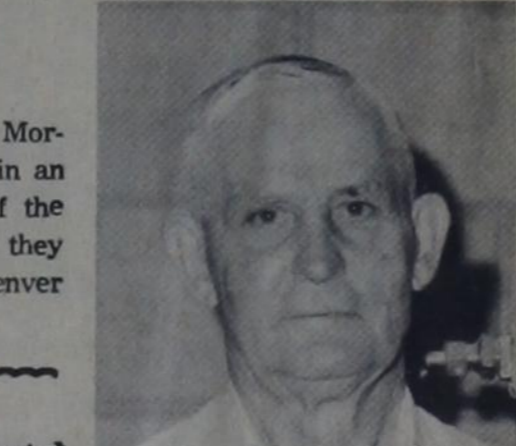
The Bobcats won a 13 point victory over Lubbock Christian High School Tuesday in the seventh annual ABC Caprock Tournament in Lubbock.

### Operation Christmas Greeting To Provide Hospital Equipment

"Operation Christmas Greetings", under the supervision of the Plains Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, resulted in the contribution of \$1,392.75 to the auxiliary's hospital equipment fund.

Funds raised by the Hospital Auxiliary are administered by representatives from the medical staff, hospital administration and hospital auxiliary. The equipment fund had a balance of \$464.05 carried over from previous Christmas Greetings which, with the addition of this year's proceeds will make a total of \$1,856.80 available for the purchase of hospital equipment.

Much needed equipment has been secured for the hospital through the efforts of the Hospital Auxiliary which also renders needed services to hospital visitors and patients through a planned daily program.

In commenting on the success of the current Christmas program Mrs. Armstrong declared that the auxiliary was deeply appreciative of the service rendered by Mrs. Faye Kenmore, at the First State Bank, in accepting and tabulating contributions as well as supplying the names of donors to the Castro County News for publication.

### Only 44,498 Bales Ginned, 85% Complete

According to reports from Castro County's fifteen gins Wednesday morning there had been 44,498 bales of cotton ginned from the present crop as a very disappointing harvesting season draws to a close.

Only 3,376 bales have been ginned in the county during the past week, and according to county ginners approximately 85 percent of the crop has been harvested. According to the estimate of the percent of the crop harvested, when completed the county gins will have processed slightly over 50,000 bales.

### 88 Texans Suffer Violent Deaths During Holidays

The Texas Department of Public Safety's "Operation Deathwatch" has climbed near the halfway mark of the 110 predicted automobile accidents during the holiday season beginning 12:01 a. m., Dec. 24 and lasting through 11:59 p. m., Jan. 2, 1965.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety in a report made at 10 a. m. Wednesday, 51 persons have died as a result of traffic accidents in Texas during the holiday season.

The most recent traffic fatalities in Texas were T. F. Pearson of Odessa, Jose Zamora Mendoza, 57 of Cone; Jimmy Ray Sanders, 21 of Henderson; Wiley B. Shields 41 and Rachiel Camuel Bailey, 60 of Hawkins; and Terry M. Taggery, 20 of Austin.

Total violent deaths estimated by the Texas Department of Public Safety during the Holiday Season is 195. The total violent deaths reported to date by the DPS is 88.

