SAN ANTONIO — Tim Duncan understands many people, maybe even a few Spurs fans, wanted to see a Game 7 between San Antonio and Phoenix.

The Suns, of course, wanted that, too, despite the bumps and bruises they sustained during the series.

But the Spurs were dead set against it. And on Friday night, they got their way.

"You have to understand we didn't want to see it go one more," Duncan said after the Spurs' 114-106 victory sent them-

against Utah. "Those guys are capable any night of putting a run together, exploding and running away with it.'

The Suns did put a run together Friday in the fourth quarter, but it was too late. With Steve Nash leading the way, the Suns cut a 20-point Spurs lead to five with under a minute to go.

"They fought back in the fourth quarter, never gave up," Duncan said. "Time just ran out on them."

And on their season.

"We left it on the floor. We couldn't get a break. We should have won this. They hit some big shots and they were knocking them down," said the Suns' Shawn Marion. "We were going back and forth battling all night.'

The Spurs closed out Phoenix 4-2 and will now meet the Jazz beginning Sunday in San Antonio. It's the Spurs' third trip to the conference finals in the last five years, and they've won the title in 1999, 2003 and 2005.

The Jazz beat the Golden State Warriors in five games to reach the conference finals.

"It's always a good feeling when your team competes at a very high level," said Spurs

Manu Ginobili had 33 points and a career-high 11 rebounds for the Spurs. Tony Parker added 30 points, while Duncan had 24 points, 13 rebounds and a careerhigh nine blocked shots.

Sammy Sosa added a double and two-run Kenny Lofton went 2-for-4 with an RBI, a stolen base and two runs scored for the last-place Rangers, who snapped a four-game losing streak.

"I've been on losing teams before and it's crazy," said the 30-year-old Vazquez. "Nothing clicks. One day you pitch well and you don't hit. Another day you hit, it's

backwards. It's hard to put it together.


"But it's still early," he said. "If everyone figures it out, we still have a chance."

Small church, huge heart

With help from volunteers, North Birdwell UMC helps with the food budget

Angelfood Ministry of Big Spring is no piece of cake. Just ask any member of North Birdwell United Methodist Church or one of the many Big Spring community volunteers.

Spring community volunteers. The congregation of the small







North Birdwell Methodist Church voted in August 2006 to join with the Angelfood Ministries of Georgia to take orders for food boxes to be sold for \$25 per box, with a special meat box that could be purchased for an extra \$18.

Since this was not a fundraiser — all monies go to purchase the food articles this small church with a membership of less than 50 knew everyone would have to work, and work hard.

The first group of orders was taken in September to be delivered the last Saturday of the month. There were 69 orders taken back then and each month has witnessed a steady rise. Now, orders reach well over 200.

"In order to get this food to Big Spring for distribution, two drivers with two helpers pulled trailers to Lubbock to pick up and return to Big Spring for a delivery time of 11 a.m.," said Madeline Boadle," Angelfood Ministry director. "Because of our order growth, it was a thrill in March to see an 18-wheeler back into our parking lot delivering to us."

After the unloading is completed, the food is divided and an assembly line is formed

to put the individual articles in boxes brought by the customers. It takes only about five minutes.

That's where the community volunteers come in.

"There is no way the church members could do this 'food ministry with a servant's heart' without the many volunteers," said Boadle. "These volunteers were not asked, they just saw the need and showed up for work on delivery day asking 'What can I do to help?'

"We do appreciate everyone and our 'hat's off' to the youth group from Westbrook for carrying the boxes to the cars. And to the owner and driver of the forklift, our aching backs appreciate you," said Boadle.

All food articles are restaurant quality, USDA inspected and Angelfood Ministries is a "faith-based program," and is open to everyone — no qualifying at all, just your name, address and a telephone number in case the truck is delayed and you need to be notified.

June's menu includes a 2pound salisbury steak dinner, 2 pounds of St. Louis ribs, 2 pounds of chicken tenders, 18 ounces of stuffed manicotti, eight 4-ounce country fried beef steaks, 2 pounds of chicken breast filets, a 6.5-ounce lasagna hamburger dinner, a 7.5-ounce Ranch and bacon pasta salad, 16 ounces of pinto beans, 16 ounces of sliced frozen carrots, 16 ounces of corn, a 24-ounce package of steak-cut french fries, an 8-ounce package of corn muffin mix, a pound of white rice, a 10-count package of waffles and one dessert item. The price is \$25.

Anyone who orders the main unit may also order one of more of the specials.

