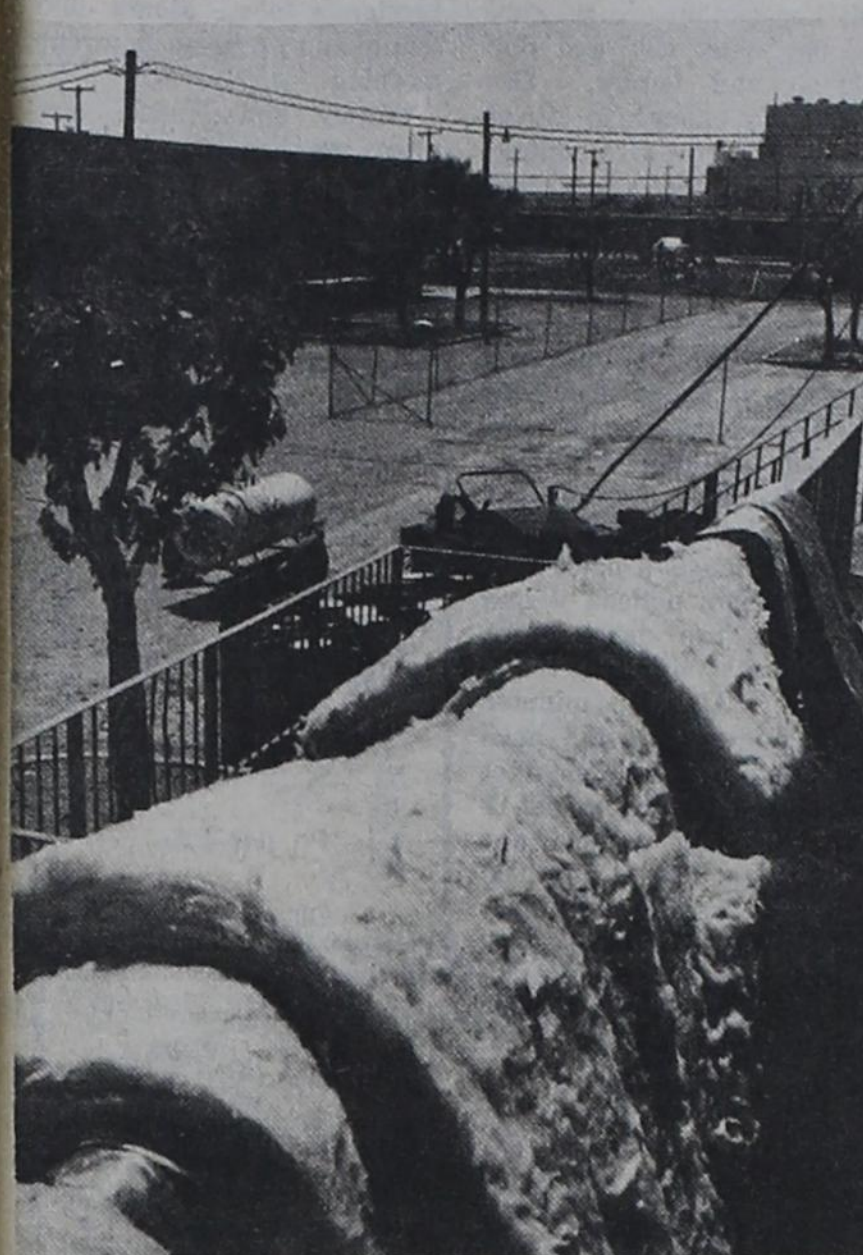

City aldermen

Franchise, road funds discussed

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen learned Monday night that additional road repair funds may be available to the city, and that the franchise agreement with Southwestern Public Service Co. is due for renewal in January 1984.

Jack Moore with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation asked the aldermen to approve an updated urban and transportation map of Dimmitt to be used by his department.

Designation of particular streets as "collector streets" may enable the city to receive additional urban road repair funds from the state.

Streets so designated are streets other than main highways that "collect" traffic from various areas and funnel it to a main artery, and that have no stop signs except where it crosses another collector or highway.

Front Street, Halsell Street, Jones Street, Lee Street (from Front Street to US 385), Twelfth Street and Western Circle Drive were marked on the proposed map as "collector" streets.

Moore said approval of the map by the city governing body is required for cities with more than 5,000 population. He added that approval must also be given on the county and state levels.

Aldermen approved the map.

Calvin Marsh, local SPS manager, presented a proposed ordinance to renew the franchise agreement between SPS and the city.

"Although the current agreement does not expire until January, we wanted to give the board plenty of time to examine our proposed renewal, to enable them to

compare it with that of neighboring cities, and to allow their attorney and city engineer to check it over," Marsh said.

Proposals include a 25-year term for the franchise, and continuing the 2% franchise tax based on gross receipts from the sale of electric energy, except for receipts from sales within the city to any federal, state or local governmental entity, department or agency, or to industries within the city.