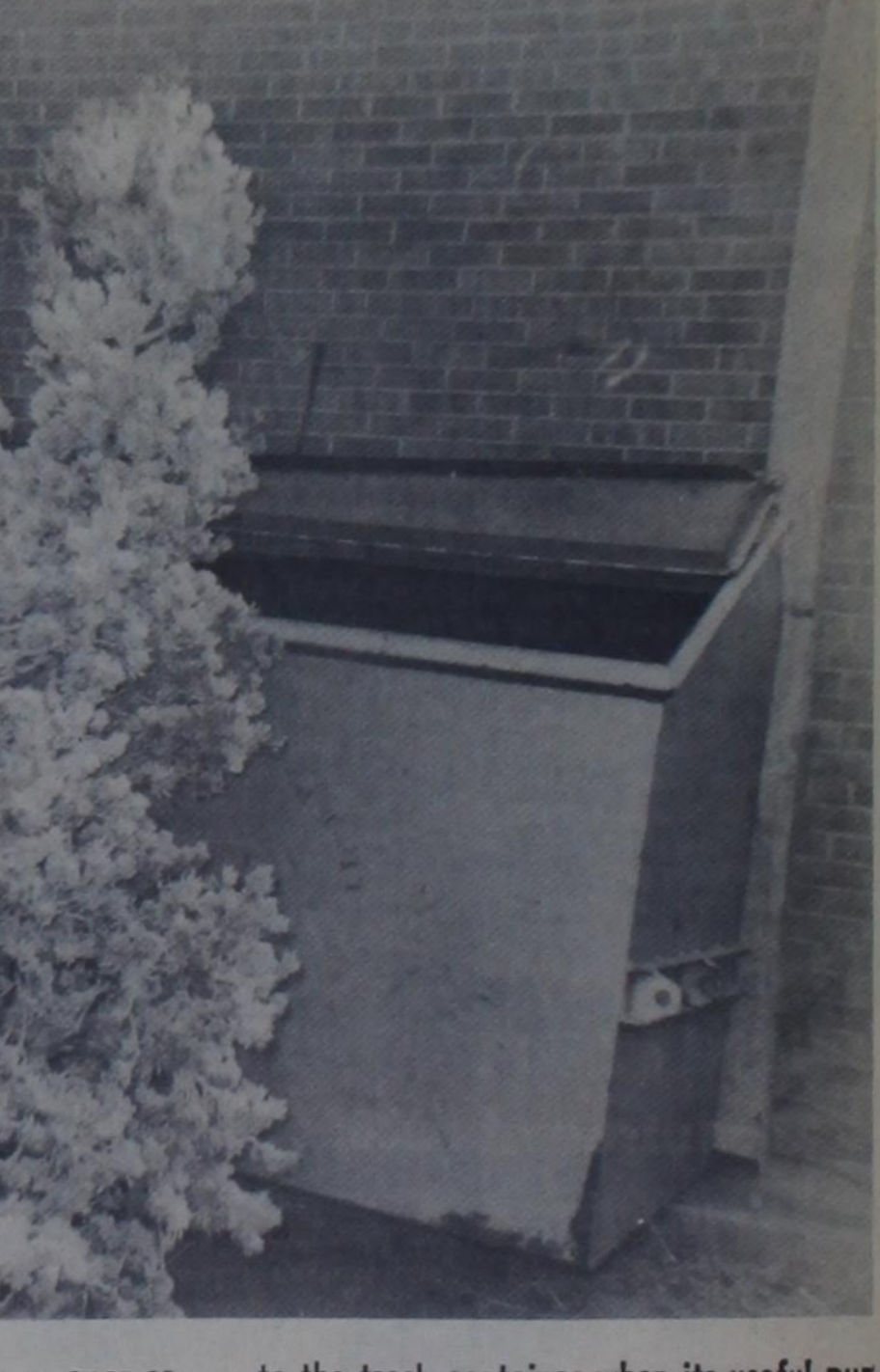

## Walter Rogers' NEWSLETTER WASHINGTON

**SPACE SIGNIFICANCE**  
The President's budget proposals are still carefully guarded secrets not likely to be divulged until his State of the Union Address and Annual Budget Message are delivered next month to the Congress. Until these figures are released it is not possible to know in what areas the President might propose to make cuts in order to pay for the rising costs of the war in Viet Nam. You may expect, however, that Congress will give the next budget especially close scrutiny and probably will make cuts below the President's spending recommendations; it is customary for Congress to make budget cuts, although the reductions are never as great as many of us might wish. In the wake of the very successful Gemini 6 and 7 flights, a question uppermost in the minds of many persons is whether our space program is to be reduced. While it is too early to know definitely, I predict that because of their potential military importance, space projects will be pushed along at about the present rate, at a spending pace of more than \$5 billion a year.

The orbital rendezvous carried out by Gemini 6 when it came within 10 feet of the orbiting Gemini 7 on December 15 was one of the most important strides taken in our space effort. It advanced the goal of a manned lunar landing, the objective of our Apollo program. In Apollo, the plan calls for two astronauts to make

a moon landing in a small craft, then to return to the main space vehicle in which a third astronaut will be circling the moon. Following their rendezvous, the three will return to earth.

