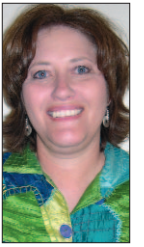
*BSISD to serve up breakfast in the classroom*

**Researchers seek breast-feeding moms in Howard County area for iodine study**

Researchers with the University of Texas at Arlington are looking for local mothers who are breast feeding their children to help complete a pair of studies on iodide nutrition and chemicals in the environment that can interfere with thyroid hormones.

According to Andrea B. Kirk, Ph.D., from UT at

Arlington's Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, women have the option of participating in a pair of studies that could impact

women's health in the future.

"We are looking for 15 to 20 breast-feeding women from Howard, Martin, Andrews,

Dawson, Gaines and Terry counties for two projects," said Kirk. "We are also recruiting from the Portales and Clovis areas of eastern New Mexico. Participants must be healthy, lactating women who feed their infants only breast milk.

"One study asks that women collect two milk

# Daly finds good luck for a change

Fat is in. Practice is out.

What else should we conclude after the first round of the PGA

Championship at Southern Hills?

John Daly set foot on the course Thursday for the first time in 13

years, then plowed through 18 holes in 100-plus degree heat and humidity

while smoking and draining diet sodas en route

to a 67 that left him two shots off the lead.

Tiger Woods, meanwhile, is as fit as a Green Beret. He's played two tournaments at Southern Hills since he and Daly played in the 1994 PGA, then a practice round here just 10 days ago. He turned up at the course again at 6 a.m. Monday — after lapping the field to win the Bridgestone Invitational barely 12 hours earlier — and played another 18-hole practice round Tuesday.

After all that, Woods shot a 1-over 71 in the opening round. Much of what remained of the

afternoon was devoted to grilling Daly about how those two things happened.

"If you didn't play a practice round here at Southern Hills," a local TV reporter asked Daly in a scolding tone, "how did you prepare for this tournament?"

"I've been playing the slots over at Cherokee Casino," Daly chuckled. "Did good the first day; didn't do too good the other day."

The next reporter, referring to the conditions, wanted to know whether Daly could "survive four days of this stuff?"

"I grew up around this area. I'm used to kind of little valleys where you don't get a lot of — you don't get any air and there's a lot of humidity and it's tough to breathe," Daly replied. "I light up a cigarette and drink some caffeine, and it actually works."

A third reporter wanted to know how much weight Daly lost during his round and how much he weighed to begin with. (Clue: The media guide lists him at 5-foot-11 and 283 pounds).

# Romo, Davis help Phillips get win in debut

IRVING — Wade Phillips' first game coaching the Dallas Cowboys opened with a pass to Terrell Owens and ended with a victory over the Super Bowl champs.

Sure, it was only preseason, but that didn't stop Phillips from enjoying his team's 23-10 victory over the Indianapolis Colts on Thursday night.

"I thought it was a pretty good first outing," Phillips said. "It's not a regular-season game, but it's nice to come in and play well at home, which you need to establish, and not turn the ball over and not let them run the ball. So I think we did some things well. Hard work can pay off. Winning whatever kind of game is important."

Easier to please than predecessor Bill Parcells, Phillips was smiling long before kickoff as he settled into the home sideline at Texas Stadium. His mood only improved seeing Tony Romo complete 10 of 11 passes while leading two long scoring drives and watching Keith Davis intercept a tipped pass and return it 41 yards for a third-quarter touchdown.

Dallas' lead reached 23-3 before the Colts scored a touchdown in the closing minutes against a unit featuring few guys likely to make the 53-man roster.

Indianapolis certainly won't fret this result. The Colts went 1-3 in the preseason last year and wound up winning the Super Bowl; they were 0-5 in 2005 exhibition games then won their first 13 regular-season games.

"All in all, we have things to build on," Indianapolis coach Tony Dungy said.

Romo christened the work of new offensive coordinator Jason Garrett with a quick 8-yard pass to T.O. He also completed his next three throws and his last six, missing only with an overthrow of Owens. His passes went

for 93 yards and to six different receivers.

"The ball was distributed well," said Owens, wearing a Barry Bonds jersey. "We'll practice hard and get better. This was a great start for us."

However, Romo missed a wide-open Jason Witten on the overthrow of Owens and he threw to Marion Barber instead of wide-open Anthony Fasano on his final pass. The Cowboys had to settle for field goals on both drives, getting a 24-yarder from Martin Gramatica and a 25-yarder by Nick Folk.

