SKELLY STAKES LOCATION FOR NOLAN COUNTY TEST

The Skelly Oil Company has staked a wildcat location for No. 1 W. H. Bradberry, 330 feet from south and east lines of northeast quarter of southwest quarter of section 67, block 30, T&P survey, and about 13 miles southeast of Sweetwater, in North Nolan County. Rotary will be used to drill to about 6,700 feet to test the Ellenburger.

GULF SEEKS PERMISSION TO DEEPEN WINKLER TESTER

The Gulf Oil Corporation has filed for permission with the State Railroad Commission to deepen the No. 11 Keystone Cattle Company test 2,218 feet from east and 446 feet from south lines of section 10, block B-3, ps survey. Rotary will be used to go to new depth of 5,020 feet. It is classified as a wildcat.

Slick-Upsell Oil Company No. 1 D. L. Alford, 2,173 feet from north and 4,813 feet from west lines of section 50 1/2, block, Y. P. B. Scott survey, East Upton County, has penetrated below 11,676 feet in Ellenburger dolomite and continuing. The contract depth is 12,000 feet.

It is waiting on cement to cure after setting 5 1/2-inch casing at 4,135 feet with 110 sacks.

GULF COMPLETES NO. 27 KEYSTONE CATTLE CO. TEST

Gulf reports the completion of No. 27 Keystone Cattle Company, 2,200 feet from north and 440 feet from west lines of lease in section 6, block B-2, ps survey, in Winkler County. It completed flowing, through 1/2-inch choke, on a 24-hour potential for 707 barrels of 41.4 gravity oil. The gas-oil ratio was 811-1.

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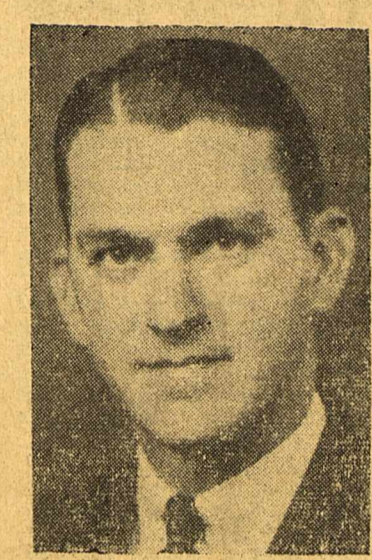
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Curbs, High Taxes Provoke Outcries

WASHINGTON —(P)—President Truman's probable program for helping Europe while fighting prices at home emerged Monday in a pattern likely to crash into Republican opposition on several fronts.

Continued high taxes, strong anti-inflation controls and "outright gifts" abroad all were urged by the President's Council of Economic Advisers. And all seemed certain to provoke sharp outcries from many GOP legislators.

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Geologists Gather To Study Volcano

VERA CRUZ.—(P)—Geologists gathered here Monday to go to the tiny village of Ignacio de la Llave about 100 kilometers (60 miles) south of here, where a new volcano appeared suddenly three days ago.

The volcano, still only mildly active, is tossing large rocks into the air and exuding tons of steaming yellow mud and sulphur fumes. Town officials at Ignacio de la Llave said there appeared to be no immediate danger from the volcano because there was no fire.

Adolfo Palazuelos, who has lived in that section many years, said more than 30 years ago a small lake covering about five hectares (12.5 acres) appeared unexpectedly in nearly the same spot. He said the lake stayed there for about 20 years and then, for some unexplained reason, disappeared and strong sulphur gas came from a vent in the ground.

A small crater formed and fine volcanic ash was emitted, then came more gas and mud. The cone reached a height of about five feet. The new volcano, using the same vent, has reached a height of 12 meters (39 feet) in three days.

Deep Wells Drilled
In 1922, Compania Mexicana Oleoductos, a foreign owned oil prospecting company headed by Robert Wichers, drilled two wells in the immediate area, one of which reached a substantial depth. At the time Wichers said he believed the well would be a producer because of the heavy gas discharge. However, before striking oil, revolutionaries supporting Adolfo de la Huerta made heavy demands on the company and it closed operations, but continued to pay rent on the land.

