British Oppose Plan For Palestine Partition

Decision Sent To UN Meet

LONDON —(P)— Britain has decided against accepting, or substantially sharing in, the Soviet-American plan for partitioning Palestine, high government sources said Thursday.

Under the Soviet-American plan Britain would be asked by the United Nations Assembly to continue to be responsible for law and order in Palestine until May 1, 1948.

Air Force Officers Had Heard Rumors About Stock Deals

WASHINGTON —(P)— Col. William B. Nuckols told investigating senators Thursday he heard rumors in early 1943 that Air Force purchasing officers had heavy holdings of stock in companies with which they were dealing.

Nuckols was an Air Force public relations officer at the time, and he said he proposed steps for the AAF to be prepared to answer such rumors, if they gained widespread currency.

When Ferguson convened the session, he said the phase of hearings then opening would aim to develop what the Air Forces did about "uncovering and exposing possible fraud" or "improper actions" by high officers.

War Ship Found And Heads For Newark Battle

NEWARK, N. J. —(P)— The decommissioned battleship New Mexico, temporarily lost at sea while en route to her last "battle," was found Thursday by a Coast Guard search plane and tugs were directed to her side.

The exact location of the vessel was not immediately known, the Coast Guard said. The 30,000-ton super dreadnaught was en route from Boston to her final "battle" with two tiny fireboats attempting to keep her from port of Newark when she was cut adrift in heavy seas late Wednesday.

Skippers of the two tugs which cut her loose had reported to the Coast Guard they were unable to re-locate the big ship.

Three men were reported aboard the hulk of the decommissioned vessel.

Newark officials, determined that no more ships be scrapped on the city's waterfront, meanwhile kept two 30-foot fireboats on patrol at the entrance to Newark Channel to keep the New Mexico from entering the bay, which is a part of New York Harbor.

City officials ordered the fireboats to block the bay and called for reinforcements from neighboring New York City as the big battleship approached the harbor.

Enthusiastic Crowd Attends Campaign Kickoff Meeting



More than 175 men and women attended an enthusiastic kickoff dinner of the Midland Memorial Hospital's building fund campaign in the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Scharbauer Wednesday night. The campaigners heard final instructions on the community-wide drive which opened Thursday and received literature and prospect cards. John W. House, Special Gifts chairman, presided.

Sirens Open Hospital Drive

The all-out campaign for \$600,000 to erect a modern, four-story, 75-bed Midland Memorial Hospital was off to a flying start Thursday as volunteer workers, busy business and professional men, started contacting prospects in an effort to complete the job as quickly as possible.

Every citizen will be given an opportunity to give to the hospital which has been termed Midland's No. 1 need.

Sirens, whistles, automobile horns and other noise-makers sounded promptly at 8:45 a. m. Thursday, signaling the official opening of the drive, the largest and most important in Midland's history.

Interest and enthusiasm were at a high pitch, and the hospital campaign was the principal subject of discussion in offices, stores, banks, hotel lobbies, coffee shops, and on the sidewalks.

"It's our big opportunity to provide adequate hospital facilities for Midland and the Permian Basin area, and we should complete the drive in quick order," was the comment of a citizen.

Another said, "The hospital will provide a new health security and will be another turning point in Midland's history."

The large crowd of workers attending the kickoff dinner Wednesday night in Hotel Scharbauer was optimistic as to the success of the campaign long before Thanksgiving Day.

Pledge cards were distributed at the meeting, and supplies and literature Thursday morning were being delivered by special messengers to companies and business firms.

Campaign officials urged team captains who have not completed workers rosters to do so at once, notifying the campaign office as soon as possible.

The first report meeting will be held Monday noon at the Kiwanis Club luncheon. Another is scheduled Wednesday noon and a third Friday.

Campaigners are requesting pledges extending over a 25 month period rather than cash gifts.

Preparations for the community-wide drive have been underway for weeks, and everything was functioning smoothly as the campaign got underway.

Aid For Red Satellites Is Opposed

WASHINGTON —(P)— Secretary of Commerce Harriman testified Thursday he would favor stopping at once any American aid to a nation which might in the future come under the influence of Russia.

Harriman was asked about his attitude in such a case while he was testifying to the House Foreign Affairs Committee in behalf of the administration's proposed \$597,000,000 emergency assistance for France, Italy and Austria.

"I would then lose interest in it, in that particular country," Harriman said.

