Voter registration deadline nears, official reminds

Thursday is the deadline for area residents planning to cast a ballot in the May 12 election to register to vote, as local elections officials urge citizens to check their voter preparedness.

"The registration deadline for any election is 30 days prior to the election day," said Saundra Bloom, election administrator for the county. "If they haven't received their card or aren't sure if they're registered, all they have to do is come by the office. They can fill out the voter registration card and their card should be mailed to them in time for the May 13 election.


AP Golf Writer AUGUSTA, Ga. Augusta National is called the "cathedral of golf," and it sure sounded like one Thursday.

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

Spurs prove that they can handle Suns

Associated Press Writer SAN ANTONIO — Tony Parker scored a seasonhigh 35 points to lead the San Antonio Spurs past the Phoenix Suns with a 92-85 victory Thursday night.

Tim Duncan had 22 points and 10 rebounds, and Michael Finley added 19 points and 10 boards in the matchup between the Western Conference's secondand third-place teams.

Steve Nash led the Suns with 20 points, while Phoenix's four other starters all scored below their averages. Phoenix had its lowest field-goal percentage of the season — 38.6 percent — and beat its season-low point total by just two points.

San Antonio came into went out of bounds on the Thursday's game three games behind Phoenix for the No. 2 seed in the West. The Spurs have won seven straight home games against the Suns.

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

FBI agent may have been killed by fellow agent in robbery stakeout

READINGTON, (AP) — State police captured a third bank robbery suspect Friday connected to the deadly shooting of an FBI agent who had been tracking the men.

The agent's team had fired on the armed suspects outside a bank branch in Readington on Thursday, but the FBI said the suspects did not shoot back and the agent may have accidentally been killed by one of his own colleagues.

"Preliminarily, information suggests the agent may have been fatally wounded as a result of the accidental discharge of another agent's weapon during a dynamic arrest situation," the FBI said in a statement released Thursday night.

Two of the robbery suspects were captured shortly after the shooting. The third fled on foot and was arrested Friday morning in Branchburg, State Police Lt. Gerald Lewis said.

N.J. on the arrest. Some 300 officers had been searching for the suspect, identified as Francisco Herrera-Genao, 22,of New Brunswick.

Special Agent Barry Lee Bush, assigned to the FBI's Newark office, had been searching for suspects believed to be responsible for at least four bank robberies, the FBI said. In two of robberies, the suspects had fired assault weapons while inside the bank, the agency said.

Pedro Ruiz, special agent in charge of the FBI's Newark office, said the suspects captured Thursday had two assault rifles and a handgun with them but didn't fire when Bush and the other agents confronted them outside a PNC Bank branch.

Investigators from the agency's Inspection have Division been assigned to investigate the shooting, the FBI said. Ruiz said he did not yet know how many shots were fired and would not elaborate.

magine this classified ad: Wanted to buy: Newborn babies. Willing to pay pregnant women \$500 not to have an abortion and to put their babies up for adoption. If interested. contact the state of Texas at 1-888-BUY-BABY; ask for state Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston.

If Sen. Patrick gets his way, the state of Texas will soon be sanctioning and engaging in human trafficking, in a bribe-for-baby bargain. The senator has sponsored a bill that would offer pregnant women a cash incentive in exchange for carrying unwanted pregnancies to term and relinguishing their parental rights.

SB 1567 would authorize the state to cut checks to women with wombs for rent up to 30 days after a birth and when they give up their babies for adoption.

Call it a parting gift, on the way out the hospital door, but to where? Sen. Patrick must presume these women would stop by their favorite discount stores on the way home to buy an Xbox, an iPod, or an iPhone — but not all three — with his cash, after bartering away their babies.

Call it what it is, a cheap shot at women and a cheapening of human life. My son is worth more to me than \$500, and surely, Sen. Patrick wouldn't sell his son or daughter for the same amount. These children of unplanned pregnancies are worth more, too. Sen. Patrick and conservative brethren speak sanctimoniously of the sanctity of life, but are simultaneously willing to devalue it with a price

tag, and a nominal one at that. The inanity of his insult, that he wants the state of Texas to buy children like garage sale rejects.

