The November general election is almost at hand and it just occurred to us we have failed to discuss the ballot, which I believe, is the biggest one we have had. Plus voting for president to constable with seven columns including write-in, we have two amendments to approve or disapprove. Both proposed amendments have to do with water bonds. The first would authorize additional \$400 million in Water Development Bonds, the second amendment would authorize an additional \$100 million in Water Development Bonds for quality enhancement (whatever that means).

After reading both amendments and studying them as carefully as possible, one must come to the conclusion that the main thing against both proposals is authorizing too much bonded indebtedness. The experience of other governmental entities in the United States in relying on bonded indebtedness as a source for financing has not been good. Texas should cease reliance on long-term bonded debt and seek other avenues for financing needed projects. Against proposal number one is placing further restrictions on approval of the construction of single large water development projects could result in increased costs and delays in providing adequate water supplies for the citizens of the state. Also, consolidating the water development provisions of the constitution would result in deleting certain detailed constitutional restrictions that should remain in the constitution for the protection of the public. Adoption of Amendment number 2 would permit passing on to the state level another financial burden that is rightfully the responsibility of local governments. We intend to cast our vote against both proposals.

The ballot, which is about the size of a saddle blanket, contains a full slate of Democrats and Republicans for federal and state offices. Next there is a column for the Raza Unida Party, the American Party, the Socialist Workers Party, the Independent party, and the last column is the write-in column. The ballots are printed in both English and Spanish, are 21 inches long and 17 inches wide. Just folding them small enough to drop in the ballot box is going to be no small chore.

# Lions Go Undeclared In Pre-District Football

Lion fans witnessed an exciting homecoming game last Friday night as the Lions won their 7th straight victory by defeating the Junction Eagles 6-0.

In a pre-game ceremony, Karen Bebee, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Dale Bebee, was crowned Football Queen by her escort Clyde Bailey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Bailey.

The Lion performance in the first half was not up to par. They barely managed to out distance their opponents in total yardage in the first half, gaining 90 yards to Junction's 68 yards.

One score did come in the first half, however. Orlando DeHoyos returned a punt for 26 yards to put the Lions at Junction's 20 yard line. Three plays later, John Galvan was called on for a field goal. His kick covered 21 yards and gave the Lions a 3-0 lead. This score came early in the first quarter, but was the only score in the entire first half. The coaches

were not overly pleased with the 3-0 half time score, and proceeded to straighten out problems with the players at half time.

The next score came midway through the third quarter when, after 11 plays and a 31 yard drive, the Lions were forced to kick a field goal again. Galvan kicked a 41 yard field goal, his longest so far this year, to put the Lions ahead 6-0.

With less than a minute left in the third quarter, Vaden Aldridge dashed 11 yards for a touchdown. This drive was good for 55 yards and took three minutes and seven plays. Galvan added the P.A.T. to make it 13-0 Lions.

Only one minute later, Orlando DeHoyos intercepted a Junction pass and ran it back 62 yards for a touchdown. Galvan again added the extra point to make it 20-0 Lions.

Less than one minute later, Ricky DeHoyos caught the Eagle quarter back behind his own goal line to give

the Lions two more points. Thirty seconds later Aldridge connected with Sterling Lay for a 21 yard touchdown. Galvan toed the extra point to make it 24-0 Ozona. This drive covered 43 yards.

With 4 min. and 50 sec. left in the game, Blake Moody scored another touchdown on a ten yard run. Galvan tacked on the extra point. This drive lasted 4 minutes and 46 seconds, covered 44 yards and took nine plays. The Lions emer-

## In General Election—

# Light Absentee Voting Here Indicates Little Interest

Absentee voting began last week in the county clerk's office. A total of 23 eligible voters had cast absentee ballots as of Tuesday morning, indicating little enthusiasm for the upcoming general election in Crockett County.

