## Tragic Accident Claims Seven Hart Residents

One of the most tragic accidents in the history of the South Plains occurred Saturday when the lives of seven Hart residents were claimed in a two-car collision. A family of five and two of their relatives were killed and four other persons were seriously injured.

Dead at the scene of the accident were: Anastacio Guana, 28; Mrs. Anastacio Guana, 27; Ramiro Guana, 7, Sylvia Guana, 6; Rey Guana, four months; children of Mr. and Mrs. Anastacio Guana; Melecia Corcova Martinez, 57, driver of the car and Anita Cordova, 19, died a few hours later.

The adult members of the family were employed on the farm of Lorenzo Lee in the Hart Community.

Injured in the two-car collision were Rodolfo Rangel, Edmonson, driver of the other car; Antonio Olivarez, 16, Edmonson; Marcelino Gonzalez, 21, 1600 Date Street and Martha Cortez, 18, of 907 1/2 Fir Street of Plainview. All were seriously injured.

The Martinez family came to Hart about two months ago from Sinton.

The car driven by Martinez, a 1959 Chevrolet, was headed east on State 194 and the 1958 model Buick driven by Rangel was headed west when the collision occurred about one and one-half mile east of Edmonson.

## Journalism Class In "Help Clean-up Viet Nam" Campaign

The Dimmitt High School Journalism Class is heading a drive to collect items to be sent to Viet Nam in a campaign titled "Help Clean-up Viet Nam." Recognizing the fact that toilet and personal hygiene articles and supplies are scarce, if not non-existent, in the war-torn country of Viet Nam the journalism students feel that their efforts in supplying articles of this type would be in keeping with the adage that "Cleanliness is next to Godliness."

In their effort to collect wash cloths, soap, tooth paste and brushes, powdered antiseptics, and any other hygiene articles that are not liquid or packed in glass, the class is appealing to

the public to contribute liberally to this humanitarian campaign.

Journalism students point out that this is a people to people campaign designed to show the people that are subjected to communist aggression that citizens of the United States are concerned about their welfare, and are anxious to do all they can to make their country disease free and a better and cleaner place in which to live.

Contributions to the "Help Clean-up Viet Nam" campaign can be left in the Journalism room at the high school. The room is number 28.

## Federal Tax On Telephone Bills To Be Reduced

Starting January 1 telephone bills for local and long distance service will be reduced by 7 per cent, according to Bill Woodard, District Manager, West Texas Telephone Company. Telephone customers in this area are going to benefit from a cut in the Federal excise tax. This reduction from 10 to 3 percent on local and long distance service was passed by Congress during the past session.

Additional reductions of 1 per cent a year will be made at the beginning of 1967 and 1968 and the tax will be completely eliminated in January, 1969. This tax has been levied directly on the telephone user. The tax due has been included on monthly statements from the phone company, and each month the tax payment has been sent on to the Federal government by the company.

But now the benefit of this tax reduction is going to be passed on in full — to the local telephone customers. This will result in bills for the coming year being 7 per cent less than they would have been otherwise.

The tax on long distance service was first passed in 1932 and it was designed to help government programs during the depression. The tax on local service was a World War II emergency measure passed in 1941. They have been increased from time to time and have been at the 10 per cent level since 1954. It was felt by many that unless reductions were secured this year that this would become a permanent tax, and it has been pointed out many times that the tax on telephone service was levied against a service which most people regard as a necessity.

Ministers officiating were Rev. Fred Beard, Rev. Daisy Wilbanks and Rev. Robert Slaton. Burial was in Floyd County Memorial Park under directions of Moore Funeral Home of Floydada.

Mrs. Ware married W. P. Ware September 3, 1924 in Lockney and had lived in Floyd County since that time.

Survivors are the husband; one son, Raz Ware of Cedar Hill Community; one daughter, Mrs. DeWayne Brown of Hart, four brothers and two sisters.

Mrs. Ware had been in ill health for some time.

