Cairo Cries 'Down With U.S.A.' Heavy Vote Forecast In Midland Egyptians Riot Wildly

CAIRO—(AP)—Thousands of riotous Egyptians, some shouting "down with America," clashed with police in demonstrations Friday against the trend of United Nations Security Council discussions on this nation's dispute with Britain.

The acting prime minister, Ahmed Khashaba, broadcast an appeal "to every sincere patriot to help the government maintain order." The prime minister, Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrashy Pasha, is at Lake Success pressing for United Nations action.

The number of demonstrators reached about 5,000 at one time in Cairo. They reformed after they were scattered by police fire. They demanded evacuation of British troops from Egypt "by blood."

"Down with America, the traitor!" demonstrators shouted. "Down with Brazil, the traitor! Egypt defies the Security Council. Egypt defies the whole world."

They called also for revenge on "traitorous Egyptian police." More than 10 of the demonstrators were reported wounded by police fire as officers struggled to bring the thing under control.

The Egyptians want a Security Council ruling on their demand for withdrawal of British troops from the Sudan. Brazil proposed at Lake Success this week Britain and Egypt start over again on the deadlocked negotiations, and keep the council informed. The United States supported Brazil's proposal.

Revolt Is Growing In Korea

SEOUL—(AP)—Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge said Friday "widespread activity of a revolutionary nature" had been uncovered in Southern Korea and some ringleaders arrested—action which the Russians charged was aimed at disrupting the work of the joint commission on this occupied country.

Hodge, commander of the American occupation zone, said Korean government authorities made the arrests after learning of a plot by Leftists employees of the Korean broadcasting system to inject Communist propaganda into network programs and sabotage Rightist political speeches.

He said also more than 100 rioters had been arrested for attempting to interfere with the government's rice collection program—but those arrests "had no political significance."

Col. Gen. Treaty F. Shtikov, Chief of the Soviet delegation to the Korean Joint Commission, charged the "mass arrests of Leftists" was apparently aimed at disrupting the commission's work.

Hodge said ringleaders in the propaganda plot had been under observation for some time "to prevent out of hand disorders."

Hodge added the activities of organizations to which many of those arrested belonged have been "tied to directions from the North." He emphasized: "I didn't say from the Soviets, but from the North."

THREE BROTHERS ARE DROWNED IN BEAUMONT

BEAUMONT—(AP)—S. E. Purcell was the sole survivor of a fishing boat tragedy on the Neches River which took the lives of four others, three of whom were brothers.

The boat sank when the nose of the craft dipped into the water as the motor was speeded up.

The dead were: J. J. McBurnett, 63, inspector for Magnolia Refinery here; Jack Hedgspeth, 53, and Claude Hedgspeth, 55, both of Beaumont and J. E. Hedgspeth, 63, of Goddard, Ala.

Initial Carver Is To Be Arraigned Tuesday

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—(AP)—A 23-year-old 190-pound former GI is scheduled to be arraigned here Tuesday on his estranged bride's accusation he carved his initials on her thigh and beat her during a drunken rampage that lasted eight hours.

Specifically, Robert Eugene Lewis is charged with "assault to commit murder" and a "crime against nature." He is in jail here on \$5,000 bond awaiting his arraignment in criminal court of record.

Mrs. Lewis said her husband tied her to a bed and began to beat and slash her.

"He told me he was going to show me whether I was his wife and threatened to repeat the beating once a week until I learned it for sure," she said.

Sikhs Kill Hundreds

JULLUNDUR, INDIA — (AP) — Fierce Sikh warriors, rising by the thousands, were waging Friday what military authorities called a ruthless war of extermination against Moslems East of the Pakistan border.

In 12 days of savage fighting, while the subcontinent was being divided into the Dominions of India and Pakistan, military reports showed the bearded Sikhs had overrun at least 150 rural villages populated wholly or partly by Moham-medans. Men, women and children were slaughtered by the hundreds. Shops and homes were burned and pillaged.

No one knows how many have died. Military records listed 1,500. No one seemed to know how many villages would be left before the Sikhs call their job complete.

Military leaders expressed fear the reprisals committed by the Sikhs in payment for atrocities committed in areas where Moham-medans are in majority would provoke a new wave of butchery of Sikhs and Hindus stranded in the Moslem Dominion of Pakistan.

Dutch Declare U. N. Is Dismal Failure In Indonesia's Case

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—The Netherlands declared Friday the United Nations effort to end the Indonesian conflict had been a dismal failure and bloodshed actually had increased since the UN cease-fire order.

Cuban Proposal Is Defeated

QUITANDINHA, BRAZIL—(AP)—Cuba was defeated Friday in her demand provisions for protection of the "economic independence" of American nations be written into a hemisphere defense treaty.

The steering committee of the 20-nation Inter-American Defense Conference voted down the proposal. Fifteen nations voted against the measure, which the United States has opposed.

Earlier, Argentina jolted the conference with a surprise move to bar joint use of armed force in combating aggression from within the Western Hemisphere.