"We were taking what the defense gave us," Romo said. "But at the same time it was fun to move down the field quickly. We got into a good rhythm."

Romo, by the way, didn't hold on either kick. His backup, Brad Johnson, handled duties for Gramatica and punter Mat McBriar did so for Folk.

Romo's bobbled snap on the hold of a field goal in Seattle ended the Cowboys' last game, and Parcells' tenure. The last time the Colts played, confetti sprinkled on them in Miami after beating Chicago in the Super Bowl.

Peyton Manning played just one drive this time, going 3-for-5 for 37 yards. Most of it came on a 28-yard strike to Marvin Harrison, made possible by rookie left tackle Tony Ugoh holding off Dallas' best rusher, DeMarcus Ware. Ugoh is trying to take over the spot vacated when Tarik Glenn retired five days before training camp opened.

"I thought we pass-protected well against the first group," Dungy said.

Manning went into his trademark pre-snap gyrations on the fifth play, a handoff, then threw a weird-looking ball for an incompletion the next down. Facing third-and-9 from the 22, he threw deep into the end zone near three Cowboys and no Colts.

# Ankiel homers to lead Cards past Padres

SAINT LOUIS — Rick Ankiel made a powerful return to the major leagues after a three-year absence, one that nearly drove sentimental St. Louis manager Tony La Russa to tears.

The failed pitcher hit a three-run homer in his first game back in the major leagues, helping Joel Pineiro and the Cardinals to a 5-0 victory over the San Diego Padres on Thursday night at Busch Stadium.

Ankiel, who led the Pacific Coast League with 32 homers for Triple-A Memphis, started in right and launched a 2-1 curveball from Doug Brocail over the right-field wall in the seventh with an effortless swing.

The drive merited a standing ovation and a curtain call for the once-troubled left-hander, who walked away from a pitching career in frustration more than two years

ago. A misty-eyed La Russa compared Ankiel's return with Adam Wainwright striking out Detroit's Brandon Inge for the final out in the World Series.

"Short of winning the World Series, it's the happiest I've seen our club," La Russa said. "I'm fighting my butt off to keep it together."

"Next to striking out Inge, that's the happiest I've been in this uniform."

The Cardinals took three of four from the NL West-contending Padres, spoiling Chris Young's return in the finale.

Young (9-4) was activated from the 15-day disabled list for a strained left side muscle before the start. In six-plus innings, he allowed four runs and three hits with five strikeouts and five walks, hiking his major league-leading ERA 20 points to 2.02.

"I was a little rusty, but no problem," Young said. "I didn't feel like I pitched

that poorly. It wasn't my best, it wasn't my worst."

Pineiro (1-1), acquired from Boston for a minor league player to be named, made his second start for his new team and retired the side in order three of his seven innings. He struck out four and walked none.

St. Louis didn't have a runner in scoring position until a two-out rally in the fourth capped by Yadier Molina's RBI single. Scott Rolen singled and Chris Duncan walked before Molina's hit.

The Cardinals chased Young with none out in the seventh after two walks and a wild pitch on ball four to pinch hitter So Taguchi that allowed in a run. Ankiel then put the game out of reach with his shot to right.

"Unbelievable," Ankiel said. "You almost can't put that into words."

The homer was the third of Ankiel's career

"I always weigh too much and probably didn't lose any," Daly replied, "because I didn't drink one bit of water. I had Diet Cokes, Diet Pepsis."

Listening to Daly talk reminds you how interviews might have been conducted if the late comedian Chris Farley played professional golf: Lots of fat jokes, a few more about the demons, dramas and insecurities that nip at his heels daily, and then a few more about the defenses he's erected to cope with them. In short, the stories are sometimes sad, but always entertaining.

The problem, as far as Daly is concerned, is that he hasn't played well enough in a while to even be asked into the interview room. He hasn't won a PGA tournament in three years, hasn't finished in the top 10 at a major this century and in the ultimate embarrassment for a guy with two major wins on his resume, he hasn't even been able to hang onto his tour card.

And for those keeping score on the domestic front, he hasn't fared much better.

Besides battling chronic shoulder and rib injuries, Daly showed up at a tour stop in Memphis two months ago with a face full of scratches he said were carved by a steak knife wielded by his fourth wife, Sherrie. Her version was that Daly scratched himself to cover up his alleged sexual assault. The best that can be said about the episode is that the two finally agreed, through their lawyers, not to press criminal charges against each other.

