Grain Elevator, Concrete Plant **Construction To Begin In 2 Weeks**

Grady Goodpasture and Bill Bridges, both of Brownfield, this week announced they would begin construction within two weeks on two new businesses for Plains. Goodpasture is building grain storage facilities and Bridges will construct buildings to house his ready-mix concrete operations

The two new industries will occupy seven and a half acres of land abutting the city limits next to Wildman's Blacksmith and Welding shop. Dr. E. W. Jones of Lubbock sold the land to Goodpasture and Bridges.

Names of the two operations will be Goodpasture Grain and Storage Elevators and South Plains Ready-Mix Concrete Co.

No personnel have been hired for the businesses yet, but the operators stated Tuesday they expected to bring a few new people to Plains when they get into operation. Both companies are expected to be permanently located here.

Bridges and his concrete company are to construct the storage elevators.

Wednesday night the City Council agreed to run a water line to the limits they are allowed for the concrete company to begin operations. Bridges will have to make arrangements to meet the city line as the city cannot go outside the city limits with the line.

Both men expect they will be through with construction and ready to begin operations within 90 days.