Breaking sharply with provisions of the Act of Chapultepec, the Argentine delegation submitted a new proposal for the mutual defense treaty in the making her under which common military force would be employed only against attack from outside the Americas.

The United States and seven Latin-American nations have presented proposals making no such distinction between aggression from without and from within the hemisphere.

Midland Clouds Rain .16 Without Dry Ice

Just as several Midland citizens Friday morning were beginning to wonder whether it would be a good idea to try out the dry-ice method of milking rain from hovering clouds, the clouds came across without any such prompting.

At noon, they had released .16 of an inch of moisture at the city barn. And, though there was sunshine at the lunch hour, lingering black clouds encouragingly indicated possibilities of further precipitation.

Political Explosion Over Co-Ops May Echo In 1948 Campaign; Texan Irks Republicans

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A political explosion which may echo in the 1948 presidential campaign was in the making Friday as a Republican-dominated congressional committee assembled to begin a cross-country investigation into cooperatives.

Even before the first session got underway, Chairman Ploeser (R-Mo) and Rep. Patman (D-Texas), ranking minority member of the House Small Business Committee, were trading charges of "smear" tactics.

Russia Is Rebuked

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Russia was under fire from several quarters Friday for persistently using the veto to upset majority decisions in the United Nations Security Council.

In the wake of angry outcries provoked by seven Russian vetoes this week, Argentina moved swiftly to seek abolition of the big power veto privilege by submitting a resolution for consideration of the General Assembly when it meets in New York Sept. 16.

The Argentine government asked the assembly to call a general conference of all the United Nations three days after the 55-nation body concludes its forthcoming session in order to revise the veto section of the UN Charter.

Under article 109 of the UN Charter a general conference of the members of the United Nations for the purpose of reviewing the present document may be held at a date and place to be fixed by a two-thirds majority of the General Assembly and by a vote of any seven members of the Security Council.

But any alteration of the Charter recommended by a two-thirds vote of the conference cannot take effect until ratified by two-thirds of the member state of the United Nations, including all the permanent members of the Security Council.

Thus, any one of the big five could use the veto to prevent abolition of the veto. In view of this fact observers agreed the small powers, who have been fighting unsuccessfully for two years to restrict the veto, could hope for nothing more than an assembly resolution urging the Big Five to use the veto only in extreme cases.

House Seat Is At Stake On Saturday

A congressman to succeed R. Ewing Thomason of El Paso, who resigned to accept a federal judgeship, will be elected and the proposed college building amendment to the Texas constitution will be decided in Saturday's special election.

Interest in the congressional race has been rising steadily and a comparatively heavy vote is forecast in Midland and other counties of the 16th District. A total of 98 absentee ballots were cast here in the congressional race and 73 in the college building amendment election. Poll tax receipts and exemptions issued here total 4,230, a record for this county.

The five voting polls in Midland County will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

The voting places and judges are: Precinct No. 1—Basement of courthouse; Mrs. Gladys Tolbert. Precinct No. 2—Prairie Lee School; P. H. Abbott.

Precinct No. 3—Stevenson School; Mrs. Herman Fisher. Precinct No. 4—Lee O. Manning residence; Mrs. Lee O. Manning. Precinct No. 5—City-County Auditorium; E. D. Richardson.

Voters are requested to bring poll tax receipts to the voting places. Midland citizens residing North of Wall Street will vote at the courthouse and those South of Wall Street at the City-County Auditorium.

A strenuous effort is being made here to get as many voters to the polls as possible.

Five El Paso Candidates
Midland is the home of Ken Regan, one of the seven candidates seeking the congressional post. Another candidate, James W. Metcalfe, is from Odessa, and the five others, Woodrow W. Bean, Louis A. Fahl, Ord Gary, Victor B. Gilbert and Pat M. Hargrove, are from El Paso.

The candidates have conducted strenuous campaigns throughout the large district which is composed of 19 West Texas counties. All are Democrats. The race will be determined without a runoff; the candidate receiving the largest number of votes being elected.

Regan returned to Midland Friday to conclude his campaign in his home county. He will speak over KCRS at 8 p. m. Friday and at 7:15 a. m. Saturday. He had been visiting with voters in the El Paso area since last Sunday.

FITZGERALD GETS FLOWING OIL IN HOCKLEY PROJECT

James FitzGerald, Jr., of Midland, et al. No. 1 Coble, Central-West Hockley County wildcat, approximately one and one-half miles west of nearest completed producer on the west side of the Leveland field, appears to have assured an extension of that producing area.

Operators treated the saturated section between the casing seat at 4,756 feet, and total depth at 4,830 feet, with 8,000 gallons of acid.

The load and residue, from the injection, was swabbed out and the well kicked off and started flowing. It was turned to tanks, after a short period of flowing to pits, and at last report was making approximately 15 barrels of fluid—mostly new oil. It was still slightly cut with acid residue.

Informed sources report that the project has shown that it will be completed as some sort of a flowing producer. It is expected that as soon as it is thoroughly cleaned from the acid injection, operator will take potential test and put the development on production.

It is 440 feet from north and 1,363 feet from west lines of subdivision 46, league 69, Hardeman County School Land survey, and six miles west of Leveland.