The Gemini 6-7 rendezvous was militarily significant in that it advanced our objective of being able to overtake and inspect an object circling the earth in orbit. Possessing this ability is going to be vital to us in maintaining our defenses beyond the atmosphere. We know how orbital objects, manned or unmanned, can be returned to earth with relative accuracy. The menace is obvious; nuclear weapons circling in space, awaiting orders to plunge earthward, could become the next form of threat to our security. We must be able to send astronauts into space to overtake, inspect, and, if necessary, destroy any threatening objects placed in orbit by an enemy power.

One of the objectives of the Gemini program is to build a pool of astronauts skilled in rendezvous techniques, which are said to be more complex than techniques required for docking space vehicles.

Our space program is directed at peaceful purposes. The planned moon landing is only one of many objectives, although it is perhaps the most spectacular. We should not lose sight of the fact that the scientific and technological advances that help make progress possible in non-military, peaceful projects also have a very great payoff in developing our defense capability. Sixty-two years ago this month the Wright brothers made man's first powered flight, and for years there was little thought given to military implications of aviation. Today we are very much aware of the military significance of space and dangers we would face if our own efforts were to lag behind those of the Communists. Just as the horse cavalry gave way to armored tanks, technological advances make it essential to a nuclear weapon hurtling down upon us from outer space; our defense against such a threat has to be mounted in space itself. We simply can not avoid the necessity of keeping pace in weapons development. As we look to 1966, we must recognize that we are not only locked in a tough "hot" war in Viet Nam but that we continue to face Communist adversaries in many continuing "cold" war problems. Space is one of them, and it is a program that can not be slighted.

### Feedlot Cattle Decrease In Feed Efficiency After 112 Days

Research done at Texas A & M University's Coastal Bend Experiment Station near Beeville, indicates the cost of cattle feeding goes up considerably after the cattle have been on feed for 112 days.

Why does the cost go up? Ed Neal and Bill Conrad, in charge of beef cattle research at Beeville, say their tests show a sharp decrease in the conversion of feed to gain in the cattle after 112 days. This means an increase in the amount of feed required to make a unit of gain — with the end result, a higher feed bill for the cattleman.

In the experiment at the A & M field station, after 112 days in the feedlot, cattle in one group required 684 pounds of feed to make 100 pounds gain. At this conversion ratio, the researchers

figures a selling price of \$19.68 per cwt. was needed to break even on cost of the ration and purchase price of the cattle.

But, as the feeding time for the same group was increased to 140 days, feed required to make 100 pounds of gain jumped to 785 pounds — and a break-even price of \$20.52 per cwt. was needed (an increase of \$.84 per cwt.). The researchers point out that the price of cattle may not increase this much in 28 days, in fact, it may decrease or stay the same.

This was just one case, others produced similar results. And in every instance, an increase in sell-

Complete records are especially helpful to Texas taxpayers who intend to itemize their deductions. A copy of your 1964 tax return also provides a good guide for preparing your 1965 tax return.

ing price was needed to break even, as the cattle were fed to 140 days instead of 112.

The A & M researchers hasten to point out that 112 days on feed isn't a magic number, by anyone's standards — but in their tests, a significant jump in feed requirement to make a unit of gain began at 112 days. To a cattleman, this means an increase in feeding costs when he feeds his cattle longer.

In view of this, there are times when it may pay to sell at about 112 days. "Other times it would be a mistake to sell," said Bill Conrad. It's up to the individual cattleman to evaluate his own situation and make the best possible decision. Conrad offers these guidelines for the cattleman to check at the 112 day mark to help him decide whether to sell, to feed on to 140 days or perhaps an even longer period.

The guidelines at 112 days are:

1. Use all available sources to estimate the price trends for the next 28 days. Is the price going to be stable? Will it go up or down? Remember, a cattleman will need a higher price or a better grade to offset the extra feed requirement.
2. Are the cattle ready to sell? Do they have the finish required? If the answer is yes, and the market doesn't promise to get much better, it may be wise to sell.
3. Is there a premium paid for higher grades of cattle in the market where you sell? Will another 28 days on feed increase the grade of the cattle? Usually about one-third of a grade increase is all that can be expected in 28 days. If the answers here are no, again, it might be wise to consider selling.

