Commissioners face tough tax rate decision

The 2007 county tax rate is expected to take center stage during Monday's meeting of the Howard County Commissioner's Court. as officials struggle with an estimated \$250,000 budget shortfall for the coming fiscal year.

The effective tax rate for 2007 — meaning the rate that would collect the same amount collected the previous tax year — is .393005 cents per \$100 valuation, according to County Auditor Jackie Olson.

The rollback rate, which is the effective rate with an additional 8

Associated Press Writer HOUSTON – Houston Astros pitcher Brad Lidge didn't mind this baseball getting blasted into orbit, and he still has the sense of humor to laugh with those who joke that it's the second-longest shot of his career.

Two years after giving up the most infamous home run in Astros history, Lidge signed a ball for astronaut Tracy Caldwell, who took it into space on the shuttle Endeavour. Now it's orbiting more than 200

miles above Earth. "To Tracy," the dedica-tion read, "hopefully no one ever hits one this far off of me."

The story was first reported by Houston television station KRIV.

Lidge is still living down the pitch he fed St. Louis Cardinals slugger Albert Pujols in 2005, when the Astros were a strike away from their first World Series. Pujols slammed Lidge's slider, forcing Astros fans to wait one more game to celebrate. The World Series didn't erase the vivid image of Pujols' homer hitting halfway up the stadium wall towering over left field at Minute Maid Park.



Cowboys will increase plays for tight ends

IRVING Jay Novacek's visit to training camp seems to be paying off for his successors on the Dallas Cowboys.

The former All-Pro tight end watched some practices in San Antonio and shared his opinions with Jason Garrett, his former teammate who is now Dallas' offensive coordinator. He later joked that his advice to Garrett was, "Throw the ball to the tight end. Golly, it's so simple."

Well, guess what: In Garrett's first game calling plays, the Cowboys did exactly that - and, they might've done even better with two more looks to the tight ends.

In a 23-10 victory over the Indianapolis Colts on Thursday night, tight ends accounted for a big chunk of the passing offense. Jason Witten, Anthony Fasano, Tony Curtis and Adam Bergen combined for eight of Dallas' 20 receptions, and 103 of the team's 200 passing yards.

The stat sheet from any preseason game, especial-

ly the opener, is easy to dismiss. Still, it's safe to assume the blockerreceiver types will get their chances in this offense.

"I think it was just a matter of what the defense was giving us," Fasano said. "The tight end had more opportunities. It was nice. It's only one game, but it was nice to get off to a good start."

The first-string offense played only two series and marched inside the Colts' 10-yard line both times. They had to settle for field goals but might have had touchdowns if quarterback Tony Romo had thrown a couple more balls to his tight ends.

Witten was wide open near the goal line during the first drive on a pass that was overthrown to Terrell Owens. Fasano was uncovered in scoring position on the final snap of the second drive, a pass over the middle to Marion Barber.

"We have to improve in so many different areas technically, mentally and physically," Garrett said. "But it's the first presea-

Jesse Franklin Blair departed this life on Aug. 9, 2007 at his home surrounded by family and friends.

He was born in the Oklahoma Territory on Oct. 6, 1907 to Scott and Mattie Blair. He was the third of five boys. His family farmed in Western Oklahoma, New Mexico and finally settled in the Loop Community of Gaines County, Texas in 1923.

Jess was preceded in death by all of his brothers, Fred, Mike, Wendell in infancy and Emil.

After graduating from Loop High School, he worked his way through college at Sul Ross University and West Texas State University where he graduated with a degree in agriculture science and education. He became a teacher and taught science at several schools in West Texas.

In 1932 he met Madeen Liles at a church social in Loop and they married on June 20, 1932. They were married for 69 years until her death on Aug. 14, 2001.

