
200-Mile Fog Bank Descends On England



They are, theoretically, far superior to the best aviation gas in this respect.

Metals, in the form of dust, can be made to burn very rapidly, even to the degree of an explosion. Metallic compounds of boron, for example, contain many times the energy of aviation gasoline.

Boron occurs in nature as boric acid and borax. There are large deposits in the Western United States, and much in Canada and Peru. Europe has some deposits, notably in Tuscany, in Italy, but if t came to a boron race, the West ern Hemisphere could hold its own. Superior In Density

Besides the heat question, metals are superior to gas from the standpoint of density. Today's planes are limited in range by fuel capacity. They must either make stops or carry wing-tanks, which low down the speed. Meta's, more dense than the liquid gasoline, would consequently increase the range at the same time they increase

Obviously, then, metals would make an ideal fuel. At present, their use as a fuel is confined to the laboratory. It's possible they will never be an adaptable fuel, cr they may have to be confined to emergency use. The greatly increased combustion

Pan American Airways has observed its twentieth birthday. The age of adulthood in this country is 21, but Pan American is international, and surely it would be niggling to question that, at 20, it has come of age.

It was Oct. 28, 1927, that a frail wooden-winged 10-passenger Fokker F-7 was babied across the 90 miles of water separating Key West from Havana, at 85 miles an

This was not the first international passenger service.
That was opened in 1920 by the Royal Dutch Line, KLM, between Amsterdam and London.

It was not the first scheduled American passenger service. The Air Transport Association credits Western Air Express, now Western Air Lines, with that for its 660-mile service between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City, opened April 17, 1926.

But the very pettiness of these beginnings serve to emphasize the courage required by Juan Trippe when he got hold of \$300,000 and undertook regular over-water international service of any kind.

During the first six months of 1947, Pan American carried 457,817 paying passengers an average of 1,100 miles each on its Latin American, Atlantic, Pacific and Alaska divisions. That was three out of every four passengers flown by all U.S. international air lines. It was more than half the total of passengers handled by all international lines, domestic and foreign, serving our shores.

During those six months, Pan American's more than 200 planes, most of them four-motored and many capable of carrying more than 50 passengers at a speed of 300 miles an hour, were scheduled for almost 29,000,000 miles of flight. Except for the Alaska division, their performance was above 97 per cent.

Notwithstanding costs and lingering timidities, only four of the 19 domestic airlines reported in American Aviation handled as many passengers as Pan American during the first half of 1947, and only two boasted as many passenger-miles.

American, TWA and United give first-class trans-oceanic service to the far places. Their planes, their services, their charges are comparable to Pan American's. More than 15 foreign flag lines serve this country, mostly with American-built planes, often with American pilots.

But American lines still handle 75 per cent of trans-Atlantic and 90 per cent of trans-Pacific and Caribbean business, and Pan American carries three-fourths of it.

Pan American pioneered, took the big original risks, gambled lives and huge sums of money against unguessable odds—and won. So, a few days late, we are happy to say to Pan American: Happy Birthday. Keep 'em flying. May the shadows of your wings never grow less.

Don't Cheer

Yes, it is good news that meat has become more plentiful at lower prices. But don't let it cheer you up too much. It's just the seasonal letup that experts forecast weeks ago. It happens every Autumn. It's welcome while it lasts. But it means absolutely nothing, one way or the other, about the continuing spiral of inflation which we haven't yet found a way to stop.