The ordinance also proposed yearly payment of the franchise tax, rather than continuing the current quarterly payment system. Several aldermen objected to that provision.

Alderman David Hays asked whether the term could be lowered to 10 years.

Marsh said his company would be willing to discuss any questions the aldermen might have.

Board members voted to delay action on purchase of a used dump truck for the street and alley department. Only one bid was received — \$9,500 from Parkinson Machinery and Supply in Lubbock for a truck that did not meet the specifications, so the bid was not accepted.

"Since we have advertised for bids without any results, we can go out and buy what we want," said City Manager Paul Catoe. He added that he will possibly visit auction lots or look at state surplus vehicles.

Catoe asked the aldermen to consider formation of an airport advisory board to work toward upgrading the existing airport facilities.

The aldermen agreed to formation of the advisory board, and the names of six potential board members were submitted, but none have been confirmed yet.

In other business, the aldermen:

— Discussed the purchase of improved lighting for the city swimming pool in order to encourage more evening use of the pool for private parties, etc.

— Were informed that the new vehicles for the Police Dept. are expected to be delivered June 20.

Another year of PIK likely

Texas Corn Growers Association President Carl King of Dimmitt said this week that Secretary of Agriculture John Block has conceded that the PIK (Payment in Kind) program will more than likely be extended for another year.

King noted that Block said the program would probably be extended at the same levels now in effect.

King spoke with Block at a recent agriculture symposium held in Atlanta, and again by phone last week.

At housing project

Half of apartments to be ready

About half of the apartments at the Azteca Complex (formerly the Castro County Agricultural Housing Project) will be ready for migrant farm workers to occupy this summer, Azteca officials said this week.

Renovations are underway at the huge housing project, and the present 199 apartments are being converted to 138, with many efficiency units being enlarged into two-bedroom apartments.

The renovation project also

includes painting, roof work and other major and minor repairs.

Approximately 70 apartments will be ready for usage this summer. Of the remodeled apartments, 28 will be efficiency apartments and

42 will be two bedroom apartments.

Renovations will make the complex more cost-efficient, easier to be maintained and easier to keep open, Larry Gonzales, president of the Azteca Corp., said.

The work is scheduled to be completed by December 1983.

"The main reason the renovations are needed is because of deterioration that the past owners let happen. The community was the past owners, and they were supposed to have a say-so in how the camp was run," Gonzales said.

Renovations and the running of the complex will be monitored by the Health Department. The apartments must meet department regulations concerning safety and the number of people living in

each apartment.

Because Azteca is a non-profit organization, rent is based on the expenses for running the complex such as personnel expenses, utilities and insurance instead of the cost of the renovations.

The work is being done by C. I. of Texas, Inc. under the supervision of W. E. (Buddy) Morton, project manager, and Frank Howell, superintendent. The architectural firm of Flores Associates, Inc. designed the renovations for the Azteca Corp.

Gridders accept offers

Three Dimmitt football players have accepted athletic scholarships to Abilene Christian University and Panhandle State University at Goodwell, Okla.

Jeff Watts, all-state tight end, will play football for ACU on a partial scholarship, while all-district tackle-linebacker Shan Powell and all-district quarterback Richard Guzman will play at Panhandle State, also on partial scholarships.

Watts, the son of Jerry and Carolyn Watts, chose ACU over "a bunch" of colleges and universities that offered him scholarships or football opportunities, including Texas A&M and other major universities.

The 6-4, 200-pounder, who was an all-stater in both football and basketball, said he chose ACU "because of the surroundings, the fact that the people there are real

nice, and ACU is close to Kim (his sister) at Hardin-Simmons."

Although Watts was an all-district punter as well as an all-district and all-South Plains selection as an end, he was recruited as an offensive tight end by ACU.

"I don't know about punting — I haven't talked to them about that," he said.

Watts plans to major in architecture.

Powell, son of Larry and Linda Powell, was a unanimous choice for the all-district team as both a linebacker and offensive tackle. He considered walking on at West Texas State University until he received the scholarship offer from Panhandle State.

After visiting Panhandle State, he said, "I liked it real well — it isn't too big, and the people are real nice. I think the people and the coaches there are what really

sold me."

"Many colleges recognized Shan's ability, but felt he was too light," DHS Head Football Coach Gene Griffin said. (Powell is 6-4 and weighs 210.) "Shan will weigh 230 in another year. He could walk on and play anywhere, but that's what a lot of these colleges want all these kids to do — walk on. I'm real pleased to see him get this scholarship."

Powell plans to major in either physical education or criminology.

"Panhandle State was the only school I talked to," said Guzman, grandson of Fernando and Narcisca Hernandez. The 5-10, 180-pounder — who was an honorable mention all-district quarterback — had planned to attend WTSU and forego athletics until he received the Panhandle State offer.

