

Russia To Open Rich Coal Fields In Taiga

MOSCOW-(P)-Four coal fields have been surveyed this year in the area discovered by Soviet geologists during the war in the Kuznetsk Basin.

Chief Engineer Molchanov of the Kuzbas Coal Prospecting Organiza-tion, who has been supervising the exploratory work, said the area would probably rank among the most important in this rich basin. The fields are located in the Taiga 60 kilometers from the city of Sta-linsk between the Tom and Usa rivers in the foothills of the Kuz-

netsk Ala-Tau Mountains. The mountainous terrain enables the deposits to be tapped through galeries driven into the hillsides, eliinating the need of shaft-sinking





So why permit them to get the protection of the Constitution to come to power only to destroy it when they got there?

Might Help Enemy 2. In case of war with Russia, American Communists would be loyal to Russia and work inside the U. S. as a Russian fifth column. So why permit any organization to exist here if it might be a big help to an enemy in wartime? American Communists are really agents of the Russian Communists. Moscow pulls the strings. They can't be trusted from day to

But American Communists carefully don't criticize Russian aims or views although they're free with criticism of this government. Critics of American Communist

point to the case of the Canadian citizens who, sympathetic to Communism, recently stole the Canadian government secrets for the Russians. But all this gets around to the

No. 1 point mentioned in the first paragraph of this story: The right of an individual or a group, guaranteed by the Constitution, to say what they think or join any political party.

Is that a right that can be taken away at any time? Or is it an unchanging thing?

Do we let a group enjoy the Constitutional guarantees only so long as that group remains small and there's no danger from it? And then, if that group grows stronger or there's danger of war, take away those guarantees for that group?

Is Freedom Only a Name? If so, is freedom under the Constitution only a name of a luxury which we give to the weak but withhold from the strong? And, if the Communist party can be denied those Constitutional guarantees today, may not some religious group lose them tomorrow? But-and this is a point on

which many sincere and honest people break their teeth-should we let this happen:

Should we give full protection of the Constitution to a group if, through that protection, it could come to power and then destroy the Constitution?


