Hispanic enroll in college with more frequency

But still at a lower rate than other groups, study indicates

AUSTIN — Although Hispanic college enrollment has increased substantially since 2000, Hispanics are still participating in higher education at a lower rate than other racial or ethnic groups and are not on target to meet state goals, according to a state report released Thursday.

About 334,000 Hispanic students were enrolled at public and private colleges and universities last school year, the report released by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board said. That's nearly 100,000 — or 40 percent — more students than were enrolled six years ago.

But because of Texas' booming Hispanic population, the rate of college enrollment among Hispanics has barely budged over the past six years, the report said. Only 3.9 percent of Hispanics are enrolled in higher education, com

CISD: Rising costs to halt renovation of admin building

COAHOMA — The rising cost of building construction has forced Coahoma school trustees to trim some items from their renovation wish list.

Work on the \$14 million renovation project approved by Coahoma Independent School District voters is expected to begin within the next week or so, school officials announced during the Thursday night trustee meeting.

The much-feared "construction inflation" — the fast-rising cost of building materials — has already forced CISD officials to revise the bid package. A planned \$320,000 renovation of the administration building has been scrapped to bring costs in line with the \$13.9 million authorized by district voters in

trict voters in 2006. "We had some bids come in higher than initially expected." CISD Superintendent

Coahoma students must turn off phones, iPods

Cell phones should be neither seen nor heard, Coahoma school officials have decided. School trustees approved

student handbooks for the coming school year during their Thursday night meeting, and the only notable change from last year has to do with students carry electronic devices such as cell "We don't want to hear them and we don't want to see them. If we do, we are going to confiscate them."

phones or iPods.

While district students will still be allowed to bring those devices to school, they best be switched off and kept out of sight during class time, officials said.

"We don't want to hear

them and we don't want to see them," High School Principal John Massey said. "If we do, we are going to confiscate them ... They can have them in their pockets as long as they're turned off during school hours." Students can still use the devices while on buses or extra-curricular excursions as long as their coach or sponsor approves, Massey said.

Cell phone use during school hours has been forbidden for the past few years, but iPods were allowed up through the 2006-2007 school year.

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — Having already improved 24 strokes on his last British Open at Carnoustie, Sergio Garcia went out Friday to protect a lead.

Tiger Woods was lurking, however.

Garcia returned to "Car-Nicely" for the second round, looking to build on an opening 6under-par 65 that once again raised expectations he might finally win his first career major.

The emotional Spaniard slipped a bit with a threeputt bogey at No. 4, but he remained even for the round with a pair of birdies on the par 5s. After sinking a short birdie at No. 14 - the sort of putts that have bedeviled Garcia in the past — he tellingly pumped his fist. All eves in the afternoon figured to be on Woods, who shot 69 Thursday in a strong start to his quest to win a third straight Open title. The last to pull off a three-peat was Peter Thomson, more than a half-century ago. Woods added another signature moment to the majors when he holed a 90-foot birdie putt on the par-3 16th. Spain's Miguel Angel Jimenez nearly made a hole-in-one at that daunting, 248-yard hole. His tee shot stopped just inches beyond the cup for a tapin birdie, on the way to a 70 that had the "Mechanic" solidly in 70 contention for his first major title. Garcia, Jimenez and all the other Europeans are trying to break the conti-

Sabathia gets help in topping Rangers

ARLINGTON - C.C. Sabathia got plenty of help to become the first 13-game winner in the major leagues.

While it was another shaky start for Sabathia, Cleveland's ace left-hander was backed by Grady Sizemore - who contributed with his bat and his glove - and a rally killing defensive play by Josh Barfield in the Indians' 7-5 victory over

Thursday night.

"I give credit to all these guys. They did the work," Sabathia said. "I kind of kept us above water and then just tried to make sure we stayed in there. These guys definitely deserve all the credit for this one." Sabathia, who allowed

Involving Tiger Woods, of all

people — or World No. 1 Tiger Woods, as they call him around these parts.

Scandal!

Well, "scandal" might be overstating it a wee bit. But it was Tiger, it was questionable, and this is golf, a sport that prides itself on keeping everything on the up-and-up. It's also Great Britain, a combination that guarantees plenty of big headlines in the morning tabloids.

Woods, who ended up with a 69, probably doesn't need any help to win this Open. He did, after all, win the last two without anyone kicking his ball out of the rough or stopping one of his drives from going out of bounds.

