## Rebuilt To Sea-Level WASHINGTON - (AP) - Con-

version of the Panama Canal into a sea-level waterway at a cost of \$2,482,000,000 has been recommended to Congress as a means of meeting the threat of atomic bomb at-

In a report submitted by President Truman, Gov. J. C. Mehaffey of the Canal Zone said a sealevel canal would be much less vulnerable to atomic attack than the present waterway with its sys-

tem of locks. "After the explosion of an atomic bomb, dropped directly into the canal, traffic could be restored, provided the necessary personnel and equipment were available, within a period of a few weeks, with full allowance for the difficulties involved in removing radioactive de-

bris," the report said. "The use against a sea-level canal of a more powerful atomic bomb, such as may be developed in the future, would increase the time of closure," the report said.

The report said that "in no sense" could a sea-level canal be destroyed as might a lock canal. Governor Mehaffey said that conversion of the Canal "would be a propect of outstanding magnitude but would present no unsual con-struction difficulities." He said the work could be completed in ten years.

Declaring that the present canal is totally lacking in security to meet the future needs of national defense, "the report said that even with ordinary bombs Gatun Lake could be reached and the loss of water there might

spoons raisins. Remove slice from top of each apple, and core. Scoop out apples, leaving a substantial shell. (Scallop edge with a sharp knife, if desired.) Chop pulp. Add butter, mashed sweet potatoes, brown or raw sugar and raisins. Mix well. Fill apple shells. Place in baking dish with a small amount of water. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 F.) 45 minutes. 

The purpose of leading from your longest suit is of course that you hope to develop winners out of your small cards in that suit In most cases, even though you have a lead in a shorter suit that appears to be safer and more normal, you will find that it is winning policy to lead from your longest suit.

His daughter Eva was believed to have married the German dicator and to have committed suieide with Hitler just before Berlin

Braun's daughter Gretele, widow of SS Gen. Fegelein whom Hitler ordered shot as a deserter in the last days, was one of the few in

the courtroom audience.


