### Last Rites For Mrs. Tom Tate Here Thursday

Last rites for Mrs. Tom Tate will be held at the First Baptist Church today, Thursday at 2:30 p.m., with the pastor, Rev. Frank Pollard, officiating. Interment will be in the Castro Memorial Gardens Cemetery under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

Mrs. Tate, 79, died Monday afternoon at 6:20 o'clock at the family home at 410 West Andrews Street, following a prolonged illness. Death was attributed to heart failure. Although in failing health for some time, death was unexpected as Mrs. Tate had been able to be up and about her home.

Born Izora Lovelace, Mrs. Tate spent her early childhood near Galveston and moved with her parents, Rev. and Mrs. Charles Lovelace, to the Plains settling near Hale Center while she was quite young. She was married to Tom Tate, a member of a pioneer Castro County family, on February 7, 1904, and with the exception of a few years spent in Oklahoma in the 1920's, they had made their home in Dimmitt since that time. Mrs. Tate was a loyal and faithful member of the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Tate was the mother of three children, two of whom survive. They are Curtis Tate of Dimmitt and Mrs. R. L. Truax of Perryton. Another son, Jewell Tate, died in 1948. She is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. T. K. Baten of Follett and Mrs. Olive Finney of San Antonio.

## Public Meeting To Promote Recreation Project Set For June 9

A public meeting will be held in the Junior High School auditorium Monday, June 13, at 8 o'clock for an educational program and to promote the sale of memberships in the Castro County Recreation Project, according to an announcement by Dr. James Wolgemuth, chairman of the Steering Committee.

The membership campaign for the recreation facility, which is already underway, is designed to raise \$25,000 through the sale of memberships at \$100 each. According to information furnished the committee that sum, representing 250 members, would qualify the loan of \$262,000 by the Farm Home Administration.

## Light Ballot In 2nd Primary Here Saturday

Polls will open Saturday, at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m., at five voting places in Castro County for balloting in the Democratic runoff primary.

All of the voting places in Commissioners Precinct 4 will be open for the convenience of voters balloting in the commissioners race, the only local race in the county. W. H. (Bill) Simpson and Alfons (Al) Maurer were the two high men, in the first primary, for the office of Commissioner of Precinct 4, and the election will determine which candidates name will appear on the general election ballot in November. The regular voting places in Precinct 4 at Jumbo, Arney, Nazareth and Dimmitt will be open.

The only other voting place in the county will be in the basement Community Room at the courthouse. The only other race to be voted on in the county is for the office of States Attorney General. That race is between Crawford Martin and Franklin Spears.

Civil Engineering Firm, will be at the meeting to explain in detail the proposed recreation facilities to be constructed on a 170 acre tract of land adjacent to the west city limits of Dimmitt. The acreage, under purchase contract from O. K. Howe, will furnish ample space for a nine-hole golf course, a club house and pro-shop, a swimming pool, skeet shooting range, picnic area, and space for Little League and Pony League baseball parks.

Also attending the meeting will be Don Jennings of Plainview, a representative of the Farm Home Administration. Jennings will explain the requirements for qualifying for a loan to finance the park. After the required 250 members have been secured at \$100 per membership, the membership fee will automatically be raised to \$250.

A breakdown on the cost of the main items involved in securing the recreation project is, site \$100,000 at \$588 an acre; clubhouse and pro shop, 3,750 square feet, \$50,625; golf course, \$75,000; 30 X 50 foot, heated and filtered swimming pool, \$13,000; landscaping on club house premises, \$4,000 and picnic area, \$1,700. Diagrams and brochures illustrating proposed facilities will be shown at the meeting.

Moore comes to the Dimmitt Schools highly recommended, from the Seagraves school system where he had spent his entire teaching career, ten years. His duties, while serving on the Seagraves school faculty, consisted of Counselor and assistant principal. Moore's other school responsibilities included: Senior Class Sponsor, Head of Social Studies Department, Advisor of National Honor Society and the Student Council, and Director of Drama.

