3 minutes of freedom

Man's run from justice is short-lived Thursday

A Big Spring man enjoyed what may amount to his last three minutes of freedom for a very long time Thursday afternoon, as he led local law enforcement officers on a chase that ended at Beals Creek.

Terrell Charles Fryar, 37, of Big Spring, managed to escape custody while being escorted from 118th District Court to the Howard County Jail, but according to Sheriff Dale Walker, his new-found freedom was short lived.

"The court's bailiff, Ed Covington, was escorting Fryar across the street following the judgment and sentencing for a revocation of probation hearing," said Walker. "The suspect was unsecured at the time, and when they



reached the sidewalk at the county courthouse, Fryar took off running north down Scurry Street.

"The bailiff Fryar ran to the radio room at the Sheriff's Office because his radio was apparently dead, and informed them that the suspect had escaped. That's when HCSO deputies and myself became involved in the search."

Walker said Fryar made his way across the railroad tracks north of the courthouse and was finally spotted in Beals Creek. "Someone caught a glimpse of his head bobbing up and down in the

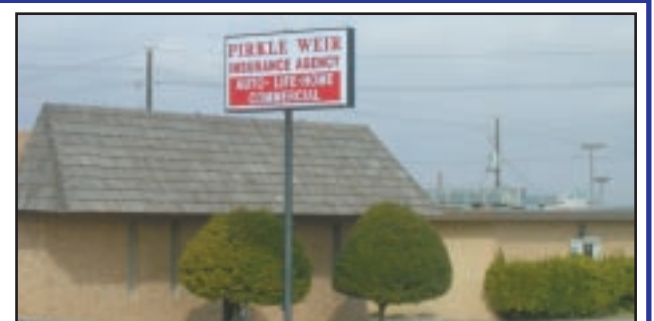

Rangers hope good fortunes continue

ARLINGTON — No team won more games than the Texas Rangers over the past month. Before the All-Star break, they won six of their last seven series.

That winning surge has provided a sense of optimism and hope going forward under rookie manager Ron Washington after the Rangers got off to such a horrible start.

It also has created an interesting problem for a team that was 19 games under .500 in mid-June and seemingly ready to listen to trade offers for key players like

Mark Teixeira, Eric Gagne, Kenny Lofton and Sammy Sosa.

"We're behind the eight ball still, but the things that we accomplished to this point, we feel good about," Washington said. "We feel like when the second half starts, we'll just continue to play good baseball and see where we stand."

Without a second-half comeback like the 1978 New York Yankees though, the Rangers (38-50) will miss the playoffs for the eighth straight season. They still have a lot of ground to make up just to finish with a winning record for only the second time since 1999.

Considering those postseason odds, general manager Jon Daniels has to balance the strides that have been made this season with building for the future — and the pieces that can be added for that by dealing. Daniels was already getting calls from likely contending teams last month.

Even after their 15-8 stretch, the Rangers are still buried in last place 15 games behind the AL West-leading Los Angeles Angels. Their winning streak included going 6-0-1 their last series, their first unbeaten seven-series stretch since 2001. They beat division leaders

Detroit and Los Angeles and split a four-game series at Boston, which has the best record in the majors.

Only Detroit and the Chicago Cubs matched the Rangers' 15 victories the past month.

"We're playing better now, but to start off the way we did, it stunk," said starter Kevin Millwood, who has won four of five starts since two stints on the disabled list before June. "Hopefully, we can continue playing the way we have been lately and see what happens."

Texas, which lost 50 games

Beckham to make debut

CARSON, Calif. — It's finally Beck's Day in L.A.

Soccer superstar and pop culture "it" guy David Beckham has arrived in Southern California, where he will be introduced as the newest — and by far most the most luminous — star of the Galaxy.

The 32-year-old midfielder signed a five-year contract with Major League Soccer's Los Angeles Galaxy in January that will pay him \$32.5 million in salary.

