Bush reclaims powers

Colonoscopy said successful

CAMP DAVID, Md. (AP) - President Bush transferred the powers of his office to Vice President Dick Cheney for more than two hours

Saturday w h i l e under sedation for a colon cancer screening.

Doctors re-moved five small polyps during the procedure at Camp Dav-"None



appeared worrisome," White House spokesman Scott Stanzel said. Polyps are precancerous growths in the colon.

The colonoscopy lasted 31 minutes. The transfer of power from Bush to Cheney covered two hours and five minutes.

The president invoked Section 3 of the 25th Amendment to Constitution "out of an abundance of caution." Stanzel said. The amendment, approved in 1967, four years after President Kennedy was assassinated, had been used only twice before.

At 7:16 a.m. EDT, Bush invoked the disability clause and transferred his authority to Cheney. The vice president was at his home on the Chesapeake Bay in St. Michaels, Md., about 30 miles east of Washington.

Bush reclaimed his presidential powers and duties at 9:21 a.m. EDT.

Howard College trustees, having been given the voters' OK to conduct a \$21 million facelift of the Birdwell Lane campus, will begin a step-by-step process toward making that goal a reality Monday afternoon. money.

Trustees will formally authorize the issuance and sale of tax bonds when they hold their monthly meeting at 12:30 p.m. in the Student Union Building Tumbleweed Room.

District voters in May approved the bonds to Step one — get the finance a variety of con-

struction and renovation projects on the Big Spring campus, including:

• Infrastructure concerns such as water, sewer and gas lines, underground electrical service and heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems.

Gagne wants to remain with Rangers

ARLINGTON — Eric Gagne is flattered to hear his name repeatedly mentioned in trade rumors. That confirms he is starting to pitch like his old self again.

Still, the closer doesn't want his comeback with the Texas Rangers to be short-lived.

"I want to stay here, but it's good to see that people really want me on their team," Gagne

Garcia holds lead at Open

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — Sergio Garcia bent over slightly. jammed the oversized putter into his stomach and calmly knocked his ball toward the cup.

Right in.

Garcia started the third round of the British Open by making a 15-foot birdie putt Saturday, the sort of chance that bedeviled him in the past. Maybe this will be the week for the talented Spaniard to finally win his first major.

Tiger Woods isn't giving up, even though the two-time defending Open champion failed to make a major charge with a 2under-par 69. He walked off with Garcia still on having course, reclaimed a seven-shot edge over the world's No. 1 player with another birdie at the eighth.

Garcia shot a 2-under 34 on the front side to get to 8 under. His playing partner, South Korea's K.J. Choi, staggered through the front nine at 1 over to drop five strokes behind the leader.

"I've got to play a little better than I have been, that's for sure," Woods said, very aware this was a day for going lower. "But at least I give myself a chance going out there tomorrow."

He remembered what happened when the Open last came to Carnoustie in 1999. Paul Lawrie rallied from a double-digit deficit the final day to win in a playoff.

Texans hope that improvement continues

HOUSTON — The Houston Texans were much better last year but still fell far short of the playoffs.

Now they're banking on a firsttime starting quarterback and a 30-year-old running back to solve their longtime offensive woes. Matt Schaub and Ahman Green begin their first season in Houston when the Texans begin camp on July 27.

The pair join a team with a defense led by last year's top pick Mario Williams, whose development will be key in Houston's success after a disappointing rookie season.

They hope Schaub and Green can invigorate the Texans offense after David Carr managed just two touchdown passes in the last 10 games of 2006.

Schaub has already ingratiated himself to Texans' veterans, most notably Pro Bowl receiver Andre Johnson, by spending the spring and summer working out with and getting to know his teammates.

believe the highly touted backup can be the leader the team needs but never had in Carr, who was dumped after the Texans posted their fifth straight losing record in 2006.

"I've been impressed with the way he handles himself," coach Gary Kubiak said. "That's a lot to handle. You go and make a trade like that for a kid and the pressure to come in here and take over this football team is great, but he's handled himself tremendously this offseason. He's been a great worker, very confident kid about his opportunity and what he's fixing to go take on."

Schaub has been learning Kubiak's offense since he was traded to the Texans in March, and his transition to the team

will be aided by the rapport he's established with Johnson. Houston's top offensive threat caught a career-high 103 passes for 1,147 yards last season.

Unfortunately Schaub, the Texans did nothing in the offseason to reinforce their receiving corps after Johnson. A key in camp will be for Kevin Walter to prove he can become the legitimate second receiving threat Houston's never had to take pressure Johnson.

Kubiak is a big fan of his, despite the 25-yearold amassing just 456 yards receiving in four seasons.

"It's a concern of mine because we're so young after Andre," Kubiak said. "We're going to find out if we have a couple of young players that are going to step up and be big time pros. I'm going to give them the opportunity to do that."