After the Huerta revolution ended, the Mexican Eagle Company, subsidiary of Royal Dutch Shell, put down some test wells in the same area. However, the 1938 expropriation of oil properties stopped the company's work.

In Volcanic Belt
Manuel Diaz Gutierrez, well known local engineer, said it was possible the volcano might prove to be the blow hole for gas pockets and might indicate the presence of large oil reserve.

The new volcano is on the southern edge of Mexico's volcanic belt, which forms an almost straight line from the Gulf to the Pacific. Major volcanoes are Orizaba, 19,955 feet high, about 70 miles west of here, the highest in Mexico, Ixtaccihuatl, Popocatepetl, Tancitaro and Paricutin, which burst from a farmer's corn field in 1943.

Dynamiting Banned In Several Counties

AUSTIN.—(P)—There will be no dynamiting in oil exploration on some University of Texas lands from December 15 to May 1, lest the lambing season be disturbed.

The Board of Regents has authorized the University comptroller to issue permits for geophysical exploration for oil on University lands at \$150 per crew for each 15-day period except in some West Texas counties during the lambing season.

Counties on which there will be no seismograph activity from December 15 to May 1 are Crockett, Irion, Schleicher, Reagan, Upton and Pecos.

A commemorative stamp honoring the U. S. Frigate Constitution is almost sold out at the Midland post office, clerks reported Monday. The special series was issued in honor of the 150th anniversary of the historic ship, and the post office here received its quota about a week ago, employees said.

As good as a home-pressing of woolen clothes is steaming wrinkles with a "Turkish bath." For that, hang clothes on the outside of the shower-curtain bar over the bathtub after curtains are drawn closed. That done, turn on the bathtub drain, close bathroom doors and windows, and let garments steam for a half-hour or so.

While steaming wrinkles out, it's a good idea to look in on your clothes now and then to make sure that everything is under control.

On those occasions when you need to freshen up winter woolens with a hot iron, here are some tips that will help you to do a more professional-looking pressing job. Dampen slightly with a wet sponge, and use a piece of heavy wrapping paper as a shield for the iron. Paper leaves no lint on dark clothes; is often a better pressing "cloth" than fabric.

After you press, brush clothes to restore a nap. Hang pressed garments apart from other clothes in your closet until they are perfectly dry.

Hear Both Sides

Of late years, there has been growing public resentment about the conduct of congressional investigations. This perhaps has been most apparent in connection with what still is thought of as the "Dies Committee."
 Much criticism of that committee has been inspired and cleverly propagated by the extreme left-wing, spark-plugged by Communists who used their customary smear tactics to draw red herrings over fresh trails. But much also has originated with the middle-roads and even with generally conservative persons who thought the committee often did the right thing in the worst way. And there has been reasoned criticism of the tactics of many other committees.

Federal Judge Simon H. Rifkind of New York recently instructed a grand jury that the congressional committee methods are contrary to the American conception of justice, because the investigators do not heed "one of the maxims of our democracy that it is better that 100 guilty men escape than that one innocent man should suffer punishment."

We concur in the feeling that congressional investigating committees should mend their ways, but we do not go along with Judge Rifkind's particular ideas.

The judge would have committees operate with the same strait-jacket and blinders that often make the administration of justice in the courts a mockery. He thinks they should observe the "rules of evidence" and the "rule of probable cause," and not consider "rumor, gossip, surmise."

The jurist's erstwhile law partner, Senator Robert Wagner, could tell him that there is a vast difference between the legitimate goal of a legislative investigating committee and that of a criminal court.

The committee is seeking data on which to base the text of new laws or of amendments to existing statutes. The court is determining whether to punish somebody for an illegal act, and if so, how severely.

