

Weevil Control Program Extended

Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Con-trol Program have voted to con-H. "Molly" Malone and mantinue in 1967 the fall spraying operaotions which started in 1964 and have reduced overwintering populations of boll weevils in nine infested counties to about two percent of previous numbers.

AT THE sae time, the group voted to increase efforts to improve eradication methods which would remove the weevil threat from the Plains once and for all. There is a possibility one or more of these eradication techniques cou'd be ready for a test run in the spring of 1968.

"There is no acceptable alternative to continuing the program," according to Ed Dean, Field Service Director for Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the High Plains cotton producer organization which initiated the program.

"If left alone, weevils would immediately build back to the huge numbers present in the 1964 growing season and would shortly overrun the entire High Plains area,'

HE ALSO said that if this area is to be in a position to take advantage of male sterilization or other eradication techniques, it is necessary that weevil numbers be kept down to the current low le-Entomologists estimate that no more than an average of three or four weevils per acre will emerge from hibernation this spring, and it is estimated that the release of sterile males would require a ratio of about 100 to 1 to disrupt the reproductive cycle.


The release of 400 sterile male weevils would not be enough to do serious economic damage to crops. But if weevil populations were even 100 per acre, the 4,000 sterile weevils that would have to be released would make the technique







Texas has an estimated 1,550,-

000 preschool children, with

620,000 of these believed suscepible to measles. At least 465,000 are believed susceptible to polio. AT PRESENT, immunizations are provided through 64 health departments located throughout the state, and covering about 75 percent of the population, the health commissioner reported. He said these are administered through various types of clinics using diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis vaccines manufactured in the State

Health Department laboratories. Polio and measles vaccines are purchased from commercial outlets, he said.

"Health departments, with coopeartion from private physicians have actively promoted immunizations in the past among the preschool and school-age population.' Dr. Peavy said, "but, many preschool children are not being reached by the usual and customary procedures."

THE CURRENT state plan to make 1967 the "measles eradication year" coincides with a national project urged by President Johnson.
