

British Seek Easier Loan Terms

English Officials Will Fly Here To Ask Concessions

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of the Treasury Snyder announced Wednesday discussion will start Monday with British officials on easing terms of the \$3,750,000,000 American loan to Britain.

Snyder told a news conference that the national advisory council on international monetary problems, which he heads, will conduct the discussions on behalf of this country.

The British delegation, which will fly here this week-end, will be headed by Sir Wilfred Eady, special assistant to Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton.

Although no formal requests have been made, it is understood that England will ask concessions which would permit her to consider a dollar supply by increasing imports from British dominions and decreasing imports from the United States.

The present terms of the loan agreement prohibit this. Snyder emphasized it was his understanding that the conference would be strictly limited to the British loan and would not delve into other aspects of the British "dollar crisis" or European aid.

Other Developments
In two other developments in the international economic scene: 1. Snyder scotched "persistent rumors" in London's financial district that the Treasury planned to increase its price on Gold from the present \$35 an ounce to \$50.

2. The British withdrew another \$150,000,000 of their U. S. loan, leaving only \$850,000,000 available. At the recent rate of withdrawal Treasury officials estimated the loan would be exhausted in October, instead of next June 30, as contemplated.

Besides the expected proposal to increase British buying from her dominions, advance reports indicate the British delegation to the talks here may seek a modification of the loan terms which make the pound freely convertible into dollars.

Fire Damages Oil Refinery

WICHITA FALLS — (AP) — Officials of the Panhandle Refinery here Wednesday began figuring losses resulting from a blaze which raged at the plant for almost four hours Tuesday.

Starting about noon when a tank of gasoline overflowed and ignited, the fire quickly spread through the installations.

Refinery officials declined to make an immediate estimate of damage, which they said was covered by insurance, but fire department officials estimated the loss at \$150,000.

Fire and accompanying small explosions destroyed the materials warehouse, ten wholesale gas tanks, welding and machine shops, the salvage warehouse and an undetermined amount of gasoline.

A polymerization plant was damaged and five trucks in the area, three owned by the refinery, burned. Crude popping and cracking units were damaged slightly.

To Resume Production Soon
Several large tanks containing gasoline, distillate and kerosene escaped damage as did big crude tanks which contained about 20,000 barrels of crude oil at the time of the fire.

R. C. Stanford, Panhandle president, said the refinery proper was damaged only slightly and production probably would be resumed in three days.

He said the fire limited itself to warehouses and the loading racks and tanks, only slightly damaging the tower and outside instruments in the polymerization plant.

The fire started at the truck loading racks. When the gasoline tank overflowed and ignited, R. E. Krull, 25, an employee of the refinery, attempted to shut the valve off, but the gas flamed up the sides of the tank and he was forced to jump.

Krull was taken to a hospital for slight burns on the arms and legs. He told hospital attendants his father died in a fire at the same plant 16 years ago.

Midland Schools' Budget For Year Totals \$435,897

A 1947-48 budget totaling \$435,897.50 was adopted by trustees of the Midland Independent School District at their regular meeting Tuesday night. The current operating expense items total \$373,540 and debt servicing \$62,357.50.

The operating items in the budget are: general control, \$19,200; instructional service (white), \$266,000; instructional service (negro), \$17,500; operation of plant, \$20,485; maintenance of plant, \$10,000; auxiliary agencies, \$18,355; fixed charges, \$9,500; and capital outlay, \$12,500.

Anticipated receipts from per capita apportionment, county available fund, federal contracts and local taxes total \$374,100. The district expects to receive into the sinking fund a total of \$65,500, bringing the anticipated income total to \$440,600.

Two trustees of the Prairie Lee School District, B. L. Graham and Mr. Bryant, attended the session.

Routine reports were heard and the district's insurance program was discussed. A financial report was submitted.

Plans for the opening of the Fall term, September 2, were mapped.

Monroe Says Schools' Salary Schedule Meets State Law

Frank Monroe, superintendent of Midland public schools, said Wednesday the school district has not broken any laws in regard to 1947-48 salary schedules, and that all teachers here will be paid in line with the standard salary legislation passed by the last legislature.

State Superintendent L. A. Woods said in Austin Tuesday that Midland schools were among those with discrepancies in salary scales.

Monroe said he had not been advised of the discrepancy before reading in the papers.

The \$2,000 minimum salary schedule was adopted here last May 5. The board realized at that time that certain adjustments would have to be made prior to the beginning of the school year, September 1, Monroe said. The state schedule was adopted officially at the regular meeting of school trustees Tuesday night.

"We are complying with all rules and regulations concerning salary scales, and no discrepancies exist in Midland, regardless of the state superintendent's comment," Monroe said.

CIO Demands Action On Price Situation

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The CIO, contending the price situation demands further action than a Justice Department investigation, renewed Wednesday a request that President Truman call an industry-government-labor conference to seek voluntary price reductions.

Emil Rieve, chairman of the labor organization's full employment committee, said in a statement that the CIO welcomes Attorney General Clark's announcement that an investigation of high prices will be made.

"But many prices are set by large monopolies and monopolies do not necessarily fall under the criminal law and Clark's investigation," he added.

Truman Urges Rio Delegates To Seek Peace

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman sent the United States delegation off to the Pan American security meeting in Rio De Janeiro Wednesday with his best wishes for "a successful conference."

