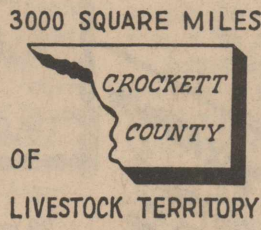

Funeral services for Lucio S. Diaz, 63, were held Saturday at 5 p.m. in Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church with burial in Lima Cemetery with military honors.

Mr. Diaz died Thursday morning in the Veterans Hospital in Big Spring, following an illness.

He was born December 13, 1912 in Silver Valley, Texas, and had lived in Ozona most of his life. He was a veteran of World War II and was a prisoner of war in Germany. He lost two brothers in the war, Manuel and Pablo. He spent most of his life as a shearing captain.

Survivors include his wife, Rosa; two sons, Santiago Diaz and Pablo Diaz, both of Ozona; two daughters, Enemencia Flores of Ozona and Lucia Bittner, of El Paso; two brothers, Bekie Diaz of Ozona and Teodilo Diaz of North Carolina; three sisters, Mrs. Paula Leal, Mrs. Josefa Perez and Mrs. Anita Fierro, all of Ozona; his mother, Mrs. Enemencia Diaz of Ozona; and four grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Victor Munoz, Sr., Conrado Flores, Raymundo Ponce, Ernesto Garza, Ramon Hernandez, and Manuel Garcia. The firing squad under the command of Napoleon Vitela, were Lalo Ramos, Antonio Fierro, Catarino Cervantes, Gregorio Maskill, Cayetano Angiano, Jose Martinez, and Oscar Flores.

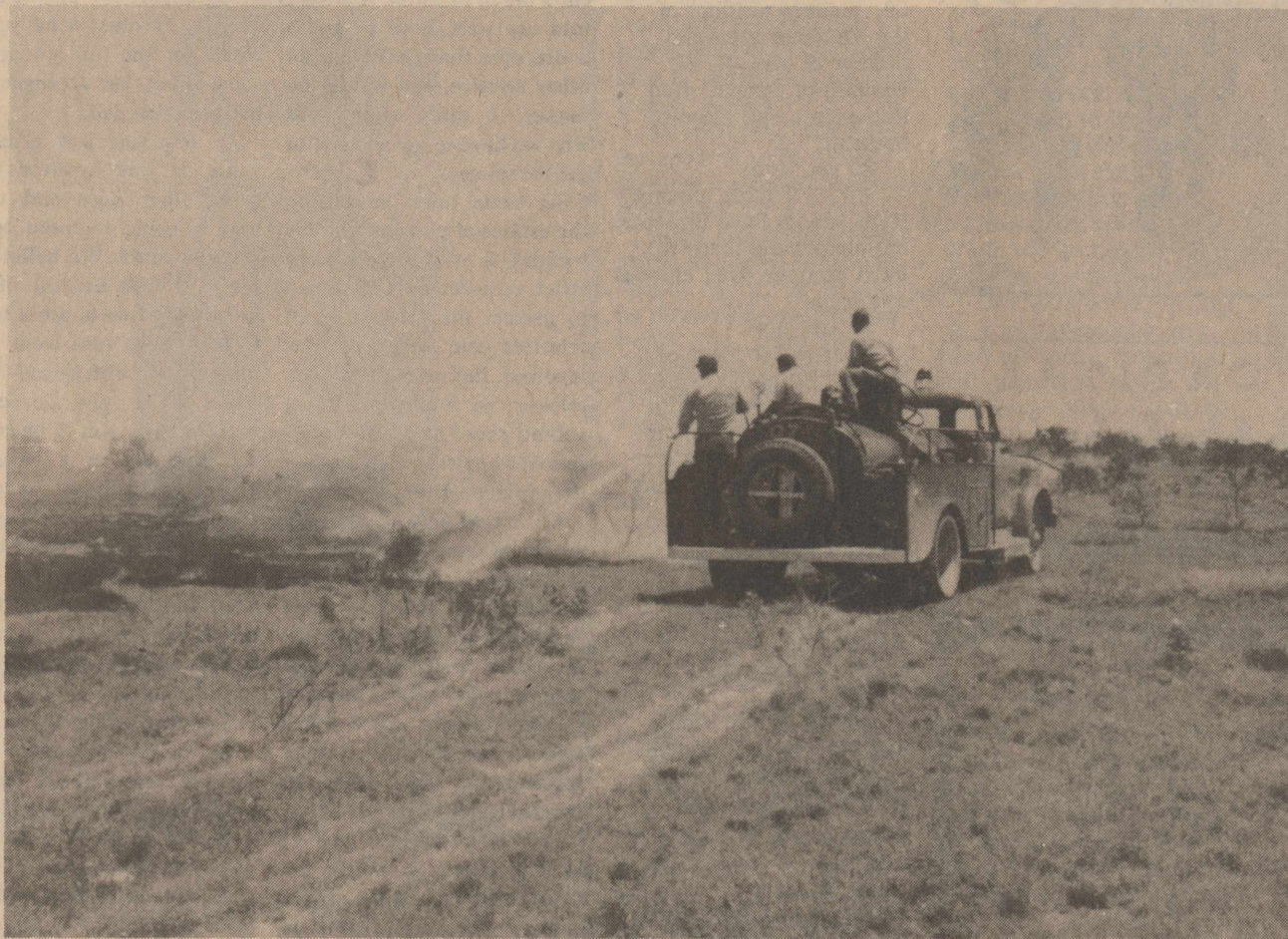
Tillman Ranch Elected To Angus Assn.

