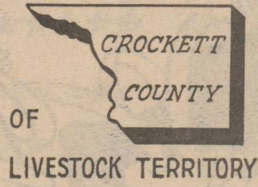

Lions Blank McCamey 27-0 For Fourth Win In A Row

The Ozona Lions captured their fourth straight victory last Friday in McCamey by defeating McCamey 27-0 and will host the Seagrave Eagles Friday night in what should prove to be a real thriller. Early in the first quarter, Orlando DeHoyos returned a punt for 36 yards to put the ball on McCamey's 40 yard line. After another play, Randy Allen connected with John Galvan for a 35 yard touchdown pass. John Galvan then toed the P.A.T. The Lions were leading 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Orlando DeHoyos made a spectacular play by intercepting a McCamey pass and running it back 88 yards for a touchdown. The P.A.T. failed, but at the half the Lions were leading 13-0. The next touchdown in the fourth quarter was also scored by DeHoyos. This time, he broke for 34 yards for the touchdown. John Galvan added the extra point. The drive was good for 54 yards and lasted 24 seconds.

Later in the fourth quarter, with 5 minutes 51 seconds remaining on the clock, it was Gary Warren's turn for a touchdown. He too intercepted a McCamey pass and ran it back for 45 yards. Galvan tacked on the extra point to make it 27-0 Lions.

Leading rushers for the Lions were Warren with 90 yards, Blake Moody with 64 yards, and DeHoyos with 45 yards. DeHoyos also had the best average for the night with a 15 yard per-carry average.

Outstanding defensive players were Mike Fay with seven tackles, five quarter-

back sacks, and one recovered fumble. Ricky DeHoyos with seven tackles, three sacks and one recovered fumble, Douglas Bean with six tackles and one sack, Clyde Bailey with six tackles and Clifford Crawford with six tackles.

County Gains Gas Discovery

H & D Water Well Drilling & Service, Inc., Junction, No. 3 Shannon Estate, Crockett County unidentified gas discovery, one location east of the Ellenburger opener and lone producer for that pay and one mile north-northwest of Shallow oil production in the Wyatt field, but separated by shallow failures, and 12 miles northwest of Ozona was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 44,500 cubic feet of gas daily.

Indian Wells, Inc., Ozona, will drill three outposts to an eight-well southwest extension area of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field of Crockett County, 21 miles southwest of Ozona.

All the projects are contracted to 7,000 feet.

The No. 1-2 C.C. Montgomery Estate, 1/2 mile east, is 1,263 feet from the south and 1,193 feet from the west lines of 2-R-TCRR.

The No. 2-1 C.C. Montgomery Estate, 1 1/4 miles southeast, is 937 feet from the north and 922 feet from the east lines of 1-F-TCRR.

The No. 1-1 Montgomery Estate, 3/4 mile southeast, is 1,605 feet from the north and 1,960 feet from the west lines of 1-R-TCRR.

Lions have not yet been tested by any football team they have played, with the possible exception of Marfa. He feels, however, that next week's game with the Seagraves Eagles should test the Lion's ability. He said that Seagraves is comparable to Ozona's district competitors, Kermit, Sonora and Crane, and that their defense is similar to the Reagan County Owls or to the McCamey Badgers, but their real power lies in their offense. Seagraves has been in the play-offs approximately 17 times out of the last 25 years. Coach Sewell feels the key to a victory in the game will lie in the Lions not having any turnovers, and maintaining a strong defense. This week's game should show what the Lions are really made of.

West Texas Blood Services is a nonprofit organization located in San Angelo servicing over 40 hospitals in West Texas. The blood center is committed to the totally volunteer blood program to eliminate commercialism and profiteering. The charge to the patient who uses the blood reflects only the actual cost for drawing, processing and distributing the blood. The patient is not charged for the blood itself.

Qualified, medically trained and supervised personnel will be on hand to screen potential donors, draw and process the blood. Members of the Ozona Womens League will serve as hosts providing refreshments for donors.

4 Crockett County Deputies Resign From Department

Ozona and Crockett County made the news around the state last week when all the deputy sheriff's resigned from the department.

