## Ozona Lions To Open Season Friday Night In Big Lake

Ozona is gearing up for the opening of the local football season Friday night with the Reagan County Owls in Big Lake. Game time is 8 p.m. and if years past are any indication, Ozona fans will be on the road and gone before 7 o'clock. The annual game is traditionally a hard fought battle on both sides and the stadium is standing room only. Although the Owls and the Lions are not district rivals this year, the game promises to be an exciting one.

Last Friday's practice scrimmage with Rankin was for the purpose of evaluating the teams under game conditions, and the Lions did very well indeed. Both teams used the event to iron out problems in both offense and defense in preparation for the upcoming season. As well as regular plays each team had opportunities to run plays in short and long yardage situations, and to practice goal line defenses.

Coach Rip Sewell was well-pleased with the Lions and as the statistics show, he had good reason. The Lions rushed and

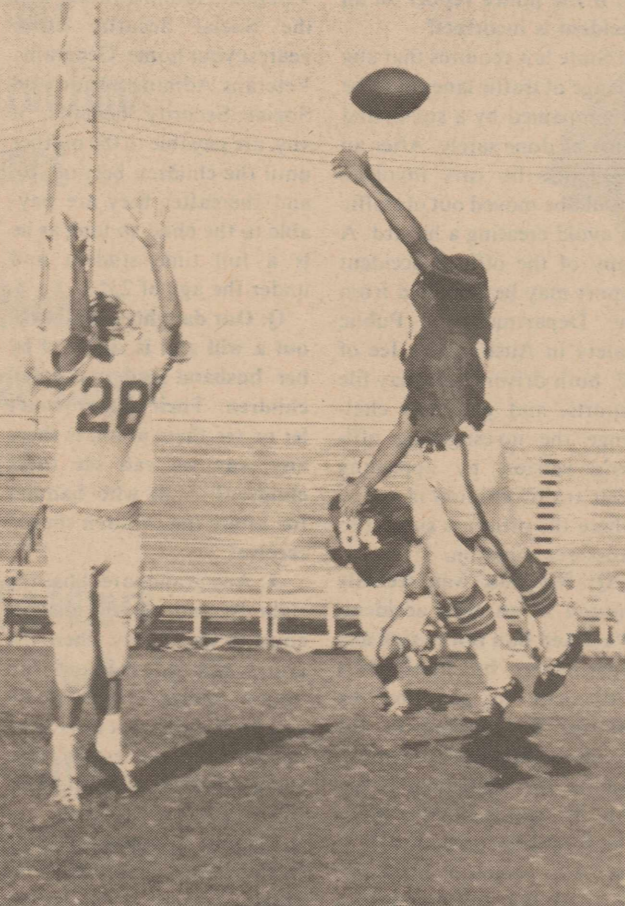
## For Sam Rios

## County Budget Hearing Is Scheduled

Crockett County taxpayers will have an opportunity to see where their money goes Monday, Sept. 13, when a public hearing will be held on the county budget for the year 1977. The hearing will be held in the courthouse at 2 p.m. on that date.

All Crockett County taxpayers have the right to attend the hearing and participate in the proceedings. This will be the only opportunity taxpayers will have to express their approval or disapproval of the new budget which is expected to see a substantial increase over that of previous years.

Tax rates will be established following adoption of the budget. Property owners have been advised that tax rates for next year will be increased, but no official figures have been made public. Following adoption of the budget the figures apparently will be released.

The budget will allocate funds for salary increases, road department funding, hospital funding, and all other county-operated funding. It will be one of the most important hearings Crockett County taxpayers can attend.

## Old Maude Defies Moving Efforts

Old "Maude" the Babcock flatbed press sat sedately on her reinforced concrete foundation year after year, decade after decade, silently for five days of the six day work week, but roaring out with full throat on "her" day, doing her job putting words and pictures into print for the weekly editions of The Stockman through its growing years.

