

KRAKOW, POLAND-(P)-Krakow's Supreme National Tribunal Monday sentenced 23 top-ranking German S.S. (Elite Guard) officers to die for crimes against humanity. committed while they were attached to the notorious Auschwitz Extermination Camp.

Five other defendants were sentenced to life imprisonment, six were given 15-year terms, two were sentenced to 10 years and three to five years, one defendant—Dr. Hans Munch of Munich-was ac-

Heading the list of those sentenced to death was Arthur Lieb-Hencshel, 46, who succeeded Rudolf Hoess, one-time commandant of the camp, who was executed last

The prosecution estimated 4,500,-000 people died from starvation, torturing, hanging and in the gas chambers at Auschwitz, 50 miles West of Krakow, during the war.

Wax Industry Enters Stretch In Mad Race To Beat Petrillo Ban

NEW YORK -(P) - Enough new music to satisfy America for two years is promised by the phonograph recording people by New Year's Eve when James C. Petrillo's edict, barring his American Federation of Musicians from making records or radio transcriptions, goes into ef-

The million dollar voices are growing husky with fatigue as they go into the stretch; the millionaire orchestra leaders are working (without white tie) through breakfast time at building a backlog that will last America's radio, juke boxes and phonographs until 1950.

Work All Hours Harry James hustles out of the Palladium Ballroom in Hollywood at 2:30 in the morning and works for the next five hours in a recording studio. Frank Sinatra, working between 1 and 5 a . m. since October 18, when the ban was announced, until December 31, when it goes into effect, will have 75 numbers recorded instead of the eight he usually makes in a two-month

period. Dinah Shore is waxing 50 vocals instead of four a month; Frankie Carle and Al Jolson are making 40 sides apiece.

Symphonic maestroes, too, are nastening to record classics they never got around to before. Toscanini and Koussevitsky both are in pressure cooker. Recording equipment has been rushed to the Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Cleve-

Technicians Scarce Harrassed, exhausted Kay Kyser in his haste inadvertently recorded the same number twice. A redeyed arranger slumped in a studio chair and his noisy snore spoiled a Buddy Clarke recording. Sinatra's gave out during one allnight session and his personal appearance in a Broadway theater had

to be canceled the next day. It takes years to train recording technicians. There is no extra help available and the regulars are cranky from the impossible job of handing from 18 to 20 artists a week. If they're lucky four or five numbers can be recorded in a night. Some nights they can get only one

or two; other nights nothing at all. Keen-eared executives of the 175 recording companies are growing 'hard of listening." In two months they will have auditioned, selected and recorded a repertoire that normally would have taken about two

Next Year's Hits

Scores from next year's movies already are on wax. Music publishers have turned over their 1948-49 lists and the record companies have them ready for release. Show tunes, from musical comedies that won't even be in rehearsal until next Spring already are in recorded libraries.

"And if this isn't enough," commented the president of one of the largest companies, "we'll make any hit that comes along with vocal

backgrounds." That's the old dodge they used during Petrillo's 1942-1945 ban. natra's comet flashed at that time. Restrained from using musical backgrounds for the new sensation, his recording company used human accompaniment.

The swift current of rumor that twists through Tin Pan Alley hints there will be "bootleg" records. In addition to the four major companies: RCA Victor, Columbia, Decca and Capitol, there are 20 secondary outfits and about 150 wildcat operations. Petrillo never has been able

to police the latter. Wise heads in the industry say Petrillo is not out to get the recording companies, his targets are the small, independent radio stations, who live on records but balk at pay ing for stand-by musicians.



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



Lawmaker Says 'Flying Saucers' Russian Missiles

'flying saucer" epidemic may have stemmed from Russian rocket exceriments.

Claiming he has received reliable information concerning the devel-opment of high velocity missiles by Soviet scientists, the Oregon lawmaker added in a statement:

"Strangely enough, this develop-ment might be the solution of the now almost forgotten mystery of the flying saucers

He said the Russians are reported to have a rocket of amazing speed and "almost limitless range," propelled by a series of explosions occurring several seconds apart. Success Explosions .

"Each successive explosion shoots the missile forward at increased speed," Ellsworth said. "Apparently the charges are packed separately and are held apart by metal disc As each charge is fired, the metal disc is discharged as an empty cartridge shell is ejected from an automatic rifle. The discs are made of thin metal and possibly disintegrate in the air not long after they are discharged.

Ellsworth suggested American scientists might have been working on some similar device, but he held it more likely any discs actually seen had come from Russian military proving grounds.

Aerial Survey For Fight Against Foot, Mouth Disease Planned

SAN ANTONIO-(A)-Plans have been completed for an aerial survey of the Mexican border, from the Gulf of Mexico to Brewster County, shortly after the first of the year in a battle to prevent possible spread of foot and mouth disease from Mexico into this country, Dr. W. C. Dye, veterinarian in charge of the United States Bureau of Animal Husbandry here, said Mon-

The survey has been mapped between Dye and King Cruse of San Benito, who will furnish the planes. 'We are going to do our best to keep possibly infected cattle out of this district, now that the Mexican eradication program has bogged

down," Dye said. Dye said the survey planes would remain on the American side of the border, but observations would be made on the Mexican side.

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Beat egg. Add milk and shortening. Stir into flour mixture, mixing only enough to moisten flour. Bake in a ring mold 25 to 30 minutes. Frost with a thin icing. Decorate with maraschino or candied cherries for holly berries, angelica or mint leaves for holly leaves.

Cranberry Upside-Down Cake: Into a ring mold, pour a mixture of 3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine and 1/2 cup sugar and 11/2 cups whole fresh cranberries.

Pour the basic batter over the over the bananas. Bake 45 to 50 cranberries.


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
