Detectives Probe Kidnap Report

El Paso School Girls Abducted

SAN ANTONIO—(P)—Detectives Wednesday were investigating the reported kidnaping of three El Paso school girls, abandoned on the outskirts of San Antonio, and the assaulting of one of the trio.

The 13-year-old assault victim, detectives said, was at a local hospital in a hysterical condition.

According to the story told police by her two 14-year-old companions, both well dressed, they were on their way to school in El Paso Tuesday morning when three men, about 30 or 35, in a gray sedan, drove up and forced them into the car.

20 Killed In Italian Air Crash

ROME—(P)—A chartered Swedish freighter plane carrying 20 Swedish military airmen, crashed Wednesday in the mountains near Salerno, and Swedish diplomatic sources said 20 persons were killed.

The plane was en route home from Addis Ababa, where the 20 military men and four others had delivered a group of B-17 planes sold by Sweden to Ethiopia.

The Swedish Foreign Office in Stockholm announced the death toll, adding that 10 were injured.

The military airmen on board were four captains, nine lieutenants, three non-commissioned officers, two mechanics, one electrician and a maintenance engineer.

An official of the plane's owner, the Traffic-Tourist-Transport Company of Stockholm, said the plane also carried six other persons and a crew of four.

Rescue Party Sent

"As far as we know," he said, "all were Swedish."

Col. Ingvar Berg, leader of the Swedish ferry squadron, was not aboard.

Carabinieri officials at Salerno said a party had been dispatched to the scene of the crash, believed to be on 3,248-foot Mt. Scala.

First reports of the accident said the plane was a U. S. Army transport.

Five of the injured were reported in serious condition and to be receiving first aid in a rude hut on the mountain side.

Fog shrouded the mountains at the time of the crash.

Committee Hears Of More Salary Drawn By Meyers

WASHINGTON—(P)—T. E. Readnow said Wednesday \$15,000 a year of his "salary" from Aviation Electric Company went to Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers during the war years and up until the firm was dissolved in 1945.

Readnow, 30, of Dayton, Ohio, told the Senate War Investigating Committee the company, which other witnesses have said Meyers secretly owned, paid him \$100 monthly while he served in the Army.

In addition, he said, a \$15,000 salary was charged on the books to him but the money, other than that needed to pay income taxes, went to Meyers.

Delivered \$7,000

He told the senators that on one occasion he delivered more than \$7,000 in cash to Meyers in an envelope, representing the residue of his ostensible 1941 \$15,000 salary, after payment of taxes.

Readnow said Meyers, retired deputy chief of Air Forces procurement (purchasing), gave him \$1,000.

With this \$1,000, Readnow said, his actual 1941 pay from the company was \$2,538.34.

Readnow was on the firm's books as vice president and secretary. He is a brother-in-law of B. H. LaMarre, the company's president.

Farmer Co-Ops Seek Approval Of Market Plan

WASHINGTON—(P)—Farmer cooperative marketing associations were reported Wednesday to be seeking government approval of a plan designed to induce farmers to turn loose wheat they are now holding off the market.

Farmer resistance to releasing the wheat now is based on (1) the wish to avoid adding to income tax liability for this year and (2) hope that prices will go higher later.

One government official said the plan advanced by the co-ops calls for:

1. Farmers to turn over their wheat to co-ops in return for a certificate calling for payment next year.
2. The co-ops to sell the wheat and invest the proceeds in wheat futures—contracts calling for delivery at specified future date—for which the co-ops would get money next year to reimburse the farmers.

Might Cut Taxes

Current and future wheat prices are pretty close together at about \$3 a bushel. If prices were higher when deliveries were due under the futures contracts, the co-ops would get the benefit of the advance and pass it on to the farmers. The plan assumes that prices will not fall by delivery time.

Backers of the plan hope that the Internal Revenue Bureau will rule that the deal counts on the farmer's 1948, instead of his 1947, income. This would keep him out of a higher tax bracket this year and give him the benefit of any tax reduction by Congress on 1948 income.

