Twisters, torrents mar weather

Castro County was placed under its first tornado warning of the year Monday as a severe storm system moved through the county during the early evening.

A tornado was confirmed by National Weather Service radar in Lubbock about five miles south of Hart at about 7 p.m. Memorial Day,

prompting the NWS to issue a warning for the county. The tornado, however, was not spotted on the ground by spotters.

Spotters did, however, later see a funnel cloud in the Five-Point area, about six miles southeast of Dimmitt, and in the Arney area. None of the funnels, however, reached

the ground.

As the system moved northeasterly, it later prompted tornado warnings in Randall County, and for the city of Amarillo. There were no reports of damage.

That storm brought only sprinkles to Dimmitt, although rural parts of the county picked up almost three inches of rain from the system, along with some hail.

Dimmitt's turn for rain came from another severe storm early Tuesday, as residents awoke to thunder and ominous-looking clouds that brought two heavy rain storms to the city and street and highway flooding in low-lying areas. Officially, Dimmitt received 3.13 inches of rain Tuesday at KDHN, the official NWS reporting station for Dimmitt. "Backyard" rain gauge reports ranged up to over four inches by noon Tuesday.

The area was placed under a severe thunderstorm watch early Wednesday, and a brief, but heavy, storm dumped another .77 inch of rain.

Hail damage was confined to small areas, but for the fourth year in a row, brought devastation to farmers north of Easter.

Until Friday, Dimmitt had received just 1.40 inches for the month and 3.21 inches for the year.

"About a mile north of Easter, you can see an area about three miles across from the northeast to the southwest corners where they were hailed out," said Eddie Matthews of Easter Grain. "We've had about an inch (Tuesday morning), and had about .4 inch Sunday afternoon, but just north of here they had about three inches. They're just flooded." By Wednesday morning, Matthews had recorded 2.2 inches.

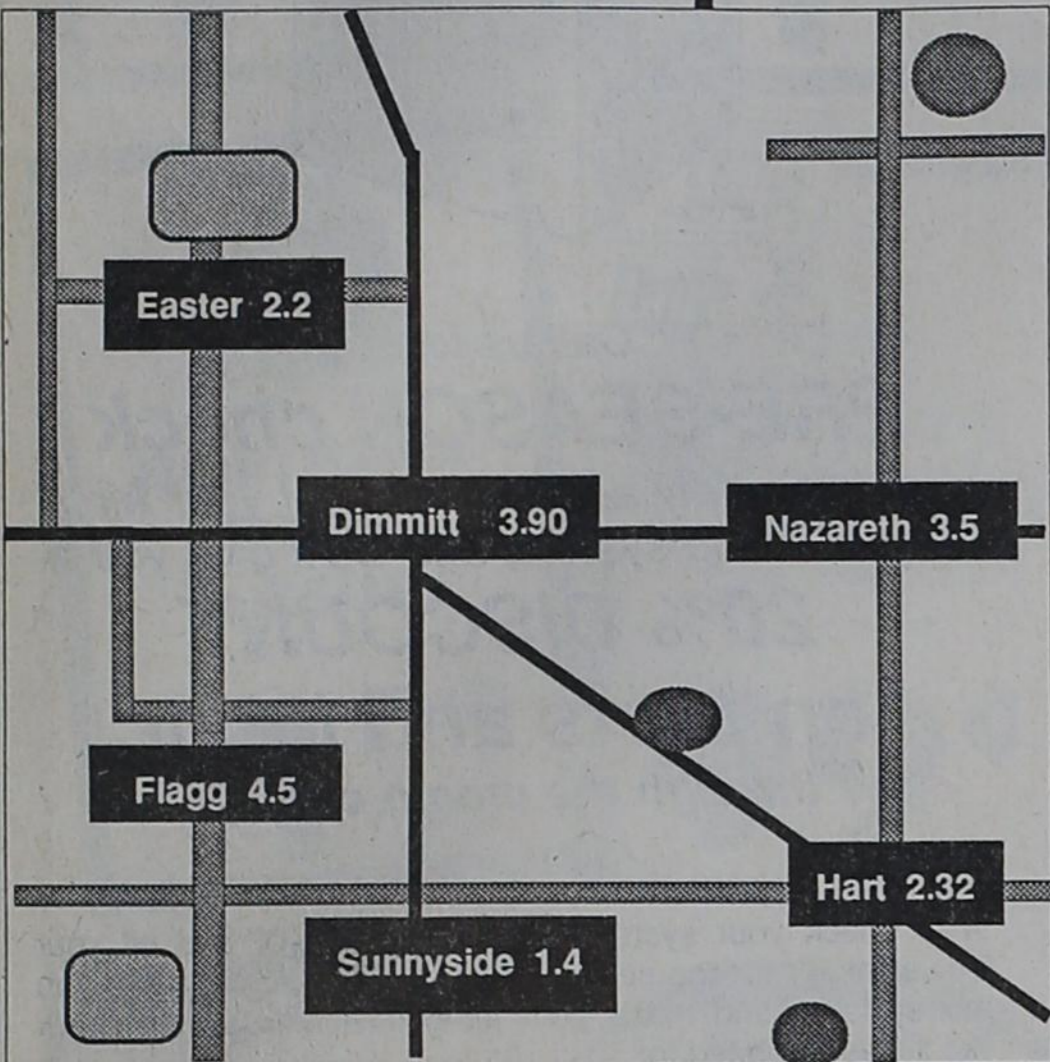
J.R. Brown, of Flagg Grain, said Flagg had picked up 4.5 inches in a four day period in three storms, including two inches Tuesday. "We've had reports of some hail in the Dodd area that hurt some people, but it wasn't a very big area."