Though probably past his prime, Green reinforces a running game that sputtered last season until December while relying on inexperienced

and injured backs. The Texans were forced to start rookie sixth-round pick Wali Lundy after Domanick Williams (formerly Davis) was placed on the injured reserve just days before the sea-

Ron Dayne finally got healthy and became a factor in December, rushing for 429 yards and five touchdowns in that month alone.

The Texans are excited about the possibilities with Green on the roster and Mike Sherman, who coached him in Green Bay for several years, said he looks better than ever. He had 1,059 yards rushing last season after returning from a torn right quadriceps in 2005.

With the one-two punch of Green and Dayne, the Texans are in much better shape at the position than they were entering last season.

"I think we have big play potential with number 30 (Green) back there," Kubiak said. "If we are right in the run game and we catch him right, we have a chance for some big, big plays. If we can run the ball that way, we can get people off Andre."

Of course, as usual, questions abound when it comes to who will protect the new quarterback after Carr was sacked 249 times in five seasons. The Texans thought they'd found their left tackle of the future in second-year player Charles Spencer, but a broken leg just two games into last season has left doubt about if the 351-pound player will ever play again.

If Spencer can't go, the Texans will rely on 10year veteran Ephraim Salaam or former Kansas City player Jordan Black to protect Schaub's blind side.

Williams, the shocking No. 1 pick last year, will need to show much more than he did in his rookie season when he finished with 47 tackles and 4 1/2

There's several reasons to believe he will.

The defensive end has recovered from plantar fasciitis in his right foot that slowed him for most of last season. He also seems more relaxed a year removed from the constant Reggie Bush/Vince Young questions and, perhaps most importantly, he's got help on the line in this year's first-round pick Amobi far exceeded expectations Okoye.

Along with taking pressure of Williams, the Texans hope Okoye, the 20-year-old defensive tackle, will beef up their paltry pass rush. Houston was 27th in the NFL in sacks last season.

"I look at him and I said: 'This kid would have gotten there many times last year," Kubiak said. "I think he's going to give us an added pass rush ability inside and make people pay attention to more than one guy when it comes to turning protections and stuff like that. Hopefully that will free up other players to make plays."

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
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
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FBI investigating possible NBA referee gambling scandal

A point-shaving scandal is an enormous problem in any sport. This one, which might involve an NBA referee, has the potential to permanently scar the league.

The NBA acknowledged Friday the FBI is investigating Tim Donaghy for betting on games, including ones in which he officiated.

"It's a shame," the Los Angeles Lakers' Kobe Bryant said. "It's just unfortunate. ... Like I said, it's a very serious issue."

According to a law enforcement official, authorities are examining whether the referee made calls to affect the point spread in games on which he or associates had wagered thousands of dollars over the past two seasons.

The referee had a gambling problem and was approached by low-level mob associates through an acquaintance, said the official, who spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because he wasn't authorized to discuss the ongoing investigation.

Gambling long has been a problem in sports, and leagues have made a point of educating players of the potential pitfalls. The NBA, for example, discusses gambling at rookie orientation, even bringing in former mobster

And the NBA dealt with negative stories about its officials earlier this year when an academic study detailed a bias by referees against players of the opposite color. The league requires its officials to file reports and defend or discuss every questionable call they make in a

Donaghy, who reportedly has resigned, was an NBA official for 13 years. He officiated 68 games in the 2005-06 season and 63 games in 2006-07, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

He also worked 20 playoff games, including five last season — Pistons-Magic on April 23; Warriors-Mavericks on April 27; Suns-Lakers on April 29; Nets-Raptors on May 4; and Spurs-Suns on May 12.

Those studying Donaghy's games might have noticed some trends. When the home team

was favored by 0-4 1/2 points, it went 5-12 against the spread in games officiated by Donaghy this season, according to Covers.com, a Web site that tracks referee trends. Home underdogs were 1-7 against the spread when it was 5-9.5 points.

Donaghy was part of a crew working the Heat-Knicks game in New York in February when the Knicks shot 39 free throws to the Heat's eight,

called on Heat coach Pat Riley and assistant Ron Rothstein, and the Knicks won by six.

Defense attorney John confirmed Lauro Donaghy is under investigation, but refused to comment on the allegations or the case.

"They are serious allegations," the leader of the referees' union, Lamell McMorris told Philadelphia Inquirer. "It's an ongoing federal investigation. And we don't really have much more to say about it, and neither do the referees."

In Bradenton, Fla., a woman came to the door of the home where Donaghy lives and shouted through the door: "We have no comment."

Donaghy is perhaps best-known previously as one of the referees in the 2004 game at Detroit that ended with Indiana Pacers players fighting with Pistons fans, among the biggest black marks in league history.

This could top it.

"We would like to assure our fans that no amount of effort, time or personnel is being spared to assist in this investigation, to bring to justice an individual who betrayed the most sacred trust in professional sports, and to take the necessary steps to protect against this ever happening again," commissioner David Stern said in a statement.

