

New Voter Registration **In Progress**

Crockett County Tax Assessor-Collector Billy Mills, said today that his office will mail new voter certificates to all persons registered as of January 31, 1976. This certificate will be good for the voting years 1976 through 1978.

Requests for information to up-date current rolls to comply with the new voter registration law were mailed this week to all registered voters. Mills stated, "No one will be removed or purged from the registration rolls for failure to return the information form, but I strongly urge you to assist our office by returning the request with all information blanks completed. "

After March 1, 1976, only the new blue certificates will be valid for voting.

Mills also urged all persons not currently registered to vote, or having moved since they last voted to re-register.

The \$5 Billion Giveaway

Most literate Americans know that the White House and Congress have been locked in a continuous fight over federal spending and taxing programs. How many know, however, that while the government has been haggling over how best to sock it to us taxpayers, it has quietly wiped out more than \$5 billion in foreign debts over the past three years? That's about \$24 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Under the direction of the President and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, several huge debts owed by foreign governments to the U.S. were "settled" for about two cents on the dollar. The governments involved owed us more than \$5 billion; they paid us \$112 million.

Naturally, the biggest winners were governments who like us least. The Soviet Union, which owed us \$2.6 billion in claims dating back to the lend-lease program of World War II, led the list. It settled the claim for \$48 million!

India, which clamped a dictatorship on its people during the last year and, at any rate, has been no friend to the United States, owed us \$2.2 billion. The slate was simply wiped clean on that one


Lest we seem like Scrooge in criticising the India transaction so soon after Christmas (which is, after all, the time for giving), let us take note of what Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.) recently said to his constituents about that transaction: "We provide financial assistance of every kind to India - yet she is hostile to the United States. ... While it is true that there is hunger in India, it is also obvious that India has diverted hundreds of millions of dollars of the aid that we sent to the government. And diverted it to what?

'On May 8, 1974, India detonated her first nuclear explosion after spending hundreds of millions of dollars in its development. This was money that India could have spent improving its agricultural system, so that their millions of hungry people could have food."



As the nation officially enters its Bicentennial year, there is one New Year's resolution we would commend to each of us: to ranged from Houston to the be thankful to live in the greatest country on earth, and to work to make it better yet.

Although a relative junior among the Family of Nations, the United States already possesses the oldest form of constitutional government in the world. This democratic form of government, however, relies peculiarly on the intelligence and good will of individual citizens. "Liberty lies in the hearts of men and women," said the late American jurist, Learned Hand, "When it dies there, no constitution, no law, no court can save it."


The Founding Fathers fashioned a system of government whose genius is that it maximizes individual freedom - to worship, to speak out, to create, to learn, to succeed. And the fruits of the system are matters of record.

"On any honest basis of comparison, the record of America speaks for itself," wrote Henry Grady Weaver in 1947. "In this republic, less than 7 percent of the earth's population has created more new wealth than all the other two billion people in the world; and the benefits of this great wealth have been more widely distributed here than in any other country - at any time."

Weaver's observation nearly 30 years ago is as timely today as it was then. The capacity of this nation to produce goods and services of almost every kind in abundance continues to astonish the world. While much of mankind, regrettably, lives in hunger, only about 5 percent of Americans are needed on the farms to produce considerably more food than the other 95 percent can consume. And the comforts available to average citizens here are unmatched anywhere.

At the same time that we have worked tirelessly to guarantee full opportunity to all our own citizens, we have taxed ourselves more heavily than any other people to help those less fortunate in other nations.

What does America ask in return from its citizens? Simply this: that we love her - warts and all - and that we vow individually to "preserve, protect and defend" her from all enemies.

This is one bright spot in the record of the 94th Congress, but the bill has not yet reached the floor.

The Congress' record on energy legislation is disastrous, however. 

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Perhaps our coldest weather of the winter came last week, anyway we can hope it was. If no rain, evergreens especially should have a good soaking now. If you have planted new shrubs or trees, be sure they don't dry out too much at any time.

Deciduous (bare-root) shrubs and trees may be purchased at a more reasonable price than balled and burlapped plants. They should do well if planted carefully. Inspect for bruises, tears, or breaks and prune back beyond the injured point. Remove excessively long and unwieldly roots. Also prune back tops of plants. Spread roots and gently fill in about them with top or mixed soil. Set plants at same depth as they were in the nursery or yard if just moving them. Apply water while planting to drive air pockets out. After soil has been filled in around the roots, tamp down surface to stabilize plant. Leave a space six inches around the trunk or stem of the plant to catch water. This can be filled in later. House plants face rather difficult conditions during January. The air indoors is likely to be exceedingly dry due to use of artificial heat. Keep varieties that prefer low temperature in cool locations and never near direct heat. During the short days of winter all house plants respond favorably to exposure of maximum sunlight and especially ones that bloom.

If you have an old fig tree that is over-grown and want to rejuvenate the plant, try a severe pruning. Select 3 to 8 vigorous, widely spaced stems to serve as leaders. Remove all other stems, and prune the leaders back about halfway. Thereafter, head back the bush each spring just before growth begins. At that time, remove 1/3 to 1/2 the length of the previous seasons growth. --0--



Excise Tax On **Phone Bills Reduced 1%**


The excise tax on telephone bills will be reduced 1 per cent -- from 7 to 6 per cent -- beginning January 1, and from the Mohair Council, 1976, as a result of the fourth step of a 10 year reduction.

The tax elimination was enacted as part of the Excise, Estate and Gift Tax Adjustment will elect directors to serve Act of 1970 calling for successive 1 per cent reductions in the excise tax on telephone bills on the first of each year, until the tax expires on December 31, 1981. General Telephone customers paid an estimated \$2.1 million less in Federal Excise Taxes on telephone bills during 1975 because of the 1 per cent reduction in the tax beginning January 1, 1975. Based on the 1975 excise tax of 7 per cent, General Telephone will have collected an estimated \$15 million from customers by the end of 1975. The excise tax on telephone bills was first imposed by Congress during World War I as a "temporary" measure. Although repealed briefly after the war, the tax was reinstated during the depression and has continued ever since at varying rates as high as 15 per cent on local service and 25 per cent on long distance calls. From 1954 until 1971, it stood at 10 per cent.