Absentee voting will continue through October 29. Ballots were delivered to the clerk's office last Wednesday just prior to the opening of absentee voting. A total of 2,607 ballots were printed for use in Crockett County. When the ballots were ordered the county had a total of 2370 voters on the rolls. An extra 10% were printed for each precinct to take care of those voters who registered after the ballots were ordered.

When the ballots were ordered, there were 765 voters registered in precinct 1, 547 in precinct 2, 551 in precinct 3, and 486 in precinct 4.

There are no contested races at the county or district level with the exception of state Board of Education, where Jimmy L. Elrod Democrat, will face H. Dell Foster, the Republican, also for sheriff. Crockett County Jim Goss is running on a write in campaign against Sheriff Billy Mills however, Mills name is the only name to appear on the ballot, winning the Democratic Party spot in the spring primary.

At the top of the ballot, is the Carter-Mondale duo for President and vice president in the Democratic Party column, opposed by Ford-Dole in the Republican Party, Anderson-Shackelford for the American Party, Camejo-Reid for the Socialist Workers Party and Eugene J. McCarthy as the independent. The write-in column is the seventh and last column on the ballot.

Democrat Lloyd Bentsen is opposed for U.S. Senator by Republican Alan Steelman,

American Party candidate Marjorie P. Gallion and Socialist Workers Party candidate Pedro Vasquez, Democrat Bob Krueger is opposed in his bid for reelection as U.S. Representative, 21st Dist. by Bobby A. Locke, Republican; Ramon Carrillo, Raza Unida; and Ed Gallion, American Party.

Railroad commissioner candidates are Jon Newton, Democrat; Walter Wendlandt, Republican; Fred Rodriguez Garza, Raza Unida, and Pat O'Reilly, Socialist Workers Party.

All the other races with the exception of Member, State Board of Education, were won by Democrats in the primary earlier in the year.

The polls will open at 8 a.m. November 2, and close at 7 p.m. Those living in Precincts 2 and 3 will vote at the Civic Center, precinct 1 at the courthouse and precinct 4 voters will vote at the Primary School cafeteria.

# 3-Judge Panel Appointed To Hear Suit Against County

Judge John R. Brown, chief judge of the fifth judicial circuit, Friday granted a request by U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward that a suit filed in District Court in July be heard by a panel of three judges.

The suit filed by Hector DeHoyos, Robert Flores, Jesse Fierro and Armando Reina in District Court in San Angelo, claims discrimination against Mexican-Americans through the re-drawing of the four precinct lines. A date for the hearing has not been set, but Brown appointed Woodward, District Judge Patrick E. Higginbotham and Circuit Judge Irving L. Goldberg to serve on the panel.

In his order calling for the trilateral decision, Brown wrote, "This is a matter best determined by a three-judge court as this enables a simultaneous appeal to the Court of Appeals and to the Supreme Court without delay."

The order further states that all parties in the suit will brief and argue the case before the three-judge court. Named as defendants in the suit are Crockett County Commissioners Jesse C. Marley, Bill Black, Jack Williams, County Clerk Leta Powell, County Sheriff Billy Mills and Democratic Party Chairman John R. Hunnicutt.

which was sought in the original petition to prevent the November general election from taking place in Crockett County, but did grant the petitioners' request that the case be judged by a three-judge court.

The suit was filed following two democratic primaries which saw the Mexican-American candidate lose his bid for Commissioner of Precinct 1. The candidate, Sostenes DeHoyos, led the ticket in the first primary, but lost out to incumbent commissioner Jesse C. Marley, in the second primary held in June.

Last October, in a called meeting of the Commissioners Court, both sides reached an agreement on the precinct lines after seventy-odd voters were moved from precinct 4 back to precinct 1, the majority affected were Mexican-American voters. However, the suit was filed early in July following the last primary.

Meanwhile, the Justice Department which has jurisdiction over all changes in voting procedure, failed to act on the request submitted to it until following the second primary. The action came about when the Voting Rights Act of 1965 was expanded last year to include Texas, and all voting changes since 1972 had to be submitted to that entity for approval.

