Moore board looks to finalize Settles contract

Group to convene at 5:15 p.m. Monday

Staff Writer The board of directors for Moore Development for Big Spring could put its stamp of approval on a \$3 million agreement with the Settles Hotel Development Company Monday night, as it considers final approval of a performance agreement for the redevelopment of the historic downtown hotel.

Moore Development directors voted unanimously in April to provide up to \$3 million to help Brint Ryan — manager of the Dallas company and the founder and CEO of Ryan & Company renovate the Settles Hotel, which he agreed to purchase for \$75,000 from the city of Big Spring.

lax abatements on county agenda

Ban on aerial fireworks also in the works as holidays near

The Howard County Commissioner's Court will be considering a number of different tax abatements Monday morning, ranging from wind energy projects to the ongoing effort to redevelop the historic Settles Hotel.

Terry Wegman, executive director for Moore Development — the local agency that acts as liaison between the wind energy companies and the county's taxing entities for the purpose of tax abatements — will be pre-

senting the court with tax abatement agreements with five different wind energy developers.

"What's listed on the meeting agenda is basically the necessary steps for the county to grant the tax abatements," said (Gunsight Mountain Wind

Wegman. "We'll be considering five different companies, Airtricity (Panther Creek Wind Farm project), Padoma (Elbow Creek project), Duke (Ocotillo Windpower project), Invenergy

Energy project) and Iberdola (Wildhorse Mountain Wind Energy project).

"Four of the companies are expecting to begin and complete their projects before the end of 2008, while Iberdola has moved its project back to be completed by the end of 2009. They all look very viable, and I feel like we're looking at some promising projects."

Wegman said the court will hold a public hearing on the proposed abatement agreements, and possibly give the contracts

STANTON — Hoop it up.

The Stanton Buffaloes have been hosting their annual Classic Hooptown since Thursday. However, the defense of their own tournament hasn't gone as planned.

The Greenwood Rangers, fresh off a 70-37 victory over the Grape Creek Eagles earlier in the day, defeated the Buffs Friday night in the semifinals, 65-53.

With the victory, the Rangers advance to the finals where they

met the Reagan County Owls, who won 63-57 over the Wall Hawks in the other semifinal match up, at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

The first quarter belonged to the Rangers as Greenwood clamped down on the Buffs, not allowing them a field goal until the 4:15 mark. Stanton's Adam Evans finally found the bottom of the net, igniting a 9-3 run by the Buffs to cut the deficit to 18-14. Greenwood answered with a 9-4 run of their own.

Stanton's David Erives ended the run, burying a trey followed seconds later by a Rangers'

converted into an easy lay up cutting the lead again to four.

Greenwood however, once again had the answer in the form of back-to-back three pointers by Austin Ivie and Colby Gilbert putting the Rangers up 37-25 at the half.

Stanton was unable to cut into the lead any in the second half as Greenwood used a patient offensive to hold off the Buffaloes in the second half for the win.

Hawk women lose overtime thriller

The Howard Hawks women's basketball coaches knew going into their opening game of the Whitten Inn Classic against the Jacksonville College Lady Jaguars that one of their toughest challenges of the season was in store.

Their expectations were met as a feisty squad from Jacksonville defeated the Hawks, 66-64, in an overtime thriller.

"Jacksonville was the biggest challenge we've faced to this point," Hawks' Head Coach Earl Diddle said. "I knew that coming in after watching them. They make you play hard because they don't make a lot of mistakes. They have some veteran guards and they take really good care of the ball. They have strong post players that cause a lot of problems. They're a really good team and very well coached.'

Howard held a 1-point, 26-25, lead at intermission, courtesy of a Kandace Griffin 3-pointer just before the horn sounded.

Unfortunately for Howard, Griffin's buzzer-beater wasn't the only one of the night.

With the Hawks leading 60-58 with 11.9 seconds to play, Jacksonville's Sophia Piggie grabbed an offensive rebound five feet from the basket and sank the game-tying shot just as the final horn blew. Howard never led in the overtime with the Lady Jags scoring the first four points in the extra frame. With 22 seconds left, Howard turned the ball over, giving Jacksonville a chance to put the game out of reach. The Hawks elected not to foul right away with the shot clock off, instead hoping for the early turnover. Unfortunately, the Hawks waited too long to foul

Steers' win streak ends in Midland

MIDLAND — Every basketball team has to become battle tested at some point in its season.

