Mason declared the law is full of ambiguities and weaknesses which are opposed to the best interests of competent plumbers, high plumbing standards, and the health and welfare of the public.

The law has permitted an un-known number of incompetent, unqualified men to become licensed as master plumbers, he said, and called for a closer-knit organization of competent plumbers to protect their profession

Organization Required When the time comes for seeking amendments to the present law, plumbers should be organized, because organization is required in politics," Mason said.

Weichel Asks Halt Of 'Enemy' Supply

exports from the United States to Russia was proposed Saturday by Rep. Weichel (R-Ohio) as "a last resort if necessary to stop supplying a potential enemy.

Weichel is chairman of the House Merchant Marine Committee, now investigating Soviet use of American-

"While the President now has the power, under export control laws, to curb the sending of supplies to Russia, he does not seem to be over-anxious to use it," Weichel *told a reporter. Information obtained by

Suspect the committee, Weichel said, shows that exports of such Killed By supplies as farm equipment and industrial machinery continue to leave this country for Russia in large numbers. Illinois Governor Assails Court Ruling In Tidewater Case

OKLAHOMA CITY -(A)- Gov. Dwight H. Green of Illinois has assailed the U.S. Supreme Court's decision giving the federal government control over tidewater oil lands as a precedent which "might be applied to effect the nationalization of all property useful or vital to the national defense or which might become the subject of international negotiations."

The Illinois chief executive, in a speech prepared for a meeting of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, called for immediate congressional action to nulify the Supreme Court's findings and to "preclude future efforts to upset established rights of the states and the American system of free enterprise and private property.'

Rancher Defends Halt Of Mexican Slaughter Plan

can foot and mouth disease slaughter program was termed "a \$36,-000,000 mistake" by Ben Williams of Douglas, Ariz., who said he operated ranches in the United States and Mexico.

Williams testified before a House agriculture committee after numerous other livestock men had endorsed the eradication drive and urged that the United States seek a renewal of the suspended slaughter operations. "The idea of going in there and

wiping out the cattle population of Southern Mexico is fantastic," Williams said. "Anyone should know such a program was doomed to fail from the beginning.'

Williams spoke to the committee for more than two hours, presenting views contrary to those earlier witnesses Particularly Mild Type

Nassau Gains In American Dollars,

NASSAU, BAHAMAS—(NEA)—

tle capital city of the Bahamas. The workings of British econemic policy aren't immediately apparent to the visitor. Those who have been here before have found things about as they were before the war. To be sure, the boys who dive for coins thrown the passengers as the ship docks won't bother for anything less than a quarter now. stores along Bay Street may not be stocked as full as they once were. But the tempo is still leisurely, the Nassauvians are still friendly, and the bicycles and horse-drawn vehicles still number the automobiles.

It is necessary to do a little digging to discover any change. The pre-war trade between the Bahamas and the States was alwithout restrictions. importers, which means virtually all merchants and hotel managers, had dollar accounts in the bank. Now imports are rigidly controlled. Officially Bahamians may import only essentials from the United States, although this rule is subject to some flexibility. Colony Has Advantage

This crown colony has an enviable advantage in the British quest for dollars. The islands are situated close to the American mainland. Their year-round summer climate, exuberant vegetacrystal clear seas and fine natural beaches are among their most "exportable" commodities. There are no shipping charges, depreciation or overhead connected with them. But they bring in the dollars. In turn they create a market for such tangibles as hotel rooms, English woolens, Irish linen and lace, Scotch sweaters and French perfumes, which bring in more dollars.

The Bahamas have no industry and little agriculture. Almost all the necessities of living, from meat and rice to automobiles and plumbing fixtures, must be imported. England can give the colony little help, because of the distance which separates them and because almost all of the United Kingdom's surplus production is being sold for dollars. Last year only five freight ships arrived at Nassau from Eng-

Incidentally, English money is not acceptable here, because some of the millions in sterling that the Nazis seized in the occupied countries has drifted into the American black money market.

English Citizens Immigrate In spite of the Bahamas' dependence on the States for necessities, there is one steady and increasing item of import from England. That is English citizens. Many of them are coming to take up permanent residence. The British West Indian Airways has a weekly flight from England. and reservations are booked solidly through March.