But, in contrast, he said he believes America should hold itself ready to extend help to nations of Eastern Europe if they should free themselves of Russian domination.

Certain of these nations, the secretary said, would have "liked to come in and work with us," but were prevented from doing so by Russia.

"Poland, Hungary and Romania are very friendly to us and have been forced into the iron vise against their will," Harriman said.

His views were brought up under questioning by Rep. Jackson (R-Calif.). Jackson also wanted a list of commodities which this country now exports to Russia.

Harriman promised to furnish it.

Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee made clear that the United States has a vital interest in the world's uranium resources.

Uranium is one of the key materials in the manufacture of the atom bomb.

Republicans To Tighten Up Truman's Foreign Aid Policy

WASHINGTON —(P)— The Truman Administration's plea for a "lenient charter" for foreign aid bumped into a determination among some House Republicans Thursday to make the program as "rigid and inflexible" as possible.

The resultant tightening up job in the Foreign Affairs Committee thus may delay not only formal introduction but House action on the \$597,000,000 emergency bill the Administration is plugging.

It is designed to carry France, Italy and Austria over the winter hump until a long range European recovery program can be put into operation.

Chairman Eaton (R-NJ) had hoped to offer the stop-gap bill as soon as Congress opens its special session Monday and then rush the measure to the House for debate by next Wednesday.

But Rep. Vorys (R-Ohio) told reporters: "I can't imagine the wheels turning that fast."

Vorys and Rep. Fulton (R-Pa), both members of the Foreign Affairs Committee, gave the tip-off that a tightening up process is in the offing.

At least one member has told a top State Department official that any bill written by the committee will be as "rigid and inflexible" as possible.

The idea, this official was told, is not to sabotage the program or make it unworkable but to eliminate generalities and broad grants of power.

Fulton objected, during questioning of Undersecretary of State Robert A. Lovett, to one section of the proposed emergency bill. It would authorize help in the form of food, fuel and "other commodities" needed by the three European countries.

Fulton said "other commodities" is too broad.

"I think I can assure the secretary," Vorys broke in, "that those words won't be in this bill when it becomes law."

Wave Of Illness In Oklahoma Is Caused By Birds

KINGFISHER, OKLA. —(P)— A "mysterious malady" attacked and nearly killed seven persons here before the correct diagnosis—a case of chimney swallows—was made, two doctors revealed Thursday.

The trouble started a week ago when Mrs. Howard Baldwin complained of "feeling dull all over."

Two days later she collapsed at home and Dr. C. M. Hodgson sent her to the hospital, where she improved quickly.

Monday night her husband was stricken, Dr. Hodgson found him slumped in a rocking chair, in great pain, and apparently victim of a heart attack.

Dr. Hodgson gave him the appropriate treatment and called in two nurses, some friends and relatives.

"Then I began feeling funny myself," the doctor said, and headed for home with one of the nurses to watch him.

Twenty minutes later Every asked his wife to take him home—he was sick, too.

She did, and then called another physician, Dr. C. F. Lattimore. When she returned to the Baldwin home, Nurse Myrtle Foote was unconscious in a chair.

She and Baldwin's boss, Fred Lankard, looked after the nurse and then Mrs. Every fainted.

"They're dying like flies in here," Lankard exclaimed to Dr. Lattimore when he arrived. Then Lankard complained of dizziness himself and went outside.

Many of the writers asked the aged couple to give them suggestions for a successful marriage.

Arnold said he had suggested this for young couples:

Stay out of taverns; no carousing; share in handling the money and don't spend beyond their incomes; don't look at other women (or men, if you're the wife); wives should get up early enough to prepare a good breakfast before the husband goes to work, and should 'stay at home and tend to her knitting."

Arnold said:

Prices Of New Homes Will Continue Upward

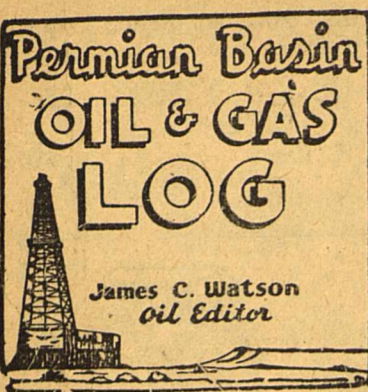
SAN FRANCISCO —(P)— Speakers told the National Association of Real Estate Boards Thursday the price of new homes will continue to rise for two more years.