Moore Oilers Take Over Little League Lead

Moore Oil took the undisputed lead in Little League play here over the past week, leaving Crockett Automotive and Ozona Oil tied for second place and Ozona National Bank in the cellar, having yet to win a game. Tonight, Thursday, will wind up first half play and there will be no games next

week. The second half will get under way the following week.

In the first game Thursday night, Moore Oil wiped out Crockett Automotive 15-0. Blake Simpson was the winning pitcher and Harvey Huereca the loser. Varlyn Aldridge was the leading hitter for the Oilers, and really got things started in the second inning with a grand slam home run. He also had three singles. Ernie Borrego hit a three-run homer in the fifth inning and the Oilers scored 7 runs to end the game on the ten-run rule. Rudy Enriquez had a double for the hapless Automotive crew.

The second game was a squeaker with Ozona Oil edging Ozona National Bank 6-5. Winning pitcher was Hector Leal and losing pitcher was Ken Stokes. Leal had two doubles to lead the Oilers attack. Geno Tambunga and Kelly Buckner had two hits each for Ozona National.

Monday night Crockett Automotive beat Ozona Oil 2-0. Winning pitcher was Rudy Enriquez, getting the first no-hitter of the

season. Losing pitcher was Deigo Leal. Leading the hitting for the winning team were Dale Perry and Harvey Huereca with a hit each. Moore Oil beat Ozona National 4-0 in the second game. Winning pitcher was Blake Simpson and loser was Kelly Buckner. Leading the hitting for Moore Oil were Robert Massey with two hits and Varlyn Aldridge with a home run. Roy Tambunga had the only hit for Ozona National.

Absentee Balloting Heavy In Commissioner Run-Off

Absentee voting in unusually large numbers points to a large voter turnout here for the Saturday run-off election or Second Democratic Primary. The two state races seem to hold little or no interest for Crockett County voters, but the County Commissioners race in Precinct 1, is holding the spotlight.

County Commissioner Jesse Marley is being challenged by hopeful Sostenes DeHoyos. DeHoyos led the ticket in a three-man race in the May Primary, but failed to get a majority of the vote. Jerry Hayes got 124 votes to throw the race into a run-off between Marley and DeHoyos. Marley led in the absentee box in May, but indications are that DeHoyos will probably hold the edge in the absentee balloting this time, since his campaign manager has been transporting voters to cast absentee ballots daily since absentee voting started May 26, and no such activity has been observed in Marley's behalf.