They had three children, Barbara Blair of Albuquerque, New Mexico, Stephen Blair and wife, Judy of Austin and Rebecca Blair Hallmark and husband, Mike of Orange Walk, Belize. They had five grandchildren, Scott Blair of Austin, Tyson Blair of Big Spring, Derek Koontz of Dallas, Rose Cantu of Dallas and Odis Hallmark of Orange Walk, Belize.

During the Second World War Blair took a job with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service. He was transferred to the Big Spring office in 1947.

About this time he also began a life-long passion as a professional writer. Over 35 years he wrote for numerous magazines and journals. He wrote an agriculture column for the *Big Spring Herald* from 1955 to 1960 called "Jess Talkin." He won a number of awards given by writers associations.

In addition to his teaching and writing careers he coached basketball for several years. He was principal at the Elbow School for two years and his teams consistently won the local tournaments. He also coached at Washington Elementary School and won the City Championship. He taught 18 years in the Big Spring School system, retiring in 1972. Jess had been a member of the Woodmen of the World for more than 50 years.

In the last years of his life when he struggled with the effects of old age and a stroke, he was cared for by many good and generous people in Big Spring.

His good running buddies, Marvin Watson and Buddy Anderson, were always there to entertain him and include him on their trips and activities. They had a thousand meetings at Herman's Retaurant to plan their next adventure.

LuBell and Elmer Dickens took Jess to dinner every Tuesday night for years. This was the highlight of his week. They researched his old writings at the Herald

and had all of them reproduced and bound in volumes to his great delight.

The ministers at the Gospel Tabernacle showed great care and concern for Jess for the 15 years he and his wife were members of that congregation.

In the last four years he required home care. Geri Hodnett began this care and continued as supervisor as the requirement for round-the-clock care became necessary. There is no other way to say it except Geri adopted Jess as her second father and the feeling of love and respect was mutual. She took him to school events with her children and to her family reunions. She saw to it that his comfort, his health and his entertainment were her highest priorities. She also assembled a group of caregivers that have shown such compassion and love that the family is humbled to know how to thank them. Many of their children came to be a part of his life. Their pictures and drawings are on the walls and were greatly valued.

His favorite recipes were prepared daily, especially the desserts. They took him to feed the ducks at Comanche Trail Lake and took numerous short trips just to satisfy his need to always be moving. His wit and clever observations kept everyone entertained.

Even after he was confined to a wheelchair these caregivers loaded him up each day and took him wherever he wanted to go eat. Over the last two years of his life they developed real bonds of affection with Jess.

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

AP Sports Writer HOUSTON — Rex Grossman needs to prove he can be consistent. Matt Schaub that he's ready to be a starter.

The quarterbacks, at vastly different stages in their careers, will take the spotlight Saturday night when the defending NFC champion Chicago Bears open the preseason against the Houston Texans.

Grossman was up and down and all over the place last season. He had a quarterback rating of more than 100 in seven games, but also posted a 1.3 rating once and a 0.0 in the final regular-season game.

He led the Bears to their first Super Bowl since 1986, but his two fourthquarter interceptions helped ensure the Colts' 29-17 win.

He'll have more options at receiver in his second full season at starter with return specialist Devin Hester moving to offense and a healthy Mark Bradley joining Muhsin Muhammad and Bernard Berrian at receiver.

Grossman has pretty straightforward expectations for the offense on Saturday.

"We just want to be sharp," Grossman said. "We want to execute well, make good decisions." Coach Lovie Smith does-

n't expect any drop-off after last year's success and knows that simply getting to the Super Bowl wasn't enough for his team.

"I just know we have the same hungry team," he said.

Schaub, the highly regarded backup who played behind Michael Vick for three seasons in Atlanta, takes over in Houston after the Texans dropped former No. 1 pick David Carr following five losing seasons.

Players and coaches alike heaped praise upon Schaub throughout training camp. Now it's time for him to perform and his first test comes against one of the NFL's toughest defenses.

"You kind of try to hold the excitement a little bit," coach Gary Kubiak said. "We've got a long way to go before we open up, but I'm excited about the progress he's made as a football player and as a leader on this team."