He then played out his contract with Real Madrid, where he escaped Fabio Capello's doghouse by showing he still can "bend it" on free kicks like maybe no other player in the world. Coming on strong late in the season, Beckham helped Real Madrid win the Spanish League title last month.

His play also was impressive enough for him to regain a spot on England's national team, which he formerly captained.

He and wife Victoria, aka Posh Spice, arrived in Los Angeles on Thursday night from London to begin their new lives in America. Dozens of reporters and photographers, many of them paparazzi, jostled behind barriers set up in the terminal as sports' royal couple strolled past on their way to a waiting black sport utility vehicle.

Ortiz powers Red Sox offense despite injury

Boston slugger David Ortiz finally let on that he has been hampered by a knee injury since last summer. The revelation followed a vintage performance.

Ortiz went 3-for-5 with two RBIs, and Manny Ramirez had two hits and three RBIs in the AL East-leading Red Sox's 7-4 home victory over the Toronto Blue Jays 7-4 on Thursday night, helping Tim Lincecum win his third straight start.

Afterward, Ortiz said he has been playing with a torn meniscus in his right knee since last summer. He said there has been no inflammation so he hasn't needed surgery.

"It wasn't anything major," said Ortiz, who has 14 homers and 54 RBIs this season after finishing with 54 homers and 137 RBIs last year. "I just kept playing through it last year. This year, it's been bothering me more than it used to."

Ortiz fouled a ball off the knee in the eighth inning but stayed in the game.

"I bet you it hurts," manager

Terry Francona said. "He wasn't going to come out. He's just a big guy that hit a ball off his knee. We'll check it again tomorrow."

Wakefield (10-8) scattered nine hits, walked none and struck out two in six innings, allowing four runs — including back-to-back homers by Matt Stairs and Alex Rios in the sixth when Toronto cut a three-run deficit to one run. But in the bottom half, Ortiz hit an RBI double and scored on Ramirez's single to give Boston a 7-4 lead.

"Manny and Ortiz are just good hitters," Blue Jays manager John Gibbons said. "They'll have big second halves."

Roy Halladay (10-4) allowed the first four Boston batters of the game to reach base and score, giving up five runs in all and eight hits. The 2003 AL Cy Young Award winner struck out two and walked four — the first time he has walked more than three batters in a game in more than three years.

Halladay gave up J.D. Drew's single to lead off the Boston first, then walked Dustin Pedroia.

Ortiz followed with an RBI single and Ramirez doubled in another run before Kevin Youkilis and Mike Lowell drove them in to make it 4-0.

"The start of the second half, we have a tough trip," Halladay said. "It's frustrating to have this kind of start, but we have a long way to go."

The Red Sox have a 10-game lead over the Yankees in the AL East, and Ortiz was asked if it might make sense to fix his knee problem now and be 100 percent for the playoffs.

"I don't want to get out of the lineup right now," he said. "I have days where I feel fine. I'm just going to get through the season."

White Sox 9, Orioles 7

At Baltimore, Jim Thome's 487th homer ignited a four-run first for Chicago.

Jon Garland (7-6) allowed two runs and eight hits over seven innings in winning his fourth straight start against Baltimore. Bobby Jenks got the final out for

his 24th save.

Rookie Jeremy Guthrie (4-3) yielded six runs, five earned, and nine hits in 3 2-3 innings.

Yankees 7, Devil Rays 3

At St. Petersburg, Fla., Alex Rodriguez, Derek Jeter and Bobby Abreu homered to back New York starter Andy Pettitte.

Rodriguez hit his major league-leading 31st homer five pitches after Jeter hit his first in nearly a month. Abreu finished the fourth-inning power surge with a two-out solo shot off right-hander James Shields (7-5) that made it 4-1.

Twins 6, Athletics 2

At Minneapolis, Michael Cuddyer tied a career high with four hits and Minnesota took advantage of five walks issued by Oakland starter Chad Gaudin (8-4).

Scott Baker (4-3) gave up two runs and six hits in six innings for the Twins, who handed the A's their fifth loss in six games.