The bureau has the question under consideration, but an official said no decision has been reached.

Midland Sells Bond Issue

City of Midland bonds totaling \$1,260,000 sold Tuesday at an average interest rate of 2.972 per cent to a syndicate including eight bond purchasing institutions. Citizens approved the issuance of the improvement and expansion bonds in a special election October 4.

The bids on the bonds were opened at a special meeting of the City Council Tuesday afternoon, the low bid being accepted. Another syndicate, including 11 firms, submitted a bid of 2.993 per cent. The bonds will be delivered on or before December 30.

Maturity dates on the huge bond issue run from 1948 to 1970.

Firms included in the syndicate buying the bonds are Crummer and Company, Inc., Dallas; First Southwest Company, Dallas; Columbia Securities Corporation, San Antonio; McClung and Knickerbocker, Houston; City National Bank, Kansas City; Rauscher, Pierce and Company, Dallas; Rotan and Mosie, Houston; and Roe and Company, San Antonio.

Representatives of numerous bond houses were here for the letting.

The issue includes \$750,000 worth of waterworks improvement bonds; \$300,000 sewer improvement bonds; \$200,000 street improvement bonds; \$200,000 public building bonds; and \$30,000 storm sewer bonds.

Marshall Says Soviet Lying And Knows It

WASHINGTON—(P)—Secretary of State Marshall injected a new element of toughness Wednesday in his country's patient-but-firm policy toward Russia.

Charging that Soviet officials and their Communist allies are lying and know they're lying in a "brazen and contemptuous" propaganda barrage against his European recovery program, Marshall declared "it is time to call a halt."

"We do not propose to stand by and watch the disintegration of the international community to which we belong," the cabinet officer asserted on the eve of his departure for a face-to-face meeting with Russian Foreign Minister Molotov.

But while his speech in Chicago Tuesday night was his toughest yet as a cabinet officer, Marshall nevertheless pledged that his sole aim at next week's Big Four Foreign Ministers' Conference in London will be to find a sound basis for a European peace settlement.

"World End Stalemate"

The secretary omitted any mention of the idea of making peace with Germany without Russia.

For himself, he said, "no matter what the provocation," his only purpose at London will be to end the present "tragic stalemate and to speed the advent of a new era of peace and hope for Europe and the world."

Marshall appeared to be touching off the intensified American "truth campaign" which high government officials said earlier this month was in the making.

Without mentioning names, the cabinet officer took critical note of the "warmongering" charges Molotov's deputy, Andrei Y. Vishinskiy, has been leveling against many Americans at the United Nations General Assembly.

Continental Oil Elects McCollum

NEW YORK—(P)—Leonard P. McCollum, coordinator of production activities for Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, Wednesday was elected president of Continental Oil Company, to succeed Dan J. Moran, whose retirement because of ill health was announced simultaneously by the company's board of directors.

Moran's retirement is to be effective December 1, and McCollum will leave his post at Standard Oil at that time to take over leadership of Continental, one of the largest of the integrated independent oil companies.

The home office of the firm is in Ponca City, Okla.

McCollum was born in 1902 at Bradford, Tenn., and has been associated with New Jersey Standard and its affiliates since his graduation from the University of Texas in 1925.

