Christmas Death Toll In Nation

By The Associated Press heavy toll of violent deathswith traffic and fires the principal causes - marred the nation's celebration of the Christmas holiday.

Accidents on the highways, as sual over a holiday period resulted in the largest number of deaths a farm fire near Martindale -at least 171. But fatalities from miscellaneous causes were past the 100 mark, more than double the toll last Christmas.

More than 30 persons died in fires, including 10 Indians in a gambling shack in Gardnerville, Nevada; seven persons in a small hotel in Orange, Taxes; and four others in a dance hall near Fredericksburg, Texas. Others killed in fires over the holiday included seven in Michigan and two each in Connecticut and Maryland. • Above Last Year

The traffic toll of 171 and 102 from miscellaneous causes, for a total of 273, covered the period from p. m. Christmas Eve to Thursday midnight. For the corresponding period last year, the total was 261, including 213 traffic deaths and 48 fatalities from miscellaneous causes fires, plane and train crashes, asphyxiation, and so forth.

The National Safety Council, although making no prediction for the period covered in the survey, had estimated traffic accidents for the four-day Christmas holiday period will total 400.

Murray's announcement, calling for round three of e CIO's postwar demands for more pay, is certainly the gnal for more inflation. Such a demand, unlike the de-and for higher prices, is something tangible that Coness could move in on. But wage controls without price ntrols are out of the question, of course. They would unfair, ineffective, and politically disastrous for those

As for price controls without wage controls—well, e can just skip that one. There is no need to argue the flationary and general economic dangers of that course, to cite the labor spokesmen who say it could be taken fely. It can simply be dismissed with the confident atement that the 80th Congress is about as likely to apove a set-up like that as it is to vote for higher income

As things stand at the moment, the majority of conssmen probably don't like controls of any sort. Neither, a matter of principle, do the majority of their constients. Neither does President Truman-if we may asme that he expressed his true feelings when he spoke t against them a month before he requested them from

But the time may have come when most of us are pre concerned with the weakened purchasing power of r dollars than with abstract ideals of personal freedom.

Our guess is that, even though the majority of Amerins don't like the idea of peacetime price controls, the O won't reap much ill will if its wage demands force e ceilings on again. Even though round three of wage es would add more inflationary pressure, it might have re public support than the first two got.

It might be more accurate to say that industry's restance to wage demands in the Fall of 1945 and last ring had more public support than it likely will receive the next round.

Some sections of industry are still saying that wage reases are, in the end, the sole cause of high prices. don't think many people believe that any more. It esn't stand to reason they are to blame for the steady onth-to-month rise in the cost of a number of commodies, particularly food. This time, if Murray comes out ith some accurate and detailed figures on profit ineases, instead of thundering a lump sum of billions and aving it hanging in the air, he may have a more attene audience.

The CIO notice of new wage demands has left Coness with a choice of three actions. It can do nothing: at would result in long strikes and lost production, or gher wages and higher labor costs, or most likely both. can give Mr. Truman the authority he wants to repose some ceilings. 



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

Silver Opens New Career For **Exploring Women**

By ADELAIDE KERR AP Newsfeatures Writer Margaret Craver's story indicates that new and unusual careers lie open to women who are willing to do some exploring outside beaten

paths. Miss Craver, the attractive brown-haired daughter of a Kan-sas cabinet maker, is building her career out of silver in New York. And she thinks it offers a lot of other people shining possibilities for hobbies and Christmas presents if they will put their mindsand hands-to it.

Miss Craver fell in love with silver when, as a Kansas University freshman, she enrolled in a metal work class. Later, when she went to work in the Wichita (Kansas) Art Association Galleries, she taught some classes in silversmithing and jewelry making. Her infatuation with the metal continued to grow and she began to dream of fine hand-wrought silver in America and of craftsmen who would have as much artistic standing as painters.

"When the war came, I volunteered to work for a summer in the Red Cross Arts and Skills Department at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station," she said recently. "They put me to work in the plastics department. There I heard talk of certain arm and hand motions which they wished wounded men to make for healing purposes. I realized that silversmithing and jewelry making would give them an opportunity to make these motions.

"So I wrote to a firm of refiners and dealers in precious metals in New York. I had always bought my silver from them. In time I came to see the firm's president and told him what I had seen and heard."

would have arrived at the dance hall in just a few more minutes and said it possibly would have numbered 1,000 persons. Identification of the four people

was made by dental work. The wood and sheet metal building burned for three hours after

the blaze started. Volunteer firemen were handicapped in their efforts to bring it under control by a lack of water. The building is situated on the outskirts of Fredericksburg, and water had to be pumped from a nearby creek.

NEW YORK. - (A) - A set of 34 copper plates from which naval charts of the American coast were printed during the Revolutionary at the church where he was to have War is to be turned over to the United States Government by the British Admiralty, the British In-

formation Service has announced. The plates are to be preserved by nine United States libraries and historical societies, while complete sets of proofs from the plates are to be presented to the Library of Congress, the New York Public Library, and the American Geographical Society.

The charts are based on surveys made between 1777 and 1781 after the Revolutionary War had started and the Colonies declared their independence. After the war, they were used to guide commercial naviagation until "well into the 19th century," the Information Ser-