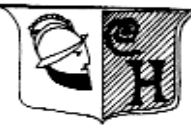

"We know we dug ourselves a really huge hole, but that's over with now," said All-Star shortstop Michael Young, who didn't want to make any second-half predictions. "I'm not going to think of records or anything like that. Just continue to play good baseball. Obviously, we want to win as much as we can, but it's tough to sit here and think of a record goal."

The '78 Yankees overcame a 14-game deficit after July 18 to force the playoff game against the

Red Sox that included Bucky Dent's famous homer. (Texas is 14 games back in the AL wild-card race).

Unless the Rangers want to try for a miracle this season, they are still in position to be sellers before the trade deadline.

Sosa and Gagne have made impressive comebacks and Lofton, the 40-year-old center fielder, has also had a significant impact. All are signed only through this season and could be attractive to other teams.

Texas is also likely to listen to inquiries about Teixeira, the switch-hitting first baseman who is eligible for salary arbitration this year and can become a free agent after next season.

When Teixeira returns from the disabled list Friday after missing 28 games because of a strained left quadriceps, there is a 2 1/2-week window before the trade dead-

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

South	West	North	East
1♣	Pass	1♥	Pass
1♦	Pass	1NT	Pass

What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

- ♠KQ87♥AK♦64♣KQ762
- ♠KQ952♥K7♦6♣AQ874
- ♠AK82♥Q95♦J♣AKJ93
- ♠AQ16♥—♦K963♣AK853

1. Two notrump. In this sequence, partner's one-notrump bid is somewhat ambiguous. It may range from a six-point hand that cannot play one spade to a hand of around 10 points. Your two-notrump bid indicates a semibalanced hand of about 16 to 18 high-card points (with a balanced hand you would probably have opened one notrump originally). It invites partner to continue to three notrump with suitable values.

A two-club bid over one notrump would misrepresent your distribution and not reflect your extra high-card values.

2. Two spades. You must let partner know that you have five spades rather than just four. At the same time, by rebidding your spades, you tell partner that you also have at least five clubs, since you would not have opened one club initially with more spades than clubs. Once partner

learns the nature of your hand, he has numerous options available to him, including bidding or trying for a game in spades or clubs, passing two spades, or taking a simple preference back to three clubs.

3. Three hearts. Despite your having only three hearts, you want to urge partner to continue on to game in either hearts or notrump. A two-heart bid would be proper if you had, say, two or three points less. Your substantial extra values have to be shown in some manner.

A jump to three clubs would fail to show your moderate heart support and would also fail to pinpoint your singleton diamond.

4. Two diamonds. Although your diamond holding is not particularly strong, your distribution calls for immediate clarification. Since you bid clubs first, partner should regard that suit as longer than the diamonds; hence your distribution must be read as 4-0-4-5.

The very fact that you bother to show all three suits implies a fairly strong hand. In cases of this type, it is important to give partner as much accurate information as possible so that he can make the proper decision for the partnership.

No jump-bid is made because, after partner's initial heart response, it is possible that there are not enough values in the combined hands to produce a game.

Parole recommendations withdrawn

AUSTIN (AP) — State juvenile prison officials have canceled the release on parole of more than 150 young offenders after learning many served minimal time for violent crimes such as murder and sexual assault.

The revelations have prompted the scandal-plagued Texas Youth Commission to review its entire parole criteria, officials said Thursday.

State adult parole officials, who supervise released juveniles, raised questions after reviewing the potential parolees' files.

After reviewing the initial list, House Corrections Committee Chairman Jerry Madden, R-Richardson, demanded the juveniles' cases be reviewed again.

The young offenders who were initially recommended for release and parole included: One juvenile who served less than three years of a 40 year sentence for the slaying of a classmate; a sex offender who had previously assaulted a TYC employee and a youngster serving time for molesting six children who was reprimanded for indecent exposure and possession of a weapon while incarcerated.

"They all did meet the existing TYC standards for release on parole," said TYC spokesman Jim Hurley. "But after further consideration, we are not comfortable with our recommendation, and we are pulling all of them back for a much more in-depth review. We are going to take a good, hard look at all those files."

creek," said Walker. "We got him out, and that water is just terrible there. There's oil and all kinds of things in it."