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
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

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

Let us all hope commissioners, voters will learn

ast week's revelation that the rising cost of building construction has left Coahoma school trustees with no choice but trim their renovation plans needs to be a wake up call for the Howard County Commissioners

Howard County voters need to take note as well. Work on a \$14 million renovation project approved by Coahoma Independent School District voters has yet to begin and already school officials announced Thursday night that "construction inflation" — the fast-rising cost of building materials has forced them to revise the bid package.

As a result, the planned \$320,000 renovation of the CISD administration building has been scrapped to bring costs in line with the \$13.9 million authorized by district voters in November of last year.

It is almost certain that commissioners, currently planning to put another bond issue for construction of a new county jail before voters in November, couldn't have been happy to hear about the CISD board's experience.

Then again, maybe it was exactly what the commissioners court needed voters to see.

Given the costs faced by the Coahoma school district, there's little doubt that Howard County voters will be asked to approve a bond package to build a 96-bed jail that could well cost as much and possibly more than the 144-bed facility commissioners sought approval for just a year earlier.

That so-called "Taj Mahal" jail could well be something Howard County voters wish they'd have approved when they had the chance — the same time Coahoma voters displayed the progressive vision to make improvements to their schools.

What's more, there's still considerable doubt in our collective mind that commissioners should be considering a 96-bed facility. After all, it was the Texas Jail Standards Commission that recommended a 144-bed facility.

Why should we pay attention to the Jail Standards Commission's recommendation?

That can be answered with another question:

Remember opponents of last year's "Taj Mahal" jail bond telling us the state couldn't close our current The bottom line, of course, is that the price of

everything is increasing almost daily. What's more, barring some devastating economic depression. prices simply aren't going to decline. Our commissioners made a recent visit to Young

County where initial plans for a 96-bed jail had to be altered to a 144-bed facility before construction began. By the way, those new plans also allow for a possible expansion to more than 200 beds.

But of course that's a different community — Graham, population 9,000, the seat of Young County, which has a population of about 17,500.

That's virtually half of Howard County's 33,627 people, right?

Let us pray our commissioners really learned

something that day.

We might also say a little prayer asking that voters be given a little more wisdom than was displayed last November.

he entertainers of the world banded together last week to end global warming by giving a series of concerts. All to the good. I'm big on good intensions. (After all, we ended the Vietnam War with folk songs, didn't we?)

But this time I'd put a hold on feelings of optimism if I were you. The world is doomed.

Doomed to everincreasing global warming, cities wreathed in toxic fumes, endless traffic jams and all that those things signify.

Extinction, basically. That revelation came a few weeks ago while I was stuck in a traffic jam in Warsaw. Up until

then I had been moderately hopeful about our ability to respond intelligently to an ever-warmer world. I thought, when push came to shove, we'd accept a \$2-a-gallon

gas tax, start using public transit, develop alternative fuels and abandon our love affair with overweight SUVs and (ugh) Hummers.

I thought we'd return to the day

of one-car families, car-pools and walking. Warsaw disabused me of those

illusions. Poland is a poor country, so poor that many there are happy to let the United States locate a "missile shield" on its soil. The "shield," far from shielding Poland from nuclear attack, will make it a target, but Poland welcomes it as a

jobs program. It's that poor.

Yet not too poor to have rush hour traffic jams made up largely of people alone in their cars. And gasoline there costs about \$6 a gallon, twice what it is here.

So I figured if six-buck gas doesn't make Poles forsake their cars, why should a \$2 gas tax force relatively rich Americans to do so?

Now, to be fair, cars in Poland tend to be smaller, much smaller, than American cars. But as I said, it's a poor country. When I got to Austria, which is not, (and gas is still \$6) the cars got bigger – Mercedes, BMWs, Audis; it looked like Beverly Hills. There were rush hour traffic jams there too, by the way.

I know what you're going to say, you optimists out there. What about President George W. Bush's favorite answer to the energy problem — high-tech alternatives? Don't hold your breath.

The New York Times recently published a supplement on the future of the auto, written by Rich Taylor, a former editor of Car and Driver who now freelances. Here is what I took away from his analysis of the most popular potential solutions to our gasoline problem.

 Ethanol — A hoax, basically. Corn ethanol takes about as much energy to produce as it saves when you put it in your car. In addition, a rising price for corn means a rising price for food at the supermarket. It's worthless. The twin reasons it's so heavily subsidized by government is: 1) The presidential nominating season begins in Iowa and politicians are afraid of antagonizing Iowa farmers, who favor ethanol

because it keeps the price of corn high, and 2) Archer Daniels Midland, which finances the political campaigns of politicians who then lick its hand, is heavily into producing ethanol.

• Hydrogen — Wonderful fuel, except...it's harder to produce than you might imagine and, in addition, contains only about 4 percent of the energy possessed by an equivalent amount of gas. Which means that to be useful it has to be compressed to about 10,000 pounds per square inch. If you have an accident with a full tank of hydrogen, you could easily become a Bruce Willis movie.

