Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Usually March is a month as varied as any during the year, especially in our area. It can be one of the most beautiful of the year, as pleasant as April, or more like January.

This month and next you can purchase flats, packs, and individual pots of ageratum, begonias, impatiens, marigolds, petunias, and others at the nurseries and garden shops. You can continue planting snapdragons, pansies, and violas for they will be dependable for several weeks yet, or until hot weather arrives.

If plant parasitic nematodes have become a problem in the garden or flower border, now is the time to treat the soil to reduce their number.

The chemical available at nurseries and garden supply centers for nematode control may either be applied to the soil before planting or used around established plants. Read the labels thoroughly, and follow instructions carefully.

Many vegetables can be planted this month, but wait another month for the soil to warm up before planting tender seedlings. Have protection available.

Most established lawns get their initial spring mowing this month. Cut the grass as short as possible and rake up the clippings. Also, rake out any dead grass killed over the winter. This will allow easier movement of air, fertilizer, and water into the root zone. After mowing, apply a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 at the rate of 25 pounds per 1000 square feet of lawn area. In addition make an application of iron sulfate (copperas) or chelated iron if grass looks yellow. Keep grass well watered if no rain comes our way. Also don't forget the evergreens especially need to be watered. Some lawns are having to be treated and replanted due to grub worm damage.

Debra Says

Turquoise is more fragile than diamonds, so Indian jewelry should be treated carefully. Avoid wearing the jewelry when doing rough work that could scratch or chip the stones. Also chemicals found in some detergents and hand lotions can discolor turquoise and affect the patina of the silver.

The silver itself should not be polished with any kind of solvent. The patina would be stripped, removing the natural highlights of the silver. To clean the silver, use a jeweler's polishing cloth (for sale at jewelry stores) to remove surface tarnish.

To store jewelry, wrap the pieces in old clothes and avoid stacking the pieces. Some jewelers suggest using the Indian method for storage--place the jewelry in cornmeal and store in a dry place. The small amount of oil in the cornmeal helps maintain the luster of the stone.

MERINGUE TOPPED PEACH CAKE
(makes one 13x9x2-inch cake)
2 cups (16-ounce can) sliced peaches
1/4 cup reserved peach syrup
2 tablespoons salad oil
1 package yellow cake mix
1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk plus water to make 1 cup
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup finely chopped nuts
Drain and dice peaches,

reserving 1/4 cup syrup. In large mixing bowl, combine cake mix, reserved peach syrup, oil, liquid instant milk and egg yolks. Blend and beat mixture according to time on package directions. Fold in drained peaches. Pour into greased and floured 13 x 9 x 2 inch baking pan. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until soft peaks form. Add brown sugar and cinnamon; beat until stiff but not dry. Spoon over batter and gently spread over to edges of pan. Sprinkle with nuts. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 40 - 50 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool at least 10 minutes. Cut into 12-15 portions.

Ozona Native Organizes Gvt. Program For Awareness Day

Alfred S. Garza, a native Ozonan, recently served as organizer of the first United States Government Printing Office (GPO) Spanish Speaking American Awareness Day Program. Highlighting the event were White House Special Assistant to President Ford, Fernando E. C. DeBaca and United States Civil Service Commission Assistant National Spanish Speaking Program Director, Santiago Rodriguez.

Garza, who is the National Spanish Program Coordinator for GPO, opened the ceremonies with remarks on the employment of Spanish background employees within the agency.

"The 115-year old Government Printing Office," he said, "has for years employed Americans of Spanish heritage. On November 5, 1970, when the President of the United States first announced the Sixteen-Point Program in support of Spanish American employment within the Federal Government, GPO already employed a recognizable number of Spanish background Americans. Today," he continued, "the Office employs five times as many Spanish persons as

in 1970 and percentage-wise ranks among the agencies with the highest number of Spanish American employees."

Garza noted that the average income of the Spanish American employed at GPO is higher than the national average. Employment is in a variety of fields covering various grade levels, with the largest number of individuals holding journeyman professional level positions.

"It is the intent and policy of this agency to continue equal employment opportunity practices for all. Nonetheless, employees as well as applicants have a responsibility for their own self-development and advancement by making their career interests known," he added.

In his concluding remarks, Garza stated, "The Spanish American will not be a forgotten person in this agency and I as National Spanish Program Coordinator for GPO will do all that I can and

that is all that I can do."

Garza is a former employee of the Ozona Stockman. A Federal employee for 16 years, he came to the U. S. Government Printing Office as a journeyman in the graphic arts area and was promoted to National Spanish Program Coordinator in 1973. His brother, Pedro S. Garza, Sr., is a long-time employee of the Crockett County Road Department. --0--

- Operate your dryer with a full load.

- Keep lint filter clean. A dirty lint filter can lengthen the drying time and present a fire hazard.

Operate your dryer with a full load. Do not over-dry. Over-drying any fabric increases wear and tear and causes yellowing, in addition to using more energy. Use leftover heat to dry light synthetic garments and only partially dry items which are to be pressed immediately. Keep lint filter clean. A dirty lint filter can lengthen the drying time and present a fire hazard. Vent your dryer to increase its efficiency. Occasionally check the vent to make sure it is not clogged. A clogged vent can cause your dryer to consume needless energy and presents a potential fire hazard.

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Oil Fields Continue County Development

Dorchester Exploration Inc., Midland, completed two Canyon oil discoveries in Crockett County, approximately 12 miles north-northeast of Ozona.

The No. 1-B Massie West, 1/2 mile west of the depleted Canyon opener and Ellenburger re-opener and 5/8 mile north-west of the Clearfork opener and current lone producer in the Ozona, North field, was finished on a gas lift for 15 barrels of 43.8 gravity oil, plus 1.6 barrels of water, with gas-oil of 1,350-1.

Production was through perforations at 7,692-713 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 10,000 gallons and 12,500 pounds of sand.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,578 feet; San Andres, 1,514 feet; Wolfcamp, 5,347 feet; Canyon sand, 7,560 feet; Pennsylvanian lime, 7,959 feet; and Ellenburger, 8,028 feet.

Drilled to 8,195 feet, it is plugged to 7,913 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,711 feet from the east lines of 6-TG-GC&SF.

The Crockett, East (Devonian oil) field of Crockett County was opened Feb. 17 with completion of H. L. Brown, Jr., Midland, No. 1-6 University, 13 miles southwest of Rankin.

It was finished for 223 barrels of 45.4 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,928-1, through a 13-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,104-113 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 6-14-University.

Delta-Suburban, Odessa, has dually completed as a one-mile west extension to the Hum-Baggert (Strawn gas) field and as a Canyon producer in the Ozona multipay field of Crockett County its No. 3-29 Couch, 15 miles southwest of Ozona.

From the Strawn it was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 940,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 9,095-416 feet, which had been acidized with 2,250 gallons and fractured with 18,000 gallons.

From the Canyon it was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,400,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 135,685-1, through perforations at 6,350-930 feet, which had been acidized with 2,300 gallons and fractured with 60,000 gallons and 60,000 pounds of sand. Gravity of the condensate was 64.2 degrees.