Came the day of the offset method of reproduction—much better, faster, easier and cleaner than the old "hot type" method. That's when the tired old press was halted for its final revolution. For some six years now she has sat gathering dust, her joints stiffening with mechanical arthritis, never turning a gear, never hearing her motor kick off. Useless, she sat forlornly—her belts were removed for cosmetic effect, her ink fountain dipped to prevent "blackups."

For at least three quarters of a century the press had occupied its position above a concrete pit, left open to repair her belly gears if ever needed. Meager tho the information is, word has it that the press "went through the Ben Ficklin flood." That occurred sometime in the late eighties or early nineties at the then Tom Green county town of Ben Ficklin near present San An-

gelo. In fact, San Angelo grew into prominence only after Ben Ficklin was destroyed. We credit that bit of information about the old press to Ed Blanton of the pioneer San Angelo print shop known as Holcomb & Blanton.

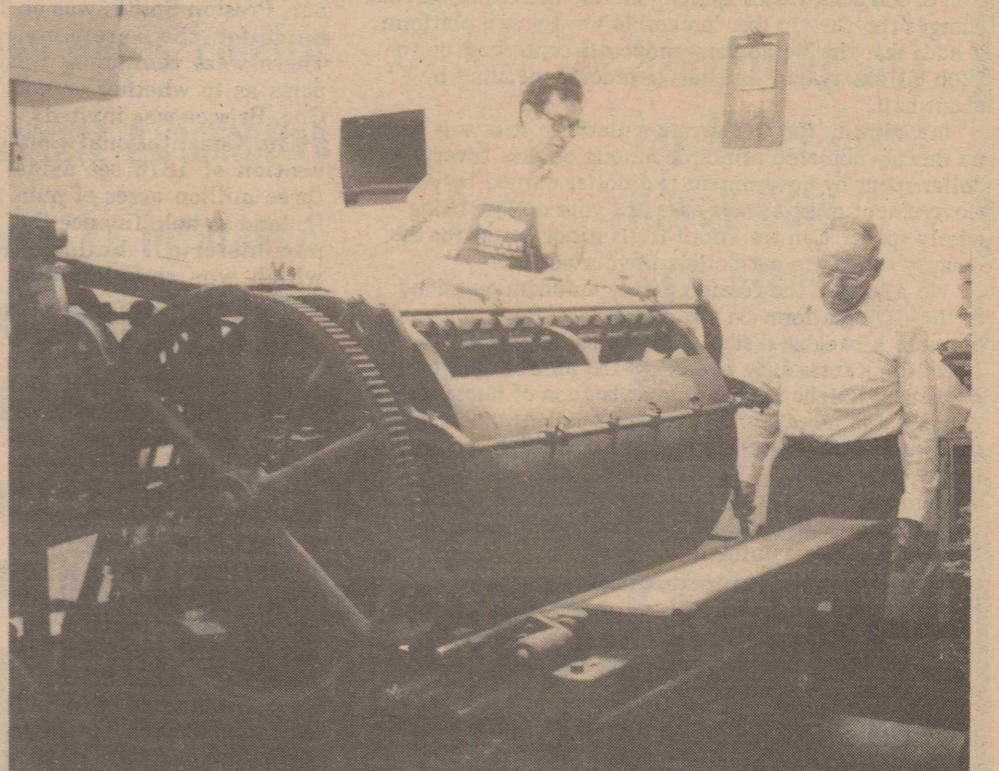
Came lately the need of more space in the growing Stockman production plant. Old Maude was useless and so she must

go. A junk dealer offered a bit of pocket change for her carcass and it was accepted just to get her out of the way. But the man took a second look and decided he didn't want her as a gracious gift—so tough did her hide look.

Turns out his was a wise decision. Kitty Montgomery, the Stockman publisher, decided she

needed the space bad enough to give the press to a local man if his crew would dismantle it and carry it off. And a start was made the past weekend but old Maude defied their best efforts. They could take off her moving parts, her feed table, her ink rollers and light stuff like that, but the workers got down to her massive

**NATIONAL DEFENSE AND THE NOVEMBER ELECTIONS**

People will give you all sorts of reasons for voting for a particular candidate. It may be that he "has a nice personality" or "a nice smile" or that "he seems sincere" or "he promises to get rid of corruption."