A total of 264 absentee ballots had been cast at 1:30 Tuesday, the final day to vote absentee, and of that number 256 were Precinct 1 votes. Also, there were 39 ballots which had not been received by mail as of Tuesday. Should these ballots arrive by Saturday, they will be counted. This would be an astonishing 295 absentee ballots cast in Precinct 1 alone, well over one-third of the 766 eligible voters on the voter list. One could almost say the absentee vote will tell the tale in this race, unless the other 471 voters get out and get to the polls Saturday.

In the state races, a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals will be elected. The race is between Judge Carl Dally, 52, who is now serving as a Commissioner on that court, and W. T. Phillips of Waco, who has been in the legal profession 39 years.

The other state race will

be for Railroad Commissioner. Jon Newton, the odds on favorite in the crowded May primary, will go up against long-time politician and former Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler. Newton, a 34-year-old attorney is a member of the Governor's Energy Advisory Council and the Interstate Oil Compact Commission. Sadler has been in retirement since his defeat for State Land Commissioner in 1970. Sadler's defeat six years ago followed an official reprimand by the House of Representatives for refusing to cooperate in an investigation of his handling of Spanish treasure discovered off the coast.

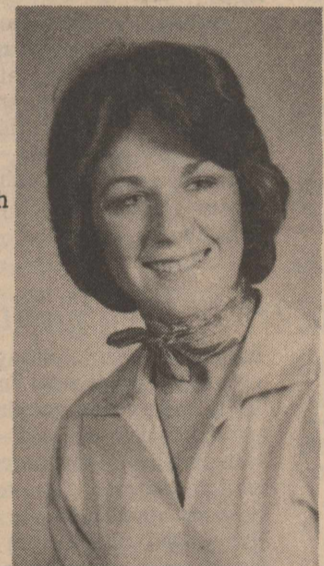

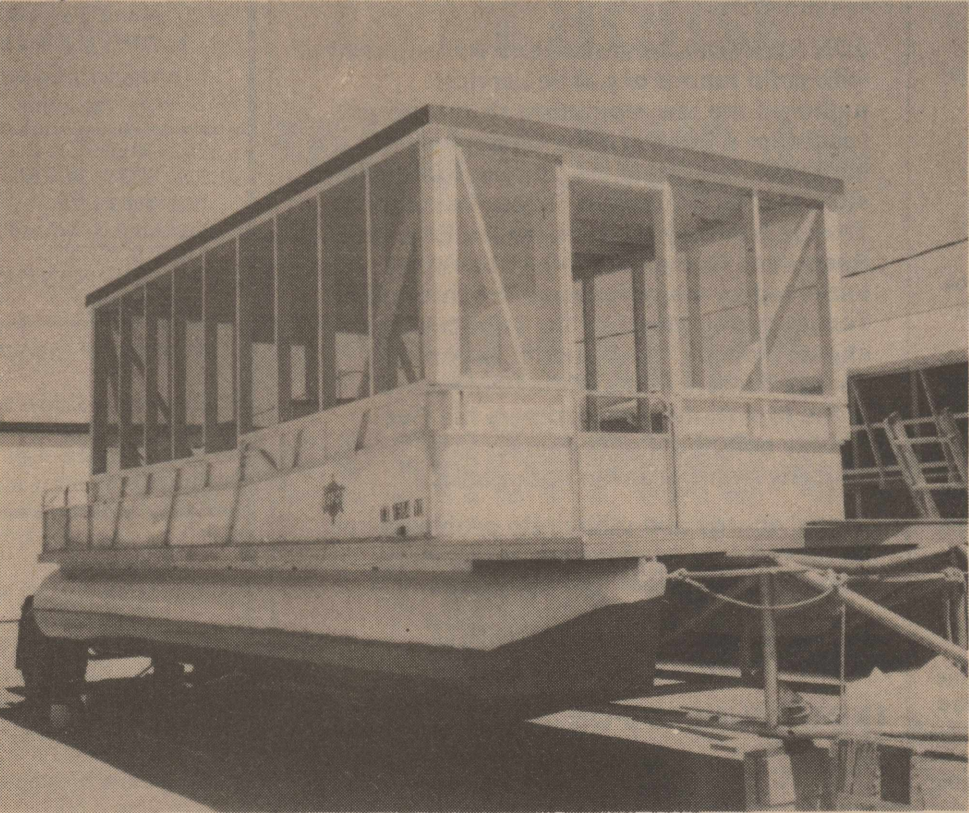



Versatile is the word for milk--and since June is Dairy Month, this is a good time to check the family's milk drinking habits. Adults and children under 9 years of age need two eight-ounce servings each day. Children aged 9-12 and pregnant mothers over 19 need three or more servings a day, while teenagers and nursing mothers require four or more servings daily.

Milk is an excellent source of calcium to help form bones and teeth and keep them strong. It's hard to get enough calcium in the diet without consuming milk in some form daily. The protein in milk builds and repairs body tissues, helps the body fight infection and supplies energy. Milk is also rich in riboflavin, a B-vitamin that helps keep skin healthy and vision clear.