That point occured this weekend for the Big Spring Steers.

The Steers were swept out of the Midland Tall City Oilman's tournament, losing all three of their games Friday and Saturday, bringing an end to a 7game win streak.

Big Spring opened its tournament run Friday against Midland Lee's Rebels, falling 82-46. Later in the day, the Steers fell to Rockwall's Yellow Jackets, 53-44, despite holding a 1-point lead at halftime.

Big Spring closed its tournament action Saturday morning, losing to Lubbock Trinity, 79-46.

"We faced some really good competition and hopefully we didn't lose too much of our confidence with these losses," Steers Head Coach Marcus Morris said. "We were playing up a bit and we kept up with these teams at points in each game. We just never pieced everything together. We played through some adversity, though, and that could make us better. I think the team understands we were playing against some good teams and that this is something we can benefit from in the long run."

The Steers (7-4) will find out quickly how much they did gain from the tournament experience. Big Spring rematches Midland Lee at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in Midland.

With several members of the team still playing football, the Steers opened the season with a loss to Abilene Wylie Nov. 13.

Big Spring won its next seven contests, including a championship run at the Gym Bice Classic in Andrews.

Midland Lee 82, **Big Spring 46**

The Steers led by one point at the end of the first period, but Midland Lee rallied in the second, outscoring Big Spring 23-8 in the stanza to lead 43-29 at the half.

Big Spring was unable to fight back as Midland extended its lead with each period.

Jason Walker led the Steers with 20 points and Terrance

SPORTS **Cowboys focused on shutting up Kitna**

DETROIT — The Dallas Cowboys can cross off a couple items on their todo list in Detroit. They can clinch the NFC East and shut up Jon Kitna.

Dallas (11-1) might be equally motivated to do both.

Kitna said Cowboys linebackers were not effective, among other things, and ripped No. 56, Bradie James, in particular during a radio interview after leading the Lions to an improbable win at Dallas to end the 2006 regular season.

James said Sunday's game at Ford Field has been circled on his calendar all year and called Kitna's comments "classless" when the team returned from a long break after beating Green Bay.

"In a sense, we've all been called out," Dallas linebacker Kevin Burnett said.

It might not be the only comment Kitna ends up regretting.

Kitna insisted before the season he would be disappointed if the Lions didn't win 10 games, a bit of bravado for the leader of a team that lost an NFLhigh 72 games the previous six seasons.

To avoid disappointment, the quarterback will have to help Detroit (6-6) pull off a stunning string of victories, starting with an upset over Dallas.

"That means they've got answered for him." to beat us to get to 10," Cowboys receiver Terrell remarks last January by Owens said.

digit underdogs at home against Dallas and will likely be so again on the road against San Diego next week and against Green Bay to close the regular season.

They seem to have only winnable game one remaining, against Kansas City at home, but that's not a given by any means.

Detroit has crumbled in all phases to revert to the same-old Lions after being one of the surprise teams in the league by winning six of its first eight games.

The Cowboys, meanwhile, have followed a strong start with a sixgame winning streak to earn their best 12-game record in franchise history.

Detroit's only hope is that the Cowboys are rusty because of a 10-day break.

The Cowboys have been off since beating Green Bay 37-27 in a Thursday night game. That win clinched a playoff berth and moved them within a victory of claiming a division title for the first time since 1998, and closer to securing home-field advantage for the NFC playoffs.

"We know what we're playing for and we've got to continue to play well and do our thing," linebacker Marcus Spears said. "If we do that, all those questions that Kitna needs answered will be

Kitna prefaced his

The Lions are double- careful because he knew the Lions were playing Dallas again this season. While preparing to play the Cowboys again, Kitna said the tone of his statements to the Seattle radio station had been lost.

"That was something that was unfortunately taken as serious that was said to my hometown radio station in fun," Kitna said Wednesday, the same day he didn't participate on a conference call with Dallas reporters as scheduled. "It was certainly not meant to be used in a way to degrade players. I talk to that station frequently, but unfortunately those quotes haven't been taken in the way they were meant."

Regardless of the interpretation, Kitna's words created another stir this season.

It appeared at the midway point of the schedule that he was going to have the last laugh about his bold statements entering the season, but he has become the face and mouth of what might end up being the NFL's laughingstock by the end of the month.