Specials include:

• a 5.5 pound grill box containing four 8-ounce New York strips, a 1-pound Italian sausage, four 6-ounce pork chops and a 1-pound chicken breast filet. Price: \$18.

• a 5.5 BBQ box containing four 6-ounce baseball-cut sirloin steaks, four 4-ounce bacon-wrapped sirloin filets, four 4-ounce steak burgers and 2 pounds of beef back ribs. Price: \$18.

• 10-pound chicken combo containing 2 pounds of wings, 2 pounds of breaded tenders, 2 pounds of breaded nuggets, 2 pounds of individually quickfrozen boneless chicken breasts and 2 pounds of breaded frying chicken. Price: \$17.

All orders must be paid for in cash.

Orders are taken the first part of each month to be delivered the last Saturday of the month. Each month offers a different menu and specials. The collection site is North Birdwell United Methodist Church, located at 2702 N. Birdwell.





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

Now that voters have given them a \$21 million check for renovations, Howard College officials will begin the process of spending the new-found money when they hold their regular meeting at 12:30 p.m. Monday in the Student Union Building Tumbleweed Room.

More than 60 percent of voters gave their approval on May 12 to the bond issue, which will finance renovation, construction

and equipping of several buildings on HC's Birdwell Lane campus.

Unofficial results show that 1,623 people voted in favor of the bond, while 994 voted in opposition.

The bond will finance a number of repairs at the Birdwell Lane campus, including:

• Infrastructure concerns such as water, sewer and gas lines, underground electrical service and heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems.

• "Building envelope" needs architects and engineers. such as replacement of aging brick and mortar, windows, doors and gas and electrical services in laboratory facilities.

• Interior repairs and upgrades such as asbestos removal, and replacement of some floors, walls, furniture, fixtures and equipment.

At Monday's meeting, trustees are expected begin implementing plans relating to the renovation, including the solicitation of requests for proposals from

• Transition and build-out plans for the San Angelo campus. • Facilities master plan for SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf.



King James leads Cavs over Nets, 88-72

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The Cleveland Cavaliers are going to the Eastern Conference final for the first time since 1992 because LeBron James finally got a little help — from two very unexpected sources.

Little-used subs Donyell Marshall and Daniel Gibson combined for 17 fourth-quarter points and the Cavaliers posted an 88-72 victory over the New Jersey Nets on Friday night to reach the conference final only four years into King James' career.

"It's a great feeling," said James, who had 23 points, eight assists and eight rebounds despite sitting almost seven minutes in the third quarter with four fouls. "This is one of the best feelings I've ever had as a basketball player."

James won't get much time to enjoy it: Cleveland will open the conference finals against the topseeded Pistons on Monday night in Detroit.

series," said Drew Gooden, who added 16 points and seven rebounds. "This is my third time seeing them in a playoff atmosphere and I am tired of losing to those guys."

In some ways, the Cavaliers are lucky they weren't facing a Game 7 against the Nets on Sunday.

They built a 22-point lead and almost squandered it when James got his second, third and fourth fouls in the opening five minutes of the second half.

Ahead by 15 at the time, James had a front row seat watching Jason Kidd almost single-handedly wipe out all but one point of that margin heading into the final 12 minutes. Kidd had 12 points, three rebounds and two assists playing every second of the third quarter, when the Cavs were held to eight points.

"I think it was tough on every Cavs fan to watch that third quarter," James said. "It's one of

Cleveland coach Mike Brown did two things at that point.

He put James back in and he decided to go with a shooting lineup that included Marshall, Gibson and Damon Jones. It worked on both ends of the court as Cleveland outscored New Jersey 27-12.

"We understand that one guy is not going to beat a team of five," Jones said of James. "We understand that we have to play together to be successful and that's why we are on the way to the conference finals."

With Cleveland ahead 64-63, James set up consecutive 3-pointers by Gibson and Marshall to push the lead to 70-63 with 8:03 to play.

A couple of free throws by Kidd narrowed the lead to 70-65, but James hit a jumper — his first basket since the first quarter - and Marshall added another 3 to push the lead to 75-66.