To give family members their recommended amount of milk each day, serve it as a beverage, in products made with milk such as ice cream and cheese or use milk in preparing main dishes, soups, sauces and puddings.

SUNSHINE FRUIT-CREAM MOLD
3 oz. pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 cup pineapple liquid and cold water
6 lettuce leaves
20-oz. can drained pineapple chunks
6 mint springs.
1 cup seedless grapes, halved
1/2 cup whipping cream
1/2 cup process Cheddar cheese, coarsely shredded
6 small grape clusters

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; stir in pineapple liquid and water. Chill until thick but not set. Fold in cheese, pineapple chunks, grapes; mix gently. Whip cream; fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart mold or six individual molds. Chill until set. Unmold on lettuce. Garnish with grape clusters and mint springs. Makes six servings, 3/4 cup each. 235 calories per serving.

VANILLA ICE CREAM
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup cornstarch
1/4 tsp. salt
1 quart milk
4 eggs, beaten
2 tbsps. vanilla
1 quart table cream

Mix sugar, cornstarch, and salt in a large saucepan. Stir in milk gradually.

Mix sugar, cornstarch, and salt in a large saucepan. Stir in milk gradually. Cook over low heat stirring occasionally until thickened, 12-15 minutes. Stir a small amount of the hot cornstarch mixture into the beaten eggs; then stir the eggs into the remaining cornstarch mixture. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly four or five minutes longer, or until the mixture is about the consistency of pudding. Chill thoroughly. This step is essential for a smooth ice cream. Stir in vanilla and cream. Pour into a one-gallon ice cream freezer canister; fill not more than two-thirds full. Freeze in a handcranked or electric ice cream freezer packed with a mixture of one part ice cream salt and six parts crushed ice.