All of these, and more, may be perfectly reasonable yardsticks to use in measuring a man's qualifications for the Congress. But this year, 1976, it would appear somewhat necessary that people look beneath the surface characteristics and examine the question: "How does the candidate stand on the matter of national defense?"

Consider: In 1945, the "world balance of power" was heavily in our favor. We were at the very peak of military might and strength; we had a vast war machine, backed with all the tremendous economic power of the most amazing industrial machine in the world, geared to the production of arms, ammunition, and military equipment of every description.

Today? Colonel Robert D. Heintz, U. S. Marine Corps (Retired), defense correspondent for the Detroit News gives us these facts about the balance of power.

"Russia today spends more money for arms than any country in the world since World War Two. This enormous surge even exceeds Hitler's in the 1930s. It is sweeping steadily upward without pause. Russia now spends 20 percent or more of its GNP on arms. By contrast, we are allocating just over 5 percent of our GNP to defense. During the last ten years, Russia has outspent the United States in every military capacity."

What has been the result of this year-in and year-out trend? Colonel Heintz ticked off a few of them: "The USSR now has twice as many troops as the United States."

They have 1,600 intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs). We have 1,054.

The USSR has 42 thousand tanks. We have 9,000. They have 20 thousand artillery pieces. We have 6,000.

The Soviet Navy, which has outspent and outbuilt ours for a decade, has 229 major surface warships. We have 172.

The Soviets have 225 general purpose submarines. We have 76.

Is not this the year when our people need to face facts and elect to Congress those candidates who will work to reverse the present disastrous trend in the world balance of power?

**GOP PLATFORM BETTER THAN DEMOS'**

Whatever else came out of the recent Republican convention in Kansas City, one thing that emerged was one of the best platforms to be offered the American people in many, many years. It is, going away, far better than the pie-in-the-sky document hammered out by the Democrats a month earlier.

Although party platforms traditionally are quickly researched and written and just as quickly put on a shelf forever, there are reasons to believe the GOP platform this year will be around as a guiding light to Republican leaders for years to come. Chief among the reasons is one Ronald Reagan who has vowed to nudge President Ford - privately at first, then publicly if necessary - if he deviates from promises made in the 68-page document.

The Republicans had the benefit of the Democratic platform to refer to, and they made the most of the opportunity.

"... The Democrats' Platform proposes over 60 new or expanded spending programs and the expansion or creation of some 22 Washington agencies, offices or bureaus," charges the GOP in the "preamble" to its own platform. It adds that the Democrats' proposals could cost up to \$200 billion a year, increasing federal spending by about half.

In contrast, the GOP wrote a platform it says is based on this no-nonsense principle among others: "Every dollar spent by government is a dollar earned by you. Government must always ask: Are your dollars being wisely spent? Can we afford it? Is it not better for the country to leave your dollars in your pocket?"

We also like the foreign policy amendment added to the GOP platform on the convention floor. In good measure a backhand slap at Henry Kissinger - no favorite of the Kansas City gathering - the amendment calls Alexander Solzhenitsyn a "great beacon of human courage and morality" for his "compelling message that we must face the world with no illusions about the nature of tyranny." The amendment also criticizes agreements such as that signed in Helsinki a year ago which "take from those who do not have freedom the hope of one day gaining it."

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**LABOR DAY THOUGHT**

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

AUSTIN — House Speaker Bill Clayton is crusading to check the constant upward spiral of state spending but getting little encouragement.

Clayton's motion to order the Legislative Budget Board staff to cut agency budgets 10 per cent was toned down to recommend the reduction where there would be "no significant loss of services."

Few agencies so far have indicated they could operate without "significant loss of services" with a reduced budget.

LBB Assistant Director Jim Oliver said selected agency requests would boost spending above the projected surplus (not including increases for prisons, youth correctional facilities and welfare).

Meanwhile, LBB approved for inclusion in the proposed budget draft a pay raise of about six per cent for state employees.