In event Congressman Wright announces for the office of Senator, he will be pitted against Waggoner Carr, State Attorney General, of Lubbock who has already stated that he would make the race for that office.

The nominee in the Democratic Primary will face Senator John Tower, Republican incumbent, in the general election in November.

With his selection as the outstanding young farmer for the year, Crum joins a select group of winners of the coveted award. This is the fifth year that the Dimmitt Jaycees have conducted this program. Previous winners of the outstanding young farmer award are Ray Joe Riley, Dale Maxwell, George Sides and Ruyphard Smithson. Smithson, last year's winner, went on to be named the outstanding young farmer in the state of Texas. Crum will be entered in state competition, sponsored by the state Jaycees, in February, 1966.

## 101 Crashes Result In 6 Deaths In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 101 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of November, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one death, four persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,850.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through November of 1965 shows a total of 101 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were six persons killed and 84 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$70,137.00.

"If you think drinking and driving is not such a big problem

as we picture it — you are wrong," the Sergeant stated. "Drinking drivers are involved in more than half the fatal Christmas-time accidents, a higher percentage than the one-out-of-three proportion during the rest of the year. The problem is not only the heavy drinker but also the social drinker and even the person who only had a few at the

office party or on the way home from work. Just a little alcohol takes a shortcut toward a driving accident by reducing judgment, self-control and driving reactions. The best solution is not to drive at all after drinking." The Patrol Supervisor offered these suggestions to emphasize holiday traffic safety; restrain impatience, haste, inconsiderateness and preoccupation that may creep into the holiday attitudes. Know the safe winter driving techniques and use them. Obey the regulations and signs. And when you are the pedestrian, don't take chances with the traffic by jaywalking, rushing, obscuring vision with packages or failing to allow extra alertness for dusk and hazardous weather conditions.

Sgt. Gene Smelling had this to say about his being in Viet Nam: "Now that I am serving in Viet Nam, I have not been content to simply ask, 'What are we doing over here?' Just recently, as I was surveying a battalion area that had been under attack the night before, the question became quite pointed with introspect and subjectivity. It was now, 'What are we doing in this country?'"

"As I think of hundreds of Americans who are giving their lives in the rice fields and mountains of this country, I reflect on and at least attempt to answer this thought-provoking question. "I believe that I am in this communist-torn and bullet riddled land because I was fortunate to be born elsewhere. I, like many other Americans, did not have everything I wanted, but I never remember going hungry."

"In a way, you might say I was brainwashed; yes, brainwashed into thinking that God created every man equal and gave him

and sending Christmas cards and writing personal messages to friends.

Involve your family in decorating the home for the holidays. Plan your holiday menus and meals well in advance, so that there will be leisurely time for entertainment.

If travel is on your holiday agenda, plan details with care. A list of things to do at home before leaving — such as stopping the daily paper, having the mail held at the post office, etc. — is a good time-saving investment.

According to the legend on the picture at the bottom of this column, Old Maud, with an obscure donkey friend, are quenching their thirst at the public water tank on the northwest corner of the courthouse square. The picture was made in 1900 by Judge C. F. Kerr. We are indebted to Mr. E. S. Ireland of Hereford for the use of the picture.

Progress and development in Dimmitt, in general is pretty well exemplified by the public water works shown below in 1900 as

compared to the present public water facilities, however public transportation is still just about on a par with that afforded by Old Maud.

Texas Will Furnish 1,475 Draftees As January Quota

State draft boards are scheduled to induct 1,475 men into the armed forces in January, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday. This compares with a quota of 1,523 in December and 1,456 in November. The January quota of 1,475 is the Texas share of a

national call for 38,280 men, 29,300 for the Army and 8,980 for the Marine Corps. Colonel Schwartz also announced that 9,575 men will be forwarded to examining and entrance stations during January to undergo the draft physical and mental examination.