But the R&A gave it to him anyway, and Woods wasn't about to turn his hosts down. "I didn't ask for it," Woods

said. "The guy told me I could."

The guy was Alan Holmes, a rules official for the R&A whose job it was on this chilly day to follow Woods and his playing partners around Carnoustie and be ready to interpret the rules of golf for them whenever needed. Turns out it was needed on the 10th hole, when Woods sprayed his drive into the deep rough

and the ball wound up on some television cables.

Enter Holmes.


He ruled quickly — albeit inexplicably — that the cables were an immovable object, allowing Woods to pick up the ball that had been buried in the tall grass and drop it onto shorter grass. Instead of a dicey carry over water up ahead and possible bogey, he was able to get it near the green and make a par to keep a good round going.

That might have been the end of it if not for Mark Roe, a former European Tour player following the group for the BBC. After Woods hit, Roe went over and easily picked the cables up and moved them 3 feet. He then suggested to Holmes that he had





Beefed up Border Patrol taking over for National Guard

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Border Patrol graduated a second class of recruits within a week for the first time Thursday, days after National Guard troops began leaving the U.S.-Mexico border.

The Border Patrol Academy in Artesia, N.M., produced 39 graduates Monday and 36 more Thursday, part of a plan to add 6,000 agents by the end of the year for a total of about 18,000. There are about 14,000 agents now.

The new graduates will be sent to five sectors — San Diego; El Paso and Laredo in Texas; and Tucson and Yuma in Arizona.

About 6,000 Guard members have been on the border since last May when they were deployed by President Bush to back up the Border Patrol until more agents could be hired.

The planned troop reductions began July 15. Officials want to cut their numbers in half by Sept.

Kelleher to step down as Southwest Airlines chairman in 2008

DALLAS (AP) — Herb Kelleher, the joke-cracking, charismatic leader of Southwest Airlines Co., will serve one more year as chairman of the airline he helped create and then resign next May, the company said Thursday.

Southwest also extended the contract of Chief Executive Gary C. Kelly into 2011, and said President Colleen Barrett would step down next July.

Kelleher, 76, and Barrett, 62, will remain Southwest employees for five years after leaving their executive jobs, working full time at Dallas headquarters, the company said.

Kelleher said he and Barrett had wanted to step away from the executive grind and were not pushed out.

Social Security numbers exposed on state Web site

AUSTIN(AP) - A California businessman dug up Troy Aikman's Social Security number on the Texas Secretary of State's Web site to focus attention on the vulnerability of personal information on the site.

Steven D. Peisner, president of SellitSAFE.com, said his search of business documents on the "SOSDirect" site revealed other personal info of the former Dallas Cowboys quarterback and more Social Security numbers.

Peisner's company works to protect companies from fraud related to identity theft.

"All of the citizens whose Social Security information is available online — they are all potential victims of identity theft," Peisner said. "You don't have to go into a garbage dumpster and get your hands dirty and sift through the trash to get somebody's identity."

Aikman's Uniform Commercial Code financing statement no longer showed his Social Security number by Thursday.

pared with 5.4 percent for blacks and 5.5 percent for whites. The goal for Hispanics is 4.8 percent by 2010 and 5.7 percent by 2015.

"We have some work to do," Raymund said Paredes, the Texas commissioner of higher education.

Boosting overall and minority enrollment is a piece of the state's fourpart Closing the Gaps initiative, which also aims to award more degrees, increase the number of nationally recognized programs and increase the amount of federal funding Texas schools get to conduct scientific research.

The Thursday report said Texas is on track to meet or exceed 12 of the initiative's 19 goals. About 1.2 million students were enrolled in higher education last year, up about 21 percent from 2000. And Texas schools awarded 27

percent more bachelor's and associate's degrees last year than in 2000.

But Texas is far short of its goal to increase the number of students earning undergraduate degrees in technology fields, particularly computer science.

Assistant Commissioner Susan Brown said students across the country have shied away from computer science programs in recent years as they've heard about outsourcing and layoffs at high-tech companies. But she said there is still demand for people with those skills and she believes students will flock back to the programs in the future.

Paredes said all the targets are within reach, especially now that high school students are required to take rigorous courses unless their parents have them moved into a more basic program.