Intruder Flees But Police Capture Him

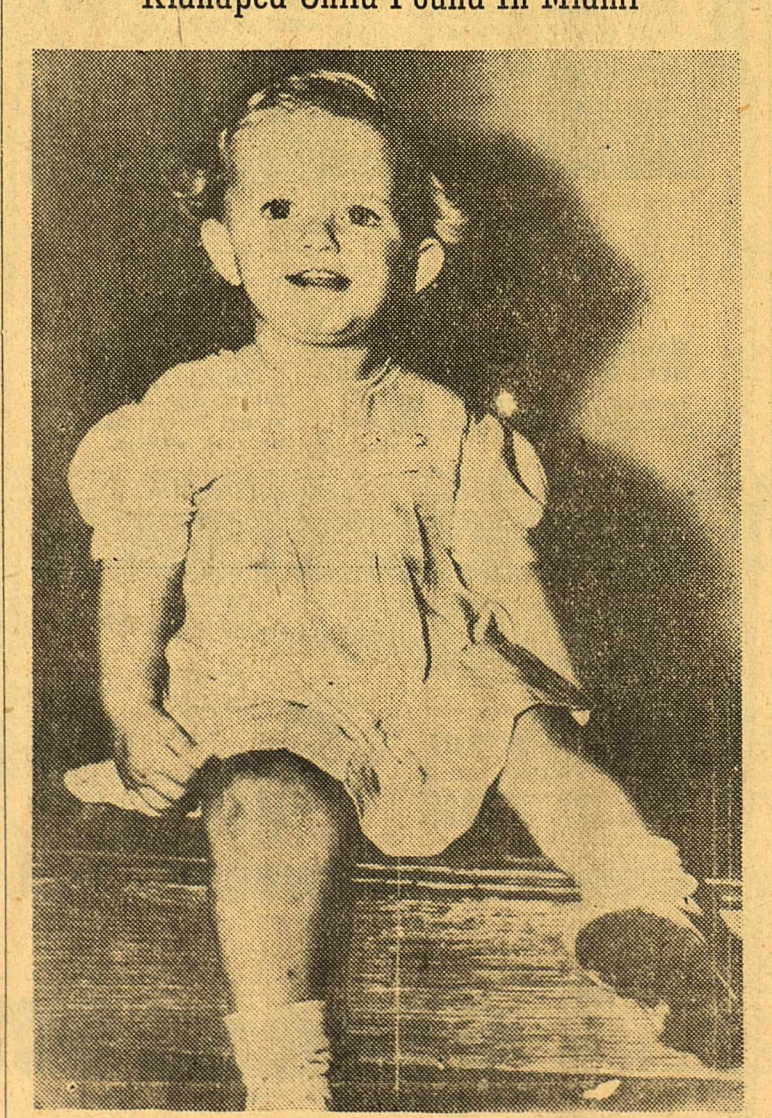
Telephone company operators of Midland called police early Wednesday when a man broke into the office of the company.

Charges are pending, police reported.