"How do you keep going other than I guess being used to it?" a reporter asked.

"Just keep going," Daly said, his voice low. "Just gotta keep on plugging and keep going."

The one constant in Daly's life has the outpouring of love from galleries on both sides of the Atlantic. Wherever the man tees it up, the crowds howl unqualified support. They see the booming drives, read the stories in the newspapers (and his autobiography) about staggering losses at the gambling tables and fierce battles with his ex-wives. They imagine he's having more fun — and much more trouble — than they are. Each and every day.

At the 18th, Daly cranked a 330-yard plus drive and arrived to find his ball barely 10 yards

past the creek that snakes across the fairway. Every crease in his shirt and slacks, and there were plenty, was sweat-soaked. Calls of "J.D., J.D.!!!" rang out. Daly lifted his right arm slightly, slowly, and waved to acknowledge the cheers. He seemed worn out by even that small gesture.

But then Daly knocked his approach on the green, two-putted for par and headed for the interview room. Near the end of a long, often-comical session, Daly was asked whether he let himself dream what another win at a major would mean.

"No," he said, his voice barely audible. "I'm not thinking about it."

Yet as Daly walked out of the interview room, someone asked whether he was planning to go back to the casinos and play the slots.

"Maybe your luck has changed," the reporter said.

Daly brightened. "It needs to."

Below are nine different bidding sequences. Where the question mark appears in each sequence, state whether partner's last bid is forcing (compelling you to bid again) or non-forcing (permitting you to pass).

1. North 1♥ South 1NT North 3♥ South ?	2. North 1♠ South 1♦ North 2♣ South ?	3. North 1♠ South 2NT North ? South 1♥ North 1NT South 3♥	4. North 1♦ South 1♥ North 1NT South 3♥	5. 1. **Non-forcing.** A jump-rebid by opener in his own suit is merely invitational; responder may pass with minimum values for his previous bid.  
2. **Forcing.** When responder names a new suit, opener must bid again.  
3. **Forcing.** A jump-bid by responder is forcing.  
4. **Forcing.** A jump-bid by responder is forcing, even though the jump is not immediate (some partnerships may agree to treat the jump-rebid of responder's suit as invitational).  
5. **Forcing.** A jump-shift (a jump in a new suit) by opener is forcing; it shows 19 or more points.  
6. **Non-forcing.** This is simply an invitational raise in notrump and has nothing to do with Blackwood. The four-notrump bid asks opener to bid six notrump with a maximum and to pass with a minimum.  
7. **Forcing.** Hearts have been agreed upon as the trump suit; North is attempting to get to game (or slam) in hearts.  
8. **Non-forcing.** A new suit response to an overall call is a corrective action implying lack of interest in partner's suit.  
9. **Non-forcing.** South's jump after the opponent's takeout double is pre-emptive.

samples, two urine samples and a baby urine sample along with samples of drinking water. It takes about an hour to complete, and participants will be reimbursed \$50 for their time and effort. The other study is longer. Participants will be asked to collect milk and urine samples one day a week for 12 weeks in a row. Participants for this study will be reimbursed \$150. Women may participate in both studies if they wish."

Kirk said iodide plays a very important role during pregnancy and infancy, and iodide deficiencies have been tied to mild to severe learning disabilities and mental retardation.

"Iodine is an essential nutrient needed solely for formation of thyroid hormones. When many people think of thyroid hormones they think of their roles in controlling weight. Thyroid hormones also play an important role in brain development," said Kirk. "Infants who were mildly iodine-deficient or had relatively low levels of thyroid hormone during gestation

are more likely to have learning disabilities and attention-deficit hyperactivity-like traits. Infants may be born with profound mental retardation if iodine deficiency was severe.

"Brain development continues, of course, long after birth. It is important that infants continue to receive iodine through breast milk or formula. Our research on iodide levels in human milk indicates American women may not be getting enough iodide to meet their infants' needs. Most U.S. milk samples we have analyzed do not contain enough iodide to meet Institute of Medicine-recommended intake levels for infants."

Kirk said a pair of chemicals — perchlorate and thiocyanate — can also inhibit the body's ability to utilize iodide, another aspect of the study her and her fellow researchers are performing.

"There are many chemicals in the environment that can interfere with thyroid hormones," said Kirk. "These chemicals may pose greater hazard to infants if they are already iodine-deficient. We are studying two chemicals, perchlorate and thiocyanate, that are

known to interfere with iodide-uptake. We are concerned that these chemicals will reduce the iodide-content of milk.

