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



Bumper Wheat Crop Is Still Possible In '48

WASHINGTON-(A)-A bumper wheat crop is still possible next year despite a serious seeding delay in the Great Plains, Agriculture Department officials said Thursday.

A department crop report said about 25 per cent of the intended wheat acreage in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado and New Mexico remained unseeded November 1 because of critically dry weather.

These six states produced about 49 per cent of this year's record crop of 1,406,000,000 bushels.

The report said seeding has progressed well, however, on what now appears to be an increased acreage in all other important producing areas. Big Crop Possible

Officials said that assuming next year's production in the six drought-affected states is only one half this year's, it still would be possible, on the basis of present prospects, to harvest a total crop of at least 1,000,000,000 bushels.

The United States has produced only four crops of a billion bushels or more, and they were grown during the past four years. Wheat output averaged 890,000,000 bushels for the 1936-45 period.

The report gave few changes in production estimates for this year's crops from estimates of a month ago. Corn declined slightly in quantity, but improved in quality and livestock feeding value. The crop is about 25 per cent below last year's record and 17 per cent short of government estimates of need based on rates of use during the past year.

Plumbers Exempt From Municipal Occupation Taxes

AUSTIN-(AP)-Plumbers do not have to pay an occupation tax or a license fee to municipalities, the attorney general held in effect late Wednsday.

The legal opinion, directed to C. E. Belk, administrator of the Board of Plumbing Examiners, held that the state license fees fixed by the Legislature in its Plumbing License Law this year are not occupation taxes.

Municipalities may not levy a tax on an occupation which is not taxed by the Legislature for the benefit of the state, Assistant Attorney General Dean J. Capp wrote. He noted also that plumbing is exempt by law from an occupation tax because it is a mechanical pursuit.

The State Board of Plumbing Examiners is the exclusive licensing agency for plumbers, the opinion added

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

6. There is no law of God or man against the use of sanctified humor. There is neither piety nor sense in a holy whine. A liver in good order will prove a valuable pastor's assistant.

7. When you have nothing more to say, pronounce the benediction.