"I'm not saying he threw us under the bus, but he put us out there nationally with the 10-win prediction," receiver Roy Williams said earlier this year.

Williams might be out for the rest of the season with a knee injury, adding to Detroit's long list of woes.

Even if the Lions were healthy, the Cowboys saying he needed to be seem set up to beat them







Help us make sure children receive a toy

hristmas Days seems to be nearing at almost warp speed this year. Here we are with approximately two weeks of time to shop and some of us haven't even begun our shopping. Sadly, though, some haven't begun their shopping simply because they can't afford to shop at all. And that's a sobering thought — not only how difficult it must feel not being able to give gifts to loved ones, but imagining what it must be like for children in such families.

The Think Outside the Bottle Pledge is part of an effort by national and local organizations, religious communities, students, and concerned individuals to pull back the veil on the marketing of bottled water and to support public water systems.

With this pledge consumers are making a leap — they are beginning to ask not only, "Why should I be paying so much for this product?" but, "How is it that even water, which is essential for life,

can become a commodity?" They are asking, "Like the air we breathe, and the public parks we all share, is water not a resource that should be held in public trust?"

These questions and the groundswell of support for public water systems have a long history. Now, the Think Outside the Bottle Pledge is lending much-needed stimulus to efforts of public officials to address bottled water issues on the city level.

In San Francisco, Ann Arbor, Salt Lake City and cities across the United States, contracts with bottled water corporations are being cancelled or actions are being taken to reduce bottled water use at large.

What's at stake in these cities and elsewhere is not just the placement of vending machines where once there were water fountains.

What's at stake is not just the long waste stream left from plastic bottle manufacture to landfill. What's at stake is the shifting of control of water from public utilities to private corporations.

What traditionally has been viewed as a shared and common resource is becoming the property of corporations whose decisions about who gets water and who doesn't are based on corporate profits, rather than people's right to the resource.

On the international level, the number of people around the world served by private water cor-



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
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

UK judge upholds will leaving fortune to restaurant owners

LONDON (AP) — Think of it as a giant tip.

A wealthy widow repaid the kindness shown to her by a family that runs a Chinese restaurant she frequented by leaving them \$21 million, and a High Court judge ruled Friday that her will was

legal. Golda Bechal's 1994's will said she wanted Kim Sing Man and his wife, Bee Lian, the owners of a Chinese restaurant northeast of London, to inherit her money. She died at age 88 in January 2004. Bechal's five nephews and nieces asked the court to declare the will invalid, claiming their

aunt was suffering from

dementia. They asked the judge to give the inheritance to them.

But Judge Donald accepted the Rattee restaurateurs' evidence that Bechal, sad and lonely after the deaths of her husband and son, became like a family member to the couple.

They went on foreign holidays together and regularly got together at

their restaurant and at her apartment in Mayfair, central London.

"It was not irrational to leave the bulk of her estate to Mrs. Man, the daughter she would dearly wished to have had, and her husband," Rattee said.

Kim Sing Man remembered Bechal as a classy woman who "always enjoyed her Chinese pick-

Pennsylvania man in Guinness Book of World Records for getting hit by car

CONNELLSVILLE, Pa. (AP) Matthew McKnight hopes nobody manages to top his feat in the Guinness Book of World

Records.

because That's McKnight holds the record for "Greatest Distance Thrown in a Car Accident" in the book's 2008 edition.

The 29-year-old recordholder lived to tell about being thrown 118 feet by a car that hit him while traveling about 70 mph. He was struck Oct. 26, 2001, while trying to help accident victims along Interstate 376 in Monroeville, about 15 miles east of Pittsburgh.

He suffered two dislocated shoulders plus a broken shoulder, pelvis, leg and tailbone. He spent two weeks in the hospital and 80 days in rehab before returning to work in April 2002.

McKnight is a volunteer firefighter and paramedic, though he wasn't on duty when he stopped to help the accident victims. He works full-time as a communications specialist at Mercy Hospital in Pittsburgh.

McKnight's emergency room physician, Dr. Eric Brader, submitted paperwork for the record, which Guinness recognized in 2003. It was not listed in the book until the 2008 edition, however. "I thought it was a big joke. Dr. Brader is known for joking around a lot," McKnight told the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette.