• Hybrids — OK for what they are but you're building two power plants where only one was needed before. Moreover, it means you've brought another battery into the world and it will eventually have to be disposed of. Not the best environmental idea.

And all of these technologies are expensive. Someone would have to pay for them. And if the American people are about anything, it's an unwillingness to pay anything for anything.

So then...The fuel of the future is...gasoline; and with it more cars, pollution and global warming. The upside is we get more feel-good concerts.

Rock on.

TO THE EDITOR:

I'm writing this letter in response to a column written about the aquatics director at the YMCA. It was written by Thomas Jenkins, an employee of the Big Spring Herald, concerning his daughter and one of our safety policies at the city pool.

He had a problem with our swim test policies. In the column he wrote about how rudely I treated him and that he had no control over how our conversation proceeded. In reality, it was Mr. Jenkins who decided how our conversation went.

Right away he demanded to speak with a manager. I tried explaining our swim test policies: Everyone under 18 must take a swim test given by a lifeguard to be able to swim in the deep end of the pool.

The swim test is given at the top of each hour.

In our records, we had his daughter as a non-swimmer. I then informed Mr. Jenkins that his daughter would have to wait until the top of the hour to retake the swim test, because the staff was busy watching the pool. But he was not happy with this. He insisted that she was a swimmer and had already passed the swim test.

I tried to apologize and explain that mistakes do happen, that we're not perfect. This did not appease him at all. Mr. Jenkins continued yelling in an irate manner, slamming his hand on the counter, slamming the swim test sheets on the counter, insulting me and telling me how incompetent I was.

He then threatened to talk to my

supervisor and threatened to put an article in the Herald about my incompetence. All of this inappropriate behavior was because he didn't want to follow our swim test policies.

I knew the situation was going to continue to escalate, so at that time I said there will be no further discussion and walked away from him.

Now, keep in mind that Mr. Jenkins was not at the pool on official business. Mr. Jenkins threatened me and tried to intimidate me using the Big Spring Herald's name, to try and change our policies. I feel it is in appropriate and unprofessional for him to abuse his position as an employee of the

'SICKO' indicts health care industry

am not in the habit of doing movie reviews but I recommend everyone see Michael Moore's documentary "SICKO" about our health care system, which leaves 45 million Americans uninsured, including 9 million children. The film shows how corporate interests guided by profits rather than by an interest in preventing and curing health problems victimize sick people

and taxpayers. "SICKO" puts human faces on our national health care crisis. A grieving mother whose 2-yearold daughter had a high fever, was gripped by a seizure and rushed to the nearest hospital, but was turned away because the hospital wasn't in her HMO's network.

The mother was told the child had to be moved and that any care provided by the receiving hospital would not be covered. Leaving that hospital denied the child vital emergency care. She slipped into a coma and died on the way to the HMO facility.

There's the middle-aged couple, both professionals with health insurance, who were bankrupted when their insurance company stopped providing health coverage after her bout with cancer and his heart attacks. They were forced to sell their home and move into their daughter's storage room. We see a 22-year-old single mother and cancer survivor from Michigan who drives to Canada and poses as the common law wife of a friend to get free clinical care in that country. And we experience disoriented, indigent patients pushed

out of hospitals, put in taxis and dumped, still in their clinical gowns, on the streets of Los Angeles' Skid Row.

Moore exposes how far some insurance companies go to avoid paying for medical costs and the voluminous list of ailments insurance companies call "pre-existing conditions" to deny treatment, cancel policies or demand repayment for already received medical services. He presents doctors and other employees of insurance companies and HMOs promoted and given bonuses based on the number of medical procedures denied sick people. In one case, a young woman with cancer was denied medical treatment because she once had a yeast infection, which the company claimed was a preexisting condition.

Moore takes us to Britain and France, which have had universal health care since the 1940s. No child or adult would be denied care in those countries because they had a pre-existing condition or because necessary care was "too expensive." When he asks patients how much they are being charged for the care they receive, they laugh and say there is no charge because everybody is included in the National Health Service.

France, in addition to universal health care, maintains a 24-hour medical care service staffed by doctors who make house calls. When is the last time any of us had a doctor come to our home? "SICKO" explores some of the myths about health care in other industrialized democracies, including supposed long waits for care and underpaid doctors.

One of the most dramatic segments of the film involves three first responders to the 9/11 attacks

on the World Trade Center who are suffering from severe respiratory diseases and a host of other ailments from exposure to dust and debris at Ground Zero. Moore took them to the U.S. military base at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba, to get the same free, top-notch health care that the U.S. military claims it is providing to "enemy combatants." After he failed to enter the base, he took them to a Havana hospital where they received extensive free diagnostic tests, treatment and medication for which they paid nominal sums. In none of the countries Moore visited are children denied care or provided a lesser standard of care for lack of health insurance or money, as is too often the case in the United States.