"I come to bid you gentlemen farewell, and wish you a happy and successful trip and successful conference," Truman told the departing delegates at Washington National Airport.

"I am glad to have this delegation — as it has so many times in the past — working for peace in the world, particularly in the Western Hemisphere."

The United States delegation to the conference, opening in the Brazilian capital Friday, is headed by Secretary of State Marshall and includes Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and Warren R. Austin, U. S. delegate to the U. N. Security Council and former Republican senator from Vermont.

Hopes To Set Example
After wishing the delegation good luck, President Truman said he hopes the Rio conference will set an example for the rest of the world.

Vandenberg commented: "I agree with that." Secretary Marshall, replying to the President's brief, informal speech, said he and his colleagues are flying South "in the interest of what is very important in the world of today — the solidarity of the Western Hemisphere nations."

The Rio conference, which Truman may address when he attends the closing phases, was called to write a formal military defense treaty for this hemisphere.

Senator Connally (Texas) and Rep. Bloom (NY), Democratic members of the bipartisan foreign policy team, went to Brazil by boat 10 days ago.

Midlander Dies Early Wednesday

Mrs. Gracia M. Cunan, 36, died in a Midland hospital early Wednesday following a six-month illness. She resided at 733 West Indiana Street.

She came to Midland in April 1947. Mrs. Cunan was born December 10, 1910 in Fargo, N. D., and was married to Dr. George Franklin Cunan in November 1935.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete pending arrival of relatives.

Survivors include: the husband, Dr. G. F. Cunan of Midland; two daughters, Georgine and Pamela; two sisters, Mrs. Louis H. Frahm of Franklin, Ind., and Mrs. Fred Martin; and her mother, Mrs. Maria Anderson.

City Tax Rate Fixed At \$1.40

The city's tax rate for 1947 was fixed at \$1.40 per \$100 valuation in an emergency ordinance adopted Tuesday night at a meeting of the City Council. The rate is the same as last year. Fifty cents of the total is for the sinking fund and 90 cents for the general fund.

July disbursements were approved as follows: general fund, \$43,335.86; airport fund, \$5,434.07; debt servicing, \$9,811.88; parking meter payment, \$1,734.75. City secretary J. C. Hudman said the parking meters will be paid for late this year.

Affairs Committee of the Midland Chamber of Commerce, told the council this committee is studying a zoning plan and garbage and sewage ordinances of other cities. The group also is studying the proposed bond issue, he said. He pledged full cooperation of his committee with the City Council.

City Manager Bob Hoppe reported the city's gross income from rentals at Midland Air Terminal, not including airline contracts, now totals \$3,148.95 a month, which is sufficient to cover current operation expense. Sixty-eight buildings are rented, and more than 65 families reside at the air terminal.

The council approved the renting of 26 buildings, including the leasing of two shop buildings in the ordinance area to Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company at \$125 per month each.

Lease arrangements between the city and the American, Continental and Pioneer Airlines were discussed. The council agreed to lease the Northeast space in the terminal building to American Air Lines. Continental will get the center space and Pioneer the West space. Then rental will be \$1.50 per square foot per year.

Hoppe reported a blinker-type traffic light will be installed soon at the West Wall-Andrews Highway intersection and a stop and go traffic light will be placed at the Wall and N street intersection, near West Elementary School. Another stop and go light will be installed at the intersection of Main and Florida streets and a blinker light at the Loraine and Florida streets intersection, near South Elementary School.

Discuss Bond Issue
Residents of the 100 block on Club Drive were given permission to erect a "Slow, Children At Play" street sign at the drive's entrance. They requested in a letter that the speed limit in the block be reduced from 30 to 15 miles per hour.

Councilmen discussed the proposed million dollar bond issue and decided to consider the matter further at the next regular meeting, August 26. The public will be urged to attend the session.

The council approved a replat of Blocks 3 and 4, Carroll Magee Addition. Attorney Joe Mims appeared before the council for Lynn Butler, owner of the property.

A sub-division plat of Ranchlands Addition also was approved. Charles Klapproth, attorney, represented the owners. Another plat approval was of Blocks 1, 2 and 5, Highland Park Addition.

Permission to erect and hold services for a 60-day period in a tent in Block 16, Haley Heights, was given the Four-Square Gospel Church.

Payment of the city's part of the summer recreation program sponsored by the schools, county and city, was approved. The city's amount was \$808.54.

British 'Crisis' Bill Receives Final Approval

LONDON — (AP) — Government officials met with trade union leaders and industrialists Wednesday to make plans for combating British economic ailments with the newly voted and extensive controls over labor, industry and wealth.

The controls became law with King George's assent after receiving final parliamentary approval from the House of Lords Wednesday morning. The "crisis" bill empowers the Labor government to muster all British resources and guide labor into essential industries in efforts to achieve economic recovery.

The House of Commons voted 193 to 84 to adjourn until Oct. 20, beating down Conservative and Liberal attempts to shorten the recess to Sept. 16 in view of the economic situation.

Anthony Eden, speaking for the Conservatives, declared the \$3,750,000,000 U. S. loan would be exhausted before the recess ends and that the Labor regime had not told Parliament what practical steps it would take in dealing with the nation's plight.