"Once infants drink milk containing iodide-uptake inhibitors they will be at greater risk of iodide-deficiency simply because they may be less able to use the iodide they receive. Perchlorate is a common contaminant of food and water. It has been detected in ground water in the Texas panhandle. Thiocyanate is produced in the body during the metabolism of certain natural compounds in foods and cigarette smoke."

Kirk said perchlorate has already been discovered in most of the nation's supply of cow's and human milk.

"We discovered perchlorate in cow's and human milk in 2003," said Kirk. "Since then we have completed two studies of perchlorate, and have undertaken three additional projects. One of our completed studies showed that perchlorate was present in human and cow's milk samples sent from all regions of the U.S., including Alaska and Hawaii. The other showed that perchlorate levels in human milk vary over time. Levels are lower in

the morning, and rise towards the end of the day. This is probably because perchlorate, while rapidly excreted, is consumed in food and water throughout the day.

"Our current perchlorate projects investigate how perchlorate, thiocyanate and iodide levels change together in milk. We have found that thiocyanate is also common in human milk. We will use data from these studies to evaluate infant perchlorate, iodide and thiocyanate intake."

As studies on perchlorate move forward, Kirk said information on Thiocyanate and how it affects infants is still unclear.

"Thiocyanate in milk has not been studied in detail," said Kirk. "We do not know how much is safe for babies to drink. There are no current recommendations for intake limits. Thiocyanate is high in serum of lactating women who smoke. It may also be high in their breast milk."

lower grades.

Junior high school students will be served breakfast at the start of second period, while high schoolers will be fed at the end of first period.

"We're doing it after first period because we have a lot of students involved with athletics during first period," Knox said. "All students will be served within a 10-minute time frame, so we won't take up any classroom time."

Studies show that students perform better in the classroom if they've eaten breakfast. The problem, however, is that many won't or don't take the time to partake of the morning meal — only 10 percent of high schoolers eat breakfast, compared to 22 percent of junior high school students,

Knox said.

That's where Smart Start comes in, she added. "Our No. 1 goal is to improve the learning environment, and we think this does that,"

Knox said.

"We've seen it helps increase attendance, there are less visits to the school nurse and they pay more attention in class," she added.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Aug. 10, the 222nd day of 2007. There are 143 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Aug. 10, 1846, President James Polk signed a measure establishing the Smithsonian Institution, named after English scientist James Smithson, whose bequest of \$500,000 had made it possible. In 1792, during the French Revolution, mobs in Paris attacked the Tuileries Palace, where King Louis the XVI resided. (The king was later arrested, put on trial for treason, and executed the following January.) In 1821, Missouri became the 24th state. In 1874, Herbert Clark Hoover, the 31st president of the United States, was born in West Branch, Iowa. In 1921, Franklin D. Roosevelt was stricken with

polio at his summer home on the Canadian island of Campobello. In 1944, during World War II, American forces overcame remaining Japanese resistance on Guam. In 1949, the National Military Establishment was renamed the Department of Defense. In 1969, Leno and Rosemary LaBianca were murdered in their Los Angeles home by members of Charles Manson's cult, one day after actress Sharon Tate and four other people were slain. In 1977, postal employee David Berkowitz was arrested in Yonkers, N.Y., accused of being "Son of Sam," the gunman responsible for six slayings and seven woundings. (Berkowitz is serving six consecutive 25-years-to-life sentences.) In 1988, President Ronald Reagan signed a measure providing \$20,000 payments to Japanese-Americans who'd been interned during World War II. In 1993, Ruth Bader Ginsburg was sworn in as the second female justice on

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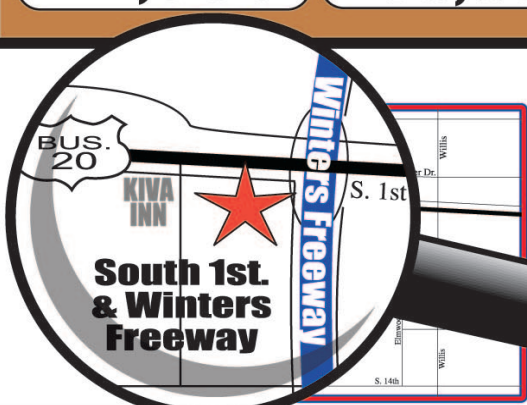