"I'll probably play quarter-

back," Guzman said. "They run an I formation that's almost identical to the one we run at Dimmitt."

Guzman will major in physical education, and plans to become a coach and teacher.

The three scholarship players' coach was understandably proud.

"I think they're super kids — just great young men," Griffin said, "and I'm glad they have a chance through athletics to help out their education, because that's the most important thing."

"And of course I'm pleased for our program," Griffin said. "It's not our job to turn out college athletes, but when our program can help a kid in the educational process, I'm real pleased."

Griffin has sent six players into college football in his four years as a head coach.

Farm-gas users huddle tonight

If High Plains irrigation gas users wanted to get gas rates regulated, should they seek a new state law that would put ag gas rates under the jurisdiction of the Texas Railroad Commission?

If so, should they try to get such a law passed in the special session of the legislature, which Gov. Mark White is expected to call soon?

Or should they seek federal regulation through Congress? These and other questions will be discussed tonight (Thursday) at 8 in the Holiday Inn at Plainview in a called meeting of the directors of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, which covers a 16-county area.

"It will be explained what happened to the ag gas use proposals in Austin during the legislative session," said Carl King of Dimmitt, who lobbied for the measure. "Also, we will ask the directors where they want to go with the issue from here — whether to try the special session or to go the federal route, which is what we are working on now."

King added that plans will be made for a meeting in this area around June 15-20 for all interested ag gas users to attend and make their viewpoints known.

"We want to see how seriously the farmers want to pursue this matter," King stated. "I think I could get Gov. White to consider the proposed regulations in the special session, if that's what the majority wants."

King said there will also be someone at the Plainview meeting to explain the progress on developing hydrogen

fuel for irrigation.

Advances in the field have come through research locally and by Texas A&M.

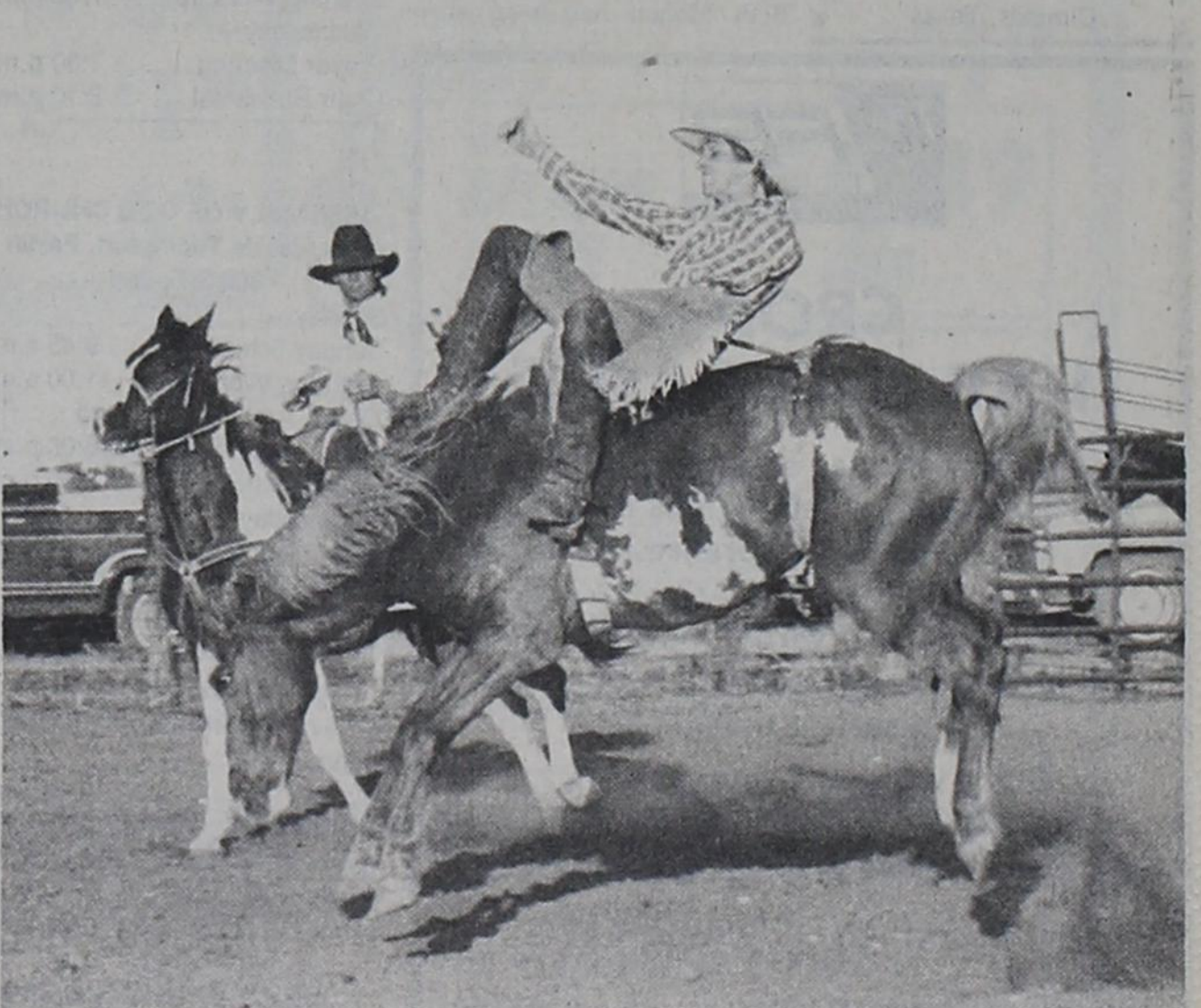
"We would like to see farmers and municipalities to be able to bid on their gas like other entities do. This would enable them to reduce the cost by as much as half," King said.