Every cattleman wants to find the right time to sell — these guidelines offer a place to start, but the final decision lies with the individual himself, concludes Conrad.

### Poverty Rate Higher In Texas Than U. S.

Poverty in Texas is the topic of a recent study prepared by Dr. William P. Kuvlesky, sociologist in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, Texas A & M University.

Kuvlesky said 29 percent of all Texas families, nearly 700,000, had annual incomes of less than the \$3,000 figure used as an indication of poverty. This is a larger proportion of low-income families than for the United States, Kuvlesky said. Texas had higher rates of both rural and urban poverty than did the nation, he added.

The study, "Poverty in Texas: The Distribution of Low-Income Families," was conducted with David E. Wright, a senior student assistant at A & M. The study is the first effort of this kind to provide distributions of low-income families for Texas counties and rural and urban places, said Kuvlesky.

The amount of poverty varied greatly from county to county, but certain broad patterns showed up in the location of low-income families, he said. Most of the counties in East and South Texas have high levels of low-income families, while in the Panhandle and West Texas, high levels are not common, said Kuvlesky.

Poverty, a serious problem in both rural and urban areas in Texas, appears to be a more pressing problem in the country, a sociologist concluded.

**Leaf Spot Means Future Trouble**

Perennial plants which lose their leaves early because of leaf spot may not survive the winter, a Texas A & M University plant pathologist reports.

"It is too late to change what has happened, but it is a good time to plan strategy for next year," C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist says.

With the disease problems fresh in mind, gardeners are advised by Horne to contact the county Extension agent for control recommendations.

In some cases, garden store operators may need to place orders for certain fungicides.

Protective fungicides need to be applied either before or shortly after the disease is noticed, Horne reminded.

"Control is easy when growers have studied the problem beforehand, obtained the proper recommendations, and have the needed materials on hand and ready for use," Horne said.