According to the Energy Information Administration, as reported by the Wall Street Journal, voluntary blending of ethanol into the fuel supply by gasoline marketers reached new highs in November.

This new high in blending reflects the current high cost of gasoline combined with the comparatively low cost of ethanol. Now, as energy legislation continues to be debated, there is a glut of ethanol supply. However, there is stiff resistance to boosting the nation's current blending requirements.

A recent Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development report suggests biofuels "offer a cure (for oil dependence) that is worse than the disease." While the National Academy of Sciences and National Research Council points out the strain an ethanol plant can place on local water supplies.

The American Lung Association has also voiced concern about the air pollution associated with burning ethanol in the fuel supply. Also piling on are the livestock and food companies who oppose more ethanol use because of the impact the fuel's production has on their corn costs and their bottom line.

And finally, even though oil companies would likely welcome more ethanol blending from a cost standpoint, they remain resistant to the subsidy levels ethanol enjoys.

Meanwhile in Washington, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid are crafting an energy bill that is meant to combine the House and Senate's previous work.

According to Bloomberg, the new plan calls for 20.5 billion gallons (bg) of ethanol blending by 2015. Of that, 5.5 bg are supposed to be advanced ethanol. The existing ethanol fuel mandate requires 7.5 bg of renewable fuel blending by 2012.

Be prepared to wait for chance to benefit from interest rate freeze

WASHINGTON - Be ready to wait if you want to get information from a toll-free hot line about freezing the interest rate on your subprime mortgage.

Minutes after President Bush outlined a plan to help strapped homeowners, callers were told to have patience until a counselor could answer their questions and "devote as much time to you as necessary."

But, once they do get through, homeowners may not find the answers they sought.

One caller to the hot line (1-888-995-HOPE) was told there would be "lots of hoops to jump through" to obtain the five-year freeze. The rate hold goes to the heart of the relief effort for people with subprime mortgages, which are loans offered to borrowers with tarnished credit or low incomes.

Even President Bush acknowledged the plan is "no perfect solution." Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson said it was not a "silver bullet."

Only a fraction of the homeowners who face huge jumps in their mortgage payments appear likely to be helped by the plan, negotiated by the Bush administration, to freeze the low introductory rates on their subprime loans for five years. After that, they could be in the same position again.

Homeowners dialing up their mortgage company to get their current rate frozen could be disappointed. The White House plan does not force mortgage companies to give eligible homeowners a break. It is voluntary.

The White House on Friday defended the system and its eligibility requirements.

"I wouldn't call them 'hoops," White House deputy press secretary Tony Fratto said. "I think we are trying to make sure, as we outlined yesterday, that we're getting at the right population that can best be served by this program."

Bush promoted the initiative

• In recent years the Pakistani nuclear program's security has been compromised. A series of scientists reportedly sold secrets to al Qaeda. The Wall Street Journal reports that because of those lapses, a new screening and surveillance program similar to what is used in the U.S. is now in place.

• According to data released by the Center for Immigration Studies, over the past seven years, immigration was the highest of any sevenyear period in U.S. history. 10.3 million new immigrants (over half reportedly living here without legal status) have moved in over that timeframe.

• In the North Sea where crude production is declining, a wind farm in deep water is being developed. Project Beatrice is projected to hold 200 turbines that when complete could use the sea's gales to generate enough electricity for one million people. That's approximately 20 percent of Scotland's population. The project is the deepest offshore wind farm in the world.

• According to a Tokyo newspaper, Sankei, Pyongyang has resumed its assistance to Syria for the assembly of non-conventional warheads. The report asserts that after a four month break, a North Korean delegation has briefed the Syrian military on arming Scud C warheads with chemical agents.

• The U.N. Development Program recommends developing nations such as China and India should cut their emissions 20 percent by 2050. However, the burden on more industrialized nations is much greater. The report suggests those relevant countries should reduce emissions 80 percent from levels seen in 1990. The report comes days before an intergovernmental conference designed to agree upon a successor to the Kyoto protocol. The White House has already said it will not sign any agreement that did not include developing nations going through rapid industrialization.

• According to the EPA, the typical wood stove emits about 350 times more pollution than an oil furnace. However, according to the Hearth, Patio, and Barbeque Association, as reported by Bloomberg, sales of wood-pellet stoves have tripled since 1999. Those stoves are the most environmentally friendly wood-heating device on the market.