"I think you'll see some very desirable results down the road," Paredes told the board.

the cases were reported north of San Angelo near the Coke County line.

"Anthrax is naturally occurring across much of our area," Sturtz said. "Most longtime ranchers here have been aware of it for generations. While it is a serious zoonotic bacterial disease, which causes sudden death, it is preventable and easily vaccinated against."

Sturtz said a zoonotic disease is one that can cross-infect from animals to humans. Naturally occurring anthrax infections occur through ingestion of the spores; not by inhalation.

"The reason for this

announcement is so area ranchers with a history of anthrax in their area will have time to vaccinate their animals, because as with most all vaccines, there is a lag time of several days before the vaccine becomes effective after the animal is vaccinated."

This year's unusually wet weather, followed by a dry spell, created a prime environment for anthrax spores already existing in the soil to resurface, Sturtz said.

"Wet weather in West Texas is a blessing, but it can lead to problems, and anthrax is just one of these," he said. "Hopefully, this will be an isolated instance.

Anthrax is a reportable disease, Sturtz said, which means that suspected cases should be reported to the Texas Animal Health Commission area office at 800-658-6642; after 5 p.m. call 800-550-8242 as soon as possible.

The commission requires that anthrax carcasses, manure and bedding from affected animals be incinerated, Sturtz said. Ranchers should not move the carcass, but should wear gloves and long sleeves when preparing the burn site.




On the drive back

Rob missle defense to pay Guard

he very first thing taught in economics is that people have unlimited wants but limited means, so choices must be made. This is true on the macro as well as on the individual level. Even a leviathan like the Department of Defense cannot

fund everything it would like. It would make sense, then, to fund programs that counter immediate threats to national security or aid troops in combat before addressing nebulous, long-term threats that may or may not emerge.

Unfortunately, in some eases, the

Department of Defense does not choose to make this common-sense choice.

Sen. Christopher Dodd (D-Conn.) is trying to rectify this with an amendment he proposed to the Fiscal Year 2008 defense authorization bill. This legislation, which may not pass, would give the National Guard an extra \$500 million to replace equipment that has been worn down by frequent rotations in Iraq and Afghanistan. Many states' National Guards have a very limited amount of gear on hand to deal with natural disasters, as reported by a recent USA Today study. This precarious level of readiness could prove devastating, should the National Guard units here actually need equipment that is overseas.

However, Dodd's amendment would get the money from one of the White House's pet projects: the U.S. missile defense program. Specifically, money would be

taken away from building a third interceptor site in Eastern Europe and the struggling Airborne Laser (ABL). The missile defense programs have powerful constituencies and friends who will fight for every penny.

The proposed third interceptor site in Eastern Europe is part of the George W. Bush administration's efforts to expand missile defense while it is still in office. This proposal would put up to 10 interceptors in Poland and a radar installation in the Czech Republic, but depends on many unknowns.

Among these variables is the reality that the missile defense facilities are highly unpopular among the Polish and Czech people, making their governments' agreement uncertain. Even if Poland and the Czech Republic officially agree to host the system, the deal would not be formalized for another two years.

There is a host of other problems as well. The interceptor system that the United States wants to put in Poland does not exist. Russia is furious about the U.S. encroachment into what it considers its backyard, and has run the gamut of responses from threatening Eastern Europe to proposing missile defense cooperation with the United States. As for Iran, it doesn't have a missile that can reach all of Europe, much less the United States, nor is it expected to for another eight years at the earliest.

Suffice it to say, this whole proposal is in flux and in no way time-sensitive. A reluctance to fund the Eastern European sites makes sense until more is known about the particulars.

The ABL is a modified Boeing

747 that is supposed to be able to shoot lasers out of its nose and damage threat missiles so that they fall short of their targets. The United States has spent \$4.3 billion on the program since its inception in 1994. Yet the ABL has suffered schedule slips and developmental troubles. It has never attempted to shoot down a ballistic missile and is not scheduled to try until 2009.

And even if it were eventually to come together as a defensive system, a working concept of how it would operate has never been clearly expressed. In any case, it is expected that a fleet of seven ABLs would be needed in order to properly cover one hot spot. Again, this is a weapons system surrounded by question marks as to whether it will even become a reality in a few years. Surely, such a theoretical system would not take priority over more immediate and tangible needs.