I hope "SICKO" pricks our consciences and catalyzes a robust national debate about our broken health care system. The film asks timely questions our political leaders need to answer. If other countries can guarantee health care to all of their citizens, why can't ours? If Canada, European nations and Cuba can take the profit motive out of caring for people, why can't we? Why are there 9 million uninsured children in America?

We need to find common ground with all Americans of good will to address the nation's health care crisis regardless of one's political affiliation.

Quick news...

• Crude Oil: As the peak gasoline demand season winds down, we anticipate the positive correlation existing between crude prices and inventories may diminish some, and prices may exhibit more stability, potentially trading between \$60 and \$70 per barrel despite falling inventories.

• Natural Gas: We anticipate high crude prices and hot summer temperatures to offer some support to the natural gas market through the summer, but an inventory overhang will likely limit a major reversal in recently weak prices. We tend to think natural gas prices will be supported above \$6.50/mmBtu during the summer.

 Colonial Pipeline Company is now accepting orders to ship Ultra-low Sulfur Diesel (ULSD) to the New York area. Previously the operator only allowed shipments up the Eastern seaboard as far as Virginia because they feared the supplies would be contaminated.

We believe the opening of the pipeline reflects strong demand for the product in the Northeast and decreased amounts of heating oil moving through the same pipelines. Heating oil can contaminate ULSD supplies with more sulfur.

Heating oil use in the United States is now limited to home heating since a June 1 regulation demanded low-sulfur diesel be used in non-highway use vehicles which previously ran on heating oil.

• The Popular Revolution Army of Mexico has claimed responsibility for last week's attack on a natural gas pipeline connecting Mexico City to Guadalajara. The group is demanding two of its members be released after being "unfairly" imprisoned during the teacher protests in Oaxaca last year. Pemex has increased security at all its major oil and gas installations.

• The Canadian federal government has said it will commission six to eight Artic-class patrol boats and use them to defend the nation's territorial oil

U.S. oil and gas rig count down 1

HOUSTON (AP) — The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the United States fell by 1 this week to 1,790.

Of the rigs running nationwide, 1,497 were exploring for natural gas and 287 for oil, Houston-based Baker Hughes Inc. reported Friday. Six were listed as miscellaneous.

A year ago, the rig count stood at 1,683.

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, Oklahoma gained three, Wyoming gained two and Alaska and Texas each gained one. Colorado lost six, New Mexico lost five and Louisiana lost one.

Baker Hughes has tracked rig counts since 1944. The tally peaked at 4,530 in 1981, during the height of the oil boom. The industry posted several record lows in 1999, bottoming out at 488.

Whole Foods extends tender offer

AUSTIN (AP) — Whole Foods Market Inc., hoping to salvage the purchase of rival Wild Oats Markets Inc., said Friday it had extended its tender offer for all Wild Oats shares again, to Aug. 10.

Whole Foods, the nation's largest natural and organic grocer, said 57.1 percent of Wild Oats shares had been tendered by the close of business Thursday. The figure was 58 percent in mid-June, Whole Foods said then.

Austin-based Whole Foods announced in February it would pay \$18.50 per share, or \$565 mil-



Water, water everywhere raises risk of livestock disease

ushing water, stagnant ponds, or even the dry stages after wet periods can lead to outbreaks of livestock disease. Mosquitoes and biting flies, capable of carrying and transmitting diseases, thrive in the damp weather, and naturally-occurring anthrax can take a toll on livestock and wildlife when pastures dry after prolonged wet periods.

Horse owners should take precautions against mosquitotransmitted diseases by having their animals vaccinated against West Nile Virus (WNV) and the reportable diseases Eastern and Western Equine Encephalitis (EEE and WEE). "If you wait until cases of 'sleeping sickness' occur in your area, you may have waited too long to vacci-

nate," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the

build the animal's immunity to a particular disease," he said. "Vaccine can provide the best it's also crucial to keep up with booster shots, as recom-

disease protection possible, but mended by the vaccine manufacturer or your private veterinary practitioner. In 2006, 111 horses were confirmed to have West Nile Virus in Texas. So far this year, the disease has been confirmed in one horse, located in Willacy County."

Three cases of Potomac Horse Fever, which is not a regulatory disease, have been confirmed in Kerr County by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory. Potomac Horse Fever, first detected in Maryland in 1979, is not typically found in Texas. Clinical cases usually are found near rivers, streams, ponds or canals. The infection involves tiny flukes that are parasites of water snails. The flukes hatch their offspring into the water, and these are then picked up by aquatic insects that molt into flying

insects, including caddis flies and mayflies. Horses can become exposed to Potomac Horse Fever when they eat or drink anything contaminated with the insects.

Kerr County equine veterinarians are urging all owners to call their practitioner if equine animals exhibit signs of Potomac Horse Fever, which can include a reluctance to eat, fever, diarrhea, colic or inflammation around the hoof. Treatment includes antibiotics and supportive care.



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
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

Government denies Taliban claim of killing 2 German hostages; but says 1 has died

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan (AP) — A purported Taliban spokesman said the hard-line militia killed two German hostages on Saturday because Germany didn't announce a troop withdrawal from Afghanistan.