## Don't Play With Little Skunks

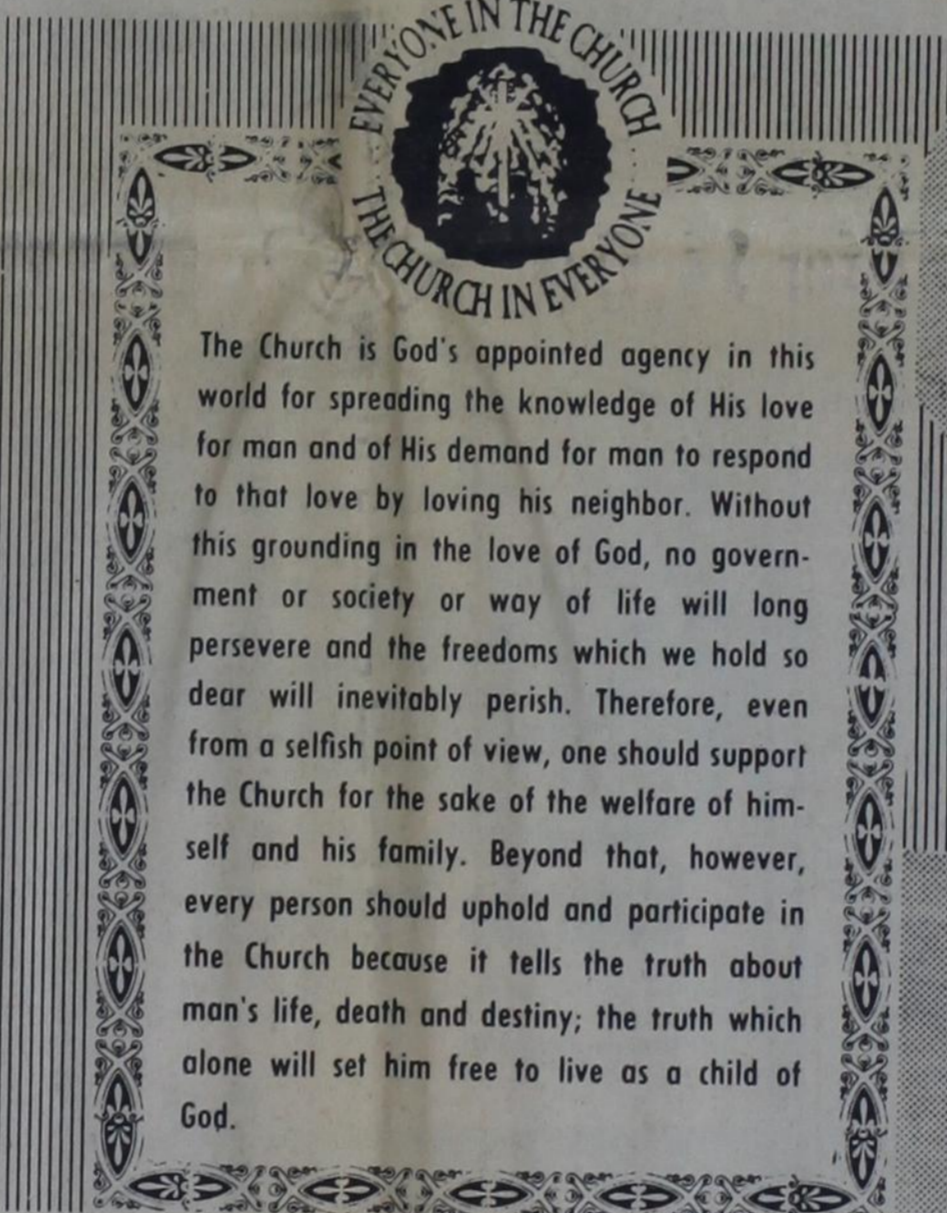

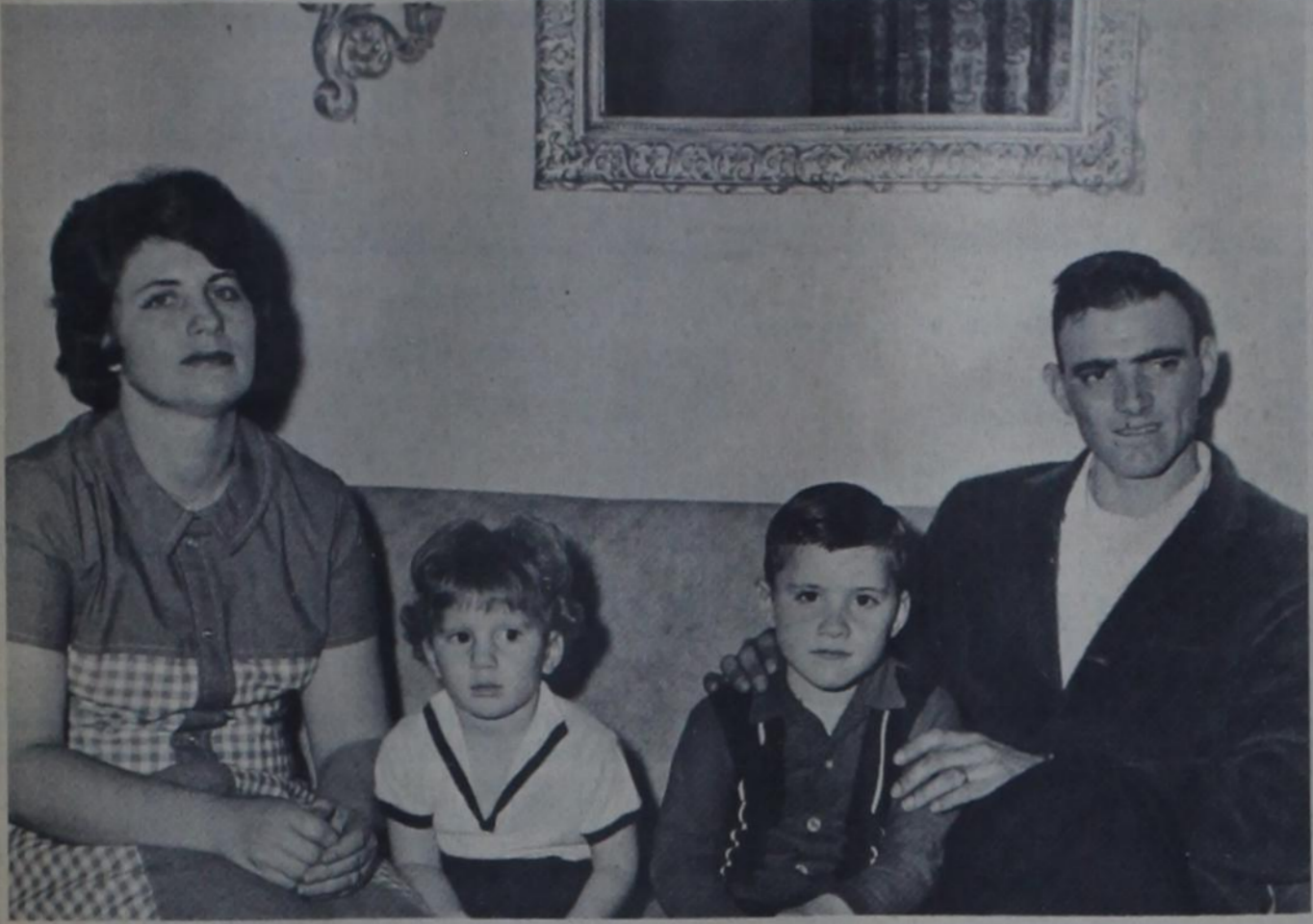

LETTER DESCRIBES

"The Land Of Iran" Is Described By Wife Of Sp. 5 Steve Moore Of Hart

Teheran in which we live is situated near the Alborz Mountains. There is very little rainfall in Iran. There are quite a few dirt storms here. All of the major cities in Iran are located in or near the mountains. The elevation varies from 90 feet below to 19,000 feet above.

Iran is bordered on the east by Pakistan and Afghanistan; on the north by the Caspian Sea and U.S.S.R.; on the west by Turkey and Iraq and by the Persian Gulf and the Gulf of Oman on the south.

Although the Greeks gave the country the name of Persia, the people called themselves Iranians

and refer to their country as Iran.

The climate is a lot like El Paso. Winter temperatures range between 20 and 40 degrees; summer temperatures average from 90 to 120 degrees, but it is a dry heat. The average rainfall is less than five inches annually. Winters vary; most have very little snow. Although in the northern suburb of the city occasionally a heavy snowfall may occur.

Many people here in Teheran are automobile owners. However autos are something that only the wealthy can afford. Automobiles have almost 100 percent customs tax on them. There are but two

classes here, the rich and the poor. There is no middle class.

The language spoken is Persian, however the Iranians refer to it as Farsi.

Labor is quite inexpensive here. However materials are very high as a rule.

As close as Iran is to Russia, there is very little Communism. All over the city of Teheran there are statues of Great Men fighting monsters which represents the Iranians warding off Communism.

Seventy-five percent of the people depend on agriculture, but the cultivated land is little more than 10 percent of the total land area. Persian carpets are a known

trade pursued both by the nomadic tribes and the towns people. World famous Persian carpets are an important item of export. But it is oil production in the South that provides almost 80 percent of its foreign exchange earnings.

They do their shopping every day. They have little stands all along the streets with fruits, vegetables, meats, eggs and so on. They buy their bread every day also and it is cooked on hot stones and looks like a big tortilla. It is very good.