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INTELLIGENT READING OF IRON CURTAIN "NEWS"

Robert L. Bartley, Editor of the editorial page of the Wall Street Journal, has sounded a timely warning to all who wish to read, with intelligence and discernment, "news" dispatches from behind the iron and bamboo curtains.

Mr. Bartley was recently privileged to a 23 day, 8,200 mile journey to some eight different cities and points in Communist China. His report, which appeared in the October 1, 1976, issue of the Journal, is a model of a conscientious attempt to bring the reader an accurate picture of what he learned. However, he reported, "The problem of getting information out of China is dwarfed by acquiring it in the first place. One starts to trust very little of what you are told, and not much of what you see."

Every day of the trip, he explained, was tightly scheduled by his Communist hosts from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. "Everything is programmed, deftly or otherwise, by the Chinese hosts," he reported. "We can write what we saw on such and such a day, and relate what we were told by such and such a source. Doing so will cause no scenes, will erect no barriers to the next visa to China. The reader can always make his own judgments. But most readers have had no experience with China, and in this atmosphere objectivity, honesty and truth are by no means necessarily the same."

One example cited by Mr. Bartley; a briefing by a Mr. Geli, head of a Communist farm commune, who gives "a perfectly preposterous briefing linking each year's agricultural progress" to Mao's thoughts. But, said Mr. Bartley, instinct warned him that "This is not a briefing, but a recitation" designed to please the ears not of the American reporters, but of a figure sitting in the delegation whom Mr. Bartley dubbed "the gauchito". In contrast to the head of the commune, who wore drab clothes and the ubiquitous blue sneakers, "the gauchito" - obviously the Chinese Communist counterpart of the Gestapo or the KGB - was "dashing in a broad hat, white and black blouse and cape, and long leather boots."

So what does one report? "No one likes to provoke scenes," writes Mr. Bartley - (but not from Red China). "Any one would want to continue on the rest of the trip to Tibet and other story-book lands." Hence, the reporters write, and dispatch through their Communist hosts, "precisely what the party (is) allowed to do and see in each city. The result is a self-censorship of what is sent out from the trip."

Readers of "news" reports from Moscow need to know that all reports filed from that world Communist capital are also "self-censored." Every reporter there knows that if he dares to write anything the Communists don't like, his career as a foreign correspondent is over - at least, insofar as reporting anything from the Communist prison of nations.

MORE MILITARY WARNINGS

Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld gave forth the other day with a few more of the military facts of life which are causing so much anxiety to people who take the Soviet threat to this country seriously.

Meeting with reporters at the Pentagon, Rumsfeld brought them up to date on Soviet missile developments since his report to Congress last January.

Rumsfeld said the Soviets are pressing ahead with aggressive programs of unprecedented scope to develop both ICBMs and submarine-launched missiles. The development of multiple warhead missiles, according to Rumsfeld, has proceeded "at a little faster deployment rate than anticipated in January." Additionally, he said that the Soviet ICBM force now has deployed 100 of the huge SS-18 ICBMs, which can hurl a 15,000 pound warhead, with up to eight independently targeted warheads, between continents.

Even if a SALT II strategic arms limitation treaty is signed with the Soviets, according to Rumsfeld it will not prevent the Soviets from achieving more nuclear striking power than the U.S. This is because the Soviets could achieve an imbalance of power with the U.S. by combining weapons permitted within its limits and "GRay area" weapons which are not included in the treaty's limitations. Most significantly, Rumsfeld reported that the Soviets have a steady building program "which could carry them toward a capability in excess of that needed merely to deter nuclear war." Asked why, he replied that "they are clearly striving not to be on the losing side" in any nuclear war.

What the Secretary of Defense was saying, in other words, is that Russia is aiming for a first-strike capability which will allow her to fight and win a nuclear war against the United States.