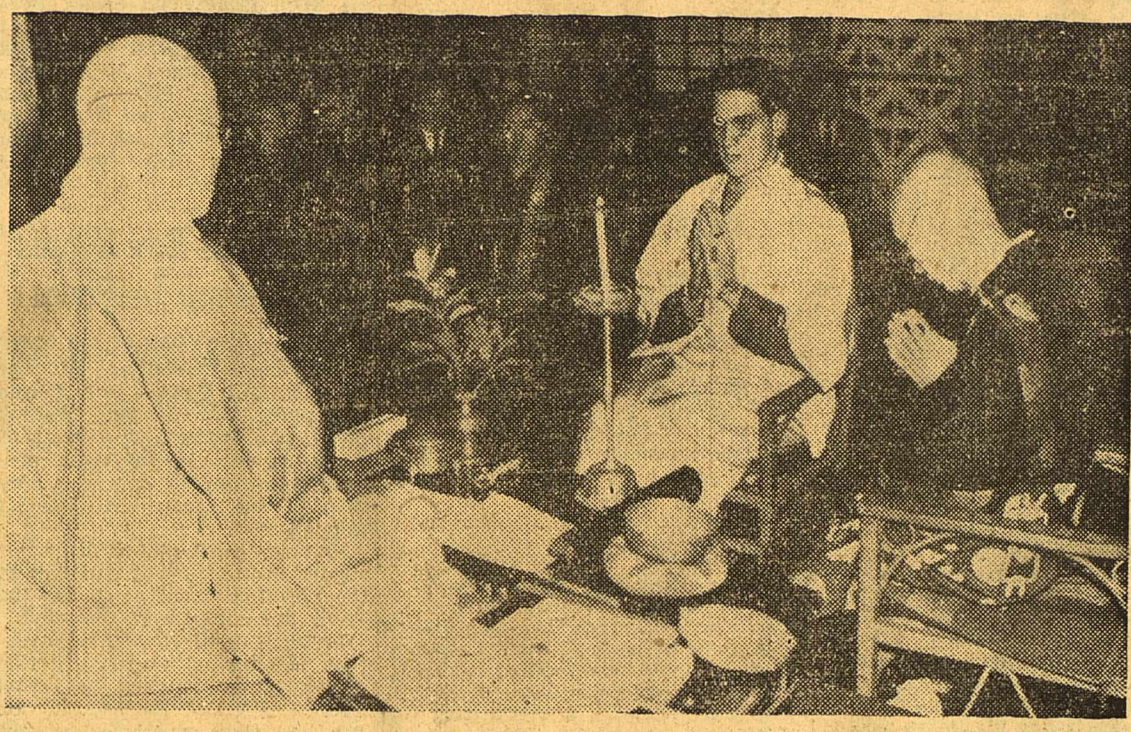
Kidnaped Child Found In Miami

Congress 'Digs In' On Truman's Recommendations

WASHINGTON—(P)—Congress got its teeth into President Truman's foreign aid and domestic anti-inflation programs Wednesday with three committees at work and two others preparing to start in a few days.

One committee—the Senate-House economic group—was due to open its study of the President's proposals Wednesday. Its chairman, Senator Taft (R-Ohio), who opposes many of the President's suggestions, summed up their chances during the special session this way:

Controls over installment buying and exports are the most likely of "Truman's cost-of-living proposals to pass Congress. Some sort of continued rent control also may be approved."

But, said the Senator, the power the President asked to restore "selective" controls over prices and wages doesn't stand a chance. Neither, he said, does rationing authority—also asked by Truman.

The chairman of the House Banking Committee, Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.), said his group will open hearings on the domestic angles of the President's program next week.

Closed Door Hearings

The stop-gap foreign aid, asked by the President for Italy, France and Austria, is being considered by both the House and Senate foreign committees behind closed doors.

Taft, on another aspect of foreign affairs, said the United States should take in "its share" of Europe's displaced persons under "notes which have not been filled by other immigrants."

Meanwhile, other senators continued their investigation into the war-time business dealings of Maj. Gen. Bennett C. Meyers.

Hospital Campaign Total Is \$190,991

A second report of the progress of the Midland Memorial Hospital building fund campaign Wednesday showed steady progress and indicated excellent work on the part of the scores of volunteer campaigners.

The grand total as reported at a luncheon in connection with the Lions Club was \$190,991 of which \$133,706 was reported Wednesday.

The report was added to \$57,285 an audit figure of Monday's report.

The breakdown of Wednesday's \$133,706 is: \$60,706 reported by team captains and \$73,000 reported by the Big Gifts Division. The Big Gifts total included gifts of 14 donors. An anonymous gift of \$25,000 was reported by A. N. Hendrickson, Big Gifts chairman.

A campaign analysis was given by Ivan H. Wood, who said an audit is made after each report session, to give an accurate accounting to the citizens of Midland of their campaign progress.

Roy Minear, Lions vice president, and John W. House, Special Gifts chairman, conducted the report program.

M. C. Ulmer, general chairman, said the results to date are most gratifying, but the good work must be continued if the \$600,000 goal is reached. He said he has faith the goal will be reached promptly.

The campaign opened last Thursday and is scheduled to close Thanksgiving Day.

A total of \$56,081 in cash and pledges was reported at the first progress session held Monday night in connection with the Kiwanis Club luncheon. The third report meeting is scheduled Friday noon at the JayCee luncheon.

All-Out Effort

The several hundred volunteer workers engaged in contacting the more than 6,000 prospects are making an all-out effort to complete their assignments as promptly as possible. Inclement weather and the fact that many people are out of the city this week has slowed the campaign to a certain extent. Interest and enthusiasm, however, have not lagged, sponsors said, and workers are meeting.