Schaub said he's comfortable with the team and the offense and is looking forward to his Texans' debut.

"I'm getting a good feel for them and they are getting a good feel for me and we are starting to get things rolling and clicking on offense and getting our sense of timing down real well," he said.

After working with Schaub since he was traded to Houston in March, Andre Johnson can hardly wait to take the field with his new quarterback, even if it's only for a quarter.


While Grossman must be consistent, running back Cedric Benson has to stay healthy for the Bears to be successful. The third-year player, chosen fourth in the 2005 draft, is Chicago's featured back after the team sent Thomas Jones to the New York Jets this offseason.

This will be the first career preseason game for Benson, who starred in high school at Midland, Texas and then at the University of Texas. His missed the preseason as a rookie because of contract negotiations and sat out last preseason with a shoulder sprain.

"I just want to be healthy the whole season," Benson said.

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



new rate. Owners of medium-priced homes in Howard County will pay approximately \$20 more this coming year, while owners of property valued at \$100.000 will see an increase of \$48 in their tax bills, College Vice President Terry Hansen said.

The major reasons for the tax hike are the \$21.6 million bond issue approved by voters in May, which will add 8 cents to the overall tax rate, and about \$300,000 in increased utility costs.

Higher-than-anticipated property valuations helped keep the tax hike from being even larger, but trustees have had to make some concessions to keep the budget balanced.

For starters, most college employees will receive a flat raise of \$500 this year, below original plans. Also, personnel positions in three departments, currently vacant, will not be filled for at least the near future.

School supplies drive still needs our donations

hile it has only been a week since we noted in this space that the Salvation Army desperately needs donations to help to make sure its annual back-toschool supply drive succeeds, we'd be remiss in not taking the opportunity to press the message home one more time.

That's because Salvation Army personnel will begin taking applications from parents or guardians in need of school supplies beginning at 9 a.m. Monday, and Capts. Russ and Linda Keeney say donations for the project have thus far come up woefully short.

Once again, all of us know that one of the most important things we can give children is an education. A part of doing that means we need to make sure children have everything they require when school bells begin to ring,

Each year, however, many families in Big Spring find they simply cannot afford what many of us take for granted — providing their children with just the necessities such as paper, pencils, notebooks, crayons, scissors, rulers and the like.

That's where the Salvation Army steps in.

Last year, the organization handed out school supplies to several hundred Big Spring children from kindergarten through the eighth grade and this year the Keeneys expect to provide supplies for that many or more.

Without the Salvation Army's help in providing those supplies, a lot of children will be at an immediate disadvantage when classes start.

"I'd be telling you a lie if it said that I'm not worried at this point," Russ Keeney said. "It's disturbing that we haven't had the same kind of response from the public that we're used to. And with everything costing more these days, that just doubles our concern. It's going to take more money to buy supplies than it has in previous years and it looks like there will probably be more people needing our help." While donors can purchase school supplies and bring them to the Salvation Army offices for distribution, it should be noted that monetary donations are preferred. The Salvation Army is a tax-exempt organization and therefore can purchase more supplies with the same money than individuals.

whe natives are restless and getting more so with each passing day it seems. In fact, things are getting downright ugly in some quarters — particularly in the wake of the Howard County Commissioners Court's recent budget cutting efforts.

Of course, that's primarily because those budget cuts are taking the form of doing away with people's jobs. That's never going to be popular especially with the people who are losing their jobs, their

friends and families. In the past week

I've received several

letters — some of which will not be printed in the Herald because the people writing them asked at some point that they not be printed - that clearly take aim at themembers of the court. None of the writers of those letters are county employees, I might add.

However, all made similar suggestions, that the county judge and four commissioners — or just the commissioners — forfeit all or part of their salaries in an effort to keep from laying off other county employees.