But regulation would be required to put farmers in a position to bid, he explained.

Caution urged at boat ramps

Weekend boat ramp scenes at Texas reservoirs and coastal waters often resemble a Keystone Cops rerun. But it's not funny to the careless boat owner to see his boat swamped or his cherished truck rolling backward into the brine.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department technician Karen Meador said good safe boating practices should start before the boat hits the water.

"Department fisheries personnel see plenty of potential hazards at boat ramps while conducting surveys," Meador said, "and some of them can be dangerous as well as embarrassing."

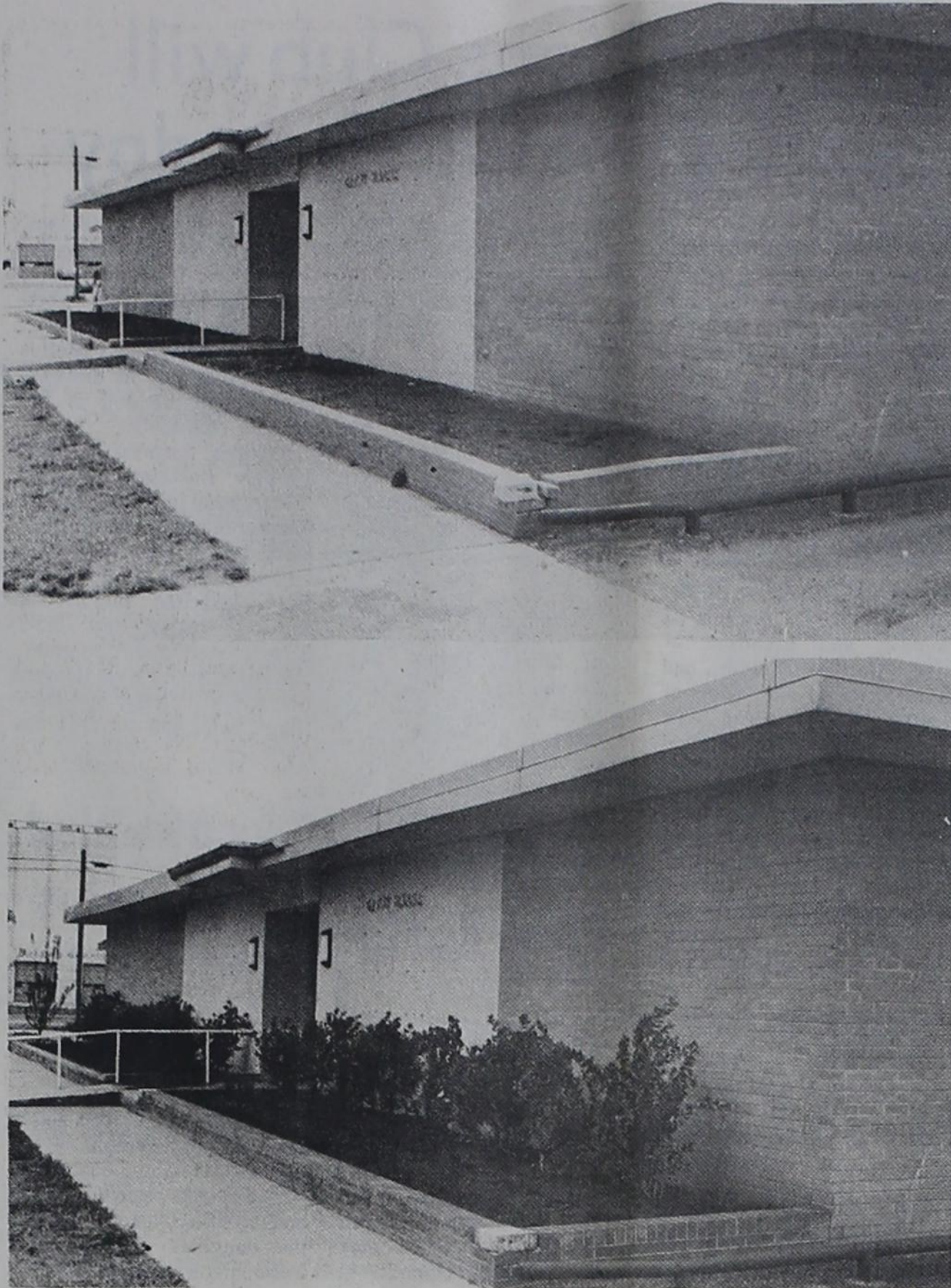
Meador pointed out that an unwritten rule is that whom-ever gets his boat into position for launching has the right-of-way. "Always make sure the way is clear and that animals, children and other vehicles are not in the launch path," she said.

