Romo, Davis help Phillips get win in debut

IRVING — Wade Phillips' first game coaching the Dallas Cowboys opened with a pass to Terrell Owens and ended with a victory over the Super Bowl champs.

Sure, it was only preseason, but that didn't stop Phillips from enjoying his team's 23-10 victory over the Indianapolis Colts on Thursday night.

"I thought it was a pretty good first outing," Phillips said. "It's not a regular-season game, but it's nice to come in and play well at home, which you need to establish, and not turn the ball over and not let them run the ball. So I think we did some things well. Hard work can pay off. Winning whatever kind of game is important."

Easier to please than predecessor Bill Parcells, Phillips was smiling long before kickoff as he settled into the home sideline at Texas Stadium. His mood only improved seeing Tony Romo complete 10 of 11 passes while leading two long scoring drives and watching Keith Davis intercept a tipped pass and return it 41 yards for a third-quarter touchdown.

Dallas' lead reached 23-3 before the closing minutes against a unit featuring few guys likely to make the 53-man roster.

Indianapolis certainly won't fret this result. The Colts went 1-3 in the preseason last year and wound up winning the Super Bowl; they were 0-5 in 2005 exhibition games then won their first 13 regular-season games.

"All in all, we have things to build on," Indianapolis coach Tony Dungy said.

Romo christened the work of new offensive coordinator Jason Garrett with a quick 8-yard pass to T.O. He also completed his next three throws and his last six, missing only with an overthrow of Owens. His passes went See **COWBOYS**, Page 2B

for 93 yards and to six different receivers.

"The ball was distributed well," said Owens, wearing a Barry Bonds jersey. "We'll practice hard and get better. This was a great start for us."

However, Romo missed a wideopen Jason Witten on the overthrow of Owens and he threw to Marion Barber instead of wideopen Anthony Fasano on his final pass. The Cowboys had to settle for field goals on both drives, getting a 24-yarder from Martin Gramatica and a 25yarder by Nick Folk.

"We were taking what the defense gave us," Romo said. "But at the same time it was fun to move down the field quickly. We got into a good rhythm.'

Romo, by the way, didn't hold on either kick. His backup, Brad Johnson, handled duties for Gramatica and punter Mat McBriar did so for Folk.

Romo's bobbled snap on the hold of a field goal in Seattle ended the Cowboys' last game, and Parcells' tenure. The last time the Colts played, confetti sprinkled on them in Miami after beating Chicago in the Super Bowl.

Peyton Manning played just one drive this time, going 3-for-5 for 37 yards. Most of it came on a the Colts scored a touchdown in 28-yard strike to Marvin Harrison, made possible by rookie left tackle Tony Ugoh holding off Dallas' best rusher, DeMarcus Ware. Ugoh is trying to take over the spot vacated when Tarik Glenn retired five days before training camp opened.

Ankiel homers to lead Cards past Padres

SAINT LOUIS — Rick Ankiel made a powerful return to the major leagues after a three-year absence, one that nearly drove sentimental St. Louis manager Tony La Russa to tears.

The failed pitcher hit a three-run homer in his first game back in the major leagues, helping Joel Pineiro and the Cardinals to a 5-0 victory over the San Diego Padres on Thursday night at Busch Stadium.

Ankiel, who led the Pacific Coast League with 32 homers for Triple-A Memphis, started in right and launched a 2-1 curveball from Doug Brocail over the right-field wall in the seventh with an effortless swing.

The drive merited a standing ovation and a curtain call for the oncetroubled left-hander, who walked away from a pitching career in frustration more than two years

ago. A misty-eyed La Russa compared Ankiel's return with Adam Wainwright striking out Detroit's Brandon Inge for the final out in the World

"Short of winning the World Series, it's the happiest I've seen our club," La Russa said. "I'm fighting my butt off to keep it together. "Next to striking out

Inge, that's the happiest I've been in this uniform."

The Cardinals took three of four from the NL West-contending Padres, spoiling Chris Young's return in the finale.

Young (9-4) was activated from the 15-day disabled list for a strained left side muscle before the start. In six-plus innings, he allowed four runs and three hits with five strikeouts and five walks, hiking his major league-leading ERA 20 points to 2.02.