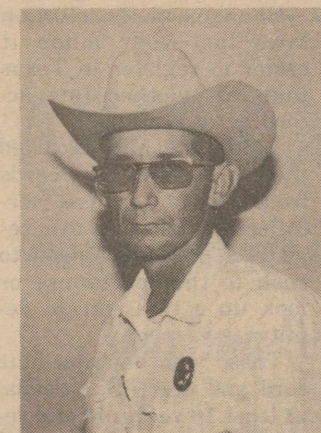
Chief Deputy Jim Goss resigned Wednesday and at the same time announced his candidacy for sheriff as a write-in for the November 2 election, against Sheriff Billy Mills, whose name will be on the ballot as Democratic Party nominee.

Jim Goss Announces Candidacy

Jim Goss, Chief Deputy for the Crockett County Sheriff's Department for the past fourteen months, resigned his position and announced his candidacy as a write-in for the post of Crockett County Sheriff in the upcoming November 2, election late last week.

Goss, 35, has been with the Department here for the past two years. Prior to that he was employed as a heavy equipment operator. Goss, his wife, Barbara, and children, Connie, and Tony, have lived in Ozona for five years. He attended school and was reared in Sonora.

In announcing his candidacy as a write-in, Goss said, "I feel that I am qualified to fulfill the duties of the office in an efficient and capable manner."

Goss charged that "under the present administration of Sheriff Billy Mills, the laws of this county and the state have not been enforced with fairness or efficiency," he added "I propose to change this policy if elected. I have served the county for the past two years as Deputy Sheriff, and over half of this tenure was in the capacity of Chief Deputy. I have both experience and knowledge of the duties of the sheriff's job.

The other three deputies, T.J. Hill, Jerry Goss and Jerry Capers resigned the following day. All three cited as reasons, inability to function under Sheriff Mills as peace officers, not being allowed to enforce the law fairly and impartially, and a desire to work for the write-in campaign election of Chief Deputy Jim Goss.

All three men, in a letter submitted to the sheriff, the commissioner's court and the newspaper, made it clear they did not wish to resign and leave the county without adequate law enforcement personnel and left the effective date of their resigna-

Mike Baker Killed In Auto Accident

James Michael (Mike) Baker, 24, was killed in a two-vehicle accident Monday morning at 8:15 at the intersection of U.S. 285 and FM 1776, about 14 miles northwest of Fort Stockton in Pecos County.

Baker's pickup was hit broadside by a 1975 Ford driven by Guadalupe R. Dominguez, 22, of Fort Stockton. The pickup burst into flames and Baker was trapped inside, according to the Department of Public Safety report. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Pecos County Justice of the Peace Tillie Cook. Dominguez and a passenger, Gilbert Lopez, also of Fort Stockton, were in serious condition at Fort Stockton Hospital late Tuesday.

Funeral services for young Baker were held Wednesday morning at 10 a.m. in the Ozona First Baptist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

He was born in San Angelo May 24, 1952 and attended schools in Ozona. He graduated from San Marcos Academy and had attended Southwest Texas Junior College and Howard Payne College. He was reared in Crockett County and was a rancher. He was married Verna Gene Newport March 21, 1975 in Eldorado. They had made their home on the Baker ranch near Fort Stockton.

Survivors include his wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Baker of Ozona; a brother, Fred Baker of Fort Stockton, and his grandmothers, Mrs. Alice Baker and Mrs. George Bean, both of Ozona.

Sheriff Mills said he was taken by surprise at the mass resignations, but as an afterthought felt a sense of relief. He stated that the three deputies had not performed their duties in an efficient manner and had been hired when he was ill several months ago. He sent out applications for the vacated positions state-wide and has had several applicants. He said, however, that before hiring anyone they would have to pass a board of review.

He assured the citizens of the county that law enforcement was not in peril in Crockett County. He is being assisted by Department of Public Safety personnel, federal officers of the U.S. Border Patrol and Texas Rangers, and these officers will assist the department until it is re-staffed.

When asked about the charges leveled against him by the former deputies, he said he frankly did not know what they were all about. Sheriff Mills said in all his years as Sheriff of Crockett County, he had been "as fair as I knew how to be in all my dealings with the public."

