

Thanks-For American Spirit

Thanksgiving Day has been celebrated so long out of gratitude for abundance that we Americans may be forgiven if we forget that the first Thanksgiving was celebrated out of gratitude for survival. But there must be many newcomers to this country, observing the holiday this year for the first time, who will experience emotions not unlike those of the colonists who sat down to that first meager Thanksgiving feast.

The original Thanksgiving Day was decreed in humble thanks for the first harvest in the new land. The harvest was a symbol of hope and security after a year of hunger and danger, of sickness and despair, in an inhospitable wilderness where only the hardiest survived.

The colonists of 1621 could not conceive of the great nation they were founding, or of the ease and comfort of its present life. Yet they would understand the hunger and danger and sickness and despair that survive in the midst of our advanced civilization. And the fortunate few who have been able to flee those miseries and escape to America must have an acute understanding of what the first Thanksgiving meant.

But that is not to say that we who are heirs of the Thanksgiving tradition are callous. The spirit of this holiday, the sense of gratitude for the privilege of sharing are never long absent from our national conscience.

Occasionally they may seem to be, when we quarrel over other systems and politicians, or when we hear talk about "let them take care of themselves." But the true than the other man. Everyone is spirit is more typically shown in such things as the Friendship Train, and in the many instances of unpublicized, individual generosity with which Americans have responded to the need of the war-destitute and disillusioned.

We should give sincere, devout thanks for the blessings that this day recalls. And the world's hungry may ful that we do not have to be also give thanks that the true American spirit is not a smug and selfish enjoyment of those blessings. For all the lies and insults hurled at America today, they must know that they can count on us to help and share, as we have so many times before.


Penn State was first choice the Southern Methodist squad, in an opinion voiced almost immediately after clinching the host snot by cinching a tie for the conference title last week.

Alaskan Air Base Resists' Invasion

FAIRBANKS, ALASKA-(AP)-An isolated Alaska air base, supplied entirely by air, successfully withstood a five-day "attack" by an invasion force of Alaska command troops in the first large-scale Winter maneuvers of Exercise Yukon.


Temperatures dropped to 26 below zero during the activities at the Galena Air Field on the Yukon River, 375 air miles from the big delta operating base.

The 250 men of the 23rd Infantry Regiment of the Second Division were under command of Capt. Earl Acuff, wartime officer of the Alaska Scouts. They were transported to Galena by a 12th Air Force Troop Carrier Group after an "intelligence report" of an approaching invasion force.

The Galena Air Field was an emergency stopover point in war-time for lend-lease planes ferried to Siberia by Russian pilots.





it never pays to open your own suit unless you have a sure entry, in another suit.

In today's hand South bids a diamond, the opponents get to three no trump, and it is North's opening lead.

Should he open a diamond or a spade? I said above that the player who opens his own suit rather than his partner's must be prepared to take all the blame for what happens, and in this case, there will be plenty of it if North opens his spades. Declarer simply lays off until the second round knocks out the ace of hearts, and makes four no trump.

But with a diamond opening the best East and West can do s to take eight tricks. Remember, therefore, when your

partner doubles, partnership bridge requires that you lead his suit.