Down in the middle of town is a Bazaar, which is several miles long with stands set up selling fabrics, rugs, imported china, and many other articles. It is a lot similar to Juarez, Mexico.

The principle religion of Persians is Islam. The basic tenets are simple belief in Allah and Mohammad's as his prophet, prayer five times a day, fasting during the month of Ramazan, giving of alms and the pilgrimage to Mecca.

A split occurred in Islam many years ago when a dispute arose over Mohammad's successor, and it later assumed a racial and political character, most Iranians being She'ite Moslems, while neighboring states are chiefly of the Sunnite Moslem faith. The women of the Moslem faith wear Chadoras. They cover them completely except for an eye peering out.

Where we have streets, avenues and boulevards, they have couje (small), Khevan and boulevards. They have Kehevans named after Roosevelt, Eisenhower and Kennedy. Also they have a beautiful boulevard named after Queen Elizabeth.

They have many beautiful traffic circles. They have a statue of a king or a great scholar in them. The statues are usually in a beautiful water fountain.

They have many indoor movies called Cinemas. A lot of the movies they show are American ones translated over to Farsi.

The houses here are made from brick and adobe. Floors are made of concrete and marble. Marble is very inexpensive here. But lumber is hard to come by. Most of the houses do not have cabinets or closets, only a few do, the ones where Americans have lived. The houses are surrounded

They pay little or no attention to the lights, especially red ones, make U turns anywhere and never stop for stop signs.

Every Friday is a holiday as it is their Sabbath or day of worship. All stores are closed from one till 4 afternoons as that's their "siesta" time. They have holidays quite often. We can not play the T.V. or radio on days of mourning. This is days set up for mourning the death of a religious leader etc. Your children are expected to make little or no noise these days also.

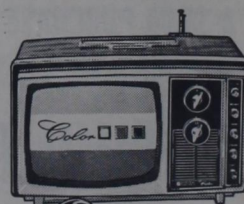

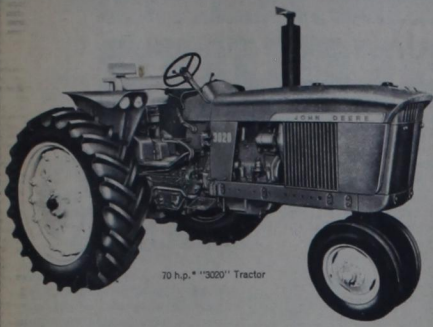

In 1960 with 219 stores, City Products became the new owners of T. G. & Y. Again, the complete operation of the company remained in Oklahoma City, where today all executive offices of T. G. & Y. are located.

T. G. & Y. ranks as the sixth largest variety firm in the United States in the number of stores doing over one hundred million dollars in total volume in 1965. It is now being recognized as a national concern rather than a sectional or regional firm.

Growth has been very rapid during the last few years, averaging about 70 new stores per year. Plans for continuation of this growth are being formulated with the signing of new leases continually in all areas of the 13 states.

**ASC NEWS**  
The grain sorghum marketing year for Commodity Credit Corporation minimum sales pricing purposes has been changed from July 1 through June 30 to October 1 through September 30. The change will be in effect for 1966-67.

This action will put grain sorghum on the same marketing year as corn and will result in a parallel escalation of CCC's minimum sales price for corn and sorghum throughout the entire marketing year. A beginning date of October 1 will more closely coincide with the major harvest in the West Texas - Kansas - Nebraska area.

This change results in a transitional period between the end of the current marketing year on June 30 and the start of the new year on October 1. During this 3 month transitional period and for the first month (October) of the new marketing year CCC's feed grain minimum sales price will be the 1966 crop loan rate plus an initial markup as usual to reflect the receiving cost. Starting November 1 CCC's minimum price for corn and grain sorghum will begin to escalate by the amount of the monthly increment for carrying charges.

The grain sorghum minimum price for 1966-67 will be based upon the 1966 crop loan rate which is 13 cents per cwt. below 1965. However, sales made by CCC will be at the higher of the market price or the feed grain minimum.

### New FCIC Wheat Insurance Plan Is Explained

A 36 percent increase in coverage will be offered on the average to Texas wheat farmers for 1967 under the Federal Crop Insurance wheat insurance program.

Texas State Director Ben A. Jordan, Jr., said today the increased wheat coverages are the result of a program adjustment by FCIC based on normal production increases during the past 10 years.