So the warnings keep coming. Is the message getting through, America? If it doesn't our present domestic debates may become only pages in history books, whose future chapters will be written by the new communoist world rulers.

'IT'S RUN DRY.'



AUSTIN - Two important water measures - one controversial, the other generally accepted - will be on the general election ballot.

Proposition 1 would amend the state constitution to authorize another \$400 million in water development bonds.

Proposition 2, by constitutional amendment, seeks to authorize another \$100 million in bonds for water quality.

Under Proposition 1, no more than \$35 million in proceeds from bond sale could go to any one project without approval of the legislature. None of the money could go to developing water resources from the Mississippi River.

The additional water quality bonds would go to grants and loans to local governments to improve sewage treatment systems.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe and other statewide officials, including Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Bill Clayton, support both issues.

Proponents argue the water development fund is almost exhausted and adequate water supplies may be jeopardized in the future unless more money is provided. The fund has financed about \$300 million in development projects and about \$100 million is left.

Environmentalists argue against giving Water Development Board uncontrolled authority to spend on water projects. Opposition spokesmen claim there is no plan, environmental study or economic assessment to guide the \$400 million bond authority.

**Courts Speak**  
 The State Supreme Court is pondering latest arguments over constitutionality of a law prohibiting sale of 46 items on both Saturdays and Sundays by the same store.

The high court held sheriffs have no power to force lawyers to put up security as a condition for making bail for clients.

A yacht owner must pay \$141,760 in damages for taking property from a \$35,000 craft, the Supreme Court held.

Upholding a \$1.8 million judgment in a products liability suit growing out of an alleged carburetor defect on a 1970 Chevrolet pickup would leave manufacturers without defense in such actions, General Motors attorneys told the Supreme Court in a Houston case.

**Funds Approved**  
 The House Higher Education Committee approved increased funds for tuition equalization grants.

Under the program, students can get as much as \$600 a year toward educational expenses. TEG received \$16 million in legislative appropriations this year.

The House committee recommended the legislature appropriate 50 per cent of funds for 150 new family medicine residency pro-

grams in 1977 and 30 additional places in 1978.

An increase of about \$4,950,000 would be required for the additional assistance aimed at increasing the number of physicians in Texas.

Another recommendation of the committee would require graduate students who serve as teaching assistants to complete internships first and would limit the number of assistants to the number of fulltime faculty members on each campus.

At the same time, the committee lamented sharp increases in state spending for Texas colleges and universities during the last decade.

**Crusade Helping**  
 Atty. Gen. John Hill claims efforts of his office under the Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act have been successful in curbing fraud.

Since January 1973, the attorney general's office has filed 250 lawsuits and processed 35,000 complaints, collected \$305,000 in civil penalties and \$3 million in restitution to injured consumers.

Hill said preventive lawsuits to stop fraud before it harms consumers afford more effective protection than action to recover money already taken.

According to U.S. Chamber of Commerce estimates cited by the attorney, general, short term direct costs of white collar crime run to \$42 billion.

**Shots Suspended**  
 The Department of Health Resources last week called a temporary halt to swine flu inoculations to allow time to find out if there are any links between the vaccine and three deaths of old people in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Fratis Duff, director of the department, said there had been no more serious reactions than a little fever and sore arms from use of 900,000 doses of the vaccine in Texas at the time the five-day suspension was ordered to study reports.

**TAC Issues Bonds**  
 Texas Aeronautics Commission authorized issuance of \$1.2 million in 1977 Texas Airport Aid program funds for construction and improvement of facilities in 47 communities.

TAC also elected officers and approved the application of Metroflight Inc. to provide scheduled air passenger and cargo service to Greenville and Paris.

Rex Cauble of Denton, rancher and oilman, was re-elected chairman. Lucien Flournoy of Alice was selected for another term as vice-chairman and David Witts of Dallas as secretary.