CONSTANTIN STEPUOT TO TEST AFTER ACID SHOT

E. Constantin, Jr., et al. No. 1-A Coble, a short distance east of the FitzGerald extender, and 440 feet from north and 1,363 feet from west lines of labor 59, league 69, Hardeman County School Land survey, was swabbing to clean out and test after treating pay section above total depth of 4,851 feet, with an unreported amount of acid.

This project is due to be finished as a producer.

Ralph Lowe No. 1 Montgomery, another stepout from proven producing acreage on the west side of the Leveland field, and 440 feet from south and east lines of labor 22, league 70, Val Verde County School Land survey, had reached 3,437 feet and was drilling ahead in anhydrite. It is to go to around 5,000 feet to test for production in the San Andres-Permian.

MARTIN FLANKER DRILLS AHEAD IN SIMPSON

Shell Oil Company, Inc., and Superior Oil Company No. 1 Lockhart, east stepout from the Martin-Ellenburger field, in Central-Southwest Andrews County, and 662 feet from south and west lines of section 22, block A-41, psi survey, was drilling ahead under 3,940 feet in Simpson lime and shale.

The formation was entered at 8,100 feet, on a derrick floor elevation of 3,134 feet. According to some geologists that puts the project 25 feet low to Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 5 Parker, a recently completed Ellenburger producer in the Martin field, and the closest oil well to the Shell and Superior exploration.

It is going on down to the Ellenburger. Interested observers expect it to produce oil from that pay section.

MAGNOLIA TO DIG OFFSET TO HUMBLE 1 Y & A DISCOVERY

Magnolia petroleum company has filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas, requesting a permit to start drilling on an 11,500-foot wildcat in Southwest Ector County, by August 27.

The prospector will be Magnolia No. 1 C. H. C. Anderson. It is located 1,980 feet from east and 600 feet from south lines of section 13, block B-14, psi survey.

That puts it one-quarter of a mile due north of Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Yarborough & Allen, which is now preparing to complete, after discovering heavy flowing oil production from the Ellenburger between 10,490 feet and the total depth at 10,580 feet.

This Is News! Big And Little Inch Make Profit For Government

NEW YORK—(AP)—Construction and operation of the Big Inch and Little Inch pipelines yielded the government a net return of \$182,000,000, exclusive of depreciation, John D. Goodloe, Reconstruction Finance Corporation chairman disclosed Friday.

This compares with a government capital investment of \$145,000,000, approximately the amount for which the system was recently sold.

"The government also effected a heavy saving in oil transportation directly resulting from the \$290,000,000 difference in the cost for pipeline deliveries and the more expensive charges which would have been necessary for tank car deliveries provided tank cars could have done the job," Goodloe said in a letter to W. Alton Jones, President of Cities Service Co., who headed up War Emergency Pipelines, Inc., which built and operated Big and Little Inch.

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U. S. Park Visitors Increase Is Record

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The National Park said Friday 26,000,000 persons may visit the U. S. system of scenic and historic areas in the travel year ending Sept. 30—an all-time record and one of the most tremendous travel increases in history.

Interior Secretary Krug had told reporters July totals indicated a forthcoming attendance record of 25,000,000.

Last year's park-travel total was 21,684,000, a new record.

Krug said almost 5,000,000 persons visited the parks in July alone, 30 per cent more than during July, 1946. "That's a fantastic increase," he said.

Some of the parks, Krug said have had particularly astonishing attendance increases. These include Big Bend, Texas, 134 per cent.

west of the discovery well of the Penwell-Ellenburger field, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 18, block B-14, psi survey, ran a drillstem test at 10,567-568 feet. The tool was open two hours and 52 minutes.

Gas showed at the surface in 18 minutes. The 1,000-foot water blanket started flowing at the top in 36 minutes. Drilling mud came to the surface in 45 minutes and oil flowed out of the drill pipe in 50 minutes.

It was cleaned to pits for a short time, and then turned to tanks. It flowed 62.50 barrels; 53.50 barrels, and 53.50 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil, in three consecutive 30-minute periods.

The 20-foot zone under test, produced gas at the rate of 2,225,000 cubic feet per day. Gas-oil ratio was 832-1. Initial flowing pressure was 2,400 pounds. Maximum flowing pressure was 2,750 pounds, and shut-in pressure was 4,375 pounds.

Operator representatives report that the well will be completed without drilling deeper.

The saturated sections above 10,567 feet had tested for approximately 230 barrels of oil per hour, flowing, natural, during previous drillstem tests. No water has been developed by the discovery.

POPLARVILLE, MISS.—(AP)—Mississippians, who never deserted Theo G. Bilbo under the fire of outside criticism of his racial beliefs, planned their final respects Friday for the state's most spectacular political figure.

The arrangements would have been to the liking of the 69-year-old Senator-elect who died of heart failure at New Orleans Thursday after a long illness which began with cancer of the mouth and became complicated by inflammation of the nerves, partial paralysis and a blood clot in the lungs.