The Afghan government, however, said one of the Germans died of a heart attack and that the second was still alive.

South Korea's government, meanwhile, attempted to win the release of at least 18 Korean Christians, including 15 women, kidnapped in the same region on Thursday.

Qari Yousuf Ahmadi, who claims to be a Taliban spokesman, said fighters had fatally shot the Germans, who were kidnapped on Wednesday along with five Afghan colleagues in the southern province of Wardak while working on a dam project.

"The German and Afghan governments didn't meet our conditions, they didn't pull out their troops," Ahmadi told The Associated Press by telephone from an undisclosed location.

Ahmadi offered no proof of the killings and said the Taliban would give further information about the two bodies later.

The Afghan Foreign Ministry said he was lying.

"The information that we and our security forces have is that one of these two who were kidnapped died of a heart attack," Foreign Ministry spokesman Sultan Ahmad Baheen said. "The second hostage is alive and we hope that he will be released soon and we are trying our best to get him released."

German Foreign Ministry spokesman Martin Jeager said a crisis team was pursuing "every clue" and was in close contact with the Afghan government.

Ahmadi said that 18 kidnapped Koreans would also be killed Saturday if South Korea didn't withdraw its 200 troops in Afghanistan.

Pratibha Patil named as India's first female president

NEW DELHI (AP) — India elected Pratibha Patil as the country's first female president Saturday in a vote seen as a victory for the hundreds of millions of Indian women who contend with widespread discrimination.

Patil received 65.82 percent of the votes cast by national lawmakers and state legislators, said Election Commission head P.D.T. Achary. She had been widely expected to win.

Patil, the 72-year-old candidate of the governing Congress party and its political allies, defeated incumbent Vice President Bhairon Singh Shekhawat, the candidate of the opposition Bharatiya Janata Party.

"I am grateful to the people of India, to all the men and women of India," Patil said in a brief statement to reporters. "This is a victory of the principles of which our Indian people uphold," she said flashing the victory sign to her supporters.

Her candidacy was dogged by unprecedented mudslinging from the moment it was agreed upon by coalition members, marring the usually genteel process of presidential elections.

Hundreds of delighted Congress supporters danced in the streets as the results were announced, banging drums and setting off firecrackers outside her home in New Delhi and in her hometown in the state of Maharashtra.

Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and Sonia Gandhi — the head of the Congress party — were among the first to visit her home to congratulate her. She will be sworn in for a five-year term as India's 13th president on July 25.

The election of a woman to the largely ceremonial post continues an Indian tradition using the presidency to bolster disadvantaged communities.

Brazil's president promises thorough investigation of plane crash

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) — Brazil's president announced measures to make air travel safer in the country and said a new airport will be constructed in Sao Paulo, where a plane crash this week killed 191 people.

President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva also promised on Friday that there will be a thorough investigation into the crash at a congested airport located in the midst of South America's biggest city.

A disconnected thrust reverser emerged as a possible factor in the TAM Airlines jetliner overshooting the runway on Tuesday in Brazil's worst air disaster. But the political heat intensified after an official expressed relief that blame for the deadly crash might shift away from the government.

Silva said in a nationally televised speech that his government would take "all measures within our reach to diminish the risk of new tragedies.'

It was the first time Silva has spoken publicly on the crash, with the exception of a short statement read by

a spokesman hours after the crash.

"I want everyone to know that the government is doing the possible and the impossible to investigate the causes of the accident," Silva said. "One cannot condemn or absolve anyone on the basis of rushed opinions."

Critics accuse officials of failing to address longstanding air travel safety problems including deficient radars, underfunded air traffic control systems and the short, slick runway at Congonhas, Brazil's busiest airport, where the crash occurred.

Election in Turkey could determine questions around divisive Islamic head scarf issue

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — A general election on Sunday in this mostly Muslim nation might help answer a divisive question: whether women should be allowed to wear head scarves in official settings and state institutions.

It was a tempest over a head scarf that helped trigger the elections in the first place. Secularists reacted with outrage when the Islamic-oriented ruling party proposed a presidential candidate whose wife covered her head.

The opposition boycotted the presidential vote in Parliament and secularists held massive rallies in several cities to protest the nomination of Foreign Minister Abdullah Gul.

A key element of the opposition's position was that it would be a disgrace for a headscarf-clad first lady to live in the mansion once occupied by Turkey's founder, Mustafa Kemal Ataturk — who established the modern secular state from the ashes of the Ottoman Empire. The government was eventually forced to withdraw Gul's candidacy and called the July elections.

The ban imposed on Islamic-style headscarf is a long running problem that has increasingly dominated the agenda here, in parallel to the rise of the country's political Islamic movement.

In 1999, Huda Kaya and her two daughters were accused in court of "attempting to forcefully dissolve the Turkish Republic," a charge carrying a possible death sentence at the time.