"How can we solve the current funding dilemma facing Howard County?" one of them asked before suggesting that we "hold those who are responsible accountable! Who would that be? It wouldn't be the patrons of the library or the registered vehicle drivers who use our road and bridge system. It wouldn't be the justices of the peace or other department heads. It would be the commissioners court. They are the ones that failed to fund the needed repairs for all those years, since the mid 1970s, that led to the recent jail closure.

"It wasn't the sheriff's refusal to be dishonest and hide the extra

inmates that closed the jail," that person continued, "it was the code and jail standards violations the commissioners continued to ignore for all those years. So how about holding them responsible instead of the many departments that held the line."

Two writers suggested we cut commissioners' salaries by at least \$25,000 each. Another wanted a \$35,000 cut.

Some wanted to compare the combined salaries of the commissioners court and the Big Spring City Council's total annual salary for all seven members of \$18,000.

I couldn't help but utter a slight chuckle when one of the writers suggested the commissioners "played a loosing hand of Russian roulette with the State Jail Standards Commission, delayed the progress on a new jail by stonewalling and listening to the same fool that thought it was cheaper to house inmates out of town, all while construction costs continue to rocket skyward!" Like I said, it's getting kind of

ugly.

Unfortunately, the voters of Howard County can take considerable blame for the problems the commissioners' court is having to deal with these days. And I'm not referring to the failed bond issue in November.

No, the voters of Howard County nixed a proposed jail bond in the mid 1990s when commissioners tried to take care of an already bad situation.

What's more, they are the people who elected and then re-elected these commissioners.

And worse still, the citizens of Howard County have long paid little attention to anything the commissioners court does until it come time to set a tax rate or consider a bond proposal.

In other words, most of us have to take some of the blame.

Of course, some would say those who don't vote needn't take any of the blame.

Perhaps. But they should keep their mouths shut.

Why?

Well, if someone isn't interested enough to look at the issues, go to the polls and cast a ballot for their choice in their precinct's commissioner's race and another in the county judge's race, they deserve whatever they get.

I agree that it's time this county's citizens demand accountability from their county judge and commissioners court.

However, we have to be accountable, too.

With an admittedly jaundiced eye, I believe the current commissioners court began the year playing partisan politics and wasted time and tax dollars by terminating a local architect only to hire another that will probably wind up being more expensive for virtually the same work.

That only compounded the problems created by years of trying to duck the Jail Standards Commission's regulations.

Now that we've had an object lesson that the state most assuredly can close our jail, are we going to make the same mistakes again?

Those who led the opposition to last year's jail bond proposal are already telling people that there's no need to build a new jail — that we can house prisoners in other counties' jails for less that it costs to house them here.

Having spent approximately \$1 million they hadn't budgeted for this fiscal year as a result of the increased costs of housing prisoners out-of-county, our commissioners and county judge know better.

The question is, have we as voters learned better. I sure hope so!

t was a little after 5 p.m. when our plane touched down at DFW International Airport. The screech of the tires on the tarmac was one of the most beautiful sounds I've heard in a very long time. It had been a month and more than 22,000 miles since I'd last seen

All of the Brewer clan went directly, on the right side of the road, to my favorite Tex-Mex joint. It was a lot like what I imagine

It was powerful and life changing but it was not without incident. When you travel throughout the world, really anything can happen. Third World countries

can be dangerous places and you have to really believe God for protection on so many levels.

"He does pretty well when he leads off of two rounds," said Australian Geoff Ogilvy, who was three strokes back, "and even better when he leads out for three rounds."

True — if 7-0 as the second-round leader and 12-0 as third-round leader qualifies.

"So, I guess this is kind of ominous," Ogilvy continued. "But at some point he's not going to win." Maybe.

But somebody should have reminded Ogilvy that pulling Tiger's tail is the worst way to go about it. Stephen Ames, who was tied with Ogilvy at 137, tried it last year when he drew Woods in the opening round of the Match Play championship and got smoked by a record 9 and 8. Rory Sabbatini did the same thing in May, calling Woods "beatable" after getting drummed at the Wachovia Championship only to get thumped even harder last weekend at Firestone, where Woods essentially lapped the field Sunday.