Anecdotal data suggests firewood sales are rising. According to Bloomberg, firewood costs half as much as heating oil when considering how much energy each product produces. With heating oil prices up 83 percent year-on-year, it appears many people are reverting back to years gone by to stay warm during the winter months.

Bankruptcy judge approves sale of remote West Texas resort

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A federal judge has approved the sale of a bank-rupt resort in West Texas to a Dallas businessman for 13.5 million.

The bid approved Friday by a judge in San Antonio came from Kelcy Warren, co-founder of Energy Transfer Partners LP, a natural gas and propane distributor.

Warren agreed to keep Lajitas, The Ultimate Hideout open for now but he would not say what his long-term plans were for the 25,000-acre resort, which features a golf course, luxury hotel and restaurants.

Located near Big Bend National Park, the resort owes between \$18 million and \$20 million to creditors.

The Lajitas resort was purchased by Stephen R. Smith, an Austin communications mogul, for \$4.2 million in 2000; he then pumped another \$100 million into the property in a failed effort to create a secluded desert destination for the rich.

New affidavit offers details of officer assault allegation

GEORGETOWN (AP) — A police officer has been charged with sexual

assault for allegedly raping a woman, authorities said.

Sgt. Jimmy Lewis Fennell Jr., 34, remained in the Williamson County Jail on Saturday with bail set at \$250,000. His attorney declined to comment on the case.

According to a search warrant affidavit, Fennell and other officers with the Georgetown Police Department responded to a domestic disturbance call at an apartment complex. The woman's boyfriend was arrested at the scene, and Fennell handcuffed the woman and put her in the front seat of his squad car.

The woman told police she thought Fennell was taking her to a hotel where she could spend the night. Instead, according to the affidavit released Friday, she told police he drove her to a park, removed her handcuffs and asked her to dance for him. He then ordered her to put her hands on the car's trunk and assaulted her, according to the affidavit.

Authorities found her prints on the trunk of Fennell's squad car, and police logs cannot account for Fennell's whereabouts for a two-hour period during which the woman said the assault occurred, according to the affidavit.

A Williamson County grand jury

indicted Fennell on Tuesday on felony charges of aggravated sexual assault, aggravated kidnapping and improper sexual activity with a person in custody. He was also charged with official oppression.

Fennell is a nine-year veteran of the department. He has been on paid administrative leave pending an internal affairs investigation of the alleged Oct. 26 crimes.

The charges against Fennell have brought renewed attention to the 1996 death of Fennell's fiance, 19-year-old Stacey Stites. She was found strangled on the side of a road near Bastrop. Investigators at the time ruled out Fennell, who was working as a Giddings police officer.

Rodney Reed was sentenced to death in 1998 for Stites' killing, but last year appealed on the grounds that the testimony of two witnesses who didn't take the stand in his trial might have exonerated him.

Williamson Co. man first Texan to be charged under Jessica's Law

LEANDER (AP) — A Williamson County grand jury has indicted a man on a capital charge of continuous sexual abuse of a child, making him the first person in Texas charged under a new state law that carries harsher penalties for sex offenders.

If convicted, Alfredo Soto Enriquez, 35, would face a minimum punishment of 25 years in prison, part of tougher sentencing rules known as Jessica's Law. Under old laws, Enriquez could have been eligible for parole after serving part of his sentence. Now, parole is no longer an option.

Enriquez is accused of molesting a 10year-old girl at least twice from September to October, authorities said. He also faces seven counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child and two counts of indecency with a child.

Enriquez's attorney, Bristol Myers of Austin, said the allegations are untrue and that his client is "looking forward to his day in court." Enriquez remained in the Williamson County Jail on Friday with bail set at \$500,000.

Enriquez is the first Texas resident indicted under the new law, according to Williamson County District Attorney John Bradley and the Texas District and County Attorneys Association.

"This just happened to be the first case we received where it looked like it fit that definition," Bradley said.





Police release first images

of Omaha mall gunman

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — In the first surveillance images released of a teenage gunman's shopping mall rampage, the shaggy-haired assailant can be seen raising an assault rifle to fire in front of a department store mannequin.

Police released three still images Friday, two days after 19-year-old Robert A. Hawkins killed eight people and himself at Westroads Mall's Von Maur store.