Blum May Form New Government In France Soon

PARIS—(P)—Leon Blum, veteran Socialist statesman, has agreed to try to form a new government, a Socialist spokesman announced Wednesday as France writhed in the grip of spreading Communist-led strikes.

Military trucks rushed flour to Paris to assure the capital of its bread supply, endangered by a millers' walkout. All France's 14,000 coal miners were on strike. Mediterranean ports were tied up by transport walkouts. The nationalized automobile industry was paralyzed by work stoppages. All sought increased pay. The government of Socialist Premier Paul Ramadier was the target of the concerted attack.

Reynard Try Falls

Informed sources said Paul Reynard, independent, who was the last premier of the Third Republic, had given up his effort to form a cabinet because he could not muster sufficient Socialist strength without alienating sectors of the extreme right needed for his voting strength in the National Assembly.

The announcement of Blum's decision was made by Guy Mollet, secretary general of the Socialist Party. He declared France had permitted herself to be divided into two groups and that if civil war should come, it would be "as bad as it was in Spain."

Mollet, addressing a luncheon of the Anglo-American Press Club, said a government under the 75-year-old Blum would be France's best opportunity to maintain her balance.

Moving Car Was Strange Place To Pick Fight

Governor Jester Assails Tideland Decision Before Area Group In Crane

CRANE—Gov. Beauford H. Jester, assailing the Supreme Court decision giving the federal government oil rights on California tidelands, and declaring it has been stated in "high places" the same decision will apply to vast Texas oil deposits in the Gulf of Mexico, told an assembly of hundreds of West Texans here Tuesday night that every effort to oppose this "further encroachment" by the government on states' right should and will be exerted by his office and the citizens of Texas.

Aside from upsetting the balance of power which authors of the constitutions of Texas and the United States wrote into those documents, and in addition to representing another step toward complete centralization of power in Washington, usurping of Texas' oil-rich tidelands will mean cancellation of a great "education-

nal insurance policy" which has guaranteed fine schools for Texas children, the governor said.

Billion Dollar Yield

Last November, in a sale of only a small fraction of the state-owned tidelands, oil companies paid \$12,294,450.10 in bonuses to the permanent school fund, he said. Inasmuch as it always has been found that the royalties from oil lands amounts to much more than bonuses paid for drilling rights, the lands already sold (one-sixty-fourth of the total tidelands area belonging to the state) will yield the state's public schools at least a billion dollars in our time, he predicted.

If such revenues are taken away from Texas, taxpayers simply will be called upon to supply the lost funds, he pointed out.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee Wednesday approved legislation to provide emergency aid for France, Italy and Austria. Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich) said the vote was 13-0.

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—An eight-nation "Arab" sub-committee on Palestine Wednesday formally challenged the authority of the United Nations in any attempt to partition the Holy Land into separate Arab and Jewish countries.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) said Wednesday the Senate-House Economic Committee will begin hearings Friday on points in President Truman's cost of living program, but proposals for limited rationing and price control will not be included.

CANBERRA—(AP)—The Australian House of Representatives approved the labor government's bank nationalization bill on its third and final reading Wednesday. The bill is expected to pass the Senate next week, after which it will face a prolonged court battle over its constitutionality.

DALLAS—(AP)—Byron Townsend of Odessa leads the list of high scoring Texas schoolboy backs, according to a football survey of class AA teams by The Dallas Morning News.

Townsend has accounted for 125 points and is leading ground gainer with 1,309 yards.

Other top performers are: Duane Grissett, Mineral Wells, total offense leader, 1,557 yards—887 yards rushing and 690 passing; Reed Quinn, Austin, leading punter, 51.4 yard average on 22 kicks; Ken Friedman, Bryan, leading passer, completed 61 of 126 passes.