Farmers are now eligible to apply for the insurance in Baylor, Castro, Collin, Cooke, Denton, Floyd, Foard, Gray, Grayson, Hale, Jones, Knox, Lipscomb and Wilbarger counties.

During the 1965 crop year approximately 1,000 farmers in these counties insured more than 42,000 acres of wheat and received a guaranteed protection in excess of \$700,000, Jordan says.

A new premium discount feature is being introduced this year which will make the low-cost, all-risk government insurance even more attractive to wheat farmers in the 14 counties where the program is available.

Policyholders who do not experience a loss for one year will be granted a five percent premium discount for the second year. Previously, Jordan says, policyholders were not granted premium discounts until they had achieved a three-year good experience rating. The same discount feature also will apply to other crops insured in Texas by FCIC.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

That mammoth Texas Water Plan was laid out Monday by Gov. John Connally and the staff of the Texas Water Development Board at a special meeting with members of the Legislature.

It shows how Texans can save and improve their water supplies to meet the needs of the thirty million Texans expected by the year 2020.

This plan has been called the most comprehensive and far-reaching yet undertaken by a state. It calls for 54 more major reservoirs, for one billion dollars worth of waste treatment facilities in the 21 major metropolitan areas alone to clean up waste water, and a one billion, five hundred million dollar system of pipelines and canals to move surplus water from the Red River Basin in Northeast Texas.

This transfer system can only be described as fabulous. First the surplus water would be moved to the Fort Worth-Dallas region. After use, it would be purified and then go down the Trinity River. At a point below Waco, some of it would be moved to the Brazos River to bolster its flow. Near Eagle Lake, some would be moved to the Colorado River to meet downstream irrigation and industrial needs.

Finally, water would be moved into a canal from the Colorado down the Gulf Coast to the Lower Rio Grande Valley region, to provide irrigation and industrial water for the vast South Texas region.

By supplementing the flows of the Trinity, Brazos, Colorado and Nueces Rivers near their mouths, the plan would make possible the holding of water in the upstream regions of the Brazos and Colorado Basins to serve needs of that West Texas area.

Tightly put together, the plan released Monday is but a summary of the conclusions proposed by the Development Board's staff. Hearings will be held in 27 cities to get other ideas and suggestions or criticisms. Series of hearings will begin on June 17 with the presentation of the West Texas portion of the plan at Lubbock. Then the Board's staff will begin river basin hearings on June 20 at Longview. When the series is completed in August, the Development Board will adopt the final version of the plan. It will become a flexible guide by which the cities, river authorities, water districts, and state and federal agencies will develop the resources of Texas streams.

Before any project actually can be undertaken, its individual feasibility and a method of financing must be shown to the Texas Water Rights Commission, which will approve and grant permits for each project.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court threw its weight behind the decision that once-submerged lands (mud flats) rising from the floor of Laguna Madre in Cameron County are not vacant and unsurveyed public school property subject to sale or lease on application ruling affirming lower courts, upheld position of land Commissioner Jerry Sadler in refusing to accept application to purchase a tract 15 miles northeast of Brownsville.

Third Court of Civil Appeals sustained transfer of two small sections of land from Frenship Rural High School District to Shallowater Independent School District of Lubbock County.

Same Court said the Pennsylvania Insurance Company cannot

get refund of \$101,589 in gross premium taxes paid under protest for a firm acquired in merger.

Third Court of Civil Appeals directed Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst to reconsider his denial of a charter to Northwest Savings Association of Houston.

APPOINTMENTS — Mrs. Raybourne Thompson of Houston, Wendell W. Mayes of Brownwood, and E. Gary Morrison of Austin have been appointed by Governor Connally to Board of Regents of Texas Woman's University. Reagan Houston III of San Antonio has been reappointed.

Mrs. Gladys Drake, assistant professor of education of the deaf at Texas Woman's University, has been appointed by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, to Citizens Advisory Committee to work with the Texas Legislative Council's Study Committee on Services for the Deaf. Findings are to be reported to the 60th Legislature in January, 1967.

TEXAS DEFENSE SPENDING UP — State's share of defense contract spending is increasing.

Defense contract work for first three quarters of present fiscal year is up to one billion, five hundred million dollars or 7.5 per cent of national total. This compares with one billion, one hundred million and 7.3 per cent of U. S. total for same period in fiscal 1965.