New Jersey never got

New use for duct tape: Stop gaffes

first heard Louie Gohmert speak in October 2004. He was campaigning for his present position, U.S. representative for Texas' 1st Congressional District, and was at a debate at Stephen F. Austin State University (SFA) in Nacogdoches. Gohmert was predictable and polished,

offering a perfect recitation of the **Republican Party** platform, until close to the end, when the moderator pitched a softball to Gohmert. What would

Gohmert do for SFA if he were elected? Candidates answering that question generally rattle off a laundry list of pseudo-promises they

know impossible to fulfill, but voters buy their lies because we hear what we want - more federal funding, improved constituent relations and the like. But not Gohmert. No, he shared his honest, unscripted opinion with the quickly dwindling crowd of a couple hundred or so. Gohmert offthe-cuff was a scary thing then, and still is:

Chickens. That was Gohmert's answer. Gohmert thought chickens were the future of SFA. He was referring to the 477-acre beef and poultry farm the university maintains and suggested that more SFA students should be interested in chicken farming. If elected, Gohmert would use the power of his position to encourage more college students in East Texas to be chicken farmers.

A snicker from the astonished audience turned into nearly everyone in the debate hall laughing as Gohmert tried unsuccessfully to

defend his unpopular view — at least with that crowd — that more college students should be chicken farmers. By the end of the debate, some 15 minutes later, as my theneditor and I were leaving, someone — perhaps a supporter from the opponent's campaign, or maybe just some crank — had donned a chicken suit and was outside the auditorium, posing and clucking. So much for journalistic objectivity. My boss and I laughed (OK, we clucked, too) at how out of touch Gohmert was with his future constituents.

Forward three years and Rep. Gohmert, who won his job solely because of redistricting in Texas and because of his party affiliation, needs to learn the value of silence. Alternatively, he could stick some duct tape — the quintessential Southern fix all - over his mouth. Gohmert is pontificating again, this time about the Local Law Enforcement Hate Crimes Prevention Act, and he's still out of touch. Someone silence the man before he speaks again. The U.S. House of

Representatives, minus Gohmert's nod of support, recently voted to add gender and sexual orientation to the categories currently covered by federal hate crimes law — race. color, national origin and religion. The present hate-crime law only protects people when they are engaged in a federally protected activity, like voting. According to Gohmert — who fancies himself a weekend preacher when on leave from his real job in the Capitol was recently in Gilmer at the Rotary Club, in the heart of his Bible Belt district. According to him, this bill's nefarious purpose is really Christian persecution. After its passage in the House, he said, this bill "is an effort to

silence people who have religious beliefs to step forward and say something is wrong.'

Gohmert added people who "don't understand the Christian heart" pushed this legislation.

As a former judge, Gohmert should know his statement on his congressional Web site — "Under the Democratic majority's proposed law, a minister simply preaching the Ten Commandments could be pursued for a Hate Crime if some nut committed a crime against a homosexual after listening to his sermon" — is legally inaccurate, at best. (Remember the First Amendment — and the freedom of speech protection it provides, Judge Gohmert?)

The glory days of the religious right's dominance in politics are over, but Gohmert is still predictably a step behind, out of touch with the crowd. It's no longer the evil, valueless Democrats versus the holier-thanthou Republicans. It's safe and nearly expected to be a Democrat with values today, as the 2008 campaign cranks up. But Gohmert is stuck in 2004-style, Karl Roveinspired hate-the-homosexuals/getout-the-vote rhetoric.

Send the man a memo of talking points on college students, chickens and Christian values.

Or, at the very least, send him some duct tape.

TO THE EDITOR:

The Big Spring City Council has approved the issuance of bonds to be used for street improvements. Before the 9/11 disaster in New York City, a proposal to include the full lengths of Lancaster, Scurry and Gregg streets was being discussed. Because of 9/11, and later, due to the possible closure of the VA Hospital and possible changes to the functions at the Big Spring State Hospital, this project was tabled. Street improvements are a worthwhile project. These three streets are in very poor condition and are major routes for vehicles. Last year, before any formal action was taken by the council, these same streets were still assumed to be the entire scope of the project. Before the election to approve or disapprove the issuance of bonds, the city presented no definitive outline of the scope of the work being considered. As I spoke with people prior to the election, they were still under the impression that all of Lancaster, Scurry and Gregg were the streets being considered. The language on the ballot was intentionally vague. Since the issue was approved by the voters, changes have been made by the council concerning the projected areas. Only two streets, Scurry and Main, are mentioned and the lengths of their improvements are questionable. Added is a "beautification" zone to be constructed in the middle of Main Street, street renovation and period lighting "downtown." As a condition of issuance, the entities that will provide the bonds asked if the city is going to ask for any additional bonds during the period of the life of the proposed bonds. In a council meeting, the mayor stated that there are no plans for further bond requests. Only if an emergency were to occur, such as a failure of major equipment in areas such as the potable water treatment or waste water treatment facilities, would any further bond issue be considered. This means that for at least the term of the new street bonds, which I understand is for 20 years, no further street improvements will be made. The council has once again not been honest with the citizens. These items were obviously planned long before the election was held, but the voters were not informed. If they had been, this issue might not have been approved. The voters who voted for the bonds have essentially given the city a "blank check" to do with

as it sees fit. This obviously has direct tie-ins with the proposed renovation of the Settles Hotel.

