package store. The fire department reported that the tool shed burned down, but no damage was done to Ralph Lowe's Package Store or any of the other buildings in Nazareth.




The A & M researchers haste to point out that 112 days on fee isn't a magic number, by any one's standards - but in the ests, a significant jump in fee requirement to make a unit gain began at 112 days. To cattleman, this means an increas in feeding costs when he feeds hit cattle longer.

In view of this, there are time when it may pay to sell at about 112 days. "Other times it would be a mistake to sell," said Bil Conrad. It's up to the individual cattleman to evaluate his own situ ation and make the best possible lecision. Conrad offers these guidelines for the cattleman to check at the 112 day mark to help

Poverty in Texas is the topic of a recent study prepared by Dr. William P. Kuvlesky, sociologist in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, Texas

Complete records are especial Texas families, nearly 700,000, had annual incomes of less than the \$3,000 figure used as an indi-cation of poverty. This is a larger proportion of low-income famlies than for the United States, Kuvlesky said. Texas had higher

rates of both rural and urban pov erty than did the nation, he add-

The study, "Poverty in Texas: The Distribution of Low-Income Families," was conducted with David E. Wright, a senior student assistant at A & M. The study is the first effort of this kind to provide distributions of low-inome families for Texas counties and rural and urban places, said Kuvlesky.

The amount of poverty varied greatly from county to county, but certain broad patterns showed up in the location of low-income families, he said. Most of the counties in East and South Texas have high levels of low-income families, while in the Panhandle and West Texas, high levels are


