**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Perhaps our coldest weather of the winter came last week, anyway we can hope it was. If no rain, evergreens especially should have a good soaking now. If you have planted new shrubs or trees, be sure they don't dry out too much at any time.

Deciduous (bare-root) shrubs and trees may be purchased at a more reasonable price than balled and burlapped plants. They should do well if planted carefully. Inspect for bruises, tears, or breaks and prune back beyond the injured point. Remove excessively long and unwieldy roots. Also prune back tops of plants. Spread roots and gently fill in about them with top or mixed soil. Set plants at same depth as they were in the nursery or yard if just moving them. Apply water while planting to drive air pockets out. After soil has been filled in around the roots, tamp down surface to stabilize plant. Leave a space six inches around the trunk or stem of the plant to catch water. This can be filled in later.

House plants face rather difficult conditions during January. The air indoors is likely to be exceedingly dry due to use of artificial heat. Keep varieties that prefer low temperature in cool locations and never near direct heat. During the short days of winter all house plants respond favorably to exposure of maximum sunlight and especially ones that bloom.

If you have an old fig tree that is over-grown and want to rejuvenate the plant, try a severe pruning. Select 3 to 8 vigorous, widely spaced stems to serve as leaders. Remove all other stems, and prune the leaders back about halfway. Thereafter, head back the bush each spring just before growth begins. At that time, remove 1/3 to 1/2 the length of the previous seasons growth.

**Debra Says**

Baking soda and baking powder both act as leavenings in quick breads - but can't be used interchangeably.

Baking soda reacts with an acid such as vinegar or sour milk to form carbon dioxide. When soda is used as a leavening agent, it must be sifted with the dry ingredients so that the carbon dioxide is released in the batter and dough during mixing and baking.

Because sour milk varies in acidity, cream of tartar is often added to react with the soda. Two and a half teaspoons of cream of tartar react with one teaspoon of soda.

Baking powder is a mixture of baking soda and a dry acid or reacting salt. Baking powders are classified as "quick acting" which releases the largest amount of carbon dioxide when the mixture is cold, "Double-acting" baking powder is recommended when the food must stand for a

while before baking.

Baking powder was developed for convenience. Since it's a mixture, there is only one measurement--replacing the need to measure both soda and an acid. CORN MEAL MIX 16 cups corn meal 1-1/2 cups non-fat dry milk 7 tablespoons baking powder 2 teaspoons salt 2 cups fat (hydrogenated or lard)

Stir dry milk solids, baking powder and salt into the corn meal. Sift all dry ingredients together three times into a large mixing bowl, or onto a large square of brown paper. Cut in fat until very fine. Store in covered container. Use as desired for making corn meal products.

**CORN MEAL MUFFINS**

1 egg well beaten 1 cup milk or water 1-2/3 cups corn meal mix

Add egg to milk or water; mix well. Add liquid mixture to corn meal mix and stir until well blended. Fill well-greased muffin tins two-thirds full with batter. Bake at 425 degrees about 30 minutes or until golden brown.

Variations of corn meal muffins: Add 1/2 cup crisp chopped bacon, peanuts or cracklings to the mix before adding liquid.

Cheese Corn Meal Muffins: Add 1/2 cup grated sharp cheese to batter. Pour into greased muffin tins; sprinkle with 1/2 cup more of cheese.

Orange Corn Meal Muffins: Add grated rind of one orange to batter. Pour into greased muffin tins; bake. Spread immediately with frosting made by combining 1/2 cup powdered sugar, 1 teaspoon butter and 1 tablespoon orange juice.

Caraway Muffins: Add 1 teaspoon caraway seed and 1 teaspoon minced onion to batter. JALAPENA CORN BREAD 3 cups corn bread mix

2-1/2 cups sweet milk 1/2 cup salad oil 3 eggs, beaten 1 large onion, grated 3 tablespoons sugar 1 small can cream style corn 1/2 cup, 6 ounces, or according to taste, jalapena peppers, chopped fine 1-1/2 cups (3/4 lb.) American Cheese Grated Chipped crisp bacon and/or chopped pimiento, optional Mix ingredients in order as given in recipe. Bake in three well greased 8" x 8" pans at 400 degrees 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown. Serves 12.