Paraguayan Revolt May Be Discussed At Conference In Rio

RIO DE JANEIRO, BRAZIL — (AP) — The arrival of Justo Prieto, self styled "observer for the Paraguayan rebels," indicated Wednesday the Inter-American Conference might be asked to mediate the civil war in that country.

Prieto, former foreign minister of Paraguay, said the American nations could not be indifferent to the war and that Brazil and Argentina must consider mediation as a duty. Both countries have tried, but failed; Brazil on three occasions.

The conference was called to consider hemisphere defense solidarity.

Fifteen Absentee Votes Cast Here

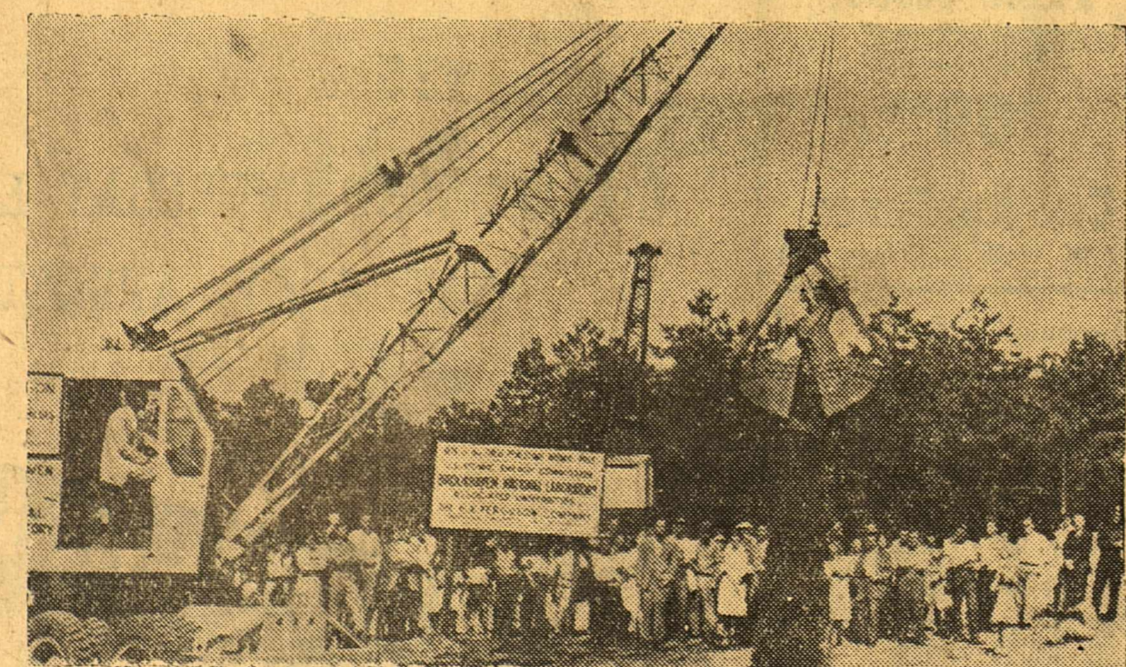

Atomic Research Laboratory Started

NORTH REEVES PROSPECTOR FLOWED 25 BF IN 2 HOURS
Texzona Producing Company No. 1 Tunstill, North Reeves County wildcat, 43 miles north of Pecos, and six miles northeast of Orla, flowed two hours Tuesday and produced 25 barrels of fluid—estimated to have been 90 per cent oil and 10 per cent drilling fluid and load water.

That test was taken after the well had been shut in four hours. It kicked off of its own volition, and flowed through open two-inch tubing.

Should the possible discovery produce regularly at the rate of the two-hour test it would be good for around 270 barrels of oil per day, according to interested observers. Corrected gravity was 36.5 degrees.

Casing pressure, when the project kicked off was 450 pounds. It dropped to 350 pounds at the end of the two hours of flowing. Operator shut it in at that time, with it still flowing.

The wildcat is 330 feet from north and east lines of section 10, block 56, TP survey, T-2. It topped the Delaware pay at 3,275 feet. Total depth is 3,308 feet. The tubing was set at 3,290 feet, during the two-hour flowing test. The seven-inch casing is cemented at 3,162 feet.

Estimates from reliable and conservative observers are that the production may possibly be completed for from 100 barrels to 150 barrels of oil per day, flowing, initial production—if it does not develop formation water. So far as has been learned, the pay zone has not shown any water.

The water which has been flowed out is understood to have been from the load which was used to kill two previous flows of the prospector.

Operator was installing a control head and a separator at last report. It is thought that efforts will be made to take an official Railroad Commission potential test, and complete the well by the end of the current week.

Reports that the wildcat had flowed oil at the rate of 125 barrels per hour, which have been circulated in some circles, appear to be in error.

HUMBLE STAKES STEPUT TO MITCHAM DISCOVERY

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Ethel C. Smith estate is to be a one location northeast steput to the same company's No. 1 Mitcham, recent discovery for flowing oil from the Ellenburger, in North-east Crockett County.

It is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 1, BS&F survey. Drilling with rotary, will start immediately. It will likely drill to around 8,165 feet to test through the zone which has been shown productive in No. 1 Mitcham. That project is now shut in, preparing to take officials potential test and complete.