In Nazareth, where some residents spent most of Monday evening in storm shelters and basements, about 3.5 inches of rain fell, with over two inches falling Tuesday. Hail damage was spotty.

In Sunnyside, .65 inch fell Memorial Day, on top of .75 inch picked up Friday. Tuesday's storm dumped another two inches and caused slight flooding in low-lying areas.

Since Friday, Hart has recorded 2.32 inches officially, according to Neoma Wall, who mans the county's other NWS reporting station. For the month, Hart has recorded 4.42 inches.

124 seniors to graduate

124 Castro County seniors will receive their diplomas in graduation ceremonies Friday and Saturday.

20 Nazareth seniors will receive their diplomas Friday at 8 p.m. at the Nazareth school cafeteria. The valedictorian of the NHS Class of 1987 is Russell Acker, while Alan Birkenfeld is the salutatorian.

Hart's seniors will graduate at 8 p.m. Friday in the Hart school auditorium. Addressing the class will be valedictorian Risha Ammons and salutatorian Martin Castillo. 32 seniors will graduate from HHS.

72 seniors will receive their diplomas Saturday at 8 p.m. at the Dimmitt High School auditorium. DHS valedictorian this year is Jacalyn Thompson. Salutatorian is Kerri Collins. Special speaker for the exercises will be Jerry Kunkel of Amarillo.

DHS grads favor A&M, then business

More Dimmitt High School graduates will attend Texas A&M University than any other school, according to DHS Counselor John Thomas.

Of the 72 seniors in the DHS Class of 1987, 53 graduates plan to attend some type of school after graduation. 38 will enroll in a four-year school, 10 in a two-year college, and five plan to attend a trade or vocational school. 10 will enter military service, while nine plan to work after graduation.

Nine students will attend TAMU, one more than Texas Tech or West Texas State universities. Other college choices include: Angelo State University, Eastern New Mexico University, Panhandle State University, and Southwest Texas State University, two each; and Abilene Christian University, Baylor University, Lubbock Christian College, Tarleton State University and University of Texas-San Antonio, one each.

Six seniors plan to attend South Plains College, three to Amarillo College, and one to Cleveland State University in Tennessee. Of the five going to trade or vocational schools, three will attend Universal Technical Institute in Houston, and one each will attend TSTI and cosmetology school.

Dimmitt students scored slightly above average on the ACT tests and just below average on their SAT tests, required by most of the post-secondary schools.

47 seniors took the ACT, with an average total score of 17.9, .8 above the state average. Scores ranged from 8 to 26. 13 took the SAT, averaging 869, just below the state average of 877. SAT scores ranged from 640 to 1,090.

The US Army is the choice of six students who plan to join the service; two others selected the Air Force, and one, each, opted for the Navy and the Marines.

Of the 65 who have a career choice in mind, 16 of the students plan to enter business after college. Education was next, with eight, followed by clerical, seven; mechanics-repairers and health-medical, six; agriculture, five; scientific-technical, four; service, social services and communications, three; sales, two, and industrial production and construction, one.

DHS seniors received \$20,200 in local scholarships. 37 graduates of the Class of '87 and six DHS graduates who are already in college will receive local scholarships next fall. In addition, 11 have received various college scholarships.

To answer the question I've been asked the most in recent months:

Well, yeah, thanks, I have. About 31 pounds.

In fact, for the first time ever, I weigh less than either of my sons. Well, yeah, my waist is still bigger than theirs, but they're burdened with all this unsightly muscle around their shoulders, arms and legs, and muscle outweighs fat 3-to-1.

