Wheat yields in the county were good this year, with several farmers harvesting crops of more than 100 bushels per acre. However, quality of the crop was generally below par. especially in protein content and weight.

Elevator operators report that the harvest is 95 to 100 percent complete.

Although hail and rain has cut the average yield and weeds have hindered the harvesting, the 1982 wheat crop is a big one. "As for the quantity," commented Bill Clark of Dimmitt Agri Industries, "more wheat was produced in the county than in the last 10 years, and the quality held out very good."

'The total volume was the biggest volume we had handled in 26 years; we were quite surprised at the amount that came 55th Year - No. 42 in," said Bill Gregory of Castro County Grain.

The Castro County Commissioners Court passed a resolution Monday urging Gov. Clements and President Reagan to declare Castro County a natural disaster area

Commissioner Edd Wilson presented the resolution at Monday's meeting of the court. The resolution stated that due to adverse weather such as hail, high winds and excessive rains, a disaster should be declared for all crops in the county, and requested that disaster relief funds should be allocated.

In other action, the commissioners gave STM Corp. of Houston a blanket permit to conduct geophysical testing on all Castro County roadways, with permission to operate on road surfaces if necessary.

Provisions of the agreement stated that STM must outfit its equipment with flashing warning lights and furnish flagmen to warn approaching traffic.

STM representative G. C. Bandy said the testing is part of a 500-mile testing program in Castro, Swisher Briscoe Counties on behalf of Exxon, Gulf and Shell oil companies.


Central Plains MHMR recently requested that Castro County contribute \$3,520 in fiscal year 1982-83 beginning in September. That amount will generate \$20,706 from the state, according to Seth Halbert of Plainview.

Use of the various funds in the past year were in areas of mental health, 78 percent; alcohol abuse; 15 percent; mental retardation, four percent; and drug abuse, three percent.

The newest services added are the Homebound Educational Program for children from infancy through three years of age and the service to rest homes providing music and occupational therapies.

Mental health outpatient services are provided through seven locations within the nine counties served by the Center. The Family Service Center in Dimmitt is located at 306 West Bedford and is open between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Genell Craig is employed in the local office, and Carol Lantz of Dimmitt serves on Center's board of the trustees

Indoor pollutants are a hidden health threat. Are they conquering your home's air?

If so, clean up you air, advised Dr. Jane Berry, a housing and home furnishings specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Indoor pollutants that are potential hazards for humans include carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, formaldehyde gas, ultraviolet light waves, other chemical vapors, dust, pollen and tobacco smoke, she said.

Berry recommended three methods for controlling indoor pollution. They are:

-Allow enough fresh outside air to come inside to dilute indoor pollutants by using an air-to-air heat exchange system to pre-heat or at 7 each night.

"No owner of any lot, place or area within the City of Dimmitt, Texas, or the agent of such owner shall permit on such lot, place or area; or upon any sidewalk abutting same or any alley abutting the same, any such weeds, grass or deliterious, unhealthful growth, or other noxious vegetable matter that may be growing, lying or located thereon, or any such hole, place or stagnant water, all as herein above defined and set out; and any such weeds, grass or deliterious, unhealthful growth, or other noxious vegetable matter that may be growing, lying or located on any such lot, place or area, when same shall be of such density, height or quantity as to constitute a menace and hazard to the health and well-being of this community, or any such hole, place or stagnant water is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.'

Property owners who are responsible for the accumulation of weeds and debris will be receiving written notification in the mail, which will allow them ten (10) days in which to clean up their property. Property owners who choose not to take this voluntary action within the specified time may be fined part in keeping Dimmitt from \$1.00 to \$200.00 per day until such time that the

School board 'holds off'

Among uncertainty over the district's tax values, the Dimmitt School Board has declined all bids on a proposed new steer barn and held a budget workshop during a special meeting.

The board cannot set the tax rate yet. Supt. Robert Ryan said that school trustees must wait until the tax appraisal district completes its re-evaluation and holds its equalization board meeting Aug. 22 before they can determine how much property value can base their taxing on and what tax rate they can levy.