Westbrook started our laptop venture two years ago with a pilot program where a number of students took laptops with them all day long so that we could work out all the kinks. We also implemented a program at that time to move wireless laptops out to all of our leacners — grades PreK through 12 -within five years. We place new laptops with a number of teachers at the end of each semester. As of this semester we are ahead of schedule with over half of our teachers having individual laptops. This school year we completed our wireless network — all of our classrooms have wireless access. We started an intensive program at the junior high two years ago to prepare the students for a laptop in high school centering on keyboarding and application skills. At that time we also implemented a teacher training program in technology.

have no doubt about that. 1,000,000 people and only God knows how many North Koreans and Chinese were lost and we were forbidden to win! **Ridiculous!**



Some of the most bothersome hands to play are those where you are sure to make the contract, provided you guess the right way to take a two-way finesse for a missing queen. Take this case where six spades is a cinch to make if declarer knows which defender has the queen of clubs. But if he finesses against the wrong opponent, he goes down, since the diamond finesse also loses. Guesses of this type are extremely aggravating when you come up with

the wrong answer and go down as a result. They are also embarrassing because partner always seems to find a reason why you should have finessed the other way.


The actual declarer found a way to improve significantly on his chances of getting the clubs right. After winning the ace of hearts, he led a spade to the king, ruffed the jack of hearts in dummy and played another round of trumps.

He then cashed the ace of clubs and led the jack of clubs, playing low after East followed low. When the jack held, the slam was home, and South now tried for seven by taking the diamond finesse. Although this lost, declarer had the rest of the tricks

Why did South decide to play the clubs the way he did rather than finesse West for the queen? The answer is that he would not only make the slam whenever East had started with any number of clubs including the queen — essentially a 50 percent chance - but also whenever West started with the doubleton queen, roughly an additional 14 percent chance. In this latter case, West would be endplayed after winning the queen, since either a diamond return into the A-Q or a heart return, yielding a ruff-and-discard, would hand South the contract.

This study bolsters our Global Investment Strategy's theory, that productive spare capacity is nearly exhausted. This is the result of years of underinvestment in new production and the refusal to allow multinational oil companies the use of sophisticated recovery techniques in order to maximize production.

The result is simple supply vs. demand. Now, if demand rises, being that there is a lack of spare capacity, little can be done to stop crude prices from doing the same.

With nations such as Venezuela forcing out the multinationals and non-OPEC production likely to decline in the coming years, the problem will likely persist and potentially worsen as demand is expected to show continued growth.

Therefore, the world will likely rely on nations such as Saudi Arabia, Angola, Nigeria, and central Asian states such as Kazakhstan to meet future demand growth and provide any supply cushion that may be available.

Quick news... • MIT professor, Daniel Nocera, believes that photosynthesis and the understanding of that process could eventually lead to breakthroughs in clean energy. In photosynthesis, a plant captures the sun's energy and uses it to grow and reproduce. Using the same design principles of photosynthesis, Nocera believes he can convert sunlight into hydrogen. That hydrogen could then be used in fuel cells.

• Iran is the number two importer of gasoline in the world. The Iranian gasoline rationing program is slated to begin this month, but it appears the process may again be delayed. AFP reports the head of the nation's energy commission recommended the program be deferred until September because the technology needed to enforce the rationing isn't ready. The nation plans to issue "smart cards" to the citizenry in order to ration their gasoline purchases.

• In Nigeria, the Movement for the Emancipation of the Niger Delta (MEND) has attacked three oil pipelines and an export terminal that typically exports some 200 thousand barrels per day. It's unclear how production was impacted, but what is clear are MEND's recent comments stating, "The last days of this regime will see more pipeline destruction."

Last week, a MEND statement from Jomo Gbomo said MEND played a significant role in getting Nigerian Vice President Goodluck Jonathon his post. This is the first time a political patron of the group has been identified.

Small beetle has big appetite for elm leaves

Tiny beetles have been ravaging North Texas elm trees this spring, said experts with Texas Cooperative Extension.

Requests for information about the elm flea weevil have poured in from

five counties in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, said Dr. Mike Merchant, an Extension entomologist in Dallas.