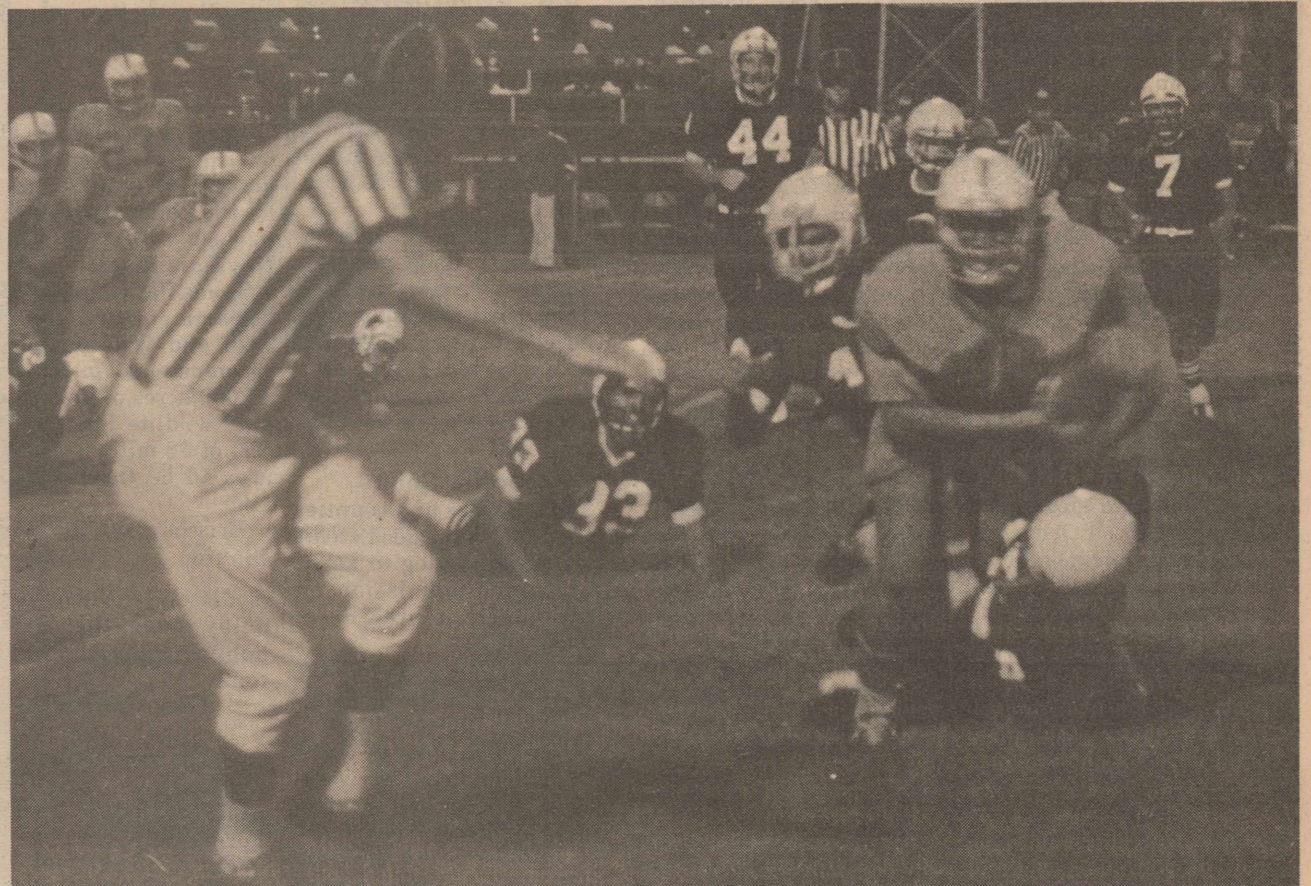
Sheriff Mills said he had no political axe to grind with any of the men, and had never had any hard feelings following a political race with an opponent, and he was not going to enter into any kind of political infighting at this time. He did say, however, that his name will be on the ballot in November and he will appreciate all the support he can get.

Former Chief Deputy Goss has been conducting an active campaign since leaving the department, and officially announced his candidacy in the newspaper today. He will kick off his campaign at a reception at the Civic Center October 4.

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CBS'S 'SALANTED' DEFENSE NEWS

CBS-TV News is arguably the single most powerful molder of public opinion in the United States. As such, it has a clear moral responsibility to present important topics fairly, with reasonable coverage being given to opposing sides. More than that, under the Fairness Doctrine of the Federal Communications Commission, CBS has a legal responsibility to present news that way.