A 223-pounder, Watson contributed a sterling game against the Texas Aggies. His blocking on offense and line-backing on defense had press box observers buzzing. Scouts for Texas and Texas Christian expressed the opinion he is the best lineman they have seen this year.

Watson is the fifth lineman and third center to be honored this Fall. The others: Jay Rhodemyre, Kentucky center; Bill Swacki, Columbia end; Bobby Davis, Georgia Tech tackle; and Chuck Bednarik, Penn center.

Linemen nominated this week included: Jim Minor of Arkansas at tackle, Alan Pike of Texas Christian at guard, Joe Watson of Rice, Cecil Stuphin of Southern Methodist and Dick Rowan of Texas at center.

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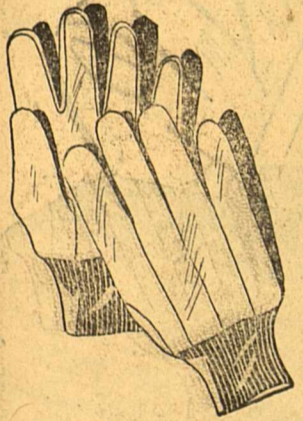
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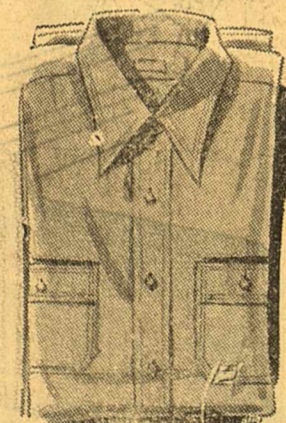

Political Football

A special commission of laymen has advised the House Ways and Means Committee to cut all personal income taxes next year. The commission also recommended 46 specific changes in the tax code.

The commission was appointed by Chairman Knutson, Minnesota Republican. No sooner had its report been filed than Congressman Dingell, Michigan Democrat, charged that it was "written in Wall Street."

Dingell did not find fault with the report's content. So far as news reports indicate he did not seem familiar with the recommendations, or even interested in them. He complained about the commission's personnel.

It represented Wall Street, he said; and J. Cheever Cowdin represented the National Association of Manufacturers; and the Association of American Railroads had a spokesman, C. S. Duncan. He did not like the participation of Roswell Magill, the chairman, or John W. Hanes, Jr.

To our mind Dingell went at this thing wrongly. If he was familiar with the report's content and knew that it favored Big Business at the expense of the proletariat, he would have done better to have said so and told how. When he confined his attack to the report's drafters he suggested very strongly that as a Democrat he felt it obligatory to oppose the product of a GOP-appointed body.

No reasonably objective observer doubts that the GOP intends to make all the political capital it can out of income tax reduction, with an eye on the 1948 presidential election.

Moreover, first reports raise considerable doubt whether the Knutson group did a first-class job. The time came long ago for a thorough overhauling of the whole tax law, going back to scratch and starting all over again so as to get rid of a terrible collection of driftwood.

The tax law now is like a house that started as a one-car garage and had one room added at a time, without any plan, of different materials, at different levels, each painted a different color at a different time.

The commission apparently suggested adding a couple more rooms—still without a plan—and re-locating a few partitions and redecorating a few odd rooms, instead of buying a new lot, hiring a first-class architect, and building a real house.

If Dingell had complained about this he would have been on sound ground. If he had found fault with specifications he would have been excusable. Instead, in effect he gave warning that the Democrats and the Republicans will kick the old taxpayer around the lot again for partisan politics.

Maybe we taxpayers ought to send word to Washington that the cost of living has cut us down to such slimness we aren't willing to be used for political footballs much longer.

