DNA evidence led to jailer's arrest Tuesday

DNA evidence led to Tuesday's arrest of a former Big Spring Police Department jailer for sexual assault by a public servant, according to investigators.

Lawrence Wayne Hein, 43, of 811 S. Runnels, was arrested at his home Tuesday at 3:36 p.m. and charged with sexual assault by a public servant.

Texas Ranger Don Williams, the investigator in charge of the case, said the arrest came after DNA evidence in the case confirmed by Department of Public Safety labs.

"The complaint was received July 14, 2006,"

Jose Bautista drove in three runs to help the Pirates cap a three-game sweep of the Houston Astros with a 5-4 come-frombehind win

Tigers take 2 game lead over Bulldogs in district race

COAHOMA The highly anticipated pitchduel between Coahoma's Donnie Garcia Elijah Anson's Ramos never materialized. Instead, errors marred the game and paved the way for Anson to escape town with a 6-5 win and a two game district lead over the second place Bulldogs.

Trailing 1-0 in the top of the third inning, the Tigers scored three runs — two of which were unearned — and took a brief lead over the Bulldogs. Coahoma fought back — aided by two errors from Ansons' infield — and tied the game at three apiece.

For the game the Tigers were able to score three unearned runs on four Bulldog errors.

"I believe that Donnie pitched well enough to win tonight," Bulldogs skipper Brad Harmon said. "Half of their runs were unearned and he held them scoreless over the final two innings. Pitching was not our problem tonight."

In the top of the fifth Coahoma had a one-run lead, but with two outs and a runner on third, Anson got a blast to center field to tie the score. The next batter popped up to the shortstop, but an error allowed the ball to drop to the grass and allowed another run to score.

In the bottom half of the inning Ramos was replaced by his twin brother — Josh Ramos. With two outs and nobody on, Collin McMillan redeemed himself for the infield error by delivering a towering shot that cleared the left field wall. Once again the score was tied — 5-5.

"If you can't throw the ball and catch the ball — if you can't field a pop fly," Harmon fumed, "then you don't deserve to win. You are not going to win many games playing like that and we're sure not going to beat a good ball club like Anson making those silly errors. Anson made us pay for our mistakes and that's why we lost.

"We hit the ball pretty well and we pitched well. We just didn't play good defense and that turned out to be the difference tonight. Now we're in second place and two games back."

Bulldogettes bash Lady Tigers, 14-3

COAHOMA — Amy Martinez went five strong innings for Coahoma and Christie Rich went 3-for-3 at the plate to lead the Bulldogettes to a 14-3 win over the Anson Lady Tigers.

Coahoma (16-5 and 6-1 in district) is ranked No. 1 in its district and continues to play solid defense and swing the hot bats. The Bulldogettes scored one in the bottom of the first inning and eight in the second to take a commanding 9-0 lead. Martinez retired the first eight batters she faced and kept the Lady Tigers offense quiet for most of the day.

The Bulldogettes threatened to end the game after three innings, but they failed to score enough runs in the third inning to have the game called.

"We were trying to work on hitting the ball back up the middle today and not pulling the ball as much," Bulldogettes head coach Tracy Tadlock said. "Even against a weaker pitcher ... we were able to hit the ball back up the middle. That tells me that we're seeing the ball better and that we're being more disciplined in the batters box. That's what we wanted to do coming into the game and I am very

pleased with our results."

Krista Kerby, the Bulldogettes speedy center fielder, went 2-for-4 from the plate — including a leadoff triple that set the stage.

In the second inning Coahoma batted around and slapped four

doubles off the Anson starter.

By the fifth inning, the only question was if the Lady Tigers could keep from having the game called due to the 10 run rule. Down 14-2, Anson exploited a Bulldogettes error to trim the

lead to 11. However, with two runners on base, Martinez got the game ending ground ball to get out of the jam.

Crenshaw has early Masters lead

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Ben Crenshaw woke up early and turned back the clock Thursday, taking the early Masters lead on a supersized course that was supposed to leave oldtimers like him far behind.

The 55-year-old, two-time champion played shots he probably never would have imagined when he last won at Augusta in 1995 — an emotional week he devoted to his longtime teacher, Harvey Penick, who had died shortly before the tournament.

Gentle Ben used a 5-wood for his second shot on the 455-yard first hole, but got the ball to the green and safely two-putted.

