LVN School In Progress At Local Hospital

Five student nurses are enrolled in the Licensed Vocational Nursing School now underway at Plains Memorial Hospital. This school, the first of its kind to be held in Dimmitt, began May 2 and will continue until April of 1967. The second school will begin in September, 1967, according to Mrs. Mary Baldrige, instructor of the school.

After completing the first 20 weeks of the school the nursing students will have their capping ceremony. Upon satisfactory completion of the course in April, they will go to Austin in July to take the State Board Examination. They must pass this exam in order to obtain their licenses.

Among the courses taught to the nurses are nursing skills, life span, anatomy, medical and surgical nursing, pediatrics and obstetrics.

The Board of Education of Dimmitt Public Schools has approved a self-evaluation study to be conducted during the 1966-67 school year. This was announced jointly by H. W. Golden, president of the School Board and Paul Hillburn, superintendent of Schools after a meeting with Dr. Morris Wallace, head of the Education Department at Texas Tech University. Dr. Wallace has been selected to direct the study. This study will involve all areas of the school program from grades one through twelve, with all school personnel serving in some capacity of the self study.

This self-evaluation study will be concerned with discovering the characteristics of good schools and developing means for evaluating schools more satisfactorily than through previous accreditation procedures. The purpose is to secure a sound appraisal of the quality of a school and encourage the staff to seek better materials and procedures in order that improvements would be a likely result.

The steering committee has been appointed and will have their first meeting June 27th at 7:00 p.m. in the South Grade Cafeteria. The committee is as follows:

Dr. W. F. Bennett, Russell Nelson, Tony Garza, Ike Moore, Em-

mitt Broderson, Kenneth Cleveland, Koma Ratcliff, Dawn Goolbsy, Joanne Snider, and Carol Dy-

er. This committee has the responsibility of naming the members of all subcommittees setting up a time schedule for the self-evaluation, establishing a method and a schedule for subcommittee reports and anticipating the need for and delivering materials and supplies to the subcommittees. Most schools believe that the self-evaluation is the most important part of the total evaluation.

After the school staff has completed the self-evaluation, an outside visiting team will come to the Dimmitt Schools and spend two days going over the total school program. This visiting team will be composed of both school people and college staff members from over the state along with staff members from the Texas Education Agency. The visiting team will write a report of their findings which will be compared with the report of the local staff's findings that will show the strength and weakness of the Dimmitt Schools.

This is the first time that a study of this depth has been undertaken by the local schools and it should produce facts that the school staff and community have never known about their school.

Higginbotham-Bartlett Open House Observes 40th Anniversary

Higginbotham-Bartlett Company will celebrate their 40th anniversary with an open house June 16, 17 and 18 in their remodeled and enlarged building at 109 N. Broadway.

The remodeled building is 60 ft. by 150 ft. and has twice as much floor space as it did previously, according to H. W. Golden, yard supervisor.

The Dimmitt yard was built in 1926 and was known as Panhandle Lumber Company until 1938. Golden has been supervisor since 1934.

The lumber yard is one of 50 Higginbotham-Bartlett yards in the tri-state area of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Doors to be given away during the open house include a Hoover Electric shoe polisher, three Hoover Carpet Shampooers, a table radio, three 3 X 5 nylon braided rugs, a Wepco storm door, a barbecue grill, five gallons of Sherwin-Williams paint and many other prizes.

Golden gave the following history of the Higginbotham-Bartlett stores:

"It was in 1882 that the Higginbotham family moved from Waterbury, Miss. to Dublin, Texas. About the time that the Texas Central railway reached Dublin and on west 12 miles to DeLeon. And in 1883 two of the sons, Joe and Boliver, as young men started in the general mercantile business at DeLeon with a capital stock of \$500. The firm was

known as Higginbotham Bros., and from there other brothers joined and they spread to other towns, such as Dublin, Comanche, St. Jo, etc., and they now have 16 stores and lumber yards in central Texas."

"In 1912 Joe and Rufus, along with Charlie Bartlett ventured to West Texas and started in the Sweetwater territory as Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. Mr. Bartlett being a nephew, and now retired and past 90. They have always been progressive, and changing with the time, adding new yards and building material yards. Mr. J. H. Boggess of Dallas, where the home office is located, is now president of the company, a third generation of the original founders. Mr. Leonard Bartlett of Lubbock, Texas is general manager of the firm, and E. M. Osborne of Plainview is executive vice president."