The packer failed after 14 minutes. There was no test. Operators are now drilling ahead below 11,840 feet. It is planned to dig to at least 12,000 feet before stopping to try another drillstem.

Humble Oil Company No. 1 Smith, stepout from the discovery for Ellenburger production in the Childress field in Northeast Crockett County, and 660 feet from south and west lines of section 1, BS&F survey, drilled to a bottom of 9,188 feet, in the Hickory sand. Operator plugged back with cement to 8,800 feet and will run 5 1/2-inch casing to test shows for possible production in the top of the Ellenburger. Sunray Makes Plans To Finance Merger

PHILADELPHIA —(P)— Sunray Oil Corp., Tulsa, Okla., has registered \$400,000,000 of 29-year debentures and a new issue of \$100 par cumulative senior preferred stock to finance the merger of Pacific Western Oil Corp. and Mission Corp. into Sunray, the Securities and Exchange Commission disclosed Thursday.

The financing, however, is dependent upon consummation of the merger which is opposed by W. G. Kelly, former president of Mission and of Pacific Western.

The merger has been approved by directors of all three companies.

Skelly on November 4 filed suit in U. S. District Court at Reno, Nev., against Mission and in U. S. District Court at Los Angeles, against trustees of the Sarah C. Getty Trust, J. Paul Getty and Pacific Western to prevent a meeting of Mission stockholders December 6.

The court actions are designed to prevent the Getty interests, who control Pacific Western and through it control Mission, from causing Pacific Western to vote Mission stock in favor of the proposed merger.

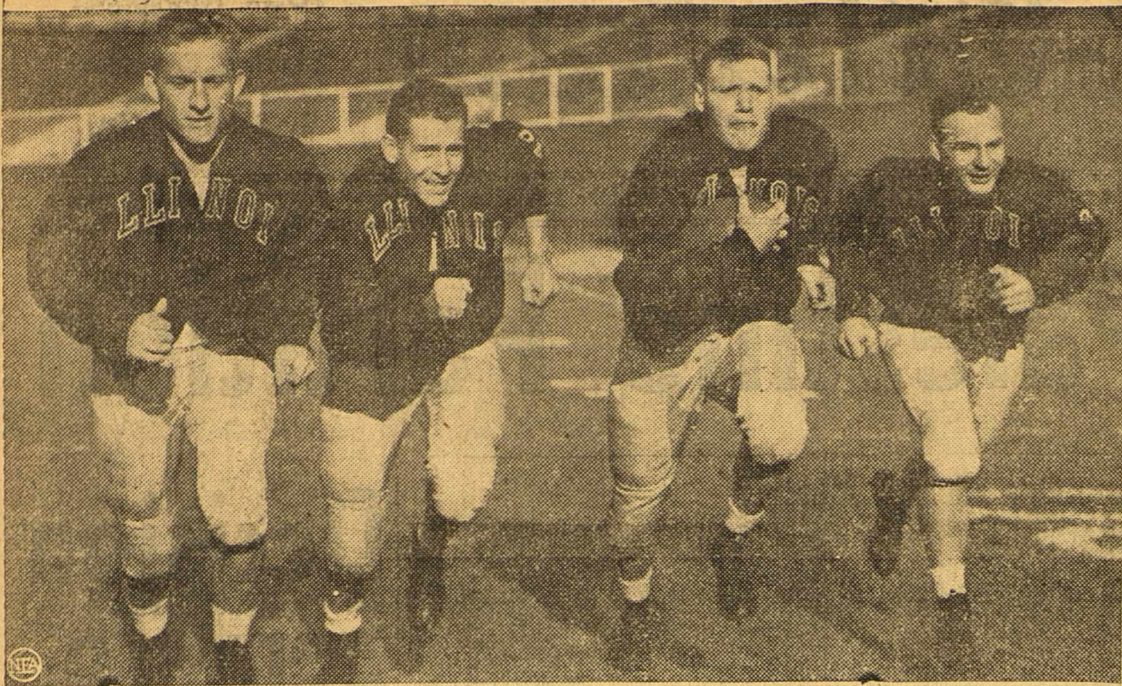

Penn State Is Defensive King

NEW YORK (AP)—The yardsticks—and seven frustrated opponents—still point to Penn State as the nation's gridiron defensive king, but Navy may have something to say about it at Baltimore Saturday.

The Nittany Lions improved their already stingy total defense record against Temple last Saturday, holding the Owls to 25 yards in 23 plays, all 25 being on the ground and none in the air in the 7-0 muddle battle which kept Penn State undefeated.