This immigration is largely confined to well-to-do Britons; a tribe that still seems to exist in spite of taxes and restrictions. They cannot bring in English currency, nor can they take their jewels out of England, but they can bring bank drafts and securities. And since the Bahamas are part of the British Commonwealth, there are no restrictions on travel here beyond the price

of passage and a reservation. In the Bahamas there is no austerity. Food is rather expensive. but plentiful. There is no coal shortage because there is no need for coal. And, probably most important to a wealthy English-

man, there is no income tax. The Colonial Office in London has repeatedly insisted that the Bahamian legislature impose one. But the local law-makers, who are independent as well as loyal, have consistently refused. So far they have gotten away with their defiance, to the joyful applause of their constituents.







Microscope May Answer Hair Puzzles

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE

ST. LOUIS. - (AP) - Some puzzles about human hair are being tackled in a new way by Dr. Mildred Trotter at Washington University Medical School.

Dr. Trotter, professor of gross anatomy, wants to learn just what changes occur in a person's hair from birth to maturity. Her subjects are 16 boys and girls, ranging in age from a few hours to 17 years old. She has taken samples of their hair every month, and is examining them under the micro-

She doesn't expect to find any answers to such problems as why some people get bald. This is a project to learn some fundamental facts about hair.

May Determine Sex The work might lead, however, to some way of examining hair and telling whether it belonged to a boy or girl, and about how old the child was, in a kind of a 'fingerprint" system for hair an-

This is the first time, Dr. Trot-ter said, that hair of the same persons will be studied over a long period of time.

Previously, analysis of hairs from different individuals of different ages has shown gradual changes in the structure of hair occurring with age. The new study may permit exact tracing of these changes, what they may mean, and why hair grows darker with age.

Age Brings Changes Hair fluoresces under ultraviolet or sun-tan light. Dr. Trotter is interested in whether the degree of fluorescence changes, and what this might indicate.

Hair research so far has demonstrated that hair grows coarser age-that the individual with hairs get thicker in diameter. It also indicates that there are only slight differences if any, between the hair of males and females.

Cutting hair does not make it coarser. Cutting or exposure to sun does not appear to have any effect upon the rate or amount of growth of hair, Dr. Trotter said.

There is evidence, she added, that plucking hairs, as in eyebrows, over a long period of time tends to reduce hair growth.







Need To Study Emotions

Dentists and surgeons should prepare their patients psychologically and also try to diagnose emotional conflicts which may be giving them erations or tooth extractions often may be unnecessary, or troubles may arise after necessary ones, he de-

If we could pile together the teeth and tonsils that have been unnecesil'nesses of emotional origin, we would have an imposing monument to an era of over-credulity in regard tion to medicine—the theory of focal infection.

'Many pains about the head, face, and neck are wrongly assumed to be due to dental pathosis. Teeth are extracted or sinuses operated on when a careful analysis of the pair would show that non-typical ne gia due to 'focal conflict' rather than 'focal infection' is present. A study of the life situation rather than a search for 'foci of infection' is the proper approach.'

Insist On Surgery Some pscyhoneurotic persons, he

continued, may insist upon having teeth, tonsils or appendix removed because in self-diagnosis they blame them as centers of infection, or have guilt feelings and derive satisfaction from the surgery.

One woman with pains in the side of her face got temporary relief after having her teeth and tonsils removed upon her insistence. then the symptoms returned worse than ever, Weiss said.

A young woman of 30, he continued, had developed feelings of partly because her upper teeth had been removed thirteen years earlier when symptoms of fatigue, nervousness, and constipation were blamed on focal

hygiene because they fear pain, or fear the dentist will extract teeth,

'The idea that the wearing of dentures is a sign of old age is true not only of women, but also of many men. It is one of the reasons that many chronic illnesses can be traced to a dental opera-tion, the fitting of dentures, and the failure of the patient to adjust himself to them.'

Weiss urged that parents and dentists cooperate in persuading children to regard treatment as sensible, necessary, and involving minimum of discomfort.



Revolutionary Atom Age Has Fifth Birthday

By The Associated Press

The atom age observed its fifth birthday anniversary this month the first time you wear them. (Is moving forward with precocious strength toward new weapons, new Enakes, spails, eels, centipedes, medical discoveries, new displaced persons and possibly toward "the ultimate secrets of nature."