But on the single most crucial issue facing America and the free world—that of its own survival—CBS has failed miserably in recent years to give its viewers more than its own narrow view of the state of the nation's defense. Specifically, an independent study of CBS-TV News programs for 1972, 1973, 1975, and 1976 proved that the network almost totally blanketed out the fact that a significant number of Americans believe the U.S. military is not as strong as it should be.

Based on the results of this landmark analysis, the American Security Council Education Foundation has now filed a formal complaint against the Columbia Broadcasting Systems, Inc. with the FCC, charging CBS with "massive and continuing" violations of the agency's Fairness Doctrine.

The first two years of the study were headed by Dr. Ernest W. Lefever, then a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution. At a recent press conference, Dr. Lefever explained one method of measuring bias he and his research colleagues used. They checked for three general viewpoints on national security issues: A—the threat to U.S. security is more serious than perceived by the government; B—the government's perception is essentially correct; and C—the threat to U.S. security is less serious than the government believes.

So how well has CBS represented the three viewpoints? In 1972, according to Lefever's study, Viewpoint A accounted for 3.5 percent of CBS-TV's coverage of defense, as measured by number of sentences. Viewpoint B accounted for 34.6 percent, and Viewpoint C—that the threat isn't even as bad as our detente-mesmerized government sees it—made up 61.8 percent of the network's coverage. CBS's coverage of national security issues was similar in both 1973 and even after the network was put on notice of its problem—again in 1975.

The network's lack of fairness is not an accident; it's policy. America's media guru himself, Walter Cronkite, made this frank admission in 1974 in an interview with Betty Utterback of the Gannett News Service: "There are always groups in Washington expressing alarm over the state of our defenses. We don't carry these stories. The story is that there are those who want to cut defense spending."

So there you have it—one big reason why CBS has often been called "Salanted," for this biased attitude as well as in honor of Richard S. Salant, president of CBS News. Since radio and television networks and stations are regarded legally as public trusts, it's now up to the FCC to see that the public's view is reasonably represented in the future on CBS-TV.

UNCLE SAM'S UNEMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

A sad story of how a bungling federal government bureaucracy put one small businessman out of business is retold by Rep. John H. Rousselot (R-Calif.) in the September issue of "Congress Today!"—published by the National Republican Congressional Committee.

Ed Sohmers was head of Marlin Toy Products, Inc. of Wisconsin. In November 1972 the U.S. Food and Drug Administration notified Marlin that a toy it manufactured was deemed unsafe. The toy, which had been made by Marlin for 10 years with no safety complaints, was a plastic ball filled with colored pellets. FDA contended a child could swallow the pellets if the ball broke. Mr. Sohmers dutifully recalled the toy at a cost of \$95,000 and removed the pellets. So far, so good. Then, in 1973 as Mr. Sohmers and his 85 employees—many of whom were handicapped—were producing the plastic ball and other toys for the holiday season that year, FDA relinquished its toy safety role to a new federal agency, the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

"In the process," related Rousselot, "some of the paperwork on the Marlin plastic toy went astray. Shortly thereafter, the Commission published a banned products list and sure enough, the Marlin plastic toy was on the list."

Some 250,000 copies of the list were sent by the Commission to thousands of toy shops. And the agency refused to recall them even after the disastrous error was called to its attention by Marlin. The incorrect list caused toy cancellations throughout the country, leading to a \$1.2 million loss for Marlin which had to lay off all but 10 of its 85 workers.

Marlin is now out of the toy business, thanks to Uncle Sam's own patented unemployment program. Which brings to mind this quote from Ronald Reagan: "Too many people have lost their capacity to get angry at government. It should be restored."

AUSTIN — Massive efforts are under way to make 1976 a record year for voter eligibility in Texas in spite of apparent apathy in most areas of the U.S.

Secretary of State Mark White Jr., who is coordinating the statewide drive, predicts that as many as 6.2 million will be registered by the October 3 deadline for eligibility to vote in the November 2 election.

That figure would be about 75 per cent of the total eligible by age and residence and would represent a jump of a million voters from 1972, the previous high.

About four million application forms have been prepared for distribution to labor unions, employers, institutions, drivers' license offices, churches, civic clubs, beauty shops and grocery stores.

Cooperating organizations include labor unions, the Democratic party and a variety of minority groups. Changes in the election laws last year made it easier to register in Texas than in any other state, according to White.

