When I start a column, like I am starting to do right now, I have qualms and misgivings and apprehensions as to what the end result might be. I always hope that I can come up with something enlightening, entertaining and maybe slightly profound, but then there is always that dread that it will only serve as a sedative and put any, provided there are any, readers to sleep. Come to think of it that would be a service that should be appreciated.

I am loaded with considerable subject matter for a column. It's in the form of columns from politicians, news releases that boil down to propaganda for the promotion of goods, ideas, and personal aggrandizement. There is, among the arm loads of releases that come to our office each week, some worthwhile material that would justify its publication in part, if not entirety. Farther down in the column I will give a few samples.

But first I want to call attention to the new location of Ace Reid's humorous cartoon "Cow Pokes." The popular cartoon that has appeared on page six each week is being shifted to page eight, our "Industrial Review" page. Before, or after, you get the message from "Cow Pokes" it will be worth your while to peruse the advertisements on that page. The businesses are trying to tell you that they will, and do, appreciate your business.

Now: Some of the mail that crosses our desk, usually on its way to file thirteen, the waste basket:

Senator Tower: "It has been ten years since the Arab oil embargo woke Americans to the need to regain energy self-sufficiency. The tremendous increases in oil prices after the embargo and the U.S. shortage of natural gas during the 1970s made this need even more clear."

Senator, I plead guilty of taking this quote out of context but it serves my purpose to do it. The present administration, elected by your party, has seen fit to dismantle the Department of Energy, established by the Carter administration, to do something about development of alternate energy. Another Arab embargo would put us back into the 70s, energywise.

Have any number of releases from Mack Wallas, chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas. They tell about the oversupply of natural gas, but explain that the oversupply is due to reduced demand that is brought about by economic decline and falling prices of competitive fuels. He failed to mention that much of the economic decline was brought about by the exorbitant prices that the public has had to pay for energy. The Railroad Commission is supposed to be a consumer advocate but their propaganda belies that supposition. I counted six full pages of typewritten copy from the Railroad Commission, in one mailing, and that is just about average for any number of commissions, bureaus, politicians, associations.

I have here several bulletins that I have considered giving some publicity but after all we have to save some space for local news and very worthwhile and newsworthy advertisements.

## DISD told 'skills improving'



DOUBLE DILEMMA—Two heads may be better than one, but that does not make shopping any easier. Twins Bryan and Brent Portwood, 4, try to decide what to get their father,

Tommy Portwood, for Father's Day — socks, undershirts, shoes, a race car, a baseball glove, a cowboy hat or a Spiderman coloring book.

"Over the last few years we have shown an overall improvement," Evie Froehner, curriculum director, told the Dimmitt School Board Monday night concerning the results of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) tests administered this year to students in third, fifth and ninth grades.

State law requires that the board review the test results each year.

"We feel we are making some headway," Mrs. Froehner said, adding, "Although, there are still some specific areas in reading, writing and math that have not been mastered."

The tests are administered in February, and have been conducted for the past four years. Scoring is based on the number of academic skills for which a student is able to demonstrate mastery.

In all three grades, problem areas were units of measure in math, correct English usage and punctuation in writing, and identifying the main idea in reading.

At the ninth grade level, only 44% of students tested demonstrated mastery of solving personal finance problems, such as making change, figuring a bill, etc. Other math skills below the 80% mark included figuring ratio and percent, fractions and measurement units.

In reading, problem areas included knowing how to use the parts of a book, distinguishing fact from non-fact, evaluating information and perceiving cause-effect relationships.

Fifth graders averaged a 67% score in identifying the main idea in reading, and also were below 80% in recalling facts and sequence.

However, not all the news was bad. The tests showed improvement in many areas.

Third graders scored 100% in mastery of spelling skills in writing. Mrs. Froehner attributed this to the six-week spelling bees and award programs implemented three years ago, which give the students incentive through recognition of achievement. Award winners have been listed in the News.

Mrs. Froehner said the tests, although not a true total picture of the education situation, will be used to evaluate what areas may need more emphasis in the future.

Having to eliminate a math component in federal funding because of federal spending cuts has caused some changes of assignments and the elimination of one full-time employee, board members were told by superintendent Robert Ryan.

Funding was lost for four certified teachers and three aides. All but one were able to be shifted to other areas of assignment.

The list of summer maintenance projects was discussed, and included eleven painting projects, besides the painting of the light towers and goal posts at the football field and all flag poles at a cost of \$1,200.

General repair projects included items from broken windows to cracked ceilings, to electrical and plumbing repairs. Building projects include shelves and cabinets in several locations.