This gave the Lions a yield of only 61.6 yards per game, as against their 67.7 mark of the preceding week, and kept them substantially under Santa Clara's 1937 mark of 69.9.

Kansas Is Second
In rushing, the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau figures showed the Staters had held the foe to only 64 yards in 179 attempts in seven games. This reduces to slightly more than one foot, or 12.9 inches, per assault.

Penn State topped the nation defensively at this same stage last season but with more than double the average—137.2. The Lions eventually bowled to Notre Dame for 1948 season honors.

Kansas is second to Penn State in total defense this week, but it, too, has more than double the Lion yield at 139.0.

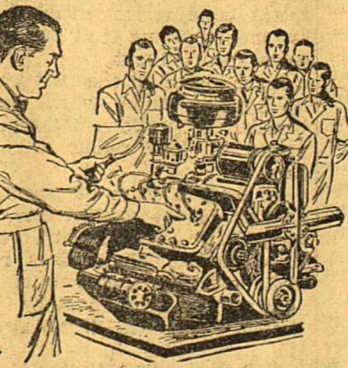
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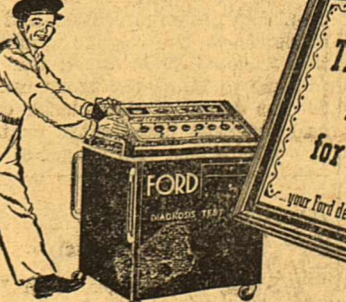

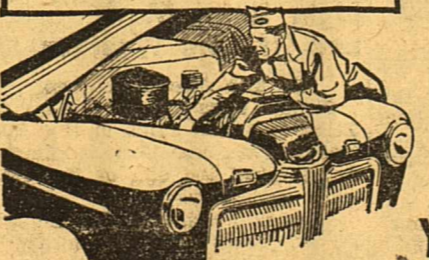

I drifted into the Mayfair Bridge Club in New York the other night looking for an interesting hand or two, and Aaron Green gave me a neat one. You might not want to bid two clubs with the South hand, but Green opened with that bid.

Having no aces, his partner bid two no trump. The three spade and four spade bids were normal, but the five diamond bid was made only after careful consideration. Green wanted to play the hand at six as soon as he found out that his partner had a fit in spades, but he also wanted to get a heart opening, therefore he

Today's lesson hand is given to us by Oswald Jacoby, that colorful champion, who by the way has just written a new book entitled "Gin Rummy." I enjoyed the book because it gives an all-American roundup of the different ways that gin rummy is played throughout the country. "Ozzie" has all the variations in this book. He is a great mathematician and an extraordinarily quick thinker.

Jacoby says that the most important lesson in bridge is to learn to stop and think. For example, in today's hand it looks as if the declarer has no problem provided he can win the club and heart finesse, or at least win the heart finesse and find a 3-3 break in hearts.

Now let's start to play the hand. Declarer wins the opening diamond lead and takes three rounds

bid diamonds. When West doubled, Green redoubled on the theory that his bidding was going to help him make the contract.

Sure enough, he got the king of hearts opening. He won it with the ace, cashed the ace and king of clubs and ruffed the third club in dummy.

Next he cashed the queen and jack of spades, then led a heart and took the finesse. West won with the queen and led the ace of diamonds. Green trumped with the king of spades, cashed the ace, and the balance of the tricks were his.

Truly a fortunate hand — the spades had to break 3-3 and the king and queen of hearts both did not have to be in the West hand, but since they were the heart opening was fortunate.

But the science of the hand came in bidding it so that the heart would be opened.

of trumps. Then he should lead a low heart, finesse the queen, and it holds.

This is where he has to stop and think. He has located the king of hearts. Should he try the club finesse now? No, he should not. Jacoby says the next thing for him to do is to clear both hands of diamonds, winning the last one in the South hand. Then he should lead a heart, and when West plays the king, let him hold the trick. West would not play the king if he had another heart, and even if he did have one, it would do no harm to let him hold this trick.

But West has nothing to return except a club right into the ace-queen, and thus declarer eliminates the club finesse.

As Jacoby says, this is not quick thinking—it is just taking time to think.