When someone pointed out the connection between him and

Sabbatini, Ames started backing away.

"Mine was taken out of context completely. And I won't get into that," Ames said, though he knows better.

Though Woods would never admit as much, he keep close track of those tugs on his cape. He gets a kick out of punishing people, but he's always in pursuit of bigger game.

He got off to a fast start both days, birdieing three of the first six holes but got waylaid at the start of the back nine Thursday and stumbled home in 1-over 71. On Friday, he made a 30-foot, par-saving putt at the 12th, then started going after Southern Hills. Woods birdied the next three, and the chase was on.

Pars at the final three kept him from writing a new page in golf's record books, but the round still qualified as must-see TV. When it was done, someone asked Woods whether he'd ever been as captivated watching anyone else as the rest of us were watching him.

"There was a lot of different ones. Just what sport? It's pretty much anything and everything," Woods said. "We've all seen it. Whether it was from

Gretzky or Jordan. Whomever it may be.

"I always think it's fun to watch if they're performing that way at the championship game when the title's on the line. Some guys just seem to take it to the next level."

Woods appears headed there yet one more time, this time at the end of a season of major championships in which he's never looked more vulnerable. At the Masters and U.S. Open, Zach Johnson and Angel Cabrera both outdueled Woods down the stretch. At the British Open, he never seriously threatened.

Woods waved off any attempts to characterize this singular outing as special or a statement round.

"I was just trying to get myself back in this tournament. And lo and behold, here I am. Sixtytwo," Woods said, grinning slyly, "would have meant I had a three-shot lead instead of two."

• According to the Beijing Olympics organizing committee, 1.7 million visitors are expected to attend the Games. Additionally, 1.1 million Chinese will travel for the festivities. In preparation for the Olympics, Air China is expecting to add 24 new planes for service to the U.S., France, the U.K., and Russia. The Olympic Games could create a surge in oil consumption from the Chinese next year when they play host.

• Japanese crude imports rose 12 percent year-onyear during June. The nation imported 3.9 million barrels per day during the month. The top suppliers included Saudi Arabia, the U.A.E., Iran, Qatar, and Kuwait. Iranian exports to Japan increased 268.1 percent.

That's the idea Jimmie Long and Bobby Price are operating on, as the pair prepare to begin construction on four homes on Colgate - northeast of Howard College - under the auspicious business name Faith Builders.

And while building homes is nothing new to either entrepreneur, building homes without a buyer already lined up is.

"I really believe in Big Spring. I believe God has a great plan for this city and he wants to do something here," said Long. "We have a real need for some really good, quality homes available for people moving into the area. We took the name because this is kind of a step of faith for me and Mr. Price to step out and believe God already has people intended for these homes. We believe He's going to send them in and they are going to be real blessings.'

Price and Long broke ground at 703 Colgate Wednesday afternoon, with a 2,200 square-feet

Our county judge has once again put his foot in his mouth (did not know he had any left to put there). In the Aug. 2, 2007 issue of the Big Spring Herald, he made some statements that require some comment.

First, Commissioner Bill Crooker stated that Adan Munoz, executive director of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, issued the statement that if the proposed bond issue for a new jail does not pass, the existing facility would be closed.

Judge Barr then was quoted as saying that Mr. Munoz did not really say that. One of these statements is obviously false. Mr. Crooker, during his years of service to this county, has displayed that he is a person of integrity, with high moral and honesty standards. He is not a

biased statement, as the judge has implied.

Second, in this same article, the judge made a statement that is straight out of partisan politics. When the suggestion was made that certificates of obligation might be required to finance a new jail, Judge Barr said "I made a commitment not to use COs when I was elected, and I'm going to stand by that" He obviously is making political promises more important than the best interests of the county and taxpayer.