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Midwest Drouth And Heat To Continue

The Midwestern heat wave and drought, now whittling away steadily at corn and other crops, still was anchored for at least three more days, the Chicago Weather Bureau said Friday.

There was nothing in sight to budge the searing blast before Sunday night, the forecaster said.

Some crop observers said with top soil moisture exhausted, or nearly so throughout the region, the crop deterioration would become more rapid with each additional day of the heat and drought.

The death toll from causes induced by the heat was reported to have reached 32 in Chicago since Monday night and 80 since Aug. 1.

New Coating Found For Meat Dishes

There's a new coating for sausage and other meat and food products. It's a protective film of good strength, but so tender that it dissolves on food that's boiled, or it can be eaten right along with the meat if it's fried or roasted. This new food covering is made from waste products—citrus peel or other fruit and vegetable waste, and the process is one that's simple and easily controlled.

Whole Chickens Now Canned: Among the poultry products on the market now in cans are whole, cooked chickens. Suspended by their legs, the feathered 3-pound chickens pass on a chain conveyor to operators who remove feet and head, singe and clean them inside and out, then pass them on to tin cans—4 inches in diameter, 7 inches high—where they are dropped neck down into the cans and broth added. Can tops are sealed on and the chickens cooked in large retorts, all their goodness safely sealed inside the can. When the can is opened, the chicken is ready to be eaten cold, stuffed and roasted (a few minutes broiling will suffice), fricasseeed or prepared a la king.

Home Canning Supplies Better: Homemakers making food preservation plans will be interested to learn that it now looks as though there will be enough glass jars, both pint and quart sizes, to go 'round. More natural rubber is being made available to manufacturers of closures, so no shortage of rubber rings or self-sealing jar tops is anticipated.

However, since there probably won't be enough pressure canners for all who want them, homemakers should place their orders early. There may be spot shortages of tin cans. Dealers will purchase enough tin containers to cover the sales they expect to make. When these are gone, they probably won't buy more unless there's a demand. Therefore, if the home canner waits until the last minute to buy these supplies, she's likely to suffer some inconvenience if the dealer is then out of stock.

Another bit of advice—those who have pressure canners should have the gauges checked without delay. This should be a yearly procedure, and can be done by the dealer, the manufacturer of the canner, or by the County Home Demonstration Agent.

Where canning is to be done in tin cans, now is the time to check over the sealing machine to see whether any of the parts need to be replaced.

Community canning centers will be operating on much the same scale as last year—when there were about 6000 throughout the country. Reports indicate that many centers have added new processing equipment. Patrons of community canning centers have discovered the ease and economy of canning where good equipment and supervision are available. If you're not familiar with the location of a center near you, contact the state office of the United States Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration, or the vocational agricultural or homemaking teacher in your local high school.

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Woman Editor Gives Lively Touch To Scholarly Encyclopedia Americana

NEW YORK—(NEA)—If you've been wondering why the girls who do things are grabbing off more space lately in one of the leading encyclopedias, here's the answer. There's a woman editor at the helm.

As executive editor of the Encyclopedia Americana, Dr. Lavinia Dudley, a suavely dressed, soft-spoken brunette, sees to it that women who deserve it get more prominence in these pages, traditionally reflecting a man's say-so, than they have in the past.

Because Dr. Dudley champions the cause of her sex, the biographies of Sister Kenny, Dean Virginia Gildersleeve, and Lise Meitner, as well as Princess Elizabeth, brighten the pages of recent Americana editions.

To insure a true reflection of world thought in each annual edition of the encyclopedia, Dr. Dudley pins her attention on fast-changing news developments and continual revision of subject matter and space allotment.

Under her guiding hand, President Truman's lineage increased from 46 in the 1946 Americana to 342 for the 1947 edition. Dr. Dudley's editorial scissors cut World War I from 400 pages in 1947 to 75 pages in 1948. She's giving World War II 250 pages.

This woman editor, whose job is the envy of many men scholars, is a gracious New Yorker. She careered up via secretarial jobs with, first, a New York University dean, next with the president of a publishing house.

A high school grad who had mastered stenography, the young editor-to-be worked for the dean

by day, took college courses at night. But Dr. Dudley says she studied only subjects that appealed to her. Want to know what these were? Art, literature and economics.

Still at it, her latest study is pictorial journalism taken, she says, "because I always wanted to explore that subject."

Never having formally graduated from college, Dr. Dudley's degree of literature is honorary and was conferred last June by the Missouri Valley College.

In her climb from stenographer's desk to the book-lined office of executive editor, Dr. Dudley worked in the sales department of a publishing house. This led to a position on the editorial staff, qualified her for the post she holds today.

Her success secret? "I love business. I've always been anxious to learn more about any job I had."

In spite of her fondness for business, Dr. Dudley, who is married to an account executive of a statistical firm, keeps house after hours. She loves to cook, hates cleaning chores. Both she and her husband are crack tennis players. But Dr. Dudley, like any good wife, admits that her husband's game is superior to hers and says ruefully, "he's too good for me."