DOLLAR HIDE WILDCAT IS LOOKING FOR ELLENBURGER

The Pure Oil Company and Humble No. 1 Cowden, deep wildcat on the north side of the Dollar Hide field, in Southwest Andrews County, and 1,980 feet from west and 600 feet from south lines of section 24, block A-52, psl survey, had reached 9,857 feet in Simpson line and shale, and was drilling ahead. It is expected to encounter the Ellenburger horizon at any time.

UPTON EXPLORATION GOES AHEAD IN SIDETRACK HOLE

Upton and Urschel Oil Company No. 1 Alford, East Upton County wildcat to around 13,000 feet, to try to locate and test the Ellenburger, and 2,173 feet from north and 4,813 feet from west lines of section 501/2, Scott survey, about 12 miles northeast of Rankin, had reached 9,490 feet in lime and was drilling ahead in a sidetracked hole. It is reported to be 80 feet away (Continued on page 5)

Price Inquiry Order Is Termed 'Fantastic'

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Crawford (R-Mich.), a leading congressional critic of OPA, Wednesday labeled as "fantastic" Attorney General Clark's order for an investigation into food, clothing and shelter prices.

The lawmaker said it appears to him to be aimed at bringing about a depression at home to help foreign nations buy more goods here. He added that Clark ought to turn his attention to the administration's fiscal policies which, Crawford contended, are the cause of high prices.

The National Federation of Small Business announced meanwhile that Clark's program is in line with what that organization has been urging since last Spring.

George J. Burger, the federation's Washington representative, told newsmen member reports indicate particular concern over "growing economic concentration in distribution businesses."

The Justice Department was silent on what leads, if any, it may have uncovered to prompt Clark's promise of jail terms for anyone found guilty of "conspiracies" to force prices up and keep them there.

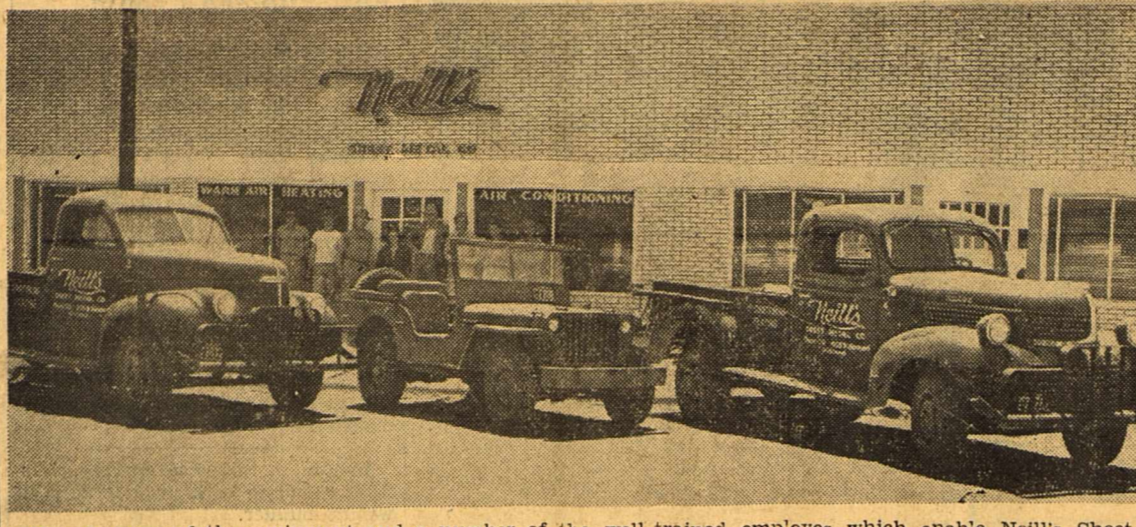
The Banner Creamery, building, progressing, and giving added services right along with the vanguard of Midland's forward movement, has added a number of new plant and distribution features here.