New atomic weapons, made from Alarm clocks, low-held umbrel- both uranium and plutonium, are "in current production and under design" by American scientists and engineers, David E. Lilienthal, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, revealed in a speech at Atlantic City, N. J.

to them. The Eniwetok people are to be moved by the American Navy to another atoll, Uselang—where the natives of Bikini, still displaced after last year's atomic bomb explosion in their waters, had been

planning to go. But Uselang isn't big enough for both groups. So the men, women and children of Bikini must remain on barren Rongerik until dangerous radioactivity no longer infests their home lagoons.

Canadians Feel Pinch Of Newest Restrictions

VANCOUVER, B. C.—(P)—Canadian travelers have begun to feel the pinch of the drastic new dominions regulations against purchases

Typists Replace Printers To Give Chicagoans News

girls who ordinarily type their bosses' private letters now are pounding out the news for the Chicago area's millions of newspaper read-

Typists gained an unprecedented importance on the city's six big dailies when the papers' 1500 AFL printers went on strike.

All the papers were prepared for a possible work stoppage and were ready with a substitute photo-engraving process for printing the

Ordinarily, when the copy is written and edited in the editorial room of a newspaper, it is sent to the composing room to be set up into type. Under the photo-engraving process it is sent to a battery of typists equipped with ordinary or electronic typewriters. Specially Ruled Paper

They copy the stories on a piece of white paper ruled to one or two columns wide. Usually the stories are copied twice, the first determinng the amount of spacing needed between words in each line so the printing will be flush with the sides of the column or columns.

The columns of copied news then are sent to the art department and pasted on a dummy page. The headlines are of a very thin photostat type of cardboard base set by hand and held in place on the dummy page by transparent tape. Prints assigned spots for the dummy page. Then the entire dummy page is reproduced by photo-engraving and sent to the storeotyper, who makes the mats and then the semicircular leaden plates for the printing

Page one and some of the inside pages of The Tribune were typed with Litho-book type face, presenting a striking typographical appearance some what resembling regular Linotype reproduction. The Obert Loberg didn't Tribune announced that a battery of sixty girl typists, all regular em-He nudged the car gently with ployees of the newspaper, produced the type-written news and advertising copy.

Larger Dummy Used To get more printed matter published, the afternoon Times, a tabloid, used a dummy half again as large as the page desired. Then the entire page was reduced to normal size in the photo-engraving process—the typewritten printing thus being only two thirds as large as normal. 

Postal Officials

Ask For Complete Mail Addresses

Midland post office officials Saturday issued an appeal to merchants and others who send statements, direct-mail advertising and other matter to residents of the city to make every possible effort to put complete and correct mailing addresses on envelopes.

It has become impossible, they said, for postal clerks to know everybody in Midland, and be able to deliver an envelope addressed simply "Joe Doaks, Midland." Such mail, if it bears first-class postage, must be sent through the office's directory service, which requires much work for an already-burdened post office and also delays delivery.

Mailing Lists

Merchants who regularly send statements or circulars to names on mailing lists may obtain complete addresses from the post office for a cent per name, or a minimum of 25 cents, the officials said. Local mail has reached such proportions that improperly addressed envelopes soon will have to be sent back to the mailer for additional information, they fear.

Invitations sent out by clubs or individuals also should bear proper addresses, post office personnel said. Thus, a letter or invitation addressed to a child whose name is not in the directory, or to a wife addressed by her maiden name inmost impossible to deliver. Such mail should bear street addresses and house numbers, or at least should be sent in care of parents or persons whose names can be located through the office's directory ser-

But while Congress argued the foreign aid program, other quarters in Washington were arguing over what, and how much, the Luckman team accomplished in its brief and highly-trumpeted career on the Citizen's Food Committee before it went back to sell-

'Speed Was Driving Force'
A week before Luckman's sudden decision to fold up and go home, he gathered the committee for one of its infrequent sessions. He had pledges, he told them, for about 80 per cent of the goal of 100 million bushels of wheat. The last 20 million bushels, he warned, would be the hardest to get. But six days later the committee shut shop, claiming it had saved well over the 100 million bushels