Clayton argues that if spending continues to increase at the rates of recent years, the state will be bankrupted or major new taxes must be enacted.

The speaker is aiming at House reorganization to save a quarter of a million dollars. Some jobs will be eliminated.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe has recommended creation of a \$1 billion capital reserve fund for investment in the era of surplus and Clayton has come up with a similar idea. The speaker concedes, however, passing a temporary one per cent reduction in the sales tax might be easier. Demands for increased budget demonstrate neither will be very easy.

**Capitol "Historic"**  
Texas State Capitol at last is "historic."

A marker proclaiming it as such was dedicated in the rotunda last week.

Only one former governor, Preston Smith, was on hand for the ceremony. There were conflicting reports as to whether or not Gov. Briscoe was invited.

The Constitutional Convention of 1876 set aside three million acres of public land to help finance the now-historic building, which was completed in 1888.

**Aid Plan Developing**

Public meetings by the State Bar this fall will attempt to determine needs and develop a plan to meet needs of the developmentally disabled.

Plans will attempt to aid those suffering from autism, cerebral palsy, epilepsy and mental retardation. Hearings will be held September 13 in El Paso, September 14 in Midland and September 16 in Amarillo.

**Loan Hearing Held**

A key state loan program for Texas college and university students may be in danger of a \$6 million a year cutback.

A Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System committee held a hearing this week to discuss a proposed U. S. Office of Education restriction on the Hinson-Hazlewood program.

The program could face a substantial cutback in its line of credit for federal insurance in 1976-77 unless the Board and USOE can agree on a plan to reduce the overall default rate of 15.56 per cent.

USOE wants the Hinson-Hazlewood loans limited to students at Texas institutions where default rates are confined to 10 per cent. Unless the agreement is reached with federal authorities, the program's lending capacity may be cut back from \$21.1 million last year to \$15 million. Many institutions have raised strong objections. Some default rates run as high as 41.8 per cent.

**AG Opinions**

State law prohibits public disclosure of city inspection reports on nursing homes, but federal law allows access to the information. Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

The Animal Health Commission has authority to require inspection for ticks on herds located on premises in a free area suspected of infestation and to require stock yards to construct scratching chute facilities at private expense for tick inspection.

Austin State School may not use appropriated funds to lease or otherwise acquire facilities in San Antonio for residential services programs for mentally retarded persons in Bexar County.

Facade easements to a building's exterior (without disturbing private control of the interior) are valid in Texas and may be granted to Texas Historical Commission.

**Unemployment Down**

State unemployment rates dropped to 5.7 per cent in July — four-tenths of one per cent below the June figure.

Texas Employment Commission Chairman Harold K. Dudley said the decline follows a seasonal pattern, since many remove themselves from the labor force if unable to find employment by midsummer.

Last year's July rate of joblessness was six per cent.

The July work force was 5,469,500, with 5,156,500 employed. Total employment for June was 5,149,000.

National unadjusted jobless rate for July was 7.8 per cent.

Texas rates vary regionally from a low of 3.5 per cent in the Amarillo area to 12.1 per cent in the Laredo area. The Dallas-Fort Worth rate was 5.1 per cent and the Houston rate 5.9 per cent.

**Bill's Scribblings**

Have you ever heard or read a story similar to this one? An art dealer discovers some paint flecking off a painting which reveals another painting beneath the surface painting. Then the dealer carefully removes the remainder of the surface painting to expose the other painting. The surface painting was a cheap work of an unknown painter, but beneath it was a masterpiece by Van Gogh or some other famous painter.

It occurs to me that our lives can become so covered up with artificial and superficial things that we "hide" the beautiful masterpiece of our lives. Hidden beneath is the beautiful artistry of our Creator: goodness, justice, mercy, hope, and love.