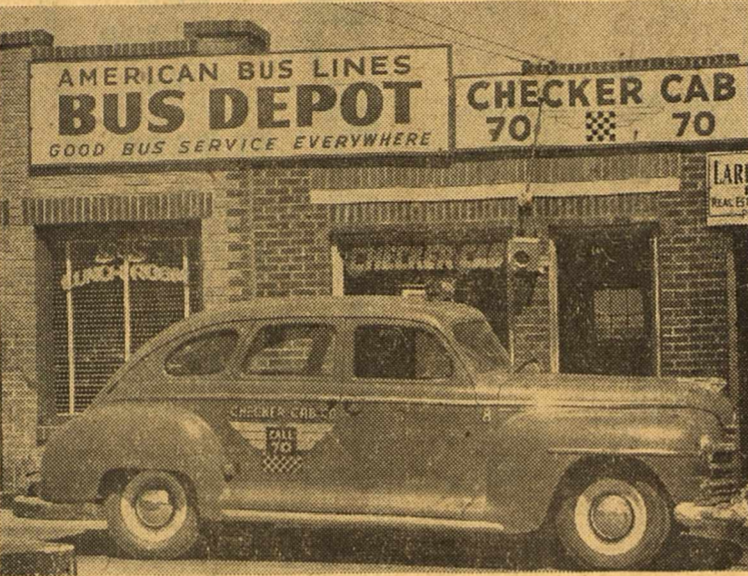

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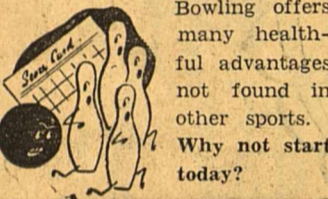
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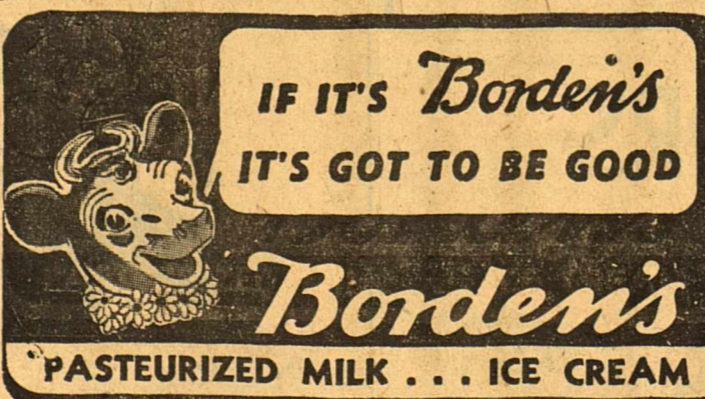

An Explosive Proposal

Greece has laid before the UN Security Council an explosive proposal of UN intervention "to halt the spread of undeclared war" in the Balkans. The proposal itself is in order, and represents one of the steps to guard peace which were envisioned when the charter was written. It is the background which adds peril to an already dangerous situation.

What Greece has done is to ask the council to invoke the powers of Chapter VII of the charter. This chapter consists of actions which the council shall take in the event of threats to the peace, breaches of the peace, and acts of aggression.

But Chapter VII includes Article 51, which says, "Nothing of the present charter shall impair the inherent right of the individual or collective self-defense if an armed attack occurs against a member of the United Nations."

Greece claims that armed attacks already have been made upon her government's forces from across the northern borders. The UN investigating commission found that Yugoslavia, Bulgaria and Albania were giving active and unneutral aid to the Greek guerrillas, though it did not accuse troops of these countries, or an "international brigade," of actual participation in the fighting.

Russia has called the Balkan commission's report a lie in almost so many words. The Soviet delegate vetoed a further investigation of the Balkan crisis. He would surely veto any motion to use the powers given the council in Chapter VII. But Greece has hinted that she will resort to Article 51 in such an event, for that article requires no council action and cannot be vetoed.

It might be said that the Greek government has already invoked Article 51 by defending itself against what it charges is an attack launched from a foreign country with foreign troops participating. However, this "escape clause" has not been invoked to its full extent, for there is also a mention of "collective self-defense."

This might mean that the Turkish government, finding itself endangered by the action to the north, would join forces with the Greeks. It is unlikely that the United States, Britain or any power distant from the scene of conflict would plead "self-defense" and give Greece active military assistance.

Yet Greece and Turkey have been promised American aid. Their self-defense, with American equipment, might be the signal for Russia to give open and active support to her satellites, though that possibility seems remote.

No major power is ready for a major war. Certainly no government outside the iron curtain wants war. Almost certainly the Soviet government does not want war now. As for its future intentions, no one outside the iron curtain can surely say.

Nevertheless, the Greek proposal is explosive. It is, in effect, an invitation for the UN to go its way without Russia. It may also be feared that it is an invitation to World War III.

The proposal probably will not get far in the council. But it remains the latest and most dangerous development in a world situation which is relentlessly developing as a consequence of the veto and Russia's use of it.

The Curse Of Socialism

It would be unjust to say that the Labor government created England's great economic problems. Those problems were principally the result of the drains of war on British resources and capital. However, it is undoubtedly true that the Labor government's basic policy of socialization and regimentation of the country's productive machine is delaying British recovery and sapping the national energies.

Socialism is the great destroyer of initiative. It places all power in the hands of bureaucrats—and bureaucrats in England are the same as bureaucrats in the United States or the Soviet Union. Their own interests come first. All the facilities of a swollen super-government are used to keep the people in line. The individual is lost in the red-tape of a government which has its fingers in every phase of human activity. There is little chance for individual progress, and the rewards for work and ambition are severely limited.

The Labor government came to power by promising socialism would cure England's economic ills. But it has failed in every particular. Socialization of the coal mines has not increased output nor bettered the lot of the miners. Socialization of finance has not strengthened England's world credit position. The threatened socialization of all British railroads and electric utilities is expected to cause more financial troubles—and to further bureaucratize the country. And the government's projected agricultural reform bill has raised a storm of protest, on the grounds that it would permit expropriation of property and a policy of dictation toward farm owners and workers.

Socialism always takes the same course. It exalts the office-holder and crushes the rest of the people. Worst of all, when thoroughly entrenched, it becomes extremely sensitive to criticism and in one way or another stifles opposition. By its very principles, it is the enemy of social freedom even as it is the enemy of economic freedom. The object lesson which a socialized Europe is giving us now should make every American determined to resist its further inroads, here.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Vanilla is still the favorite flavor of ice-cream-eating Americans, the Commerce Department noted. "Make mine vanilla" is the order of half the consuming public, the department said, while chocolate is a poor second with only 15 per cent. Strawberry is third.

By consuming almost 3,000,000,000 quarts of ice cream last year—about 21 quarts for every man, woman and child—the public sent the ice cream manufacturers into the ranks of the billion-dollar industries.