Don't abort that baby — sell

Sen. Patrick's eerie quid pro quo of buck-for-baby is brought to you courtesy of you and your fellow taxpayers. Yes, state dollars sucked from the state's currently strained family planning budget would fund this potential fiasco. Sen. Patrick would prefer that Texas pay for kids than for contraception. We don't have enough money for mammograms or birth control for underprivileged women, but Sen. Patrick assumes the coffers are flush with cash to purchase an infant, or two, or 3,000 — the amount he estimates his bill, should it pass, would reduce the number of abortions in the state. Sex is not a science. The only way to prevent unplanned pregnancies is to prevent them, as oxy-

moronic as it sounds. The mathematical formula is rudimentary: fewer unplanned pregnancies equals fewer abortions. (I realize the logic is complex, but try to stay with me here.) Birth control prevents unwanted pregnancies; so does abstinence. Sound public policy recognizes the latter but funds the former. Prevention is better than post hoc. If Sen. Patrick funded birth control pills, he wouldn't have to provide Pampers when women had unplanned kids.

Sen. Patrick's bill has yet to find a co-sponsor. Pro-choice, anti-abortion, and adoption-policy groups statewide — in a weirder than weird coalition of critics — oppose it.

Joe Pojman, the executive director of the Texas Alliance for Life, said recently, "We just need to make sure there isn't even the perception of baby buying going on." Even anti-choice groups are justifiably suspicious of Sen. Patrick's motives, which look more gimmicky than good-hearted Samaritan.

Although it has been referred to the state Senate Health and Human Services Committee, the bill has not been scheduled for a hearing. This cheese stands alone, which is not a good political position, but the perfect place for this morally bankrupt bill.



"timetables." Given unpopularity, Democrats can't help but profit in the short term as they appear to be advocating a position that aligns them with the majority of Americans.

Indeed, the more they hear themselves rant, the more emboldened they become toward extremism and to attempt legislation outside their constitutional authority.

A telltale sign of their increasing cockiness is their announcement that they are about to introduce a bill to cut funding for the Iraq war. Up until now, they've lacked the courage to go that far and have just danced around the issue.

But just off the presses, we read that Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid and Sen. Russ Feingold are co-sponsoring a bill that will "bring our involvement in the Iraq war to an end."

The relevant part of the bill states: (c) Prohibition on Use of

Funds — No funds appropriated or otherwise made available under any provision of law may be obligated or expended to continue the deployment in Iraq of members of the United States Armed Forces after March 31, 2008."

Be aware that as recently as Nov. 30, 2006, Sen. Reid said something quite different. He said, "We're not going to do anything to limit funding or cut off funds.'

What has changed since then that would warrant such an about face? How about the fact that the troop surge is showing signs of success? No, that would cut the other way now, wouldn't it? More likely it's the increasing pressure from the antiwar base and the reportedly solid poll numbers against the war.

But, as I said, the Democrats better be wary of what they wish for. If we do end our significant military involvement in Iraq before the Iraqi forces can protect themselves and their new government as a result of Democratic pressure, Democrats will have to answer for the mayhem and instability that will ensue.

Even if we have relatively secured the situation there enough to withdraw before the 2008 election, which is doubtful, it's unlikely that Democrats will benefit politically from that development.

An end to the Iraq war will not end the war on terror (WOT), as much as many liberals appear to believe otherwise, since they think the WOT is but a figment of our neoconservative paranoid imagination. With our withdrawal from Iraq, the nation will once again have an opportunity to focus on the Democrats' policies on the WOT, which have been obscured by the enormous elephant in the room: Iraq. It will not be a pretty

or comforting sight.

Without the aid and comfort of an unpopular war (Iraq), voters, assuming Republicans can sharpen their communication skills, will be reminded of the Democrats' sympathy for the enemy's position on a far-ranging array of issues related to the WOT.

DNA evidence may free Lufkin man

DALLAS (AP) — The lawyer for a man who spent 10 years in prison for a rape he maintains he did not commit said Thursday she expects her client to become the 13th Dallas County man to be exonerated with the help of DNA evidence.

James Curtis Giles, 53, of Lufkin, has a court hearing scheduled for Monday in which his lawyer and the Dallas County District Attorney's Office will present evidence they say proves his innocence in the 1982 gang rape of a Dallas woman in her apartment.