He used the traditional three shots to reach the par-5 second — normally a two-shot hole for the big hitters — and waited nearly 10 minutes to putt, after Davis Love III and John Kelly batted it around the green for a while.

But Crenshaw made that putt for birdie, then made par on the next two holes and was at 1-under par after four.

With about 25 players on the course — not including Tiger Woods or defending champion Phil Mickelson — Crenshaw was tied with

Tim Clark for the lead.

The tournament kicked off when Arnold Palmer hit the ceremonial tee shot

from a first teebox that used to be the practice green.

Palmer's shot into the left rough, about 100 yards short and on the opposite side of the fairway from the bunker that's in play for the big hitters.

"That little draw off that first tee kept me out of the sand trap up there," Palmer joked

For plenty of other players, that sand trap will be well in play on the first

It was all part of the plan when the powers at Augusta started expanding their course — first in 1999 and again in 2002 and 2006. They got tired of watching



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Former OU lineman criticizes punishment as 'harsh'

former Oklahoma football player who was kicked off the team with former quarterback Rhett Bomar says he believes his dismissal was unfair.

Former offensive lineman J.D. Quinn and Bomar were permanently dismissed from the team the day before the start of practice last fall for taking money for hours they did not work at a Norman auto dealership.

Quinn, who transferred to Montana, told the Tulsa World he didn't understand why he and Bomar were kicked off the team Aug. 2.

"All I did was take cash," Quinn said. "I didn't break any laws and I get kicked off the team, but there's people on the team that are breaking laws and failing drug tests and stuff like that, and there's nobody getting kicked off the team for that type of stuff."

Quinn declined to provide details of his allegations about other players, but said it was not neces-

"I was just saying around the country. I wasn't saying it in the context of Oklahoma. There's just people I've heard of doing things."

Motorists urged to observe all 'signs of change'

t seems like every week is designated as a special observance for some cause these days. As a result, the message seems to get lost in all the things that seem vitally important in our day-to-day lives. That's why we're reasonably sure most people are unaware this is National Work Zone Awareness Week.

That's why Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and federal transportation officials are encouraging traveling motorists to pay special attention to the "signs of change" alerting them to work taking place on Texas roadways this week.

What's more, they're urging drivers to obey work zone advisory signs not only during this week's national observance period, but throughout the year.

While Texas no longer leads all states with 154 work zone fatalities as reported in 2005, the year for which the most recent statistics are available, it does rank a close third behind California's 155 and Florida's 162 work zone fatalities for that

Although not leading that list is a good thing, especially considering the fact that Texas has considerably more paved roadway mileage than any other state, there's still plenty of room for improvement. Highway fatalities are never a good thing, regardless of where they occur, but they seem especially pointless when they take place in well-signed areas making it clear that hazards exist and that defenseless workers are laboring to improve the roadway.

Officials want to reduce those numbers and we can all can help by following these tips:

- Slow down.
- Pay attention to the signs.
- Expect the unexpected.
- Keep a safe traveling distance do not tail-
- Obey road crew workers or flaggers.
- Stay alert and minimize distractions.
- Keep up with the traffic flow.
- Prepare for delays leave early and listen to traffic reports.
- Be patient and stay calm.

With nearly a 50 percent increase in work zone fatalities in the U.S. between 1997 and 2004, TxDOT officials say work zone safety is clearly a growing concern.

In 2004, 1,068 work zone fatalities occurred. Federal transportation safety officials estimate more than four out of every five work zone fatalities are motorists — not workers.

In all, during 2004, an estimated 115,000 work zone crashes happened, causing an estimated 49,620 injuries.

Nationally, this translates to one work zone fatality every 8.2 hours (three each day) and one work zone injury every nine minutes — that's 160 a day — and that's simply too many.

To our way of thinking, in fact, just one is too many.

Late 'Swift Boat' ads blacklash

enator Kerry," Sam Fox said at his confirmation hearing to be ambassador to Belgium, "I very much respect your dedicated service to this country. I know that you were not drafted — you volunteered. You went to Vietnam. You were wounded. Highly decorated. Senator, you're a

hero.' Unfortunately for Mr. Fox, that isn't what he said when someone — he can't remember who it was — asked him for a contribution to support the independent group that was attacking Senator Kerry with the infamous "Swift Boat"

ads during the 2004 campaign. Mr. Fox can't remember who asked, but he said yes to the tune of \$50,000.

It cost him the ambassadorship last week.

The question is whether it will do any good.

