small diamond to dummy's ace, then led the ace of spades and discarded the deuce of clubs from my hand.

I led a small spade from dummy, on which East discarded the eight of clubs, and I ruffed with the three of hearts. Another diamond was led to dummy's king, and the jack of diamond's cashed.

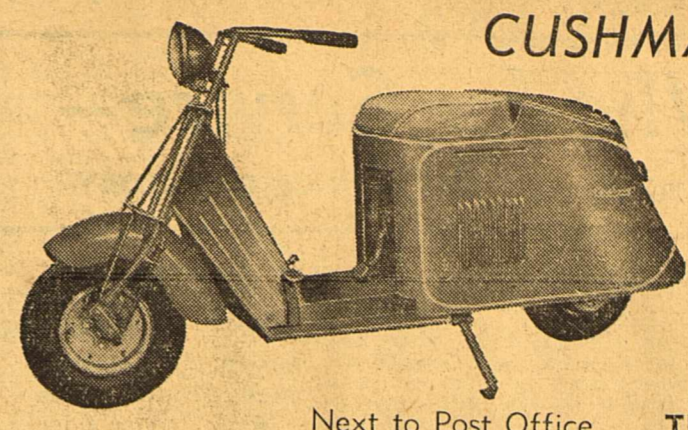

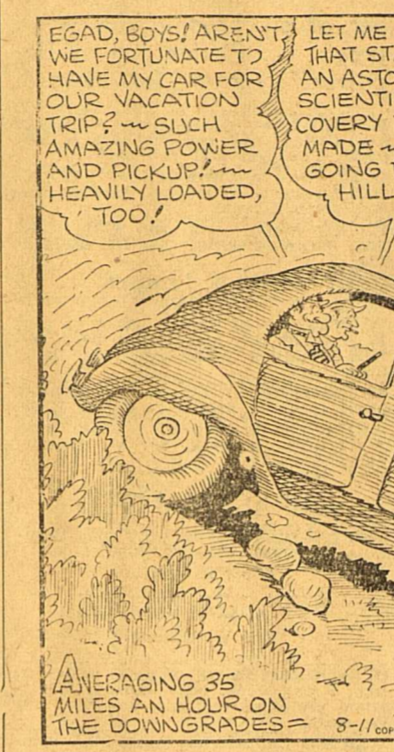

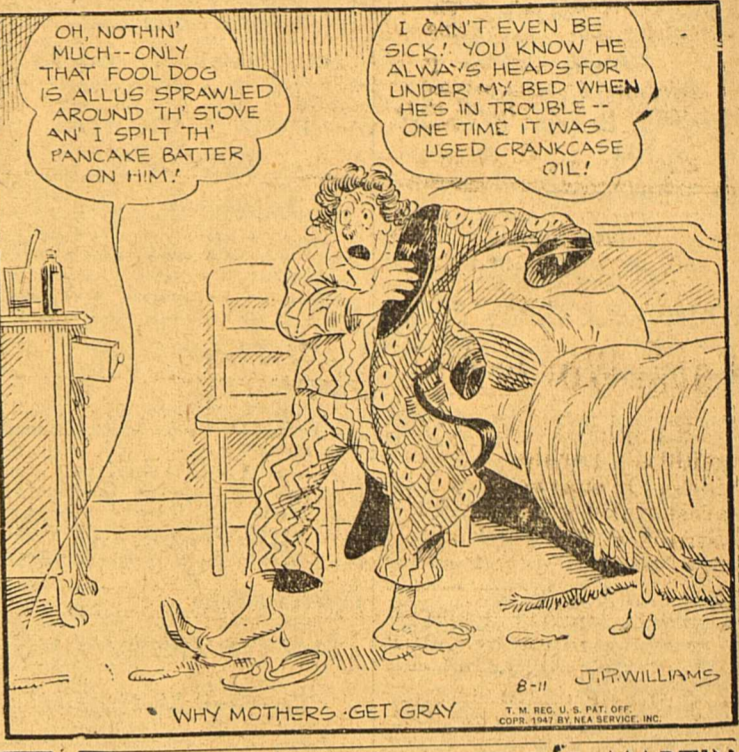

I had decided from the beginning that East had all of the missing hearts, otherwise he would not have doubled three. When I led the last spade from dummy and East again refused to ruff, discarding his last diamond, I ruffed with the four of hearts. The five of clubs was won by West with the ace.

At this point I was down to the ace-nine-six-five of hearts and the diamond queen, and East had nothing but hearts. West returned a club from dummy and East trumped with the ten of hearts.

I discarded the queen of diamonds, and East was helpless. He returned the king of hearts, which I won, then led a small heart to dummy's queen. A club was led from dummy, and there was no way that East could prevent me from making the nine of hearts.

East and West made two heart tricks and the ace of clubs. If a club had been opened, they could have held the hand to three, but as it was, I made one overtrick.