Because of the uncertainty over the budget, the board decided to put off building the steer barn for the FFA. Bids for the project that had been received included \$19,500 for the building, \$6,300 for concrete work, \$2,000 for electrical work and materials and \$6,000 for construction of pens and other items inside and outside the building, a total of about \$33,800.

The FFA has \$9,700 on hand in certificates of deposit to go toward the project, but board members agreed that the project must wait until more funds are available.

"We'd like to have at least half of the cost on hand before beginning such a project,' Ryan said. He added that the FFA might continue working on various money-making projects.

The board tentatively set Aug. 26 at 7 p.m. for the annual public budget hearing. The budget must be completed and in effect before Aug. 31.

Also, in view of money uncertainty, the trustees voted down the optional 40% exemption for homesteads, saying that they would continue to grant the current \$5,000 regular homestead exemption and the \$10,000 homestead exemption for perienced for the 1980-81 those who are over 65 or disabled.

estimated that the additional homestead exemption could have brought a \$115,000 loss of revenue.

The board accepted a proposal from Honeywell, Inc. to conduct a technical survey of the heating systems in the elementary, middle and high school buildings.

Honeywell will furnish labor and equipment to perform an infrared scan on boilers, inspect and test boiler controls and burners, test and calibrate temperature controls, inspect and test hot water and condensate pumps, perform thorough analysis on Honeywell electric panel and night set-back controls, inspect and test Lennox rooftop units, and test and cali-

brate temperature controls and related components such as air conditioner compressors. The total for all three

schools will be \$6,586. A final detailed report and repair estimates will be submitted to the school within three weeks after completion of the

survey. A transportation report which Ryan showed to board members revealed that the conversion of several buses to LP gas usage last year saved the school enough money to pay for the conversion equipment, cover the extra mileage brought about by instituting the East Dimmitt bus route and still cost \$2,000 less than the previous year in total fuel

expense. A food service report showed that, with \$336,606.37 spent for the school lunch program for 1981-82 and revenue of \$314,728.51, the loss of \$21,877.86 was offset by an inventory gain of \$4,976.79, bringing the net loss to \$16,901.07.

"This loss could almost be called satisfactory after the \$33,070.11 total loss we ex-

TCGA's seven-county "checkoff area" - the state's main corn-producing region -116,451 of the 421,431 acres planted to corn have been ruined by hail.

The counties include Castro, Deaf Smith, Hale, Parmer, Swisher, Bailey and Lamb.

Hardest-hit, King reported, is the biggest corn-producing county, Parmer, where 141,-000 acres were planted to corn and 70,000 acres have been hailed out.

Damage estimates in other counties are Castro, 10,000 of 85,120 planted acres damaged; Lamb, 14,040 of 47,040 planted acres damaged; Deaf Smith, 6,150 of 41,031 planted acres damaged; Swisher, 2,467 of 16,450 planted acres damaged; and Bailey, 11,000 of 35,000 planted acres

After meeting with Gov. Clements in Lubbock Monday, King commented, "The governor is well-versed in the problems of agriculture, and has a top aide in Jarvis Miller, former president of Texas A&M. Of course, there's not a whole lot the governor can do except to be sure to be in Washington to testify on behalf of the state's farmers when the time comes.

King said he's tried to make the same point with all the officials who have been in the area to survey the damaged crops.

"I've asked them, 'Do you get the significance of what's taking place here?' and told them, 'The point is that if we had had a good farm bill to start with, the farmers could have ridden this thing out'," King said.







LEAF rust took a heavy toll of this year's Texas wheat crop, particularly in central and southern areas, said a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Losses run 50 percent or more in some areas. Leaf rust is a perennial disease problem but was particularly damaging this year because of a new race (type) that infected normally resistant varieties, a large increase in wheat acreage in southern areas that allowed rust spores to develop early and spread northward, and almost ideal weather condi-To reduce potential tions. problems next year, farmers should plant several different wheat varieties, use fungicides if necessary, and plant later if wheat will not be grazed.

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