I've dropped from 207 to 176 so far. I'm 10 pounds lighter now than when I played high-school football, and two pounds lighter than when I came out of Army basic (although it's stacked a lot differently now). I expect to level off at about 170 eventually. I'm in no hurry.

You could say that I'm on a diet. But it would be more accurate to say that I've gone through a re-education process on nutrition.

It was a year ago last week that I landed in the hospital with a bleeding ulcer. One of the tests they ran showed my triglyceride level was too high. I didn't know what triglycerides were, but when Dr. Murphy told me it could cause hardening of the arteries and ultimately lead to a stroke, it got my attention. I decided I'd better clean up my act.

The diet I went on was to get the TG level down. I also started losing weight. That's when my re-education process began.

(I thought I had been trying to lose weight for years. Actually, I had just been hoping to lose weight.)

"This is great," I thought. "I'll bet I can lose even faster if I try." So I made the mistake most dieters make, and cut out nearly all carbohydrates. Soon I didn't have the energy of a gnat. So I added carbohydrates back—but only the complex ones (fresh fruit, whole-grain and whole-wheat products) and not the simple ones (such as white flour and sugared foods and drinks).

Then, for Father's Day, Verbie gave me an exercycle with rowing-type handlebars. I started getting up earlier and doing my thing in front of the TV set while watching the daybreak news programs. The pounds came off steadily and I began to feel much better.

My triglyceride level came back to normal right away. But I was on a roll, so I stayed with it.

I studied the nutrition charts, and discovered how ignorant I really was about healthy eating.

For instance, I had always considered a hamburger to be a fairly well-rounded meal, since it contained meat, bread and fresh veggies. But according to the American Heart Association, cardiologists call the fast-food hamburger "the triple-bypass special" because it's loaded with cholesterol, starch and sodium.

I also learned such goodies as:

—Spinach has practically no nutritional value. Squash contains much more iron and vitamins. Spinach can give you lots of Vitamin C, but only if you steam it or eat it fresh.

—Among the worst things you can put in your body are refined sugar and refined flour.

—Avoiding fried foods is good advice for anyone—not just ulcer patients. When you deep-fry or batter-fry any meat or vegetable, you destroy or alter some of the natural qualities of the food and sometimes load it with cholesterol and unnecessary calories. (This is especially true with fish.) Light stir-frying in a wok seems to be the best way to fry anything. Fried foods put a big load on the digestive and cardiovascular systems. Satchel Paige, the immortal baseball pitcher, said it as well as anyone ever has: "Avoid fried foods as they angry up the blood."

—A person should eat no more than three eggs per week, including

OM teams compete Friday

Three Dimmitt Middle School teams will be competing in the World Olympics of the Mind competition Friday at Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant, Mich.

The teams left Amarillo Wednesday morning and flew to Detroit, where they were scheduled to tour Greenfield Village, where the original homes and work areas of Henry Ford and Thomas Edison are located, and Windsor, Ontario, before arriving at CMU, on Michigan's Upper Peninsula, Wednesday night.

Today, the teams will do some last-minute preparation before attending tonight's pep rally, where all of the participants from 43 states, several Canadian provinces, and Puerto Rico will gather.

The teams will perform Friday, but their exact schedule was not known until registration Wednesday night.

The teams will fly back into Amarillo late Saturday night.

"The contributions to help defray our expenses have been wonderful," said Glenda Sims, who coordinates the OM teams and is serving as one of the coaches. "We had about 300 persons attend our performances (May 19) and our bake

sale went over very well. Our kids have raised about half of the cost of the trip."

Here's a capsule look at the three Dimmitt teams and their problems:

■ "Cro-Magnon," with team members Shanna Schaeffer, Jeanne Davis, Fabian Longoria, Susan Waggoner, Heather Moore, Christy Killough and Robert Vera, coached by Sims and Vicky Richards. The problem requires the team to create and perform a presentation which takes place, at least partially, in a cave during the prehistoric era. The team is required to make a painting, early tool, instrument, prehistoric animal and a representation of fire for its presentation;

■ "Poetic License," including team members Amy Beck, Matt Sims, Jennifer Sava, Robert Langford, Michelle Smith, Michelle Hardee and Amanda Boothe, and coached by Bill and Jacque Sava. The team must select and read a poem (in this case, Joyce Kilmer's *Trees*), create and read a parody of the poem, then present the parody in a live performance along with a playbill, props and background for the performance;

■ "Omer to the Rescue,"

coached by Zane Ellison and Doricell Davis and including Shad McDaniel, Heather Thomas, Jeremy Langford, Michael Ellison, Deena Richards and Michele Garcia. The team had to design and build a vehicle which fits into one or two suitcases, assemble, drive, turn and