And while Fryar may be a newcomer to swimming in Beals Creek, Walker said he's certainly no stranger to being incarcerated — or running from law enforcement.

"Fryar is currently being held on a charge of escape from custody. However, we was arrested July 6 on a charge of evading arrest or detention, and before that he was arrested June 14 on a charge of bail jumping and failure to appear," said Walker. "In March he was arrested on a charge of driving while license suspended, and a little more than a year ago — July 10, 2006 — he was arrested on a charge of evading arrest or detention."

According to Walker, Fryar was also arrested May 31, 2006, on a charge of bondsman off bond stemming from his arrest in late 2005 for possession of a controlled substance in a drug free zone.

"In all, he was out of custody for approximately three minutes," said Walker. "With this new charge on him, I doubt he'll think that three minutes was worth it."

well-being of the nation's children. It's good news on a number of key wellness indicators, experts said of the report being released Friday.

"The implications for the population are quite positive in terms of their health and their well-being," said Edward Sondik, director of the National Center for Health Statistics. "The lower figure on teens having sex means the risk of sexually transmitted diseases is lower."

In 2005, 47 percent of high school students — 6.7 million — reported ever having had sexual intercourse, down from 54 percent in 1991. The rate of those who reported having had sex has remained the same since 2003.

Thirty-four percent of the students reported having had sex during a three-month period in 2005. Of those, 63 percent — about 3 million — used condoms. That's up from 46 percent in 1991.

The teen birth rate, the report said, was 21 per 1,000 young women ages 15-17 in 2005 — an all-time low. It was down from 39 births per 1,000 teens in 1991.

"This is very good news," said Sondik. "Young teen mothers and their babies are at a greater risk of both immediate and long-term difficulties."

The birth rate in the 15-19 age group was 40 per 1,000 in 2005, also down sharply from the previous decade.

Education campaigns that started years ago are having a significant effect, said James Wagoner, president of Advocates for Youth, a Washington-based non-profit group that focuses on prevention of teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases.

"I think the HIV/AIDS epidemic and the efforts in the '80s and '90s had a lot to do with that," Wagoner said of the improved numbers on teen sex, condoms and adolescent births.

"We need to encourage young teens to delay sexual initiation and we need to make sure they get all

the information they need about condoms and birth control," he said.

The report was compiled from statistics and studies at 22 federal agencies, and covered 38 key indicators, including infant mortality, academic achievement rates and the number of children living in poverty. The 2005 figures were the most comprehensive numbers available.

Other highlights: —The percentage of children covered by health insurance decreased slightly. In 2005, 89 percent of children had health insurance coverage at some point during the year, down from 90 percent the previous year.

—The percentage of low birthweight infants (born weighing less than 5 pounds, 8 ounces) increased. It was 8.2 percent in 2005, up from 8.1 percent in 2004.

—More youngsters are getting reading time.

Sixty percent of children ages 3-5 (and not in kindergarten) were read to daily by a family member in 2005, up from 53 percent in 1993.

—The percentage of children who had at least one parent working year round and full-time increased to 78.3 percent in 2005, up from 77.6 percent the previous year.

—More young people are completing high school. In 2005, 88 percent of young adults had finished high school — up from 84 percent in 1980.

The report was released by the Federal Interagency Forum on

Child and Family Statistics — a consortium of federal agencies that includes the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, the Census Bureau and the Administration for Children and Families.

Politics of executive privilege

There are two issues raised by the president's efforts to shield his aides from testifying publicly under oath about the White House's role in the firings of eight United States Attorneys.

One is the legal issue of whether the invocation of executive privilege is appropriate in these circumstances, a thorny question that courts could take years to resolve. The other is the political question of whether this president is in any position to win a standoff on the subject of the politicization of the Department of Justice. The legal issue is a close one; the political issue is not.