Whether a new jail is financed by the issuance of bonds or certificates of obligation, the money comes from the same place — the taxpayer. If certificates of obligation were to be obtained immediately, the cost of an election would be avoided, and construction could be started much sooner. The longer the jail decision is prolonged, the more expense will be involved for a given design.

A good, well designed jail of a larger size than is now proposed, and for about the same cost, was ready for approval last year. The majority of the people who took the time to vote in the last election did not approve building a new jail. This is very hard to understand.

If the disapproving voters thought they would save themselves money, they need to take some courses in math and economics. If they thought building a new jail (or as it was presented — a "Taj Mahal") would be too expensive and/or unnecessary, they will probably scream bloody murder at the cost of : 1.) not having a local facility; 2.) having to transport every prisoner out of town for confinement; and 3.) transporting their return for hearings, trials, etc.

This is not the time for the judge to be playing politics. Get on with the task at hand and act responsibly.

Every once in a while, the defenders manage to coordinate their efforts perfectly and succeed in hornswoggling declarer out of a contract that is rightfully his. Take this deal from a rubber-

bridge game where East-West picked declarer's pocket clean. West started with the K-A and a third diamond, ruffed by East. It might seem that South could now easily have won the rest of the tricks by taking a club finesse, but that's not what happened.

Declarer's downfall commenced

with the size of the diamond West returned at trick three. He chose the three, a suit-preference signal requesting a club return from East after he ruffed.

South intercepted the signal as West intended him to - so when East next returned the seven of clubs, South rushed up with the ace, certain that West had the king. West then reinforced declarer's false impression by playing the ten on the ace. As West hoped, South concluded that West could not possibly have the king of spades, since he had already shown up with five diamonds headed by the A-K and was "marked" with the king of clubs. If he had the spade king also, declarer reasoned, West would surely have opened the bid ding as dealer.

Declarer therefore led a spade to the ace at trick five and returned the queen. He planned to ruff if East covered with the king, but when East played low, South followed his plan and discarded his club loser.

South's reaction when West tool the setting trick with the king of spades, and his chagrin a few moments later when he learned East had the king of clubs, need not be chronicled here. Suffice it to say that the chicanery practiced so artfully by the defenders worked like a charm. and very likely would have succeeded against most other declarers as well.

Man sues florist when wife discovers affair

HOUSTON (AP) - A Texas man is suing a florist after an employee there faxed a receipt to his estranged wife that showed he sent flowers and a love note to his girlfriend.

The lawsuit, field this week in Houston, asks 1-800flowers.com to pay for Leroy Greer's mental anguish and the increased amount he now expects to pay in his divorce case. Greer's lawyers are asking the florist for \$1 million, saying the once-amicable divorce could cost as much as an additional \$300,000.

In April, Greer sent his girlfriend flowers, a stuffed animal and a card that read: "Just wanted to say that I love you and you mean the world to me! Leroy." The company promised Greer that it would send nothing to his home, according to the lawsuit.

But 1-800-flowers.com later sent a coupon and a thank-you card to Greer's home. His wife saw the card, called the company and asked for a receipt, according to the lawsuit. The florist faxed the receipt to his wife, and it showed Greer spent \$100 and detailed the message on the card.

means faster times."

Col. Jim Little, director of the Big Spring Airport and Airpark, said the launches have provided little problem for him and his staff.

"Everything has been running smoothly," said Little. "Naturally, there's a lot of nail biting involved in a project like this, but we haven't had any problems coordinating takeoffs and landings with the competition.

"We're closing the primary runway down during their launch each day. This is just for safety.

There are going to be many more planes and pilots in the air than in years past, so you have to consider it a riskier situation when you're trying to bring planes in for a landing. We're still allowing emergency landings, but we haven't seen any of those at this point."

Little said one of the most common problems among world competitions — the language barrier – hasn't been an issue thus far, either.

"Each team has a team captain who is very fluent in English, and they have been doing a great job of getting the instructions to the pilots," said Little. "They are a very congenial group of people to work with.'





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
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