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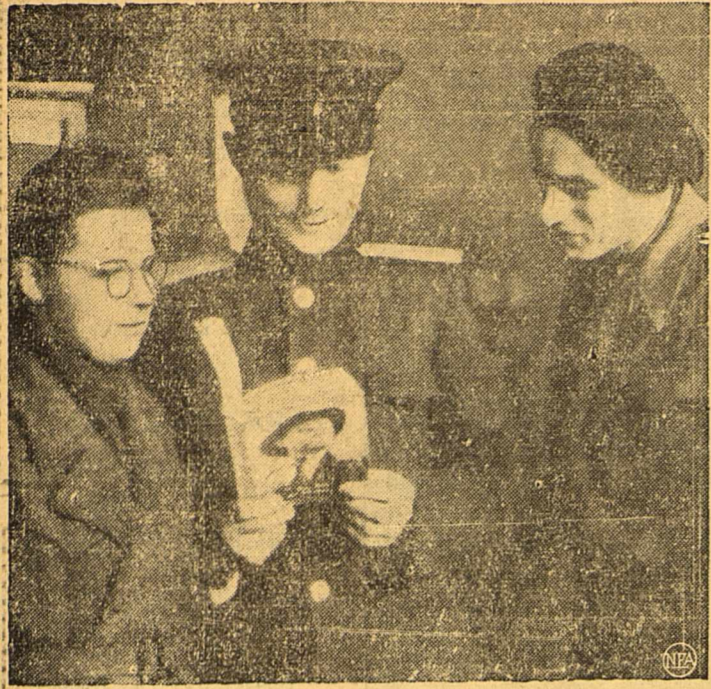

But the scheme is falling flat. Nobody seems to want to trade one nagging wife for 16,178 others with the same defect.

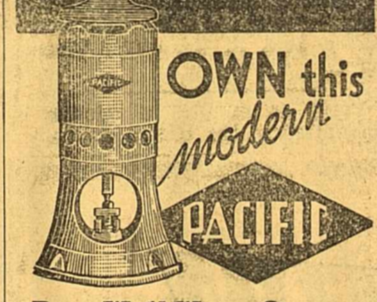

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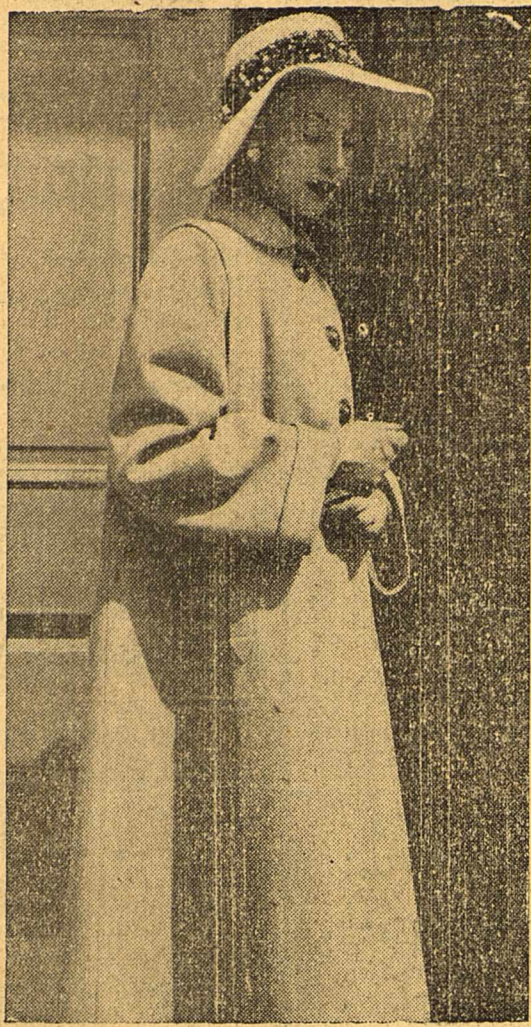

Wrecked Freighter's Crew Being Rescued

HALIFAX, N. S.—(P)—The British freighter Empire MacCallum reported Wednesday she had begun taking aboard survivors of the shipwrecked freighter Langlecrag after their five-day ordeal of being marooned on bleak Sacred Island, off the northern tip of Newfoundland.