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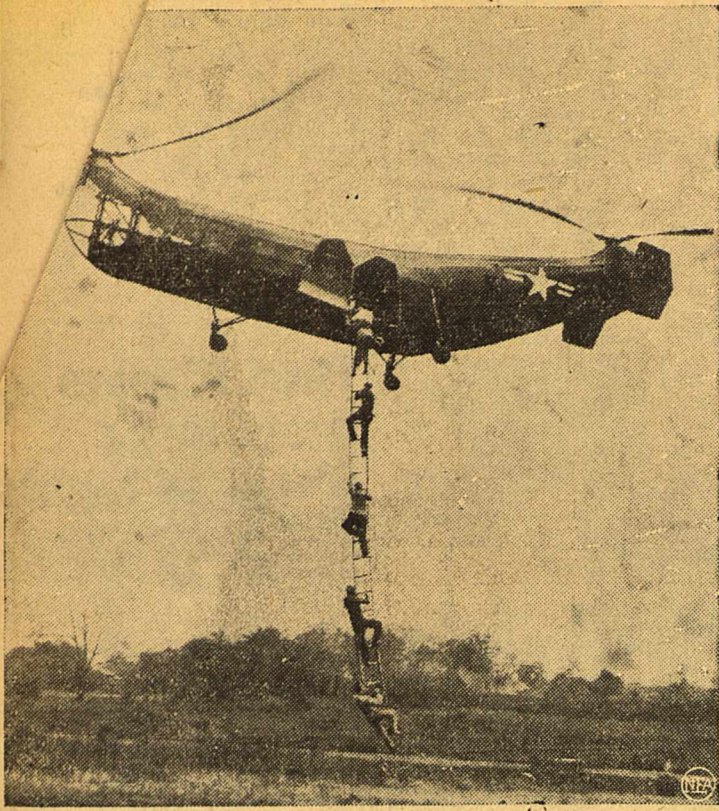

Neff announced last week that he is resigning as head of Baylor, effective the last day of this year. But he told a Baptist General Convention audience Wednesday night he submitted the resignation "because I wanted to allow the trustees to replace me without any offense if they chose to do so."

Thursday, Thomas L. Tyson, Corsicana attorney, submitted to

the convention resolutions committee a measure stating "it will be most unfortunate for Baylor University for President Neff's superb administration to end abruptly on December 31."

Whether the resolution will be submitted to the Baptist General Convention Thursday afternoon in its last day of session is up to the committee.

The 77-year-old Neff, tall, straight as a ramrod, silvery haired, blue-eyes misted with tears, was a striking figure as he told of his love for Baylor.

An audience of 7,000 cheered him warmly when he arose and walked to the pulpit after a num-

ber of other speakers had paid him tribute.

"I am going to serve Baylor as long as the Lord and the trustees think I ought to serve," he said.

Following the speech, Casa March, once a candidate for governor and now a faculty member at Baylor, said: "It is clear from what Mr. Neff said that he is willing to continue as president of Baylor University if the board wishes it so."

The convention elects Baylor University trustees. Three are to be named Thursday.

Among those who paid tribute to Neff at the special meeting were Wallace Bassett, president of the

convention, J. Howard Williams, executive secretary; Forrest Feezor, pastor of the First Baptist Church Waco, March, and Tyson.

Neff, two-term governor of Texas, has headed Baylor 15 years.

The convention Wednesday voted to again commit ourselves to an effort to secure from the governor and the legislature the submission of a statewide amendment prohibiting the sale of beverage alcohol and to pledge ourselves to a vigorous campaign for its enactment."

The resolution was adopted after a report, which called beverage alcohol "responsible for nearly all our social ills," was read by the Rev. Clarence A. Morton, pastor of

the First Baptist Church of Lamesa.

Dr. J. M. Dawson, executive secretary of Baptists of the United States, Washington, told the convention in an address prepared for delivery Thursday that:

"To our passion for ministry through orphanages, old age asylums, and great hospitals, we have added a concern for social justice and righteous conduct. We have often deplored a state of society existing in certain parts of the world where the dominant church allows pitiful ignorance, gross superstition, flagrant illegitimacy, rampant immorality, and rank economic exploitation by the favored few to flourish under the very shadow of beautiful cathedrals and gorgeous church ceremonials.

"Now Southern Baptists, reach-

ing beyond 6,000,000 and unquestionably predominant in their section, have begun to see how a similar condition confronts us.

"In the south we find the poorest housing, the death rate is the highest, prejudices are the worst, the people are the poorest fed, the poorest clothed, the incomes are the lowest, illiteracy is the highest, and economic exploitation of the helpless is the most serious.

