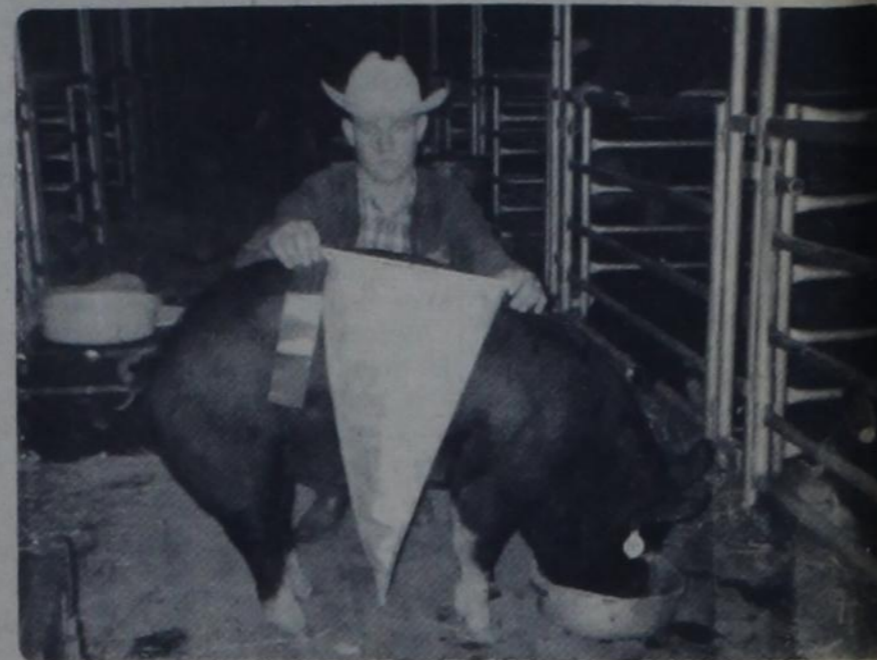

### Communist Government A Challenge To American Government Of Freedom

Communism, an atheistic, totalitarian ideology superimposes itself upon the economy, welfare and morality of a nation. A communist government rules by absolute dictatorship, claiming for the state all property and means of production. It abolishes individual freedoms and creates spiritual emptiness in the people it controls.

To face up to Communism as a creative challenge to our free way of life, we need to look fearlessly at our weaknesses, both as individuals and as a nation.

The Korean War marked the first time that Americans met totalitarian Communism face to face on the battlefield and in prison camps. At the close of that war a five year study was made by the United States Army to determine how some 7,000 young Americans stood up to the experience of three years of imprisonment.

One out of every three prisoners in Korea was guilty of some kind of collaboration with the enemy, although there was little about the so-called "brain-washing" which could not have been resisted by any man who had strong personal convictions and who wanted to resist.

American prisoners in Korea had the highest death rate of any war in our history; a tragic 38 percent. This was not the result of starvation or epidemics or any mass executions, but of a psychological killer the soldiers themselves called "give-up-itis." The Army's conclusion was that a distressingly large number of these strapping 18 to 22 year-old men lacked inner resources to fall back on when the going got tough; physically well-nourished, they had somehow not gotten from

their home the convictions that made life seem worth living under disagreeable or uncomfortable conditions.

While there were instances of individual heroism and steadfastness by many American soldiers in Korea, this study was concerned with probing for reasons behind the large percentage of collaborations. And since the specialists who prepared this report noted that these seven thousand Americans were fairly representative of the nation as a whole, perhaps it can serve as a frank look at ourselves.

At the beginning of the American's imprisonment, the Communists isolated all soldiers with leadership qualities. Only 5 percent of the Americans needed to be so separated; the Communists found no trace of leadership in the remaining 95 percent.

It seems obvious that the Soviet Union wants no part of atomic war if she can achieve her objectives through ideological weapons. The question is: can we match, and surpass the Soviets in ideological weapons?

The experience in Korea showed us the following: Communism makes greatest advances when there is an absence of convictions. Therefore the values in American life, our emphasis on material belongings and security that is measured in a bank balance, our urge for conformity, the growth of indifference where religion is concerned, the drive of non-believers to eliminate God from our schools, oaths of office and public institutions, all these feed the Communist mill.

