#### 3,150-FOOT WILDCAT IS TO BE DRILLED IN NW MITCHELL

H. S. Moss of Dallas, has filed an application with the Railroad Commision of Texas, requesting a permit to start drilling at once on his No. 1 P. K. Mackey, as a 3,150-foot wildcat in Northwest Mitchell County, about six miles north of Iatan, and in an undeveloped region between the Iatan-East Howard field and the Coleman Ranch pool. Drilling will be with cable tools. The project will attempt to develop production in the middle Permian

The venture will be 1,980 feet from west and 330 feet from north lines of section 11, block 29, TP survey, T-1-N.

#### UPTON PROSPECT BOTTOMS AT 12,002 FEET; TO CASE

Slick-Urschel Oil Company, The Plymouth Oil Company, et al, No. 1 Alford, East-Central Upton County Ellenburger discovery, 12 miles northeast of Rankin, and 2,173 feet from north and 4,813 feet from west lines of section 50½, block Y, Scott survey, has bottomed at 12,002 feet, in Ellenburger entered at 11.021 feet.

Skelly Oil Company, through its district office at Abilene, has released official reports on its No. 1 Adrian, Northeast Nolan County Ellenburger discovery, about 10 miles southeast of Sweetwater. This development, located 330 feet from south and west lines of block 20, TP survey, flowed 68 barrels of oil in 34 hours, through tubing. That production was developed

following treatment of perforated sections at 6,368-28 feet and at 6,-340-64 feet, with 1,000 gallons and then 3,000 gallons of acid.

Following the 1,000 gallon initial the well swabbed and flowed 37.63 barrels of new oil in seven hours. Then the 3,000 gallon shot was pumped in and after the load and residue had been recovered the project flowed the 68 barof new oil in 34 hours.

Predicted In Survey NEW YORK -(P)- The downward trend in American exports will continue, a majority of producers representing 33 major U.S. industries predicted in replies to a survey by the National Industrial Conference Board.

Half of them expect the doestic market to offset the loss of

Three fourths of them report export sales for the first six months in excess of the compar-able period of 1946. But the slump in exports that set in about through the remainder of the year, they say.

Most exporters agree that government loans and aid to foreign countries would help cushion the decline, but many say foreign dolthrough imports to this country.

Most pessimistic over the downward trend were manufacturers of machine tools. Others foreseeing trouble ahead are manufacturers chemicals, paper, hardware, extiles, rubber products, and some types of industrial machines. In no industry group does a majority look for exports to continue at the high level of the first half of this year.

The manufacturers regard the dollar shortage as a basic cause. Some report that competition is increasing from foreign producers now getting back on their feet. Many report they limit the volume of sales to foreign markets.

The top 100 report total lobbying expenses of \$3,737,372. Seventeen more reported lobbying expense of less than \$1,000 each and 13 reported no expense at all. Returns by individuals are not included in the tabulation.





Indians Is Opposed

WASHINGTON - (P) - The National Congress of American Indians says two Alaskan villages have sold Tongass National Forest timber rights, which they claim to a New York Corporation for \$20,000,000.

Mrs. Ruth M. Bronson; Secretary of the congress - a private organization of persons of Indian descent-told a reporter the purchaser, the Timber Development Corporation of New York, will start logging up there right away.

She said the timber will be cut from land which the Department of Agriculture proposes to offer at auction February 18. Lyle F. Watts, chief of the United States Forest Service, said

he had not been informed of the sale, but added, "we will oppose

Watts said the Forest Service will not permit the sale or cutting of timber outside the provisions of the Tongass Timber Act recently passed by Congress.



# Delete Milk From Budget Cuts



Tall glasses of milk after school replenish protein needs of growing children.

No matter what other food budget cuts you must make, do not cutdown on milk. Instead, use more milk, vegetables and fruit as you cut down on meat, fowl and eggs. That is a basic rule of family nutrition — particularly for growing children.

Milk does a double duty. serves as a food and drink and contribues excellent body - building protein, calcium, riboflavin, thiamin-all so necessary to growing boys and girls.

Children, like adults, crave variety. On occasion, flavor milk wholesome sweeteners such as molasses, honey, home-made jam, plain malted milk powder or sugar and vanilla. Have the makings ready and let the youngsters flavor their own glassfuls. Quick Milk Tricks

Honey-Milk: To a glass of cold milk add 1 tablespoon molasses, honey or jam. Stir well.

Malted Milk: When using plain malted milk powder, first make a smooth paste of 1 tablespoon malted milk and a little milk. Add enough milk to make 1 cup and mix thoroughly.

Vanilla Milk: A teaspoon of sugar is plenty to flavor 1 cup of milk, with just a dash of vanilla.

Old-Fashioned Banana-Milk (Serves 6)

Five medium ripe bananas, 1 quart milk, 6 tablespoons molasses or honey, 1/8 teaspoon salt. Peel bananas. Mash with a fork until smooth and creamy. Add molasses or honey, and salt. Beat thoroughly with wire whisk or rotary egg beater. Pour into

glasses and serve with cookies.

# Cracker Crumbs Can Be Utilized

Don't waste a crumb of wheat food. Keep a jar for cracker crumbs and broken crackers, then use them in budget menus. Scalloped Potatoes

(Serves 6 Three cups sliced potatoes, 1 1/4 teaspoons salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper and 1 1/2 tablespoons flour mixed together, 2 tablespoons butter or fortified margarine, 1 cup sliced onion, 1 1/2 cups milk (about), 1/2 cup crushed cheese

Place half of potatoes in greased baking dish. Sprinkle with half of salt, pepper and flour mixture; dot with butter or margarine. Add a layer of half of the onions. Repeat layers. Add sufficient milk so that it can just be seen between the top slices. Top with crushed cheese crackers. Cover and bake in moderate over (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes; remove cover and bake about 30 minutes longer.

Stuffed Eggplant (Serves 4)

One medium-sized eggplant, 2 tablespoons fat, 3 tablespoons diced onions, 3 tablespoons diced green pepper, 1/2 cup diced celery, 1/4 cup chili sauce, 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, 1/2 cup buttered crispy cracker crumbs.

Wash eggplant and cook in boiling water 10 minutes. Cut in half lengthwise; scoop out pulp leaving shells about one-half inch thick. Reserve pulp. Sprinkle shells with salt. Melt fat in frying pan. Add onion, green pepper, and celery and saute five minutes. Add sauteed vegetables, chili sauce, salt and pepper to chopped eggplant pulp. Fill eggplant shells with this mixture. Top with buttered cracker crumbs. Place in shallow baking dish containing a little water. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 40 minutes or until tender.