"Southern Baptists x x x are beginning to realize they cannot retain the decent respect of mankind, when on the one hand they decry a Latin-American neglect of human rights by a dominant church, while on the other hand they themselves as a predominant church remain careless of conditions also grievous."

De Gaulle's Plan Called Premature

Gen. Charles De Gaulle's call to native France to take the lead in making alliances with America, Britain and other countries "who feel themselves similarly menaced" by Communism, is likely to be received with mixed emotions among western democracies.

One would expect the first reaction to be one of gratification that his powerful personality should be growing his re-born political leadership into the battle to help stem the Red tide's rise against Western Europe. The other democracies certainly need the all-out support of France, and General De Gaulle in a smashing victory in the recent elections with his new party—"Rally of the French People" (RPF)—although he has no position in the government.

However, this first reaction most certainly is bound to be followed by many circles by anxious questions. For one thing, some of General De Gaulle's opponents in France charge that he has dictatorial ambitions, and there has been some uneasiness over this in the channels of allied capitals.

Other Consideration

But there is another consideration which is of more immediate concern. De Gaulle's proposal comes most on the eve of the Big Four Foreign Ministers' Conference in London to try to draw up a German peace treaty. Hopes of reconciling the differences between Russia on the one hand and the American-British-French trio on the other are slim as it is, and were De Gaulle's proposal for alliances against Communism accepted forthwith, it would preclude all hope of agreement in the London conference. Then the fat would be in the fire.

So I believe the democracies will regard the general's idea as premature, to say the least.

While things look gloomy for the foreign ministers' conference, which is scheduled for November 25, it can be written off this far in advance. It may be that it will consist mainly with Austria and Russia may stall to see how the Marshall program works out.

Then, too, Britain and France simply couldn't contemplate breaking with Russia before even knowing whether the Marshall Plan will be approved by the United States Congress. If the plan does go through it will in effect be an alliance among the countries of Western Europe to combat Communism.

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Soil Conservation Week Calls Attention To Great Progress

Soil Conservation Service officials, in calling attention to Soil Conservation Week, November 7-15, said Texas can be proud of the progress made during the six years of SCS work in the state and of the way farmers and ranchmen are pushing the program.

Landowners have voted in a total of 143 soil conservation districts, covering 127 million acres and about three-fourths of the state's land area.

About 17,000 farmers and ranchmen of Texas are applying for soil conservation work each year, they said, and at the end of last year over 44,000 farm and ranch owners were co-operating with district boards in co-ordinated conservation. This year, they are surpassing the last year's records by 30 per cent.

Other statistics: By the end of the fiscal year last June 30, 86,000 miles of terraces had been built, 413,000 acres of range and pastures had been seeded, 3,000,000 acres had been contour-plowed, and 1,200,000 acres had been planted to protecting and improving cover crops.

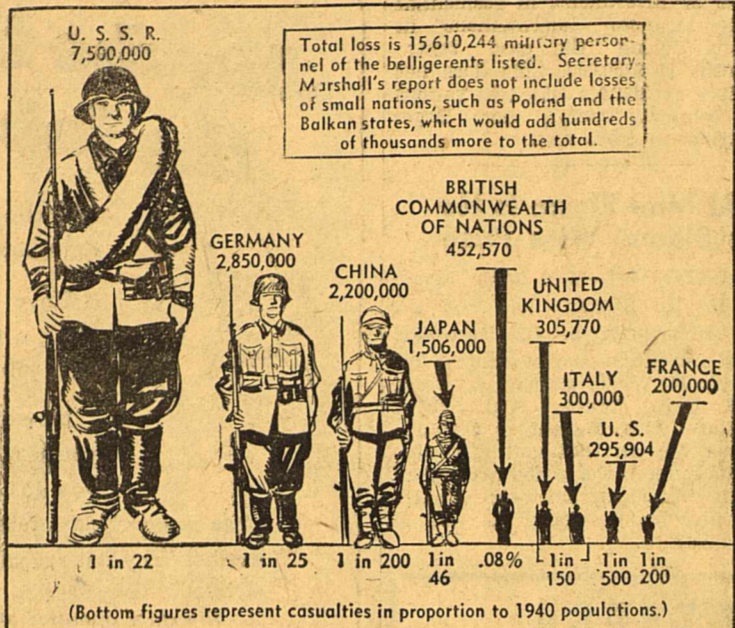

Resistance To Reds Grows In Russia's Own Satellites

By DEWITT MACKENZIE
Democratic resistance to Communism within Russia's own satellites in Eastern Europe continues to spread.