There's nothing really unusual about Mr. Fox's story except the ending. He's the biggest Republican donor in Missouri and one of the biggest nationally. He was a top supporter and fundraiser for George Bush both in 2000 and 2004, and so were his sons. He chairs the Jewish Republican Coalition, and the president reportedly calls him "Foxie." He has given close to \$1 million in soft money to Republicans.

No one ever suggested that Mr.

Fox didn't have whatever qualifications are required to be ambassador to Belgium. In fact, he had the support of a number of powerful Democrats, including his home state Senator, Claire McCaskill, and Joe Lieberman.

But Kerry decided to make an issue of Fox's Swift Boat contribution, and Fox's effort to justify it on the "everybody does it" rationale fell on deaf ears. "Mr. Senator, when I'm asked, I just generally give. I did it because politically it's necessary if the other side's doing it."

"Tough politics I accept," said Sen. Chris Dodd, Kerry's fellow Democrat, a committee member and current presidential candidate. "Strong partisan views I accept. But he went over the line."

The White House, watching Democrats get in line against Fox, announced it was withdrawing his nomination. "A great shame," Arlen Specter called the demise of the Fox-to-Belgium bid. "I think that kind of political retribution is out of line.

The issue is not retribution, but responsibility. Guys like Sam Fox finance the worst of politics, but don't take responsibility for it. Just saying yes to someone, they explain later. Can't even remember who — although it must have been someone with enough clout to command a \$50,000 yes.

So long as that explanation works, they'll keep saying yes. So long as the funnel stays open, the garbage will keep flowing. Unless there is a price to be paid for supporting it, the price will be paid by the targets and the voters. If

the candidates aren't going to be held responsible for the mud thrown on their behalf, at least the people paying for the mud should be.

The Supreme Court has put independent groups beyond the reach of regulations aimed at candidates, based on the fiction that these groups really are outside the candidate's control. But the reality is that most of these groups depend for their financial support on people whose real ties are to the candidate, and who write them checks hoping and expecting that the candidate will be grateful. You can bet that when Sam Fox wrote that check for \$50,000, he figured he was helping himself with the White House and Republican insiders, not making himself unconfirmable.

Would he have written the check if he knew what it would cost him? Of course not. That's the point.

"Sam Fox had every opportunity to disavow the politics of personal destruction and embrace the truth," Sen. Kerry said in a statement after the withdrawal of the Fox nomination. "He chose not to. The White House made the right decision to withdraw the nomination. I hope this signals a new day

in political discourse." Whether it signals a new day in discourse remains to be seen, but Sam Fox's fall should at least make it a little more difficult for the next round of Swift Boaters to tap the usual suspects for funds.

A whole lotta 'wow!'

Seemingly everyone with an interest in pickup trucks has been awaiting the arrival of the extensively reworked 2007 Toyota Tundra.

Now that I've had a week behind the wheel of a rear-drive Tundra Double Cab, let me just start by saying ... Wow!

As in: Wow, this Tundra is beautifully laid out, has massive components that are seemingly bulletproof, accelerates like a scalded cat and brakes like a Nike-shod panther.

But there are other reasons to say "wow."

As in: Wow, I'd sure hate to buy gas for this thing.

And: Wow, I wouldn't want to park this truck in those oh-so-tiny parking spots.

Bottom line on the new Tundra: It's a fabulous work-site pickup and a ranch worker par excellence. But in my world of urban commuting, I'd no more pick a Tundra than I would navigate the rockladen Rubicon Trail in a

Porsche 911 Turbo. When the tested Tundra Double Cab was delivered, it was handed over to me with a warning: "Be careful when you park it. It can be interesting."

I love it when someone who drives hundreds of vehicles as part of their job says something like that. It's sort of like the doctor telling you "this might hurt a little bit."

I think I got the Tundra parked between the lines in a cramped parking lot on the eighth try. I figured it must be 300 inches long, but in truth, the tester came in at 228.7 inches. And coincidentally, when it was parked next to a 2007 GMC Sierra 1500 Extended Cab pickup at one point, their rear bumpers lined up perfectly even.

So, maybe I was just intimidated by Tundra. From passersby to a random sampling of dedicated pickup drivers, everybody said it looked huge, especially from the front end. Even the folding exterior mirrors looked like they were transplanted from an 18wheeler.

And yet, everything that made me feel like a nervous urban dweller was all but forgotten when I took the Tundra out on the open road.