Local board quotas for both induction and examination are scheduled to be placed in the mail to the boards Friday.

The January quota for induction will be filled with single and childless married men, 19 through 25 years old, and volunteers who have not attained the age of 26.

No married man with children, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the January call. "Draft boards must have the information about children, of course," Colonel Schwartz said.

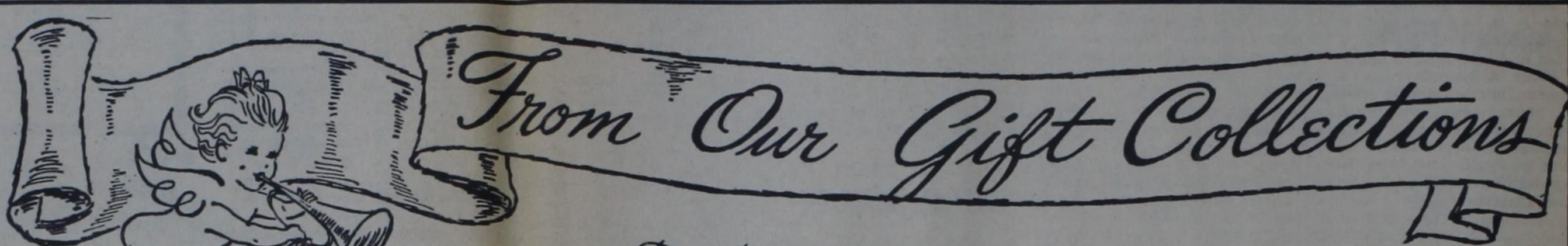

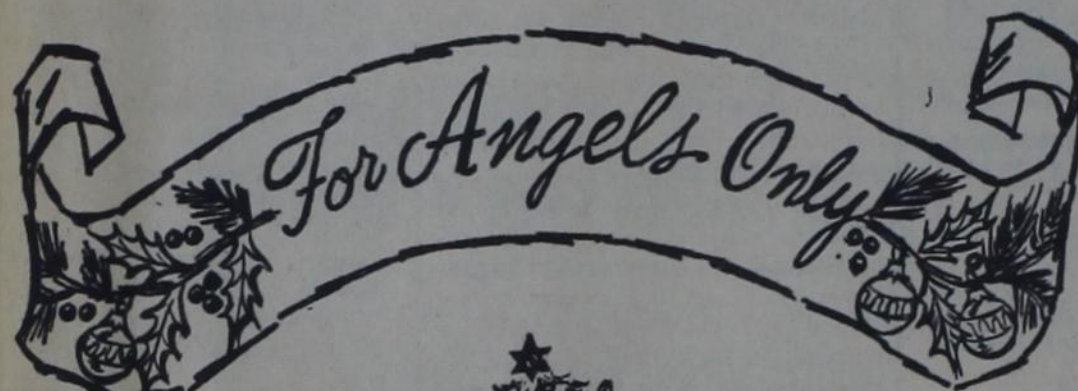

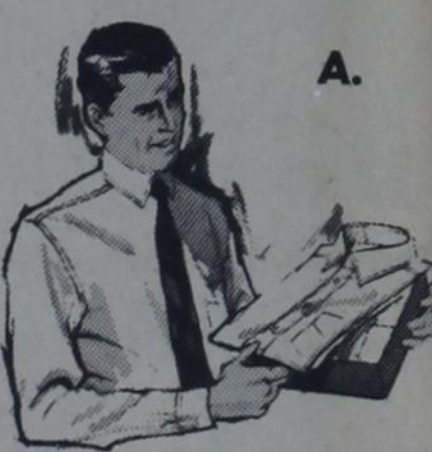

saving the homemaker time and energy.

Combinations such as meat or fish, vegetable, desserts and breads can be prepared in the oven at the same time for unique flavor and saving of fuel.

To plan your meal, first select a vegetable, dessert or bread, that can be cooked at the same temperature and for the same length of time as the meat being prepared.