Boaters often forget to set the parking brake when launching or reloading boats. In some cases this results in launching both boat and tow vehicle into the water. Blocks of wood placed behind one or more tires can be added insurance against rolling backward.

"It's also advisable to be sure the plug is secure in your boat," she advised. Some boats will sink if the plug is out; all boats will take on a considerable amount of water.

Also, be sure your motor runs properly before finally shoving off from the launching site. "A boat drifting away from the ramp is a hazard to boats waiting to come in, and others going out," said Meador.

Please skip Dimmitt first

either by planting shrubs and flowers or setting out potted plants. The city got into the swing of things by planting Burford holly and barberry shrubs, monkey grass and an ornamental plum tree in front, and barberry and junipers in back. The shrubbery replaces ground cover that originally was in the front beds.

Price spread may widen

Looking at the farm to retail price spread, it's basically a case of "the poor getting poorer."

Farmers are continuing to get less of the dollars that consumers spend at supermarkets and restaurants, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Last year only 28 cents of every dollar spent on food went back to the farmer," points out Dr. Forrest Stegelin, "while 32 cents went for labor and the remaining 40 cents covered marketing costs."

This difference between what farmers receive and what consumers pay for food products is called the "farm to retail price spread" and represents food industry charges for handling, processing and retailing farm food commodities. That difference rose 5.1% in 1982 and is expected to grow even larger this year.

"Because, while the farm value of food is expected to rise only 1 to 4% in 1983, marketing costs are forecast to increase 4 to 7%," says Stegelin. Thus the trend of marketing costs rising faster than the farm value is expected to continue as it has for the past three years.

"This means that the overall food price increases have been influenced less and less by changes in farm prices and more and more by changes in the cost of packaging, processing, fabricating, transporting and distributing, and food industry wages," says the economist. "This year the higher marketing bill will account for more than three-fourths of the increase in total consumer spending on food."

Marketing costs are particularly high for highly processed crop products, notes the economist, while they are lower for animal products. The farm value represents 50 to 60% of the retail prices for meats, dairy products, and poultry and eggs, but only about 20% of the retail prices for processed fruits and vegetables and some 14% for bakery and cereal products.

Safe Boating Week is set

Governor Mark White has proclaimed June 5-11 "Texas Safe Boating Week" and the U.S. Coast Guard has named it "National Safe Boating Week." The special state-wide designation was issued by Governor White in a ceremony at the Texas State Capitol.

Groups participating in the proclamation were the Boating Trades Association of Texas, Marina Association of Texas, Texas Parks & Wildlife, Texas Safety Association, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and U.S. Power Squadrons. The six organizations teamed up to form a coalition for Texas boating safety and to remind Texans that "safe boating is fun."

"Our main Safe Boating Week objective is to remind boaters to follow a few simple guidelines that not only make boating safer but make it more fun," said C. R. "Rob" Youker, San Benito, president of the Boating Trades Association of Texas.

Insects of interest

Moth control

A common and often serious pest of young pines in our area is the small pine tip moth. As its name implies, the larvae of this moth bores into and destroys the tips of the shoots. Death of the buds stunts the tree's growth and results in a many-branched, poorly-shaped tree.

Pine tip moth damage can be identified by tunnels in the buds or candles, and the presence of tree resin, webbing, and dead needles near the injury. Often, the small yellow to brown larva can be found in the tunnel. Tip moth injury is generally most severe on trees less than 15 feet tall.

Sprays should be applied soon after tip moths are active so young larvae are controlled before they tunnel into the bud. I began catching large numbers of pine tip moths in pheromone traps the last week of April in Dimmitt. Susceptible pines should be treated now to control hatching larvae, and should be re-treated in 7 days. Treating again in mid-June and July should control later generations.

Acephate, sold as Orthene, is recommended for tip moth control.

AN optimist is a person who thinks the "fresh-cut" yule tree won't lose 60% of its needles from tree lot to living room.