"I was a little rusty, but no problem," Young said. "I didn't feel like I pitched

that poorly. It wasn't my best, it wasn't my worst."

Pineiro (1-1), acquired from Boston for a minor league player to be named, made his second start for his new team and retired the side in order three of his seven innings. He struck out four and walked none.

St. Louis didn't have a runner in scoring position until a two-out rally in the fourth capped by Yadier Molina's RBI single. Scott Rolen singled and Chris Duncan walked before Molina's hit.

The Cardinals chased Young with none out in the seventh after two walks and a wild pitch on ball four to pinch hitter So Taguchi that allowed in a run. Ankiel then put the game out of reach with his shot to right.

"Unbelievable," Ankiel said. "You almost can't put that into words."

The homer was the third of Ankiel's career

"I always weigh too much and probably didn't lose any," Daly replied, "because I didn't drink one bit of water. I had Diet Cokes, Diet Pepsis."

Listening to Daly talk reminds you how interviews might have been conducted if the late comedian Chris Farley played professional golf: Lots of fat jokes, a few more about the demons. dramas and insecurities that nip at his heels daily, and then a few more about the defenses he's erected to cope with them. In short, the stories are sometimes sad, but always entertaining.

The problem, as far as Daly is concerned, is that he hasn't played well enough in a while to even be asked into the interview room. He hasn't won a PGA tournament in three years, hasn't finished in the top 10 at a major this century and in the ultimate embarrassment for a guy with two major wins on his resume, he hasn't even been able to hang onto his tour card.

And for those keeping score on the domestic front, he hasn't fared much better.

Besides battling chronic shoulder and rib injuries, Daly showed up at a tour stop in Memphis two months ago with a face full of scratches he said were carved by a steak knife wielded by his fourth wife, Sherrie. Her version was that Daly scratched himself to cover up his alleged sexual assault. The best that can be said about the episode is that the two finally agreed, through their lawyers, not to press criminal charges against each other.

"How do you keep going other than I guess being used to it?" a reporter asked.

"Just keep going," Daly said, his voice low. "Just gotta keep on plugging and keep going.'



samples, two urine samples and a baby urine sample along with samples of drinking water. It takes about an hour to complete, and participants will be reimbursed \$50 for their time and effort. The other study is longer. Participants will be asked to collect milk and urine samples one day a week for 12 weeks in a row. Participants for this study will be reimbursed \$150. Women may participate in both studies if they wish."

Kirk said Iodide plays a very important role during pregnancy and infancy, and iodide deficiencies have been tied to mild to severe learning disabilities and mental retardation.

"Iodine is an essential nutrient needed solely for formation of thyroid hormones. When many people think of thyroid hormones they think of their controlling roles in weight. Thyroid hormones also play an important role in brain development," said Kirk. "Infants who were mildly iodinedeficient or had relatively low levels of thyroid hormone during gestation

"Once infants drink milk containing iodideuptake inhibitors they will be at greater risk of iodide-deficiency simply because they may be less able to use the iodide they receive. Perchlorate is a common contaminant of food and water. It has been detected in ground water in the Texas panhandle. Thiocyanate is produced in the body during the metabolism of certain natural compounds in foods and cigarette smoke."

Kirk said perchlorate has already been discovered in most of the nation's supply of cow's and human milk.

"We discovered perchlorate in cow's and human milk in 2003," said Kirk. "Since then we have completed two studies of perchlorate, and have undertaken three additional projects. One of our completed studies showed that perchlorate was present in human and cow's milk samples sent from all regions of the U.S., including Alaska and Hawaii. The other showed that perchlorate levels in human milk vary over time. Levels are lower in

The tale of Whitey, Billy and Mitt

week ago in Iowa, GOP presidential hopeful and former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney said he wants to strip government officials convicted for corruption of their pensions.

He noted his disappointment with ethically lapsed Republicans, in particular: "I expect more of people in my own party. We speak about high ethical standards, and we should be an example of those high ethical standards.'

It turns out,

Romney was the rare \equiv Massachusetts pol to act correctly in one of the state's worst political scandals.