Christianity is often hidden by superficial imitations; expensive church buildings, gaudily dressed people, and meaningless rituals. The Apostle Paul expressed a fear about this corruption when he wrote: "--I am afraid, lest as the serpent deceived Eve by his craftiness, your minds should be led astray from the simplicity and purity of devotion to Christ." (II Corinthians 11:3)

Perhaps the reason that I am so conscious of this corruption is because, in my opinion, preachers are the most notorious offenders. Occasionally someone will say: "You do not look or act like a preacher." Is this a compliment or an insult? How should a preacher look and how should he act? I am afraid that the common criterion of preachers is one of sanctimonious attitudes and actions. Many preachers encourage the masquerade by "playing a role"; they dress in black and talk "religiously." Jesus came to this world as both God and man, but preachers can relax because they are asked to be only men. Paul wrote to Timothy, a preacher, and said: "Flee from youthful lusts, and pursue righteousness, faith, love and peace, with those who

**Q: If a car pulls in front of me to switch lanes and I'm unable to avoid hitting the car from behind, who is at fault? After an accident, is it necessary to leave the cars where they stopped? What can you do if the police report on an accident is incorrect?**

**A:** State law requires that any change of traffic lanes must be accompanied by a signal and must be done safely. After an accident, the cars involved should be moved out of traffic to avoid creating a hazard. A copy of the official accident report may be obtained from the Department of Public Safety in Austin for a fee of \$2; both drivers also may file reports, and you may challenge the investigating officer's version by appealing your traffic citation in court, where the officer is subject to cross-examination.

**Q: My son was recently injured in an auto accident. We asked him not to sign any legal papers, but he signed a settlement to pay for the injuries he suffered in the accident. My husband and I believe the settlement is too low. My son is 20 years old—can I void the settlement?**

**A:** Any person over the age of 18 is free to enter into a contract. Unless a court determines a person to be incompetent, that person's contracts could not be rescinded by a parent. As his parent, you have no right to contract for your son or to reject his

**Q: My husband served four years in the navy. Now that I'm a widow, what benefits are available for me and my sons aged 13 and 14?**

**A:** You should contact the Veterans Administration and the Social Security office nearest your home. Generally, Veterans Administration and Social Security benefits, if any, are payable to the mother until the children become 18, and thereafter they are payable to the child so long as he is a full time student and under the age of 23.

**Q: Our daughter died without a will and is survived by her husband and two small children. Their father won't let us see them at all. Is there any way we can see these children? And, who handles the estate the children should receive?**

**A:** Any grandparent has the right to petition the district court in the county where the grandchild resides in order to obtain visitation rights. To do so, the grandparent asks to be named as a possessory conservator of the child and asks the court to compel the managing conservator, who in this case apparently is the child's father, to make the child available for visitation. 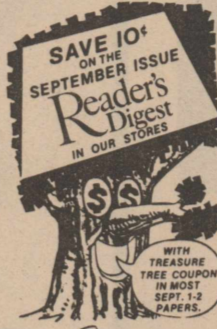

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

September is the beginning of the Autumn season in the South, and happens to be my favorite time of the year. It's one of the busiest times for many gardening activities including fall vegetable garden, bedding plants setting out container grown trees and shrubs, preparation for over seeding your lawn, and general clean-up of the home grounds.

If weather continues dry this month, be sure to supply sufficient water to keep plants from being weakened.

Continue to separate and replant perennials as needed when plants become overcrowded. Some of these to be concerned about include irises, day-lilies, and shasta daisies.

Proper care is the only assurance you have that roses will produce good fall flowers. They must be watered periodically, mulched thoroughly, fertilized every month, and sprayed for insect and disease control each week.

Roses cut late in the afternoon will last longer than those cut in the morning. Reason is that more food is stored in the plant tissues in the afternoon; the cut bloom lasts as long as its store of food reserves lasts. Also, flowers use their food reserves faster when placed in a warm room than when placed in a cooler one. Immerse the cut stems in warm water as soon as possible after cutting, and put them in a cool, dark place for several hours before arranging, or exhibiting them.

As the growing season moves into fall, survey the plants you have in hanging baskets to determine their needs. Are plants getting the amount of light they need? Ferns want indirect sunlight, while geraniums will tolerate full sunlight. Turn baskets occasionally if necessary to allow light to reach all the foliage. As temperatures cool, less water will be required. So water less frequently, but continue to do a good job thoroughly when water is applied.