Or, if the meat takes longer to cook than the other foods, start it first and put the vegetables and bread in later so that all finish cooking at the same time.

Since meat requires a more accurate setting of oven temperature than most other foods, plan your vegetables, dessert, and bread around the recommended time and temperature for the meat dish.

If necessary, the vegetables and dessert can be cooked at temperatures 25 degrees lower for a longer time, or 25 degrees higher for a shorter time than the recipes or baking charts suggest.

Ideas for oven meals are included in Extension pulcator B-927, "Quick Meals." It's yours for the asking at the County Extension Office.

The type of fabric will determine the best way to remove a fruit stain, says Mrs. Elsie P. Short, Texas A & M University Extension Service home management specialist.

If you are not sure whether or not the fabric can withstand boiling water, sponge immediately with cool water. Then apply a glycerine or soapless shampoo and rinse. Do not use soap, as this will set the stain.

If the stain remains after the shampoo treatment, use a chlorine or peroxygen bleach. Be sure to test the effect of bleaches on a seam that doesn't show or on a sample of the fabric before using the bleach on the stain.

If the fabric will withstand boiling water, pour it through the fabric while the stain is still fresh. If the stain is allowed to dry or set, it will be much more difficult to remove.

USDA nutritionists say time spent in moderate activity instead of reading, watching TV or playing cards can help take off extra pounds.

An overweight woman who eats just enough to maintain her weight can lose 9 pounds in a year by substituting daily an hour of activities such as light gardening or a brisk walk for an hour of activities she does while sitting.

If she spends an extra second hour in active recreation instead of sitting, she'll lose another 15 pounds a year — for a total of about 24 pounds, without a change in diet.

Sports such as bowling, tennis and swimming offer excellent exercise opportunities.

Ever wonder why the tradition of the Christmas tree? Some date the first lighted Christmas tree back to Martin Luther.

The story goes that, while strolling through the countryside one Christmas eve, his thoughts turned to the nativity of the Christ Child. He was impressed with the beauty of the heavens and the wintry landscape. And he observed the snowflecked evergreen trees sparkling in the moonlight.

When he returned home, he told his family of his experience. In attempting to reproduce the scene for them, he attached candles to a small evergreen to reproduce the reflection of the star-lit heaven upon the snow-laden forest trees. Thus — the first lighted Christmas tree.

When selecting a Christmas tree, the most important thing to look for is shape, according to official U. S. standards established by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

These standards are mainly for the trade, but you can adapt the requirements to your use, too. These standards of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service base 50 percent of the grade on shape. You'll want the tree to be perfect all the way around if you intend to put it in the center of the room. But an imperfection on one side may not matter if the tree is to be placed in a corner.

You should also shake the tree out a little to see what the taper is. Check the density to see if the tree is as thick as you desire it to be, and watch out for any noticeable gaps or holes, weak or broken branches, or undesirable crooks in the stem.

Too, it should be healthy and fresh looking, with the needles pliable and firmly attached. And keep the tree in water to retain freshness.

Whole meals can be prepared in an oven with one oven setting.