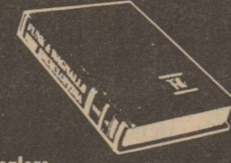

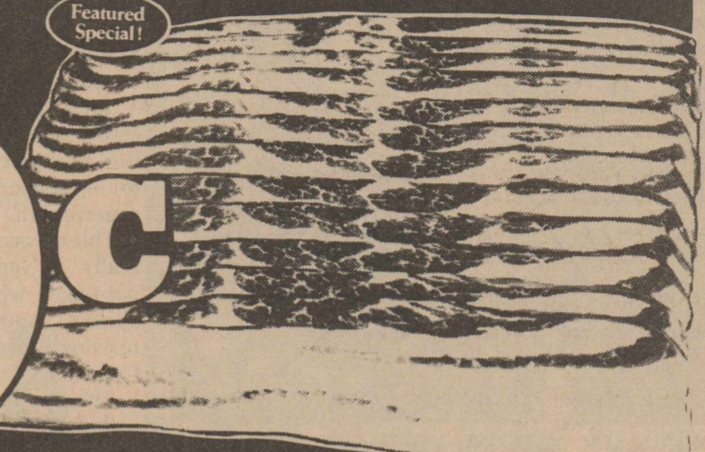

**Tips For Gardeners**  
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

I'm sure everyone was really surprised at the earliest frost in this area, if I remember correctly, in the twenty one years we have been in Ozona. It did damage a few tender plants, but not extensive from what I hear. Now, you should be on the alert if weather warnings of a frost or freeze are in the forecast.

Garden grooming should be our emphasis this month. The Commissioners Court have assigned the week of Oct. 25 for our fall clean-up pick-up project. We hope everyone will take advantage of this generous help to give our personal garden and city a cared for and orderly appearance. If you have friends or relatives that own lots here, and they need grooming, write them a note to remind them of our concern to get our city in a well groomed condition. Also, every business is asked to look over their entrance and alley way to see if it is clean of weeds and trash. The Garden Club will appreciate this help and your own concern.

If you have caladiums and want to carry them over the winter, it isn't too much of a problem. I had fair luck several times, but the Joe

Claytons have been more successful for several years, so you might want to try their process. The leaves are dying back now, so gradually reduce watering so the tubers can start drying out. After the soil is thoroughly dry, dig the clumps and leave to dry until the soil can be removed easily. If in pots turn out soil and tubers, and let dry as above. You may leave out in sun where they will not get wet again, but be sure to be careful not to leave out if a hard freeze is forecast. When dry and ready to store, place them in baskets, or boxes after separating and shaking off all dirt. If you have more than one layer, place one sheet of newspaper between each layer, place one sheet of newspaper between each layer to absorb any moisture. Divide into colors and mark, should you want to group them by colors. Place under a bench or where well ventilated in about 60 degree temperature until time to plant after the soil is warm, which is usually May or later.

**Debra Says**

With beef and potatoes in plentiful supply this month according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, now is a good time to use these items in some hearty German fare to celebrate Oktoberfest.

This colorful Bavarian festival marking the wedding anniversary of King Ludwig I is held in Munich the two weeks beginning with the next to the last Sunday in September.

However, celebrations called Oktoberfests are being held in this country throughout the month of October. And, like the original Oktoberfest, German food is very much a part of the merrymaking.

Marketing specialists with the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service report the October supply of beef is up 3 to 5 percent above the record of a year ago, making this an especially good time to introduce your family to sauerbraten.

This classic German dish is really a variation of beef pot-roast, which derives its special "sour" flavor from marinating anywhere from four hours to a week.

The recipe below, which calls for marinating the beef for as little as four hours, is provided by the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

To take advantage of October's plentiful supply of potatoes, try another tasty recipe, for hot German potato salad.