Di-Syston 2G is a granular systemic insecticide that can be applied to the soil for tip moth control. Work the granules into the soil and water the tree thoroughly.

Proper watering and fertilization of pines will encourage rapid growth and shorten the time trees are most susceptible to pine tip moth injury.

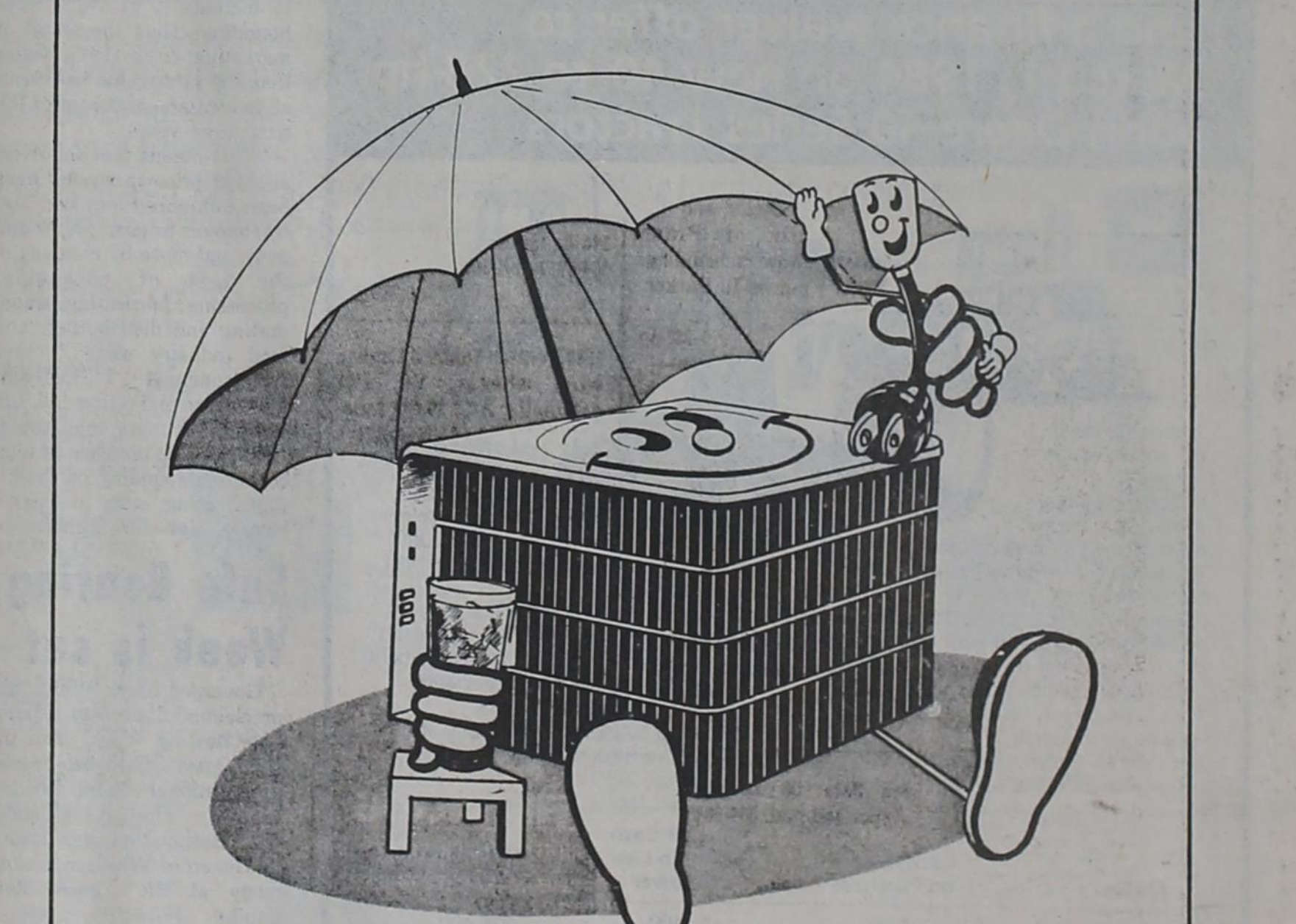
Bush scholarships are awarded by the scholarship committee of the Area Foundation to those students excelling in the study of accounting or related fields.

Wheat Board to hold election

The Texas Wheat Producers Board formed in 1971 to support wheat research and market development will hold its sixth biennial mail election between July 1 and July 15, according to W. R. Moore, Jr. of Munday, Chairman.

The three current board members whose terms are expiring are Cagle Kendrick of Stratford, Otis Harman of Tulia and Dwight Hamilton of Olney.

Any wheat farmer producing within the 34-county commercial wheat area, is eligible to vote for a board member for that district. Castro County is included in District II, along with the counties of Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf

Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Farmer, Hale and Floyd.