Frankly, if we think of winning with love, not hate, that we be an informed people about our nation, about Communism, about

Dear Fellow Texans:

Last week I discussed with you my bill to compensate the innocent victims of crime, one of my major concerns now that the Cold War GI Bill has passed. Another main area to which I will be devoting much of my time is that of conservation projects in Texas, conservation of land and of water, and of parks and recreation areas.

My first bill, now pending, is to create a National Park in the Guadalupe Mountain region in

West Texas, 35 miles southwest of Carlsbad Caverns and 95 miles east of El Paso, west of the Pecos River.

This Guadalupe Mountain area contains a unique and beautiful system of mountains, valleys, canyons as well as having much wild-life, elk, deer, wild turkey, and the famous Ponderosa pine tree. This area has been recommended by President Lyndon B. Johnson as an addition to our National park system and has been given the approval of the National Park

Service.

Before an area can be designated as a National Park, it must be both unique and large, and the Guadalupe Mountain area is well qualified in both of these areas. I first introduced a Guadalupe Mountains Park Bill in 1963, and have been working for it for three years. We have created a great deal of interest in this area in Texas and in the Nation. Earlier this year, Justice William O. Douglas, a famous outdoorsman and conservationist, made a trip to this region and was highly complimentary about its possibilities.

Another area which I will be working hard to preserve is the Big Thicket Area in Southeast Texas, northwest of Beaumont and northeast of Houston, which has rare and wonderful plant, animal and bird life which is unique in this concentration. Tall pines, wild magnolia, wild peach trees, giant bay trees, sloughs of water and large palmettos are found, along with many species of flowers, shrubs and flowering vines.

Last year I was able to make a trip through the Big Thicket to personally see the many characteristics which make it a unique area to be preserved so that all Americans can enjoy its many beautiful attributes. The Big Thicket area is truly an unparalleled region of beauty of America.

Another bill of mine is to have a National recreational Area established in connection with the Amistad Dam on the Rio Grande near Del Rio, Texas. This recreation area will be a major attraction for tourism, water sports and scenic beauty in Southwest Texas.

These three conservation projects are needed additions to our park, recreation and conservation system in Texas.

Last year we were successful in having the Alibates Flint Quarries near Amarillo, declared a National Monument, a bill which I have worked on since 1963.

Earlier, in 1962, we were successful in having Fort Davis in the Davis Mountain area designated a National Historical Park Area and in having Padre Island declared a National Seashore Area. I worked on the Padre Island bills for four and a half years

Ruth Skinner then presented Mrs. Alice Cowen's paintings on velvet. Mrs. Cowen has always

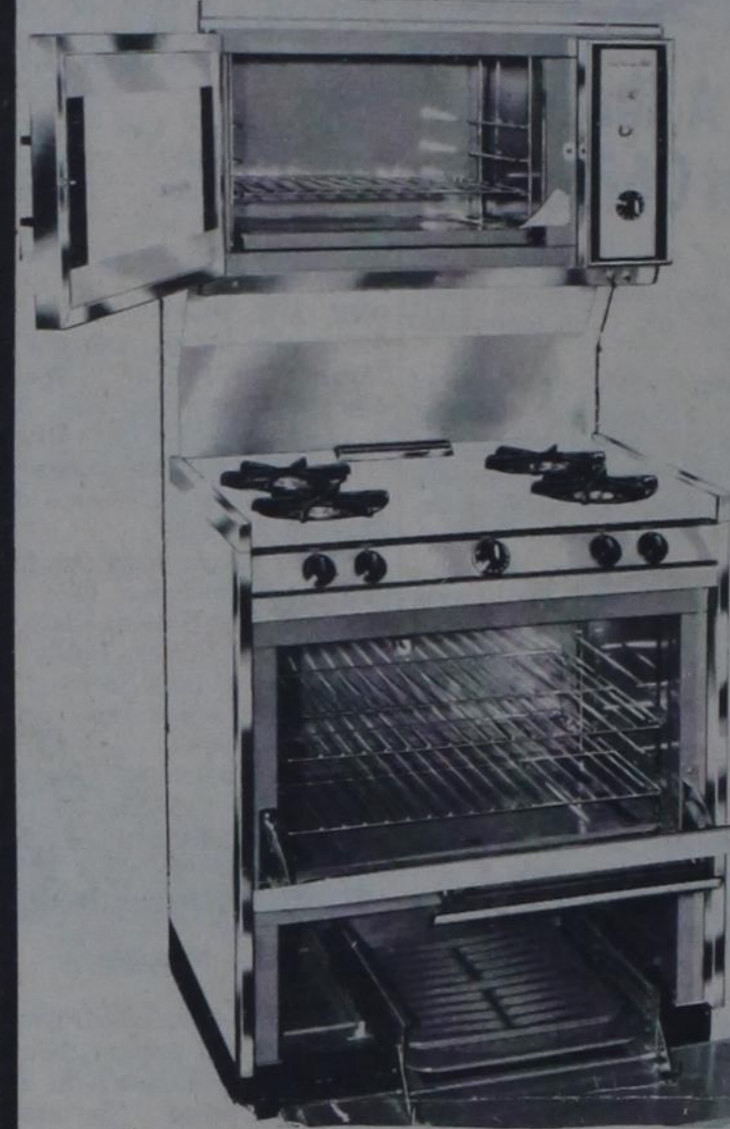
enjoyed drawing and charcoal sketching, but had not had art lessons until recent years. She demonstrated her work by making a lovely painting on velvet.