Yet this is exactly what the Pentagon intends to do. For some reason, missile defense is granted leeway that most weapons program proponents can only dream about. While other more pressing needs go unmet, missile defense backers continue blissfully along, certain that funding will come through almost entirely intact. Whether or not Dodd's amendment passes, it highlights just how skewed the Pentagon's spending priorities have become.

Israel releases Palestinian prisoners in gesture to moderate leadership

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) – Israel released more than 250 Palestinian prisoners Friday in an attempt to bolster moderate Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas in his power struggle with Hamas.

Leaning out of bus windows and hoisting Palestinian flags, the prisoners headed to Abbas' headquarters in the West Bank city of Ramallah for a festive reception.

"All the suffering, all the pain is gone," said released prisoner Iyad Milhem, 30, as he rode on one of the buses. "But we still hope for the release of all the other prisoners."

Most of those released were from Abbas' Fatah movement. Prominent among the freed prisoners was 61year-old Abdel Rahim Malouh, second-in-command in a small PLO faction, the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, which assassinated an Israeli Cabinet minister in 2001.

Pakistani tribal elders try to salvage peace deal; ruling on suspended judge expected

MIRAN SHAH, Pakistan (AP) – Clashes broke out Friday between Pakistani troops and militants in North Waziristan after a suicide car bomber hit a security checkpoint, killing four people, officials said.

The attack on the outskirts of the main town of Miran Shah, which killed a soldier and three male civilians, came hours after a 45-member delegation of tribal elders began talks with pro-Taliban militant leaders to resurrect a controversial peace deal and stem spiraling violence.

Meanwhile, the Supreme Court was set to rule Friday on an appeal by Pakistan's top judge against his suspension by President Gen. Pervez Musharraf that has triggered political turmoil.

Iftikhar Mohammed Chaudhry's suspension in March sparked protests by lawyers and opposition parties that have grown into a powerful pro-democracy movement just as Musharraf faces a rising tide of Islamic militancy.

Experts puzzle over crashed plane's high speed as officials debate closing airport

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) — One of the two thrust reversers on an airliner carrying 186 people that crashed in a fireball was turned off when the plane landed, the jet's owner said, as officials tried to determine why it raced down a runway instead of slowing down.

However, the airline insisted late Thursday that the thrust reverser, used by jets to slow down just after touching down, had been deactivated earlier in accordance with proper maintenance procedures.

Meanwhile, federal prosecutors asked a federal judge to "temporarily paralyze" Congonhas airport - a move that could disrupt air travel in Latin America's largest nation. The judge could issue a decision as early as Monday on the airport's fate.

Responding to warnings that such a move could create havoc in travel and cause severe financial repercussions for airlines, prosecutor Marcio Schusterschitz said it was better "to choose life over monev."

"We think this situation has reached its limit," Schusterschitz said in an interview with The Associated Press. "We are flying blind."

U.S. general says solid judgment about troop buildup in Iraq not likely until November

WASHINGTON (AP) — For months September has been cast as a pivotal time for determining the course of the war in Iraq, yet a top general now says a solid judgment on the U.S. troop buildup there may not

come until November.

Lt. Gen. Raymond Odierno told reporters after a Senate hearing Thursday that he would need beyond September to tell if improvements in Iraq represent long-term trends.

"In order to do a good assessment I need at least until November," said Odierno, a deputy to Gen. David Petraeus, the U.S. military commander in Iraq.

Petraeus and other officials testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and briefed reporters on Thursday. Making strides toward security and political goals could take more time than first thought, they warned.

Federal judge dismisses ex-CIA operative Plame's lawsuit against Bush administration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former CIA operative Valerie Plame lost a lawsuit Thursday that demanded money from Bush administration officials whom she blamed for leaking her agency identity.

Plame, the wife of former Ambassador Joseph Wilson, had accused Vice President Dick Cheney and others of conspiring to disclose her identity in 2003. Plame said that violated her privacy rights and was illegal retribution for her husband's criticism of the administration.

U.S. District Judge John D. Bates dismissed the case on jurisdictional grounds and said he would not express an opinion on the constitutional arguments.

Bates dismissed the case against all defendants: Cheney, White House political adviser Karl Rove, former White House aide I. Lewis "Scooter" Libby and former Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage.