The beetles seem to be feasting on leaves of all types of elms in the region, Merchant said.

The insects appeared early this season and have been spreading quickly. When they are done with a leaf, the beetles leave little

more than a skeleton, he said.

 $Though \ small - about \ one-fourth \ the$ size of a grain of rice — the beetles are hard to miss, he said. Their numbers are so large in some areas, they fall out of trees onto lawns, sidewalks and people. The beetle would appear as a black speck on the tip of a finger. It's long snout can be seen under a magnifying glass.

It's not hard to tell that they're there, he said. But fortunately the pests are easy to kill, Merchant said. The insecticides acephate, Malathion and permethrin should work well.

The biggest challenge would be apply-

ing the insecticide to tall trees, he said.

to spray other types of trees. Most elms will recover well, he said. But some that have been stressed by a lingering drought might struggle.

Records at Texas A&M University entomology department's insect collection suggest a second generation of the beetles could appear in August, Merchant said. Entomologists don't know much about elm flea weevils, he said. But they know the insects aren't normally a big pest. Recent rain in the area may have helped the beetles flourish, Merchant said.

Rain is a good trigger for outbreaks like this, he said. There's lots of vegetation out there. That means lots of food.

Although a problem for property owners, this year's outbreak is an opportunity for entomologists, Merchant said. You can learn from these outbreak years, he said. They help us make predictions and recommendations in the future.

Northwest Airlines Corp. gets judge's approval to exit bankruptcy in June

NEW YORK (AP) Northwest Airlines received approval on Friday to emerge from bankruptcy, freeing it to move out of court protection from its creditors and into an industry besieged by higher fuel costs and crowded with competitors.

Eagan, Minn.-based North- tors eligible to vote on the com- be paid between 66 cents and 83 west Airlines Corp., the nation's fifth-largest airline, has spent more than 20 months cutting costs and slashing jobs in its reorganization effort and said it expects to emerge from bankruptcy in June.

More than 97 percent of credi-

pany's reorganization plan have approved it.

Under the plan approved Friday by Judge Allan Gropper after a two-day hearing, Northwest's secured creditors will be paid in full. Most unsecured creditors are expected to cents on the dollar in new shares of the reorganized company. Existing shares will be canceled, leaving shareholders with nothing.

Once the company emerges from court protection, its shares will begin trading again

on the New York Stock Exchange under the symbol "NWA."

"They're going to be in a very strong position," airline industry consultant Mike Boyd said. "They have a strong vision of what they want to do. If you're going to bet on an airline, I'd bet on them."



Who packs your parachutes?

Frecently read the story of Charles Plumb, a U.S. Navy jet pilot in Vietnam. After 75 combat missions, his plane was destroyed by a surface-toair missile.

Plumb ejected and parachuted into enemy hands. He was captured and spent six years in a communist Vietnamese prison. He



communist Vietnamese prison. He survived the ordeal and now lectures on lessons



Navy uniform: a white hat, a bib in the back and bell-bottom trousers. I wonder how many times I might have seen him and not even said, 'Good morning, how are you?' or anything because, you see, I was a fighter pilot and he was just a sailor."

Plumb thought of the many hours the sailor had spent at a long wooden table in the bowels of the ship, carefully weaving the shrouds and folding the silks of each chute, and each time holding in his hands the fate of someone he didn't know. Now, Plumb asks his audience, "Who's packing your parachute? Everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day." He also points out that he needed many kinds of parachutes when his plane was shot down over enemy territory. He

needed his physical parachute, his mental parachute, his emotional parachute and his spiritual parachute. He called on all these supports before reaching safety.

It is so important that each of these supports be packed in a proper manner to prepare us for the future.

Sometimes in the daily challenges that life gives us, we miss what is really important. We may fail to say hello, please, or thank you, congratulate someone on something wonderful that has happened to them, give a compliment, or just do something nice for no reason. As you go through this week, this month, this year, recognize the people who pack your parachutes and let them know your appreciation.

ing my parachute in the kinds words you say, a drive-by wave or the friendly nature and the ready smile you portray daily. As an educator, I believe that your continued support of athletic events, music concerts, art festivals and theater productions of the schools, the churches and the community packs the parachutes of the children of this community. And, sometimes it's the little things we do such as sending a thank you note or a get well card that impacts a life much more than we will ever

know.

May we remember the remark of Luciano de Crescenzo as he noted: "We are each of us angels but with one wing; we can only fly by embracing each other."

splinter and attacks will likely resume.