Executive privilege is nowhere mentioned in the Constitution. Nothing in that document gives a president any more power than anyone else to ignore subpoenas properly issued by Congress or, as is often the case, a special prosecutor. It is ironic, at least, to see conservative opponents of judge-made constitutional rights (think *Roe v. Wade*, for instance) arguing for a broad construction of a judge-made privilege that has no basis in the words of the Constitution.

Even so, presidents, both Democratic and Republican, have argued with mixed success that their need to receive confidential advice from their advisers requires some measure of protec-

tion from public disclosure of Executive deliberations. When, during the McCarthy era, congressional investigators sought testimony from President Eisenhower's staff on the issue of Communists in government, Ike was heard saying that any member of his staff who testified about what he'd said to the president wouldn't be working for him by nightfall.

Richard Nixon, famously, fared worse in his efforts to avoid disclosing the White House tapes. In *United States v. Nixon*, the Supreme Court held that no one, including the president, was above the law, that even if executive privilege might shield certain discussions of national security, President Nixon was required to turn over the tapes, as well as other documents sought by the Watergate special prosecutor. The decision sealed his downfall.

President Clinton, who sought to invoke executive privilege in response to Special Prosecutor Ken Starr's investigation of his relationship with Monica Lewinsky, ended up negotiating with Mr. Starr for his own appearance before the grand jury and losing in court on the question of whether his aides could be forced to testify.

In this case, White House supporters argue that the claim of privilege is strengthened by the fact that what is involved is congressional oversight, rather than a criminal investigation by a special prosecutor. On the other hand, the White House has repeatedly said

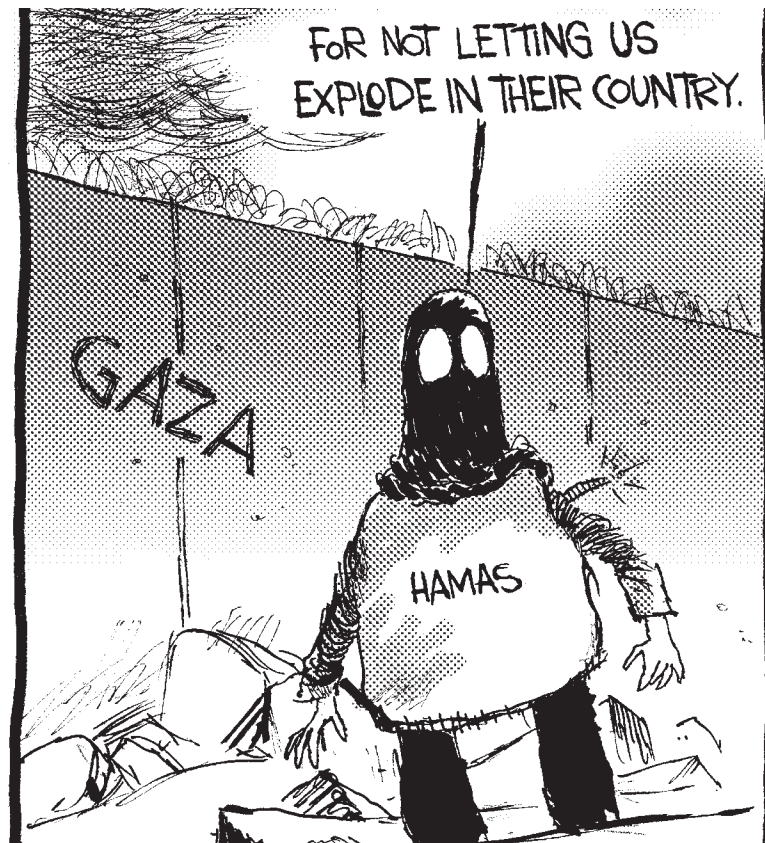
the president was in no way involved in the firing of the U.S. Attorneys, which should make it difficult for them to argue with a straight face that his right to receive the advice of his top staff would somehow be jeopardized by allowing staff members to testify. Nor does this case involve national security, the area recognized by the Supreme Court in *United States v. Nixon* as the most appropriate for exercising the privilege.