Their alleged crime? Like thousands of others, they had participated in a rally against a government ban on wearing Islamic headscarves in universities.

Turkish society has changed dramatically in the time since Kaya's trial.

N. Korea says reactors should be a reward

BEIJING (AP) — North Korea's nuclear envoy demanded Saturday that his country be given power-generating reactors as a reward for eventually dismantling its

atomic programs. The demand presents a future hurdle for talks aimed at ridding Pyongyang of its ability to make nuclear bombs.

"In order to ultimately dismantle (the nuclear programs), light-water reactors should be given" to the North, Kim Kye Gwan told reporters before leaving Beijing, referring to a type of nuclear reactor that cannot be easily used to make radioactive materials for weapons.

Six-nation talks on the North's nuclear weapons programs ended Friday without setting any target date to disable Pyongyang's nuclear facilities — before their eventual dismantlement following the shutdown of its sole operating reactor a week ago.

The North had been promised two light-water reactors for power under a 1994 disarmament deal with the U.S. But that agreement fell apart in 2002 when Washington accused Pyongyang of embarking on a secret uranium enrichment program, sparking the latest standoff.

The U.S. and the other countries in the arms talks — China, Japan, Russia and South Korea have agreed to discuss providing the North with light-water reactors at an appropriate time. Washington has insisted discussions on the reactors would only take place after Pyongyang has rejoined the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty that it quit in early 2003.

The North's Kim still praised the outcome of latest arms talks, but said time had not been sufficient to set a new deadline for the next step in Pyongyang's disarmament.

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

Dickens latest to be honored as Hangar 25 Vet of the Month

According to famed American essayist and philosopher Ralph Waldo Emerson, "Each man is a hero and an oracle to somebody; and to that person whatever he says has an enhanced value."

Elmer Dickens was the latest area veteran honored the Hanger 25 Museum's Veteran of the Month Thursday night. He was surrounded by fellow veterans and his family as he was invited to retell his story to be chronicled in the museum's library.

"Well, I'm honored very much to be a veteran and I was honored to serve my county in World War II," said Dickens. "I'm not a hero — the heroes didn't come back."

Hailing originally from Lenora, Okla., Dickens up traveling between Oklahoma and Texas, living with different relatives. It was his senior year in high school when he received what he considered "a congratulation from the United States" — his draft notice.

He was able to finish high school, but was soon inducted into the Army at Fort Sam Houston, near San Antonio, and then continued his training at Camp Berkeley Abilene.

There he received training at the clerical and radio schools as well as medical training, "but they decided they needed me as a rifleman more than they needed me as a medic." Dickens said jokingly.

He left the United States by ship and was stationed in Le Havre, France as a member of the 341st Regiment of the "Blackhawk" Infantry Division. Soon,

it was on to Germany "From there we had to cross the Rhine river at night, they couldn't see us, but they knew we were coming. They didn't have to see us, but whereever they shot the could hit us."

He faced combat while in Germany and was soon placed at the company headquarters. received a 10 percent disability from the ringing in his ears due to the mortars the Germans fired at them. "You know you're safe when you can hear them," he said, commenting on the mortars. "It's when it's quiet that you better hit the dirt."

During his time in Europe his company marched across Germany, Belgium and Austria. "We walked, but I knew I could've probably run the entire way if I had to," He said jokingly.

"I believe we were in Austria on May 5," Dickens said. "We heard rumors that peace was on the way. Sure enough we were right. On the eighth of May we were right. I happened to be on the switchboard around 1 a.m. and we didn't sleep the rest of the night. We knew we were going home."

His division didn't spend much time in the United States. They were soon shipped to the Pacific Theater, where he spent time stationed in the Philippines and soon earned enough points to leave the Army and return to the United States.

During the ceremony he was presented with an American flag that had flown over the capital, donated by U.S. Rep. Randy Neugebauer as well as a wooden plaque emblazoned with his name to be hung in the museum of Hanger 25.

"I feel very humbled ... It's wonderful. I feel it's a great honor." Dickens said as he finished his presentation.

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

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

It's All So Sensible



South West Ňorth East Dble 2 NT Pass Opening lead — king of clubs.

You naturally can't see the defenders' cards when you're declarer, but in the majority of cases you're expected to win as many tricks as if you did see them. Some players call the ability to do this a sixth sense, but it's really nothing more than drawing logical conclu-

sions from the clues at hand. Take this deal where West leads the king of clubs, which you win with dummy's ace. Whether or not

you make the contract resolves itself into one simple issue: If you lose two trump tricks, you make the contract; if you lose three trump tricks, you go down one. Aside from a club, you have no other losers.

It is obvious that East cannot have the A-K of spades, because West would not have an opening bid without at least one of them. It is therefore sensible to assume that West has either one or both of them.

For this reason, it is best to tackle trumps by leading them first from the South hand. Declarer therefore crosses to the ace of diamonds at trick two and leads a low trump.