Texas bases cleared for construction work by Senate were Fort Bliss, \$4,900,000; Fort Hood, \$1,800,000; Bergstrom Air Force Base, \$4,400,000; Carswell AFB, \$1,200,000; Kelly AFB, \$450,000; Laredo AFB, \$220,000; Laughlin AFB, \$675,000; Randolph AFB, \$236,000; Shepard AFB, \$1,900,000; Perrin AFB, \$61,000; Reese AFB, \$546,000; Webb AFB, \$226,000; and Naval Auxiliary Station, Chase Field, \$93,000.

ATORNEY GENERAL RULES — Fees of \$3 should be taxed against drivers arrested and convicted for misdemeanor traffic offenses, and court costs should be added in peace bond proceedings, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled.

In other opinions, Carr concluded that old iron fence which once surrounded capitol ground, and now in storage, can be used at governor's mansion without conflicting with state law.

University of Houston construction projects are not regulated by Houston, LaMarque or Clear Lake City building ordinances.

Texas Education Foundation Inc., engaged in the operation of the Gary Job Corps Training Center, is not exempt from the payment of taxes imposed on the use of motor fuel.

LAST PREMIUM COLLECTED — Texas 65 Health Insurance Association has collected its last premium.

Association, authorized by 1963 Texas Legislature to offer health insurance coverage to all Texans past 65, will be replaced on July 1 by Medicare.

Participants in the program were notified in January that all coverages would cease on July 1. However, Texas 65 would remain in operation past that date to process claims incurred before Medicare.

UNLINED PITS BANNED — Use of unlined disposal pits for oil field brine was barred by the Texas Railroad Commission in 13 West Texas counties over Ogallala Underground Water Formation.

In three separate orders, Commission said pits were polluting underground water. Agency threatened to sever pipeline connections of oil and gas operators who did not fill pits by deadline in Hemphill, Swisher, Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Gaines, Hale, Hockley, Lynn, Terry Yoakum, Andrews and Martin counties.

SHORT SNORTS — Attorney General Carr assigned Howard M. Fender chief of his enforcement division, to work with Limestone County Attorney Holloway Martin Jr. on Martin's request to join him in investigation of alleged irregularities at Mexia State's School for mentally retarded.

Texas needs a wholesale reduction in the number of independent school districts, according to Dr. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education, and he thinks districts with less than 500 scholastics should be merged with other districts.