At the middle school concrete work will be done outside the game gym to try to correct a drainage problem involving the west sidewalk from the steps area.

Ryan noted that most of the projects should be finished by the time school starts.

The board will hold a special session Monday night at 8 p.m. to open bids on two projects — a vocational agriculture barn to be built at the FFA pens, and seal-coating of all parking lots.

Ryan said bids are being sought on a parcel basis for the seal-coating so that only part of it may be accepted.

Specifications on the barn were redrawn from an earlier [Continued on Page 7]

## Storm kills former resident

Paula Kay George was killed and her mother, Sally Howell of Dimmitt, was injured when severe winds destroyed her family's mobile home near Lake Meredith last Thursday.

Mrs. George's husband, Larry, and their five children escaped serious injury.

Mrs. George, 38, was a native of Dimmitt and had served as a licensed vocational nurse at Plains Memorial Hospital, Golden Spread Nursing Home and South Hills Manor here before she and her family moved to Lake Meredith. Her husband, an electrician with Basin Electric Service of Borger, had owned and operated George Electric here, and also had worked for ABI and A-1 Mechanical.

Mrs. George was seven months pregnant and was undergoing treatment for cancer. Her mother was visiting with her and her family.

The storm hit the area about midnight, demolishing the Georges' mobile home. Another mobile home was destroyed, a tractor-trailer rig was flipped and several houses were damaged, Dept. of Public Safety dispatcher Duane Barnett said.

Mrs. George and her 18-year-old son, Twan Vilas, reportedly were about to wake the others when the storm hit.

Officials at the National Weather Service in Amarillo said Friday that they did not know for sure if the storm was

a tornado or just high, straight winds.

"It just sucked her out of the house," Mrs. George's husband said. "I woke up just when the whole world went to pieces."

The mobile home was destroyed and the family's household belongings were scattered over a large area.

A refrigerator fell on Vilas and a recliner was thrown on Larry George. The other children — DeTonja Vilas, 14, Tiffany Vilas, 9, Candice George, 2, and Pattie Kaye George, 1 — and Mrs. Howell were covered with debris.

"Twan and I managed to dig ourselves out, then we went looking for the others," George said. "We dug the kids out and then got my mother-in-law."

Neighbors cared for the younger children while George and Vilas searched for Mrs. George.

"I think it was more than an hour later that we found my wife. We knew about where she was, but we had to move everything piece by piece," George said.

When Mrs. George was found, she was taken to North Plains Hospital in Borger, where she was pronounced dead on arrival.

Mrs. Howell, who suffered minor injuries, was treated and released.

George and the children later gathered some clothes from the debris and came to Dimmitt. The children are

staying with her sister, Patty Summers.

Services for Mrs. George were conducted Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Dimmitt with Rev. John Street, pastor, and Rev. Vernon O'Kelly of First United Methodist Church officiating.

Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens, under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

## Projects underway for stricken family

A fund and a food-and-clothing project were set up in Dimmitt this week to aid the Larry George family.

Mrs. George was killed and the family's mobile home was destroyed last Thursday night when tornado-like winds struck the Lake Meredith area.

Mr. and Mrs. George were both raised here and their five children were all born here. They moved to Lake Meredith two years ago.

Anyone wishing to donate clothing or household goods to the stricken family may take them by George Real Estate between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. The real estate office is located at the intersection of US 385 and State 194. After 5 p.m., such items may be taken to the Gerald Summers home seven miles south of Dimmitt on US 385.

Anyone wishing to help the family financially may contribute to the Larry George Family Fund at the First State Bank.

## Shootout marker to be dedicated

The Castro County Historical Commission will have a dedication ceremony on the Fourth of July for the historical marker commemorating the 1891 shootout between Ira Aten and the McClelland brothers that took place in Dimmitt.

The marker will be placed on the southwest corner of the courthouse square, near the site of the shootout.

Speaker for the ceremony, tentatively scheduled for 10 a.m., will be Jim Mull of Plainview, who has been a

years. He will speak briefly on the similarities and differences between now and Ira Aten's day.

Aten was a Texas Ranger who settled in Castro County and served a term as sheriff. The shootout was spawned from a public insult to Aten, made by Andrew McClelland, McClelland's brother, Hugh, also joined the fray, but no one was killed.

The gun Aten reportedly used in the shootout is on display at the Castro County Historical Museum.

## County to charge for commitments

From now on, if you ask the county to commit a member of your family to a mental institution or a drug-alcohol rehabilitation center, it will cost a \$150 filing fee plus 23 cents a mile for transportation, unless your family is indigent.