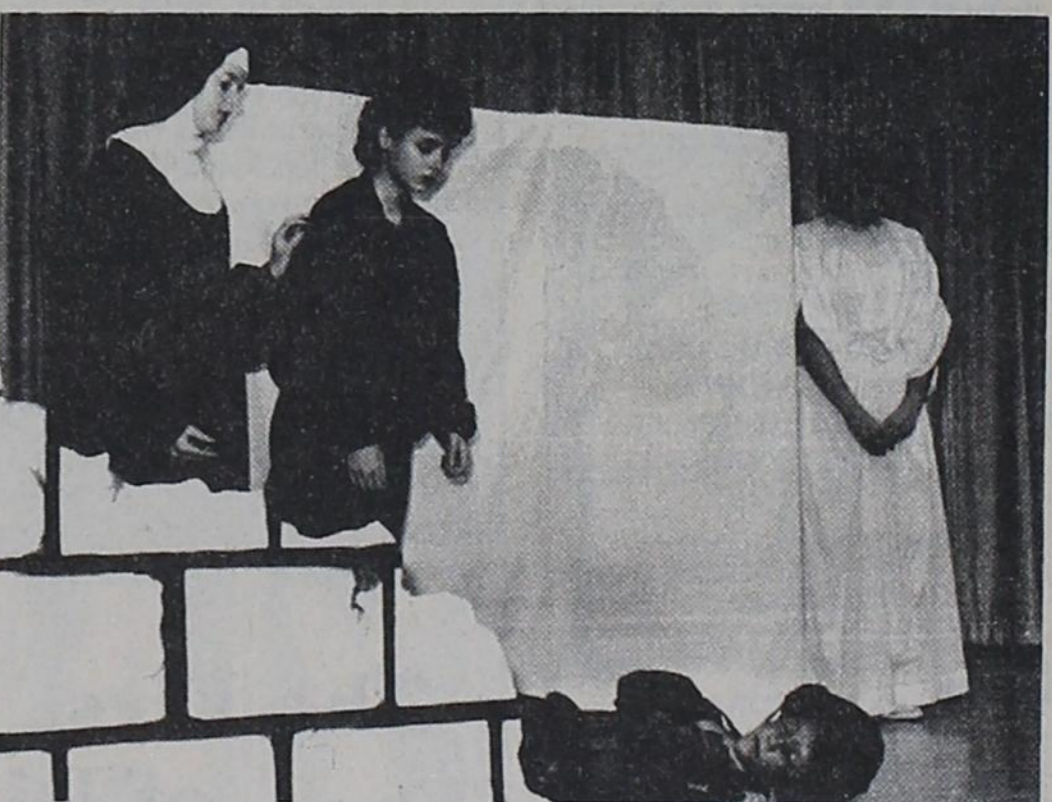
stop it, perform specified tasks and disassemble the vehicle within a certain time frame.

The three teams won first place at the State OM Meet held April 10 at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. DMS also picked up two

