Everyone Should Apply For SS Benefits At 65

Panhandle residents, 65 or over, who have not yet applied for social security benefits were advised today to file a claim now even if they are not planning to retire right away.

In issuing the above advice, Hal Geldon, Amarillo social security district manager pointed out that several local people who applied last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier.

"We have found," said Geldon, "that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to apply at 65 whether or not he intends to go on working. Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire. With entitlement already established, the benefits can be started immediately when we are notified of the retirement date."

Geldon said that according to the latest figures there are nearly 19 million Americans who are 65 or over. Of that total, more than 14 million have already established their entitlement to social security monthly benefits, and 1.1 million are insured for benefits but have not yet filed their claims. The latter figure includes the wives of insured workers.

Noting that President Johnson has designated May as National Senior Citizens Month, Geldon extended a special invitation for all Panhandle over-65 residents who have not applied, to visit the social security office or meet with the social security representative who comes to their area and file application for benefits.

Dimmitt Woman's Father Buried

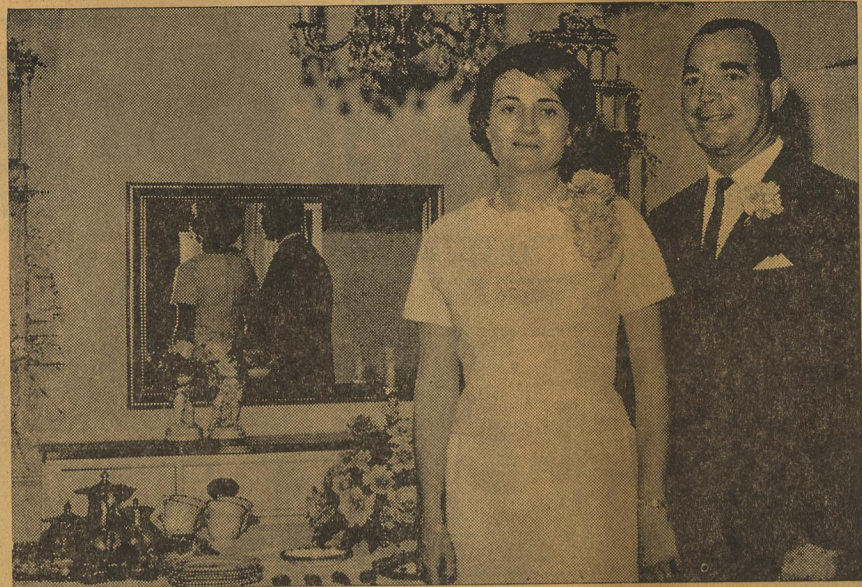

Cheaper Irrigation Gas In Offing

Plainview, Texas, May, 1965: At the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, W. T. Millen, Bailey County farmer, was elected President for the 1965 term. Clayton Enger of Lubbock County became the new Vice-President and Tom Robinson of Deaf Smith County the Secretary-Treasurer.

W. L. Edelman, President of the Plains Gas Farmers Cooperative, was present at the meeting and reported to the Board that the Cooperative south of Black in Parmer County, Texas, would begin purchasing irrigation gas in June from a new source of supply, Transwestern Pipeline Company, for about eighty-five irrigation wells under a permit from the gas will be purchased at a flat rate of 26 1/2 cents per Mcf, which according to Mr. Edelman, should save most farmers in excess of one-third in the cost of irrigation gas.

A report was made by E. K. Angeley and others of a conference with officials of El Paso Natural Gas Company in El Paso on May 5, looking into the possibility of buying irrigation gas from El Paso Natural Gas Company. It was reported that El Paso advised that if gas were bought directly from them by a qualified group of farmers, the price for such gas would be 23 cents per Mcf. The group of farmers on the Lamb-Bailey County line could purchase the gas directly from El Paso without laying any additional line because the farmers' line now ties directly into the El Paso main. This will permit farmers to buy gas for not much in excess of one-half of the present cost.

Anthony Kirby, Margaret Catoe and Jeanetta Cowell. Our sponsors were Rosy Bates and Coach Culpepper.

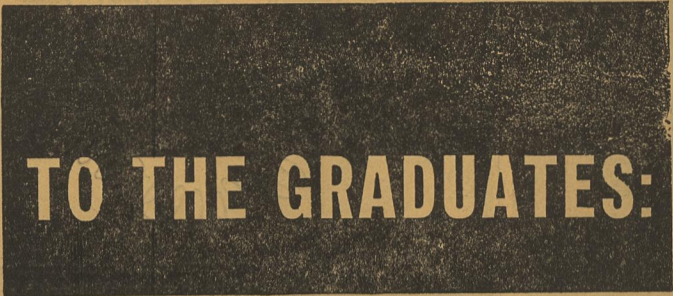
To begin our junior year, the band took a trip to the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs. It was a little tiresome leaving Dimmitt after the

Hi folks, seems as if air conditioner weather is here to stay now.

We have noticed quite a bit of cotton, milo and sugar beets up and growing. I'm sure the farmers are happy to see this warm weather. Good luck to all of you. Getting back to air conditioners, we would like to mention a few precautions to observe while working on, or around evaporative type coolers. As we all know at times the electric motors on these coolers will short out or break down. The motor will still run but will be grounded to the cooler through the motor mounts. Usually the ground or the grass under and around the cooler is wet or damp, which will make a good ground for your body. By touching the cooler and standing on the wet or damp ground your body provides an avenue of escape for the electricity. It will pass through your body to the ground, which could be fatal, by means of electrocution. A lot of folks think 110 volts will not injure or kill a person, but records show there are more people electrocuted by 110 volts with the proper ground, than by higher voltages. With the proper ground 110 volts has a tendency to hold you to it instead of knocking you away from it. So before you start to work on the cooler always pull the cord from the electrical outlet. Don't trust the on and off switch too much. If it is necessary to work on the cooler while it is running, don't put your hands in the water and touch the motor or cooler frame at the same time. It is a good recommended practice, when approaching or working on the cooler, to touch the frame with the back of your hand. The same rule applies to motors or pumps also but if at all possible unplug the unit before starting repairs or checks. Never pour or squirt water on an electric motor that is burning or running.