Continue to feed hanging plants with a complete water-soluble fertilizer. Keep plants groomed to encourage compact new growth and a profusion of bloom. This is especially important with such plants as fuchsia, impatiens, lantana and petunia. Pinch off dead flowers and discolored or damaged leaves at least once a week. Keep a close watch for insects and disease problems. Remove infected plant parts and spray if needed.

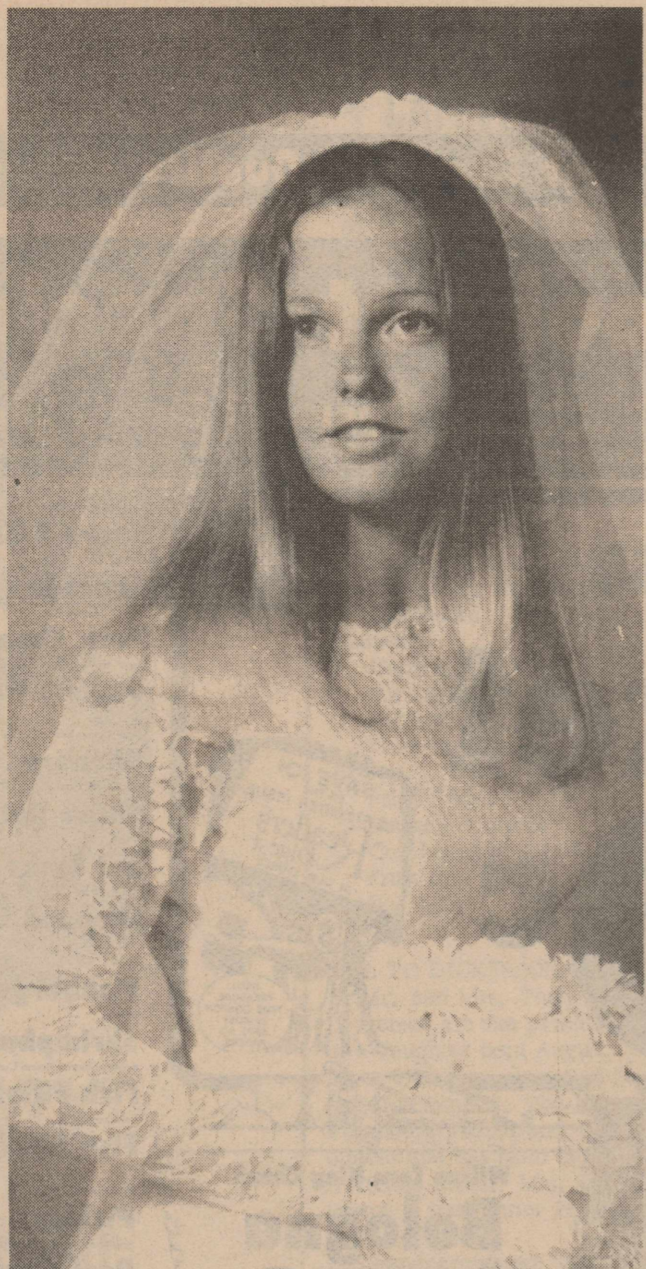

Real leather, suede and their fabulous fakes are continuing as one of the most popular outerwear categories for everyone this fall. Current styles feature more detailing and fashionable design variations. Popular colors include buttery tans and earth tones of rust, mocha and brown shades.

Real leathers and suedes are more expensive than a year ago. Costs for cowhides have risen almost 50 percent, while sheep, lamb and pig skin costs have remained stable. Sharply soaring costs of real fur—five to 100 percent higher—and lamb shearing trims will limit their availability except in the more expensive price ranges.

Realistic-looking, and more affordable, fake fur trims will be seen in the popular price ranges. Real and fake fur trimmed styles will be more popular than a year ago—as much as one-third of the market. Since outerwear garments are a major investment, consumers should shop carefully. Real leather

and suede garments should be well-matched in color and texture. They should be supple enough to conform comfortably to the body during wear. If possible, lift the lining and examine the wrong side of the leather or suede. If it is a different color on the wrong side, any surface scuffs will be visible.