Voters who have received their blue certificate cards from county tax assessor-collectors, already are registered and don't need to rush to the courthouse or look up a registration deputy.

Those who have no blue card and are U.S. citizens, at least 18 years old and residents of the state can still become eligible to vote in the presidential election if their applications are delivered to a deputy before midnight October 3.

White thinks voters are, at last, beginning to get interested in politics this year, and that a warming presidential campaign will boom the election day turnout.

Bond Fight On A major battle is developing over the proposed \$400 million water bond issue to be voted on November 2.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe recently named Paul G. Veale of McAllen to head a statewide committee working for passage of the bonds. Briscoe maintains the bonds are necessary to meet Texas water requirements.

A coalition of environmentalists has opened a campaign against passage of the bond amendment to the constitution, claiming there is no real justification for a "crash program" and that interest rates would be unlimited.

Credit Good Texas cities and counties in general have good credit ratings, according to Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

Of 27 largest Texas cities, 25 have bond ratings of "A" or better. Austin, Dallas and Houston have the highest ratings—Aaa. Forty-one counties have "A" ratings or better, and 45 counties have no long-term debt. Credit ratings are an indication of financial health of local government.

New Approach Charted Texas Animal Health

Commission has ordered a new approach to the brucellosis program in Texas to control and eradicate the dread livestock disease.

The new program would seek to raise immunity to the disease through an all-out calfhood vaccination program for five years and then return to a "test and slaughter" program hopefully amended by better diagnostic tools perfected by research.

The state brucellosis study committee report will be sent to the U.S. Animal Health Association Brucellosis Committee as a guideline for negotiating support of USAHA for a Texas program following recommendations laid down by the study panel.

AG Opinions Information on cost, type and use of electronic eavesdropping equipment used by police is public, Atty. Gen. John Hill said.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: A member of the Dental Laboratory Advisory Board vacates his office when he moves his residence outside the state.

Brenham State School is not entitled to a share of the state available, county available or county permanent school funds.

Rate Hike Delay As expected, Texas Public Utility Commission suspended for 120 days effective date of Southwestern Bell's proposed \$298.3 million telephone rate increase.

The company asked an October 7 start-up for the new rates. The rate hearing will begin November 1.

Commissioners approved classification of 107 intervening parties into four interest groups to present their positions on the rate request. Cities, companies and consumer groups may set up still-other groups to express their opposition to the various rate proposals.

Cities were ordered to present their overall case jointly with Atty. Gen. Hill who represents state agencies.

Urges Permit Gov. Dolph Briscoe called on the U.S. Corps of Engineers to grant a permit for the Limestone Reservoir project on the Upper Navasota River.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service recommended purchase of 15,000 acres of land to provide wildlife habitat (at a cost of \$8 million) near the area to be flooded by the lake.

Briscoe said the permit should be issued immediately without further delay over the wildlife habitat issue and evaluations.

New Industries Twenty new industries—a record number for the year—announced plans to locate in Texas during July.

Texas Industrial Commission estimated the new firms will add more than \$35 million a year to the state's economy, creating 428 new jobs directly and another 613 spin-off jobs.

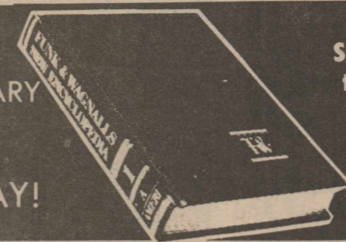

After nearly two years, turkeys have moved out of the adequate and into the plentiful category, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

New crop marketings in September are expected to be about 5 percent more than a year earlier and 9 percent above the September 1973-75 average. Cold storage holding as of September 1 are likely to be about 7 percent more than a year earlier and 4 percent above the three year average. The September supply of turkey is anticipated to be up nearly 6 percent from a year earlier, say marketing specialists with USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

With turkeys moving to market this month well ahead of the holidays, it's a good reminder that turkey is no longer used exclusively for holiday feasting. Today, turkeys are going to picnics in the park and to backyard barbecue parties. Turkey parts are being packaged separately to make it easier for you to prepare only your favorite pieces—drumsticks, wings, or breast of turkey. Prepare in as many ways as you wish. Drumsticks or wings on the barbecue grill require only about 45 minutes' barbecuing time. During the last 15 minutes, glaze the drumsticks with whatever sauce is your favorite.