10,000 Head Capacity Feed Lots To Be Constructed Near Dimmitt

Installation of another major business project for Dimmitt and Castro County was announced recently by owners of a large feed lot to be constructed six miles west and one mile north of Dimmitt on the northwest part of the former D. Neumayer farm. Owners of the new business enterprise are G. L. Willis, Charlie Hays, Bob McLean, A. J. Kemp and Jim Elder.

When completed, the installation of equipment, land, buildings, and fencing will represent an investment of approximately \$400,000 and will be located on a 170 acre tract of land that affords good

drainage for the feeding pens. Feed pens will be of pipe and cable construction and feed troughs will be made of concrete and feeding will be done with the latest type of mechanical feeding equipment.

In addition to the office building, there will be a large building housing the modern feed mixing plant designed to produce sufficient feed for the 10,000 head capacity feed lots. Some materials have already been delivered to the building site and actual construction is expected to get underway immediately.

\$36,431 Migrant Health Grant Is Approved Here

The Castro County Hospital District has been approved for a Public Health Service grant in the amount of \$36,431, under the Migrant Health Program, according to a telegram received by the News Tuesday from Congressman Walter Rogers.

Don Newman, manager of the Plains Memorial Hospital, stated that the hospital district had applied for a grant in the amount of \$70,000, and that the hospital board expects information from the Public Health Service, within the next week as to the details of the parts of the program that have been approved.

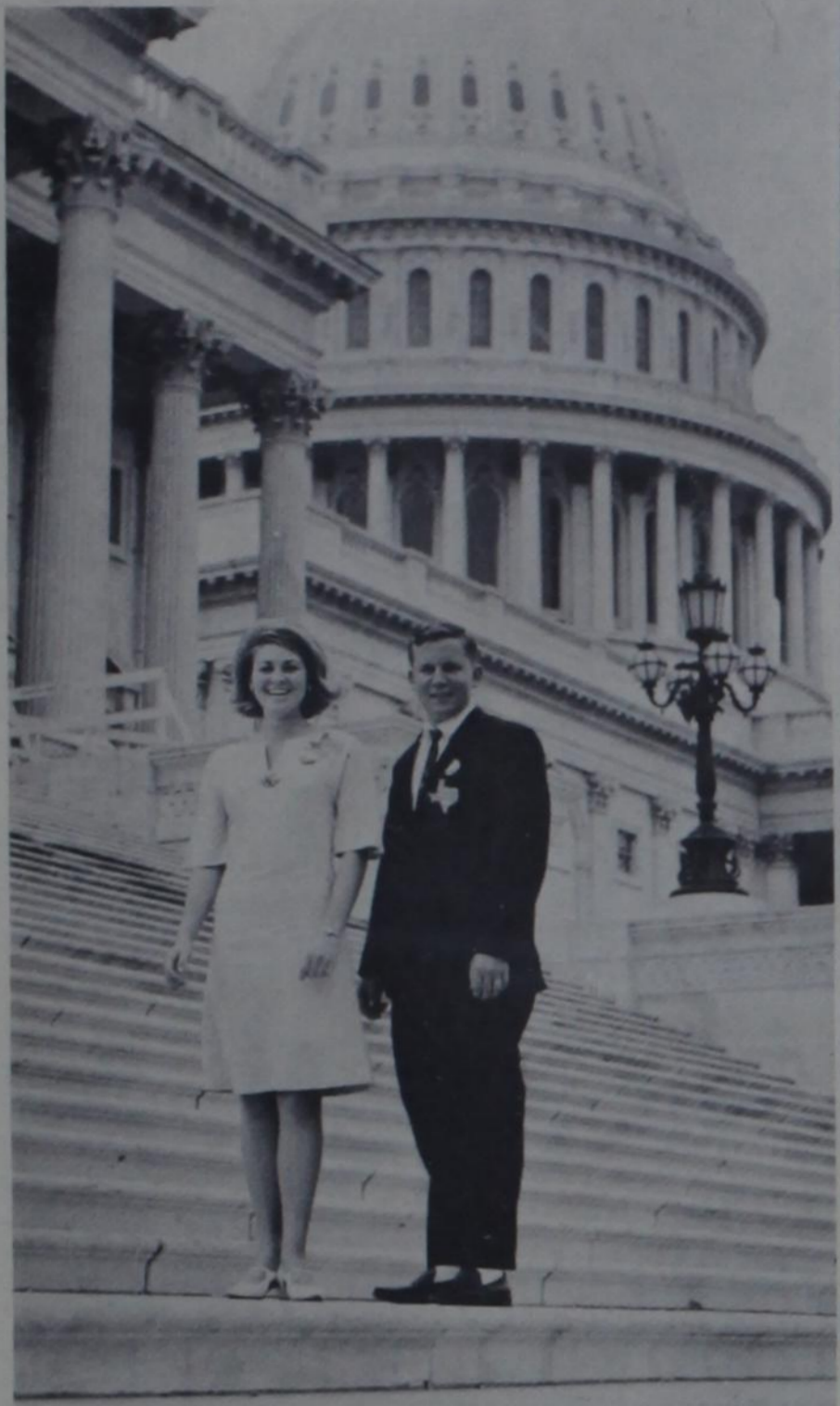
All pot plants must be in the exhibitors possession for three months prior to the show.