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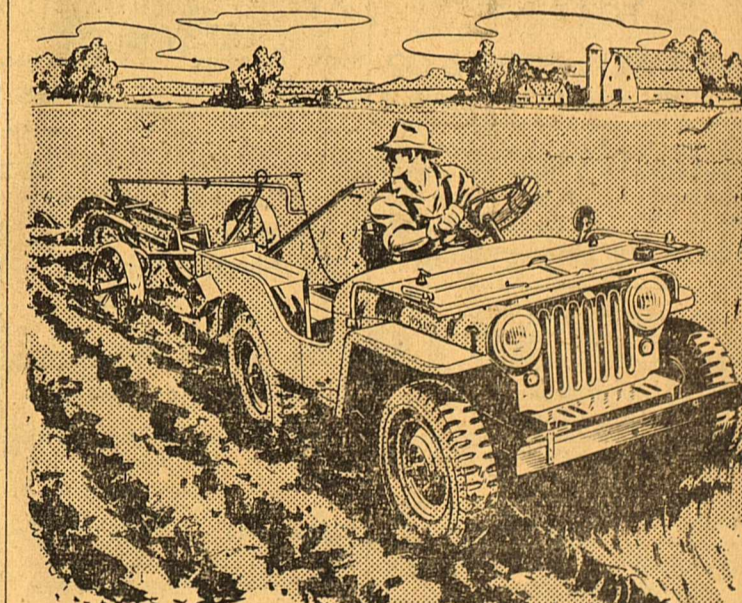

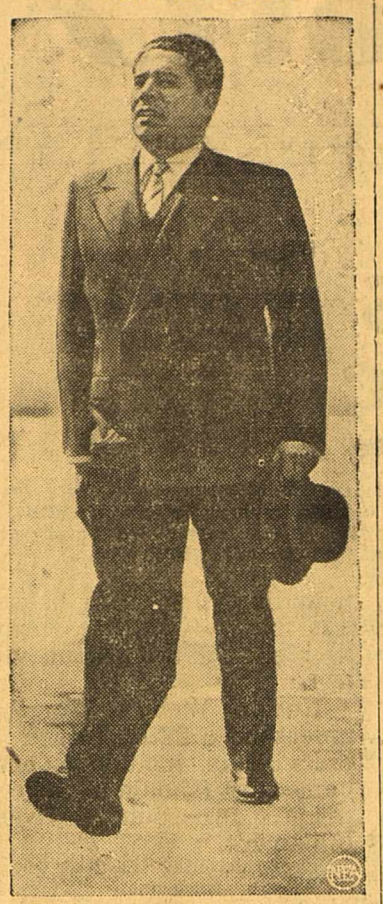

Industrialization Of Texas Is On Upswing

AUSTIN—(P)—Industrialization of the state is gaining momentum, the Texas Employment Service reports.

TEC said 77 new industries scheduled operations in Texas during July, and 51 of these are already in production with 991 workers hired.

This is the largest number of new firms opening in any one month since April.

The other 26 industries are expected to open in the next six months. They will need approximately 1,760 additional workers, TEC estimated.

Industrial expansion continued in East Texas with 10 new firms employing some 600 workers, the employment commission reported.

Other labor markets with a great number of new industries: Waco, Dallas, Austin, Beaumont, Abilene, San Angelo, Fort Worth and Harlingen.

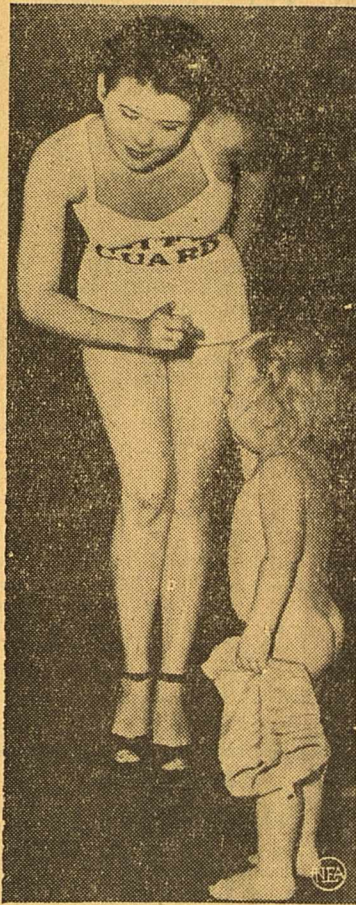

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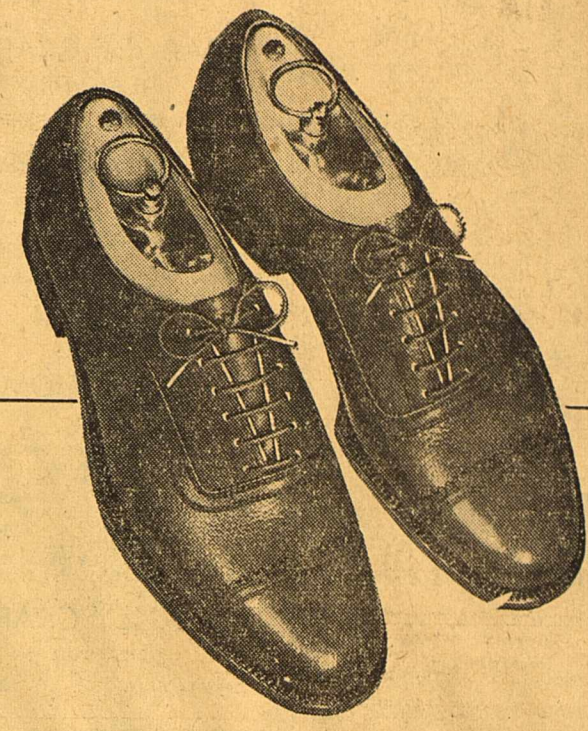
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Colts Schedule Carlsbad, N. M.