• The Energy Information Administration raised its forecast for regular gasoline this summer to \$2.95/gallon. Last summer's prices averaged closer to \$2.85. Earlier estimates called for April through September prices to be \$2.81/gallon.

• After years of being limited to only their domestic market, the Chinese oil-field services companies are beginning to harness their newfound know-how and technology improvements abroad. Last week in Houston there was an **Offshore** Technology Conference. There, it was argued that because of China's massive employment pool and their industrial capacity the nation may become a prominent player in an industry that is struggling to keep pace. • A KPMG survey of

553 energy executives for the oil and gas industry found 25 percent of them think 75 percent of the government's energy spending should be put towards renewable energy. Interestingly, 60 percent of those surveyed think it will be impossible to mass-produce (we aren't sure what level that refers to) renewable fuels within the decade. Less than 20 percent think ethanol can be mass-produced by 2010. Thirteen percent think biodiesel is a more likely product for mass-production by 2010. • In Egypt, President

Mubarek and Israeli Minister of Foreign Affairs Livni met last week and the two agreed that a team of Arab officials would soon visit Israel and discuss the Arab League-endorsed peace deal. The deal proposed basically consists of Israel withdrawing to its 1967 borders and the creation of Palestinian state holding East Jerusalem as its capital in return for normal relations, including full recognition of Israel, between Israel and its Arab neighbors.

• Reports from DEBKA suggest Iran has resurrected the Ansar al Islam terror cell. Ansar al Islam operated rather extensively in northern Iraq prior to the U.S. invasion of Iraq in 2003. It appears that as Iraq continues to break along sectarian lines Iran is attempting to ensure their influence in all regions. Al Islam is growing its strength in Kurdistan. Iran already has influence in the mostly Shiite south, and it is also strong in the Sunni-dominated west and central Iraq. The report is also interesting, in that, in the past we have suggested it would not surprise us if Iran was actively working with al Qaeda cells in Iraq. This report seemingly confirms those assumptions as Ansar al Islam is al Qaeda connected.

Three killed when tank explodes in field

MERCEDES (AP) — Three people were killed Friday when a liquid storage tank exploded in a field and burned their bodies beyond recognition, authorities said.

FEATURES

The three have not been identified but investigators believe they are teenagers, the Valley Morning Star reported.

"It appears that three young people, and I can't tell you the age, not even the sex at this point, were messing around with the storage tank with some sort of petroleum-based liquid or oil," Hidalgo County Sheriff Lupe Trevino said. "It appears that one of them got on top, opened the can and maybe either lit (a) lighter or a match and that's when it exploded."

The explosion happened between 2:20 p.m. and 3 p.m. in an empty field of yellow wildflowers.

"It was pretty bad. You could see all of the smoke and the fire," said Mercedes resident Joe Pion, 26.

Officials found two bodies near the explosion site and another about 30 yards away, Trevino said.

There was no barrier around the tank. When it exploded, part of the tank flew into the air before landing in the field. A lighter was discovered near the explosion site, but investigators weren't sure if it ignited the tank. There were also footprints on the top of part of the tank, Trevino said.

5-year-old dies after running over self with car

HOUSTON (AP) — A 5-year-old boy who was left unsupervised in a running car died Friday after he apparently put the car into gear, fell out and was run over.

The boy's mother had stopped the car outside an elementary school that two of her children attend and went inside when the accident happened about 11:15 a.m., said Candace Ahlfinger, spokeswoman for the Pasadena Independent School District. Along with the 5-year-old, three other young children were in the car.

"Just one of those horrible, tragic accidents that happens," said Ahlfinger, who identified the boy as Rudy Gonzalez.

Rudy was flown to Memorial Hermann Hospital, where his status was listed as "undetermined" because the hospital was waiting for the boy's mother to arrive, said spokeswoman Tishauna Washington. But



Ahlfinger and police spokesman Vance Mitchell said Child Protective Services confirmed that the boy died. "I understand the child did suffer a head wound," Mitchell said.

It's unclear whether Rudy was initially fastened in a car seat, Ahlfinger said.

The school district and police department in Pasadena, a Houston suburb, are investigating the incident.

Catholic teacher fired

FORT WORTH (AP) — A Catholic school religion teacher was fired after admitting that he had sexual contact with a 14-year-old girl while he was a youth minister in 2001, diocese officials announced Friday.

Kelly B. Bayer, 30, was fired Thursday from Sacred Heart Catholic School in Muenster, about 60 miles north of Fort Worth. Police in Denton, where Bayer served at St. Mark Catholic Church when the alleged offense occurred, are now conducting a criminal investigation.