CHECK YOUR HOME CANNER WITH CARE

Summer vacation time heralds the home canning season for many homemakers. If your pressure canner is still where you placed it at the end of last year's canning season, now is a good time to check it out.

For safe use of your steam pressure canner, clean the safety-valve and petcock openings and check the pressure gauge. Faulty pressure gauges may result in loss of food.

Clean the safety-valve and petcock openings by pulling a string through them. Then carefully check the dial gauge and weighted gauge.

Use your pressure canner to can all meats and vegetables. Tomatoes, however, are an exception, for they may be safely canned by the boiling water bath

method used for canning fruits. The water-bath canner should be checked to see if it is deep enough so that water will cover tops of jars adequately. The lid on the canner should fit tightly.

Both the water bath canner and pressure canner should contain a rack inside on which to place the jars.

Get the canner ready now in order to save valuable time later when vegetables and fruits are at their peak of flavor and need to be canned quickly. We have a gauge at the office for use by homemakers who want to check their pressure gauges. You are welcome to come borrow it any time.

BUYING AND BROILING BEEF STEAKS

Now that vacation is at hand, there will probably be more opportunities for back yard cookouts and get-togethers with family and friends. To assure tenderness, quality and flavor in beef steaks, be willing to pay for a little fat and choose from the top three grades — Prime, choice or good.

The sirloin is the largest and most economical broiling steak. If it is cut one and one-half inches thick, it will serve four or more people. The porterhouse is the largest short-loin steak, and when cut one and one-half inches thick, it will serve four people.

The T-bone steak is smaller and contains less tenderloin than the porterhouse. When cut one inch thick, it weighs about one and one-half pounds and serves two persons. The smallest steak in the short loin is the club steak, which contains no tenderloin. When cut one inch thick, it weighs about a pound and serves one.

Rib steaks are cut from the loin end of the ribs, and contain the rib-eye muscle but no tenderloin. They are the least expensive of all broiling steaks.

HOW TO LOSE WEIGHT

Many people are under the false impression that with some diets you can eat all you want to and still lose weight. This is not true.

Even if your diet is based on some "special foods" or it limits carbohydrates to 60 grams per day, it is still impossible to eat all you want and lose weight at the same time.

The simple principle of dieting is that when — and only when — less calories are taken in than used by a person's body it is possible to lose weight.

A high fat, low carbohydrate diet may cause quick loss of weight for a short time. However, most of the loss is water that has been drawn out of the body tissues. There's little loss of actual fat. Also, a high fat, low carbohydrate diet causes an imbalance of nutrients in the body which can have harmful effects.

Other devices to make dieting easier, such as making spaghetti thinner, or, the hole in the doughnut larger, or cutting slices of bread thinner, are also illusions. There is really no easy way to control weight. It simply takes long sustained effort and will-power.

