

B&F TAKE ANOTHER DST AT NW CROCKETT WILDCAT

Byrd and Frost No. 1 Mayberry Tippett, extreme Northwest Crockett County wildcat which flowed at the rate of 540 barrels of oil per day, natural from an unidentified pay section at 6,309-99 feet, during a four-hour test, found a soft zone at 6,440-85 feet, in a chert and lime horizon, and was taking a drillstem test to see if that interval carries any possibilities of petroleum pro-

The new discovery is 660 feet from northeast and southeast lines of section 39, block 31, H&TC survey, and about six miles southwest of the shallow Crockett field. It is contracted to drill to about 9,000 feet to explore into the Ellenburger.

PLYMOUTH 1 FROST FLOWED AT RATE OF 180 BOPD

The Plymouth Oil Company No. Frost, discovery for production from the Ellenburger in North-Central Sterling County, about 12 miles north and a little west of Sterling City, was flowing through tubing

This new well ran a 12-hour test Monday, using a McCullough testing tool. Production during that period averaged seven and one-half barrels per hour-or at the rate of 180 barrels for 24 hours.

During the first four hours of the 12 hours, the well made 32.17 barrels of oil. That was an average of 8.042 barrels per hour for the four hours. The oil is coming from per-

WASHINGTON -(A) - Chairman Eaton (R-NJ) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee declared Tuesday Greece may be "the powder keg that explodes into World

Taking a gloomy view of world conditions, the House member who helped draft the United Nations Charter, told reporters the United States "cannot afford" to permit Russia to dominate Greece.

Such a Soviet conquest, Eaton said, would be the beginning of a drive on Turkey and other countries bordering the Mediterranean.

"From there, they could go on to an attempt to conquer the world," he asserted.

Eaton was a leading proponent of the Administration's \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid program designed to keep those two nations from falling prey to Not Last Long Communist pressures.

During House debate on the measure last Spring, the white haired lawmaker ca'led upon his colleagues to accept resolutely the "great risk" involved in what he termed the most important piece of legislation to reach Congress in 100 years. 'We are right down to bedrock in

Greece," Eaton said Tuesday. "Both sides have served notice they will back their position to the limit. If neither backs down the consequences will be disastrous. Primeval Chaos "The situation is as bad as pri-