Its nearly 5,300 pounds rolled with silky smoothness. Steering was amazingly responsive. The Tundra's suspension swallowed the jolt of potholes, with only the sound reaching the interior cabin.

With the 5.7-liter, 381horsepower V-8, acceleration from a standing start admirable. Acceleration from the 2,000 to 4,000 revolutions per minute range was spectacular. No wonder Toyota is touting the Tundra's muscle from 40 to 70 miles per hour in its relentless TV commer-

cials. As stunning as it was to



feel this big truck moving so fast, it was equally stunning to feel how quickly the big, fourwheel, ventilated disc brakes slowed it down or brought it to an abrupt

A short sojourn in the dirt about an hour north of Sacramento wasn't really a test. The Tundra handled my mild off-road excursion like a gorilla slapping down a pesky mosquito.

For all the Tundra's brute strength, the interior was most civilized. Big, easy-to-operate controls were on the dash; seats were sizable and supportive. Leg and headroom were ample. Cupholders and power outlets were plentiful.

Predictably, fuel economy ratings on the tester were truck-like — 16 miles per gallon in the city and 20 mpg on the highway — but regular gas is the recommended fuel.

Auto industry analysts raised an eyebrow when Toyota announced that its Tundra would be priced slightly higher than similar trucks made by General Motors and Ford. But the tested Tundra Double Cab delivers a lot of truck for \$32,553, a price that included nearly \$4,000 in optional equip-

ment, including a \$695 camera/monitor for backing up with a small conveniently screen installed near the rearview mirror. Without all the extras, its starting price of \$28,110 seemed entirely reasonable.

One could go on and on: The Tundra has numerous storage compartments, generous cargo beds, a tailgate that can be maneuvered by fingertips, and 31 trim configurations.

Overall, the Tundra is a player in the monstercompetitive full-size pickup market, and American automakers have every right to be worried about

It will be interesting to see how the Tundra plays in the heavily brand-loyal truck segment.

There are longtime Ford/Chevy/Dodge truck buyers who insist they will never buy a foreignmade pickup. And there are Ford pickup buyers who won't even look at a Chevy or a Dodge, as well as the other way around.

But know this: The new Tundra is too big to be

Opening lead — queen of spades. The longer you play the game, the more you come to realize that success at bridge depends more on plain common sense than on anything else.

For example, take this deal where West led the spade queen against four hearts. Declarer won with the ace, cashed the A-K of clubs, discarding a spade, then led a diamond and finessed the ten. West won with the queen and

returned the queen of clubs, ruffed by South. Declarer then led the ten of trumps to the king, returned a dia mond from dummy and finessed the jack, losing to West's king.

Back came the spade jack, which

held, and another spade that declares ruffed. By this time, South had lost three tricks, and his last four cards diamonds. Whether South pulled East's last trump before playing the ace of diamonds or played the ace first, he had to lose another trick and so finished down one.

However, declarer missed a practically certain way to make the contract. There was no good reason to take any diamond finesses at all. since he needed them like a hole in

All he had to do, after playing the A-K of clubs, was to lead a diamond to the ace at trick four and return a diamond. The defenders would have been unable to stop South from eventually ruffing his fourth diamond with dummy's king of hearts to pro-duce his 10th trick. His only losers would have been a spade and two diamonds.

Expressed differently, South's 10 winners would have consisted of the ace of spades, ace of diamonds, A-K of clubs, his five natural trump tricks and the fourth-round diamond ruff in dummy. The diamond finesses South attempted created a risk that was no justified by the circumstances.

Senate approves bill mandating booster seats up to age 8

AUSTIN (AP) — Children under age 8 will have to be secured in a booster seat when riding in a passenger vehicle under legislation approved Wednesday by the Texas Senate.

Current law requires booster seats for children under 5 and less than 3 feet tall. The bill approved Wednesday would raise the height requirement to 4 feet 9 inches and put Texas law in line with federal guidelines.

Sen. Judith Zaffirini, the bill's sponsor, said seat belts do not fit children properly and can injure or kill them in an accident. But parents may not realize how important booster seats are because they're not required by law to use them, the Laredo Democrat said.

Starting in June 2008, people who don't follow the law would face a \$25 fine, which would be used to buy booster seats for low-income families.

The bill, approved by a 26-4 vote, now goes to the Texas House.