The best reducing diet is a low-calorie, nutritionally balanced diet of varied foods. No one food is fattening unless too much of it is eaten. So, cut out the extras, such as extra sugar, fat and second helpings, and stick with the balanced diet.

Never attempt to lose weight without first having a medical checkup. Your family doctor can prescribe the correct calorie intake for you to help you to lose weight safely.

DAIRY PRODUCTS ARE FEATURED IN JUNE

June traditionally is observed as "Dairy Month," and one way that homemakers can show their appreciation to the industry is to use more milk and milk products all through the year. Milk is one of nature's most perfect foods.

It is outstanding as a source of calcium, protein, vitamin A and riboflavin, the "big four" ingredients which make milk important in the diet.

If you put the cost of milk on a nutritional basis, it's almost impossible to find an equal. Milk is a far more concentrated food than many of us realize. Actually, it contains 13 percent solids by weight — more than many of

Terry will go to college this fall at East Texas State University on a partial track scholarship and he will major in pre-law.

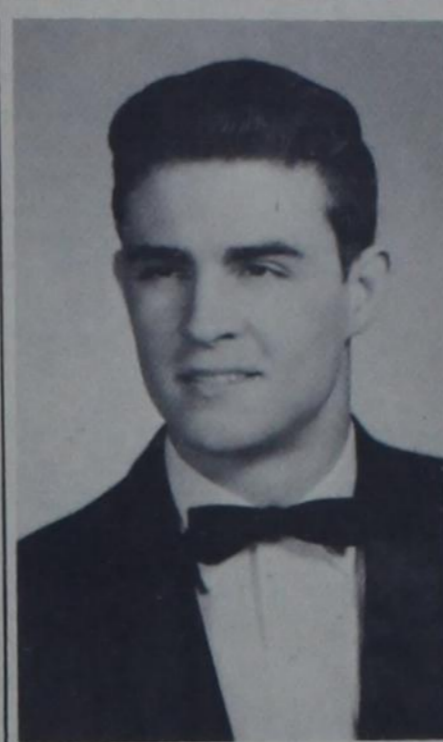
We are all so proud of our good children who bring honor to Dimmitt.

BURNING STUBBLE
The ASC State Committee has determined that deliberate burning of crop residues, other than flax, violates reasonable conservation principles and will be considered a practice tending to defeat the purposes of the Agricultural Conservation Program. Counties should use available means to remind farmers of this decision of the State Committee at this time, since there have been reports of extremely rank wheat, barley and rye stubble in some areas. Farmers who burn stubble risk the loss of cost-share payments to which they might otherwise be entitled under the 1966 ACP.

ACREAGE REPORTS AND PROGRAM PAYMENTS
We are prepared to accept acreage reports and applications for final payment under the 1966 cotton, feed grain and wheat programs. All producers participating in one or more of these programs are required to report (and certify) their crop and diversion acreages by no later than August 15, 1966. Producers must file an acreage certification whether they are subscribing to the measurement service or not.

YOU CAN HELP US AND WE CAN HELP YOU — The sooner you make your acreage report — the sooner we can compute (and make) final payments under the programs. As you know, there is generally last minute rush on almost everything done like this. We urge you to make your acreage report as soon as you have completed planting and your crops are up. Avoid the "last minute rush" — make your report as soon as possible!

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Lack Of Employment Opportunities And Substandard Housing Concern

Frank Latimer, Castro County director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, reported to the directors of that organization Tuesday evening, at a regular meeting, that the survey now underway reveals that the greatest concern is the lack of employment opportunities and the substandard housing.

The Federal Farm Home Loan Administration is making a great effort to qualify low income families for modest loans at low interest. A staff from Plainview is in the basement of the courthouse each Tuesday and Thursday to consider applications. Twenty-four applications are now pending the purchase of suitable lots at no more than ten percent of the cost of house and lot.

In the absence of any employment office, the staff of Castro County Community Action Committee will endeavor to act as an Employment Center, bringing together employer and employee quickly and at no expense. Since almost all parts of our county can be called by telephone without a toll charge, it is hoped this facility will place workers on the job without delay. The phone number is 647-3437.

Comments, criticism, suggestions, and protests will be considered at this County Community office in the basement of the courthouse.