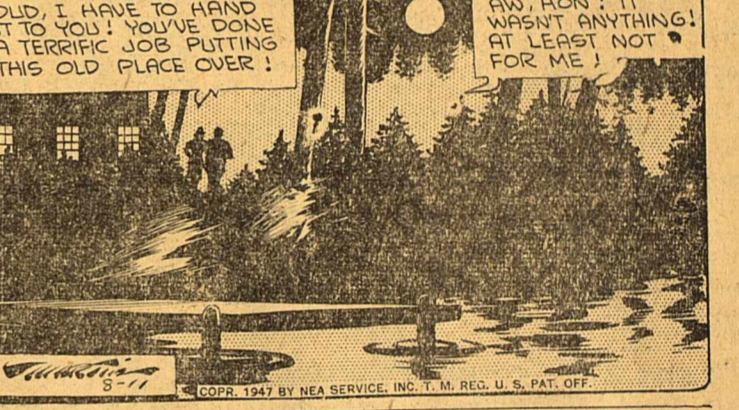

Accidents and Violence Cause 12 Texas Deaths

Number of weekend fatalities resulting from accidents or violence over the state rose to 12 Monday, with traffic mishaps leading the list of causes.

Five died in accidents involving motor vehicles or trains, with the remainder of the deaths resulting from drownings, shootings and a road roller mishap.

Lloyd Bennett, 27, of Beloit was killed Saturday night in an auto-truck collision eight miles east of Crockett.

A similar highway accident four miles north of Seminole Sunday ended in death for William C. Gardner, 29, an oil field worker.

was the tip-off. Washington was getting too hot for him!

"There was no reason for the other senators on this committee to continue his losing battle for him if he was too cowardly to stay here and face the music."

The plane builder said he thought the hearing had been adjourned "because the people of this country render the final decision in any controversy" and were back of him.

Claims Public Support

Hughes previously told reporters he does not believe the hearings ever will be resumed, despite Ferguson's announcement that Meyer will be subpoenaed for an appearance Nov. 17.

"It was very obvious from the time I first walked into this room that the public and the press were on my side," Hughes declared as newsreel cameras recorded his statement. "They believed that there was no justification for this investigation in the first place.

As he left the room, there was a burst of applause from many who had stood around outside the closed doors waiting for a glimpse of the man who has been the central figure in the Senate's most sensational hearings in years.

In announcing the decision to defer further hearings for three months, Ferguson gave two principal reasons.

Other demands on the senators' time, including plans several have made for trips to Europe.

The inability of the committee to locate Meyer, Hughes told questioning newsmen, he thought the reason was "ridiculous."

In reply to questions, Hughes said he doubts that the big flying boat will be ready to take to the air by November.

As for the photo reconnaissance plane, Hughes declared "I can't exactly say" when it will be completed.

"It's undergoing tests right now," he added.

Hughes had two wartime plane contracts—an \$18,000,000 one for the flying boat and a \$22,000,000 one for photo-reconnaissance planes.

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) told a reporter he has asked that General H. H. Arnold, former air Corps chief, and Carl Spaatz, present commander, be summoned for testimony in the inquiry into Hughes' contracts.

Pepper said he wants to establish primarily the need for the photo planes at the time they were recommended by Elliott Roosevelt during the war.

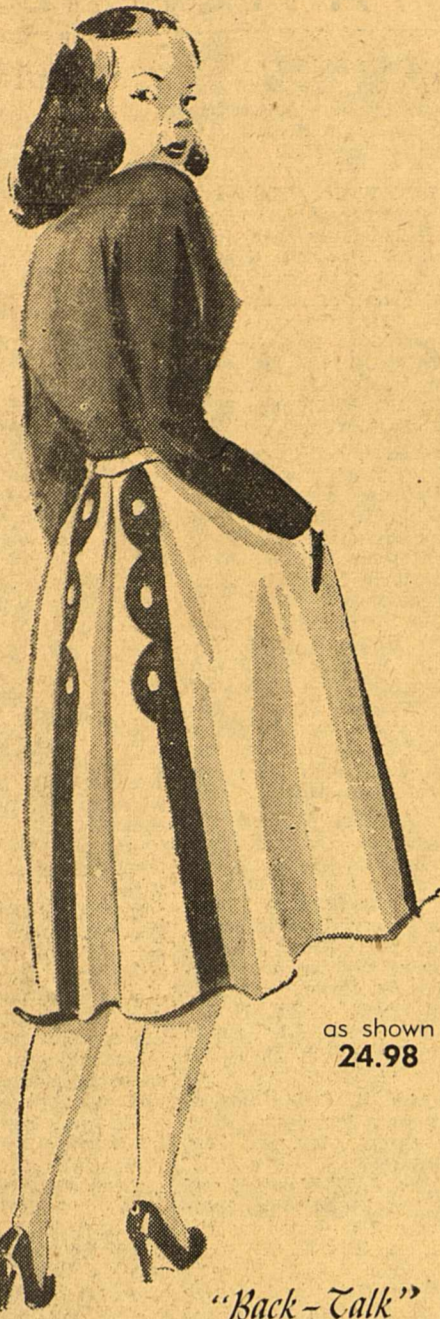