**Snappy Pot-Roast (Sauerbraten)**

- 3-4 lb. beef arm pot-roast cut 2" thick
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1 large tomato peeled and chopped
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 bay leaves
- 6 whole cloves
- 2 tbs. cooking fat
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 2 tbs. brown sugar
- 1/2-3/4 cup crushed ginger-snaps

Combine vinegar, water, tomato, bay leaves and cloves; pour over meat, cover and marinate in refrigerator 4 to 6 hours (or overnight), turning meat at least once. Remove meat from marinade and pat dry with paper towels; reserve marinade. Brown meat in cooking fat in large frying pan. Pour off drippings. Sprinkle salt and pepper over meat.

Simmer in heavy covered kettle with the marinade for 3 hours or until meat is tender, turning once. Remove meat to warm platter. Discard bay leaves. Add water to cooking liquid to make 3 cups. Stir in raisins and brown sugar and bring to a boil. Gradually stir in gingersnaps until thickened. Yield: six to eight servings.

**Hot German Potato Salad**

- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of celery soup
- 2 tbs. lemon juice
- 4 medium potatoes, peeled cooked and cubed
- 1/2 cup sliced celery
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 2 tsp. salt
- dash pepper
- 1 tbs. bacon-flavored bits

In large saucepan, combine soup, lemon juice and 1/4 cup water. Heat stirring occasionally.

Stir in remaining ingredients, except bacon bits. Cook just until heated through, stirring constantly and gently. Serve immediately topped with bacon bits. Makes 8 servings, about 75 calories each.

**Cooler Weather Brings Brown Patch Disease**

Cooler temperatures and rainy weather spell trouble for homeowners as these conditions boost brown patch disease in lawns.

"Brown patch is a fungus disease that occurs on St. Augustine grass, Bermuda grass and Zoysia grass in late spring and early fall," points out Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The disease is characterized by three different types of symptoms in turf, the most common being a circular pattern of dead grass that may range in diameter from 1 to 50 feet. The second type of symptom of brown patch is a diffused type of pattern of which small patches of grass will turn brown mainly in shady locations. Another sign of the disease is leaf blades turning yellow in turf; this usually occurs in Floratam St. Augustine grass.

"In each of these symptoms, both the grass blades and leaf sheaths may be easily pulled from the stolons (runners) because of deterioration in the attachment area," explains Walla. "Stolons often remain green. New leaves may emerge in the center of circular diseased areas within two to three weeks, giving the disease a doughnut-shaped appearance. Entire spots may eventually become green during a long growing season."

Brown patch develops most rapidly when air tem-

peratures are between 75 and 85 degrees F. and free moisture is present, notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. Fungal activity stops when air temperatures reach 90 degrees F., which explains seasonal development of the disease.

"Some lawns are affected almost every year while others are damaged only occasionally," says Walla. "Fungicide applications will effectively prevent brown patch where the disease is a chronic problem. In areas where the disease occurs occasionally, apply fungicides when the disease first appears."

Fungicides cleared for use in controlling brown patch include Benomyl, available as Turf-side 1991 and Terracolor PCNB; and Maneb, available with coordinated zinc ion as Fore. Other products include Acti-Dione RZ and Daconil 2787. PCNB generally is effective throughout the growing season while the other materials will need to be applied at 10-to-14 day intervals.

The No. 1-38 Millspaugh, one mile southwest, is 1,980 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 38-MM-T&StL. Ground elevation is 2,443 feet.

**Pickles And Relish Add Zest**

Tired of bland, tasteless foods? Pickles and relishes stimulate the appetite and add tartness and color to meals, Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist, says.

Made from fruits and vegetables, pickles and relishes are sources of minerals and vitamins--especially A and C. They retain most of the vitamins because of the high acid content and short heating time in a water bath canner, this specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, says.

Dilled okra adds variety of shapes to a relish tray. Seasoned with pepper, garlic and dill, the spicy flavor will add a distinctive touch to a buffet supper or backyard picnic.

Pepper-onion relish made from end-of-season garden vegetables gives flavor sparkle to cooked dried pinto beans.