several pictures showing unusual technique or subject. One, a "trompe d'oeil", a picture designed to fool the eye, was a patchwork design, much like an old-fashioned quilt. Sue had glued bright pieces of material in random pattern on her painting board. Then she painted in the vacant spaces, copying the material patterns and even painting in the stitches. The viewer cannot tell where the actual mater-

ial stops and the painting begins. This is a good problem for the art student, since colors must be matched accurately and painting must be meticulous for the completed picture to "fool the eye." Sue also had several small plaques made by mounting real butterflies in a background of flowers, which she had painted. The monograph technique and the "trompe d'oeil" technique have been taught by Mr. Hilburn

to his classes. These are two of the many he presents in an endeavor to help each individual artist find himself. From time to time special paintings will be on sale at the Gallery. This column will carry announcements concerning them.

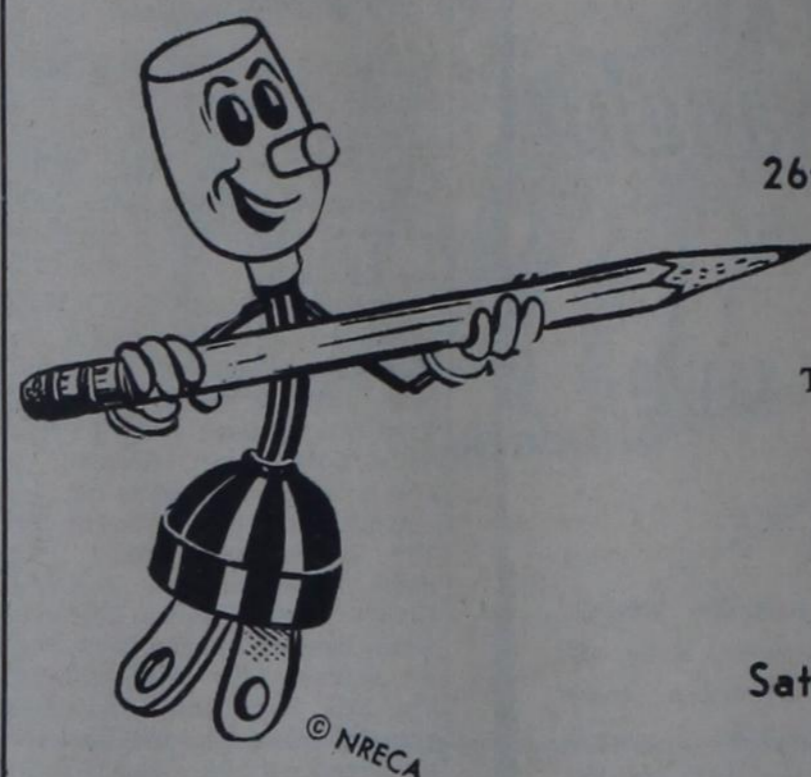