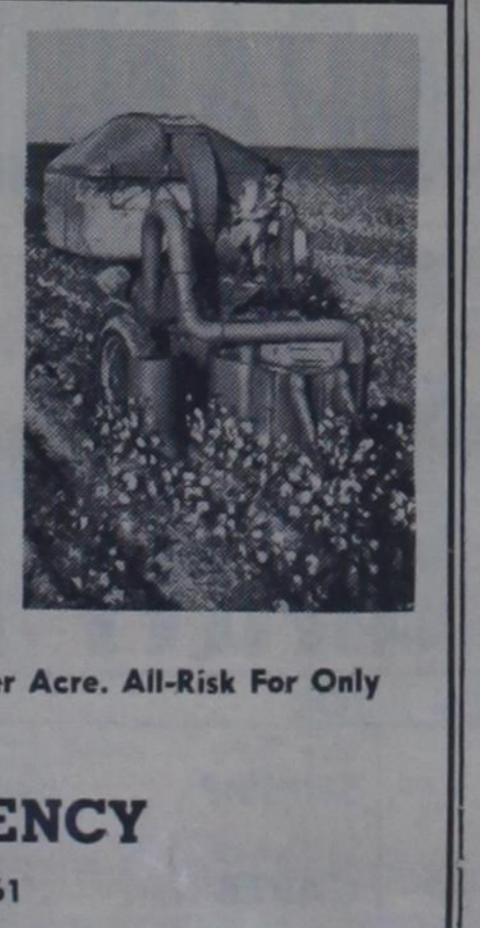

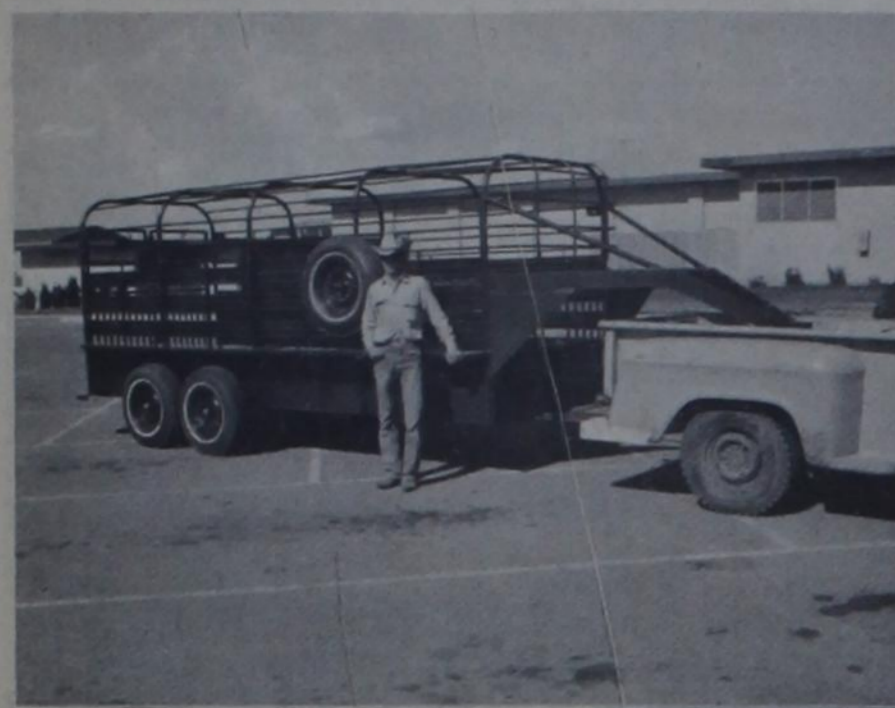

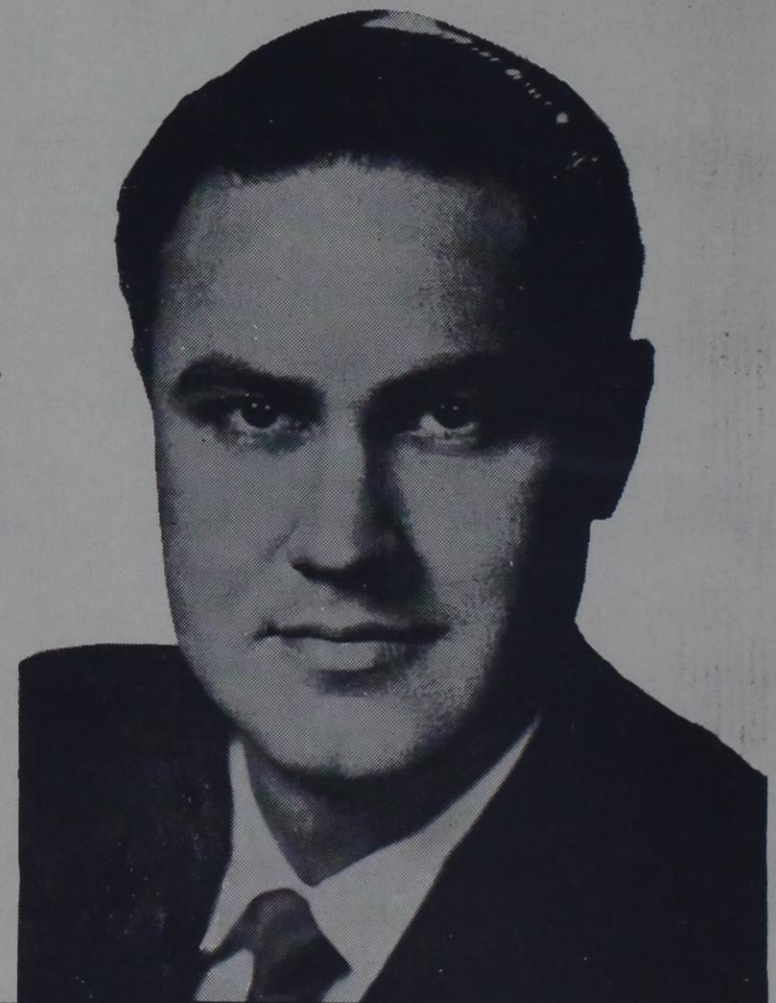

**Postmaster Davis Points Out**

**Discriminatory Laws Affecting Parcel Post Shipments To Military Personnel**

The discriminatory effects of present parcel post laws affecting military personnel, were pointed out today by Ernes Davis on behalf of the National Association of Postmasters.

"Parents in Dimmitt cannot mail larger or bulkier parcels to sons and daughters at hundreds of military installations served by first class post offices in the United States," Mr. Davis, who is postmaster of Dimmitt, Texas, declared. Mr. Davis said this discriminatory treatment — which does not apply to parents in small communities — was pointed out in an analysis of present corrective legislation before Congress by President James O'Toole of the National Association of Postmasters in Washington, D. C.