Moore points out that any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Wheat Producers Board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least 10 other persons eligible to vote in the election, at least 30 days (June 15) prior to the election final date (July 15), in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

Applications for names to be placed on the ballot should be sent to the organizations headquarters office, 625 Commerce Bank Building, Amarillo, 79109.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters 15 days prior to the election, Moore said. He also indicated that any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days before the election date, may obtain one at Agricultural Extension Service offices in the 34-county area as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

Wheat producers fund TWPB with a 1/2-cent assessment on their deliveries of

wheat at commercial handlers. Proceeds from such participation supports programs of foreign and domestic market expansion, food and feed wheat technical service, insect control demonstrations and other activities designed to strengthen wheat producers' income. In addition to Moore and the three members with expiring terms, other TWPB members are Robert Graves of Perryton, Wiley Tabor of Quanah, Leo Witkowski of Hereford, Kenneth Keisling of Dumas, and C. L. Edwards of Panhandle.

In 1971 when the Producers Board was formed by Texas producers as a self-help program to enhance the value of their crops, 3.5 million acres was planted to wheat that produced 31.4 million bushels valued at \$37.3 million. In 1983, even with 22% of planted acres idled by the PIK program, Texas is expected to produce 141 million bushels valued at over \$600 million. All of the increased production in the ensuing years has been exported through markets newly developed by U.S. producers through the self-assessment programs of their boards and commissions.

Persons under the age of 25 do not qualify for the discount but are urged to attend and learn the defensive driving techniques.

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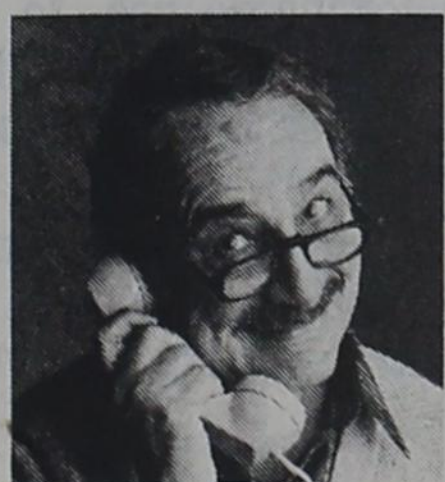
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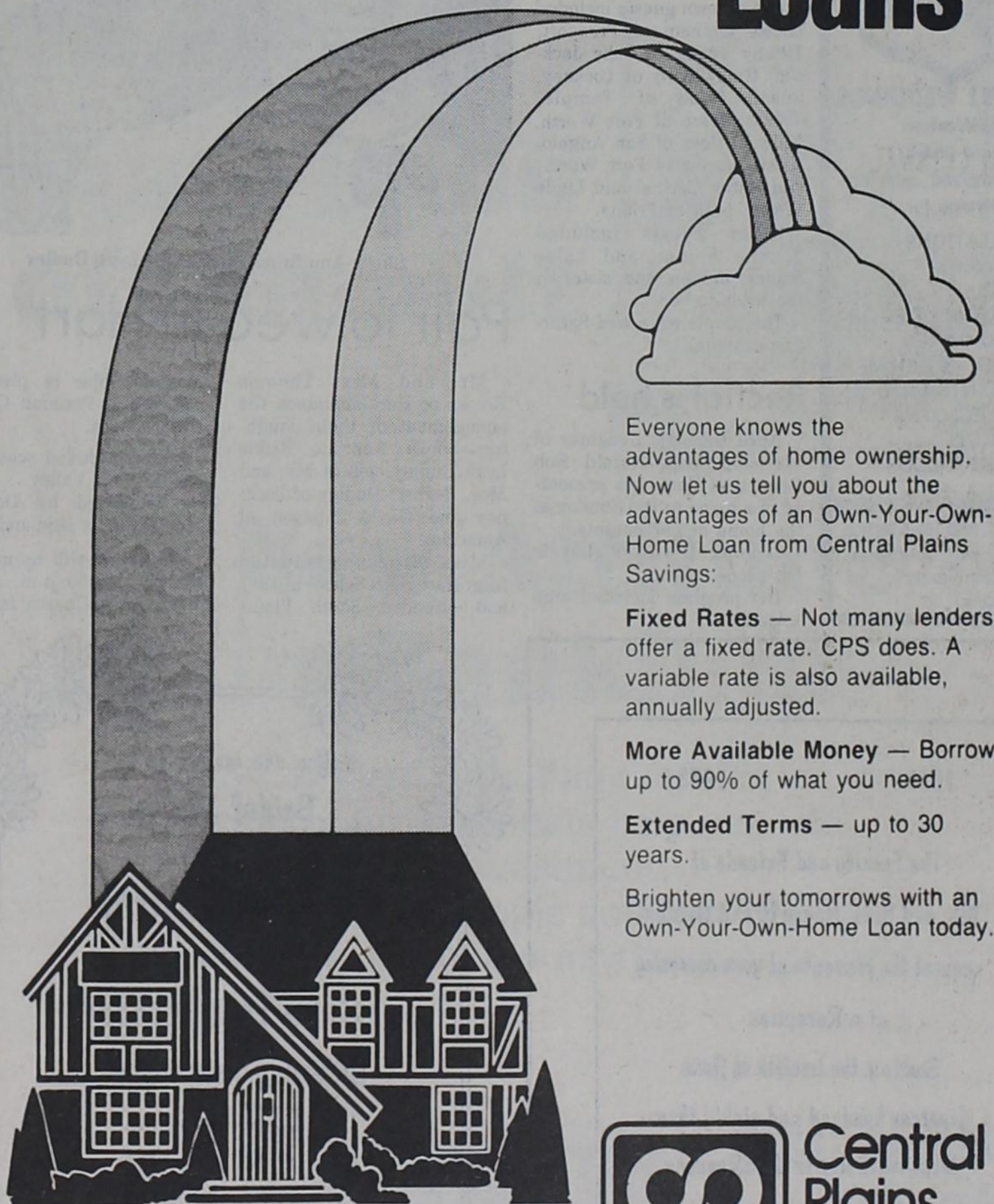