No incidents of sexual conduct with students have been reported since Bayer has taught religious education at Sacred Heart School the past two years, according to officials with the Catholic Diocese of Fort Worth.

AUSTIN – Gov. Rick Perry vetoed a toll-road moratorium bill Friday that he insisted would jeopardize Texas' entire transportation

system, but a senator key said another plan more suitable to the governor will be ready soon. "I am grate-

Williams said a number of changes were made in the House on Thursday that need to be gone over carefully.

Armstrong urges cancer research at Texas Capitol

AUSTIN — Lance Armstrong won his battle with cancer.

Now he wants to win the war.

The seven-time Tour de France winner put his celebrity power to work Friday, headlining efforts at the Texas Capitol in a late push to get a \$3 billion cancer research referendum to voters in the fall.

"I'm living proof that funding critical research works," Armstrong said. "If we get this done, I can honestly say it will be the greatest thing I've ever done with my work within cancer, which makes it one of the greatest things I've done in my life."

The plan would allow the state to issue up to \$300 million a year in general obligation bonds, which the research institute would use to make grants to public or private institutions, state universities and medical schools.

Some lawmakers have questioned financing the project with bonds that could accrue billions in interest debt and whether finding a cure for cancer is a realistic goal for the massive project.

But by Friday night, the vote in the Senate Finance Committee, committee where the measure was considered in danger of failing, was 11-0. "We are going to find a cure for cancer," said Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville. She said at least 25 of the Senate's 31 members support the measure in a full Senate vote. Cancer research has traditionally been funded by the federal government. The National Cancer Institute spent about \$4.7 billion on research in the 2006 fiscal year in its own labs and through grants and agreements with universities, hospitals, research foundations and private businesses.

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Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas has already passed the state House of Representatives but is bumping up against Senate deadlines before the session ends May 28.

If approved by the Senate, the issue would go to the voters on the November statewide ballot.

Armstrong also testified Friday night in front of a key Senate committee before the panel voted to send the measure to the full Senate for a vote next week.

"This is an investment human life," in Armstrong said, wiping away a tear after speaking.

Ăn estimated 35,000 Texans die of cancer every year, and 85,000 new cases are diagnosed. Armstrong, who recovered from testicular cancer that had spread to his lungs and brain before winning the Tour de France every year from 1999-2005, has become a strong advocate for cancer research since his retirement.



TAMPA, Fla. — Deepsea explorers said Friday they have hauled up what could be the richest sunken treasure ever discovered: hundreds of thousands of colonial-era silver and gold coins worth an estimated \$500 million from a shipwreck in the Atlantic Ocean.

A chartered cargo jet recently landed in the United States to unload hundreds of plastic containers packed with the 500,000 coins, which are expected to fetch an average of \$1,000 each from collectors and investors.

"For this colonial era, I think (the find) is unprecedented," said rare coin expert Nick Bruyer, who was contracted by Tampa-based Odyssey Marine Exploration to examine a batch of coins from the wreck. "I don't know of anything equal or comparable to it."

Citing security concerns. the company declined to release any details about the ship or the wreck site.

Company co-founder Greg Stemm said a formal announcement will come later, but court records indicate the coins might have come from the wreck of a 17th century merchant ship found off southwestern England.

Because the shipwreck was found in an area where many colonial-era vessels went down, the company is still uncertain about its nationality, size and age, Stemm said, although evidence points to a specific known shipwreck.

The site is beyond the territorial waters or legal jurisdiction of any country, he said.

He would not say if the loot was taken from the same wreck site near the English Channel that Odyssey recently petitioned a federal court for permission to salvage.

In seeking exclusive rights to that site, an Odyssey attorney told a federal judge last fall that the company likely had found the remains of a 17th-century merchant vessel that sank with valuable cargo aboard, about 40 miles off the southwestern tip of England. A judge granted those rights Wednesday. In keeping with the secretive nature of the project dubbed "Black Swan," Odyssey also is not discussing details of the coins, such as their type, denomination or country of origin.

Bruyer said he observed a wide variety of coins that probably were never circulated. He said the currency was in much

facts yielded by most shipwrecks of a similar age.

The coins — mostly silver pieces — could fetch several hundred to several thousand dollars each, with some possibly commanding much more, he said.

Value is determined by rarity, condition and the story behind them.

Other experts said the condition and value of the coins could vary so much that the price estimate was little more than an educated guess.