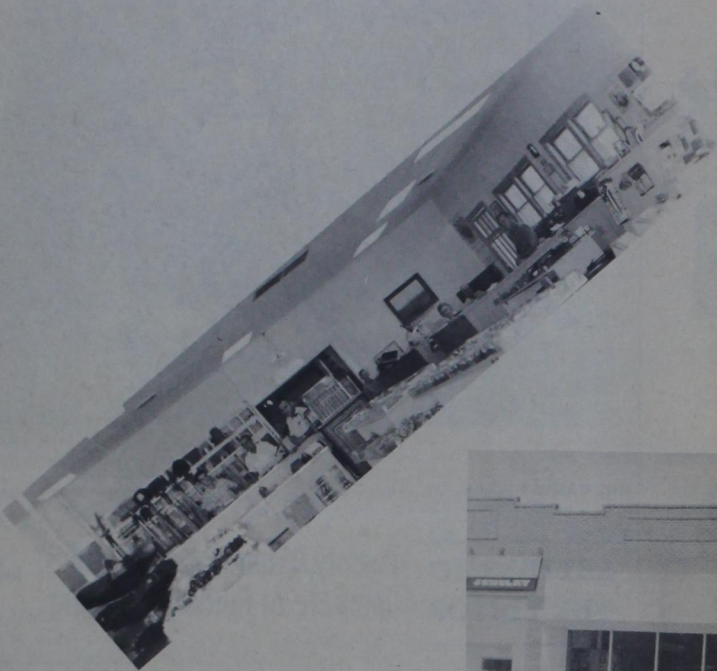



It now costs only \$4.23 per ton to haul a ton of feed grain from St. Louis, Missouri, to states east of the Mississippi River — Mississippi and Alabama — while it costs \$10.60 a ton to haul the feed grains the same distance to Bronson, Texas.
So, a broiler producer east of the Mississippi can get his feed grain at about a third of the cost per ton mile insofar as freight rates are concerned. He can sell his products in Houston — including the cost of transportation — for one-half cent a pound less than a broiler producer can produce those broilers for right there near Houston in Harris County, itself.
The reason is obvious. The southeastern producer pays less than half what the Texas producer has to pay per ton mile.

Sen. Yarbrough's Washington Report

Dear Fellow Texan:
This week I want to talk about the problems of production and the problem of marketing in Texas. Something is wrong when the Texas housewife is asked to pay more for Texas meat products just because of the unjust freight rates the Texas poultry and livestock industries are forced to pay on food grains that fatten poultry and livestock.
These industries are in grave danger in Texas because of the unequal, unjust railroad freight rates on coarse grain shipments. The freight rates on a ton of feed grain are three times as high per ton mile from Kansas City to Texas as they are on a ton mile of feed grain shipped from Kansas City to areas east of the Mississippi River that compete with Texas.
It means that a Texas housewife, if this keeps up, would have to pay more for locally-Texas produced broilers and beef than she did for the same items shipped in from east of the Mississippi River. These freight rates on feed grains must be reduced or the Texas chicken and beef producers will lose their markets.
This situation has come about because of the action of the Southern Railroad, serving the southeastern states, in lowering shipments to the southeastern states east of the Mississippi River.

They want fair freight rates so that they can furnish meat more cheaply in the Texas markets — east of the Mississippi River — than producers in distant states can.
I have requested Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to file an official complaint with the Interstate Commerce Commission for fair freight rates on feed grain from the Midwest into the Southwest. The Secretary can do this under the law of 1938, passed to help farmers in cases like this where a farmer doesn't have the money to spend to correct freight rates by himself. The Secretary of Agriculture is ordered to do it for all the farmers and that is what we requested.
The ton mile rate on grain from Lubbock to Temple is still more than five times the rate paid for the same mileage east of the Mississippi. The Texas farmer is unjustly treated on these freight rates and he deserves an even break on them.
The Texas housewife should get the break of lower competitive prices when she goes to the market to buy meat, poultry, and eggs. These higher freight rates for feed grains mean higher prices for meat for the housewife. The farmer and the rancher get blamed for the higher price, but they don't get the profit. That goes into the freight rate.