The County Commissioners' Court established the charges Monday to pay for the growing legal fees, court costs, paperwork, gas and other expenses involved in committing a person.

The state now requires that a "probable cause" hearing be held before a county remains any person to a mental institution or rehab center. County Judge Polly Simpson noted that the new requirement will make the commitment process more expensive because of the legal fees involved.

County Clerk Joy Jones reported that many counties charge filing fees in commitment cases, but that Castro never has.

"There's a tremendous amount of paperwork involved for the clerk's office, the courts, the judge and the sheriff's office," Mrs. Jones said.

She recommended that the county charge a filing fee, payable in advance.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis said the probable cause hearing that is now required, "even though expensive, is a very good idea" to weed out what is known as "weekend commitments" that stem from family crises, or the repeated commitment of an individual.

"I think we ought to charge people who want someone committed, to make sure they're serious about it," Commissioner Jimmie Howell commented.

Davis said also that a commitment often requires 200 to 500 miles of travel for county officials, to and from treatment centers. Most Castro

County patients are taken to the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center at Plainview or to the state hospital at Vernon, and the process usually requires two or three trips, Davis said. Davis recommended that the county set a fee of "a minimum of \$100 or \$150."

Commissioners felt the county should also be reimbursed for transporting patients, at the same mileage rate which it pays — 23 cents per mile.

Commissioner Ed Bennett made the motion to set the filing fee and mileage rate, and his motion carried unanimously.

Judge Simpson reported on the latest inspection of the county jail. Although the Texas Commission on Jail Standards certified the local jail again, the inspector noted that the current average jail population of 11 "is getting dangerously close to the maximum we're allowed" with the present number of cells, Mrs. Simpson reported.

"What he's telling us is that we'd better be doing something upstairs (in the jail block)," she said. "When our average jail population reaches 12, we'll be violating the regulations."

Judge Simpson said two more cells could be built in the cell-block area, but that it would require relocating some radio relay equipment which now takes up the space.

"Also, he said we'd better hire another jailer," Judge Simpson said. "We look in on our prisoners every hour on the hour, but anytime we have 10 in jail we have to have someone up there all the time."

In other action, the commissioners:

— Approved a new "urban area transportation map" of the City of Dimmitt, which [Continued on Page 10]

## Hart School Board hears TABS results

Results of the annual Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) tests taken by all third, fifth and ninth grade students, in February were presented to board members at Monday's meeting of the Hart School Board.

The TABS tests give specific data to assist in the improvement of instructional programs. The tests cover three basic areas — reading, writing and arithmetic.

The tests point out strengths and weaknesses of individual students. Individual results are released only to the student, parents and school personnel directly involved. Parents may see the results of their child's tests by contacting one of the school counselors.

Also during the meeting, board members accepted the resignations of Charles Lawson and Kay Gfeller. The Board employed Mrs. Pam McRary for Gfeller's position