"It's absolutely impossible to accurately determine the value without knowing the contents and the condition of the retrieved coins. It's like trying to appraise a house or a car over the phone," said Donn Pearlman, a rare coin expert and spokesman the for Professional Numismatists Guild.

Experts said that controlled release of the coins into the market along with aggressive marketing should keep prices at a premium.



The richest-ever shipwreck haul was yielded by the Spanish galleon Nuestra Senora de Atocha, which sank in a hurricane off the Florida Keys in 1622. Treasurehunting pioneer Mel Fisher found it in 1985, retrieving a reported \$400 million in coins and other loot.

Odyssey likely will return to the same spot for more coins and artifacts.

"We have treated this site with kid gloves and the archaeological work done by our team out there is unsurpassed," CEO Odyssey John Morris said. "We are thoroughly documenting and recording the site, which we believe will have immense historical significance."

Odyssey stock shot up 80.9 percent Friday, closing at \$8.32.

The company salvaged more than 50,000 coins and other artifacts from the wreck of the SS Republic off Savannah, Ga., in 2003, making millions.

But Odyssey posted losses in 2005 and 2006 while using its state-of-the-art ships and deep-water robotic equipment to hunt for the next mother lode.

"The outside world now understands that what we do is a real business and is repeatable and not just a lucky one-shot deal," Stemm said.


In January, Odyssey won permission from the Spanish government to resume a suspended search for the wreck of the HMS Sussex, which was leading a British fleet into the Mediterranean Sea for a war against France in 1694 when it sank in a storm off Gibraltar.


Historians believe the 157-foot warship was carrying nine tons of gold coins to buy the loyalty of the Duke of Savoy, a potential ally in southeastern France. Odyssey believes those coins could also fetch more than \$500 million.

But under the terms of an agreement, Odyssey will have to share any finds with the British government. The company will get 80 percent of the first \$45 million and about 50 percent of the proceeds thereafter.

Odyssey also is seeking exclusive rights to what is believed to be an Italian-registered passenger vessel that sank during World War I in the Mediterranean Sea east of Sardinia, and to another discovered in the Mediterranean about 100 miles west of Gibraltar.

Pump jacks in the oil patch are dangerous. They look fairly slow, going up and down, pumping oil from the ground, but you can't react quick enough to get out of the way.

Several people have been killed or injured by pump jacks. Dub Clinton of Big Spring, who has owned an oil-field service company, has invented a device that should reduce the number of pump jack accidents.

"A lot of the pump jacks are on a timer,' savs Dub. "They turn on and off intermittently. You really never know when they're going to come on. People who don't work in the oil patch might walk up to a pump jack and assume it's dormant. They might even climb up on it. All of a sudden it kicks on and the people are killed or hurt real bad."

Dub's system has a 30second message in English and Spanish that is broadcast from a speaker near the pump jack. It warns that the pump jack is about to activate and to clear the area immediatelv. There is a 10-second countdown from 10 to 1

Right after the "one" is broadcast, the pump jack activates.

The product has been used on some pumping units for a year and Dub says there haven't been any problems. He says he has yet to present it to an oil company that didn't think it was a good idea. Usually when he talks to oil company executives, they relate instances where it could have saved lives.

They say they can't believe it's not already on the market. The item is new and sells for \$695.

"They're small enough that we like to put them inside the electric panel box near the pump jack, so they're out of the weather. The only thing external is the speaker, which is mounted on the panel box. We can string other speakers if the customer wants them.' Dub got the idea for the product after a near-accident.

"We were out on location and one of my employees was cutting weeds under the pumping unit. Someone asked the oil-company man if the unit was turned off. It wasn't. It was on automatic. It scared all of us pretty good. We ran and shut the unit off. Nothing really happened, but as I was driving away from that location I thought there ought to be a way to warn people before those units come on."

Dub says his device is primarily aimed at pump jacks, but it can be used for any type of automated equipment, like a compressor or conveyor belt. A spin-off from the product is another warning system for H2S gas.

"If the H2S monitors trip, our alarm goes off. It's a warning in Spanish and English to clear the area and not come back until it's safe. The message is repeated until the monitor either clears or is turned off."

The company's Web site is protechsafety.net. Dub says it has a video that demonstrates how the product works.

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
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Heflin selected **Freshman** Legislator of the Year

The Crosbyton Democrat, elected District 85 state representative in November 2006, is completing his first session of the state legislature. Overall, he said it was an experience not to be missed.


"The most pleasant surprise is how much fun it's been," Heflin said. "It's been a great challenge, but it's also been fun almost every single moment."