"He is overjoyed to finally have this day," Vanessa Potkin, Giles' lawyer and a staff attorney with the Innocence Project, said Thursday.

Lisa Smith, an assistant district attorney in Dallas County, said her office's investigation into the 25-yearold case found a co-defendant's statements that implicated another man were never presented at trial nor provided to Giles' lawyer.

The case turned on a case of mistaken identity, Potkin and Smith said.

State leaders reach agreement in children's health care case

AUSTIN (AP) — State leaders said Thursday they had reached an agreement with the plaintiffs in a 14year-old lawsuit regarding children's Medicaid, days before a court hearing on the case.

The agreement must be approved by U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice, who is scheduled to oversee a hearing in the case Monday.

"With this agreement, dental and medical access will dramatically improve for our neediest children, those on Medicaid," Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick said in a joint news release.

The two did not disclose the proposed terms of the settlement, but an attorney who accepted the agreement on behalf of plaintiffs said the deal was wide reaching.

The case stems from a class-action lawsuit filed in 1993 claiming the state did not provide adequate care for children enrolled in Medicaid.

Chase of suspected illegal immigrants leads to school

PALMVIEW (AP) - A South Texas elementary school was locked down for about an hour Thursday after a chase involving suspected illegal immigrants ended at the school.

No one was hurt.

Border Patrol spokesman Oscar Saldana said two of 19 immigrants were caught by LaJoya Independent School District police and the others were caught by city, school district or Border Patrol personnel nearby.

La Joya ISD spokeswoman Lizette Martinez said precautionary measures were taken at E.B. Reyna Elementary School in Palmview.

Saldana said the immigrants were in a van that struck a parked vehicle. He didn't know who was chasing them.

Palmview is 10 miles west of McAllen.

Crittenden Co. sheriff's office identifies suspect in '98 slaying

MARION, Ark. (AP) - A suspect in the fatal shooting of a Gilmore grocer and former mayor in 1998 is waiting to be extradited from Texas, where he was serving a sentence for a parole violation, according to a Crittenden County investigator.

Melvin Boyd, 55, faces charges of capital murder and aggravated robbery stemming from the slaving of grocer Emmitt Luther, sheriff's investigator Thomas Martin said.

A warrant from Arkansas seeking Boyd's arrest

arrived in Texas as he was set to be released after serving his parole-violation sentence, Martin said.

The investigator said Boyd had also served time in Arkansas, Illinois and Kentucky on other convictions. "He's a chronic criminal," Martin said.

Boyd, a Gilmore native, came to investigators' attention after they began reviewing the cold case and interviewing people who were able to place Boyd at the scene of the crime, Martin said.

Luther, owner of Luther's Lucky Dollar Store, was found dead inside his store on Feb. 3, 1998. Police said \$20 and \$5 bills were missing from the cash register.

At the time, the crime shocked the small town, as Luther, 74, was known for allowing customers to buy groceries on credit or would lend them money. Though police made trips to Chicago to interview witnesses, no arrests were made.

Martin said deputies had told Luther's family of the arrest.

"It was absolutely amazing to see the relief on the family's face," Martin said. "They were upset and happy at the same time, but this does give them closure."

Texas may ban harvest of wild turtles

AUSTIN (AP) — State wildlife officials have taken a step toward banning the commercial collection of all wild turtles in Texas — a move cheered by some biologists and criticized by trappers.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved the ban proposal Thursday, but the rule is subject to a 30-day public comment period that's expected to begin later this month.

The rule applies to public and private lands and covers 20 native turtle species, including the red-eared slider, ornate box and Texas diamondback terrapin.

Officials say demand for turtle meat has grown in Asia and some American cities.

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Investigators: NASA watchdog abused authority

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) -NASA's top watchdog routinely tipped off department officials to internal investigations and quashed a report related to the Columbia shuttle explosion to avoid embarrassing the agency, investigators say.

A report by the Integrity Committee, a government board that investigates inspectors general, found that Robert Cobb "created an appearance of a lack of independence," and it questioned whether NASA would do enough to reprimand him.

NASA Michael Griffin has proposed sending Cobb to — found that he has

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
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