The images at first show Hawkins walking into the mall unarmed, wearing glasses, a black zippered sweat shirt over a black T-shirt with a white logo. Six minutes later, he returns and strides through an entrance decked with holiday decorations, an apparent bulge under his clothing. In the last image, he is shown with his sleeves rolled up, aiming the AK-47 to fire.

The images appear to contradict earlier reports that the gunman had a military-style haircut and entered the mall wearing a camouflage vest.

Moments after Hawkins entered the mall, authorities would be flooded with 911 calls about the gunfire. One was from Jodi Longmeyer, a human resources manager at Von Maur, who agonized with the operator while barricaded in an employee locker room at the store.

Some heart, cancer tests put off because of shortage of radioactive ingredient for scans

NEW YORK (AP) — Thousands of patients are facing delays in crucial medical tests because of a shortage of a radioactive substance used in those examinations all because of the shutdown of one nuclear reactor in Canada. The substance is used in at least 15 million medical scans a year in the United States, by one estimate. Those scans are used to diagnose and assess a wide variety of conditions including cancer, heart disease and bone or kidney illnesses.

They are often crucial for guiding therapy, telling a doctor whether a woman's breast cancer has invaded her bones, for example.

But over the past few days, many hospitals began facing a shortage of a radioactive substance called technitium-99 that is injected into patients to do these body scans. And that has forced them to cut back on the procedures.

"Many, many hospitals are working at about 20 to 30 percent of capacity" in doing the scans in the United States and Canada, estimated Dr. Sandy McEwan, president of the Society of Nuclear Medicine, based in Reston, Va. He said he didn't know how many scans had been postponed.

Democrats voice outrage, seek probe into CIA destruction of interrogation tapes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional Democrats Friday demanded a full Justice Department investigation into whether the CIA obstructed justice by destroying videotapes that documented the harsh 2002 interrogations of two alleged terrorists.

A day after CIA Director Gen. Michael Hayden told agency employees the tapes were destroyed in 2005, members of Congress, human rights groups and lawyers for accused terrorists said the tapes may have been key evidence that the U.S. government had illegally authorized torture.

White House press secretary Dana Perino said Friday that President Bush did not have any recollection about the tapes or about their destruction. But she could not rule out White House involvement in the tapes' destruction, saying that she asked only the president about it, not others.

Perino refused to comment on whether the destruction could represent obstruction of justice or a threat to cases against terrorism suspects. She said that if the attorney general decides to investigate, "of course the White House would support that."

In a letter to Attorney General Michael Mukasey, the Senate's No. 2 Democrat, Senate Democratic Whip Dick Durbin of Illinois, asked for a probe of "whether CIA officials who destroyed these videotapes and withheld information about their existence from official proceedings violated the law."

Prosecutors give immunity to some guards; focus on charging others in Iraq shooting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal prosecutors investigating the shooting deaths of 17 Iraqi civilians have narrowed their focus on as few as three Blackwater Worldwide bodyguards and have given others immunity for cooperating in the case, The Associated Press has learned.

New information about the deadly Sept. 16 incident, which has strained relations between the United States and Iraq, reflects progress by the government to prosecute Blackwater guards for the shooting in Baghdad's Nisoor Square.

A final decision on whether to prosecute the guards — and how many — may still be months away. But two weeks into a federal grand jury investigation, people close to the case told AP that authorities have focused the number who could face charges to about three of the dozen or more guards on the security detail.

Despite the progress, the people who discussed the case noted concerns about testimony given by the four Blackwater guards who have so far appeared in front of the secret panel. Details were discussed on condition of anonymity because of the sensitive nature of the information.

The concerns stem, in part at least, from the fact that Blackwater is paying one law firm to represent as many as 10 guards, raising concerns that their stories could be coordinated. The Justice Department tried to get the firm removed from the case but, in a closeddoor hearing last week, a federal judge refused the request.

Gates: Persian Gulf countries must coordinate to counter Iranian threat

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Defense Secretary Robert Gates planned to tell Gulf countries Saturday they must work together to help the U.S. counter Iranian threats, including Tehran's ballistic missiles and meddling in Iraq.

Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said the United States still wants new sanctions.

Gates, ending a weeklong trip to the region, intended in his keynote speech at an international security conference in Manama to urge Gulf allies to cooperate more as part of a broader strategy for containing Iranian influence, according to U.S. officials traveling with Gates on Friday.