But the real issue here may turn out to be political rather than legal. Few presidents, at least since Nixon, have been as politically weak as this one at the time they invoked the privilege. The offer by White House counsel Fred Fielding to allow White House aides to testify privately, so long as it is not on the record or under oath, far from strengthening the president's hand, leaves the inescapable impression that they have something to hide and are seeking a license to lie.

That, coupled with recent disclosures that Attorney General Gonzales had received reports of FBI abuses of the powers granted by the Patriot Act well before he assured Congress there were no such problems, adds fuel to the fire and strengthens the political hand of Congress in this fight with the president. It is not a fight this president needs, and not one he can easily win in the court that matters most right now — the court of public opinion.

Looking at bad timing on Iraq

During a teleconference from Iraq with reporters last week, Maj. Gen. Rick Lynch, commander of coalition forces operating in the region south of Baghdad, explained, "Lynch's rules of war fighting." Rule 1 is, "Everything is timing, and the second rule is, everything takes longer than you think it's going to take."

I've had people ask me what it would take for me to support withdrawing U.S. troops from Iraq. The answer: If military leaders such as Lynch or top Iraq commander Gen. David Petraeus say this war is not winnable, then it's time to get out.

But when U.S. senators — be they Republicans Richard Lugar and Pete Domenici, or Democrats Hillary Clinton and Harry Reid — call for a timetable to withdraw U.S. troops, that's not a sign to get out. It's a sign that D.C. pols want to be on the popular side of an unpopular war. It's a sign that Washington lacks what Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., described as "the courage necessary to put our country's interests before every personal or political consideration."

U.S. troops serving in Iraq deserve better. It simply is too soon to be talking about the surge failing. U.S. forces in Iraq did not meet full surge strength until June 15. It makes no sense to send an additional 20,000 troops to Iraq, then not give them the time to do their job. It also makes no sense to call for a change in plans now that

the Bush administration is doing what critics demanded — increasing troops and changing strategy.

More important, there is evidence that the surge and the Petraeus approach to fighting the counterinsurgency are working. Lynch told reporters: "What I believe is (that) al-Qaida has worn out its welcome. They've overplayed their hand, and their tactics have indeed backfired."

More Iraqis are coming forward to share intelligence in ways that have not occurred before. U.S. troops are seizing weapons caches, which should reduce the number of bombs used against American forces. Lynch also noted that Iraqi troops are beginning to identify as Iraqis, not simply as Sunnis and Shiites. Sunni tribes in Anbar Province are reported to have flipped from their alliance with al-Qaida in Iraq. Returning from Iraq, McCain noted that Ramadi, "which just months ago stood as Iraq's most dangerous city, is now one of the safest."

Not all of Lynch's words were reassuring. He criticized Iraqi police as "either not competent or corrupt." Lynch noted that he has been fighting to "clear, to hold, to retain" territory that "became an enemy sanctuary because no one was there" to keep insurgents out.

During Wednesday's Senate debate, many senators argued that a troop withdrawal is needed because American troops have no business fighting in another country's civil war. Nice sound bite, but Americans should be clear that this is not a civil war with two sides fighting on a battlefield. It is a war in which terrorists from various factions are waging war against civilized society, using violence and intimidation to

sabotage efforts to stabilize and secure Iraqi daily life.

If the ugly tactics of purposefully killing innocent civilians prevail, then those tactics will spread beyond Iraq's borders. As McCain noted in prepared remarks on July 10, if al-Qaida insurgents "defeat the United States in Iraq, they will believe that anything is possible, that history is on their side, that they really can bring their terrible rule to lands the world over."

And: "The terrorists are in the war to win it. The question is: Are we?"

The answer, judging by this week's debate in the Senate, is: not exactly. Thankfully, there are still enough (mostly Republican) senators to block bills to start pulling out U.S. troops. With more than 3,600 U.S. troops killed in Iraq, many Americans just want this war to go away. That's a natural desire, but it ignores the price that American troops will have to pay if U.S. troops again are called to arms.