We are committed to the judicial thesis that it is better to acquit many villains than to convict one man, however vicious and anti-social, of maybe the only crime in his neighborhood he didn't commit. With that in mind we have permitted lawyer-legislators to enact a code that makes the trial of any defendant a chess game between counsel.

Notwithstanding the many serious abuses of which the "Dies" and other committees have been guilty, their fault was not in receiving and even considering evidence that, under Judge Rifkind's rules of evidence, is hearsay, incompetent, irrelevant and immaterial—rumor, gossip, guesswork and surmise.

Their fault is that their hearings are, as the lawyer would say, ex parte. Only one side is heard. The witness is expected to answer questions which bring out what the committee wants, but he is not permitted to present rebuttal himself or through his own witnesses. This works frequent injustice against him. Even more serious, it often deprives Congress of all the facts to which its members are entitled.

The score was 11 to 1 out of a possible 12 tallies in the two-day matches. The Americans completed the route Sunday before a gallery of about 6,000 by winning seven of the eight singles events in the wake of sweeping all four Scotch foursome bouts on Saturday. One Briton Wins Only Sam King saved the day—and the humiliation of being stopped on every front—by capturing his singles contest. The 36-year-old Englishman, professional at the Wildernesse Golf Club, defeated Herman Keiser, 4 and 3, in the eighth and final match. Keiser was an alternate. He did not play in the two-ball foursomes but was named to the singles by U. S. Team Captain Ben Hogan, who withdrew in his favor.

America took possession of the shiny gold Ryder Cup for the fifth time in the seven times it has been at stake since the initial competition in 1927. The Americans also won in 1937, the last previous battle for the trophy.

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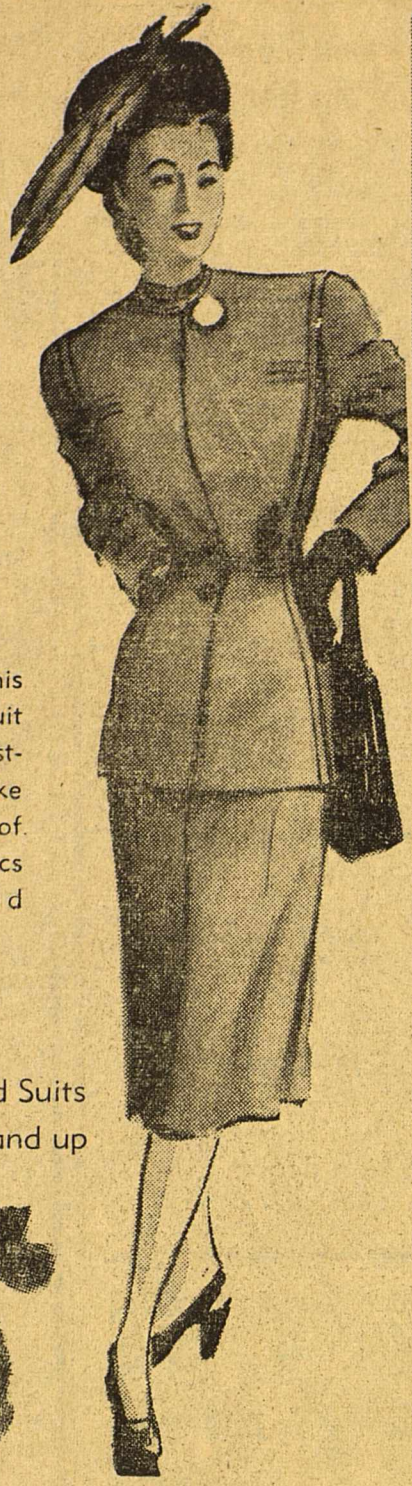
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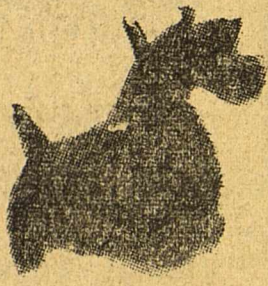
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Texas Conference Has Important Tilts Carded This Week

Fourteen drivers qualified for the 100-mile race over a mile and one-sixteenth course.