To consider are:
CHILI SAUCE MARINADE
Combine:
1/4 cup chili sauce
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
dash tabasco sauce
1/4 cup cooking oil

BARBECUE SAUCE
1 tablespoon shortening or fat, melted
1 medium onion, chopped fine

1 1/2 cup celery, chopped fine
2 tablespoon brown sugar
2 tablespoons prepared mustard
1/2 cup catsup
1-8 oz. can (1 cup) seasoned tomato sauce

1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
1 cup water
Combine shortening, onion and celery in pan. Cook until soft and yellow. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Yield: 2 cups.

Tips For Gardeners
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

So far, this has been a most unusually pleasant month since our good rains have kept the temperature lowered for September. Rain relieves one chore, watering, but it does bring on another tremendous chore of weeding. It will be helpful to keep them under control while small and easy to combat.

If leaf spot is a problem on your chrysanthemums this year, you will have noticed the progression of infected leaves from the base of the plant upward. Remove dead and fallen leaves, and spray weekly with zineb, captan, or ferbom until color shows in the flower buds. Also continue to feed until the color shows and water thoroughly if no rain.
September is also the

month for spectacular flowers of the Dahlias. These huge blossoms are the result of careful attention to feeding, watering, spraying, disbudding and staking.

Herbs are interesting and easy to grow. You can start growing your own herbs in containers or beds, and later pick and cure the flowers and leaves. Then all you have to do is add a pinch to give a much better flavor to any dish than the commercial product. Rosemary, sage, thyme, dill, lavender, oregano, parsley, anise, lemon balm and chives can be successfully grown here with very little effort. You can get plants from nurseries or from seed. Be careful not to plant too deep (1/8 to 1/16) inch and water very carefully daily if needed to keep moist 1 to 2 inches deep until the seedlings emerge. Oregano makes an attractive hanging basket plant, and the leaves are very fragrant. Also several varieties grown in one

basket is interesting and useful. Chives make a good border plant. Fresh dill makes a green salad so tasty you won't want to miss trying it. Once started it will come up year after year for it is an annual.

and I feel that there are many ways in which I can operate the department for the betterment of Crockett County."

"I was acting sheriff for a period of three months when Sheriff Mills was forced by ill health to be absent. During this time, I feel that the department was operated to its full potential for the first time in many years. I instilled professional attitudes in the deputies, in order that their duties could be performed in an efficient, courteous and modern manner. I began a system of regular assigned duty shifts for the deputies, thereby doing away with the old-fashioned method of all deputies going off duty during the hours of prime danger to the citizens and businessmen. It was my idea for the new 24-hour patrol now in effect. I also updated the equipment used by the department. I have attempted to further the education of the deputies in various seminars and specialized law enforcement schools, only to be told by Sheriff Mills that education was a waste of time," Goss said.

"I have tried to see that the law was enforced impartially and fairly by the deputies. I say 'tried' because Sheriff Mills has kept a policy of favoritism and personal feelings in effect, against the better judgement of myself and the deputies. Nothing can make a deputy more frustrated than to see a law violator released from a legal arrest by the Sheriff, and then be reprimanded by the Sheriff for doing his duty under the law," Goss continued.

Goss is a certified officer, having 240 hours at Law Enforcement School in El Paso and attended County Sheriff's Department Academy in El Paso.

Goss said he felt that for the past year the county has had the best educated and most experienced deputies in its history.

Goss said "I have been unable to change the outdated and prejudicial attitude of Sheriff Mills, and I cannot in Christian conscience continue to be a part of such a travesty." He added "The only course I can see, to give all the citizens of Crockett County fair, efficient and honest law enforcement, is to resign my position and seek the office of Sheriff."

"My pledge to you is that the Law will not be denied, bought or sold to anyone if I am elected as your sheriff," Goss closed his statement.

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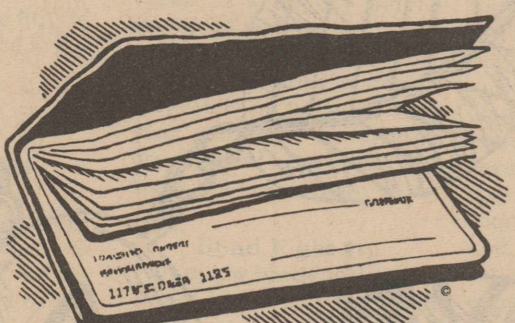