The latest country to develop a crisis between left and right was Czechoslovakia. This difference grew out of Communist insistence on broadening the basis of Red influence in the government. A meeting of the coalition cabinet under Communist Premier Klement Gottwald resulted in his being given full powers.

This political clash wasn't unforeseen, because Czechoslovakia, while small in size, is huge in love of independence and couldn't be expected to endure indefinitely, without protest, efforts to impose totalitarian regimentation. So, after two years of anxious effort to fit herself into the Russian zone of influence and still retain her independence, she now has displayed a strong element of resistance to Communism.

Czechoslovakia thus joins other Russian bloc nations which have parties of dissidents to Communist domination. These include Poland, Hungary, Romania, Finland and even Yugoslavia, although in the last named country Red opposition has been fairly well stifled—or has it?

Of course one would expect the current Czechoslovak crisis to be bridged temporarily. But the anti-totalitarian element cannot be stifled.

The Czechoslovakian imbroglio is particularly interesting in light of a U. S. State Department statement made in a review of the development of the Marshall Plan for European recovery. This declares that any government, political parties, or groups which attempt to prolong human misery for political profit, will meet with unqualified opposition from the United States.

Recruiting Poster Impresses Indian

Wheat Prospects Look Doubtful In Panhandle

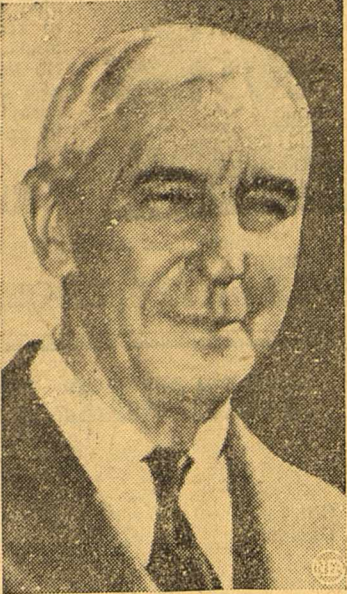
GUYMON, OKLA.—(AP)—Wheat prospects in the Northwestern and Panhandle areas of Oklahoma are doubtful but there is little chance of a "dust bowl" condition this year, says John Bailey, soil conservationist in Texas County since 1926.

"I may start worrying about a dust bowl next year if dry weather continues," Bailey said, "but at present, conditions don't indicate such a disaster."

A survey by the Oklahoma City Times in the Northwestern wheat belt showed wheat prospects ranged from zero to 50 percent. The area has had no general rain since July 5.

Farmers were busy this week drilling seed into the dry, dusty ground and said they would hope for snow to provide the needed moisture for a winter crop.

Campbell, who estimates wheat should be \$3.50 per bushel, said he is holding back 610,000 bushels of this year's harvest "because I expect to get higher prices."

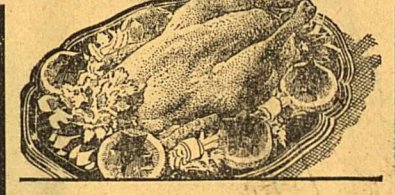

1/4 cup finely cut onion
1 cup grated raw sweet potato
2 cups cooked rice

Crude Oil Production Resumes Upward Trend

TULSA—(P)—Production of crude oil in the United States resumed an upward trend during the week ended November 8 with a daily average of 5,292,390 barrels; an increase of 4,010 over the previous week's output, the oil and gas journal reported.

Leading the producing areas with increases was Michigan, which jumped 7,650 barrels to 50,505 barrels. Others with gains included California, up 3,500 barrels to 925,200; the Eastern area, 2,990 to 67,990; Illinois, 2,100 to 178,000 and Oklahoma, 2,050 to 407,350.

Kansas had the sharpest decline, 11,500 barrels to 281,950. Notable declines also were registered in Colorado, down 1,890 barrels to 48,020, Mississippi, off 650 to 107,915, and Wyoming, down 2,840 to 120,920.

Texas production was unchanged at 2,370,925 barrels. Louisiana was up slightly, 452,750 compared to 158,400. Arkansas production was 4,300, compared to 83,850 November 7.

For part of each year, 75 percent of the sheep and half the beef cattle of the United States are supported on 728 million acres of range lands in 17 western states.