Bidding Quiz

You are South in each of the following five bidding sequences. How many spades are you likely to have in each case? SOUTH NORTH 1. 1 NT 1 **†** 2 **†** 2. $1 \spadesuit$ $1 \mathrm{NT}$ 3 NT Pass 1 **♠** 2 ♦ 3. 2 NT 3 NT 3 🐥 Pass 1 🔶 2 ♦ 3 ♠ 2 NT **4** 5. 2 NT 2 🕈 3 🕈

1. Six. Rarely would you have only five spades. You would probably pass with 5-3-3-2 distribution, and bid your second suit with 5-4-2-2 or 5-4-3-1 distribution. Your hand might look something like $AQ7632 \forall 8 \diamond AQJ \clubsuit 843$. 2. Six. The jump to three spades indicates six or more spades, and you

would be unlikely to pass three notrump if you had seven spades. Your hand could be \blacklozenge KQJ952 \heartsuit AJ ♦ Q84 ♣ A7.

3. Five. You can't have only four spades because you would surely have opened the bidding in a minor with what is obviously a three-suited hand. Your most likely distribution is 5-1-4-3, since you passed three notrump and would probably not do so with 6-0-4-3, 5-0-5-3 or 5-0-4-4 distribution. Your hand might be ♠ QJ972 ♥ J ♦ AK85 ♣ KQ4.

4. Five. Your opening spade bid could have been made on a four-card suit (assuming you play four-card majors), and partner's delayed support is likely to be based on only three spades. It would therefore be wrong to bid four spades at this point with only four trumps. You also can' have six spades, since you would have rebid the suit rather than bid two notrump at your second turn. A typical hand would be \clubsuit KJ843 \clubsuit K5 ♦ K96 ♣ A92.

5. Three. Partner has only four spades, judging from his twonotrump bid. If you had four also, you would indicate this by bidding three (or possibly four) spades instead of three clubs. You probably have a hand such as ♠ KQ6 ♥ ♦ A5 ♣ KQ9764.

'He's still my Savior!'

Here a e's still my Savior!" Sometimes we learn great truths from unexpected sources. The lady who spoke these words certainly was an unexpected source of wisdom.

Several years ago, I read an article about a woman's experience with her aging mother who was gradually losing her ability to relate and to remember. I believe that the article was in Guidepost magazine. I no longer have the article, but it left a lasting impression on me. Both before and after reading that article, my wife and

longer recognizes us at all.

The story that the writer told was of a bright moment in an otherwise depressing phase of her life with her aging mother.

She had enjoyed one of the better visits that she had experienced in some time. As it came time for her to leave the nursing home, she dreaded facing what had generally been a painful parting. Her mother usually pleaded to go home; however, today as the daughter made her way toward the exit all was silent.

A short distance from the door, she heard her mother's shuffling step and realized that her name was being called. Though she was tempted to act as though she did not hear the call, the daughter could not. This was her mother calling! As her mother drew closer, she could see the confusion in her eyes. However, once they were face to face, a wonderful thing happened. Her mother's eyes cleared for a moment, and she said, "He's still my Savior." With that unforgettable remark, her eyes clouded over once more, and she shuffled back to her room.

Through the years since reading that very personal story, I have reached some conclusions about God's ability to work in the lives of people we love — even when they can no longer communicate with us or perhaps even remember us.

First, when I search some of God's promises, I realize that He has not promised that I will be able to witness everything He is doing in the lives of those whom I love. However, for those who walk in faith with Him, he has promised that he will never leave or forsake them (Hebrews 13:5b; Genesis 28:15; Deuteronomy 31:6). I don't need to witness this promise in action for it to be true. This is one more place where I just need to trust Him. Second, He has

promised that His Spirit will bear witness with our spirits that we are His children. The Spirit Himself testifies with our spirit that we are children of God (Romans 8:16 NASV).

This tells me that the Lord is able to remain close even when a person is otherwise unable to respond. I have chosen to believe that this promise stands even when we can no longer communicate with anyone else.

These conclusions have led me to view my grandmother's final years in a

very different way. Later when my Dad no longer recognized me, my confidence in God's promises made those final years much easier.

Now my wife and I are going through this kind of loss once again. Her 93-year-old mother has not responded to her or recognized her in almost eight years. We can't know what it has been like for her to live with the advanced ravages of Parkinson's disease, but we do know that she is not alone.

May the Lord bless and comfort you as you trust Him to go where you cannot and do what you no longer can.


