The fire hazard inspection is invited at this time to coincide with the movement of the city in trying to obtain better fire rates, and to encourage new support to the fire department who have been doing a good job with the type of epuipment they have had to work with.

With the arrival of the new fire truck together with the water works improvements now being made in the city, the efforts of those who have worked in the fire department should soon pay off in the form of a decrease in fire

Although the inspection itself will not directly bring wire credts, it will serve to remind the citizens of the things which cause fires and be ready to assist in any move that will reduce rates.

Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration is cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be fur-

The buyer's individual circumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. All too often people try to squeeze a sales contract to fit the type of printed form on hand, omitting or leaving to easily misconstrued or forgotten oral agreement many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form." Too many unfortunate entanglements have been announced by clients to lawyers wth the words, "I have just signed a receipt for a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that eveything is O. K.?"