Here is a recipe from this publication:

Crystal Tomato Pickles

- 7 pounds tomatoes
- 2 gallons water
- 1 quart slaked lime
- 9 cups sugar
- 2 quarts vinegar
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 6 strips cinnamon bark, 1 1/2-2 inches long
- 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- Slice green tomatoes 1/4 inch thick; place in glass or porcelain-lined container. Cover with 2 gallons water in which the quart of lime has been dissolved. Let stand 24 hours. Remove from lime water and rinse well through several cold water baths to remove all lime sediment. Dissolve sugar in vinegar; add cinnamon stick and cloth bag containing nutmeg and ginger. Heat the vinegar and spices to boiling and allow to stand for 1 hour.

Add slices of green tomato and cook rapidly until slices are glazed and syrup clings to the spoon. Fill hot jars with the slices, arranging cinnamon sticks attractively with the slices in the jar. Discard the spice bag. Heat spiced vinegar to boiling; pour over tomatoes. Close. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boil.

Also accompanying Krueger will be a member of his Washington staff, Jeff Talmadge.

Krueger's itinerary calls for his visiting agriculture research stations in Clay Center, Nebraska the first day; the facilities in Stillwater, Oklahoma and Petit Jean Mountain, Arkansas the second day; and the Texas A&M facilities in College Station, Uvalde, and San Angelo the final day.

Krueger explained that he had invited the leaders of Texas' most important livestock organizations to accompany him at their own expense so that they could advise him of their needs and assist him in his evaluation of the research centers.

Before leaving on the trip, Krueger said, "We are going to examine the agricultural research effort in this country first-hand in an effort to better anticipate our future needs in the field of agricultural research. Given the problems of diminishing world resources and increasing population, we must look to the future for ways of maximizing food production, and this trip will be a step in that direction".

**Gas Wildcat Slated For County Field**

Durham Inc., Midland, will drill an 8,000-foot gas wildcat in Crockett County, six miles northwest of Iraan, 1 5/8 miles northeast of the Hanson (Grayburg oil and gas) field, and 5 3/4 miles south of the recently opened Crockett, East (Devonian) field. It is the No. 1 Allied-Union Carpenter No. 1.

Location is 1,994 feet from the north and 540 from the west lines of 86-1-L&GN, Abst. 541.

It is also 7/8 mile east-north-east of 7,850-foot failure and one mile southeast of a 9,272-foot failure. The Live Oak (Strawn gas) field of Crockett County gained its third producer and a 1 7/8 mile northeast extension with completion of Dan J. Harrison Jr., Houston, No. 2 Joe T. Davidson, eight miles south of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 6,800,000 cubic feet daily. Production was through perforations at 8,969-9,039 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons.

Stated as a 7890 Pennsylvania gas test in the Davidson Ranch multipay field, it was drilled to 9,287 feet, with 4 1/2 inch casing set at 9,191.6 feet and plugged back to 9,135 feet. It was amended to the above field.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from east lines of 5-F-GC&SF.

Amoco Production Co. No. 1 Jake Beasley Trust, in 6-G-GC&SF, Crockett County wildcat, 1/2 mile east east of its No. 1-B J.F. and M.E. Sudderth, recent confirmation to Strawn gas production in the Crockett portion of the Whitehead multipay field 21 miles southeast of Ozona, apparently has assured production in the Strawn with the flowing of gas for an unreported time at the rate of 1.3 million cubic feet daily.

Flow was through an 11-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,973-9,211 feet. Testing continued.

Drilled to 9,400 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 9,233 feet, it is plugged back to 9,212 feet.

The Crockett portion of the field has three Strawn producers. The Sutton portion has nine Strawn and two Canyon gas wells.

The sergeant is a 1956 graduate of Ozona High School.

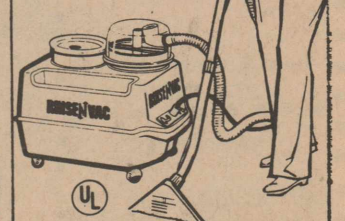