Self-defense claims differ from affidavits in Shaver case

LORENA (AP) — A man shot and wounded by country singer Billy Joe Shaver outside a bar has told police the attack was unprovoked, an account that

One witness said Shaver followed the victim, Billy B. Coker, 50, out of Papa Joe's Texas Saloon in Lorena Saturday night and asked, "Where do you want it?" before shooting him in the face, according to an arrest warrant affidavit.

Another witness said that after hearing gunfire, she went outside and heard Shaver say to Coker, "Tell me you are sorry," and "Nobody tells me to shut up," according to the affidavit signed by acting Lorena Police Chief John Moran.

Coker told police that he and Shaver had been talking inside for an hour or more and discovered that Shaver's wife was the widow of Coker's cousin. Coker said Shaver later asked him to go outside and then said, "Where do you want it?" before shooting him in an unprovoked attack, according to the affidavit.

Coker was released Tuesday from a Waco hospital.

Shaver's attorney Joseph A. Turner has said Coker was drunk, aggressive and had a knife and that he followed Shaver outside. Turner said that while witness accounts in any incident will differ somewhat, especially when people have been drinking, he is surprised that the documents do not mention the knife.

"Clearly the witnesses did not see the whole thing if they didn't see the knife," Turner told The Associated Press on

State leaders work to settle potentially expensive lawsuit

AUSTIN (AP) — State leaders spent hours behind closed doors Wednesday trying to hammer out a settlement in a 14-year-old children's Medicaid lawsuit before lawmakers get stuck with an unfavorable and expensive court ruling.

State Rep. Warren Chisum said the state would make every effort to settle the case before it goes before U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler, who has a history of making aggressive demands of the Legislature.

"We don't feel very comfortable relying on Judge Justice to give us any slack," Chisum said, after emerging from the closed-door meeting with plaintiffs attorneys and state policy experts.

An April 9 hearing before Justice is scheduled in the case, which stems from a class-action lawsuit filed in 1993 claiming the state did not provide adequate

care for children enrolled in Medicaid. Susan Zinn, an attorney for the plaintiffs in the case, said she had hoped to have an agreement Wednesday, but

would continue planning for a trial.

O'Connor says she's concerned about attacks on judges

DALLAS (AP) — Former Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor said Wednesday that she has grown weary of partisan attacks on judges, criticisms that she believes are causing citizens to lose faith in the judicial system.

O'Connor detailed plans to establish a Web site to teach schoolchildren about the judicial branch of government during a speech to law students, lawyers and fellow judges at a judicial conference at Southern Methodist University.

O'Connor, 77, said she finds troubling the "increased number of attack on judges that are coming out of the halls of Congress and out of state legislatures across the country." Single-issue advocacy groups are tagging judges with labels such as "activist judges" or "godless, secular humanists" to win passage of propositions or amendments to state constitutions, she said.

"The founders of our country did not intend that Congress or the legislative branch dictate results in specific cases,"

House bills on electricity deregulation derailed for now

House agreed Wednesday to allow regulators to reduce prices for some residential electric customers, but the legislation was derailed before lawmakers could vote on whether the state can review the proposed record buyout of TXU Corp.

After more than two hours of debate, the whole bill by Rep. Phil King, a Weatherford Republican, was halted because of a technical point raised by a fellow Republican.

Lawmakers were moving toward a vote on whether to allow state regulators to review the pending \$32 billion sale of Dallas-based TXU to private equity firms. King opposed that attempt to change his bill.

The deal would be the highest-priced private takeover in U.S. corporate history.

Once King's bill was blocked, it was sent back to a House committee and likely will be brought up again in the full House later this month.

Earlier, King teamed with some Democrats to add a provision to his legislation allowing the Public Utility Commission to lower elec-

tricity prices for residential customers under a specific formula if their prices rose above a certain level.

TXU threatens plant shutdowns over penalty

DALLAS (AP) — TXU Corp. said it could be forced to shut down some of its power plants if it can't come to terms with the state Public Utility Commission over charges that the power company manipulated the wholesale market.

Mike McCall, chief executive of TXU's wholesale division, wrote to the commission that its proposed penalty of \$210 million raises doubt that the Dallasbased utility could afford to operate older natural gas plants.

TXU, the largest power generator in Texas, rejects the commission's accusations that it manipulated the Texas electric market in 2005 by selling power to the market at inflated prices and causing electricity prices to rise 15.5 percent during a four-month summer stretch.