The Empire MacCallum, one of four ships which plunged through heavy seas toward the island on rescue missions, reported she arrived at midnight, and stood by until daylight to take aboard the crewmen. The Langlecrag also was a British ship.

For five days the seamen—variously estimated at from 30 to 44 in number—were lashed by icy rain and buffeted by giant breakers while their radio operator sent out frantic messages that time was running out. One man was lost when the ship smashed on the shore reefs and broke in two early Saturday.

Knutson Assails New Reductions In Tariffs

WASHINGTON—(P)—Rep. Knutson (R-Minn) said Wednesday the State Department, in its "free trade" tariff cuts, has sought to tie the hands of Congress against protecting American agriculture and industry from foreign imports.

The statement by Knutson, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, indicated a bitter battle in Congress when the Reciprocal Trade Law comes up for renewal next Spring.

Under terms of the Geneva Trade and Tariff Agreement made public by the government Monday night, the United States will make more than 3,500 cuts in import duties as part of a 23-nation pact affecting half the world's commerce.

London Stages Most Diamond-Studded Party

LONDON—(P)—The biggest, most diamond-studded party London has seen since the country trooped to war eight years ago thronged the state apartments of Buckingham Palace until the wee hours Wednesday to toast Princess Elizabeth in vintage champagne from the royal cellar.
Officially, the big party was an "austerity" affair, for the king ruled against staging a major state occasion in days of British national poverty.

But wealth, royalty, music and champagne, youth, dignity, silk and diamonds made the party barely distinguishable from the big state affairs of happier days. The only thing missing was rich food at the buffet supper.

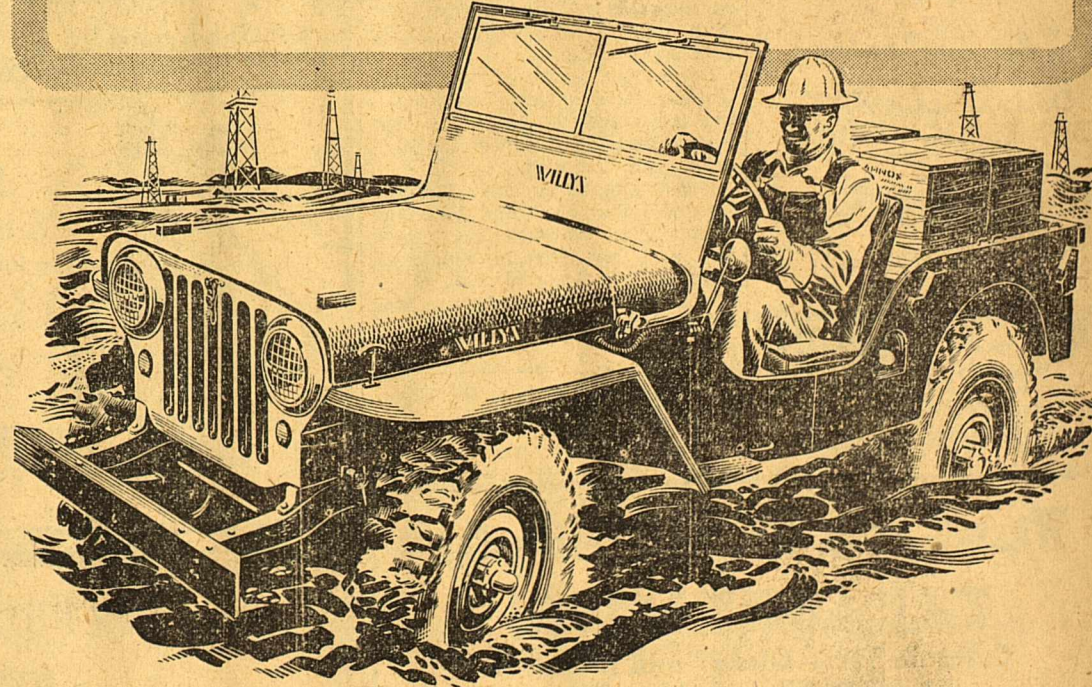