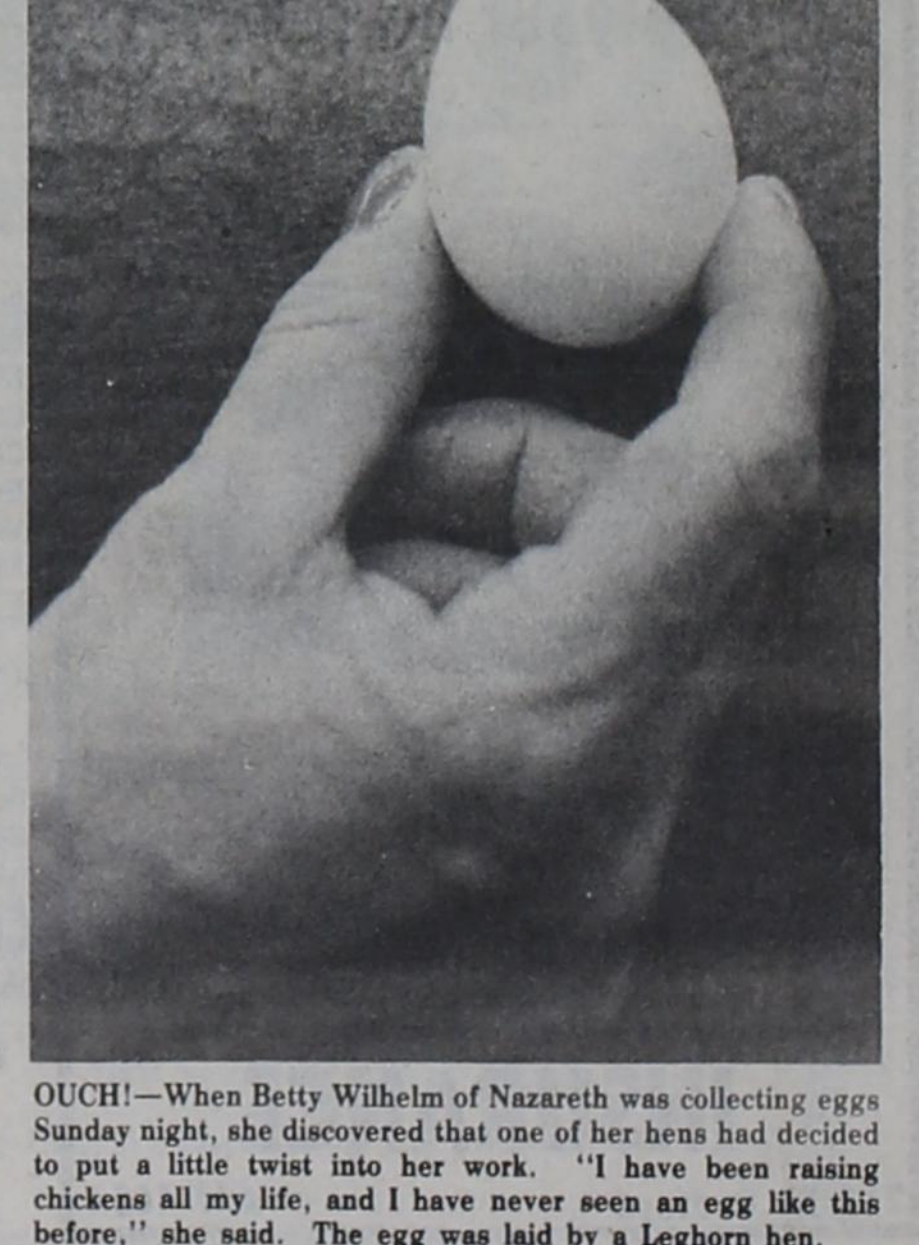
and Terry Lovett as band director for the 1983-84 school year. Don Sanders, CVAE shop instructor, presented his proposed budget for the next school year. The board approved the \$4,360 proposal.

Board members accepted bids on the district's 1987 International, 60-passenger school bus. The board accepted the bid from Church Buses of San Antonio for \$389.99.

The board appointed the firm of Brown, Graham and Company of Tulia to conduct the 1982-83 audit.

Trustees voted to continue to collect school taxes for the 1983-84 school year in the school tax office. The board also voted to change the date on the delinquent tax contract from Sept. 1 to July 1.

On July 1, delinquent taxes are to be turned over to the law firm of Perdue, Brandon, Blair and Fielder for collection.

attempt at asking bids to try to keep the cost as close to \$19,000 as possible.

Board members voted to authorize Gene King, business administrator, to negotiate for a new phone system for the schools.

Purchase of the present equipment (rotary) would cost \$7,633, and would be an investment in an obsolete system, which would eventually have to be replaced. Bids on the touch system were received at \$18,470 from Continental Telephone, \$19,787 from West Texas Telephone, and \$25,099 from Communications Corp.

After a down payment of \$3,694 to Continental, monthly payments could be continued at the current rental rate of \$374.75 per month for 39 months.

The 1982-83 budget was amended in functions 36 and 37 to show the revenue and expenditures generated by the boys' basketball playoffs. Revenue was \$10,784.93, with \$6,794.42 coming from

the state tournament. Expenditures were \$8,440.55, with \$5,336.17 going for meals, lodging and bus travel for the state tournament. Over all, the playoffs generated a \$2,200 profit.

In an executive session, board members accepted six resignations, hired two, promoted one, and heard an appeal by a parent concerning discipline administered at the middle school.

Pat Bagley, high school homemaking teacher, resigned her position. Others resigning were third grade teacher Sharon Crawford, Hart Plan A teacher Kay Gfeller, eighth grade science teacher Donna Hendrickson, high school girls basketball coach Jimmy Hoyle, and fourth grade bilingual teacher Jean Morris.

Beth Buckley was hired to teach sixth grade math, replacing Melody Hart, who was moved to the high school. James McClellan was hired to teach seventh grade science.

Lyman Schroeder was promoted from middle school coach to high school varsity girls coach.

In other business, the board:

—Was informed on the status of a current civil rights law suit involving the Edinburg CISD, in which the parents of a student who was injured at school and subsequently committed suicide are suing on the basis of violation of the student's civil rights.