Vote As You Please But Vote

Saturday is election day and voters of the 16th Congressional District will select a new congressman to succeed R. Ewing Thomason, who resigned to become a federal district judge.

Many of us have announced our favorites among the seven candidates and Midlanders have a sincere interest in the campaign because we have an opportunity to name a resident of the Permian Basin who understands its problems to Congress. Ken Regan, oil operator, farmer, ranchman and businessman is a resident of Midland. He knows oil men, field workers and executives, and their problems are not unfamiliar to him. Midland has an opportunity to elect a congressman. The Permian Basin has an opportunity to elect a congressman. He should be elected by an overwhelming vote to prove to him that citizens of this large district are behind him.

Also to be decided by Texas voters is the proposed college building amendment to the Constitution which provides for a \$60,000,000 development program for 16 colleges and universities. This issue has been explained to citizens a number of times, and it now is time to make the decision.

So two major matters must be decided Saturday.

"Have you voted yet?" should be on the lips of each citizen Saturday. More than 4,200 Midlanders are eligible to vote.

Urge your friends, neighbors and business acquaintances and associates to vote. It is the duty of every citizen to vote and to interest others in exercising their rights and privileges as American citizens at the polls. Every qualified voter should cast a ballot. Every citizen should be interested in sending the best man available to Washington as our congressman.

Vote as you please, but please vote.

No Time For Minnow Fishing

Senators Owen Brewster and Homer Ferguson are men of distinguished records. Ferguson is a former judge and law professor who was an able, militant crusader in the cause of justice. Brewster, also a lawyer, was formerly governor of Maine and has a notable reputation as a public servant, in and out of the Senate.

But these gentlemen are going to have to hustle if the Senate investigation of war expenditures which they are now running winds up to be enhancing their prestige. In fact, they will be fortunate if they can make the public forget the ineptitudes of their first attempt.

Anyone who had even a distant bleacher-seat view of war production in this country must have known that public money was flung around high, wide and handsome in entertaining government bigwigs and smallwigs. Maybe it wasn't right, but it happened.

Nobody knows what the total bill for parties, junkets, and so on came to. Suppose it was \$10,000,000, which we doubt. That sum would be a little more than the average hourly cost of the war to the United States government—every hour from Pearl Harbor to the Japanese surrender.

It would seem then that the wisest thing this committee could do would be to go after the big ones, and not fish for minnows. Combing unfiled and extravagant-looking war contracts will take a long time. Irregularities in \$500 expense accounts and money spent on "party girls" may make spicy reading, but there is no time for such detailed investigation. Senators Brewster and Ferguson couldn't finish the job in the thorough manner in which they started if they lived to be 100.

Republicans, Democrats and every other American political breed might well ask why the senators started where they did? And why did these two able lawyers permit extravagant forecasts and promises to go unrefuted? It was said that President Roosevelt okayed the unfiled Howard Hughes contracts. It was said that Elliott Roosevelt "forced them down the throats" of Army authorities. Testimony at the hearings proved no such thing.