Garments should fit comfortably since alterations are difficult. Stitching cannot be let out without showing. Restitching in the same place further perforates and weakens it. Care instructions should be followed exactly. Often special procedures or cleaning specialists are recommended. Some fakes are only washable or dry-cleanable, not both, or may be neither.

Also, it is wise to save all hang tags and the sales slip in case the garment does not perform satisfactorily after following the recommended care instructions and needs to be returned to the store.

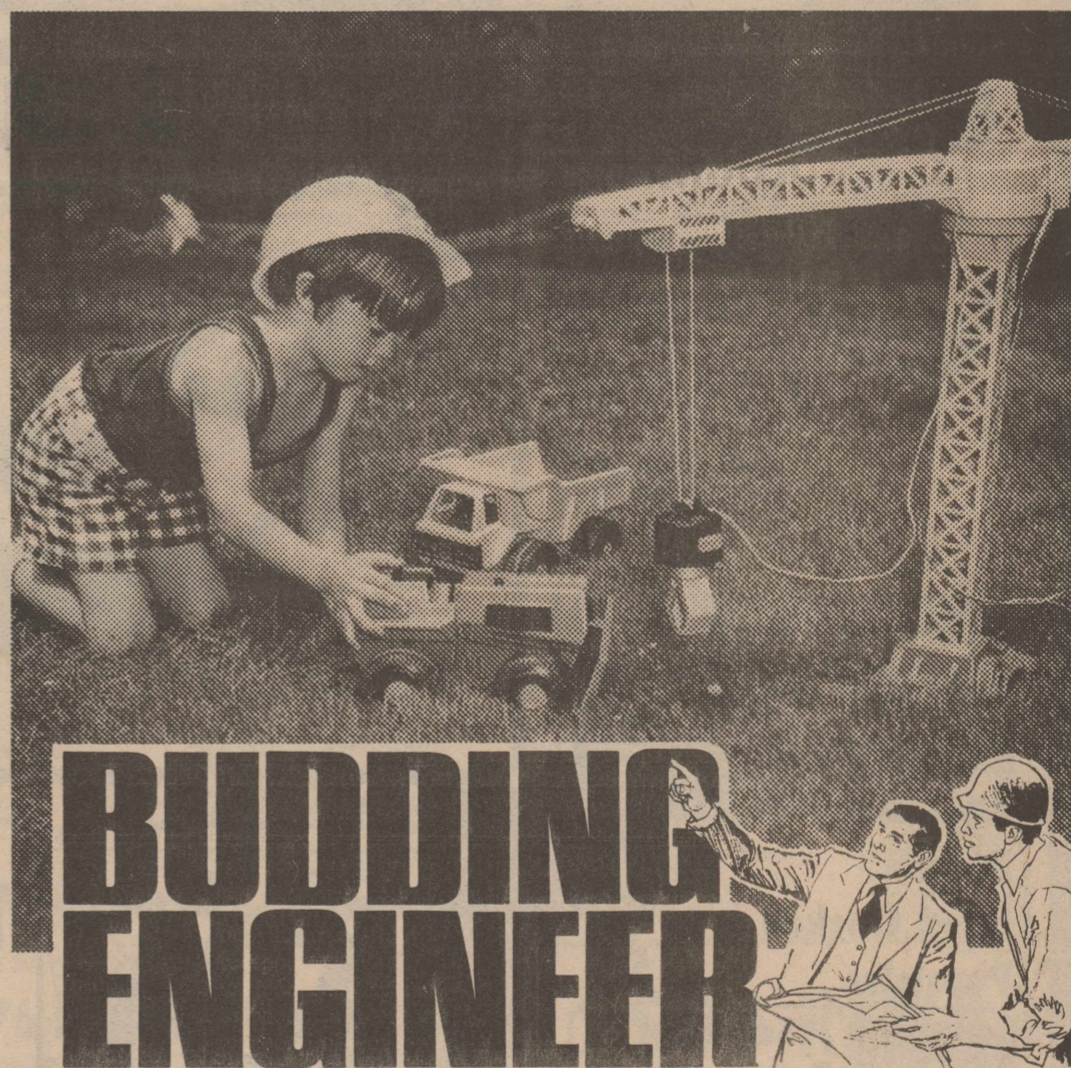

**General Mills Scholarships Available To H.S. Seniors**

College scholarships of \$500 to \$5,000 are available to high school seniors through the General Mills Search for Leadership in Family Living, now in its 23rd year. Invitations to enroll in the program have been mailed to high schools across the nation. Schools new to the program can write the General Mills Search, P. O. Box 1113, Minneapolis, Minn. 55440, for information. The 1976 winner of the

top \$5,000 scholarship is a boy, the first in the history of the Search. He is Dan McVicar, Broomfield, Colorado.

Enrollment deadline for the 1977 General Mills Search is November 1, 1976.

On Tuesday, December 7, each participating school will administer a 50-minute written examination. Prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Inc., Chicago, this general knowledge and attitude examination is the first important step of the scholarship program.

From the examination results a General Mills Family Leader of Tomorrow will be chosen for each participating school. School winners are acknowledged with special awards and their examinations are entered in state competition.

Each State Family Leader of Tomorrow receives a \$1,500 college

scholarship while every state second-place winner receives a \$500 grant. State winners also earn for their school a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," from Encyclopedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

State winners will be the guests of General Mills next spring on an expense-paid tour of Williamsburg, Virginia, and Washington, D. C. A special event of the tour is announcement of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, whose scholarship is increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The General Mills Search, known as the Betty Crocker Search for its first 22 years, is on the advisory list of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