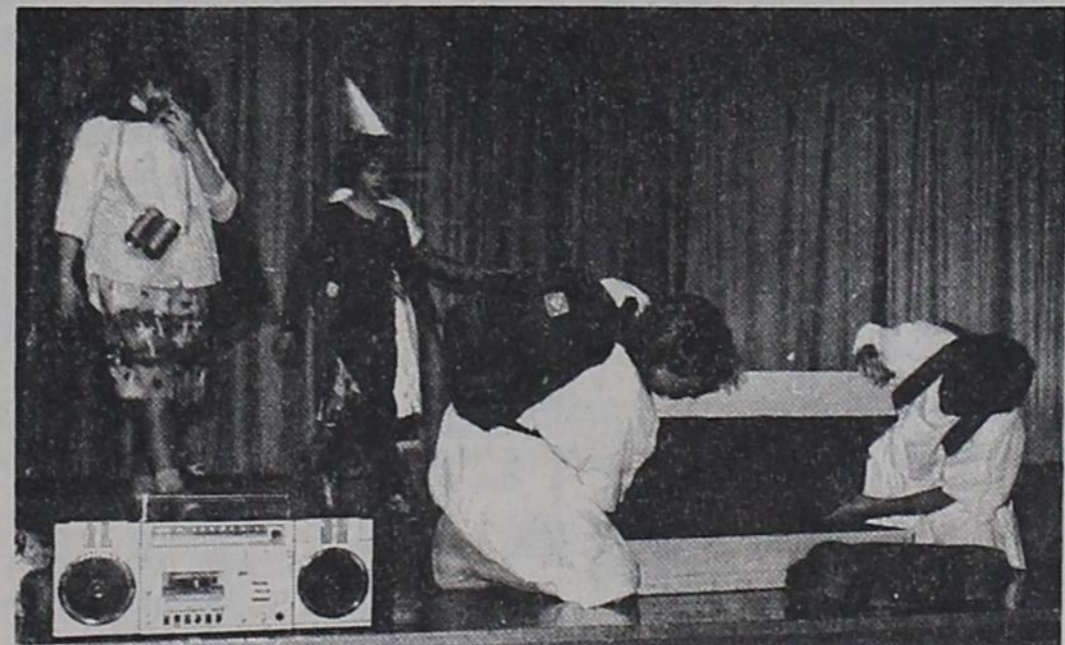

Mark and Kay Merritt and daughters of Midland were weekend guests of Mark's parents, Glenn and Mona Merritt and his grandmother, Mable Brock.

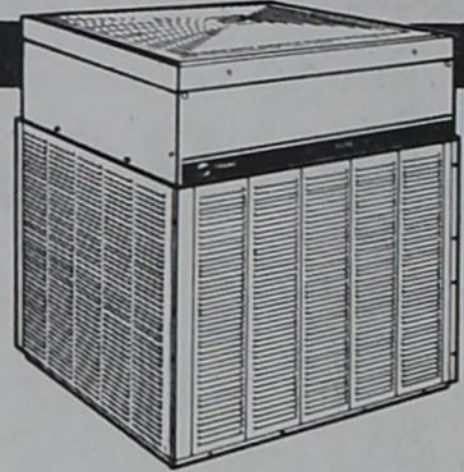

USDA working out disaster programs

The US Dept. of Agriculture is accepting comment on proposed rules regarding discretionary disaster payments authorized by the 1985 Farm Bill to establish criteria for determining when disaster payments will be made to producers of cotton, feed grains, wheat and rice for the 1987 through 1990 crops.

The rules would not apply to 1986 crops since a separate disaster program was provided last year, and other legislation to cover crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987 is awaiting President Reagan's signature.

The 1985 farm bill permits the Secretary of Agriculture to make prevented planting and reduced yield disaster payments to producers who, for reasons beyond their control, suffer disaster losses if such losses create an economic emergency for the producers and Federal Crop Insurance Corp. indemnity and other available government assistance is insufficient to alleviate the emergency.

USDA proposes that payments be made only to producers in counties declared a disaster area by

the secretary, at the request of the state governor. To be approved, the governor's request would have to show that a substantial loss of production had created an economic emergency in the county. Then, producers in that county would have to document a similar loss and emergency on individual farms.

A "disaster" would be deemed to have occurred when conditions beyond the control of producers result in a yield reduction of at least 60%.

"Insufficient assistance to alleviate the economic emergency"

would be defined as a situation in which an economic loss of 60% or more exists after taking into consideration the dollar value of all crop production, including hay and pasture, plus all forms of federal assistance.

Considered "federal assistance" in the USDA proposal are available federal crop insurance indemnity, deficiency payments, land diversion payments, in-kind compensation, FmHA emergency loans, the value of any special haying or grazing privileges, emergency livestock feed and "any other forms of government assistance" made available for the same disaster losses.

The value of "available" FCIC indemnity is defined as the total available payments (at the 65% coverage level) for all commodities for which crop insurance is available, whether or not the producer elected to purchase crop insurance. However, eligibility itself would be contingent on an FCIC policy being in effect on at least a portion of the affected crop.

The payment rate for both prevented planting and reduced yield payments is set at one-third of the established target price for the affected crops.

Comment on the proposed rules must be submitted by July 14 to Director, Emergency Operations and Livestock Division, ASCS, USDA, PO Box 2415, Washington, DC 20013.

Bushland demonstration is today

The annual Wheat Field Day will be held today at 1 p.m. at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland.

Research on varieties, hybrids, grazing, Russian Wheat aphids, reduced tillage, diseases and freeze damage will be discussed at Bushland.

Bus tours will leave at 1 and 1:30 p.m. from the lab headquarters, west of Amarillo on Interstate 40. At two of the four stops, Dr.

Kenneth Porter and Gary Peterson will show familiar irrigated and dryland wheat varieties and some experimental lines and hybrids, including the new TAM 200.

TAM 200, developed by Drs. David Worrall and Earl Gilmore at the Texas A&M Research Center at Chillicothe/Vernon, has leaf and stem rust resistance, very high test weight, and yield potential, according to Porter. TAM 200 seed may be related to certified seed growers

this fall.

