

TWO WILDCAT LOCATIONS STAKED IN REEVES COUNTY

Locations for two new wildcat petroleum explorations in Reeves County, have been reported for im-

mediate drilling. Dave Elder and C. E. Wheeler, of San Angelo, have filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas, requesting a permit to drill a prospector in South Reeves County, one-half mile east of Balmorhea.

It will be carried as their No. 1 Fred Stroabe, Jr. Depth to which it is projected was not given on the application for a permit. Probably it will go to between 2,500 feet and 3,000 feet.

The location is to be in north corner of middle third of southwest quarter of section 56, block 13, H&GN survey. Cable tools will be used to dig the project.

C. & B. Oil Company, and M. G. Hansbro are credited with making a location for a wildcat in Northeast Reeves County, about 27 miles northwest of Pecos.

It is to be their No. 1 C. L. Monroe, and is reported to be located 330 feet from south and west lines of section 13, block 2, H&GN sur-

That would put it approximately 14 miles south and east, down the Pecos River, from Texzona Producing Company No. 1 Tun-still, discovery for some sort of production from the Delaware, six miles northeast of Orla.

That development is bottomed at 3,308 feet, and is doing preliminary testing, preparatory to completing It has flowed some oil-but no gauge for any extended period has been reported.

It is also reported, but not yet confirmed, that C. & B. Oil Company and M. G. Hansbro have mad location for a stepout to the Texzona No. 1 Tunstill.

The location is said to be southeast corner of west half west fourth of section 3, block 56 TP survey. T-2.

Both the C. & B. and Hansbro projects are expected to drill t around 3,500 feet—unless they ge oil, gas or water, in the Delaware shallower levels.



FURTHER TESTING SLATED FOR STERLING DISCOVERY

The Plymouth Oil Company No. Frost, discovery for flowing oil production of around seven and one half barre's per hour from the Ellenburger at 8,356-76 feet, was trying to make the well kick off and flow through tubing.

After flowing for 12 hours, through McCullough tool, at the average rate of seven and one-half barrely of oil per hour, operator killed the flow, with mud and water, in order to pull the test tool.

When that had been accomplished the project was swabbed through tubing for several hours. It would not kick off. Recovery averaged round two and one-half barrels of fluid each 60 minutes. Some of that fluid was drilling mud and drilling in jeans and shorts. water, and some of it was oil.

Some interested observers think the perforations at 8,356-76 feet are probably clogged with mud-thus preventing the oil from coming through. It may be that a shot of mud acid will have to be used in order to clean the perforations.

At last report operator had the well shutin, to allow it to pressure up-in the hope that when such had been done it might start flowing.

Few perhaps even remember now that six years before V-J Day, on Aug. 14, 1941, the statement which came to be known as the Atlantic Charter was made public.

Things were going badly for the Allies when President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill met "somewhere on the Atlantic." Only the British Empire and the Soviet Union, newly attacked, were opposing the Nazi armies. The outlook was not only discouraging but desperate.

Yet, in retrospect, the decisions facing the heads of the two governments seem comparatively simple.