For all the mistakes that have been made, the Iraq war effort today benefits from the new Petraeus counterinsurgency strategy, committed U.S. troops and Iraqis who sense a final chance to grab the brass ring of normalcy. While Iraqi politicians are failing, many Iraqi people are risking their lives to bring about change. This moment should not be sacrificed because American voters and politicians are tired of the war — not when those at the center of this storm believe they can make it work.

Naaman's Syndrome robs us of answers we need

How would a bath in a muddy west Texas river appeal to you as a cure for what ever ailed you? An Old Testament character by the name of Naaman was offered that solution to his illness — not in a muddy west Texas river but the muddy waters of the Jordan in Israel.

Naaman was wealthy, respected, and successful. However, he had the terrible disease of leprosy. This carried a stigma much like what a person who

is HIV positive has to face in our own day. As with AIDS today, leprosy in that day was incurable. When Naaman heard of the possibility of a cure, he was ready to take any necessary risks in order to experience this cure. Since this cure was to be found in a foreign country (Israel), Naaman used his good status with the Syrian king to ask that an audience with the king of Israel be arranged.

Naaman, with letter in hand and bearing considerable gifts, approached the king of Israel with his request for healing. When he learned the purpose of Naaman's visit, the king was terrified. In fact, he was suspicious that the king of Syria was attempting to pick a

fight with him.

Fortunately, the prophet Elisha heard what was happening, contacted the king, and told him to send Naaman to him. The king was more than happy to comply.

Naaman showed up expecting a welcome that he thought was appropriate for his status. However, Elisha simply sent a messenger out with a message for Naaman. 2 Kings 5:10-14 records what happened. But Elisha sent a messenger out to him with this message: "Go and wash yourself seven times in the Jordan River. Then your skin will be restored, and you will be healed of leprosy."

But Naaman became angry and stalked away. "I thought he would surely come out to

meet me!" he said. "I expected him to wave his hand over the leprosy and call on the name of the Lord his God and heal me! Aren't the Abana River and Pharpar River of Damascus better than all the rivers of Israel put together? Why shouldn't I wash in them and be healed?"

So Naaman turned and went away in a rage. But his officers tried to reason with him and said, "Sir, if the prophet had told you to do some great thing, wouldn't you have done it? So you should certainly obey him when he says simply to go and wash and be cured!" So Naaman went down to the Jordan River and dipped himself seven times, as the man of God had instructed him. And

his flesh became as healthy as a young child's, and he was healed! [NLT]

Naaman's response reveals an attitude that we too often reflect in prayer. We go to the Lord with a request. When He responds with instructions that we do not like, we may complain loudly and long about the way He is treating us. Sadly, we may not have wise friends who counsel obedience as Naaman's servants did. Our own version of "Naaman's syndrome" robs us of the answer that we so badly need. God has not failed to answer, we have failed to hear and obey.

Workers begin renovation of BSSH admin building

Cupola atop building to get facelift

The main building at Big Spring State Hospital is getting a facelift.

Workers recently began renovation work on the cupola atop the Administration Building at BSSH, officials said.

Cupolas — or “widow’s walks,” as they were nicknamed — were very popular among architectural designers around

the time construction planning began at the hospital in 1938, said Jok Simons, assistant superintendent of the facility.

“Somehow, during the planning of construction of this hospital, which began in 1938 with the four main buildings up front and the steam plant in the rear, the architect added this feature to (the administration building),” Simons noted. “This is not a full-sized cupola, but a scaled down version. It has no working doors, but French style fixed windows.”

The ball and roof were originally copper, then in the late 1980’s, the

remainder of the structure, which is wooden framework, was clad with copper, Simons said.

“It was later painted for some reason, then everyone forgot about the copper until now, when we have a contractor working on repairs to the windows (to fix rain leaks) and to repaint,” Simons said. “During the prep work, we re-discovered the beautiful copper, so we are now considering how much of it to leave revealed, with advice from our architect.”