The story starts with James "Whitey" Bulger, a convicted bank robber who did time in Alcatraz in 1959 and the brother of Billy Bulger, Democratic head of the Massachusetts Senate from 1978 to 1996.

After a long stint in federal prisons, Whitey found the key to success in a life of crime: He became an FBI informant, while reputedly operating as a hit man and crime boss.

Today, Bulger is on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted List — for 18 counts of murder, conspiracy to commit extortion, narcotics distribution and other charges. He has been a fugitive since he skipped town in 1994, after he was tipped off to a long-overdue federal indictment.

Bulger's partner in crime, Steve Flemmi, was not so connected. He did not get away. In 1997, Flemmi began to spill details of how Bulger and he plied their so-called handlers in the FBI with cash and gifts. In return, their bought-andpaid-for federal minions took out their criminal rivals and sabotaged attempts by real law enforcement officers to go after Bulger and Flemmi.

The investigation that followed uncovered the wrongful conviction of four men framed in the 1965 murder of small-time hoodlum Teddy Deegan, so that Flemmi's brother "Jimmy the Bear" Flemmi and an accomplice could escape prosecution. Worse, the feds knew about the hit before it happened. Last month, a federal judge ordered the government to pay \$101.7 million to the four men two died in prison — and their

Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., summed up the scandal during a 2003 House Committee on Government Reform hearing: "It is now beyond dispute that agents in the Boston office of the FBI protected organized crime figures who committed murders and other violent crimes, helped send innocent people to jail, warned suspected criminals of pending indictments, accepted bribes and committed other illegal acts."

Did Billy Bulger use his position to shield his brother? Then president of the University of Massachusetts, Billy Bulger had not wanted to testify before the committee, but Romney forced Bulger's hand when he announced that the UMass president had "a responsibility" to testify.

So under grant of immunity, Bulger testified that he had talked to Whitey while his brother was on the lam. Although a lawyer, Billy had not advised Whitey to turn himself in to authorities.

As Boston Herald columnist Howie Carr wrote in his book "The Brothers Bulger: How They Terrorized and Corrupted Boston for a Quarter Century," this story has few political heroes.

At one of Billy's famed St. Patrick's Day breakfasts, former GOP Gov. William Weld, a former Justice Department official, turned the Kingston Trio classic "Charley on the MTA" into a ditty about Whitey Bulger on the lam. It was Weld who gave Billy the UMass job.

Weld's predecessor, Michael Dukakis, awarded Billy Bulger's top aide with a judgeship. Bulger reportedly advised Bush pere in 2000, and this Bush Justice Department tried to block the release of FBI documents on Whitey.

But Romney was determined to get Bulger off the UMass payroll. Romney put out the word that he would name three Bulger critics — including Howie Carr — to open trustee seats. Bulger's first reaction, Carr wrote, was that Romany "wouldn't dare."

But Romney did dare, and Billy Bulger resigned.

red Thompson, would-be presidential candidate, is 64 years old and looks it. His wife, Jeri, is two years younger than one of his daughters and looks even younger than her 40 years. They have had two babies together since they married in 2002.

Does it matter? Imagine if Hillary Clinton were married to a 36-year-old stud. She'd be laughed out of town. Imagine, at 60, if she decided she wanted two more children. Too old, we'd all be screaming.

So, does anyone care when Fred Thompson does it?



There have been pictures of the buxom and beautiful Jeri Thompson circulating on the web for months. Last month, the story broke into the mainstream media when The New York Times asked whether the country was ready for a president with a "trophy wife" — a term generally used to refer to women who are substantially younger, less wrinkled and sometimes, but not always, more accomplished than the old model, who was there when the guy was nobody and they were supporting him, cleaning the house themselves and giving birth to the children who are now older than the new edition.

Thompson supporters, and even some who aren't, went slightly nuts at the audacity of *The New* York Times for even asking the question. Imagine, the mainstream media descending to discuss what bloggers have been talking about for months. Are there no standards?

Putting aside that little piece of hypocrisy, as well as the one about how all of us would react if the genders were switched, the question remains whether voters will actually care. Will men be jealous, or impressed? Will women say "ick" and be turned off?