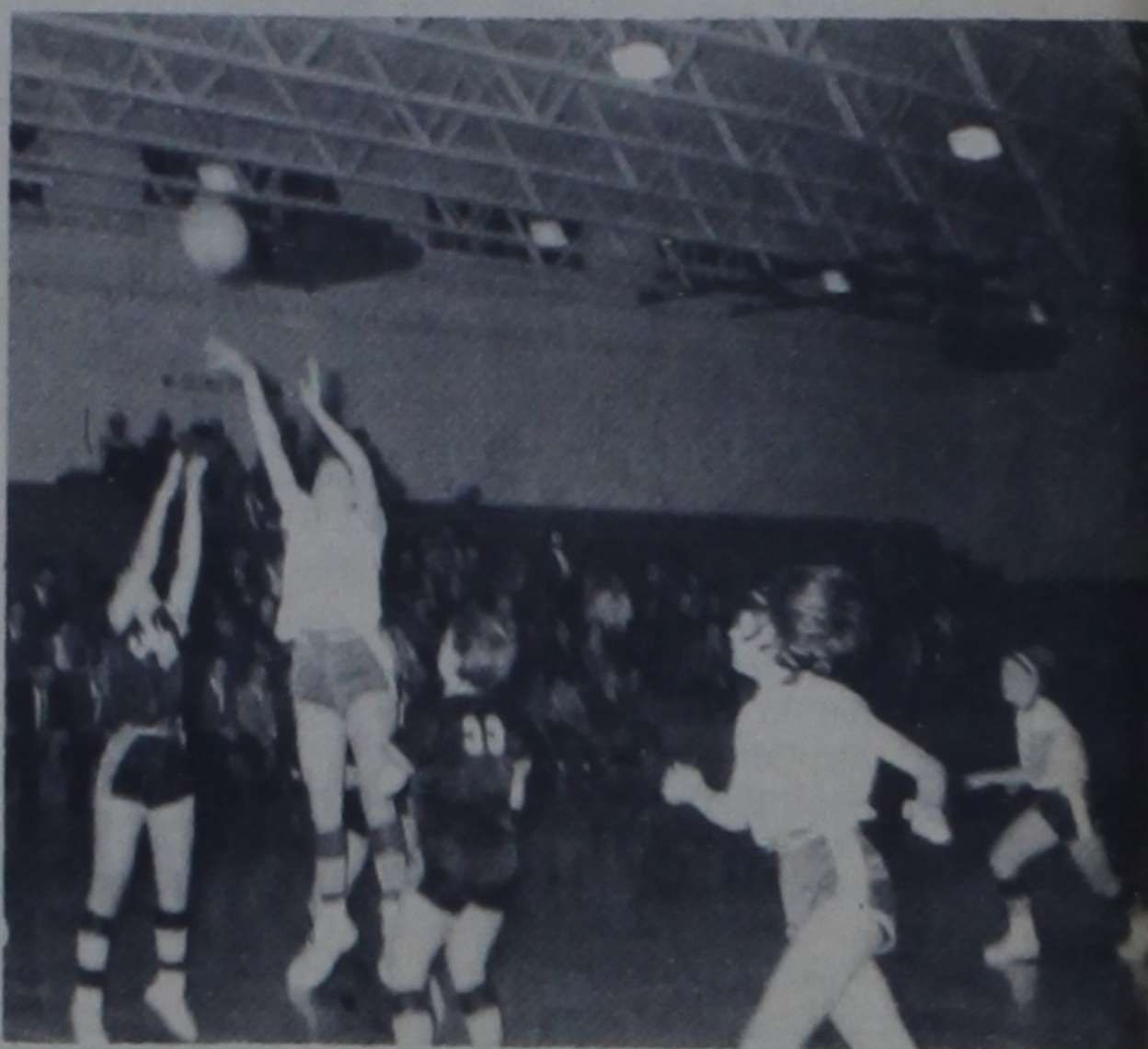

Blackeye Peas A Must On New Years

Never! Absolutely never let New Year's Day pass without eating a good "helping" of blackeye peas!

Felks who aren't native to these parts may not understand the importance of such a positive bit of advice. But it's fully as significant as warning children that Santa Clause may not remember bad little boys and girls.

You must eat blackeye peas on New Year's if you want to be lucky in the coming year! That's based on long-standing legendary fact.

And some good luck experts claim that the peas must be dry peas seasoned with hog jowl and eaten with corn pone to be truly effective.

For every pea you eat, you can expect to earn a dollar to match it during the coming year, according to folklore.

So plan your 1966 budget as you enjoy blackeye peas New Year's

Day. May you eat plenty. The Consumer and Marketing Service takes no official stand on the folklore, but this U. S. Department of Agriculture agency does point out that hog prices are near a 17-year high, so you may find that your hog jowl will cost you slightly more than last year. There are ample stocks of blackeye peas - frozen, canned and dried. And the 1965 corn crop set a new record, so there will be plenty of corn meal for corn pone. One of the favorite southern "good luck" dishes is called

"Hoppin' John." Cook a ham bone or knuckle in 2 qts. of water for 2 hours. Then add 1 cup of dried blackeye peas that have been soaked overnight in cold water. Cook until almost tender. Remove the ham bone, add a cup of washed rice, salt and pepper. Boil gently about 20 minutes until rice is soft and most of the liquid is cooked away. Serve hot with hot corn pone and butter. YUM! YUM!

### 1966 Agricultural Conservation Program Highlights Emphasized

We will begin accepting applications for cost-share practices under the 1966 Agricultural Conservation Program in Castro County on January 3, 1966. We have the same conservation practices available for 1966 as in 1965. A farm limit of \$500.00 is applicable in 1966. Applications accepted at this time will be for conservation practices to be carried out during January, February and March.

**Release and Reapportionment Of 1966 Cotton Allotment**

Application for released cotton acreage may be filed with the Castro County ASCS Office beginning January 3, 1966. Any person having 1966 Cotton Allotment acres which they desire to release to the Castro County ASCS Committee for reapportionment may do so beginning January 3, 1966.

**1966 Upland Cotton Allotment Transfers**

The 1966 Upland Cotton Allotment transfers must be filed by January 3, 1966. The following types of transfers are applicable

to Castro County:

(1) Transfers by lease or sale from one farm to another in Castro County.

(2) Transfers from farms in approved counties by lease or sale to farms in Castro County.

(3) Transfer by owners between farm owned or controlled by him anywhere within the state.