—Revised the school calendar to move the March 30 in-service day to May 25, with the last day of instruction set May 24. The change came about because Dimmitt will not be hosting the band concert contest this year. It will be held at Plainview.

—Appointed Deanne Clark as official delegate to the TASB/TASA Convention Sept. 17-19. Don Gregory was named alternate. No resolutions were recommended.

—Approved the tax addition/deletion report.

—Were informed that the two buses sold brought prices of \$1,550 for the 1971 International and \$2,200 for the 1972 Ford.

—Approved payment of the bills, totaling \$131,350.39.

The Texas Corn Growers Association is currently working on several possible markets for the area's crop, according to association president Carl King of Dimmitt. King said that association representatives have been meeting with finance people with foreign money to invest in corn and corn bi-products. He added that at a later date a meeting will be held with an

agent representing the foreign investors.

King also revealed that he has been contacted by Mauricio Lopez, vice-president of the Fort Lauderdale, Fla. firm of Alto, Inc., which deals in export of food products.

Lopez said he had seen the corn growers' display at a recent trade show in Atlanta, and is interested in sending 300,000 metric tons of white corn and 125,000 metric tons of yellow corn to Venezuela.

Venezuela usually imports food grain from Africa and Argentina, but supplies have been reduced because of a drought in Africa, King said.

"This could be a hot possibility for us," King remarked. "We'll sit down and talk with him, and if the terms are right, we'll be glad to join in negotiations. Of course, it will take a lot of meetings if the deal does take place."

**Ornery bull mauls owner**

Bob Sheffy of Dimmitt is in Plains Memorial Hospital after being mauled by a bull while trying to get it corralled.

Sheffy is in good condition after being injured Saturday evening at his farm northeast of Dimmitt.

"He is okay. He is just banged up and the doctors are trying to get some fluid out of his lungs," Karen Sheffy, his sister-in-law, said.

After the bull got out of the corral, it pinned Sheffy against a locked fence. The bull knocked Sheffy's wife, Mildred, over and kicked her a few times, then returned to pin Sheffy against the fence, and finally butted him over.

The Sheffys have owned the bull only about three weeks, and "had been trying to get rid of him since we got him," Mrs. Sheffy said.

The small bull, a mixture of Brahma and Jersey, has been taken to the Dimmitt Meat Co. packing plant.

### Social Security ...in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS People who are nearing 65 and do not plan to retire will find that their Social Security check will be bigger when they do claim benefits.

This is because of the delayed retirement credit. This credit increases a person's retirement benefit for each month between 65 and 70 that he or she does not receive a benefit.

The credit adds 1/4 of 1% to each month — 3% for a full year — that a person does not get a check because of work. The credit also applies to widows' and widowers' benefits. Starting in 1990, the credits will increase gradually until they reach 8% by 2008.

In addition to these credits, a person's earnings after 65 may result in a bigger check than would have been payable at 65.

Of course, a person who starts getting checks at 65 can work and have significant earnings and still receive benefits. A person 65 or over in 1983 can earn up to \$6,600 before checks are affected. If earnings exceed \$6,600, then \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above \$6,600.

This annual exempt amount will increase automatically in future years to keep pace with increases in average wages. The exempt amount for people under 65 is \$4,920 in 1983. (Starting in 1990, the \$1 for \$2 withholding will become \$1 for \$3 for people 65 and over.)

### Friends meet after 41 years

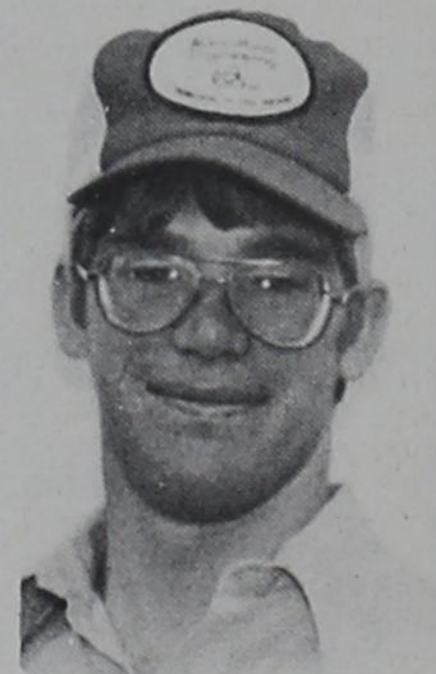
Army buddies Buck Raper of Dimmitt and Charles Shales of Chicago, Ill., were reunited in Dimmitt after 41 years.

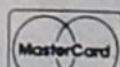
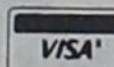