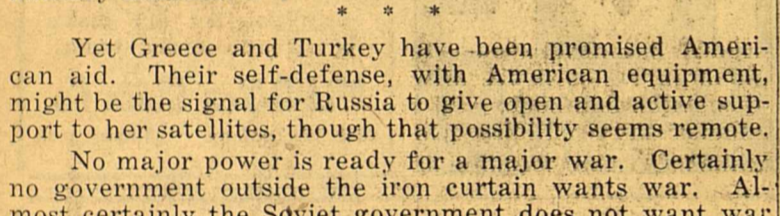

Incompetent To Act On Communist Matter

RIO DE JANEIRO—(AP)—Brazil's Supreme Electoral Tribunal, which outlawed the Communist Party a few months ago, has ruled itself incompetent to decide whether Communist-held Congressional Legislative and City Council seats would be abolished.

By this action, taken on a four to two vote, the Tribunal apparently left up to the Brazilian Congress the decision whether to abolish Communist seats and how such vacancies should be filled.

A similar decision apparently must be faced by the Rio de Janeiro Federal District City Council, 18 of the 50 members of which are Communists, and by the various State Legislatures.

The Communist representation in Congress consists of one senator, Luis Carlos Prestes, who is the party secretary general, and 16 members of the Chamber of Deputies.

A decision by the Tribunal on the status of the Communist-held seats was asked by the Administration Party in Congress after various senators and deputies indicated their reluctance to pass on the subject.

Mussolini's Rescue Told By SS Colonel

DACHAU, GERMANY—(P)—How Mussolini was rescued from advancing Allied armies on order of Adolph Hitler was disclosed here by the man who says he performed the assignment—SS Col. Otto Skorzeny, about to go on trial as a war criminal.

Meeting the press in advance of his trial, Skorzeny quoted Hitler as saying "that he was firmly resolved not to leave his friend Mussolini in the lurch."
Under Gen. Kurt Student, the SS colonel said, he set out with a staff of five to find the ducce, well hidden by the Badoglio Government. Skorzeny scoured Italy for four months. He heard Mussolini might be held in the Apennines near Gran Sasso.

He verified these reports as best he could and then prepared 12 gliders, each with nine men, and took off for the 6,000-foot aerie. He landed 50 feet from the hotel. The Italian guards were too surprised to act and "the hotel was surrendered without resistance."
"I reported to Mussolini: 'Duce, the Führer has sent me as a token of his royal friendship.' Mussolini embraced me."
Skorzeny decided to take off from an improvised field.
"We almost reached the brink of a cliff when a ditch suddenly cut straight out across our path. We hopped over the ditch and coasted over the brink. After a drop of perhaps 1,000 feet the pilot succeeded in gaining control. The plane flew over the valley just above the ground."
In Patuca De Mare, they transferred to Luftwaffe transports and flew to Vienna, thence to Hitler's headquarters.

Poland Increases Rate Of Exchange

WARSAW—(P)—The government's exchange control commission has boosted the official rate of exchange—100 zlotys to the United States dollar—by 150 per cent as a spur to increased Baltic Sea transport and port services.
The semi-official newspaper "Rzeczpospolita" said business interests dealing in American dollars, English pounds, Swiss francs and Swedish, Norwegian and Danish crowns, Dutch florins and Belgian francs particularly would benefit under the exchange ruling.
The Ministry of Finance is expected to officially establish a new rate of zlotys exchange by Sept. 1 under the international monetary fund. It is rumored the rate will be boosted from 100 to 400 zlotys to the dollar.

LANDLORD REWARDS 'FAITHFUL TENANTS'
TOWSON, MD.—(P)—Thomas R. Brannan, Baltimore County Democratic leader who passed on recently left five houses to his tenants.

Looking at all four hands and actually playing a hand are two very different matters. Here is a hand that I watched at several tables in a recent duplicate game. Most of the North-South pairs got to five clubs. They all made it, although it was defended in two different ways.

The opening heart lead was won in dummy with the ace, and a small club was led. Some East players decided that West had to have the ace of diamonds to justify the double of five clubs.
Therefore, they went up with the ace of clubs on trick two in order to lead back the singleton

deuce of diamonds, hoping to get a diamond ruff and set the contract. Of course, they caught their partner's guess, and West did not have the ace of diamonds. So the contract was made.
Should East have played the ace of clubs at trick two? Undoubtedly a player would need a few seconds to decide this question, after the small club was led from dummy.
At the tables where East played the deuce of clubs instead of the ace, declarer knew that the only reason for East's hesitation was that he held the ace of clubs. Therefore, declarer went up with the king and dropped West's queen.
Then he proceeded to trump out his losing diamonds, letting East cash the ace of clubs whenever he wanted to.
Of course, looking at all four hands, we would say that East should have played the deuce of clubs quickly at trick two and declarer should have taken the finesse. But down he would go—as he would have lost two clubs and a diamond.