The conventional wisdom, which

is that because it has been proven true for so long, is that wives matter even less than running mates in determining votes for the presidency. And, certainly, Judith Giuliani has a long way to go before shedding the image of the "other woman" and adulterous stepmother, but I'm not the least bit certain Rudy would be faring any differently if the mother of his children, and his children for that matter, were by his side.

There's even greater evidence that running mates don't matter, and if the guy who is a heartbeat away from the presidency doesn't influence votes, why would the woman who is on the other side of the bed? I will never forget waiting for the returns from our pollster the night Lloyd Bentsen absolutely trumped Dan Quayle in the vice presidential debate ("I knew John Kennedy. He was a friend of mine. And Senator, you're no John Kennedy."), only to get the word that while Bentsen's own reputation had soared, support for the Dukakis-Bentsen ticket had barely budged. You know when you hear those heartbeat ads that desperate candidates ask — who do you want a heartbeat away from the president — it's because the guy at the top of the ticket is in big trouble.

All of this should support the view that Jeri Thompson's assets are irrelevant to her husband's prospects. But I don't buy it for a moment — at least not among women of a certain age, both married and single, who are liable to play a decisive role in this campaign, particularly if Hillary Clinton is the Democratic candidate.

The reaction I hear from every woman I know, those who have gotten sick to their stomachs over seeing middle-aged men cavorting with girls barely beyond their teen years, is a giant "yuck.'

What does it say about a man who's busy having babies only two years after being diagnosed with lymphoma? What does it say that he'd rather be with someone who wasn't even alive when JFK was shot, or at least was too young to remember where she was? What does it say that he doesn't care that she doesn't remember the songs and the history and the fears we grew up with? Where

does it leave those of us who do? Dateless is where. And maybe voting no.

I can't help it. It makes me like Fred Thompson less. And I can't believe I'm the only

Pioneering bishop in **Anglican Church of** Canada to resign TORONTO(AP) — The

first and only female bishop in the Anglican Church of Canada plans to resign Nov. 30.

Bishop Victoria Matthews of the Diocese of Edmonton, Alberta, made the announcement to parishes in an Aug. 5 letter.

Matthews was twice a nominee for national leader, or primate, of the Canadian church.

She withdrew from the 2004 election after she was diagnosed with breast cancer. She was a candidate once again this year, but lost in a close fourway race.

If she had won, she would have been the first woman to lead the Canadian church and only the second woman to lead a national church in the world Anglican Communion.

"Some will wonder if I have health concerns, and others will ask if I am angry at the Anglican Church. The answer to both questions is no," Matthews wrote.







This Date In History

Today is Friday, Aug. 10, the 222nd day of 2007. There are 143 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Aug. 10, 1846, President James Polk signed a measure establishing the Smithsonian Institution, named after English scientist James Smithson, whose bequest of \$500,000 had made it possible.

On this date:

In 1792, during the French Revolution, mobs in Paris Tuileries attacked the Palace, where King Louis the XVI resided. (The king was later arrested, put on trial for treason, and executed the following January.)

In 1821, Missouri became the 24th state.

In 1874, Herbert Clark Hoover, the 31st president of the United States, was born in West Branch, Iowa.

In 1921. Franklin D. Roosevelt was stricken with polio at his summer home on the Canadian island of Campobello.

In 1944, during World War

II, American forces over-

came remaining Japanese resistance on Guam. In 1949, the National Military Establishment was

renamed the Department of Defense. In 1969, Leno and Rosemary LaBianca were

murdered in their Los Angeles home by members of Charles Manson's cult, one day after actress Sharon Tate and four other people were slain. In 1977, postal employee David Berkowitz was arrest-

ed in Yonkers, N.Y., accused of being "Son of Sam," the gunman responsible for six slayings and seven woundings. (Berkowitz is serving six consecutive 25-years-tolife sentences.) In 1988, President Ronald Reagan signed a measure

providing \$20,000 payments to Japanese-Americans who'd been interned during World War II.

In 1993, Ruth Bader Ginsburg was sworn in as the second female justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.