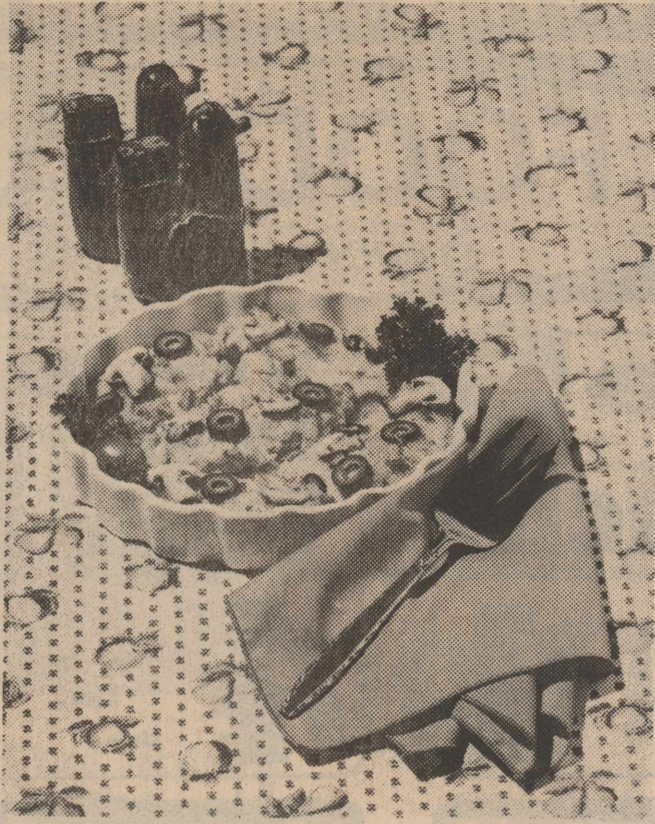

CHICKEN MARTINI CASSEROLE

- 4 whole broiler-fryer chicken breasts, halved, skinned, boned
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 tsp. flavor enhancer
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup corn oil
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1/3 cup chopped mushrooms
- 1/4 cup dry martini mix
- 1/2 cup sliced ripe olives

Sprinkle chicken with flavor enhancer, salt and pepper. Coat with flour. Heat corn oil in frying pan over medium heat. Add chicken and brown on all sides. Remove chicken to baking pan. Pour off excessive pan drippings and add broth, mushrooms and martini mix. Stir well and pour over chicken. Bake in 350 degree oven, uncovered, about 40 minutes or until fork can be inserted with ease. Garnish with olives. Yield: 8 servings.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

June will be a busy month for Ozona gardeners. Vegetables that were planted in April and May are well established with some now being harvested and canned. Also, bedding plants set out earlier should be blooming well.

If you haven't planted caladiums, June is an excellent time to plant, since the soil is warm enough for rapid growth. They add coolness and color to shaded spots in the garden. Used in borders, beds or containers, they brighten are otherwise bland situation. Caladiums are especially effective around water, and stay attractive most of the summer. Plant the tubers 12 to 18 inches apart and 2 inches deep in soil that is well fertilized with organic matter. Keep soil moist but not wet.

Floribundas like it hot. Better adapted to hot weather conditions than hybrid

tea roses, they continue to bloom all summer.

In addition to providing colorful garden displays, these roses also make good cut flowers. To conserve growth energy, always snip off flower clusters as soon as they fade. They will benefit from a summer mulch and should be given plenty of water during dry spells. Feed every 6 to 8 weeks with a complete fertilizer during the growing season.

Everyone is urged to make a special effort this month to have every yard in Ozona looking its most colorful, and well groomed for the July 4th Bicentennial Celebration. Too, many tourists will be passing through our city this summer, and we want them to continue complimenting Ozona as the most beautiful little city in West Texas. This should encourage every business firm to freshen up their area too, with a new coat of paint if needed, and clear off all rubbish. Will you help with this project by doing your part?