Another tour stop will take visitors to research plots on limited tillage being conducted by Dr. Paul Unger, USDA soil scientist. The effect of removal dates on yield of irrigated wheat will be described by Dr. Steve Winter.

After the field tours, a group of researchers will give a panel discussion on freeze damage, wheat diseases and insect control in wheat at the headquarters building.

Pest workshop slated Tuesday

Two workshop sessions have been scheduled by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to increase the effectiveness of the pest management programs in the area.

The first of the two sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests, and will be held Tuesday at 8:30 a.m. at the Hale County Ag Center in Plainview.

The second workshop will be held July 7 in Plainview and will cover mid- to late-season crop pests.

The workshop has been held annually since 1973, and its role

over the year has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and other interested persons as well as farmers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments, improve yields, and hold down production costs.

Tuesday's session will begin with Dr. James Leser, Extension entomologist, outlining the scope of the training. Dr. Pat Morrison, Ex-

tension entomologist, will cover aspects of pesticide safety, general concepts of pest management and sampling.

Leser will open the cotton pest section with information on thrips and the growth and development of cotton plants.

Greg Cronholm and Allen Knutson, Extension entomologists in Plainview and Dimmitt, respectively, will provide information on early and mid-season sorghum and corn pests.

The workshop should end around noon with a hands-on session, and handouts will be available.

Nelson, TAMU team sweep meat trials

Doug Nelson of Dimmitt was a member of the Texas A&M University meats judging team that just completed a spring sweep of intercollegiate judging events.

Nelson and his Aggie teammates won events in Denver, Houston, Fort Worth and the Great Plains Invitational at Sioux Falls, S.D. No team came closer than 64 points of defeating the A&M team.

It was the first time in 11 years that TAMU has been undefeated through the spring, and the first time ever to win four consecutive spring contests.

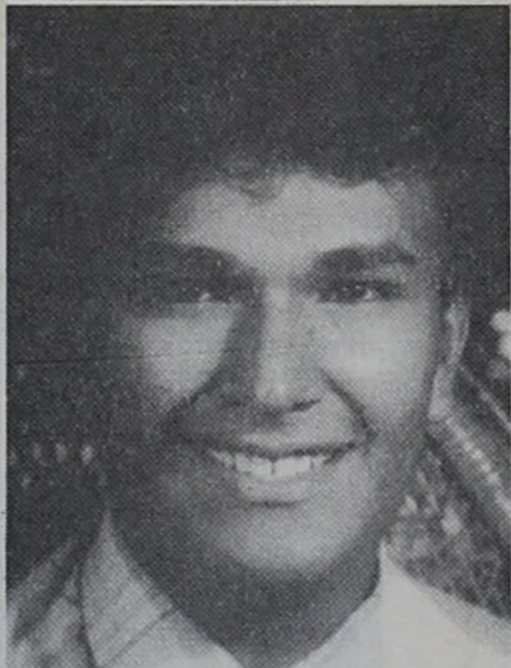

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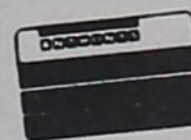

Mijares, Rodriguez top HHS honorees

Hart High School capped what Head Football Coach and Athletic Director Mark Stroebel said was "the school most successful year ever in athletics" at the annual Athletic Banquet Friday at the Hart School Auditorium.

Chris Rodriguez, a standout running back-linebacker in football, starter for the district runner-up basketball team and a regional qualifier in track, and Lupe Mijares, who finished fourth in the state in cross-country, was a part-time starter in basketball and finished second in the 1,600 meters and third in the 3,200 meters at the state track meet, were named HHS' most versatile athletes.

"I didn't realize when I showed up in Hart what kind of year we would have in cross-country," said coach Leslie Young. The team won district, was third at regional and fourth at state, while Tammy Menchaca won the state 1A-2A championship.

Menchaca and boys' runner Reno Montiel were named MVP's.

"This was an exceptional team," Stroebel said of his 8-3 football squad that was Hart's first entry into the playoffs in 10 years. "This is a team I will always remember in my heart and mind." Award winners included Rodriguez, Strike Award; Cecil Diaz, Trench Award, Danny Ledesma and Brett Ritter,

who shared the Fighting Heart Award, and MVP Paul Ramirez.

Gwen Wilson, who recently signed with perennial national power Wayland Baptist University, was named girls' basketball MVP. Wilson, named first-team all-state by the Texas Sports Writers Association, averaged 19.3 points, 15.9 rebounds, seven blocked shots and three assists, led the team to a 17-12 record this season.