No cotton acreage may be transferred across state lines and no acreage may be transferred from Castro County to another county except under the ownership provision.

As of December 27, we have had 19 applications filed transferring approximately 280 acres to Castro County for the 1966 crop year.

**1965 Wool Program**

Wool producers are reminded that the 1965 Wool Marketing Year started on January 1, 1965 and will end December 31, 1965. Wool producers are reminded to turn in sales receipts for Unshorn Lambs and Wool Sales made during these dates and file their application for incentive payment in the Castro County ASCS Office not later than January 31, 1966.

### Winter Protection For Trees, Shrubs And Flowers Explained

Trees shrubs and flowers face problems from the elements just as do humans and among them is winter protection. The amount of protection needed depends on the natural hardiness of plants, severity of climate and exposure, explains County Agent Charles Hottel.

Winter injury to plants is usually attributable to two factors, severe cold or loss of moisture from shoots and branches. Extreme cold will cause twigs, stems and roots to freeze, prompting cell tissues to break down.

Excessive loss of moisture which frequently causes winter killing, is due largely to the effect of strong, drying winds during periods of brilliant winter sunshine, says Hottel.

Evaporation of moisture from twigs, branches, canes and leaves (in the case of evergreens) continues at a slow rate through the winter. To supply this moisture, plant roots must continue to absorb water.

When evaporation is rapidly accelerated by prolonged periods of winter wind and sunshine, plant roots are unable to supply moisture fast enough. Branches and canes become withered and, if this condition is sufficiently aggravated, it often results in dying back of a large portion of the plant or in its death.

Therefore, one of the most important preparations for winter, says Hottel, is to see that the soil is adequately supplied with moisture. If rainfall has been light during the summer, the ground should be soaked before freezing weather sets in.

Many trees and shrubs may be saved from winter injury if this protection is given. Protection against wind and sun is as important to many plants as protection against extreme cold.

To protect half-hardy shrubs and newly planted shrubs, a wind screen can be constructed from

### Farm Outlooks Good For 1966 According To Economist

Agriculture fared well in 1965 and should do even better in the year ahead John G. McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A & M University, said today realized net farm income in 1965 reached the highest total since 1952 and may be up another quarter to a half billion dollars in 1966.

The nation's realized net farm income for 1965 is now estimated at \$14 billion. Realized net income, explains the economist, is income above production costs.

Three factors are listed by McHaney for the bright outlook for 1966. The production and price outlook looks favorable for livestock producers; the new food and agricultural act of 1965 will provide some increases, especially for crop farmers and he expects the domestic demands for farm products and exports to continue their expansion.

A growing economy, rising incomes and population gains will result in increased consumer expenditures for food. However, he does not expect the increase to equal the six percent gain of 1965. Commercial food purchases in 1966 will again be supplemented by such programs as national school lunch, special milk, direct distribution and food stamp. The per capita food use is expected to hold near the 1965 figure but there'll be more people to feed, he said.

Exports have played an increasingly important role in American agriculture over the past 15 years and sales abroad in 1964-65 amounted to \$6.3 billion. While the value of exports may be up only moderately in 1966, McHaney expects the volume to increase by four or five percent. Larger exports are expected for Texas feed grains and wheat but smaller for cotton.

Cotton farmers, he said, will get much of the increase in government payments, about \$1 billion, to offset the income effect from the reduction in price-support loan rates to competitive world price levels. Some increase to wheat farmers will result from the new legislation and the new Cropland Adjustment program will also add to increased farm income in 1966.

The economist expects production expenses to continue their upward trend and to offset much of the indicated gain in gross farm income. Prices paid for commodities, interest, taxes, and wages are expected to increase but the rise will be less than the increase from 1964-65.

Net income per farm in the nation in 1965 is now estimated at over \$4,000 — 10 percent above

1964 and 40 percent above 1960 and the best in over a decade. With the continuing decline in farm numbers and farm people, per farm and per capita incomes of farmers should reach new highs in 1966.

The total value of farm assets continue to rise with most of the increase due to higher farm real estate values. Farm debts rose sharply in 1965 and will probably increase more in 1966, but the dollar increase in debt will be much less than gains in farm assets, the economist said.