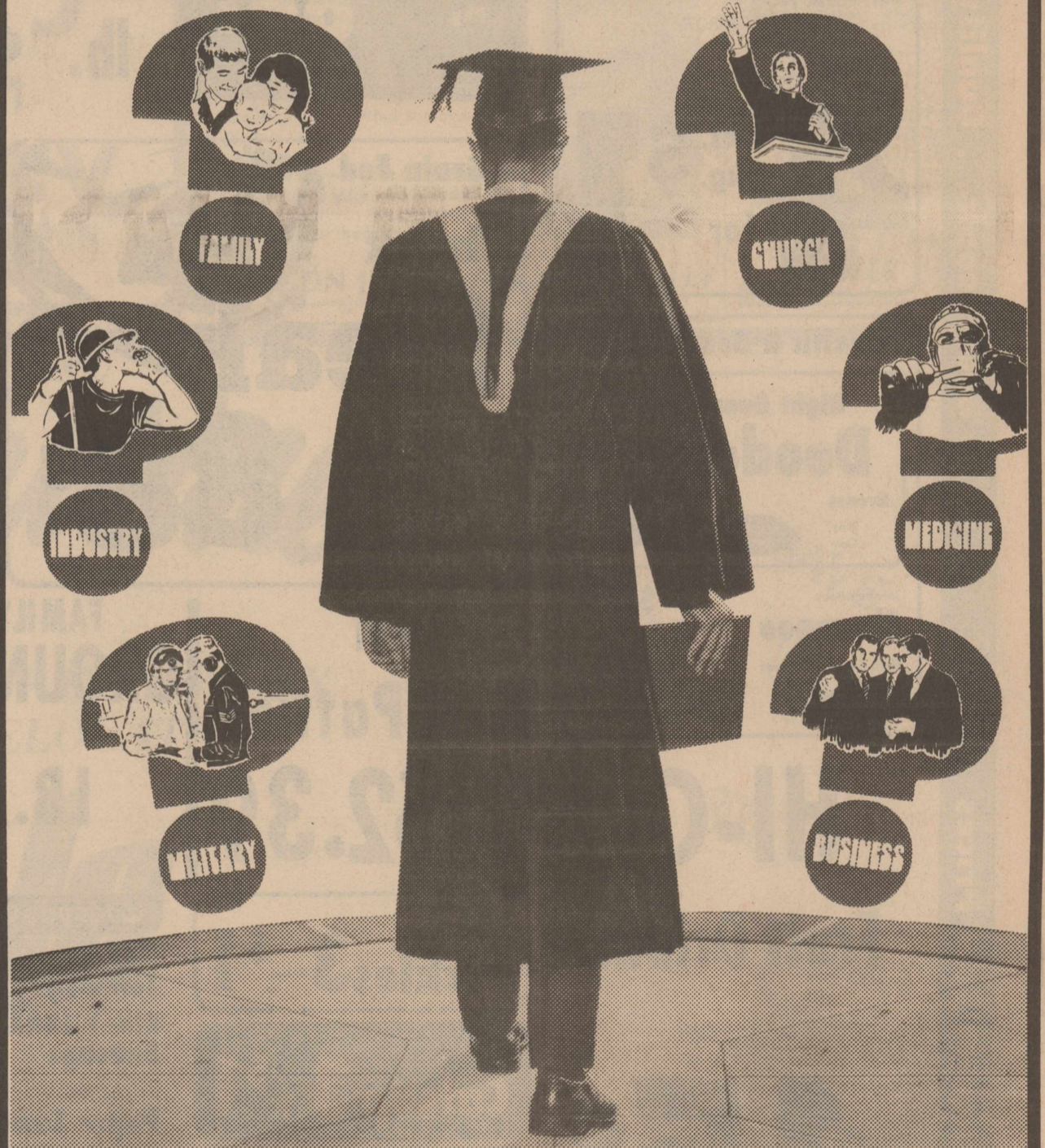

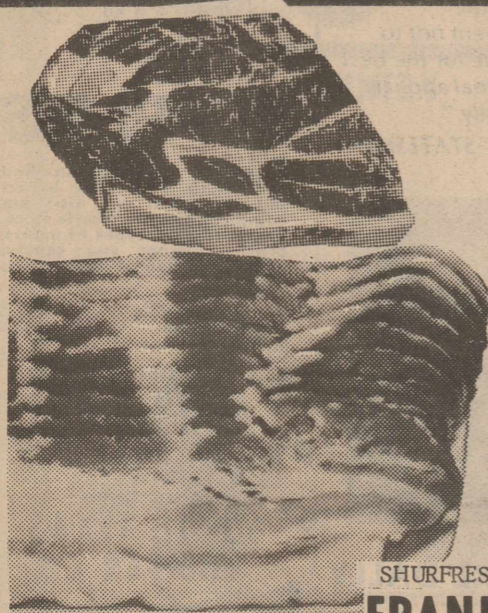

Land Management Threat Eased

A vast land-management program planned by the Forest Service of USDA has been averted, thanks to vigorous opposition by the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. Under the Forest and Range Land Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974, the Forest Service had announced its intention to project management procedures for all privately owned lands as well as public lands.