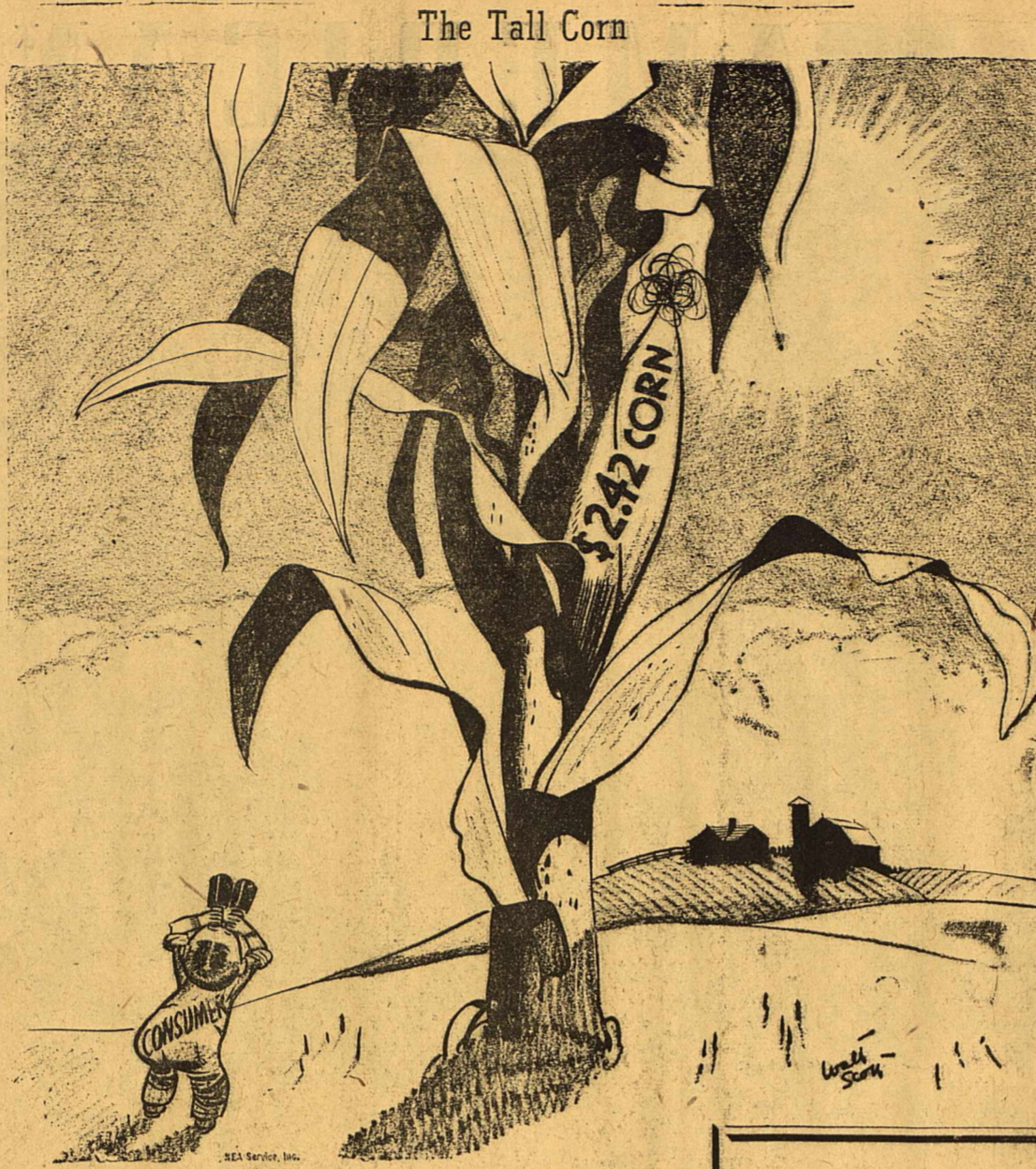
The late President's son admitted his indiscretion in accepting gifts from Hughes. Unquestionably instances could be found where others were equally indiscreet. Roosevelt's mistake was in forgetting that, in his position, the slightest misstep would be blown up out of all proportion.

The senators might well recall that President Roosevelt is dead and the war is over. The public debt remains. If there are million-dollar frauds, let them be uncovered and the guilty punished. But if that is to be done, there is no time to spend further weeks in totting up night club bills and puzzling over \$50 gifts to girls. And there is no place for publicity or politics.

An Unwise Request

We hope and trust that the Greek government's reported request for a "symbolic force" of American troops or fliers will not be granted. Such a move surely would not "intimidate" the foreign supporters of the Greek guerrillas, as the government hopes. Rather it would put the United States in the position of doing just what the Balkan neighbors are doing, and thus give them excuse for redoubled assistance.

The obvious purpose of aid to Greece and aid to Europe is to help the recipients to help themselves.



Improvement Is Seen In British Industry

LONDON—(AP)—Deputy Prime Minister Herbert Morrison has announced signs of "progress"—recorded July exports and increased coal production—in the battle for Britain's economic recovery.

Provisional export figures for July, Morrison told a news conference, totaled \$441,200,000, "the highest level since November, 1920, and, apart from that month, probably the highest ever recorded in peacetime."

"It begins to look as if we have stopped the rut in coal," he added, indicating Britain might be in a position to resume coal exports to the continent by next year.

But, Morrison warned: "The crisis is still getting graver. We shall have to face worse things before we are through."

NAVY'S FIGHTING SHIPS CUT FROM 1,300 TO 285

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Two years after the end of the war, the Navy has reported its fleet of combatant ships has shrunk from nearly 1,300 to 285 in full operation and 21 in reduced status.

From 41,272 planes on VJ-Day, the Navy's air arm is down to 15,999 of all types, with 2,500 of them fleet combatant aircraft. In manpower, the Navy has gone from 3,966,758 men and 325,074 officers to 425,000 men and 46,000 officers and will shrink a bit more during the current fiscal year.

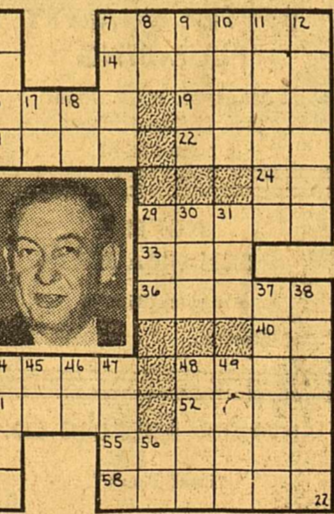

Maybe crappie would save the day, Becker decided, so he gave the bugle call to a tank of them. They swarmed and nuzzled the device, but Walter Chute, aquarium director, didn't go for that.