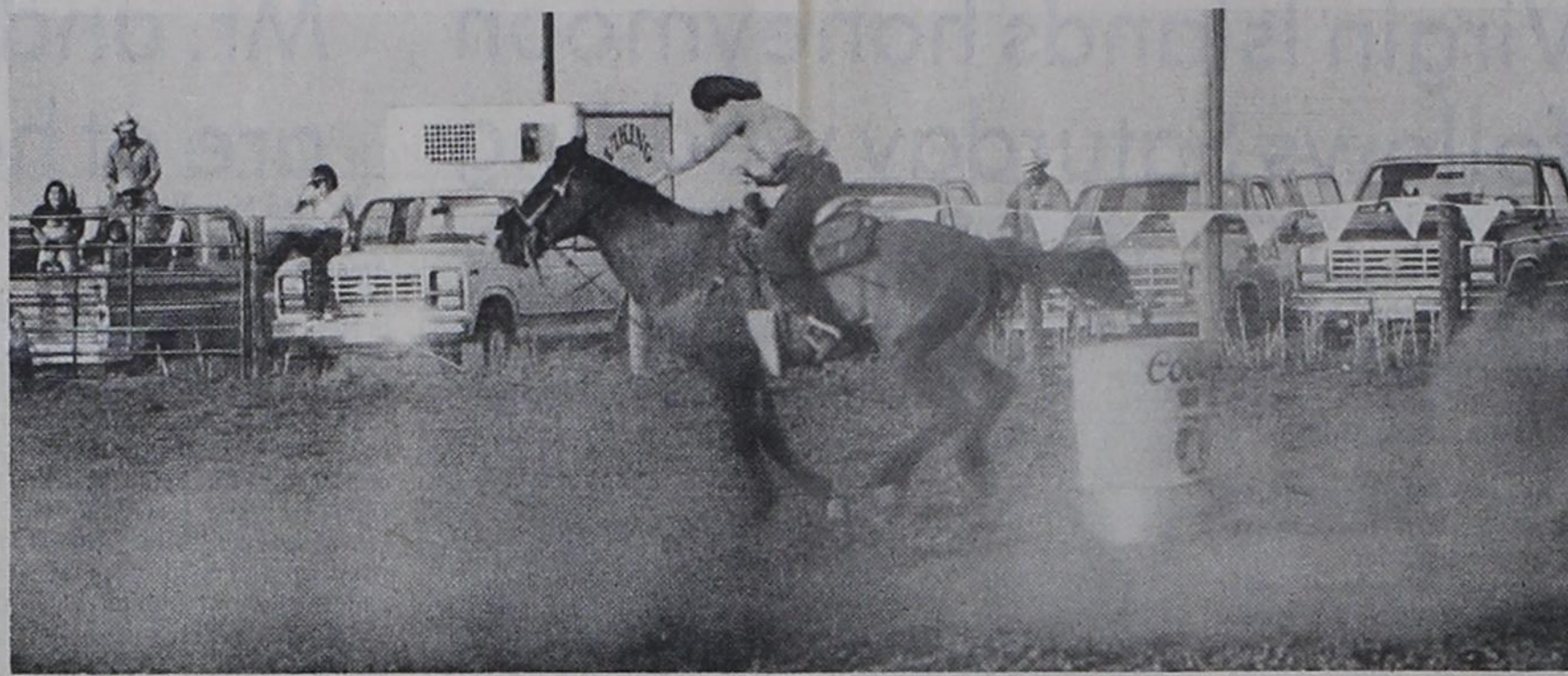