## Gov. Briscoe To Be Mohair Meet Speaker

San Angelo -- Gov. Dolph Briscoe will be featured speaker at the annual meeting of the Mohair Council of America on Jan. 22 when Texas mohair producers get together to make final plans for a Mohair Referendum to be held in 54-counties on Feb. 10. The governor, who served as the Mohair Council's first president, has strongly endorsed the referendum.

## Excise Tax On Phone Bills Reduced 1%

The excise tax on telephone bills will be reduced 1 per cent -- from 7 to 6 per cent -- beginning January 1, 1976, as a result of the fourth step of a 10 year reduction.

The tax elimination was enacted as part of the Excise, Estate and Gift Tax Adjustment Act of 1970 calling for successive 1 per cent reductions in the excise tax on telephone bills on the first of each year, until the tax expires on December 31, 1981.

General Telephone customers paid an estimated \$2.1 million less in Federal Excise Taxes on telephone bills during 1975 because of the 1 per cent reduction in the tax beginning January 1, 1975.

Based on the 1975 excise tax of 7 per cent, General Telephone will have collected an estimated \$15 million from customers by the end of 1975.

The excise tax on telephone bills was first imposed by Congress during World War I as a "temporary" measure. Although repealed briefly after the war, the tax was reinstated during the depression and has continued ever since at varying rates as high as 15 per cent on local service and 25 per cent on long distance calls. From 1954 until 1971, it stood at 10 per cent.

## Community Services Grant Told

The Community Services Administration in Washington today announced a grant of \$39,833 to the Tom Green County Community Action Council, effective February 1.

According to Congressman Bob Krueger of the 21st District of Texas, the grant will provide for administration and general community planning services including job development and placement services, health and immunization clinics, and senior citizens transportation services.

The grant will run for two months and will serve nine other counties: Coke, Schleicher, Sterling, Menard, Crockett, Sutton, Irion, Reagan, and Kimble.

The meeting, scheduled for 10 a.m. at the La Quinta Motor Inn, will focus on the referendum. Meetings throughout the mohair producing region of the state have been conducted in the last few weeks by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service in cooperation with the Mohair Council to inform producers of the referendum proposition and to seek nominees for the Mohair Producers Commodity Board which will be elected at the same time. Balloting will be in county ASCS offices on Feb. 10. Producers unable to go to the polls on that day can vote absentee, provided the absentee ballots are mailed on or before February 7. Absentee ballots will be available from county agents, wool and mohair warehouses and from the Mohair Council, Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901.

In other business, the Council's membership also will elect directors to serve for the next year and new officers will be elected. A nominating committee, appointed by Council president James T. Hunt of Sonora in early December, will present a slate of officer candidates.

The mohair market, which has soared to record high prices, also will be discussed at the one-day session, along with reports on product and market development and various promotion programs being carried out by the Council. All growers are invited to attend, Hunt said.

## Lions Start Dist B'ball Play

The Ozona Lions began district basketball play here Tuesday night with a double header with Crane. The varsity participated in the Big Lake Tournament over the weekend, winning the first game against Stanton 56-48 and losing out to Iran 51-50 in the second game. Frankie Garza was named to the all-tournament team. Garza was high point man in both games with 15 and 14 points. John Galvan hit for 13 in the Stanton game and Greg Thompson had 10 points in the Iran game.

The junior varsity defeated Sonora 37-35 to win third place in the McCamey junior varsity tournament over the weekend. They lost the first game to McCamey 44-42, came back to beat Wink 72-40 and Alpine 55-41.

Clair McDaniel was high point man in the Wink game with 18 points and Danny Weant hit for 12. Orlando DeHoyos was in double figures in the final two games, hitting for 13 and 16 points.

Both teams will play in McCamey Friday night.

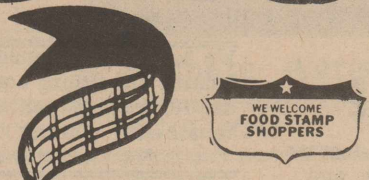