David Witts, attorney for the Association, attacked this program in statements to Early Butz, secretary of Agriculture, and John R. McGuire, Chief of the Forest Service, pointing out that the Act passed by Congress specifically stated "federal lands" and not privately owned lands were to be included in this management program. After reconsideration, the Forest Service altered its plan to an "assessment

... of the nation's forests and rangelands" in the proposed study, secretary-general manager of the TSCRA, John R. McGuire stated: "We recognize that there has been some misunderstanding of the intent and scope of the Resources Planning Act with respect to non-federal lands. The legislation provides that an assessment would be made of the Nation's forests and rangelands. This assessment is not a commitment to do speci-

fic things, but an analysis of the present situation, of how things came to be as they are, and what the outlook is and where the present course will take the nation."

Land management laws are popular methods of government meddling in the affairs of private citizens, according to Witts. "This is a prime example of bureaucrats overstepping their boundaries," he said, "to go beyond the intent of Congress. We must keep a constant vigil against this kind of encroachment if land owners wish to retain their freedom to manage their possessions as they desire." Witts added that the steady monitoring of government action by TSCRA is to be credited for averting this potentially disastrous situation for farmers and ranchers before it gathered enough momentum to become un-stoppable.

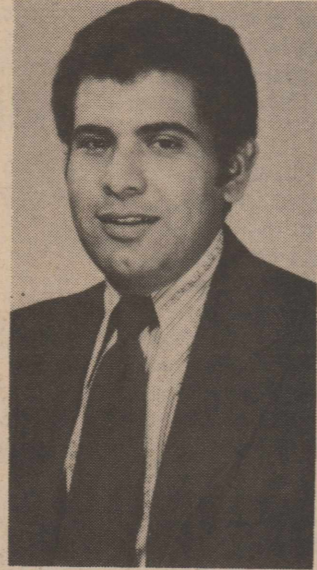

symbolic drive of 70 descendants of the incredible Longhorns, described by some as "wild as a tornado, stronger than a blue norther and as smart as an Apache." Ramrods for the Texas Tech University Trail Drive are Ace Reid, cowboy cartoonist, and James DeLesdernier, inspector for the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Participating in the celebration will be the cities of San Antonio, where trail drives were originating as early as 1779, Kerrville, San Angelo, Stamford and Midland. The cattle will be trailed along thoroughfares in those cities to introduce many to the legendary breed that made men of greenhorns for more than a century.

In each city, the drive is expected to be a part of America's 200th birthday celebration.

When the drive arrives at the Ranching Heritage Center July 2, there will be dedicatory ceremonies led by Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson who, with the late President Johnson, owned a working Hereford ranch.

The Mexican ambassador to the United States, Jose Juan de Olloqui--representing a country which developed American cowboy techniques--will welcome the Longhorns' arrival as well representatives of four other of the nations which contributed to America's ranching heritage.

Dale Robertson, who has depicted the American westerner in film and television, will be master of ceremonies for the dedication ceremonies and the Ranching Heritage Center's formal opening July 2-5.

The 12-acre center is a collection of a score of authentically restored ranching structures depicting the history of America's ranching industry. Special tours have drawn more than 100,000 visitors to the unfinished site since the first building arrived in 1970.

The opening is an official national Bicentennial event.

"The trail drive," Schreiner said, "should cause Americans to look over their shoulders. If people don't think about their heritage and let their roots run deep, they can't progress.

"Americans should be

proud of their ancestor, proud of the people who built this country," he said.

The trail drive will help people glimpse the heroes of the past.

Schreiner is one of the founders of the Texas Longhorn Breeders Association created in 1963. The Longhorns for the trail drive come from his YO Ranch at Mountain Home, near Kerrville, from the Wichita Falls area ranch of Carter McGregor and from a herd belonging to Don Harrison of Houston.