**Fire Ant Control From Fla. to Tex.**

As one entomologist recently put it, "20 years is a long time to be in an ant fight". But that's approximately how long the South has been trying to control the spread of the fire ant. Current estimates indicate an infestation of 133 million acres in a 9 state area, reaching from Florida to Texas.

Fire ant mounds are an easily recognizable sight in agricultural areas, but the fire ant is an urban, as well as a rural problem, invading lawns, golf courses, parks, playgrounds, school yards, cemeteries and even homes. The threat this insect poses may be as minor as unsightly mounds on your lawn, or as major as a severe allergic reaction to its sting, resulting in illness, or even in death.

Controlling the fire ant is a problem, simply because there are not very many chemicals which are effective. Mirex has, over the years, provided some good control. However, the nation's only Mirex plant, in Prairie, MS, was recently shut down by the manufacturer, Allied Chemical, and the plant was subsequently bought by the state of Mississippi. While Mirex is now being distributed by the Mississippi Authority for Control of Fire Ants, it is available on a limited basis, primarily to state-sponsored programs. This limited availability,

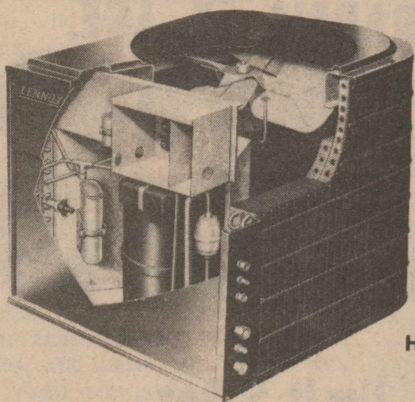
coupled with the Environmental Protection Agency's restrictions on number of applications as well as places Mirex can be used, severely hampers the success of any control program.

One additional recourse for homeowners is to make individual treatments with chlordane insecticide. Chlordane is one of the only commercially available insecticides for consistent effective control of fire ants. According to a recent EPA ruling, chlordane has been allowed for use for fire ant control "in view of the public health problem which may result from the fire ant sting and bite."

Currently available as a liquid, a dust and in granules, chlordane fire ant killer should be applied at label rates for broadcast application and/or for individual mound treatments. After 3 weeks following any of these treatments, examine the treated area. Any surviving colonies should be retreated.