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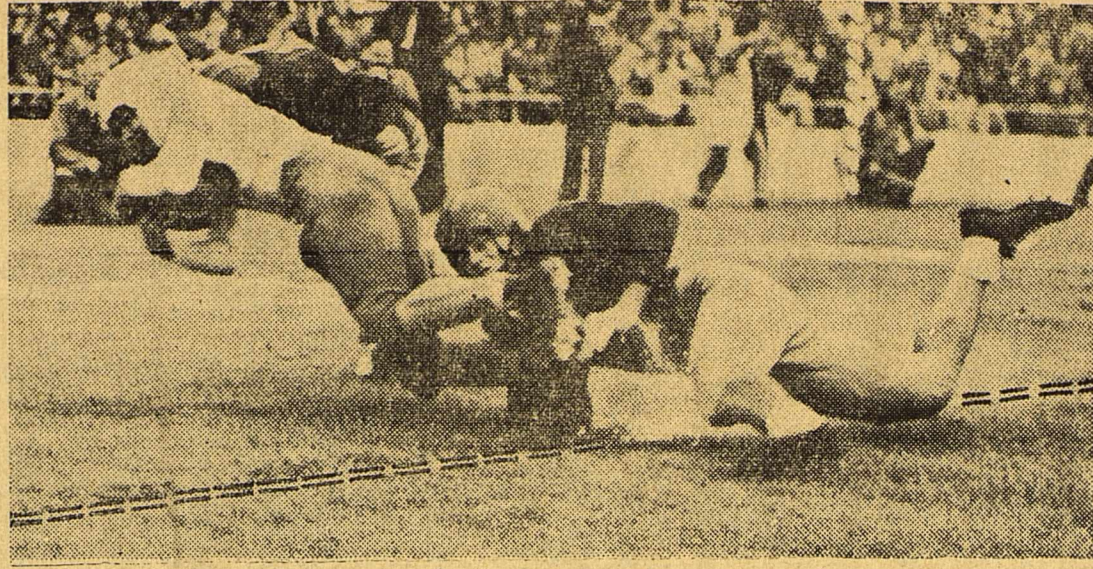
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Texas Touchdown—But Mustangs Win

NEW YORK—(AP)—With Michigan and Southern California rolling toward the Rose Bowl on paths that are downhill the rest of the way, college football still had enough names on its list of unbeaten teams Monday to gladden the hearts of the sponsors of other post-season games.

Such unbeaten powers as Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, Southern Methodist, Pennsylvania, Penn State, Virginia and Utah survived last Saturday's grid battles in which the lone departure from the chosen ranks was made by Texas, squeezed out of the all-victorious group by SMU, 14-13.

Georgia Tech, headed toward the Southeastern Conference crown and a possible spot in the Sugar Bowl, kept its record spotless by noosing previously once-tied Duke, 7-0, leaving Southern Cal as the only major club with one deadlock of an otherwise clean slate.

Michigan turned back Illinois, 14-7, and Notre Dame blanked Navy, 27-0, to continue their two-way race for the mythical national title.

Southern California, not yet whipped, Washington, 19-0, but got an added lift toward the Pacific Coast title when California, humbled by the Trojans a week earlier, bounced back to hand UCLA's defending champions their first conference defeat, 6-0.

The all-victorious list is due for further paring this week when Virginia meets Pennsylvania at Philadelphia in one of the East's stand-out games.

Army, which shook off its loss to Columbia by flattening Washington and Lee, 65-13, goes to South Bend to take a shot at Notre Dame's perfect record in the last game of their popular series.

Michigan will be at home against Indiana, first of three underdog opponents standing in the way of the Wolverines' drive to the Big Nine title and a trip to Pasadena.