In speaking as a representative of the Association, Mr. Davis listed some typical discriminatory situations in which the restrictive parcel limitations can apply for mail going to or from military personnel at many points.

1. A civic group collects gifts for the local people in military service — such as records, canned food specialties, some 3 types of clothing for civilian wear etc., but cannot send it as a single parcel because it weighs more than 30 pounds. If sent, it must be broken up into two or more parcels at greater cost and resulting inconvenience.

2. A group of local men away in military service ask to be sent records, a record player, and similar items for their camp club — but it cannot be sent by parcel post.

3. Parents want to send some new luggage for a son or use on furlough, putting some books and personal effects in it. It cannot go by parcel post, because it is too heavy or too bulky.

4. A local women's group organizes a drive for candy, cake and gifts for a dozen local boys away at military installation. It is likely to be too big a package to go by parcel post.

Similar limitations apply on parcels mailed home at first class post offices by military personnel. Mr. Davis said "At the same time, at any nearby smaller second, third or fourth class post office the same parcels can be sent because these post offices have a 70 pound, 100 inch limitation. Mailers on rural routes out of first class post offices also have this right."

"As a result of legislation effective in 1952, enacted to favor Railway Express Agency, parcels going between first class post offices (those in large cities) 150 miles or more apart are restricted to 20 pound and 72 inch dimensions," the National Association's representative said.

If the first class post offices are less than 150 miles apart, the limitations are 40 pounds and 72 inches, he noted.

Hundreds of such first class offices serving Army posts, camps and stations and Air Force bases, fields and installations are listed in the Directory of Post Offices.

Corrective legislation passed the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee, with the number H. R. 14904. A vote for the bill indicates an excellent chance of the passage in Congress, Mr. Davis said.

He said reports disseminated by express agency that the legislation of jobs were not correct.

"President O'Toole of the National Association has advised me," Mr. Davis said, "that the Department has expressed complete willingness to rehire any employees who might lose their jobs under this legislation — although the Association emphasizes there is no basis in the first place for any such fears of job losses as a result of this bill."

In addition to ending discriminatory provisions against mailings between first class post offices — applying to regular military personnel in this country and to mailings of civilians — the bill provides about \$107 million in additional revenue through moderate rate increases to prevent a parcel post deficit.

**No Admission Fees To Be Charged At Lake Meredith, Rogers States**

Congressman Walter Rogers announced today that no entry fees will be charged this summer to recreation areas at Lake Meredith. The lake will be one of the few major Federal recreation areas to which access will be free of charge in 1966.

"After consultation with officials of the Department of the Interior and the National Park Service, I have been assured that fees will not be charged this year," Congressman Rogers said.

"It has been my conviction that fees for admission to Federal recreation areas should not be charged anywhere in the Federal system. I opposed fees when the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 was before the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, and I opposed admission fee charges when the bill was before the House," Congressman Rogers said.

The Congressman added, "I am continuing efforts to amend the Fund Act to exempt Federal recreation areas from admission fee charges because I believe that the people should have the right of free access to what is, in fact, the property of the people."

Congressman Rogers continued, "I am strongly opposed to the idea that a man taking his family for a Sunday drive should have to pay merely to enter an area set aside for all the people under public ownership."

Recreation facilities at Lake Meredith are being developed under appropriations authorized by legislation introduced and pushed to enactment by Congressman Rogers. Approximately \$500,000 is to be spent in the continuing development program during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

"Because the work has not been completed it is only proper that Lake Meredith should be exempt from the provisions of the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act which requires charging admission and facilities' use fees," Congressman Rogers said.

"It is my hope that before another recreation season comes it will have been possible to amend the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act to exempt admission charges," he said.

Meanwhile, Congressman Rogers' schedule for the week calls for him to preside over daily sessions of the subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, of which he is chairman. On Tuesday and Wednesday the subcommittee will consider a proposal to authorize feasibility investigations into water projects in the Western States.

On Thursday and Friday the subcommittee will continue deliberations on the Lower Colorado River Basin Project Authorization Bill.

In the latter sessions Congressman Rogers will continue to push for adoption for a proposal he has introduced to include the Texas Panhandle and the High Plains area in any future planning for disposition of water resources.

The Congressman is also expected to participate in deliberations by the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, of which he is ranking majority member, into proposed legislation affecting community antenna television (CATV) systems and TV and radio broadcasting.

Legislation before the House this week is expected to include legislation to assist in the rehabilitation of narcotics addicts, to establish bail bond standards for Federal prisoners, amendments to the Library Services and Construction Act, and authorizations for military weapons and supply procurement.