West produces the eight, and if declarer plays the queen from dummy, he loses three trump tricks and goes down one. **However**, there are good reasons

for ducking West's eight. Declarer knows that if the spades are 2-2, his play does not matter because he cannot lose more than two trump tricks. He therefore assumes a 3-1 division. It is highly unlikely, in view of

West's play of the eight, that he has the A-K of spades. Accordingly, South plays dummy's six on the basis that East has either the singleton or doubleton ace or king, and winds up making the contract.

The murder trial of a Lamesa man accused of the shooting death of a former Big Spring High School track star that was

Harbert indictment.

Michael Harbert, 23, of Lamesa, was indicted on a charge of murder in March for the Dec. 23 shooting death of former Big Spring High School track star Tory Mitchell.

According to Howard County District Attorney Hardy Wilkerson, the trial is now set to begin Aug. 20.

"There was a problem with the indictment," said Wilkerson. "We attempted to amend it, but the defense objected. The law says they are entitled to a waiting period in a situation such as this, and we have to abide by the law."

Wilkerson said the delay doesn't necessarily amount to more time for the prosecution to prepare for the trial, making it a situation where he and his staff will simply have to wait.

"We were ready to go this week, there's no question about that," said Wilkerson. "Now we just have to try to keep the powder dry and be ready to go Aug. 20."

Harbert, who also goes by the name of Michael Gibson, allegedly had a series of altercations with Mitchell that led to the fatal shooting, according to Wilkerson.

"It appears that the defendant Mr. and Mitchell had their differences, and those differences appeared to have escalated, ultimately culminating in the state's allegation that Mr. Harbert shot Mr. Mitchell

in the back with a .357 (pistol)," Magnum Wilkerson said.

Mitchell earned fame as a multiple gold medal winning track athlete at Big Spring High School in the 1990s.

He won back-to-back double gold medals at the state track meet in the 100 meters and 200 meters during that time and eventually signed a football scholarship with the University of Miami in

According to Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer for the Big Spring Police Department, Mitchell was shot multiple times.

"Patrol officers were dispatched to a residence in the 2600 block of Fairchild in reference to a shooting," said Everett. "Officers were advised that one subject had been shot and the suspect had left the scene in a small, red Ford. While en route to the call, a police officer saw a vehicle matching the description. He stopped and detained the

Harbert, along with Felicia Aldridge, 20, of Big Spring, were arrested soon thereafter. Harbert was found to be in possession of a handgun that is believed to be the murder weapon.

Harbert was charged with murder, possession of marijuana and interfering with a police officer's duties.

Aldridge has been charged with three counts of possession of a controlled substance.

Murder is a first degree

felony that normally carries a possible punishment of between five and 99 years or life in prison. Because Herbert has previous felony convictions, however, his possible punishment has been enhanced to between 15 and 99 years in prison and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

and natural gas claims in the Artic. The U.S. Geological Survey estimates the Artic may hold upwards of 25 percent of the world's undiscovered gas and oil.

In the extreme north, territorial claims are very contentious. Canada, Russia, Denmark, and the U.S. are all involved, and with some expectations for the Northwest Passage to be ice free year-round by 2050, moves to protect territorial borders in this area will probably increase.

• Experts from the Institute of Grassland and Environmental Research in Britain are diligently working to change the diet of farm animals as a means to help the nation cut its greenhouse gas emissions. When cows, sheep, and other animals flagellate or burp they release methane gas. Some estimates have suggested one-fourth the world's "man-made" emissions come from farm animals. Changing the grasses animals graze on can theoretically cut the amount of methane they emit.

· Currently Canadian oil sands produce roughly 1.2 million barrels per day, but they are expected to have a capacity of 3.7 mbpd in 2020. As a result, pipeline operators and refineries are proposing new lines, reversing and expanding others, and retrofitting processing units. Through 2015, annual investment in building an infrastructure for the Canadian oil sands is expected to be at least \$15 billion.

· Across the globe a shortage of turbines is crimping the growth of windgenerated energy capacity. Anticipating there would be a shortfall in wind-tur-

bine production; some foreign companies locked in orders and now are using their components to leverage buyouts of domestic firms and outfit otherwise stillborn projects.

· Beef tallow is a very important ingredient used in making soaps and detergents. Over the last year the price of tallow has doubled to about 33 cents per pound. Tallow can also be used to make diesel additive. Because current legislation offers a tax credit to those turning animal fat into fuel, tallow is being diverted to the fuel supply. For soap makers this translates to higher production costs.

• According to Russian Energy Minister Khristenko, the nation plans to export 68 billion cubic meters of natural gas to China within the next 15 years. Current 3 percent of Chinese energy production comes from natural gas. Over the next three years they plan for 5.3 percent of total energy demand to be met with natural gas. Khristenko was in China were he talked with officials about completing two pipelines connecting the nations.

• Lockheed Martin suggests that with a price tag of "several billion dollars" the United States could install a cruise missile defense system capable of protecting the Mid-Atlantic and Northeast coastlines within 14 months.