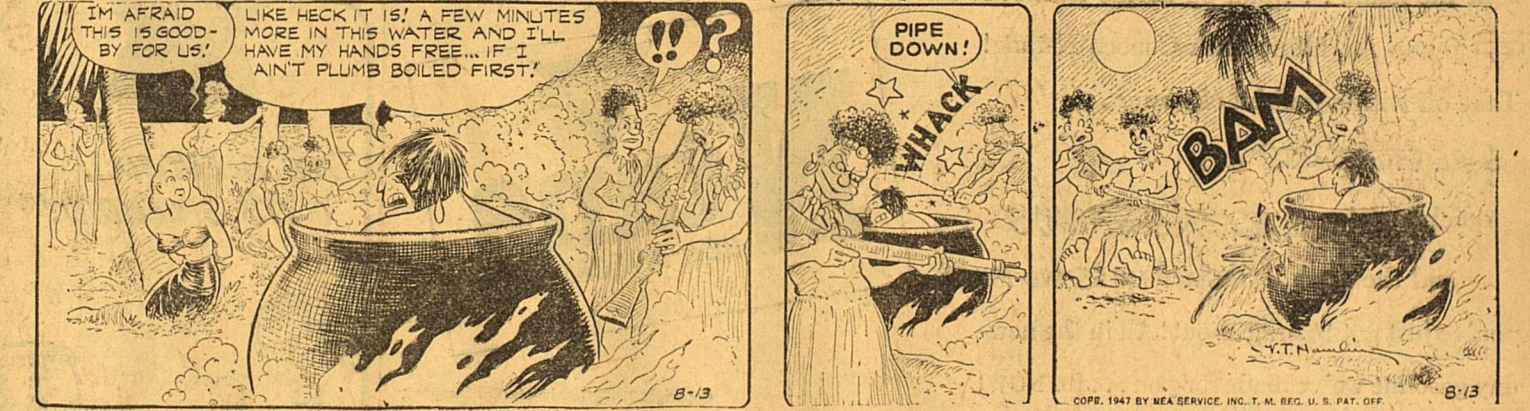


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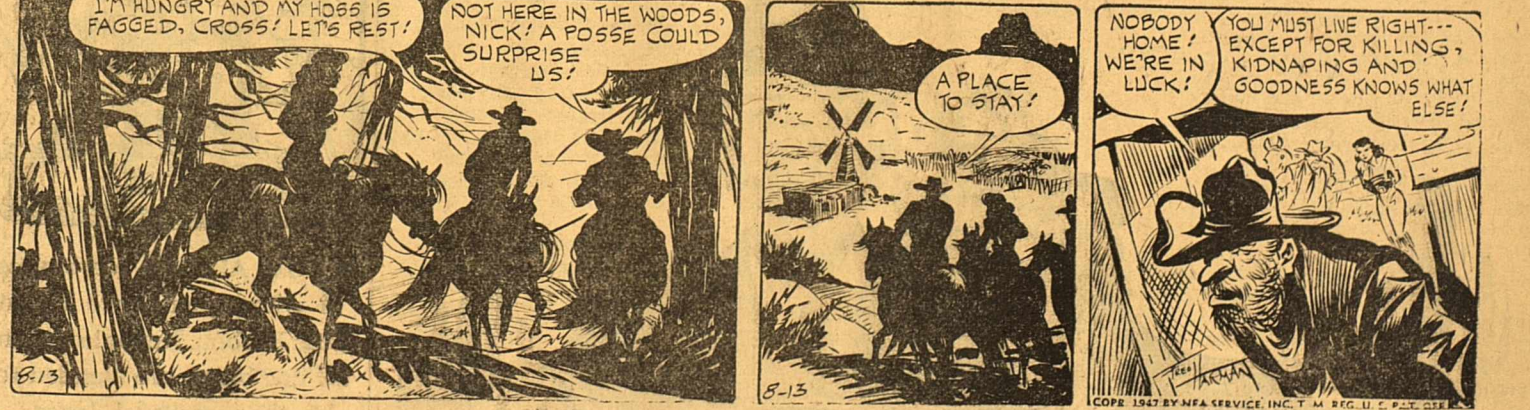
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France Enters International Atomic Bomb Sweepstakes With Rapidly-Growing Stockpile



A slow starter in the atomic sweepstakes, France is now busy producing a uranium stockpile as the nation's first step toward the manufacture of atomic bombs. About 120 French technicians report to work daily at the Fort Chatillon and Le Bouchet powder works, both on the outskirts of Paris, but first must pass through a security check as rigid as those of atomic plants in the U. 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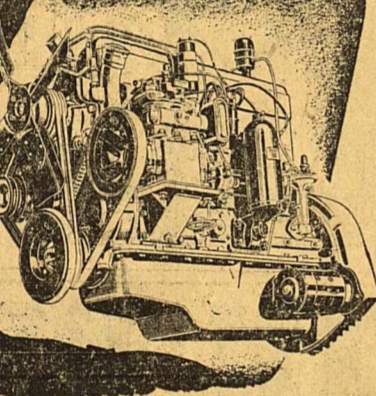
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Steel And Grain Are Major Problems Confronting Government Economists

WASHINGTON—(P)—For a few minutes pretend you are a government economist and try to see how wise you could be.

Here are two problems now both troubling the economists. What would you do about them?

Steel is the center of one. Steel is the life-blood of reconstruction. It is needed for railroads, rolling stock, docks, buildings, trucks, farm machinery—all of the things the world needs to make and distribute goods. And steel is extremely short.

The U. S. Maritime commission reports that 122 ships were building in European docks on March 31. It will take 494,300 tons of steel to complete them.