"These fish," he said, "are very friendly. They also bump your finger if you put it in the water." That was enough for Becker.

"I am returning the caller to the owner with a sharply worded letter," he said.

REDS GROW VEGETABLES IN FROZEN NORTH

MOSCOW—(AP)—The weekly newspaper Socialist Agriculture said recently vegetables are being grown successfully on the Soviet Union's Taimyr Peninsula, the Northern tip of which has about the same latitude as Northern Greenland.

One farm reported growing over 30 tons of cabbages per acre in this land of perpetually frozen earth and 24-hour-a-day sunlight during the early summer, the newspaper said. It added that greenhouses were used to start the plants and the fields were heavily fertilized.

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DON'T BE LED ASTRAY WEST TEXANS VOTE VOTE VOTE August 23, Saturday AGAINST THE COLLEGE BUILDING AMENDMENT

On Saturday, August 23, an amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas will be voted on to allocate 5¢ of the authorized 7¢ confederate pension tax to finance a building program for state owned colleges other than the University of Texas and Texas A & M.

Limited Expansion

By removing the power of appropriation of the Legislature for the next 30 years, this amendment, if passed, will limit the expansion of 14 state owned colleges, regardless of their future needs. Texas University and Texas A & M, with access to the Permanent University Fund (mostly derived from West Texas oil) which is already earning approximately \$2,000,000 annually will not be so limited by the new amendment.

Will Not Provide Adequate Buildings

If passed, this 5¢ additional tax will not provide adequate and sufficient buildings at today's cost of construction. In the next ten years West Texas State Teachers College at Canyon might get \$487,200. The College of Mines at El Paso might get \$423,000. Sul Ross at Alpine might get \$189,000. Texas Technological College at Lubbock might get \$1,500,000 in the 10 years. It is reported and advertised that Texas Tech will receive approximately \$7,500,000 from this new tax in the next 30 years. Actually, Tech will get only about 60% or \$4,500,000 for actual construction in 30 years—the balance having to go for interest.

Strong West Texas Opposition To The Amendment

The membership of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce voted 2065 to 997 against the passage of this amendment at a recent poll. The Veterans of Foreign Wars are opposing the amendment on a state wide scale. State Representatives Preston Smith of Lubbock, Harley Sadler of Sweetwater and Roger O. Evans of Denison, among others, are actively opposing the amendment.

Small Taxpayers Pay

The veteran, the farmer, the small home owner, the laborer, the small business man, everybody will have to pay this 5¢ tax in addition to the 7¢ state tax, if this amendment carries. This state tax is in addition to local taxes—County taxes—School taxes—City taxes—and perhaps others. This amendment does not provide for a homestead exemption for small farm and home owners.

42 Counties Exempt

42 of the state's richest counties pay no ad valorem taxes for state purposes. None of these counties are in West Texas.

Moral Rearmament Goals Are Outlined

CAUX-SUR-MONTRÉAUX, SWITZERLAND—(AP)—From a mountain retreat here 2,500 feet above the Castle of Chillon, the world assembly for Moral Rearmament is crusading to change, it says, the hearts of men and the destiny of mankind. Frank Buchman, founder of the Oxford Group and chief exponent of the philosophy of moral rearmament, calls the movement a Christian revolution to eliminate personal, political, industrial and racial antagonisms. Domestic relations, strife between labor and capital, international complications and the clash of ideologies all come within the province of the revival. The group's million-dollar plant here includes three hotels where 1,000 workers and guests are lodged and fed. The average stay of each guest is 10 days. The establishment will be open more than two months this summer, its second season. And almost daily there are groups which fan out from here into 60 nations to spread the gospel of moral rearmament. The plant in Caux-sur-Montreux, according to leaders of the movement, was provided by voluntary contributions from Swiss followers.

Buchman was fired with an idea one night in 1921, he says, aboard a train from Hartford, Conn., to Washington while traveling to attend the Disarmament Conference. The nations of the world then were trying, as he put it, to heal the wounds of the "war to end wars." Buchman thought their approach was wrong. He went to Oxford University in England and there formed a group and adopted a plan for developing "trained, disciplined groups of selfless fighters, a united supernatural force, unshakable in their loyalty and bound together by a greater vision of a world remade." To those who claim that moral rearmament was a hotbed of pacifism during the war, Buchman points to the scores of ex-service men who come to Caux-sur-Montreux. He says there is documentary evidence that Hitler ordered the movement liquidated in Germany. Asked whether the movement were directed against Communism, Buchman said: "It is against the evils of all isms. The problem is not just an iron curtain which separates nation from nation, but a selfishness which separates man from man and all men from the government of God. And where they listen to God and obey, the steel and iron melt away." A surprisingly broad international and social cross section is represented at Caux-sur-Montreux. An acting president of the India Railways' federation, a British country girl, American business and industrial figures, attendants from various nations on the continent, are included.