Ramirez and Ritter were named co-MVP's in boys' basketball, where they teamed to lead the team to a 20-7 record and their first-ever trip to the playoffs.

"I feel fortunate to have coached this team this year," said coach Ricky Rowland. "I know Paul can play college basketball somewhere."

Ramirez averaged 20 points, 15 rebounds, and was, like Ritter, an unanimous all-district selection. Ritter averaged 15 points and 10 rebounds a game.

"One of the greatest honors a coach could have was to coach this track team," said coach Mark Albin. The "team" scored 34 points at the state Class 2A track meet, with Menchaca winning gold in the 1,600 and 3,200 and Mijares' two medal performances in the same races.

"Tammy and Lupe were my

pride and joy the last two years," Albin said. "They're more than just track athletes, they're special persons."

"If they weren't, they wouldn't have received over 40 scholarship offers over the past three months. Tammy and Lupe were the class of distance runners in Texas this

year." Freshman Larry Brown, who qualified for the state track meet in the long jump, was named MVP, while Risha Ammons, in girls' tennis, and Martin and Andy Castillo, who qualified for the state meet in boys' doubles, were named tennis MVP's.

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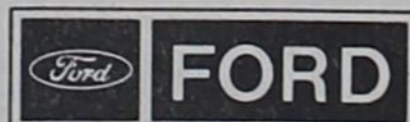

TDA says hunting is cheapest here

Panhandle-area farmers and ranchers are providing some of the cheapest hunting in the state, according to a survey released last week by the Texas Dept. of Agriculture.

Mike Moeller, deputy commissioner of TDA, said the statewide average for landowners is about \$300 per gun, with a high \$425 in the Rio Grande Valley. "These estimates are median rates," Moeller said. "The type of game and the proximity to metropolitan areas are the key factors in determining the rates that hunting leases will bring."

Most of the land in the Panhandle is leased for pheasant season, which will run from Dec. 12 through 27 this year. There are also deer and prairie chicken hunts in the region.

The information was gathered as part of the Texas Hunting Clearinghouse, a joint effort of TDA, Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Texas Farm Crisis Hotline. The clearinghouse links up hunters with hard-pressed farmers and ranchers who have land to lease. Last year, in its first year of operation, over 5,000 hunters and 1,000 Texas farmers and ranchers took advantage of the service.

"Texas farmers wishing to lease their land can now provide TDA with information on their acreage,

distance from the nearest airport, type of game, whether hunting dogs or guides are available, and boarding opportunities," Moeller said. "We organize the information by region and send it to interested hunters. With more land available this year, we want to increase not only the number of hunters, but, more importantly, the longevity of Texas farmers and ranchers."