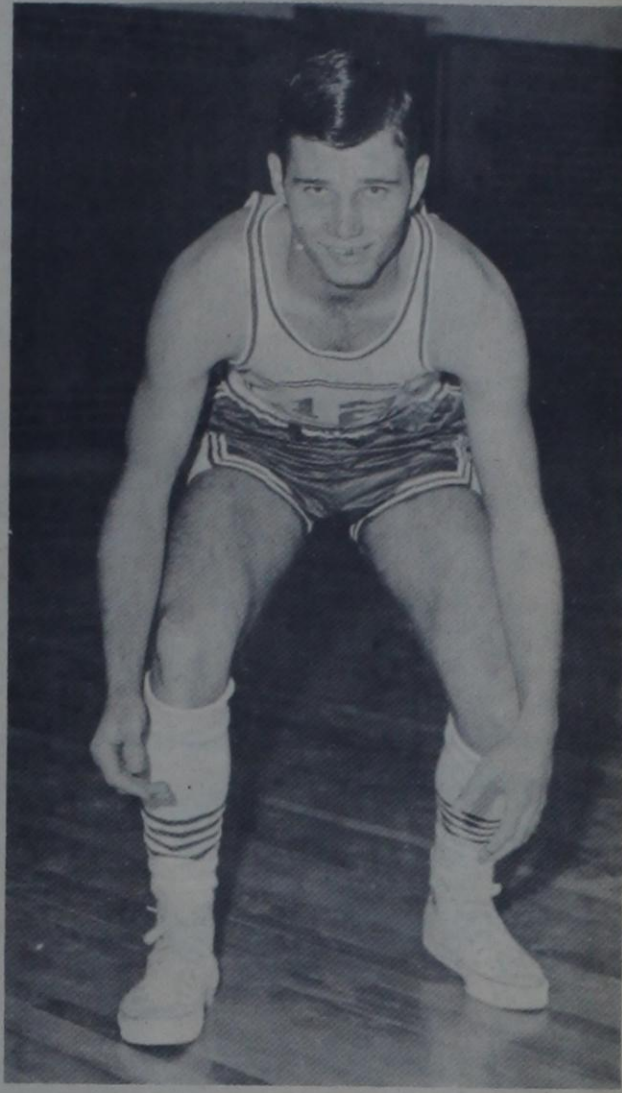

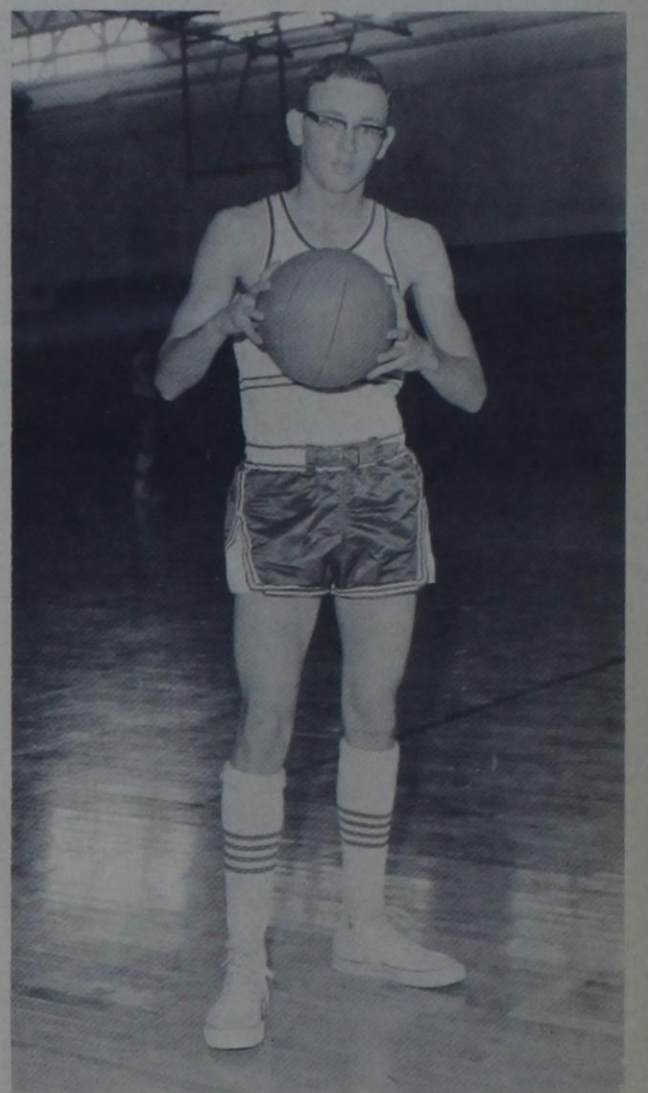