But at the same time the United

States has laid up 1,000 wartime cargo vessels which it is ready to sell at 50 per cent of the cost, less depreciation. The Maritime Commission has worked up a table showing that for every ship being built in Europe now we have an almost comparable vessel gathering barnacles in some watery backyard.

To Control Steel Exports

Here's the question: Is it wise for the United States to go on selling steel for ships that are little more than duplicates of what already exists?

The government actually is preparing to do some directing of the manner in which American steel is used. On October 1 export licenses will be granted to steel exporters only after the government has approved both the nation to which it is going and the use to which it will be put.

But the government experts haven't said whether they will tackle this shipping snarl.

Problem No. 2: Reports from Europe say only Russia will have a good grain crop this year. Most of the other countries will have even less than last year.

Dollars Are Scarce

This means that again millions of Europeans will have to depend for their daily bread—and bread is a large portion of their diet—on wheat bought in the United States. Perhaps they will be able to buy some in Russia, but that is uncertain.

For the wheat they buy here they will have to have American dollars to pay. But dollars are also scarce in Europe.

The longer they spend their dollars on food the longer they will need help from somewhere—and that somewhere looks like the United States.

What should we do about it; we are prepared to spend \$332,000,000 on foreign relief this next 12 months. No one knows whether that will keep hunger out of Europe.

Judge's Plea For Tax Refund Rejected

SPRINGFIELD, ILL.—(P)—An Illinois Supreme Court justice's plea that federal income taxes on his salary were an "interference with an essential government function" has been rejected by a federal judge.

Federal Judge Charles G. Briggie dismissed the suit by Justice Walter T. Gunn, Danville, Ill., who sought a refund of \$12,509 in income taxes paid for the years 1939 through 1944 on his \$15,000 annual state salary.

Judge Briggie said he "doubted that any function of the state government or the independence of the judiciary will be seriously affected by the application of the federal income tax" to the salary of a State Supreme Court justice.

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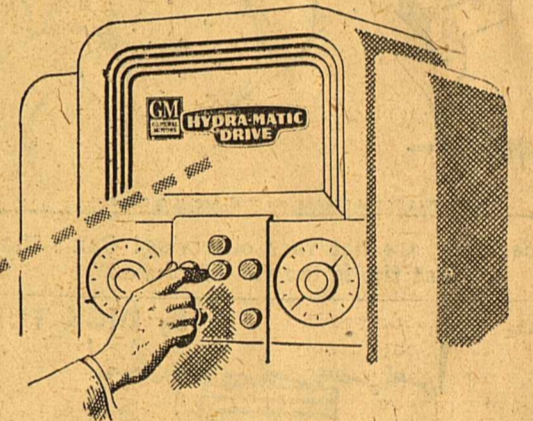
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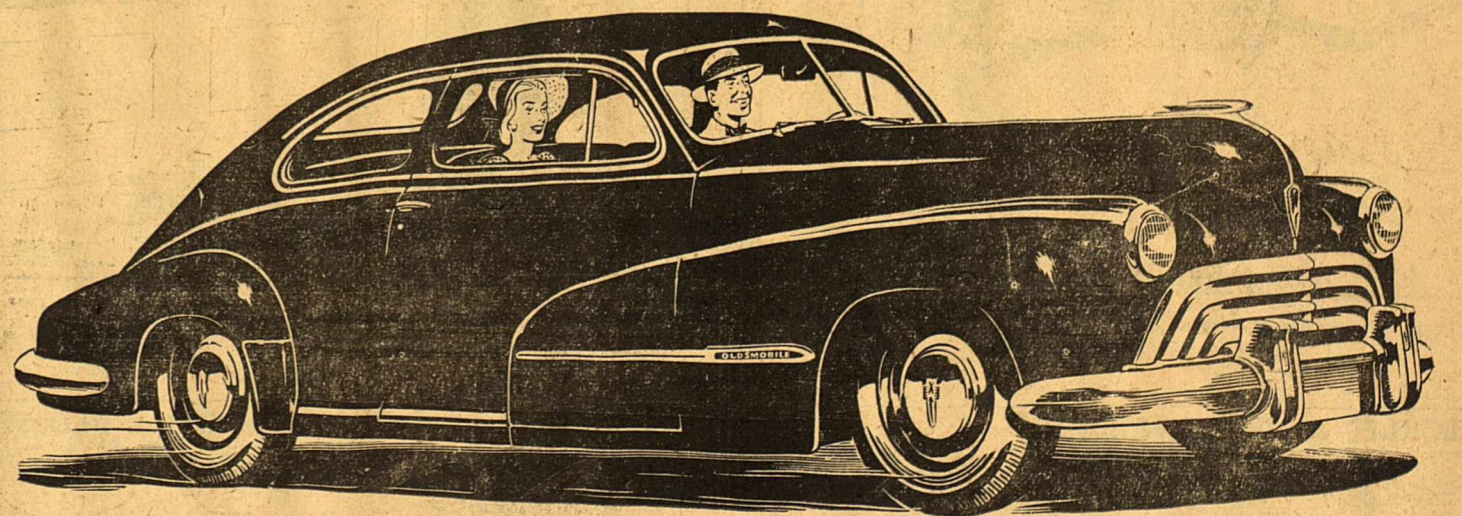
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