Their herds were started by surplus purchases from the Wichita Wildlife Refuge in Oklahoma, where 30 Longhorns were brought in 1927, at a time when they were an endangered species. There were estimated then to be only a few hundred left although 10 million of the wild cattle were gathered and trailed north after the Civil War to furnish beef for a hungry nation.

The trail drive, known to most Americans only through books, television and film, is symbolic of America's western history. The Spanish and Mexicans passed along ranching techniques to the Texans, and it was from the coastal

plains of Texas that the great range cattle industry spread in an explosive boom throughout the American West after the Civil War.

By 1890, Texas cows, Texas cowboys and cattlemen, and Texas methods of ranching were found in every state and territory west of the Mississippi River and in Canada.

History records three trail-driving booms in Texas. The first, from 1779 to 1803, saw about 15,000 head trailed annually from Spanish ranches in Texas to markets in Louisiana.

The second began in the 1830's with drives from Texas into Louisiana, but later the drives moved to the north and even into California to satisfy the appetites of Gold Rush miners.

These trailed Longhorns were descendants of Spanish herds which had multiplied and run wild. They developed into hard, wiry animals that could travel well and live longer on less care than any other breed of cattle before or since.

The third and biggest Longhorn boom exploded after the Civil War when men returned home, beaten financially but strong on imagination and courage.

They found the rangy animals outnumbered people about six to one and were theirs for the taking. And the Texans took them, about 2,500 at a time, to meat-hungry northern markets.

The 1976 trail drive will be symbolic, with fewer cattle than the authentic drives and with some trucking over the route; but the system will duplicate the drives that changed America from a pork eating to a beef eating nation. A trail drive--a highly organized operation--and a trail boss in command and a ramrod as overseer. The cook, who was either competent or fired, applied the meals. A swamper helped the cook and performed odd jobs. Cowboys, or drovers, herded the cattle.

Two cowboys rode point and guided the movement of the herd. Swing men rode farther back. Toward the rear were flankers to prevent the herd from spreading or wandering. Cowboys riding drag at the back of the herd picked up strays and kept the animals moving at about 10 miles per day.

Schreiner, whose grandfather was one of the first to contract with ranchers to trail cattle to northern railheads, said that any who want to can join the Texas Tech Bicentennial Drive. Each participant should furnish his own horse and trailer and will be asked to pay \$175 per person or \$300 per couple to help cover costs.

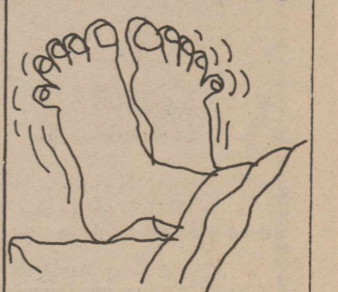
The Bicentennial cowboys will receive special recognition, will participate in all events along the trail and will have food for their mounts.

Select Cattle On Growth

Beef cattle selection programs should include consideration of the lifetime growth patterns for weight and for other measures of size, such as height.

No single growth pattern, says Dr. Charles R. Long, animal scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is optimal for all beef production systems, or even for all phases of a single system.

Long advises producers to identify "growth curves" and characteristics which will help them reach breeding goals.

What's a growth curve? The scientist defines the term as a lifetime sequence of measures of animal size, plotted against age.

"A more general term would be size-age curve, such as weight-age, height-age, length-age or other size measure plotted against age," Long explains.

The most commonly used measures, he points out, are weight at weaning, post-weaning average daily gain and yearling weight. Few selection programs consider other measures of size, such as height,

or weights at other ages, such as maturity.

"While weight at or near the usual selling age is important, since payment is usually based on weight, other considerations are critical to long term success of a selection program, or of a beef production system," Long notes.

Experiment Station studies which show that, because of relationships among cattle weights at different ages, selection for weight at one age will affect weights at other ages. Therefore, the cattleman should consider the lifetime growth pattern in deciding upon a specific selection program, believes Long.

After the best growth patterns are identified, breeds should be chosen and combined, breeding stock selected, and the cattle managed to correspond to the optimal growth patterns.
