

Just for the information of newcomers to the community it should be explained that you are not required to buy an animal at the auction if it is your desire to contribute a premium. Stock buyers bid a floor price on all of the animals offered for sale. When the individual animal is auctioned off the bidder is only required to pay the difference between the amount of his bid and the floor price. The stock buyer then pays the floor price and takes possession of the animal. The bidder can, however, claim the animal if he wishes to pay the full price of his bid. All businessmen are urged to attend the sale and con tribute to it's success.

It should be remembered that it was a federal court that declared the assessment of a poll tax, as a requirement for voting, unconstitutional. Maybe it should follow that a federal law enforcement agency should determine that the decision is respected and upheld, and that could only be done by some type of inspection.