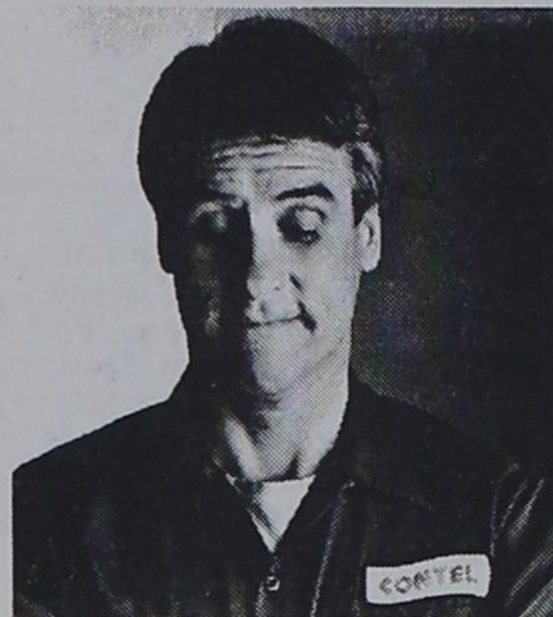

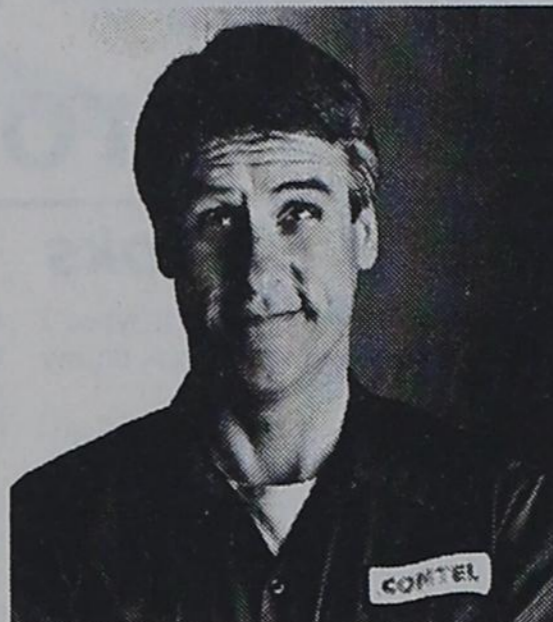

Reed came over and got his Coke, and I asked him if he would tell me something about umpires. "Sure," Rich said with a smile. "How come," I asked, "you and John Hirschbeck, rated the worst two umpires in the American League, are working on the same crew?" Rich, I'm sure, is still a little upset, but he let me drink the rest of his Coke, and the guys in the Rangers' bullpen, who haven't had much to smile about this year, got a good laugh out of it. It was all the comedy and drama you'd ever want.

the eggs in processed foods. If you like 'em fried, then use Pam instead of bacon grease, put a few drops of water on them in the pan and cover them with a saucenpan lid. That will blindfold them, making them the same as "over easy."
— We overcook, overprocess, oversaturate and otherwise abuse most of the foods we eat. The less processed or cooked a food is, the better.
— The diets for people with diabetes (high blood sugar level), hypoglycemia (low blood sugar), high cholesterol level, high triglyceride level and high blood pressure are basically the same diets. (Does that tell you something about healthy eating?)
— Most Americans are overweight, yet many don't get adequate nutrition.
— You can save money on food if you eat right. It's the "garbage" foods and drinks that cost the most and do you the least good.

works for me, but I don't have any authority to tell you what you, individually, should or shouldn't eat. Your tolerances, level of activity, etc., are probably different from mine.
However, if you're interested, I'll lay it on you. But only with this disclaimer: Check with your doctor or a qualified nutritionist before you go on any diet.
My new eating habits are fairly simple, and positive in approach rather than negative. And I don't count calories. My diet is intended to help you attain your "best weight" while avoiding those foods that can cause the bodily system to malfunction or trigger serious health problems.
The basic rule:
You can eat anything you want, and as much as you want, as long as it is lean, green, red, yellow or orange; boiled, broiled, baked or steamed.
Specifics:
Eat only whole-wheat or whole-grain breads and crackers. (White flour has had the germ and fiber removed, and these are among the main benefits of grain.)
Eat plenty of fresh fruit, especially for dessert and snacks. They'll give you most of the fiber and potassium and all the natural sugar that your body needs.
For sweetening, use honey or artificial sweetener. If you have to use sugar, use fructose.
Avoid processed foods that list sugar, bleached flour or palm oil among the ingredients.
Eat poultry and fish (fresh, frozen, canned or kippered) as often as you do red meats. Peel the skin from the poultry before eating it. Enjoy a broiled steak when you want. Don't be afraid of pork; today's leaner pork has fewer calories and less cholesterol than most beef.
If you drink milk, substitute buttermilk when you can.
Avoid caffeine. Either use the decaffeinated drinks, or rediscover the benefits of plain water. (If you can tolerate caffeine, okay. I can't anymore—it drives me up the wall.)
Alcohol kills liver cells and adds a tremendous amount of carbohydrates and calories to your intake. But I'm not going to preach to you

about it.
If you have a sweet tooth, learn to live with the sugar-free versions and recipes. (If you eat right, your tolerance for sweets will drop significantly.)
For a spread on toast, bread or crackers, use soft or soft/lite cream cheese instead of butter or margarine. (Tasty, and less than half the calories.)
The healthiest breakfast is also the least expensive—oatmeal, fruit juice and whole-grain toast. It provides the energy you need in complex carbohydrates, keeps you from getting too hungry later in the day, and isn't fattening.
Exercise regularly, using whatever kind of exercise you enjoy most. The experts recommend half an hour a day up to the strenuous level, three to six days a week.

That's about it.
Yes, the yardsticks in this diet cut out a lot of your favorite things—candy, colas, chocolate, bacon, most of the sausages, fried foods, most fast foods, traditional cookies, cakes and pies, doughnuts, Twinkies...
But you'll find that when you start looking, there's a lot of good food out there that falls within these guidelines. Your stomach—and waistline—will thank you for it.

One other major point: Don't be a fanatic or a bore about it. When you go to a banquet or meeting and have no control over the meal, go ahead and eat it. And remember, it's your fundamental right as an American to enjoy an occasional dip of Baskin-Robbins grand marnier, or Braum's French butter-pecan, or Frusen-Gladje strawberry, or Haagen-Dazs rum-raisin. After all, life is to be enjoyed as well as endured, and you'll be surprised how much more you'll enjoy these occasional rewards.
